NWT Teachers' Association Takes Job Action

YELLOWKNIFE (January 4) -- The Minister Responsible for the Public Service, Charles Dent, said he is disappointed but not surprised by the NWT Teachers' Association (NWTTA) decision to work to rule.

"I hope that escalated job action by the NWTTA can be avoided. The territorial government remains committed to negotiating a responsible collective agreement that fairly compensates teachers while recognizing the fiscal reality of a projected \$60 million deficit next year," Mr. Dent said.

On Monday, arbitrator Tom Joliffe agreed with the government that school principals must perform essential child safety functions in the event of strike action by the NWTTA. Principals will be required to be on duty at the school for the first two hours of any strike to ensure that any children who show up for classes are returned to the safe custody of their parents or guardian.

Upon receiving the arbitrator's decision, the NWTTA served the government with notice of job action starting at noon on January 6th. Job action will initially consist of working to rule. Teachers will conduct classes but will not perform any voluntary services. The NWTTA has committed to notifying the government before any escalation in job action.

The government, with Divisional Education Councils and Divisional Education Authorities, has developed contingency plans should job action escalate.

Last November, NWTTA members rejected a tentative agreement reached by the government and the NWTTA bargaining committee and endorsed by a mediator. The tentative agreement offered wage and benefit increases totalling six per cent over two years and would have made NWT teachers among the highest paid in the country.

Early in December, the government presented its plans to deal with class size and special needs through the release of the Department of Education, Culture and Employment's Strategic Plan. This plan will be one of the critical areas for the new government to address.

GNWT Prepared to Meet NWTTA's Priority Wage Demand

YELLOWKNIFE (January 7) -- Minister Responsible for the Public Service, Charles Dent, announced today that the Government of the Northwest Territories has increased its offer of compensation to teachers outside of Yellowknife and has invited the Northwest Territories Teachers' Association (NWTTA) to resume negotiations for a collective agreement.

The new proposal provides for a wage increase of 6.25 per cent over two years. The parties had reached a tentative agreement in November of 1999 that provided for a five per cent increase in wages over two years, along with increases to allowances, for an overall increase in compensation of six per cent.

"In a television interview on January 4th, NWTTA President, Pat Thomas, stated that her members' primary monetary demand is a 6.25 per cent increase to the existing salary grid," Mr. Dent said. "This was our first indication of what the NWTTA's priorities were even though we had been asking this question for some time. We now have the opportunity to avoid a protracted dispute and the negative impact it would have on our students."

"Given that education of our young people is a high priority for the government, we were already prepared to move funds from other areas to increase teachers' compensation by six per cent. Under our current financial circumstances this means that very difficult decisions must be made as to where the money will come from in the areas of health care, housing and other public services. However, in the interest of avoiding escalated job action by teachers that will affect NWT students, the GNWT is prepared to reallocate further funds to meet the NWTTA's stated priority wage demand," Mr. Dent said.

Mr. Dent also indicated that while the government remains committed to addressing class size and special needs support outside of the collective agreement, it is prepared to explore ways that the NWTTA can be involved in the resolution of these issues.

"The Government of the Northwest Territories is committed to maintaining the quality of the education program," said Mr. Dent. "We would like to resume bargaining and resolve this dispute as soon as possible."

Minister Urges Teachers' Union to Return to Bargaining Table

The Minister Responsible for the Public Service, Charles Dent, hopes that the NWT Teachers' Association (NWTTA) will reconsider the government's latest salary offer and return to the bargaining table.

This morning, in an effort to get collective agreement negotiations started again, the government offered to increase the teachers' salary grid by 6.25 per cent. In her response to the government's overture, the NWTTA President, Pat Thomas, characterized the increased offer as little more than repackaging, even though hundreds of thousands more dollars had been put on the table. The NWTTA has countered with wages demands that exceed eight per cent and appear to be taking the position that these concessions must be made as a precondition to returning to the negotiating table.

"We have taken every reasonable step we can to get bargaining back on track and avoid escalating job action," Mr. Dent said. "As a government facing a \$60 million deficit and almost no revenue growth we simply cannot agree to the large wage increases the NWTTA is holding out for. We are prepared to make the difficult reallocations from other areas to meet responsible demands, but we will not fatally jeopardize our other programs and services to satisfy one group's excessive expectations."

Mr. Dent went on to say that he hoped the NWTTA would reconsider its position and agree to resume bargaining next week.

Department of Health and Social Services and UNW Join Forces to Improve Working Conditions in the North

YELLOWKNIFE (January 12) — The Department of Health and Social Services and the Union of Northern Workers (UNW) are uniting to address problems of workplace health, safety and wellbeing. The goal of the participants is improved working conditions for health and social services workers across the NWT.

The initiative grew from the department's recruitment and retention planning, and is meant to help address the territory-wide shortage in health and social services professionals. As one of the first steps in the process, the department and the UNW jointly chaired a one-day workshop with representatives of several stakeholder groups in Yellowknife on January 11.

Represented at the workshop were health and social services boards, the NWT Registered Nurses Association, the NWT Medical Association, the Association of Social Workers in Northern Canada, and the Certified Nurse Assistant Association. Other stakeholders in attendance were the Northwest Territories Health Care Association, the Worker's Compensation Board, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police, the GNWT Financial Management Board Secretariat, and Aurora College.

A portion of the workshop was devoted to having frontline health care and social services workers identify issues of workplace safety as they see them. The workshop also offered participants the opportunity to build better working relationships and share information and strategies to combat workplace violence.

Penny Ballantyne, Deputy Minister of Health and Social Services, and Georgina Rolt-Kaiser, President of the UNW, both expressed their satisfaction at the outcome of yesterday's workshop.

"These are not new issues," Ms. Ballantyne said. "Our frontline workers need to feel supported, not only by their employer, union and professional associations, but also by community leaders and the general public. With the growing national and international shortage of health and social service professionals, we need to treat frontline workers well and let them know they are appreciated and valued members of our communities."

"Workers' safety is a most important issue," Ms. Rolt-Kaiser said. "This is about working together and forming joint strategies to develop a foundation to improve workplace safety. I'm pleased that we've gathered here to identify problems and commit to making positive changes together."

Participants first identified areas of concern, which included workplace violence, issues of staffing and isolation, and career training and professional development. Ice Road Closed to Remove Truck

YELLOWKNIFE (January 12) -- The Department of Transportation says no one was injured and the ongoing construction of the ice road has not been affected by an incident on the Mackenzie River ice road this morning.

At approximately 7:00AM, a northbound Super-B-Train truck hauling diesel fuel broke through the ice crossing near Fort Providence. The driver was treated for hypothermia at the Fort Providence nursing station.

Both fuel tanks on the tanker remain partially in the water. No fuel has leaked from the tanks and the Department of Resources Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED) is currently monitoring the situation.

The ice crossing, which had been open to light traffic up to a maximum of 4,000kg, is currently closed while spill-response crews pump the fuel out of the stranded tanker and attempt to remove the truck from the ice. It is estimated that this will take at least 48 hours.

Staff from the local RCMP detachment, RWED and the Department of Transportation (DOT) will maintain road closures at both ends of the ice road until the retrieval of the truck has been completed.

The ferry at Fort Providence continues to operate on a 24 hour basis and no disruption to the travelling public is expected other than normal delays due to ice or fog.

Northerners Reminded that Smoke Alarms are an Essential Part of Fire Safety

YELLOWKNIFE (January 10) - Despite recent concerns about the reliability of smoke alarms, the Office of the Fire Marshal is reminding NWT residents that properly installed and maintained smoke alarms play an important role in fire safety.

Present day codes require dwellings in the NWT to have at least one smoke alarm hard-wired into the building's electrical system and located immediately outside sleeping areas at ceiling level. Supplemental battery operated or hard-wired smoke alarms may be installed in other locations at the owner's discretion. For an added measure of protection, residents may use a combination of both ionization and photoelectric alarms.

One of the leading causes of smoke alarm failure is the lack of a power source - no battery, dead battery or, in the case of hard-wired alarms, disconnection from a power source. To ensure alarms are working properly, consumers should set up a regular testing and maintenance schedule that meets the manufacturer's recommendations.

"Properly installed and maintained smoke alarms do save lives," NWT Fire Marshal Don Gillis says. "Ensure that your smoke alarms are working and leave them in place."

Smoke alarms, however, are only one element of fire safety in the home. Fire prevention is the first priority. "Smoke alarms cannot prevent fires," Gillis says. "They are simply a warning device to allow people to escape from the dangers of smoke and fires."

All households should develop and practice a fire escape plan regularly. Preplanning and practicing a fire escape plan allows everyone to be prepared and to react quickly if fire strikes. A good plan ensures that every member of a household knows: two ways out of every room; where to meet outside the home; and to call the fire department from a neighbour's home.

All residents of the NWT are encouraged to follow the above safety practices. The Fire Marshal's Office will keep the public informed of any new developments in this area.

Backgrounder

Northerners Reminded that Smoke Alarms are an Essential Part of Fire Safety

- In Canada, smoke alarms go through third-party testing by the Underwriters' Laboratories of Canada.
- There are two types of smoke alarms on the market ionization and photoelectric. Both are tested, certified, and labelled by Underwriters' Laboratories of Canada and must bear the ULC or CUL mark. They are suitable for early detection of smoke and fire in homes. Both technologies are designed to "alarm" at a point that will offer sufficient time for occupants to evacuate a home.
- Ionization type smoke alarms are recognized by ULC for being better suited in detecting fast-flaming fires, which account for 70 per cent of home fires.
- Photoelectric type smoke alarms are recognized for quicker detection of smouldering fires, which account for 30 per cent of home fires.
- Smoke alarms should be installed and tested in accordance with the manufacturers' instructions. Smoke alarms should be tested at least once a month.
- To test an alarm:
 - test monthly with smoke
 - drift smoke from a just extinguished candle
 - alarm should sound within 20 seconds
 - fan smoke away to silence alarm
- If an alarm doesn't sound, check and or replace the battery, check fuse box/breaker panel if the alarm is not receiving electricity and if the alarm is dead then replace immediately.
- To maintain an alarm:
 - clean smoke alarms twice a year by removing and wiping cover with damp cloth and gently vacuuming the inside of the alarm;
 - replace batteries once a year as needed (a chirping sound indicates low battery status);
 - never remove batteries for other uses;
 - do not install rechargeable batteries in smoke alarms; and
 - replace smoke alarms 10 years or older with a new one.

