Preface

The Northwest Territories was divided into 22 electoral districts in 1978 by an Ordinance of the Northwest Territories, based on a report of the Electoral District Boundaries Commission, chaired by The Honourable Mr. Justice C. F. Tallis, pursuant to the Electoral District Boundaries Commission Ordinance of the Northwest Territories, assented to May 11, 1978.

Pursuant to an Ordinance of the Legislative Assembly of the Northwest Territories, assented to November 25, 1982, the Commissioner of the Northwest Territories, Mr. John H. Parker, on January 7, 1983, established by Proclamation an Electoral District Boundaries Commission and appointed The Honourable Mr. Justice J. H. Potts, a Deputy Judge of the Supreme Court of the Northwest Territories, as Chairman.

Upon the recommendation of the Legislative Assembly of the Northwest Territories, the Commissioner, on January 7, 1983, appointed Chief Jim Antoine of Fort Simpson as a member of the Commission. Upon the joint recommendation of Mr. Justice Potts and Chief Antoine, the Commissioner, on January 21, 1983, appointed Mr. David Alagalak of Eskimo Point as a member of the Commission.

Upon the recommendation of the Commission, the Commissioner, on January 21, 1983, appointed Mr. Thomas Auchterlonie as Secretary of the Commission.

The task of the Commission was to examine the existing electoral district boundaries and to make recommendations concerning the possible realignment of existing electoral district boundaries and the possibility of increasing the number of electoral districts from the existing 22 to 23, 24 or 25, as authorized by an Act of the Parliament of Canada.



Recommendations

The Commission bases its recommendations on those factors referred to in Section 13 of the Electoral District Boundaries Commission Ordinance and on consideration of representations made at public hearings and by written submissions to the Commission.

The Commission recommends that the number of electoral districts for the Northwest Territories be increased from the existing 22 to 24 and that the description of the boundaries and the names of the electoral districts be as shown on the maps attached as Schedules "A" and "B".

Reasons

- The existing electoral district of Mackenzie Liard is divided to create two electoral districts to be known as Deh Cho and Deh Cho Gah because of the large number of communities in the existing electoral district.
- The existing electoral district of The Central Arctic is divided to create two electoral districts to be known as Kitikmeot East and Kitikmeot West because of diversity of interests and the great distances between communities.
- The settlement of Holman Island is included in the electoral district of Kitikmeot West a result of a plebiscite and because of means of transportation and communication and community of interests.
- 4. The existing electoral district of Hay River has been reduced in area to consist of the Town of Hay River and the communities of Paradise Gardens and Enterprise. The Hay River Reserve and the area bounded by the east bank of the Hay River and the easterly boundary of the existing electoral district of Hay River has been included in the new electoral district of Deh Cho because of community of interests of the residents of the Hay River Reserve.
- 5. The boundaries of the existing electoral districts of Keewatin North and Keewatin South are realigned in a north-south axis to create the electoral districts of Keewatin West and Keewatin East because of means of transportation and communication and community of interests of the residents of the two areas.
- 6. The southerly boundary of the existing electoral district of High Arctic is extended in a southerly direction to encompass all of Admiralty Inlet and the northern part of Prince of Wales Island because of the outpost hunting camps used by residents of Arctic Bay and Resolute.
- 7. The easterly boundary of the existing electoral district of Slave River is realigned to reduce the area of that electoral district and to increase the area of the existing electoral district of Great Slave East because of community of interests. The name of the existing electoral district of Great Slave East is changed to Tu Nede to reflect the wishes of the majority of the residents.
- 8. The boundary between the existing electoral districts of Rae Lac la Martre and Great Slave East is moved east to encompass the hunting outpost camps of the residents of Rae Edzo, Rae Lakes and Snare Lake.
- 9. The eastern portion of the boundary between the existing electoral districts of Mackenzie Liard and Mackenzie Great Bear is moved north to include the outpost camps located on Blackwater Lake and Keller Lake. The name of the existing electoral district of Mackenzie Great Bear is changed to Sahtu to reflect the wishes of the majority of the residents.



