I am sorry that it has taken so long to answer your letter of June 28. I took your letter with me to Yellowknife and have argued very strongly on your behalf for new houses for Pelly Bay. Only a few days ago did I have an answer from the Gov't of NWT administration. I quote you the text of the Telex which I received from Mr. S. W. Hancock, Director of the Dept of Local Government.

"Reurtel and as promised the possibility of allocating up to five houses to Pelly Bay 1973-74. Construction looks promising, you will appreciate we can make no firm commitment until 1973-74 capital budget is received from DIRM for northern rental housing construction. We will advise immediately our construction program is fixed up".

As soon as I get further information I will let you know. I also must point out that every settlement in my constituency is, like Pelly Bay, asking for new houses on the basis of overcrowding the present houses.

I only wish it was possible to get enough houses in one year to supply all the settlements adequately however with only a few houses allocated each year I can only try to argue for them in the places with the greatest need.

I do want you to know that for next years allotment of houses Pelly Bay will be my first priority and I will do everything I can personally to get new houses to Pelly Bay from the 1973-74 allotment.




There are 35 houses with over 200 people living in them.

10 pregnant ladies whose baby will be born this year 1972
Some in July 1972 and some later so if the babies are
born they will be add up in one of the Rental
Houses. There are babies every year, some ladies to be
pregnant soon, some to get their babies.

There are also at least 3 couples getting married,
from last year, there were about 4 got married with
no house at all, to live in. we are short of Houses
for couples. If all couples, who are married had
a house, the houses would be more cleaner. With too
many people with only 3 bed room, you cannot
make it clean.

There is trouble too about houses is that there are couples who get married every year who live with their families who had about 6 to 7 kids. Most of the houses are full with people who most of them had lost of kids with only 3 bedroom. Like House # 3. father & Mother had 3 kids. -- 3th one married with 3 bedroom. Old woman living. That 3 families in 3 bedroom House there are 12 people in 3 bedroom House.

Also there are at least 3 or 4 getting married every year so we have a very bad houses who are filled.

I hope we will be heard from the Government as we have been asking for 3 or 4 years or more for New Houses so that we will keep our house clean with less people.

I have been asked to write to you from Pelly Bay Housing Association so here I am now writing to you about our problem. I hope we will hear from you.

At the meeting, the directors told me to write this to impress you how badly we need houses. We have asked before, and we never get any house this year while Gya Haven, Spence Bay and Cambridge got some. Looks like the

people who ever looks after (Kenta) Houses does not care about Pelly Bay because they never look inside the 35 houses and how there are 3 families in them.

We hope to hear from you soon.

Thanks for looking at this matter.

Dear Lena:

We have heard that that there are no new houses coming to Pelly Bay and we are asking you to try to get them in to Pelly Bay as the commissioner had promised. We heard that the Regional office had not a list about Pelly Bay to get new houses.

You wrote to us in August 25, 1972 that this year allotment of houses Pelly Bay will be your first priority and you will do everything you can personally to get new houses to Pelly Bay from 1973-74 allotment. We are now writing to you to make sure that we get these five houses that were promised by the commissioner on his visit to Pelly Bay. You heard what he said that we are to get new houses and we believe him and when we heard that that there are to be no houses, we feel bad about it and we are asking for you to get them for us for we do need the houses badly because there are too many people in one house and too crowded for there are more than 10 people in one house and people in one of the houses always sleep on the floor. Maybe you remember that the nurse ask the commissioner to get houses for Pelly Bay because it is not good to have crowded place because of the health.

Mr. Stevenson from Cambridge Bay told us that he telephone Regional Office about the new houses for Pelly Bay and they told him that there are no list of houses for 1973 to Pelly Bay. And he told them that there are to be houses and they only could tell him that there are no list of houses for Pelly Bay.

Now we are right now trying hard and counting on you to help us to get these houses for this spring and these houses must have gone to some place by mistake and we are counting on you to get them for us yet. Please write soon.

Last year and before we asked for new houses and we always get the same answer that next year we are going to get the new houses and it is more that 3 years that next year we never get them. Always same answer next year we will get the houses.

We are hoping to get a letter soon.

Otto Ask Mr. Stevenson why Pelly Bay is not going to get new houses for 1973 Mr. Stevenson told the directors that he had phone the regional office and heard that there was no houses for Pelly Bay and he will try to get further information on this.

