

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Public Utilities Board Decisions In Summary — 1983

Decision 1-83 February 1, 1983

Proposed

I.C.G. Utilities (Plains Western) for increase in existing rates, tolls and charges for electrical energy supplied to its customers effective January 1, 1983.

Decision 2-83 February 28, 1983

Proposed

N.C.P.C. proposal to increase rates, tolls and charges to N.W.T. customers effective April 1983 billing cycle.

Decision 3-83 April 26, 1983

€roposed

An application by I.C.G. (Plains Western) for changes in existing rates, tolls and charges for electrical energy supplied to its customers effective January 1, 1983.

Decision 4-83 May 20, 1983

Proposed

A proposal by I.C.G. (Plains Western) for changes in existing rates, tolls and charges to its customers effective with the April 1983 billing cycle.

Decision 5-83 June 23, 1983

Proposed

A proposal by Alberta Power Ltd. to alter the Franchise Agreement with the Town of Hay River to transfer Franchise Agreement from Alberta Power Ltd. to Northland Utilities (Northwest Territories) Ltd.

Ordered

The Board approved this application to be effective March 1, 1983. The application for a surcharge was denied. The period of time after accounts to customers are rendered before being due and payable was increased from 14 to 21 days.

Ordered

Approval of rate structure as submitted by N.C.P.C. was approved on an interim basis effective April 16, 1983. A final order will be issued following public hearings to be held at a later date. This date to be determined by the completion of N.E.B. Hearings and a review by the Minister.

Ordered

Approved to be effective as of March 1, 1983.

Ordered

Approval on an interim basis was granted for schedules A to F effective April 11, 1983. Final order will be implemented after a public hearing to be held in the City of Yellowknife at a later date to be set by the Board.

Ordered

Approved effective June 23, 1983 for the term of the Franchise Agreement.

The Board

The Public Utilities Board is empowered pursuant to Territorial Legislation (Public Utilities Ordinance, 1974, Chapter P-17) as amended.

The primary objective of a public utilities regulatory board is to protect the utility customers from monopolistic exploitation by a utility while concurrently ensuring that the utility maintains its financial integrity. Customers simply want reliable and adequate service on a continuing basis at rates that are minimum, fair, understandable and bear a reasonable relationship to the disposable income of the household or enterprise.

Because of the complexities of the economic, social and political considerations that must be blended to arrive at an appropriate charge to the many classes of customers in the N.W.T., it is imperative that all interested parties participate fully in the rate hearings.

Specialists are required to assess the many economic and technical aspects of utility operation against established principles that have been developed through the years. Nevertheless, the process is dynamic and must recognize the short and long term effects of rate design decisions.

It is imperative that we in the N.W.T. evaluate and learn from the chaotic economic conditions of the past ten years. Throughout North America, electric utilities are in a state of transition. A return to relative stability will depend on the extent to which utilities, regulators and governments seek out appropriate and innovative technologies that will enhance the potential of the North.

Regulated Utilities

Presently the Board regulates three utilities:

Northland Utilities (N.W.T.) Ltd. Head Office: Hay River, N.W.T.

I.C.G. Utilities (Northwest Territories) Ltd. Head Office: Leduc, Alberta

Northern Canada Power Commission Head Office: Edmonton, Alberta

1983 In Summary

The major influence affecting the Public Utilities Board operations in 1983 was the National Energy Board hearings into the Northern Canada Power Corporation structure, rates and operation. A submission to the N.E.B. Order 1 EHR-1-83 by the Government of the Northwest Territories was filed in May 1983. The N.W.T. Government Minister responsible for the P.U.B., the Honourable R. Nerysoo issued a press release on November 3, 1983 stating that the N.E.B. report as presented was unacceptable. The P.U.B. is anxiously awaiting the final decision of the Minister of Northern Affairs, the Honourable J. Munro. As of December 31, 1983, N.C.P.C. has indicated they will not attend rate hearings of the N.W.T. P.U.B. They also indicated there will be an increase in rates charged to its customers in 1984.

A first for the P.U.B. was the receipt of applications by Northland Utilities (N.W.T.) Ltd. and I.C.G. (Northwest Territories) Ltd. to provide a franchise agreement to supply natural gas to the Municipalities of Hay River and Pine Point. Preliminary in camera hearings were held in Hay River on December 15, 1983. A comparison of these applications will be provided to the Minister in early 1984.

The Board has been involved in litigation with the Town of Hay River concerning the rate of franchise tax being levied in that town. This matter is still before the Supreme Court of the Northwest Territories but should be resolved in early 1984.

A Look Ahead - 1984

On looking ahead, the Board is sure its work will not be less but more. With the filling of the two vacant positions, greater representation of the Northwest Territories will be assured.

We look forward to the finalization of the dilemma concerning regulation of the N.C.P.C. The Board is committed to the concept that all utilities supplying electrical service in the N.W.T. should be regulated by N.W.T. Public Utilities Board, representatives of those consumers being served.

With receipt of the applications for the supply of natural gas to N.W.T. Municipalities, a new energy era has started in the N.W.T.

The need for regulation of energy and energy resources including exploration for, production, development, conservation, control transportation, transmission, use and marketing now appears necessary. The delineation of the P.U.B.'s responsibilities, if any, prior to establishing rates is anticipated during review of the **Public Utilities Ordinance**.