- 10. The boundary between the existing electoral districts of Hudson Bay and Keewatin North is moved south to include Coates Island and Mansell Island, which are traditional hunting areas for the residents of Coral Harbour.
- 11. The boundaries of the existing electoral districts of Yellowknife are realigned so as to provide for a more balanced representation, although all three M.L.A.'s from Yellowknife took the position that, if the Commission did not recommend an additional electoral district for the City of Yellowknife, then the boundaries for the existing electoral districts of Yellowknife Centre, Yellowknife South and Yellowknife North should remain except for the inclusion of the lakes adjacent to the Ingraham Trail. The name of the existing electoral district of Yellowknife North is changed to Yellowknife East to reflect the extension of the boundaries in an easterly direction to encompass the lakes adjacent to the Ingraham Trail because of community of interests.

Background

Pursuant to Section 11(1) of the Electoral District Boundaries Commission Ordinance, a public notice informing the public of the Commission's intention to hold hearings and to receive representations, in respect of the division of the Northwest Territories into electoral districts, was published in all newspapers currently circulating in the Northwest Territories. Copies of this notice were printed in the English language and in Inuktitut and distributed to all communities in the Northwest Territories with the assistance of the Regional Directors and their staff.

Publication of the public notice was followed by a full page advertisement including a map of the 22 existing electoral districts and a schedule of proposed places, dates and times of public hearings. Thirty tapes translated into the Dene languages and Inuktitut were sent to community radio stations. A 56-second Anik Information advertisement in English and Inuktitut was broadcast by the Northern Television Network of the Canadian Broadcasting Corporation.

Pamphlets, in the English language and Inuktitut, describing the existing electoral district boundaries were sent to all communities in the Northwest Territories. In addition there were press releases and radio news broadcasts on the Commission's activities. Generally, the information available to the public was adequate. However, in the opinion of the Commission, greater lead time is required to ensure that all sectors of the public are fully conversant with the intent and purpose of such public hearings.

The Commission travelled 26,403 kilometers (12,300 miles) and held 31 of 35 scheduled hearings at which representations were received and explanations given by the Commission. Public hearings were held in the following communities:

Holman Island Rankin Inlet Repulse Bay Coral Harbour Baker Lake Eskimo Point Frobisher Bay Lake Harbour Cape Dorset Pangnirtung Igloolik Pond Inlet Arctic Bay Grise Fiord Resolute Scheduled public hearings were not held in Fort Resolution, Hay River, Fort Good Hope and Fort Norman.

In addition, representatives from the communities of Chesterfield Inlet, Pine Point, Fort Good Hope, Fort Norman, Sanikiluaq, Sachs Harbour, Pelly Bay and Snowdrift participated in public hearings at adjacent communities. An additional hearing was held in Yellowknife at the end of the schedule.

The proposal for a guaranteed or reserved seat for the aboriginal people in the N.W.T. as a political concept has been presented to the Commission for Yellowknife. Although this concept is being discussed at various constitutional forums at territorial and national levels, based on legal opinions, the proposal cannot be adopted as a political principle unless revisions are made to the Northwest Territories Act and possibly to the Canada Act.

Minority Report

I am entirely in agreement with the report signed by my two distinguished fellow commissioners with the single exception that the report did not include a recommendation for an additional electoral district for the City of Yellowknife

Section 13 of the Electoral District Boundaries Commission Ordinance requires the Commission, in recommending the boundaries of any electoral district, to take into consideration:

"...demographic considerations, including in particular the sparsity, density or relative rate of growth of population of any region of the Territories...".

This simply gives expression to the principle of political science known as representation by population. Admittedly, this is only one of the factors that the Commission is required to take into consideration. However, it is a very important factor and should not be ignored.