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Fuel Recovery Completed from Tank Truck

YELLOWKNIFE (January 13) – Officials from the Department of Transportation say the recovery of fuel from onboard the tank truck that went through the ice crossing near Fort Providence yesterday has been completed without incident.

The Mackenzie River ice crossing will remain closed while crews assemble equipment required for the recovery of the truck cab and tanker units. This operation is expected to begin on Saturday. Once the recovery is complete the Department of Transportation will reassess the site for damage to the ice crossing.

Department personnel and barricades will remain in place at either end of the ice road until the crossing is reopened to light traffic. The ferry at Fort Providence continues to operate on a 24-hour basis and no disruption to the travelling public is expected other than normal delays due to ice or fog.

YELLOWKNIFE (January 14) – Departmental exams for high school students will go ahead as scheduled over the next two weeks, not withstanding the job action by members of the NWT Teachers' Association Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Michael Miltenberger, said today.

"Each of the Directors of Education at the five Divisional Education Councils have come up with a contingency plan for supervising students who were scheduled to write exams next week," Mr. Miltenberger confirmed. "Students are studying now for exams scheduled Monday."

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Rural Teachers Break Off Contract Talks

YELLOWKNIFE (January 15) – The NWT Teachers' Association (NWTTA) has broken off contract negotiations with the territorial government.

The latest round of negotiations was held on January 13th and 14th in Yellowknife. The NWTTA left the table after the government presented an offer that would have given rural teachers a 6.25 per cent pay raise over two years. This would have ranked them among the highest paid teachers in the country.

"This is a good offer that shows the Government of the Northwest Territories is committed to improving education for our young people and values teachers and the work they do," the Minister Responsible for the Public Service, Charles Dent, said. "We were confident that this offer would get students back to school."

The offer also contained a memorandum of agreement, subject to approval of funding by the Legislative Assembly. The agreement would have seen the pupil/teacher ratio (ptr) drop from the current ratio of 18:1 to 16:1 over the next four years. The ratio would have dropped to 17.5:1 at the beginning of the school year next fall. The memorandum of agreement also committed to increase funding for student support services from 8.2 per cent of total schools funding to 15 per cent over the next four years. These targets would require at least \$4 million in the first year. This is in addition to \$4.2 million over two years increase to salaries and benefits for teachers.

"With the government facing a deficit of close to \$60 million, the latest offer to the NWTTA is a significant commitment," Mr. Dent said. "The offer demonstrates our commitment to quality education and provides specific targets to address support for special needs and a reduction in the pupil/teacher ratio."

The government's budgeting process takes place over the next few months. It is through this process that MLAs consider where the GNWT should allocate money.

"It's not clear how long the NWTTA will continue rotating strike action while it waits to see whether the government reallocates more money for education." Mr. Dent said. "It would be unfortunate if students are kept out of the classroom while their teachers hold out for more money despite there being a reasonable offer on the table. I encourage the NWTTA to reconsider this latest settlement offer and return to the bargaining table."

Truck removed from Ice Road

YELLOWKNIFE (January 17) - Officials from the Department of Transportation (DOT) confirmed today that the tanker truck that crashed through the Mackenzie River ice crossing last week was successfully removed to the north shore of the river on Saturday afternoon.

RTL Robinson's Enterprises Ltd. of Yellowknife led recovery efforts that involved using small dynamite blasts to free the truck from the ice. RCMP and DOT officials were on hand for the recovery along with representatives from the Department of Resources Wildlife and Economic Development and the federal departments of Indian and Northern Affairs and the Department of Fisheries.

DOT staff have since secured the damaged ice road with ice berms and have erected barriers to protect the area where the truck went through the ice. The ice road has been reopened to light traffic up to 4,000 kg with a detour around the damaged area.

Spray-ice construction of the ice crossing continues today and the Deportment of Transportation expects to open the ice crossing to all traffic later this week.

Robert Nault indicated there would be no delay in issuing water and land use permits for the Diavik process once an environmental agreement was in place.

"We are encouraged by Mr. Nault's comments today and agree that negotiations for an environmental agreement should proceed with all reasonable speed," Mr. Kakfwi said. "We appreciate that Mr. Nault has demonstrated concern for the effects mining has on the northern environment. Agreement Reached Between the NWTTA and the GNWT

YELLOWKNIFE (January 24) - Premier Stephen Kakfwi and President of the NWT Teachers' Association (NWTTA) Pat Thomas announced today that they have signed a Memorandum of Agreement outlining a commitment to introduce amendments to the *Education Act*.

"Amendments to the Act will be tabled at the next session of the Legislative Assembly," Mr. Kakfwi said. "This will confirm the government's commitment to implementing two of its department's key goals: to decrease pupil teacher ratios and increase student support funding."

Approval of the planned legislative changes will result in an incremental increase in education funding of approximately \$4.6 million in the 2000/2001 year.

"While job action was a difficult step for GNWT teachers to take, the end result is that all teachers and students in the NWT will benefit from the proposed legislative amendments," Ms. Thomas said.

In addition, the parties have reached a tentative agreement to renew the collective agreement for teachers outside of Yellowknife.

The collective agreement package includes:

- a salary increase of 6.25 per cent over two years; comprised of 3.75 per cent in the first year and 2.5 per cent in the second year. These same percentage increases will be applied to other teacher allowances;
- a professional allowance of \$1000 in the first year and \$500 in the second year;
- average increases to the Northern Allowance of 15 per cent;
- a new Mentorship Allowance of \$1000 to support orientation of new teachers;
- restructured Principal and Assistant Principal Allowances which result in an average increase of about 22 per cent.

- The addition of one salary step to the grid for Aboriginal Language and Culture Specialists; and
- A restructured salary grid based on the number of years of post-secondary teacher education. The results in approximately 30 teachers receiving an additional 5-6 per cent salary increase.

"This agreement means that teachers will no longer be working to rule or engaging in other job action," Ms. Thomas said. She says she will be working towards an early ratification vote by the members.

Information for Seniors Now Available on The Internet

YELLOWKNIFE (January 27) -- Minister Responsible for Seniors, Vince Steen today announced the creation of a new web site to provide seniors with up-to-date information on a wide range of federal, provincial, and territorial policies, programs and services.

The web site, called the Seniors Policies and Programs Database (SPPD), is the latest tool to be developed by the federal, provincial and territorial Ministers Responsible for Seniors to assist in planning for and responding to the needs of Canada's ageing population.

"Seniors are one of the fastest growing population groups in the North," Mr. Steen said. "By the year 2018, the population of those over 60 years of age in the NWT is expected to increase 135 per cent from about 2,400 to 5,600. The information available on this site will allow seniors, care-givers and ageing persons to research the supports and programs they need, or will need, in the future."

The SPPD web site includes information in both English and French on areas such as health, housing and income support, and will support the development of policies and programs that address the needs of seniors in the North and across Canada.

The new site allows seniors to browse policies and programs by jurisdiction or by subject, and provides direct access to federal, provincial and territorial web sites related to their search.

Fort Smith senior and President of the NWT Seniors Society, Beatrice Campbell says the new site will be a valuable tool for those providing information on the society's toll-free information line. "This will certainly fill a gap, she said. "We can now readily find information for those callers who may not have Internet access."

Seniors living in NWT communities that have a public library will be able to access the web site using the library's computers.

YELLOWKNIFE (January 27) -- The Premier and Cabinet congratulate northern Aboriginal leaders on yesterday's decision to work together to develop a business partnership to maximize ownership and benefits of a pipeline in the Mackenzie Valley.

It is a sign of how much progress we have made in the NWT that these same groups are now prepared to take control of this development themselves."

Finance minister Joe Handley and Aboriginal Affairs minister Jim Antoine attended the meeting on behalf of the territorial government. "This shows what can be achieved when people work together," Mr. Antoine said. "This type of unity and cooperation will allow northern people to ensure that they take control of the development of northern resources."

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Discussions Underway on Alternate Payment Methods for Physicians

YELLOWKNIFE (January 31) – The Department of Health and Social Services and the NWT Medical Association are working together to find alternative ways to recruit, retain and compensate physicians in the Northwest Territories.

The department and the NWT Medical Association are joining with Stanton Regional Health Board and Yellowknife Health and Social Services Board to create a competitive compensation scheme and practice environment -- one which supports the recruitment and retention of physicians, while ensuring clients continue to receive the quality of care to which they are accustomed.

Over the past year, a significant number of general practice physicians have left Yellowknife to practice elsewhere. It is increasingly difficult to recruit permanent replacements. Consequently, the pressure on the remaining physicians has become unsustainable. General practice physicians in Yellowknife must manage patients in their office, while providing a wide range of services to Stanton Regional Hospital and continuing to provide visiting physician services to other communities.

"We must act now to ensure that our remaining physicians stay in the North," Penny Ballantyne, Deputy Minister of Health and Social Services said. "We are very pleased to be working with the NWT Medical Association on this initiative and are exploring ways to develop physician compensation methods that may result in improved working conditions."

Dr. David King, President of the NWT Medical Association said, "Although our current focus is on addressing the concerns of Yellowknife physicians, a new alternate payment method will obviously have implications for the entire NWT medical care system. Because we represent the interests and concerns of all NWT physicians, we will continue to provide leadership and support to the process."

In the Northwest Territories, mental health problems account for more hospital visits than any other illness. "It is important," Mrs. Groenewegen said, "that communities continue to recognize mental health as a priority."

In 1998-99, over sixty per cent of funding for community wellness projects was spent on mental health prevention, promotion or protection. Traditional healing, drug and alcohol prevention, physical activity, cultural workshops, healthy parenting, support groups, traditional justice, anger management and empowerment are just a few areas where communities are spending mental health dollars.

"Mental health issues are important and communities across the north are responding to the challenge. I'm pleased to hear that communities are involved in setting the mental health agenda. They understand the impact mental health problems have on individuals, families and communities," Mrs. Groenewegen said.

Annual Transportation Report Released

YELLOWKNIFE (February 7) - Minister of Transportation, Vince Steen today released an annual report of traffic accidents in the NWT prepared by the Department of Transportation for the year ending 1998.

The report indicates there were 725 collisions in 1998 that resulted in 195 injuries and five fatalities. The number of collisions in 1998 represented a 17 per cent drop compared to the average number of collisions for the previous nine years.

