The following questions were prepared for the Directors' visit on Feb. 28th:

(1) Mr. Kwaterouski, Superintendant of Game Management

- Polar Bear Hunting (a) ban sport hunting and only Eskimo people to hunt polar bears
(b) respective settlements to decide if it is feasible to have a sport hunting program
(c) quota system - basis - surveys
- Bird Hunting (a) local people should hunt birds when birds arrive and should set up their own time as to open season of hunting and recommend a change of the Migratory Bird Law
- Caribou (a) calving season should be introduced so as to protect the young that are not born
- Musk-ox (a) opening up of a quota system for each settlement

(2) Mr. Gordon Devitt, Dept. of Education, representing Mr. MacPherson

- Regional High School (a) to be erected in the Central Arctic, including the High Arctic
(b) what does Government base their policy of education on (125 minimum)
- Cultural Inclusion (a) not enough funding therefore more funding requested - 8¢ per day or \$15.00 per child/year
- Policy on funding of the Inuit going to College.
- Grade system be brought back and do away with free school as the children are not learning the way it is running right now.
- School not big enough at Gjoa Haven and Pelly Bay. School held at teacher's place.

(3) Mr. Kwaterouski for Mr. Espie, Dept. of Economic Development

Economic Development Officer should be put in each settlement as once one is in a settlement, he starts a program and because of other responsibilities in other settlements, by the time he returns he might forget what he started.

- Materials (a) establishment of a good supply
(b) long way to get supplies- should have funding to get supplies of soapstone and whalebone for the communities

Assistance for those who do not have means to go out hunting and fishing during the summer season (Peterhead boats)

Dividends - policy on those receiving the dividends

Policy set up so more money coming back to the carvers - big mark-up

on the carvings bought to be resold.

(4) Mr. Creery, Regional Director

- Airstrips and roads
 - (a) big airstrips in each settlement so Hercules facilities could be taken advantage of
 - (b) all weather lighting at all airstrips
 - (c) air ambulance service - station at Yellowknife therefore a good airstrip needed
 - (d) train weather observers in each community (weather stations)
 - (e) placement of airstrips (location)

- Roads
 - (a) policy guidelines on building roads - bigger roads
 - (b) good ~~vehicles~~ vehicles to maintain roads
 - (c) more funding to build better roads
 - (d) signs put up to enforce road laws

- Municipal
 - (a) estimates asked for should be given so proper services could be carried out
 - (b) proper equipment to carry out the services
 - (c) payments on contracts done locally
 - (d) casual payroll and contract payments: why can't each settlement make payments like they do with welfare

- Government Communications
 - (a) settlements supplied with telex
 - (b) government procedure on the funding for roads and airstrips (long waiting period)
 - (c) set up steps to go through to get answers (should eliminate some of the steps - Cambridge Bay - Ft. Smith - Yellowknife and then back down to the settlements)

- Water Wagon or Fire Trucks
 - (a) every settlement should have good fire trucks as well as good garages - urgency

- Development Officers
 - (a) for each community to help out the Councils as well as the public

- Proposed Hospital at Cambridge Bay - urgency.

PAGE 2 DEPARTMENT HEADS:

- Look after the people requirements as well as the side from the Gov't Game Dept.

CARIBOU: Calving seasons to protect females when they have the young in them will discuss the matter and make a demand to make a recommendation to the Game Ordinance

MUSK-OX: Quota Systems are fine but have to see where the Musk-Ox are,

- a quota is given. Musk-Ox were protected since 1917, same time as the Bird Law.
- Survey have to be taken on the number of Musk-Ox in the areas. (Grise Fjord and Sachs Harbour, Paulatuk have quotas on the Musk-Ox. Next year a few Musk-Ox for Cambridge Bay and Holman Island.
- Game Dept. have not forgotten to do the request from the people but it is a slow procedure and be patient as not to make any mistakes.
- Special Permit on the Polar Bear hides being sold as they cannot be bought to other countries.
- Southern people do not like the killing of the animals.
- In 1972 the U.S.A. prohibited the import of Polar Bear hides.
- Renewing Game Laws in June 1974. But will not be effective until 1975.