Representation by population is never applied with mathematical exactness. There are always fewer voters in rural than in urban districts. Section 13 introduces additional and special factors such as accessibility, diversity of interests and means of communication because the Northwest Territories is very unique. The classic example is the electoral district of Hudson Bay with a population of less than 400.

The major argument advanced against an additional electoral district for Yellowknife is that, because of easy access, it is much easier for a member of the Legislative Assembly from Yellowknife to serve his or her constituents than for a member of the Legislative Assembly from most other electoral districts. In addition, a member of the Legislative Assembly from Yellowknife resides in the capital city and therefore has direct access to Ministers and government officials. As the Honourable Dennis Patterson put it, "Yellowknife M.L.A.'s have only to walk across the street to have access to Ministers and senior bureaucrats".

There is no question but that it is much easier for a member of the Legislative Assembly from Yellowknife to serve his or her constituents. But the role of a member of the Legislative Assembly is not merely to serve constituents in the sense of ensuring that they receive from government everything to which they are entitled. The other, and probably the more important role, is to represent constituents by speaking and voting for them in the Legislative Assembly. The member of the Legislative Assembly is the voice of his or her constituents and when he or she votes in the Assembly he or she is exercising political power on their behalf. This is what democracy and representation by population is all about and why it cannot be ignored.

I wholeheartedly endorse the words of the following persons who appeared before the Commission.

Lynda Sorensen:

"Based on approximately 10,000 population, in a total approximate population of 46,000, Yellowknife could justify a request for as many as 5 electoral districts. Under the present situation Yellowknife has approximately one M.L.A. for every 3,300 population while the overall average is one M.L.A. for approximately 2,000 citizens. Four Yellowknife electoral districts would certainly bring Yellowknife more in line with the Territorial average."

Robert MacQuarrie:

"Again, I say that while representation by population is not the only factor to consider in allocating seats, it is nevertheless a vitally significant factor inasmuch as it is the very foundation of representative democracy, and it must never be ignored. It is obvious in our Assembly that there is already a very great weighting given to geography, language, culture, remoteness, and so on, and not enough consideration given to the principle that one person's vote should be approximately equal in weighting to any other person's vote.

If the Commission were to recommend that Yellowknife should have 4 seats out of a 25 seat Assembly, that would amount to 16% of the seats for nearly 21% of the population — still not entirely fair, but tolerable."

Hon. George Braden:

"I am of the view that an additional seat would, of course, provide better representation for the city and would also reduce the disparity which currently exists when one applies the representation by population factor to the current territorial electoral boundaries."

Mayor Michael Ballantyne:

"The concept of representation by population is fundamental to the Canadian political process and we feel that, presently, Yellowknife is under-represented on the Legislative Assembly. With our present population we constitute approximately 23% of the population of the Northwest Territories, but our present three seats are only 13.5% of the total of 22.

If Yellowknife was given one seat of the three additional seats being considered it would not totally rectify the situation but it would indicate a willingness to recognize the capital city's desire for fair representation.

In fact, if the Legislative Assembly received three extra seats, and Yellowknife received one, the average population of a Yellowknife seat would be approximately 2,600 and the average of the other 21 seats would be about 1,730 and 23% of the population would still have only 16% of the seats.


There is another important factor that should be considered during your deliberations. People of the North are working together to achieve common political, economic and social goals. An essential part of that cooperation is that the peoples of the North, native and non-native alike, must all feel that they are being fairly represented in our political system."


Pursuant to Section 20 of the Electoral District Boundaries Commission Ordinance, the Legislative Assembly has the authority to approve with alterations the proposals of the Commission. I recommend that, in a spirit of fairness, the Legislative Assembly exercise that authority and provide an additional electoral district for the City of Yellowknife, by dividing the existing electoral district of Yellowknife South. I further recommend that the boundaries and the names of the four electoral districts in Yellowknife be as shown on the map attached as Schedule "C", provided that the boundaries of the new electoral district of Yellowknife East, other than through the City of Yellowknife, be as shown on the map attached as Schedule "A".