Although the low number of vehicles in the NWT makes some statistics difficult to interpret, Mr. Steen said the report confirms his concern that high alcohol use continues to be the leading cause of accidents in the North. Ten per cent of all accidents in the NWT involve alcohol. In those collisions, one in every four people are injured or killed. The report also cites the lack of seatbelt and helmet use as concerning.

"The information in the report will be useful for NWT communities to review the type and nature of accidents that are occurring in their communities or nearby highways," Mr. Steen said. "Their input will assist the Department of Transportation to determine the most effective way of bringing these accident numbers down."

The 1998 report also contains statistics for areas now within Nunavut, an aspect that will not appear in future reports now that Division is complete.

GNWT Signs Canada/NWT Cooperation Agreement On Language

YELLOWKNIFE (February 10) – The Government of the Northwest Territories has secured funding to support the preservation and enhancement of Aboriginal languages and the development of French language activities in the Northwest Territories by signing the Canada/NWT Cooperation Agreement on Language.

The agreement, which was reached in December 1999, is valued at \$17.5 million over the next five years and will support a wide range of community based and government services in the territories.

"The Canada/NWT Cooperation Agreement on Language establishes a viable framework for co-operation for the preservation and enhancement of French and the Aboriginal languages by ensuring service is provided as required under the Official Languages Act," Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes said. "It also provides money for the development of language programming in the territory."

The agreement, which will end in 2004, provides \$1.9 million annually for Aboriginal language activities. A large portion of the money is to be managed locally to promote and enhance Aboriginal language preservation and recovery. A further \$1.6 million a year will go toward the provision of French services in the NWT.

The Cooperation Agreement on Language is signed by the Department of Education, Culture and Employment, on behalf of the Government of the Northwest Territories and the money is distributed to all government departments to provide the delivery of government services in French and the Aboriginal languages.

An event will be held in March to officially recognize and celebrate the ratification of the Language Agreement.

Campaign Launched to Promote Teaching Profession

YELLOWKNIFE (February 15) – A new promotional campaign to highlight the rewards of teaching careers and the teacher training programs available at Aurora College will be launched today by Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jake Ootes.

The multimedia campaign will include posters, newspaper and radio advertising, CD-ROMs, a video and information packages. Its goal is to increase the number of northerners who choose teaching as a career.

"We want to make it clear to northerners that teaching is an extremely satisfying and rewarding career," Mr. Ootes said. "In the North, we have an excellent teacher training program available at Aurora College."

The theme of the promotional campaign is "Be a Teacher – It's More Than a Career." In addition to the more obvious benefits of being a teacher, a career in teaching can provide many intangible benefits such as an opportunity to mentor young people and to watch students succeed and overcome challenges. Teachers are respected members of the communities in which they serve, acting as valuable role models.

The campaign will highlight the training offered through the Aurora College Teacher Education (ACTE) program. Over the past three decades, ACTE has trained hundreds of northerners, many of whom now teach in NWT communities. Others have gone on to assume leadership roles at the local, territorial and national level.

ACTE is a three-year diploma program, which permits graduates to teach up to grade nine within the NWT. By completing a fourth year of study with the College's partner, the University of Saskatchewan, graduates can earn a Bachelor of Education degree and the right to teach in various provinces and territories.

"We are proud of the role ACTE has played in the North since it began in 1968," Aurora College Chairperson, Danny Yakelya said. "We have built a respected program that produces qualified teachers. Our partnership with the University of Saskatchewan makes a degree very accessible for our graduates."

One element of the campaign is an information kit to help prospective candidates decide if teaching is the right career for them. The kit is designed for use by students and teachers together or by the students themselves and are available through Aurora College, School Guidance Counselors and Career Development Officers throughout the NWT.

Premier's Address calls on all NWT Leaders to Work Together

YELLOWKNIFE (February 22) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi made a renewed commitment to partnerships today as he formally began the business of the Fourteenth Legislative Assembly of the Northwest Territories.

Mr Kakfwi told his colleagues that his government's agenda will be based on a collective commitment from all leaders of the Northwest Territories. He said that he wants to develop a three-way partnership approach to governance that includes federal and aboriginal governments.

Mr. Kakfwi said the measurement of his government's partnership approach will be a reduction in the number of incidents related to social issues in each community and an increase in the global health and wellbeing of people in the Northwest Territories.

Reduced Speed on Highway #3

YELLOWKNIFE (February 24) – Minister of Transportation, Vince Steen today announced that the maximum speed for trucks will be reduced on the non reconstructed portion of Highway Three between Rae-Edzo and Yellowknife.

Student Financial Assistance Program Improved

YELLOWKNIFE (February 25) – Post-secondary students from the Northwest Territories could soon have access to more money, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes, said today.

Mr. Ootes introduced a Bill in the Legislative Assembly this week to amend the *Student Financial Assistance Act*. If approved, it will allow for changes to be implemented to the Student Financial Assistance Program providing increased financial support for post-secondary students.

Under the new program, funding for books will increase to \$300 per semester, tuition allowances will increase from \$1250 a semester to \$1750 a semester and the life-time maximum loan limit will increase to \$47,000.00.

"The objectives of changes to the NWT Student Financial Assistance Program are to increase benefits to students, encourage success and to invest in the future of the North," Mr. Ootes said.

The new program places an emphasis on aboriginal students and those schooled in the NWT. It will focus on supporting student success and progress, and will ensure that over the long term, student debt load remains at a manageable level with limits placed on the number of semesters for which students can receive assistance.

"These changes are being made following an extensive consultation process," Mr. Ootes said. "Direct input from students, parents, aboriginal leaders and legislators have all contributed to the program's redesign."

In addition, the redesigned program will be supported by improved, streamlined administrative procedures.

Towards Excellence: A Report on Education in the NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (February 28) – "Towards Excellence: A Report on Education in the NWT," was tabled Friday in the Legislative Assembly by Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jake Ootes.

The report is the third edition of what is referred to as an "indicators" document to be published in the Northwest Territories. It presents statistical data documenting how well students from Kindergarten to Grade 12 are progressing through the education system.

"This report is good news for all residents of the Northwest Territories," Mr. Ootes said. "It reveals that there is much to be proud of in our education system."

The document indicates the overall education level of NWT residents has risen. It shows yearly increases in the number of students graduating from high school. School participation rates are up and more than 90 per cent of existing students now have access to senior secondary schooling in their home community.

Information contained in the document will allow parents and the public access to the same tools used by educators and the Department of Education to track progress and the effectiveness of the education system in the NWT.

This is the first set of indicators for the new Northwest Territories. It will provide a reference point from which to track trends and changes in the system over the next few years. Indicators will be published biannually in the future.

"Towards Excellence is not only a snapshot of where we are, it helps us set realistic goals for our education system and our students," Mr. Ootes said.

The Territorial Government Signs off on Diavik Environmental Agreement

YELLOWKNIFE (March 8) – The Minister of Finance, Joe Handley, today confirmed that the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has signed off on the Environmental Agreement with Diavik Diamond Mines Inc.

"I commend all parties involved in the long and tough negotiations on this agreement," Mr. Handley said. "Their dedication and hard work has paid off in an agreement that recognizes the importance of the environment to northerners as well as the rights of Aboriginal governments to play a central role in monitoring the project."

The environmental agreement was developed with the participation of the Dogrib Treaty 11 Council, Yellowknives Dene First Nation, Lutsel K'e Dene First Nation, North Slave Metis Alliance, Kitikmeot Inuit Association, Diavik and the governments of the Northwest Territories, Nunavut and Canada.

An agreement was required to address environmental provisions identified in the Diavik Comprehensive Study Report that would not be covered by other regulatory instruments such as a water licence or land permits.

The environmental agreement calls for the establishment of an Environmental Monitoring Advisory Board, composed of representatives from Diavik, the five affected Aboriginal governments as well as the governments of the NWT, Canada and Nunavut, to oversee the environmental management of the project.

The advisory board will also make recommendations on the participation of Aboriginal people and community members in training and monitoring programs and on the design and implementation of scientific and traditional knowledge studies. Diavik will fund the board. The territorial and the federal governments will provide additional funding to the board for the first two years.

The Diavik Diamonds Project is still awaiting other regulatory instruments including a water licence from the Northwest Territories Water Board.

- Establishment of an Environmental Monitoring Advisory Board to operate at arm's length from Diavik and government.
- Advisory Board will oversee the environmental management of the project, to make recommendations on the participation of Aboriginal people and community members in training and monitoring programs and to design and implement scientific and traditional knowledge studies.
- Membership of the Advisory Board to include representatives of the Dogrib Treaty 11 Council, Yellowknives Dene First Nation, Lutsel K'e Dene First Nation, North Slave Metis Alliance, Kitikmeot Inuit Association, Diavik and the governments of the NWT, Nunavut and Canada.
- Advisory Board will produce an annual report of its activities and recommendations.
- Diavik will fund the Advisory Board.
- GNWT and Government of Canada will provide additional funding to the Advisory Board for the first two years.
- Diavik will comply with all environmental laws and regulations applicable to the project.
- Diavik will provide environmental management plans for both the construction and operating phases of the project.
- Diavik will establish environmental monitoring programs for the project.
- Diavik will participate in the development of a regional cumulative effects assessment and management framework.
- Diavik will implement a progressive reclamation and abandonment plan for the project.
- Diavik will provide appropriate protection for archaeological sites in the vicinity of the project.
- Diavik will produce an annual report which will include results of environmental monitoring programs.
- Diavik will provide a security deposit for the reclamation and abandonment of land and water.
- Disputes arising out of the agreement will be subject to arbitration.



Economic Strategy to Include Training, Education and Inter-regional Cooperation

YELLOWKNIFE (March 10) – Training, education and inter-regional cooperation are some of the key issues that need to be addressed in an economic strategy for the Northwest Territories.

These issues were on the table when the Economic Strategy Panel recently met in Inuvik to continue their deliberations on the contents of an economic strategy for the Northwest Territories.

"Education and training, particularly in the areas of the trades and technical and management skills, must be vital components of the strategy," Economic Strategy Panel co-chair Darrell Beaulieu said. "Northerners must have the skills necessary to meet the needs of industry if residents are to benefit from development."

The panel identified the need for much greater inter-regional cooperation.

