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Betty House construction underway

Single women and women with children will have a new place to live this summer – Betty House. And not a moment too soon.
Betty House will be full when it opens, based on the waiting list of 50 for the YWCA's Rockhill family housing program. Betty House will meet the need for women's housing not provided anywhere else in the NWT.

The apartments will provide housing for women with children who want to escape abusive situations. Security features will help women feel secure at Betty House.

Depending on availability, women living in overcrowded conditions or moving on from an emergency shelter may also be welcomed. Experienced staff will help women rebuild their lives by offering new skills and learning opportunities.

The three-storey building includes six bed-sitting rooms with a communal kitchen, eight two-bedroom apartments and two three-bedroom apartments, along with program and office space.

Construction of the 18-unit building on 54



Street began is well underway, with Clark Builders as the general contractor. The City of Yellowknife is managing construction of the \$4 million project. YWCA Yellowknife will become the owner and operator of Betty House when it is complete.

Living at Rockhill: "It made a big difference being here"

"My boyfriend and I were living at the Ptarmigan apartments with our son. He's now two-and-a-half. Rent was \$1675 a month and we started getting behind. Only one of us was working because we couldn't afford day care at \$800 per month plus rent.

I had heard about THP and called. They gave us the opportunity of living in an emergency unit for three months so we could catch up on bills. That did the trick and then we moved into a one-bedroom transitional unit. That was lucky because they don't always have openings and you have to go somewhere else.

It's made a big difference being here. It allowed me to have the programs offered here. It's given us time to save up money because we're going to move south in a few months. Anything you need, anything you want to talk about the staff is always there for us.

I learned how to cook, how to be a better parent, how to have more patience, how to take responsibility for money. I make a pretty mean meat loaf.

The staff work with you, how to budget, how to save money, show you crafts, cooking and computers. They'll

help with resumes and looking for jobs.

We're starting over in Red Deer at the end of May. My boyfriend has some family. We're going to find jobs and stay with a friend there for a couple of days.

I am way less stressed now. I used to be pretty stressed out all the time about money and bills, making sure everything paid and making sure there was food on the table. It's hard if you are a young family."

message from the executive director:

January is a time of new beginhings, as we change our calendars and watch the sun turn again towards the northern hemisphere. A new year, and longer days... what will 2014 hold for us in our efforts to reduce violence, poverty and homelessness? Here are my hopes for the new year ahead:

> That we learn from Alberta's efforts to end homelessness with the improvements we need to make in our efforts to assess needs and end homelessness for families

> Our new (yet to be written) community plan to address homelessness will excite broad engagement from government departments and non-profit housing and sheltering agencies

Fundraising for BETTY House steadily continues so that it can open with everything needed to have a welcoming atmosphere for the women and children who will live there

Waiting lists of housing (emergency, transitional, public, or affordable) are shorter and everyone has more timely access to suitable housing

That the housing subsidy program

through the GNWT is maintained and perhaps even expanded

Developers find ways to increase stock of mixed use housing in the downtown core, and some units are affordable by CMHC standards

That addictions treatment will include trauma recovery and be widely available throughout the NWT

Women with mental health issues have the same level of access to services as exists for men with mental health issues

No deaths occur in the NWT due to intimate partner violence in 2014

The treatment program for men who use abuse is successful and replicated in other regions of the NWT

That no one goes without meals or stays home from school because they cannot afford food

And that we continue to be kind and helpful to each other as we live out the days of 2014
