The Community Development Fund assists community governments by providing financial support for initiatives that help develop communities and build capacity. This fund aims to build partnerships and cooperation between community governments and regions, and to assist communities as they move towards greater authority and responsibility. Under the Community Development Fund for 2006-2007, MACA supported sixty-six projects in the Northwest Territories.

The Community Initiatives Program is an annual fund of \$1 million that is targeted to non-tax-based communities to assist them in development and support of initiatives that benefit families, youth, healthy lifestyles, safety education, and active living. I am proud to report that in 2006 - 2007 MACA provided support to twenty-one communities in every region of the Northwest Territories.

I look forward to continuing these Community Development Programs in the future to ensure that communities in the Northwest Territories grow and develop in a manner that will benefit residents and future generations.

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## **Community Development Fund (CDF)**

The Community Development Fund provides assistance to community governments for initiatives that build on local community development strategies and capacity building.

Objectives of the Community Development Fund include:

- promoting community development activities that support political governance, social, economic and health priorities;
- encouraging partnership and cooperation between community governments and other community or regional groups while building on community based planning and training priorities; and
- supporting communities as they assume more responsibilities and authorities.

Applicants must contribute equity in the form of a financial commitment, project management, administration, or services in kind.

Applicants must submit a year-end report.

## Community Development Fund Sahtu Region Highlights

### Accounting and Financial Reporting Training Deline Land Corporation

Funding: \$2,250 (plus additional funding from the Department of Indian and Northern Affairs and the Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment)

The Deline Land Corporation, through CDF funding, provided financial training to most of the local organizations and small businesses in the Community of Deline on October 17-19, 2006. Approximately 12 people participated in this training, which included representatives from the Deline Land Corporation, Deline First Nation, Sahtu Secretariat Inc., Deline Housing Association, Charter Community of Deline, as well as some small local businesses.

### Land Administration 1 Training Charter Community of Deline

#### Funding: \$4,255

The Charter Community of Deline received CDF funding to assist the Land Administration Officer to attend the Land Administration 1 course.

Previously, the Community of Deline had only a part-time Land Officer with little applicable experience and knowledge; it was imperative to provide further training to operate the municipal land department effectively.

After completing the course, the Land Administration Officer commented that "...the training was intensive and informative, I learned information and received new materials and guidelines and have taken on new challenges as Land Administrator for the Municipal Office".

## Community Development Fund South Slave Region Highlights

### Lutsel K'e Community Healing and Reconciliation Project

#### Funding: \$12,000

In late 2006, a former Chief of Smith's Landing assisted community residents and Council with healing and reconciliation workshops. The community had encountered difficult times as conflict had erupted between families.

In order to resolve this issue sharing circles were used with the families involved. Current Chief Addie Jonasson said, "the healing project was important because our members had to learn to move forward."

Chief Jonasson also noted, "we will continue to have projects like this in our community. We still have a lot of healing to do. We have to get our own house in order. The Community Development Fund has made big difference in our community."

### Kakisa – National Aboriginal Women's Conference

#### Funding: \$12,000

Four local women attended a National Aboriginal Women's Conference in Vancouver and had the pleasure to learn about the issues and challenges other Aboriginal women in leadership are facing.

Dianne Simba; the Administrative Assistant at the Ka'a'gee Tu First Nation, said that attending this conference was both a pleasure and great learning experience. As a bonus, they also met with other well-known Aboriginal leaders and popular figures including Phil Fontaine and Buffy St. Marie.

Since returning to their community, the Kakisa members have organized a walkathon to raise awareness of violence against women.

### 2nd Level Housing Maintenance Apprentice

#### Funding: \$8,671

Two staff members attended their Second Level Housing Maintainer Apprentice Program in August 2006. The housing program is managed by the Hamlet of Ulukhatok. The training support they received allowed these individuals to effectively provide maintenance services to the community.

## **Community Initiatives Program Contribution Details**

The Community Initiatives Program provides financial assistance for the development of projects or programs in non-taxed-based communities that address community priorities in the areas of families and youth, healthy life-styles and safety education, with a special emphasis on active living.

First introduced in 2003-2004, the program has provided nearly \$4 million in support for projects in most Northwest Territories communities. In 2006-2007, \$910,000 was contributed to projects in 21 communities.

### Sahtu Region

#### Fort Good Hope

Landscaping was completed on the baseball diamond and a fence added for safety reasons. A basketball court and arena ice resurfacer shed was built.

### South Slave Region

#### **Fort Resolution**

The community of Fort Resolution completed improvements to the local ball diamonds.

#### **Katlodeeche First Nations**

Construction of a new baseball field was started on the Hay River Reserve where interest in the sport is at an all time high.

#### Kakisa

The community continued its walking / hiking trail development between Tathlina Lake and Kakisa.

#### Enterprise

Trail development projects continued in Enterprise. A community trail map was developed, interpretive signage was installed and a day use area constructed.

## **Community Initiatives Program**

### **Dehcho Region**

#### Wrigley

Wrigley used funding from the Community Initiatives Program and other sources to complete construction of a youth centre, playground, daycare and outdoor skating rink.

#### Nahanni Butte

An outdoor multi-sport court was built in Nahanni Butte. The Band also purchased a minivan and sport equipment to assist with recreation programming.

#### **Trout Lake**

The community of Trout Lake built an outdoor rink and community arbor.

#### **Jean Marie River**

A new community playground was built in Jean Marie River. New recreational equipment was also purchased to give local children additional opportunities to be physically active.

#### **Fort Liard**

Fort Liard began construction of a skateboard park.

#### North Slave Region

#### Wekweeti

An unsafe playground was dismantled and new equipment installed for the children of Wekweeti.

#### Gameti

A recreation master plan was developed in Gameti.

#### Whati

Development of a youth centre was partially supported through the Community Initiatives Program.

## **Community Initiatives Program**

### Inuvik Region

#### Paulatuk

The community of Paulatuk completed renovations to their arena to make the facility safer and more useable throughout the year.

#### Aklavik

The community above-ground swimming pool received some much needed upgrades and repairs. A new lining and windows were installed and the pool was painted.

#### **Fort McPherson**

New equipment was purchased for the community recreation complex in Fort McPherson including tables, chairs and appliances for the canteen.

#### Tuktoyaktuk

Renovations were completed in the Tuktoyaktuk arena to make the facility safer and easier to use by the public. Some new programming equipment was also purchased.

#### **Sachs Harbour**

A safety inspection was completed on the Sachs Harbour playground. The picnic area was cleaned up and made accessible and the furnace room in the recreation complex was repaired.

#### Ulukhaktuk

The community of Ulukhaktok continued development of walking trails along the shoreline. Benches and tables were installed for residents to enjoy the sights. Signage and trail makers were installed to assist visitors.