"Development projects often cross regional boundaries and investment opportunities frequently require a cooperative approach by Aboriginal governments," co-chair Richard Nerysoo said. "A cooperative approach to development could benefit both Aboriginal governments and developers, who can be faced with a multitude of consultation requirements."

The panel also emphasized the need for increased promotion of tourism and of the Northwest Territories in global markets.

A special presentation was also made by an experienced negotiator from the Vuntut Gwich'in First Nation. Steven Mills provided the panel with a presentation on the devolution of oil and gas in the Yukon, and the experience of the Yukon First Nations.

The panel is scheduled to meet in Rae April 5-6 to continue work on the economic strategy.

"The potential for jobs and economic stimulation from this industry is great," Mr. Ootes said. "Our participation in the international community of diamond producers will help ensure that we reach that potential."

Israel 2000 is the second international conference on rough diamonds and is expected to attract approximately 500 delegates. It is hosted by several Israeli diamond industry groups and by the government of Israel. The conference allows rough diamond producers and consumers to share ideas and explore opportunities and to discuss the issues facing the industry today.

Premier Looking Forward to Release of New National Standards Strategy

YELLOWKNIFE (March 28) – Premier Kakfwi says he, like many northern interest groups, will be watching with interest when the details of a new Canada-wide standards strategy are released tomorrow in Yellowknife. Federal Industry Minister, John Manley, plans to release the new Canadian Standards Strategy simultaneously in Yellowknife and six other cities.

Plans to formulate a Canadian Standards Strategy were announced by the federal government almost two years ago. The Standards Council of Canada, a national crown corporation, has co-ordinated the project in partnership with industry associations, governments, standards development organizations, consumer groups and the general public. The strategy will outline the position that Canada should take internationally and domestically to secure a leadership role in the development and application of standards.

"Standards are a significant marketing tool for our emerging Northern manufacturing sector," Mr. Kakfwi said. "By demonstrating that our products comply with established standards, we are able to access new markets for our own goods and services."

A special launch event has been scheduled at the Great Hall of the Legislative Assembly, where the Premier and representatives from industry, business, government and members of the public will watch the new national strategy being announced via satellite broadcast from Ottawa.

"It is significant that Yellowknife was chosen as one of the locations for this national event," Mr. Kakfwi said, "I think it demonstrates a recognition that residents of Canada's North are important stakeholders in this sort of initiative."

Tours of two manufacturing plants and a discussion of what the strategy means for Northerners will follow.

\$1 Million Seniors' Complex sold to Alaskans

YELLOWKNIFE (March 29) -- The Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation (NWTHC), Roger Allen today announced the completion of a deal to sell a made-inthe-NWT seniors' complex to Stebbins, Alaska.

The five-unit complex valued at roughly \$1 million will be built as a pilot project between the NWT Housing Corporation, the United States Department of Housing and Urban Development and the Alaska Housing Finance Corporation. Under the terms of the deal, NWT contractors will build the complex with local labour while NWT suppliers and manufacturers will provide the materials.

"In addition to the participation of NWT contractors, suppliers and manufacturers, Aurora College will conduct a three week pre-employment training program for the Alaskans who will work on the project," Mr. Allen said. "By working together in this manner, Northerners can help build a viable economy for the NWT."

The complex will use existing NWTHC designs modified to meet the needs of the Alaskans. The pilot project is a continuation of NWTHC efforts to market NWT goods and services to other parts of the circumpolar world. Last year the NWTHC sold seven housing materials packages to the Inupiat of the Alaskan North Slope. The NWTHC is confident that there is the potential for increased business with the Alaskans.

As part of the NWT Trade Delegation to Alaska, the Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs, Jim Antoine, will be in Stebbins today to inaugurate the pilot project.

Stebbins is an Yup'ik Inuit village located roughly 190 kilometres southeast of Nome, Alaska.

Rae Edzo Dene Band to redeem invested shares from NWT Development Corporation

YELLOWKNIFE (April 4) - The Tli Cho Co-operative Ltd. of Rae Edzo has purchased a building to house its community-owned general store. This allows the Rae Edzo Dene Band to redeem \$294,340 in preferred shares from the NWT Development Corporation.

The NWT Development Corporation originally invested in the construction of the building in partnership with the Rae Edzo Dene Band Development Corporation in 1996. The Co-op, owned by shareholders in the Hamlet of Rae Edzo, was a tenant in the facility.

The Minister Responsible for the NWT Development Corporation, Stephen Kakfwi, said he's pleased that the corporation was able to partner in the project. "The role of the Development Corporation is to provide assistance to business for infrastructure and employment development. This project is a good example of how all of its investments should work," he said.

President of the Rae Edzo Dene Band Development Corporation, Eddie Erasmus agreed. "The original deal served the community's needs very well," he said. "When things are going well, it makes sense for the community to take financial responsibility for its own developments. With the sale of the building to the Tli Cho Co-operative, the band is able to buy out the corporation's initial investment."

The Tli Cho Cooperative has also received assistance from the NWT Development Corporation, along with the Business Development Bank of Canada and the Arctic Cooperatives Development Fund (ACDF) to purchase the building.

"Cooperatives are community owned businesses. This development demonstrates how co-ops and development corporations can work together at the community and territorial level," ACDF Operations Manager, Greg O'Neil said.

Premier Kakfwi seeks Alberta Investment for Brilliant Future

YELLOWKNIFE (April 10) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi told Alberta business representatives this morning that their investment in NWT resources will result in huge benefits as the economic potential of the Northwest Territories is realized.

Speaking at a "speaker's corner" breakfast hosted by the Calgary Chamber of Commerce, Mr. Kakfwi invited the over-100 business representatives in attendance to join the NWT and Aboriginal governments in developing the NWT's "brilliant future". "You have the expertise, the equipment and the service industry, he said. "We need training, investment and joint-venture partners to work with northern and Aboriginal businesses."

Premier Kakfwi's speech was the first engagement in a two-day round of meetings scheduled with natural gas producers, pipeline and drilling companies and government regulators. Finance Minister Joe Handley and Aboriginal Affairs and Justice Minister, Jim Antoine are accompanying the Premier.

Key to any future hydrocarbon development is the devolution of regulatory authority to northern governments and the successful negotiation of resource revenue sharing that is fair to territorial and aboriginal governments.

In a one-on-one meeting in Ottawa last week, Premier Kakfwi encouraged the Prime Minister to lend his support to the resolution of these important northern issues.

"Our aim is to build a strong unified self-reliant NWT that can take its place in the Canadian Confederation as the first "Have-Territory" in Canada's history," Mr. Kakfwi said.

Virtual Classrooms Being Piloted in the NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (April 18) -- Students from Kakisa, Hay River, Yellowknife, Norman Wells and Aklavik are taking part in a pilot project that could lead to virtual classrooms becoming a reality in the Northwest Territories.

The students are taking a course called Northern Studies 10, with the assistance of an online instructor who lives in Norman Wells.

The self-contained distance learning course is presented in software which has been customized to include course material and reference material in an interactive format, and includes links to a number of other Web Sites with information relevant to Northern Studies.

"This pilot project is the first step in developing a network which will give students access to classes which will earn them extra credits toward their high school diploma in their home community," Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes, said. "This is a perfect example of how the GNWT's Digital Communications Network is helping people."

The online instructor uses e-mail and fax to create the atmosphere of a virtual classroom. Her work is supported, in each of the participating communities by an onsite facilitator, commonly an educator from the community who will assist students with difficulties they may encounter accessing course material.

"One of the greatest challenges people of the NWT have to deal with is the delivery of quality services to areas that are often difficult to reach by traditional methods," Mr. Ootes said. "This concept is a winning combination because both students and teachers communicate via the computer, so it no longer matters where they live."

The software and curriculum for the program was developed for the Department of Education, Culture and Employment. An assessment of the pilot program is planned for June. It is expected the Northern Studies 10 plus a math program for grades 7 to 10 will be available to students across the NWT in September.

Kakfwi says His Promise Stands

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Workers' Compensation Benefits Paid to Widows

YELLOWKNIFE (May 1) -- The Minister Responsible for the Workers' Compensation Board, Joseph Handley announced today that cheques have been mailed to 11 widows whose benefits had originally been discontinued.

In accordance with the *Workers' Compensation Act* at the time, WCB benefits were terminated to surviving spouses when they remarried. Amendments to the *Act*, introduced by Mr. Handley the March session of the Legislative Assembly changed this legislation to reflect rights identified by the Canadian Charter of Rights in 1985.

"We needed to do this as soon as we could," Mr. Handley said. "Some of these women have waited a long, long time to see this happen."

Mr. Handley noted today that the government's decision to amend the legislation and to allow for the payments was completed in a very short period of time. "It could not have been achieved without the consensus of all members of the assembly," he said.

As in some other jurisdictions across Canada, settlements must still be negotiated with widows who remarried prior to 1985 but Mr. Handley says he's confident that with the continued co-operation of his colleagues, the WCB will be able to resolve that soon.

Turning Point Youth Facility a Good Move, Minister Says

The Turning Point building already meets the standards necessary to operate as an open custody facility. The department will fund training for the Turning Point staff to assist in the conversion. Staff from Inuvik's other open custody homes have been invited to take advantage of the opportunity for further training as well.

Staff Retention Policy Announced

YELLOWKNIFE (May 8) -- The GNWT has adopted a new Staff Retention Policy, the Minister Responsible for the Public Service, Joe Handley, announced today. The policy focuses expressly on retention and development of GNWT employees when government goes through organizational change.

"The Policy recognizes the critical need to retain a competent and skilled workforce and that this becomes even more vital when organizational change occurs," Mr. Handley said. "Change is inevitable in today's environment of rapid political and technological developments and it should be a positive experience. We believe that we now have a policy that makes the retention of employees a priority when change occurs."

Highlights of the policy are:

- An express commitment to retention, retraining and development of existing staff to maintain a skilled, stable and competent public service;
- A requirement that government departments that may undergo restructuring develop a strategy to maximize staff retention where it is contemplated that employees will be affected;
- A requirement that each department report on its management of the human resource aspects of organizational change initiatives on an annual basis to the Legislative Assembly, including all steps taken to retain affected employees.

