Oral Question 319-18(2): Promotion and Protection of Traditional Lifestyles

This letter is in follow-up to the Oral Question you raised on October 14, 2016 regarding the promotion and protection of traditional lifestyles in the Northwest Territories (NWT).

The traditional economy is extremely important to all communities across the NWT, especially to those who rely on traditional foods for a large portion of their diet. Important aspects of traditional economy programming are positive health benefits and youth related activities. Programs teach youth traditional life skills, and give them the opportunity to connect with elders through a shared appreciation for traditional culture and heritage. Additionally, the trapping of fur-bearers is a key economic driver in many small communities.

The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) provides support to NWT community governments, Aboriginal organizations and community schools through programs such as:

- Take a Kid Trapping;
- Community Harvesters Assistance Program;
- Local Wildlife Committee Funding;
- Genuine Mackenzie Valley Fur Program; and,
- Workers Safety and Compensation Commission coverage to protect trappers from loss of income due to injury.

The GNWT invests over \$2.6 million to deliver these programs, which are coordinated by Environment and Natural Resources (ENR) with funding contributions from the Departments of Municipal and Community Affairs and Health and Social Services. Other GNWT departments contribute funding because they see benefits from traditional economy activities that support their mandates.

The programs listed above represent a portion of the assistance provided by the GNWT to small communities and their traditional economy. I will table a full report during the February-March 2017 sitting of the Legislative Assembly.

ENR understands how important traditional economy is to NWT residents and the department will continue to provide support to communities through the allocation of funds and program delivery.

² A revolving fund of \$1.5 million is used to provide advances for the sale of fur and hides.

³ Funding is shared between the Departments of Industry, Tourism and Investment and Environment and Natural Resources. The Fur Price Program Grant is included in this funding (\$205,000) and is used to conduct fur marketing activities and sales commissions paid out after every sale.

⁴ Significant in-kind administrative support is provided in addition to this funding.

¹ The Department of Education, Culture and Employment provides additional contributions to support traditional lifestyles through initiatives such as the Emerging Heritage Centres funding and the NWT Arts Council. Funding amounts vary depending on the number of applications received.