EDUCATION: REGIONAL HIGH SCHOOL IN CENTRAL ARCTIC:

- Could only build schools gradually because a lack of funds.
- Gisa Haven 1975 and should be ready for use in 1975 planning in 1974.
- Lena Pederson wanted to speak at this time:
- minimum for high school 125.
- Education have the biggest budget every year.
- Gov't policy that 125 required to build a high school. Fobisher Bay does not have 125.
- \$1.00 per child on the Cultural Inclusion is not true hopefully be double. Devitt will check on the figures.
- Have to decide where to put the high school.

DEPARTMENT OF LOCAL GOVERNMENT, MR. RAY GREENY: ROADS & AIRSTRIPS

- The airstrips been mix last few years only emergency airstrips not enough funding. M.O.T. is responsible in some Settlements.
- Policy will change in a few years, but will have to abide at this time not come up with Policies, therefore should improve on the airstrips. Good deal more money from MOT in the construction as well as maintenance and operation.
- Maintenance funds to be treated as Municipal Services, therefore under the the hands of Settlement Councils, same as road maintenance.
- Changes Government Policies.
Proposed Policies: A) Gisa Bay.....6000 sq.-6500 sq Airfield.
B) Coppermine and Pelly Bay....3500-5000 ft.
C) Holman, Gisa, Spence, in shorter group.
- weather lighting in all air-strips, need to be improved and new locations in some cases, priorities.
- Train weather Observers needed right now, in the new Policy part.

ROADS: As to the present building roads have been under a program called
SITE DEVELOPMENT.

- broken down in funding \$10,000. or \$5000.
- Site development: roads, drainage, filling, etc., reserve funding, therefore Settlements could apply if run out as required but no guarantee if they are going to be granted.
- Good Vehicles to maintain roads, Commissioner had a meeting, and a need or a system to improve to get right facilities. recommendations requested.
- Policies on enforcing by-laws on roads to control the enforcement of by-laws left up to the Councils.

MUNICIPAL SERVICES:

- Problems on the part is that Local Government have not been listening to local people. Education facilities use a tremendous amount.
- Next year proper improvement, estimates quantities depend on Settlement Councils.
- Vehicles same as the road maintenance. Possibly after from all settlement doing a survey on all the vehicles to determine what is being used.

PAGE 3 DEPT. HEATS :

- Contract payments too slow, Ray Creery would look at the problem but does not know if it could go to a Settlement level.

GOVERNMENT COMMUNICATIONS:

- Extremely expensive to provide telex but sees the problem in improving
- Radio communications does not foresee for sometime.
- Funding should come in earlier often come in late to do proper work.
- Procedures on the steps to get answers:
- Most of the request are dealt with from Fort Smith cause they have a financial responsibilities.
- Some financial responsibilities will be given to area office in Cam Bay.
- Treasury not in Cam Bay, yet but will improve during the year.

WATER TANKS AND FIRE TRUCKS AND GARAGES:

- Capabilities to maintain equipment varies in each Settlement.
- No space provided right now, what happens in case of fire.
- Build just cheap garages with gravel floor so we can put many each year or expensive long term garages which will take a long time.

DEVELOPMENT OFFICER: To help Councils

- Settlement Managers to carry the assistance and carry out the programs. Development officers go from communities to assist Settlement Secretar-

LOCAL RADIO STATION:

- Jake Ootes inform that local radio stations could be erected, which are not very expensive, \$3500.00 includes, erection, freight recorder, tape-recorder micro-phone licence, information can be obtained from the Department of Information.

Paul Kwaterouski; representing Mr. Espie.