Mr. Handley stated that the previous government's "no lay-off" approach to organizational change was commendable but did not place enough emphasis on the need for well planned government-wide co-ordination of organizational change impacts to effectively retrain and redeploy affected employees. It also had the effect of denying employees access to some provisions of their collective agreement in circumstances where employees did not wish to move or undertake retraining.

Program to help New Teachers

YELLOWKNIFE (May 15) – A program designed to help new teachers get used to their duties in the classroom was announced last week by Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jake Ootes.

"New teachers are enthusiastic about their careers and the opportunity to make a difference in the lives of young people," explained Mr. Ootes. "But those first weeks in the classroom, when they are suddenly faced by the expectations of both students and the school system, can be overwhelming. Teachers may feel isolated and lose their initial enthusiasm."

"A Program for Beginning Teachers" is designed to help new teachers meet the challenges they face during the first year of their careers. It will help the five divisional education councils and the two Yellowknife school boards support teachers who are new to the territory or have graduated from the Aurora College Teacher Education program and are about to begin their first year of teaching.

The four-phase program is outlined in an NWT Teacher Induction Guide. It begins with a pre-orientation session immediately after a teacher has been hired and provides ongoing support throughout the school year. It features methods of orienting new teachers to northern culture as well as ways of encouraging them to establish supportive relationships in the school and in the community.

The need for the program was identified in the Strategy for Teacher Education in the Northwest Territories two years ago. Its purpose is to improve teacher performance, retain teachers in the profession, promote, promote the personal and professional well being of new teachers and help teachers understand the culture of the education system in the NWT.

The material included in the NWT Teacher Induction is based on broad consultation with beginning teachers and participation from Divisional Education Councils, Yellowknife School Boards, Aurora College, the NWT Teachers Association and the Department of Education, Culture and Employment.

NWT Public Libraries Receive \$323,000 from Gates Foundation

HAY RIVER (May 17) – Public Libraries in the Northwest Territories will receive a \$323,000 grant from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, Jake Ootes, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment announced today in Hay River.

The grant will fund computers and Internet access in NWT public libraries, as well as virtual libraries in communities not currently served by the NWT Library system. Separately, Microsoft Canada will donate software with a retail value of \$92,000 to all libraries receiving foundation grants.

"The ability to access new information quickly is a necessary skill in today's wired world," Mr. Ootes said. "This announcement means that not only are we one step closer to providing a range of library services for all NWT residents, regardless of where they live, it also means we are developing the capacity in NWT communities to learn computer skills and to pass on that training to others."

The nine existing NWT public libraries will receive computer workstations. Six additional communities will also benefit from the grant as virtual libraries with full Internet access and computer technology will be created. A mobile training lab, training for library staff, upgraded hardware to improve Internet access, and one help desk station are included in the gift.

"NWT Library Services is leading the way to providing increased access to all people. The creation and development of virtual libraries will mean that even without a physical library building, citizens of NWT can now benefit from library services and the power of the Internet," said Carol Erickson, International Library Programs Manager for the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation. "It is the Foundation's hope that this program may be used as a model to reach people worldwide."

The communities in which virtual libraries are established will have public access to the World Wide Web, including the NWT Library Services web page. This will mean access to the borrow-by-mail program currently offered by NWT Library Services; inter-library loans throughout Canada; full-text material on-line; plus other research and resource material. Training will develop expertise at the community level that will ensure service for library clients. NWT Library Services will work with the communities to create a virtual library with the range of services that best suits the community.

The grant is a part of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation's Library Program whose mission is to provide increased access to technology for libraries serving low-income communities throughout the United States and Canada.

"This impressive gift means that both the goals of NWT Libraries to enhance service and that of the foundation to increase access to technology are met," Mr. Ootes said. "More than that, the training components turn this gift into an investment from which all NWT residents will benefit. Installation of the virtual libraries in Fort McPherson, Tsiigehtchic, Fort Good Hope, Fort Liard, Rae-Edzo and Lutsel K'e will begin in September and will be completed before Christmas.

In a July 1999 study of Internet use by households, Statistics Canada noted that while computer use has increased nationwide, there is a wage gap between those with access to technology and the Internet and those without access. Inuvik Regional Health Facility to Proceed as GNWT-Owned Project

YELLOWKNIFE (May 17) -- The Government of the Northwest Territories will build a new regional Health and Social Services Centre in Inuvik but not as a Public/Private Partnership (P3) pilot project as originally planned.

"The Government was excited by the potential for a P3 approach on this project, but we did not receive the response from the private sector that we had hoped for," Minister of Finance, Joe Handley announced today. Instead, the GNWT will assume full ownership and project-management responsibility for the new facility.

Minister of Health and Social Services, Jane Groenwegen stressed that progress on the Health Centre will not be delayed by the decision. "We have conducted a thorough analysis of the options open to the Government, and have determined that at this point whatever route is chosen to finance and construct the hospital, it will result in a new facility opening during the Summer of 2003. Even if the Government were to proceed with the P3 approach, the facility could not be completed any sooner," she said.

"The Department of Health and Social Services will work with the Inuvik Regional Health and Social Services Board, and the Department of Public Works to get a project management team in place. No time will be lost as a result of this change to the management and ownership approach," Mrs. Groenewegen said.

New Agreement Provides Air Support for Northern Search and Rescue Operations

YELLOWKNIFE (May 18) -- A new Memorandum of Understanding between the Department of Municipal and Community Affairs, the Royal Canadian Mounted Police "G" Division and the Civil Air Search and Rescue Association (CASARA) will provide trained aerial support for search and rescue operations in the NWT.

Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs, Jim Antoine signed the understanding in Yellowknife last week. "It is important that we have effective search and rescue services in the Northwest Territories," he said. "Having access to trained air support when it is needed will help us organize more efficient ground searches with our partners in this agreement."

CASARA is a national organization of volunteer pilots, navigators and spotters trained to conduct aerial searches. It has been active in the North for 11 years and currently has operations in Hay River, Yellowknife and Inuvik, with plans to expand to Fort Smith and Fort Simpson.

Under the terms of the understanding, CASASRA will provide air support to official searches for missing persons at the request of the RCMP and the department's Emergency Measures Organization. Over 100 members and six aircraft are available to provide support during ground searches.

The RCMP is responsible for organizing ground searches and searches on inland waters in the Northwest Territories. The Department of Municipal and Community Affairs, through the Emergency Measures Organization, assists communities in developing their own emergency response plans and works to co-ordinate the implementation of search and rescue plans.

Northern Leaders Unified in plans to address Western Premiers

BRANDON (May 23) -- Northern Premiers will seek support for northern economic development when they meet this week with their counterparts at the Western Premiers' Conference (WPC) in Brandon, Manitoba.

New Agreement to Offer More Courses On Line

YELLOWKNIFE (May 24) – High school students in NWT communities will have more online courses to choose from in the 2000/2001 school year thanks to a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed today by Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes, and Cathy Faber of the Calgary Board of Education.

The MOU will give NWT students access to more than 30 online courses developed in accordance with the Alberta curriculum. Students will use a web-based program called WebCT (Web Curriculum Tools) to access courses through the Digital Communications Network. WebCT is the most popular method of delivering online courses in North America.

Earlier this year, on line studies were introduced to NWT schools in a successful pilot project in Kakisa, Hay River, Norman Wells and Yellowknife. "The potential for this new initiative is immense," Mr. Ootes said. "Students now have an opportunity to augment their studies with courses previously unavailable in their communities. WebCT allows students to study online, at their own pace, with the support of a trained teacher facilitator."

Courses to be offered in the new school year have been developed by teachers from the Calgary Board of Education, considered a leader in the development and delivery of online learning. Calgary teachers will teach the courses with student support provided by trained teachers in the NWT.

"We are delighted to have reached an agreement for WebCT course delivery in the NWT," Cathy Faber said. "We are looking for partners in education to help us develop and expand our WebCT program. The GNWT is looking for ways to enhance and expand the amount of material available for students online."

Teachers in the NWT will also benefit from the learning offered by WebCT programs thanks to professional development opportunities available for teachers who assist in delivering the courses. Training will be provided by the Calgary Board of Education beginning in August and will continue throughout the two-year term of the MOU. NWT teachers will also have the opportunity to participate in the development of future courses designed for online delivery.

Students who wish to take advantage of the course offerings through the WebCT program must complete a computer readiness course called *Info Highways 1090*, which will be offered beginning in September at NWT schools.

New Agreement to Offer More Courses On Line

- Online Learning is a type of distance education that has gained prominence and popularity in recent years, because of advances in technology. WebCT is among the most popular course delivery tools currently available
- WebCT, which is an acronym for Web Curriculum Tools, is a Web-based program developed at the University of British Columbia.
- Students can access courses through the Internet, which are stored on a server in a central location. Under the guidance of a trained teacher facilitator, students can proceed at their own pace through the course.
- Teacher facilitators in the NWT will be trained by the Calgary Board of Education through a combination of Online Learning and on site workshops.
- The Online Learning training course will be delivered in the NWT over the Digital Communication Network (DCN). This follows a successful pilot project this spring in which Northern Studies 10 was offered in virtual classrooms throughout the NWT over the DCN.
- Teachers will be encouraged to develop additional courses appropriate to the NWT, in conjunction with the Calgary Board of Education who hopes to use the expertise of NWT teachers in developing a curriculum that is culturally appropriate for Aboriginal students.
- Among the secondary level courses that will soon be available to schools in the NWT are: Pure Math 10 & 20, Applied Math 10, Social Studies 10, 20, 30, 33, English 10,13,20,23,30, 33, Sciences 10, Chemistry 20 & 30, PE 10 & 30, Sociology 30, Biology 20 & 30, Physics 20 & 30, Art 10, 20 & 30, Psychology 30. It is expected that by next year, three hundred courses in all will be available.
- NWT Teachers will be given the opportunity to complete the *Training On-line* program, and to attend the *Summer Teaching and Learning Institute* in Calgary.
- Students are required to complete a computer readiness course, *Info Highways 1090*, before being recommended by their local DEC/DEA to register through ECE for the courses offered. This course is available in schools where a trained teacher facilitator is present.

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Western Premiers Support Northern Priorities

BRANDON (May 25) -- The Premiers of Canada's three territories say that support received at the Western Premiers Conference will strengthen their message to the federal government, and that it is time to talk seriously about implementing federally funded economic development and diversification programs in the North.

The provincial and territorial Premiers addressed common northern priorities in Brandon, Manitoba yesterday afternoon. In particular, the provinces restated their support for the federal devolution and jurisdiction over land and resources to the territorial governments.

"The devolution of land and resource management responsibilities to northern governments will be critical if we are to fund economic development initiatives," Nunavut Premier Paul Okalik said.

Yukon Premier Pat Duncan agreed. "Devolution of jurisdiction over land and resources is critical if Yukon people are going to gain control over their economic futures," she said.

The Premiers expressed concern that the territories are the only jurisdictions in Canada where the federal government has not implemented expected economic development agreements.

"This is ironic considering the enormous potential for resource development in Canada's northern territories," NWT Premier, Stephen Kakfwi said. "We can take advantage of the opportunities if Canada invests now but without the support of the federal government, our ability to maximize those economic opportunities is severely constrained."

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GNWT Targets Tobacco with Public Awareness Campaign

YELLOWKNIFE (May 26) -- The Department of Health and Social Services is releasing a series of ten public-awareness television advertisements in recognition of World No-Tobacco Day, Wednesday May 31, 2000.

"It's a proactive initiative that targets a very serious problem," said Minister of Health and Social Services, Jane Groenewegen. "Smoking rates in the NWT are among the highest in Canada. Implications for health costs and human costs in terms of death and disability are significant and rising. We simply can't afford it." The 1999 Labour Force Survey indicated that 42.4 per cent of males and 39.7 per cent of females in the NWT are smokers.

The 30 and 60 second commercials, produced in the North and featuring northern actors, primarily target youth using a blend of humour, animation, music, vivid imagery and testimonials. "We're looking forward to the response these messages will provoke," Mrs Groenewegen said. "They are well produced and speak in the images and languages of the audience we are trying to reach."

The advertisements are designed to counter messages in marketing by tobacco companies. "We want young people to think about what they're being asked to buy into," Mrs. Groenewegen said.

World No-Tobacco day is an international event designated by the World Health Organization. This year, the theme is Entertainment and Tobacco Promotion – Countering the deception. The slogan is Tobacco Kills – Don't be Duped.

The GNWT recognizes tobacco use as a major health and social problem in the NWT and is committed to combating this significant public health issue. A key goal cited in the government's vision document, *Towards a Better Tomorrow*, is "people free from preventable diseases such as those resulting from alcohol and drug abuse."

NWT Employer of Youth for 2000 Recognized

YELLOWKNIFE (June 5) -- Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jake Ootes today presented the NWT Employer of Youth Award for 2000 to Al and Kelly Kaylo, owners of the Yellowknife McDonald's franchise.

"On behalf of the GNWT and The Conference Board of Canada, it gives me great pleasure to recognize, the outstanding efforts the Kaylos have made in providing job opportunities for young people who often have a difficult time making a transition into the work force," Mr. Ootes said. "Efforts like those of this McDonald's franchise exemplify the role an employer can play in introducing young people to the world of work and reducing unemployment among youth."

The Kaylos first opened Canada's most northerly McDonald's in Yellowknife in 1992. Two years later, the original location in Yellowknife was expanded and a second location opened in the local Walmart store. The two restaurants regularly fill orders from north of the Arctic Circle and employ anywhere from 40 to 90 young people aged 14 to 19 at any one time.

"Young people employed by McDonald's get an excellent start in developing job skills because of the extensive training provided by the company," Mr. Kaylo said. "They learn skills ranging from team work to supervisory skills and everything in-between, sometimes without even realizing it."

The Conference Board of Canada's Employer of Youth Award program is one of several initiatives under the Forum of Labour Market Ministers' Agenda for Action on Youth Employment. Each year, employers from each province and territory who demonstrate innovation in creating new work opportunities for young people are encouraged to apply. Winners are recognized at the Conference Board of Canada's annual conference, which took place earlier this year in Halifax. In the Northwest Territories, the Employer of Youth program is co-ordinated by the Department of Education, Culture and Employment.

New MOU will Enhance Northern Economies

VICTORIA (June 6) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi and the Premier of British Columbia, Ujjal Dosanjh agreed today on a range of economic development initiatives designed to mutually benefit communities in the two regions.

A Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed by the leaders in Victoria will see the NWT and BC governments pursue joint initiatives to develop services and infrastructure critical to long-term economic development.

Backgrounder:

New MOU will Enhance Northern Economies

Between 1991 and 1996, the Northwest Territories imported on average just over one billion dollars worth of goods and services annually from southern Canada. Ontario and Alberta were the leading suppliers of imported commodities, with Quebec and British Columbia following in third and fourth place.

In 1996, the latest year for which we have information in imports, the NWT imported \$952 million from southern Canada. In 1996, the NWT economy created a demand of around \$3.2 billion. Thus, for every dollar of economic demand generated in the NWT, thirty cents flowed directly south to benefit businesses and labour in other provinces.

The impact is even greater with large-scale resources projects such as mining, oil and gas developments. Because the NWT produces very little manufactured goods such as machinery, and because of a limited supply of skilled labour, demand for machinery and trades employment must be filled from southern suppliers. For example, it is estimated that for every dollar of output by Yellowknife gold mines, 51 cents flows directly south for supply purchases. For the construction phase of mine operations, 95 cents of every dollar spent on machinery and equipment heads south, and 69 cents of every dollar spent on materials flows to a southern province. Similarly, for capital construction associated with oil and gas, 80 cents of every dollar spent accrues to southern businesses.

The NWT imported on average (1991-1996) \$137.2 million of goods and services annually from British Columbia. In terms of economic output, imports from British Columbia represent 5.8% the average gross domestic product of NWT economy during that period. That is, for every dollar of output in the NWT, almost 6 cents of economic activity is generated in British Columbia.

The Northern Dimension of Canada's Foreign Policy

OTTAWA (June 9) -- Minister of Finance, Joe Handley was among the northern leaders who met with Canada's Foreign Affairs Minister, Lloyd Axworthy yesterday to unveil the "*The Northern Dimension*" of Canada's Foreign Policy.

Mr Handley, who attended the meeting on behalf of Premier Stephen Kakfwi, joined Nunavut Premier Paul Okalik, Yukon Deputy House Leader Scott Kent and Inuit, Gwich'in, Metis and Yukon First Nation leaders at the Ottawa event.

The document unveiled by the Minister outlines Canada's northern foreign policy objectives with a focus on four areas: Strengthening and promoting the Arctic Council, particularly Aboriginal peoples' participation in the Council; Helping to establish a University of the Arctic and a Canadian and circumpolar policy research network; Developing and expanding opportunities to assist Russia in addressing its northern challenges; and Promoting the study and practical application of means for circumpolar countries and communities to develop sustainable economic opportunities and trade across the Arctic circumpolar region.

"The GNWT has consistently supported the concept and principle of having a Northern component in Canada's Foreign Policy that addresses the unique aspects of Canada's North in a circumpolar world," Mr. Handley said. "Our government is particularly interested in the promotion of circumpolar trade and commerce and the implications of climate change."

Mr. Handley noted however, that Canadian domestic policies and priorities must be developed to ensure that they will be supported by the *Northern Dimension*. "For example, we need a larger percentage of our northern students to finish high school in order to benefit from the post secondary opportunities afforded by a circumpolar university" he said.

The GNWT will review the Northern Dimension document and expects to be a full and active participant in the next step, the development of an action plan to support the policy framework.

Understanding Canada's Health Care Costs

YELLOWKNIFE (June 9) – Today Premier Lucien Bouchard, on behalf of all provincial and territorial premiers released *Understanding Canada's Health Care Costs*, *An Interim Report*. Copies of the report have been provided to the Prime Minister and the federal Minister of Health Allan Rock.

Understanding Canada's Health Care Costs, An Interim Report examines how the health care system is financed, provides an analysis of innovations that are already underway in provinces and territories, and looks at the current and future cost drivers in Canada's health system.

The report confirms that Canadians are currently well-served by the public health care system however, territories and provinces are challenged by increasing costs due to such factors as ageing populations, new technologies and pharmaceuticals. In the NWT additional challenges include: a young population, 30% of our residents are 15 years or younger; a high birth rate; a seniors population that will double in 2018; a high turnover rate in the health care field; and the population's low health status in areas of preventable illness and premature deaths.

If current cost trends continue, operating health expenditures will increase by approximately 5% per year. The interim report clearly shows that while territories and provinces are increasing their health care contributions, federal government funding has decreased.

"Each year the NWT Minister of Health and Social Services requests additional funding and each year the GNWT makes some kind of increase. Despite our efforts we continue to be short on funds to do things the public and health care providers expect," Premier Stephen Kakfwi said.

Minister of Health and Social Services, Jane Groenewegen adds that money is the big issue but it's not everything. "All the money in the world will not solve the challenges we are faced with today. We also need to change the public's attitude toward their health and the health care system. Federal funding is essential to help us make long-term changes. Changing the public's attitudes and behaviours will not happen overnight, Mrs. Groenewegen said.

When Medicare was first created, it was established on the basis of a 50/50 cost sharing arrangement between the provinces/territories and the federal government. Currently the federal contribution averages 13% of total health costs. Premier Kakfwi is confident that Understanding *Canada's Health Care Costs*, *An Interim Report* will help change the situation. The report has been released to support the Provincial and Territorial Premier's request for full and immediate restoration of \$4.2 billion to the base funding of the Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) and the implementation of an annual escalator for the CHST.

GNWT will respect Decision of Supreme Court

YELLOWKNIFE (June 15) – Justice Minister Jim Antoine says the Government of the Northwest Territories will take time to analyze this morning's decision by the Supreme Court of Canada to uphold the validity of the new federal Firearms Act.

A reference question was brought to the Supreme Court by the Province of Alberta, which asked for a ruling on whether the licensing and registration provision of the Firearms Act was outside federal jurisdiction. Several provinces and territories, including the NWT, joined Alberta as intervenors in the case.

"We participated in this case because we understood the concerns of many northern people about the way the federal legislation would affect their lives," Mr. Antoine said. "We have pursued this question to the highest court in Canada and we must respect that court's decision."

"This is a complex issue and we know there are many strong opinions on firearms legislation both in the North and throughout Canada," Mr. Antoine said. "We will now take the time necessary to analyze the full effect of the court's decision before deciding what, if anything, can be done. I will, of course, be very interested to hear the views of my colleagues from other jurisdictions that took part in this court case."

