PROGRAM FOR THE AGED
Re: Item For Action No. 118

At the 33rd Session of the Northwest Territories Council, Mr. Baker, Mr. Porritt and Mr. Goodall asked that implementation of the Territorial Government's Five Year Plan for the development of services for the aged be speeded up.

The Northern Administration Branch shares Council's concern over the continuing lag in the development of services for elderly people in the north and is equally anxious to see all parts of the Plan translated into action as quickly as possible. However, the realization of many of our objectives for the elderly ultimately hinges upon developments in other key areas of activity. A further explanation will enable Council to have a more complete picture of the major problems which still have to be solved before the Plan can be fully implemented. Perhaps the best way to deal with this matter is to recap the most important elements of the Plan and at the same time report what progress has been made in connection with each.

First of all, the Plan regarded the provision of adequate shelter to be the greatest and most urgent single need of elderly people in the North. On the assumption that most older people could and would prefer to live in their own homes or with relatives and friends if conditions permitted, the Plan urged both governments to give priority to the improvement of housing throughout the North. It was understood that this requirement would have to be taken care of by the Department's and the Territorial Government's Low Rental--Low Cost Housing Programs.

On the Department's side, encouraging progress was made last year towards improving housing conditions among Eskimos in the Eastern Arctic and undoubtedly there were many elderly among those who benefitted. The Branch's Housing Program will be carried to the Central Arctic this summer and to the Mackenzie District next year. A number of new houses were also constructed last year for Indians in the Mackenzie. Council is aware that the Federal Government is probably endeavouring to amalgamate the administration of the Eskimo and Indian Housing Programs under the Northern Administration Branch this year in the interests of greater efficiency and a better balance of effort.

There is still a critical shortage of adequate housing among large numbers of non-Indian, non-Eskimo residents of the Territories. At this Session Council will deliberate on the establishment of a Territorial Housing Authority which, if proceeded with, will make it possible for the Territorial Government to deal with the housing needs of this group.

In summary, therefore, it is fair to say that considerable progress has been made on this particular requirement of the Plan.

The Plan also called for the development and use of Homemaker Services in providing assistance to elderly people living in their own homes but unable to completely care for themselves. As reported at the 33rd Session, this part of the Plan has already been implemented but only to a limited extent. There are several reasons for this. Firstly, to function properly, the Homemaker Services Program must assume the existence of adequate housing to begin with. It is impractical to place homemakers in substandard, ill-equipped housing and expect them to provide proper care. Secondly, experience to

date suggests that it is quite difficult to find women locally, particularly in the smaller communities, who are prepared to act as homemakers. Also, when women are found who could serve in this capacity, most have to be given some measure of training and supervision. Therefore, while this approach allows for optimism, it does present certain problems which cannot be overcome immediately. Housing is obviously one of the main problems. The other is lack of social work staff in the field to recruit, train and supervise women to undertake this work in local communities. Progress in implementing the Homemakers Services part of the Plan depends upon improvements occurring in these two related areas.

A number of elderly people are now being assisted through the Boarding Home Care Program which is still another feature of the overall Plan. As with Homemaker Services, the use of Boarding Home Care depends to a great extent upon the availability of family dwellings where elderly people can be comfortably lodged. Overcrowded housing conditions in the North tend to limit the ability to use this form of care as extensively as is desirable. Again, the rate of progress to be hoped for in this connection in the future, is directly tied to advances in government housing programs. On this basis, it is anticipated that greater use will be made of Boarding Home Care in the Eastern and Central Arctic in 1967, but that there will be relatively no change in pace as far as the Mackenzie is concerned.

Finally, the Plan also proposed the construction and operation of institutional facilities in the North for elderly people of all ethnic groups needing this kind of care. The institutions to be constructed were to compliment the facilities that already exist in various areas of the North which, for the most part, are operated by religious denominations. Statistical information to support the need for new facilities in a number of communities in the Mackenzie District was provided Council by the Children's Aid Society of Yellowknife and by Branch staff at the time the Plan was proposed. On this matter, the Plan also emphasized the principle, later accepted by Council, that whenever and wherever possible and feasible these facilities should be constructed in or near those communities where elderly people have passed most of their lives.

The Plan proposed that three new institutions should be constructed during the five-year period in the following order of priority:

Yellowknife (15 beds) 1966
Fort Simpson (8 beds) 1970-71
Hay River (8 beds) 1970-71

The determination of the need to construct additional facilities in the northern part of the Mackenzie District and in the Eastern and Central Arctic during this period or later, was to be left in the hands of the Branch. It was generally understood, however, that if new facilities were to be constructed during the five-year period in communities other than those mentioned above, this would be paid for out of federal funds.

The new Territorial institutions at Yellowknife, Fort Simpson and Hay River were to be constructed and operated under a special agreement between the Commissioner of the Northwest Territories and the Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. The essential features of this agreement were described to Council in Recommendation to Council No. 9, First Session, 1966.

Progress on the construction of the Home in Yellowknife was reported to Council at the 33rd Session. Further details are found on pages 739-740 of the proceedings of that Session.

At the request of the Territorial Government, the Federal Government recently asked for and received from its field staff statistical information to support a proposal to construct a Home at Fort Smith to serve that and surrounding communities. The report, a copy of which is attached, which does not purport to be more than a quick and superficial appraisal of the situation, indicates the need for a facility of this kind in the Fort Smith Region but at the same time expresses doubt about the willingness of many elderly people now living in more distant communities such as Fort Simpson and Hay River, to enter the Home if it is built at Fort Smith. On the same basis, the report also confirms that there is a continuing urgent need in the town of Yellowknife for a 15-bed Home of the type previously planned.

The report recommends refurbishing an existing federal building for use as a Home for elderly people of Fort Smith and Fort Resolution, rather than undertake new construction. A very rough estimate of the cost of refurbishing this building would be in the order of \$6,500. Annual operating costs would be in the order of \$23,000 of which 50% would be recoverable under the Unemployment Assistance Act. An agreement with C.M. & H.C. would not apply under this arrangement.

The information available to the Branch from the field points to the need for a small Old Folks Home at Fort Smith to provide institutional care for seven or eight elderly people living in that community and at Fort Resolution.

If the Home were established to provide a high degree of independent living, i.e. with most of the residents preparing their own meals and with no provision for nursing home care, a staff of three or four would be quite sufficient to operate it.

Since a number of federal residences will presumably become available at Fort Smith for other uses with the move of some of our field staff to Yellowknife, the Branch recommends that two of these be converted for use as a Home for the Aged rather than undertake new construction.

The Branch have not had time to prepare an estimate of the costs of converting existing houses for use as a Home at Fort Smith, nor for the operation of that Home. The best estimate at the moment as far as capital costs are concerned would be in the order of \$25,000. Two existing adjacent 3 or 4 bedroom houses could be joined by a weather-proof passageway with a common room and laundry unit located midway between. This is feasible from an engineering point of view. The best estimate of operating costs would be about \$30,000 per annum. A portion of the operating cost would be recoverable from National Health and Welfare under the Unemployment Assistance Act which will share half the cost of maintaining needy residents who are Territorial responsibilities. Northern Administration Branch will pay the cost of maintaining eligible residents who are federal responsibilities.

Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation would not share in the conversion costs of such a Home. The houses would be made available by Department of Public Works for a nominal sum and alterations and additions would be a one-time expenditure. Central Mortgage and Housing would share any operating loss as with the Yellowknife Home.

There is still a pressing need for an Old Folks Home at Yellowknife and the Branch recommends that this be proceeded with as originally intended. Council is being asked to approve capital funds to undertake the construction of the Yellowknife Home.

At the Deputy Commissioner's review of the 1967-68 Territorial Estimates the capital funds in the amount of \$168,000 for the construction of the Yellowknife Home were re-allocated to Fort Smith with a view to building the Home there and \$1 was left in for operating costs. It was decided that because the Home would not be ready until late fall funds for operation could be sought in supplementary estimates in September.

The funds proposed for the construction of the Yellowknife Home were submitted on the basis that 90% would be recoverable from Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation. In addition to providing board and room for 15 residents this Home would operate as a Day Centre for the elderly residents of Yellowknife who continue to reside in their own homes. This would facilitate the work of voluntary organizations in the community who may wish to assist by providing a recreational program for the old people.

If Council approves the original plan to build a Home in Yellowknife funds in the amount of \$25,000 would have to be appropriated at the same time for converting existing buildings at Fort Smith for use as a hostel for the aged. Operating costs would be sought in supplementary estimates later this year.

The Branch will await the decision of Council on the construction of a Home this summer either at Fort Smith or Yellowknife or both. If the decision is for new construction at Fort Smith the plans that have been drawn up by the architects for the Yellowknife Home could be adopted for this purpose.

In summary then, the Territorial Government's Five-Year Plan for the development of services for aged people in the Territories is being implemented about as quickly as circumstances will permit. Much of what is proposed under the Plan, in terms of the development of various types of services, cannot be fully realized until advances are made in other related areas of activity - particularly that of low rental and low cost housing. Work on the architectural plans for the new institution in Yellowknife is being held in abeyance. Before proceeding further the Branch must first have a decision on what is to be done this summer at Fort Smith and Yellowknife.