Economic Development Officer:

- Few positions in the Settlement therefore priority should be placed.
- Not supposed to be completely negative, but will need a better idea as to what kind of a person the people want. Things that he might be doing but not only this are; Handicrafts, Co-Op, Arts & Crafts, Fishing, Game Officer. Try to plan by the Government and the people as to what as to kind the Settlements really want.

ESTABLISHMENTS OF A GOOD SUPPLY: Long ways to go get soap-stone.

- Realize the problem and have plans to get a Twin Otter to go to the supply depots.
- Assistance to the people who do not have facilities to go out hunting. There are means now to get assistance (Social)
- Trappers ~~assist~~ Assistance now in effect.
- Money available now to organizing hunts.
- Money available to Trappers and Hunters Association.
- Travel Incentive Program; \$400. or over on furs caught during the year the Government will give 20% to a person.
- Now we can make use of the money we have, programs.
- Co-Op dividends: will be looked into when back in Yellowknife as he does not have the answer

LAND-USE REGULATIONS BEING TAKEN:

Damage done to areas (hunting areas)

- Indian and Inuit interests being looked after.

HOUSING CORPORATION: Al Wight, Regional Housing Officer

- No furniture on the new houses, \$500 sent to Housing Associations to provide furniture for the new Houses.
- Rule is that furniture goes with the tenant that leaves the house when he moves to a new house.
- Number of houses is not known, that are coming in, year ahead (20) area.
- Old oil stoves should be replaced with new ones, it is a fire hazard.
- In cases of power failure that damage furnace parts, there should be an ample supply of parts. This year \$225/per house per yr.... Maintenance \$10/monthly per house... Administration Housing Associations responsibility in getting the parts.
- Fire alarm systems will not be installed in the new houses but fire extinguishers will be provided and also the old ones will be replaced.
- Tools to do the Maintenance work. - Furnace Mechanics Course June 1974.

RESULTS FROM THE GROUP DISCUSSION

Polar Bear Hunting: Tables split as to "A" Or "B". Will have to decide on one or the other.

- c. More surveys for quota and more consultation between Hunters and Trappers Association on setting up the quota system.
Also bear coming into the settlements and shot not be included in the quota.

Bird Hunting: 1. Recommend change to open season June and close ~~XXXXXX~~ July and August and reopen in September.

2. Each settlement set their own as to when the birds arrive.
3. Recommend the birds be change to meet the needs of the people.

Caribou: Season for hunting caribou recommended.

1. Close April 1 to July 31 and reopen August 1.
2. Close May and reopen in August.
3. Close June and July and reopen in August.
4. Have a close season but if native people needed the food they are permitted to hunt them.
5. Just more care in Hunting the females.

Musk - ox:

1. Survey first before recommending quota system.
2. Season: close April to July and open in August.
3. Consultation with the Hunters and Trappers Association from the Game Department before a quota system is introduced, and recommend that quota system be extended to other settlements.

EDUCATIONS

Regional High School:

1. Extend Grade 9, 10, 11 and 12 in each settlement and if not possible then a Regional High School be built.
2. Regional High School be built at Cambridge Bay even though the minimum as mentioned is not reached.
3. Lower minimum from 125 to 80.

Cultural Inclusion:

1. Recommend that the Department of Education double the amount but looks toward increase every year.

Grade system:

Grade should apply to all the settlements. Same as the question

College:

Recommend that the Department of the EDUCATION send the information regarding Assistance for those who want to go to college to each settlement in the Central Arctic.

Recommend that new schools be put into Gjoa Haven and Peely Bay.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT

Economic development Officers be recommended and that native people be trained to do the job in the settlements for the necessary programs.

Dividends:

1. Be left up to the respective Co-ops.
2. Get policy set to guide the refund of the dividends.
Agree with that a policy be set up so more money comes back to the carviers - from carvings resold down south.

Airstrips and Roads:

Agree A, B, C, D, E AND Fa added to include terminal buildings and also that the airstrips should be licenced.