The Government of the Northwest Territories is not participating in the administration of the Firearms Act. The federal government administers the gun licensing and registration program in the NWT.

NWT Finance Minister Presents Optimistic Budget

YELLOWKNIFE (June 20) -- Finance Minister Joseph Handley said he's optimistic that the future of the Northwest Territories will bring increased opportunities for residents of the NWT. He presented his first budget to the NWT Legislative Assembly this afternoon.

"These are exciting times for the people of the Northwest Territories. We are on the brink of substantial development of our territory's immense resource potential."

Today's budget supports the vision of a prosperous future identified by the Legislative Assembly in the document *Towards a Better Tomorrow*. Mr. Handley warned, however, that the GNWT is limited in the amount of new resources it can commit to the vision.

"Given our fiscal position, the fact that we are able to maintain the service levels we currently enjoy is an achievement worth noting," he said. "We are maintaining the levels of services provided to northerners and investing where we can to provide maximum returns on the future – both for our people and our economy."

For the second time in the short life of the post-division NWT, revenue growth is not expected to keep pace with the growth in demands for government programs and services as the \$764 million in budgeted expenditures exceed revenues by \$12 million.

The government is conducting a number of reviews to identify possible areas of savings but the Finance Minister ruled out major cuts to programs as the solution to the NWT's fiscal problems. "Making cuts to essential services will likely cost us much more in the future in terms of health and social problems," he said. Mr. Handley warned all residents of the NWT that they must be realistic in their expectations of what the GNWT can afford to do.

Despite these challenges, Mr. Handley noted there are opportunities as well. Oil, natural gas and diamonds have made the NWT the focus of national and international attention and the possibility of a Mackenzie Valley natural gas pipeline is very real.

The Budget identifies a number of initiatives the government is taking to respond to and prepare for resource development, including community planning, highway construction and employment training.

Mr. Handley was clear, however, that the GNWT alone does not have the fiscal resources to make the investments that are needed if both northerners and Canadians are to reap the maximum benefits from the

development of its resources. NWT developments could yield as much as \$90 billion in royalties and taxes over the next thirty years - most of which will flow to the federal government.

"We are hopeful that the federal government will make the required level of commitment and invest in a bright future for the Northwest Territories," Mr. Handley said.

Mr. Handley stressed the need for a timely resolution on the issue of devolution – the transfer of control of northern resources and royalties to northern governments. He noted that the Intergovernmental Forum, bringing together territorial, federal and Aboriginal governments, is an important process for dialogue on this issue.

Today's budget introduced one new tax for the NWT, a five per cent tax on hotel occupancy effective April 1, 2001 in order to provide revenues needed to promote the NWT as a tourist destination and to develop attractions. The tourism industry is a sector whose potential has barely been tapped. The tax is expected to generate \$1 million in annual revenues.

NORTHWEST TERRITORIES 2000-2001 BUDGET HIGHLIGHTS

Fiscal Overview

- The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) expects that its share of the closing March 31, 1999, pre-division surplus will be \$21 million.
- The \$34 million budgetary deficit anticipated for 1999-2000 will eliminate this positive starting balance and place the GNWT in a small accumulated deficit position as of March 31, 2000.
- Beginning in fiscal 2000-2001, the GNWT is making a significant change in its budgeting and accounting policies. It will now report the value and accumulated depreciation of its capital assets, such as schools, hospitals and highways. Previously, the value of these assets was not reported in the GNWT's books. This change responds to calls by the accounting profession for governments across Canada to amend their accounting practices.
- The 2000-2001 Budget anticipates operating expenditures of \$763.6 million. Total revenues are estimated to be \$751.3 million, representing an expected operating deficit of \$12.3 million. When this operating deficit, and the undepreciated value of the GNWT's investment in capital assets, which is \$845.5 million, are taken into account, the GNWT expects an accumulated surplus of \$843 million for March 31, 2001.
- The GNWT continues to face deficits because revenue growth is not keeping pace with the growth in demands on the government's programs and services. The Budget avoids cuts to programs or to the public service. However, in order to identify possible areas for savings the GNWT has committed to conducting both a broad review of programs as well as specific reviews in areas such as government purchasing, subsidies and energy use.

Improving Social Wellbeing

- Ongoing investments in key social programs such as education, health care, social services and housing are essential to addressing the NWT's serious social challenges. Recognizing that cuts to these programs will likely result in higher future costs, the Budget contains measures to maintain service levels in the face of rising demand:
 - o \$5 million to respond to the growing needs of the NWT population for health care;
 - o \$3 million to respond to the projected growth in school enrolment and income assistance demands.
- In addition, strategic initiatives have been made in a number of key areas:
 - o \$1.6 million to decrease the pupil-teacher ratio in NWT schools;
 - o An additional \$210,000 for the Healthy Children Initiative, the aim of which is to give children as healthy as possible a start in life; and

o \$4.8 million, financed by additional Canada Health & Social Transfers, to be allocated by the Department of Health & Social Services for the implementation of primary health care models.

Better Governance Through Partnerships

• The GNWT has committed to fund one-third of the costs of the Intergovernmental Forum. The Intergovernmental Forum brings together territorial, federal and Aboriginal governments to discuss issues that are territorial in scope, and will provide a process for ongoing discussions on key issues such as devolution and resource revenue sharing.

A Vibrant Northern Economy

- The Budget includes a number of initiatives to respond to ongoing and future development of the Northwest Territories' resources:
 - o \$700,000 to help communities prepare for oil and gas development, including economic development, employment and business planning, environmental and socio-economic monitoring, and investigation of opportunities for value-added industries;
 - o Almost \$10 million to keep pace with the heavier industrial traffic on the NWT's highway system;
 - o \$1.3 million to promote employment in the oil and gas industries; and
 - o \$1 million to target youth employment.
- In order to provide resources to invest in the tourism sector, the Budget proposes the adoption, effective April 1, 2001, of a 5 per cent tax on hotel occupancy. The tax is expected to generate about \$1 million in annual revenues.

Becoming More Self-Reliant

- Growing demands on social programs and the pressures created by resource development will place great strains on the GNWT's fiscal capacity.
- New resource development in the NWT has the potential to provide as much as \$90 billion in royalties and tax revenues for government over the life of the developments. Under current fiscal arrangements, most of these revenues will flow to the federal government.
- Funds from resource development have the potential to help finance needed investments in infrastructure and growing costs in the social area.
- Devolution of both control over development and the revenue from natural resources to northern governments could turn the NWT into a "have" territory over the course of the next ten years.



Report Concludes GNWT does not have Jurisdiction to Regulate Yellowknife Houseboats

YELLOWKNIFE (June 21) -- A report prepared by the Department of Municipal and Community Affairs has concluded that the Government of the Northwest Territories does not have the authority to regulate activity on waters within municipal boundaries.

The report was completed to help clarify questions, of municipal jurisdiction over activities on water, raised by the City of Yellowknife's efforts to regulate houseboat developments on Yellowknife Bay. Copies of the report have been provided to the City of Yellowknife, all houseboat owners and the Yellowknives Dene First Nation.

The report found that the Government of Canada is currently responsible for the administration and control of waterbeds and activities on water in the Northwest Territories. Existing federal and territorial legislation does not provide the GNWT with authority to regulate these activities.

GNWT authority to regulate activities on water may be established, but would first require the federal government to transfer administration and control of waterbeds within municipal boundaries to the GNWT. Discussions between the GNWT and the federal government indicate that this transfer will not be possible without the support of the appropriate aboriginal groups.

If GNWT jurisdiction were established by the transfer of administration and control of the waterbeds from the Government of Canada, legislative changes would be required to explicitly establish municipal authorities in this area. This would require the GNWT to prepare amendments to 14 pieces of existing GNWT legislation. As any changes to GNWT legislation would have territorial-wide effect, extensive consultation would have to be undertaken before any legislative changes were introduced. This process would require considerable time and effort on the part of the GNWT.

The report concludes that due to the time and expense necessary to conduct extensive consultations with aboriginal groups, the federal government and other parties to seek the transfer of federal authority, further action on the part of the GNWT in this matter would be inappropriate at this time.

Kakfwi Delivers Sessional Statement - Government is Building Momentum

YELLOWKNIFE (June 21) -- Premier Kakfwi says the first four months of his government have been about building relationships and earning trust. In his Sessional Statement to the 3^{rd} session of the 14^{th} assembly this afternoon, he told his colleagues that their vision of a better tomorrow is gaining momentum.

"Businesses and institutions outside of the NWT, which are in a position to help us realize our dreams, are sitting up and taking notice of the things we are saying," he said. "They are beginning to share our excitement about the prospects for development in the Northwest Territories - not only of our nonrenewable resources, but of our local businesses, our tourism industry, our people, their skills and abilities.

Mr. Kakfwi spoke of the momentum of support building within Federal, Aboriginal and Community governments but acknowledged that initiatives such as the intergovernmental forum were fragile and, to flourish would need goodwill and a spirit of co-operation. "I would ask for support and patience from each of you. Please recognize that we are working hard to overcome the obstacles that have divided us in the past, in order to forge a new and stronger bond," Mr. Kakfwi said.

Emphasizing the Government's position that building strong partnerships with Aboriginal governments is fundamental for the GNWT, Mr Kakfwi praised recent steps towards the settlement of outstanding land claims and self-government agreements – a long standing goal of the GNWT. "Achieving this goal will represent a tangible confirmation of the rights of Aboriginal people to self-government and to secure tenure over lands that they have occupied for centuries," he said.

The Premier also outlined many of the initiatives of individual Ministers which have helped to build momentum in business and industry, the social agenda and national and international affairs; and he called, once again on the federal government to respond quickly and decisively to the GNWT's Non-renewable Resource Strategy.

"Immediate investment is needed," he said, "if the opportunities offered by economic development are to be maximized for the benefit of NWT residents. With every day that passes we find new opportunities to benefit from this development. As a proactive government, we cannot afford to wait."

Economic Strategy Panel Delivers 'Common Ground'

YELLOWKNIFE (June 26) -- The Government's Economic Strategy Panel has formally delivered their report to the Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development, Joe Handley.

Co-chairs Richard Nerysoo and Darrell Beaulieu today signed, then delivered, their document titled 'Common Ground' in a short ceremony in the Legislative Assembly's Great Hall.