There was the discusses of the new houses that were to be here for 1973. The directors feel that they should have the houses definitely because they work very hard at the meetings to get these 5 new houses for Pelly Bay for 1973. The directors also says that at the Commissioner's visit on September 1972, they ask for new houses, and Mr. Hodgson and Mr. Creeury says there will houses coming to Pelly Bay for 1973 and the houses will be built on the lake agter water is dump out. The directors had the meeting before the commissioner's visit and they told the secretary to tell the commissioner on be half of Pelly Bay Housing Association to ask for new houses when Mr. Hodgson gets in. The secretary show a letter to Commissioner about the letter from Lena that Lena would try to get houses for Pelly Bay for 1973 and in her letter that she would try hard to get houses for Pelly Bay.

The directors feel bad about the new houses when they heard that the houses are not coming rbo Pelly Bay and they said since they work hard to have houses for Pelly Bay for 1973, they should write a letter to Commissioner and Lena Pddersen to have the houses in, the five new houses promised by Commissioner Hodgson on his visit on September 1972.

Motion by Christian that the minutes of past meeting be passed. Seconded by Celine. Carried.

General Business

Motion 8/73 Moved by Otto that the secretary will write a letter to Commissioner about the houses that were definitely suppose to be going to Pelly Bay to to see if we still could get them because we do need them really badly for some people are too cro ded in one place. Sometime there are 10 people in one house and that is the 3 bedroom house. Three or more are i one house. Seconded by Celine. Carred.

Christian ask if there were to be new stoves and the secretary had forwarded an information on what type of stoves were require by each tenant because the Regional Office had sent for this information and that the Housing Association had ordered fire pots and carburators for the houses. Mr. Stevenson says since the Regional Office had send for this information, they will probably will get new stoves and the fire pots and the acaburators will come in handy someday.

The secretary reported on the financial statement, Grants we received but still had debit in Administration and had paid the balance of \$ 1,002.03 from Maintenance to Administration as on Feb 14, 1973. This was passed as Mr. Stevenson says that there will be money coming in to Pelly Bay Housing Association to pay the costs till at the end of March.

Christian ask if Thomas could have a raise in his work and Mr. Stevenson that it is up to the Housign Association to pay the men and if he going to get a raise it should't be \$5.00 or 4.00 because in Cambridge bgy a qualify person with papers dose not make that much money. He makes \$2.50 an hour which is good but the Housing Association had to think first because they want to be fair to what work they do and to the people.

The directors says that they will talk about this again on the next meeting and Mr. Stevenson that if the Housing Association want the workman to have a raise it does not mean that they will get more money in Monit.

The president says that he heard that the people that went to Cambridge Bay Meeting in February never talked about the new houses why when they themselves talked about the houses to make sure that they will get them and in Cambridge Bay they heard that the houses are coming. Mr. Stevenson says that he was at the meeting and he says that for sure the directors were talking about them.

Motion 9/73 Moved by Otto that if for sure the new houses are coming, the co-op plane should bring them in because the plane goes any time. Seconded by Christian. Carried.

Mr. Stevenson explained about the polyurethane that could be put in the houses when the houses are going to be fix this summer.

Motion 10/73 Moved by Christian that the houses be fixed with the polyurethane since the water does not go in and it harden. Seconded by Cecilia. Carried.

Motion 11/73 Moved by Celine that if the new houses come in that they should be made open when they built them because we could have air coming in. Seconded by Otto. Carried.

The Directors ask Mr. Stevenson if 3 of the one bedroom could have bigger oil tanks and Mr. Stevenson says that the people or Kelly Bay Housing Association should have the meeting and buy one out of their maintenance 's money. The directors that they will talk about it on their next meeting.

There being no further things to say the meeting was closed at 5.30pm

that effect and then the Territorial Government could look
at the proposal.

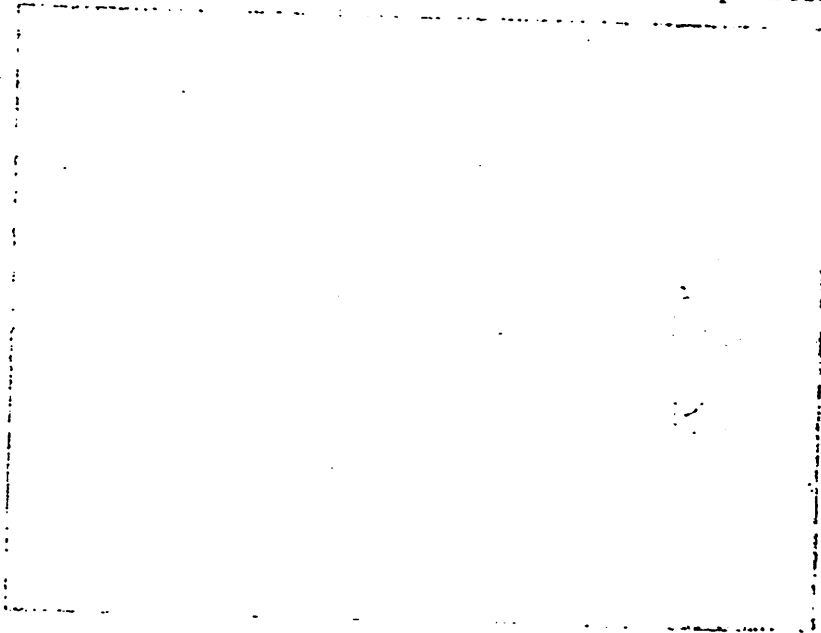
Mr. Hodgson told the people that the Territorial Government
is planning to put 5 new houses in Pelly Bay next year.

After being told about the budget of the Housing Association
it was readily apparent there was not enough administrative
money allotted to the local Association. The Commissioner
agreed to assist in this regard and asked the members of the
Association to decide upon a salary for the Secretary
Manager and let him know.

The Association informed the Commissioner by letter of the
following: they require \$3000 for the remainder of this
fiscal year and \$6000 for the next fiscal year.

Both the school principal and the local nurse endorsed a
proposal to have a public bath house in Pelly Bay. It
would reduce the present taxation on the school water
supply and also improve health conditions within the
community.

The Commissioner said he would look into the matter and write
the principal to tell him of the Government position.



For three years the community has submitted several capital projects, the first one on the list being the filling of a small lake badly polluted, shallow, and very close to the village. This is the best location for the new rental housing and we have heard that we might have some new ones coming next summer. We have received as yet no official answer about this project.

Mr. Creery mentioned there was a good possibility that Pelly Bay would receive 5 new Northern Rental houses next year. The filling of the lake would in actual fact be the site development and the Government will provide the money for this fill next year.

Once more a survey was conducted by the Fisheries in Pelly Bay region. According to the men in charge a very large quantity of Arctic Char frequent the many rivers of Pelly Bay and feel that a much larger quota could be established for commercial fishing purposes which could be a continuous and substantial source of income to many people of Pelly Bay. We have been told that the fishing plant situated at Pelly Bay might eventually be turned over to the community but the Hamlet feels that improvement should be effected by the Department of Industry and Development before this happens.

Dear Lena:

The following are items that the Gjoa Haven Settlement Council wants to you to help them with, at your June session.

PER CAPITA GRANT:

For this fiscal year 1973/74 the amount received was \$6,000.00 based on a government figure of a population of 300 people in Gjoa Haven.

The actual number of people in Gjoa Haven this year, as per the attached list of people living in Gjoa Haven, is 367.

This list compiled by the Settlement Council.

According to our records we are short \$1,340.00. Council would like your help in getting this money for us.

New Water Source:

The Council wrote to the Commissioner twice this year on our water problems in Gjoa Haven and how we wanted to get a water system set up this year from the lake 4 miles away to last for 10 to 20 or more years. Some expert help was also requested in the way of the Town Planner and the Environmental Health Officer coming to the settlement and help with the planning. To date this seems to be forgotten about. Council would like for you to help in getting this back on the road again.

The following are the ways that the council feels that the water could be delivered from the 4 mile lake.

1. By water pipe line from the 4 mile lake to a natural reservoir close to town. Water reservoir to be pumped full each summer and the pipe drained and not used in winter months. From the reservoir a heated pipe leading to a central place in town for water distribution by vehicle and eventually by utilidor system.

2. The second way was to build a road to the water lake 4 miles away and truck the water year round from there to the town.

D8 CRAWL TRACTOR:

The TD8 tractor that came on the barge last summer is too small for airstrip and road building. Council requested a tractor about the size of a D6 but the gov't purchased a machine which is not suitable for this town. It is not made for the cold weather.

The commissioner also stated that some more equipment will either have to be flown in or sealifted in in 1973 to commence work on the airstrip and roads. (at a general meeting in Gjoa Haven Sept. 14th, 1972). To date we still do not know if this equipment is coming in or not.

Also the Commissioner stated that two pieces of equipment from Rowley Island will be flown in to Gjoa Haven this winter. A Grader and a D8 cat.

Council would like for you to see that something is done about getting this equipment for Gjoa Haven.

AIRSTRIP:

The natural strip of approx. 2,000 which no work has been done on it is now considered to be dangerous due to the C.N.T. tower of approx 75 feet situated along side the strip.

The Council wants to have a land Airstrip made that can be used year round and big enough to accommodate at least a Dc6.

At present only \$15,000.00 budgeted for airstrip construction for this summer. Council knows that this is a very small amount if we have the equipment.

Council would like your help in getting an Airstrip constructed this summer

ROADS: We still do not have any roads in Gjoa Haven. The money we had for roads had to be used for Hat Island buildings because of the early freezeup.

We do not have any money budgeted for this year for roads plus the lack of proper equipment.

Council would like for you to look into this as well. The Roads also depend greatly on proper equipment. Without roads municipal services in Gjoa Haven is almost impossible from the spring time to the fall because of the sand.

NEW SCHOOL AND GYM.

In our five year forecast made up in 1972 the council projected that in 1974 the school will expand to 6 classrooms and 6 teachers. Rather than bring in more portables, the council feels that this would be a good time to build a new school.

This year in March 10th, 1973 a letter was written to the commissioner asking for a classroom and a teacher plus accomodations for the teacher to tide us over this year.

Council does not have any word from the Dept. of Education on if a new School and Gym will be constructed in Gjoa Haven 1974. Our present facilities is a 2 classroom school, 2 portables and 1 portable coming on the ship. This insufficient for 1974. Council would like your help in getting a new school for Gjoa Haven .

HOUSING

In our five year forecast made up in 1972 it was projected by council that in the year 1974 15 houses would be required. As per the attached list of families that do not have a house at present the council was right on in their estimate. Council would like for you to do your best to see that we get a minimum of 15 houses to accomodate the attached listed people. If less than the required number will be coming council would like for the Commissioner or some other government official to advise on who does get a house and who does not get a house for this coming winter as this is very difficult in the settlement when housing association and Council feel and know that they all need houses.

All the above things that the council requests sounds like a lot for one settlement and that the Territorial Council may feel this way in thinking that we have been developing each year along with the rest of the settlements. But this is not so. This settlement was forgotten about for years. there was never any government representation here to deal with the real needs of the people until the settlement council was elected two years ago.

The Family of Nanooklook, Anguttitauruq Thomas, Nulieyok, Maganaq, Hikhik, Ikkutilsluk Do not have any house whatever, Those families are mainly on welfare. Any fuel or water they require is billed directly to them. All of them are living in shacks which are cold and unsanitary. This was outlined in a letter from the Environmental Officer, a copy of which is attached. Abraham Hiqiniq, Angnalooak, Qayuttinnuaq mark, Qammukkaq George, Porter Tommy, Anguttitauruq Michael and Ruben Alex are living in with relatives who do have houses. This again poses the problem of over crowded houses, which are hard to keep clean and sanitary.

It also causes a social strain.

Aquptangnuaq Luke and Atkitchook Jacob have houses that are considered unfit for use as a home and that these two houses, as soon as possible, be replaced with proper homes.

5. Annie Maraanqnaq's Family
6. Luke Nnleiyok's Family
7. Tommy Anquittitauraq's Family
8. Ollied Nanooklook's Family - no home?

The conditions existing range from poor floor covering to cardboard covering walls and ceiling. The main objective for the Housing Committee, is to ensure that materials used will provide:

- (a) Warmth from the coming winter cold.
- (b) Easily cleanable, and moisture proof.

(c) Have good fire rating properties.

(d) Should not be very expensive.

I will also take the liberty of re-mentioning some of the topics we discussed at the council meeting on April 27, 1973.

- All homes in the community must be supplied with a water barrel, which receives regular water delivery service.
- All homes must have a honey bucket toilet which receives regular sewage pick-up service.
- The dogs should be boarded further away from the homes.

Further to our discussion I had been in contact with Mr. Ross McKinnon, Development Officer, Local Government, Yellowknife, concerning sewage and garbage collection in Gjoa Haven. I have suggested to Mr. McKinnon that Gjoa Haven be included in the upcoming winter using the sewage and garbage collection method of Greenland. As I have explained previously, this consists of a large water proof bag which all sewage bags and garbage will be placed rather than the traditional 45 gallon drums which are not suitable. I am hopeful that Gjoa Haven will be selected for this project, which will be at the expense of the territorial government.