Roads: Agree from A to D in the Questions 1

Municipal services: Agreed from A to D plus all contractors purchase their own equipment and not to lease from the Government.

Government Communications.

Agree from A to C plus priority items: Departments give full consideration now, not years from now.

Agreed that Regional Headquarters be move from Fort Smith to Cambridge Bay for this area.

Fire Wagon and Fire Trucks:

Agreed with fire trucks and water wagons and that the Government should purchase these equipment.

Development Officers as outline in the Questions was also agreed upon.

Hospital to be farm at Cambridge Bay was also agreed upon but discussion will arise from this topic probably later on in the conferance.

BIRD HUNTING: Discussion as to the best approach to take on the Migratory birds in the Central Arctic Area. Traditional way of hunting birds or the law as set. Different arrival time of the Migratory birds.

The law was set when there were no Councils or with no consultation with the people ~~living~~ living up in the Arctic who are affected by the law.

3. moved by Simon Kataoyak - Holman Island
seconded by Gideon Qitsualik - Gjoa Haven
that the opening season of hunting the migratory birds be open in May and June but have a close season in the month of July and August when the migratory birds are nesting and reopen in the month of September.

TRAPPING SEASON AND SPORTS FISHING: Mr. Charlie Bolt wanted also to talk about 1) trapping season on the foxes.

2) sports fishing be limited.

Delegates generally discussed the trapping season and felt that no change be necessary.

Sports Fishing also discussed and delegates generally felt that the tourists should not throw back fish they do not want. The fish once handled by gills-breathing area - explained by one of the delegates could die in few days.

guides for the sports fisherman - no regulation

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NOTES COMPILED FROM GROUP DISCUSSIONS

1. Public bath-house/laundry
 - a. upgrade the present facilities including new equipment
 - b. all communities that do not have public bath-house/laundries be supplied with them
 - c. train local people to service the equipment in preventative maintenance
 - d. type of wash-house to meet public health regulations
2. Northern rental Housing and Maintenance
 - a. More funding on the Administration Budget to meet the requirements of the Housing Association needs
 - b. Furniture allotment of \$500.00 should not include freight charges (more money for freight)
 - c. pressure systems and bath-tubs are required on all the Northern Rental Houses
 - d. the housing requirements by settlements are not allocated therefore surveys needed to be taken by respective Housing Associations to include names of adults and children who do not have housing as well as the matthbox houses which suppose to be outdated (number of people living in them). Surveys to be sent to the "Action Group" to compile and then original sent to Mr. J. Cretien, with copies to the Commissioner, N. W. T. Council, and the N. W. T. Housing Corporation.
 - e. Planning of the types of housing should be in consultation with the Housing Associations
 - f. Government staff should be given government housing; so the people on the northern rental program could have more housing, which are being used at the moment by government staff.
 - g. more funding on the capital maintenance materials because the older the equipment the higher is the repair costs.
 - h. rent assessment should be based on cost of living, size of the families, type of house as well as income
3. Regional Council
 - Location: on selection of a Regional Council Conference location to be decided by a secret ballot
 - Time: When there is not much going on in the settlements therefore avoiding elections, hunting times and the actual date left to the hosting settlement.
 - Who to attend: six people from each community representing; plus Settlement Secretaries
 - Mandatory: Chairmen of each Settlement or Hamlet Councils to attend.
Remaining four to be chosen by respective committees or organizations as recommended by Councils and one from the public.
 - Only the delegates should attend to discuss topics and then forward resolutions, etc., later on to the departments or people concerned and that other people attend only by invitations as recommended by other settlements.
 - Invited guests should not send replacements in their place.
 - Funding:
 - board and lodging to increase to \$20.00 per day to meet the ever increasing cost of living.
 - Cost of living compensation to delegates increase to \$10.00 per day.
 - Additional funds asked for, for interpreting, typist, and translator.
 - Action Group:
