DISPOSITION

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FORT SIMPSON WATER AND SEWER SYSTEM - USER RATES

As a result of a report submitted by Associated Engineering Services in April, 1958, a water and sever system was installed at Fort Simpson at a cost of about \$650,000.

The system was completed in 1960, but until the spring of 1965, no charges were levied for services. Early in 1965, however, after discussion with Northern Canada Power Commission, which operates the system, a rate structure was established and users were notified of the schedule and informed that charges would be made for use after April 1st, 1965.

In reviewing the rate structure, Council will remember that under the terms of the Federal-Territorial Financial Agreement, it was agreed that the cost would be shared on the basis of 50% capital and 50% operational by the senior governments and the remaining 50% of each by the consumer.

In practice, however, it was found more frasible for the federal government to pay the full costs of installation and for consumers to pay the full costs of operation on the basis that 50% of capital costs, amortized over 15 years, plus 50% operational costs were reasonably equated to full annual operating costs. This latter formula is being considered for the next 5-year Financial Agreement.

In the case of Fort Simpson, the N.C.P.C. provided the following data:

As of April, 1965, the revenue estimated for the fiscal year 1965-66 is 34,296, which is about 55% of the cost of operation (\$64,000). The balance of 330,000 is the annual subsidy which must be paid by the Government of the Northwest Territories.

In brief, the existing rates of \$14 per month for water and \$3.60 per month for severage removal (total \$17.60) represents 55% of the annual operating cost but does not conform to the proposed policy recommending that users pay 100% of operating costs.

The problem at Fort Simpson is that even the rate of \$17.60 per month (\$211 per year) is considered too high for the average private user. Council should note that any reduction from this rate will require further subsidy by Council unless a more drastic change in policy can be brought about.

Using the same figures as quoted above, for example, if Council decides \$10 a month instead of \$17,60 a month is a more reasonable rate, the total payments by users would be about \$19,080 per year or under 20% of actual costs and would increase the annual subsidy from \$30,000 to about \$44,000.

In considering the problem, it is thought that the whole matter of water and sever rates should be reviewed because a decision to adopt a certain rate at Fort Simpson will undoubtedly serve as a criterion for all other settlements and Council will be faced with finding funds to subsidize the discrepancies. At the moment it is not possible to advise Council of the estimated subsidy figure which would be required on an overall basis should a rate less than actual operating costs be established, but the Administration is preparing a paper which may be completed in time for the Summer, 1966 Session. Council might be well advised to defer a decision on the proposal to reduce the present rate of \$17,60 per unit until that time.
