CARE OF THE AGED

PART I

1. Request

At the 30th Session, the Council of the Northwest Territories directed that the Administration prepare for the next regular session of Council a proposal for the development of a comprehensive program for the care of the aged of all ethnic groups in the Northwest Territories, the program to include construction of physical facilities as well as other types of services. (Proposal, Page 238.)

II. Introduction

The number of older people in the population of Canada is increasing rapidly. Medical science and improved living conditions are lengthening the life span of the average citizen and magnifying the problems of aging in our society. In all parts of Canada there is a growing realization that more must be done to assist elderly people to achieve a satisfying existence when their productive years are over.

On the basis of available information, it is estimated that there will be more than 242 people over 55 years old, representing all ethnic groups in the Northwest Territories, who will require care in varying degrees during the next five years. This figure is broken down roughly as follows:

Eskimos

A Northern Administration Branch survey of housing in the eastern Arctic conducted in the summer of 1964 revealed 95 Eskimos of 65 years and over. The survey indicated that most of these older Eskimo people are being cared for by their families on a standard that is normal for the area.

This is true to a great extent of the Eskimo people of the Arctic coast of the Mackenzie District. In the high Arctic the majority of the people are living off the land, and the extended family which forms the basic economic unit, still includes grandparents. The number of Erhinos in the M.D. estimated to require cure in next 5 years.

Indians //numbers 35.

In the lower Mackenzie Valley the aged population at the present time consists almost entirely of Treaty Indians who are in the first instance the responsibility of the Indian Affairs Branch. Most of the people in this group exist on a hunting and trapping economy. The activities of this type of livelihood are such however that they can be carried out by fairly elderly people but only where they are in good health.

Those who are in poor health are cared for by various medical facilities, such as T.B. sanatoria or chronic care hospitals. This leaves a marginal group whose health is reasonably good or at least not poor enough to warrant admission to a medical institution and who do not have families to turn to in their advanced years. This group numbering about 127 constitutes a major part of the problem in the care of the aged Indian groups in the North.

Others

In the southern Mackenzie District there is in addition to the Treaty Indians, a sizeable group that is non-Indian and non-Eskimo, numbering approximately 6,000 m The older segment of this group, numbering approximately or people who are the responsibility of the Government of the Northwest Territories contains a large number of former prospectors, trappers and labourers who have chosen to live

50% of the expenditures of the Territorial Government for these services are recoverable under the Unemployment Assistance Act. 100% of the cost of Homemaker and Boarding Home Care for Indians and Eskimos is recoverable from Indian Affairs and Northern Affairs. As the number and status of the persons who will receive these services is not predictable the amount recoverable is approximate only.

Recommendations

It is recommended that:

- 1. A medium sized hostel be built in Yellowknife in 1966 as outlined above. This unit, for the care of those aged persons who can no longer maintain themselves independently, should have sufficient land surrounding it to permit the construction later of single unit dwellings for those old people who do not require hostel care but do need some assistance with meals. The site should be close to the hospital and shopping area.
- 2. Two Homemakers be recruited in Yellowknife and one each for Fort Smith and Hay River for the first year.
 - 3. The Homemaker Service be expanded in 1967-68 and 1968-69.
- 4. Two small hostels for the aged by built in 1970-71 (one at Hay River and one at Fort Simpson).
- 5. The tentative five-year plan be re-examined in one year's time to assess progress and to re-adjust objectives and timing as experience or other necessity dictates.

FIVE YEAR PROGRAM FOR THE DEVPLOPMENT OF SERVICES AND FACILITIES FOR THE AGED IN THE NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

The following is an attempt to project on a year-to-year basis, over a period of five years, the capital, staff, and operating costs of a comprehensive program of services and facilities for the aged in the Northwest Territories. Certain assumptions have had to be made in order to deal with the complex matter of continuing federal responsibility for Indians and Eskimos. These assumptions were:

- (a) Indian Affairs and Northern Affairs would agree to use any Territorial facilities that might develop. This has been confirmed.
- (b) Northern Affairs and Indian Affairs would continue to expand their Low Cost Housing Programs, their Boarding Home Programs, and would agree to utilize Territorial Homemaker Services
- at their own expense, as appropriate.

 (c) That any plans on the part of Indian Affairs or Northern Affairs to construct institutional facilities in the North would be discussed first with the Territorial Government in the interests of co-ordination, and would be open to persons in all three ethnic groups.

 The group of aged persons in the Mackenzie District who will require some degree of care during the next 5 years is estimated to number 242. Of this group, approximately 35 are Eskimos, 125 Indians and 82 are "others". The following tabulation shows how many the existing facilities and services can accommodate.

Recommendations

It is recommended that:

A medium sized hostel be built in Yellowknife in 1966 as outlined above. This unit, for the care of those aged persons who can no longer maintain themselves independently, should have sufficient land surrounding it to permit the construction later of single unit dwellings for those old people who do not require hostel care but do need some assistance with meals. The site should be close to the hospital and shopping area.

2. Two Homemakers be recruited in Yellowknife and one each

for Fort Smith and Hay River for the first year.
3. The Homemaker Service be expanded in 1967-68 and 1968-69. Two small hostels for the aged be built in 1970-71 (one at

Hay River and one at Fort Simpson).

5. The tentative five-year plan be re-examined in one year's time to assess progress and to re-adjust objectives and timing as experience or other necessity dictates.