Mr. Handley thanked the panel for their hard work which will provide a comprehensive approach to economic priorities and actions needed to guide the government's future economic development. "After additional input from the public, 'Common Ground' will form the basis of an economic action plan for the recommendations directed to the Government of the Northwest Territories," he said.

The panel, appointed last June by then RWED Minister, Stephen Kakfwi, represents a broad cross section of northern organizations with an interest in the economic development of the North. The report reflects not just industry and sector associations' concerns, but those of Aboriginal governments as well as communities and organizations dealing with environmental and social issues.

The panel's work has already formed the basis for the draft Non-renewable Resource Development Strategy. Mr. Handley says he will continue to work with panel members to review progress made on their recommendations.

Commercial Vehicles on NWT Highways Safest in Canada

YELLOWKNIFE (June 28) – The percentage of NWT commercial vehicles that passed safety inspections in a recent inspection blitz was the highest in the country Vince Steen, Minister of Transportation announced today.

Only ten per cent of trucks checked from June 6-8, 2000 had safety defects serious enough to require towing or immediate repair compared to the Canadian average of 23 per cent. The 72-hour random-safety inspection of trucks and drivers known as Roadcheck 2000 was conducted across North America. Eighty-seven trucks were inspected in Yellowknife, Inuvik and Enterprise. Nine vehicles and two drivers were removed from the highway until major defects were corrected. Sixteen charges and ten written warnings were issued.

"The carriers that operate on NWT highways continue to have some of the best quality drivers and vehicles in the country," Mr. Steen said. "Long distances, remote locations and an unforgiving climate are all factors that demand the very best from our trucking industry. The Department will continue to concentrate on inspections to ensure that acceptable levels of safety are maintained."

The annual Roadcheck Program serves as a report card on trucking-industry compliance across North America. During the last six years, the program results for the NWT have show steady improvement from the pass rate of 62 per cent in 1995 to 90 per cent achieved during the most- recent inspection. The NWT's average pass rate of just over 80 per cent over that time is higher than the Canadian average of 73 per cent.

Minister says Highway #3 is Safe

YELLOWKNIFE (July 7) – The Minister of Transportation says Highway #3 is safe. Responding to concerns raised in the Legislative Assembly this week, that portions of the Highway are too narrow to allow transport trucks to pass, Vince Steen today told his colleagues, "It is simply not true."

Mr. Steen reassured his colleagues that the full distance of Highway #3 is wide enough to accommodate passing transport trucks. "For two trucks carrying over-dimensional wide loads to pass, they need a minimum travelling surface of 6.4 metres. There is no point along the road narrower than eight metres wide. The average width is 10 metres," he said. "Newly constructed sections of Highway #3 are built to a standard width of 11 metres."

The Department of Transportation ensures that all NWT highways meet national engineering safety standards.

Mr. Steen told his colleagues however, that the Department of Transportation's Highway Patrol Officer reports far too many private passenger vehicles routinely travel in excess of the posted maximum. "Highway #3 is safe at the posted maximum speed limit of 90 kilometres an hour," he said.

Minister Announces Next Phase in Highway Construction

YELLOWKNIFE (August 4) -- Minister of Transportation, Vince Steen announced today that the re-construction of an additional 15.5 km of Highway #3 between Rae and Yellowknife has been awarded to Pelly Construction Ltd. and their northern partners.

Construction on this next phase beginning at the Stagg River bridge and proceeding towards Yellowknife is expected to begin this summer with completion scheduled for September 2001.

This contract is the third in a series of contracts that will lead to the eventual reconstruction of Highway #3 from its junction with Highway #1 near Fort Providence to its junction with Highway #4 near Yellowknife. To date, 12.5 kilometres near Rae/Edzo and 4.5 kilometres near Yellowknife have been completed. Once this contract is complete, the gravel portion of Highway #3 will be reduced to 58 kilometres.

The Department of Transportation reminds motorists to adjust their speed as posted through the construction zone and in accordance with road conditions on the remaining gravel sections. Speed limits through the construction zone and on the remaining gravel portion of Highway #3 will be strictly enforced.

New Plan Introduced for Yellowknife Family Physicians

Yellowknife (August 08) — A new agreement will change how Yellowknife physicians are compensated for the services they provide, and give them clearer terms of service for their practices. The Minister of Health and Social Services, Yellowknife physicians and the Yellowknife Health and Social Services Board introduced the plan in a joint news conference this afternoon.

Under the new plan, physicians will be offered employment on a contract basis with the Yellowknife Health and Social Services Board. Current physicians will have the option of continuing to be compensated on a fee-for-service basis or selecting the contract arrangement. The Yellowknife Health and Social Services Board will also assume ownership of the four clinics and employees of the clinics will become employees of the board.

Today's announcement is an important step toward implementing a new model for primary health care. With the transfer of administrative responsibilities for the clinics to the board, physicians will be better able to concentrate their time on their patients. In addition, physicians will have greater opportunities to work with nurse practitioners, mental health workers and social workers.

The new plan also addresses, in part, the severe shortage of general practitioners in the city. With the new contract payment method, the board expects to be more competitive in recruiting physicians.

Minister of Health and Social Services Jane Groenewegen, said she's pleased with the plan developed by the board and physicians. "I believe we will now be in a better position to compete nationally for the limited pool of doctors in the country," Mrs Groenewegen said. "I want to assure the people of Yellowknife and northerners that the quality and responsiveness of our health care system is a priority of this government. Our efforts to recruit and retain physicians will be enhanced by the plans announced today.

"These initiatives represent an important step toward stabilizing the current general practice physician workforce, as well as moving toward a competitive recruitment and retention strategy for Yellowknife," said Dr. David Butcher, speaking on behalf of Yellowknife physicians. "We do not anticipate any immediate change for the public in their access to their family doctors, but we hope we'll be able to attract more family doctors to Yellowknife under this plan."

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GNWT to Attend Jewellery World Expo in Toronto

YELLOWKNIFE (August 9) – Staff from the Department of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED) will attend the Jewellery World Expo in Toronto August 13-15th to promote NWT diamonds and raise awareness of the GNWT's new diamond certification program.

The GNWT has been working with stakeholders to develop a program to certify selected diamonds that are mined, cut and polished in the NWT. The monitoring system will follow diamonds from the producer through to the factory.

"This certification system guaranteeing the origin of NWT diamonds is on the leading edge of the diamond industry," says RWED Minister, Joseph L Handley. "No other region in the world is putting such a program in place".

Participation by the northern manufacturers will be voluntary, along with diamonds they choose to have certified. To date, two northern manufacturers have agreed to participate. "The GNWT and our participating manufacturers believe that this process will increase the growing demand for high quality NWT diamonds," Mr. Handley said.

A government seal with the GNWT's official polar bear logo will adorn the new certificate. The certificate will state that the accompanying diamond has met standards outlined by the GNWT Certification Program and will include the diamond's Gemprint image. A Gemprint image is similar to a fingerprint, as each diamond has its own distinctive characteristics. These details will provide yet another level of authenticity for the consumer. Northern manufacturers may choose to put their own mark or logo on their diamonds as a marketing tool.

The GNWT, along with Deton'cho Diamonds and Arslanian Cutting Works are working to have the Certification Program in place by the late fall. They will share a booth at the Jewellery World Expo to provide details and information on the certification process to the international jewellery industry.

Department of Transportation introduces General Identification Card

YELLOWKNIFE (August 10) – The Government of the Northwest Territories has introduced a General Identification Card (GIC) for residents of the Northwest Territories.

Beginning September 5th, residents who have reached the age of 14 and meet current motor-vehicle identity requirements will be able to apply for a GIC. Identification Cards will cost \$25.00, plus the applicable agent's fee, and will be valid for five years.

The new identification cards will be provided through the Department of Transportation. "For them, the GIC will be an official means of providing identification and proof of age in the Northwest Territories."

The Department of Health & Social Services and the Northwest Territories Liquor Licensing Board are also partners in the project. Once incorporated, the General Identification Card will be the officially recognized ID for the purchase of alcohol and tobacco products in the NWT.

Premiers secure national support for Northern priorities

WINNIPEG, Manitoba (August 12, 2000) – Canada's Northern Premiers received strong support from their southern colleagues on a number of initiatives during the Annual Premiers' Conference, which wrapped up in Winnipeg late Friday night.

Nunavut Premier Paul Okalik, Northwest Territories Premier Stephen Kakfwi and Yukon Premier Pat Duncan met prior to the Annual Premiers' Conference to review the APC agenda and discuss issues of common concern. Premiers agreed that health, northern economic development and infrastructure would be a key part of their discussions with Canadian Premiers.

Premiers discussed the state of health care systems in Canada and agreed to a plan that would ensure access to care, prevention of disease, improvements to health services, availability of doctors and nurses, better home and community care, and affordable drivers. Premiers are committed to ongoing investment in health infrastructure and new technologies. They emphasized the need for the federal government to work with the provinces, territories, and aboriginal peoples to improve the delivery of health care and services to aboriginal peoples. Premiers called on the federal government to restore health funding immediately.

"Unless the North is able to access increased funding for the health care system, we will continue to find ourselves lagging behind other Canadians," Premier Paul Okalik said. "In Nunavut we have been innovative in restructuring our health care system and we urge the federal government to recognize this and respond favorably."

Premier Kakfwi led the discussion on Northern Economic Development Strategy and Devolution. He acknowledged the continued support of Premiers for devolution of resource jurisdiction and revenues to northern governments. As importantly, Premiers expressed support for federal economic development assistance and promotion of strategic private sector investments to promote strong northern economies.

"The key to economic self-sufficiency for all territories is to maximize economic benefits now," Premier Kakfwi said. "In the Northwest Territories our vision is to create a vibrant, robust economy that will enable the NWT to be a 'have' territory."

Premier Pat Duncan led the Northern Premiers' call for specific, baseline infrastructure funding for the territories. Premier Duncan said the recently announced federal infrastructure program does not meet Northern needs. Premiers acknowledged the challenges faced by the North and agreed that special consideration should be made for the territories in meeting their infrastructure and transportation requirements.

"The population of the North is small compared to the rest of Canada; the infrastructure needs are great," Premier Duncan said. "In addressing the issue of funding allocation, our colleagues have continually stressed that funding must take into account the pressing infrastructure needs of remote and sparsely populated areas."

Premiers also agreed to pursue discussions with the federal government in the areas of early childhood development, airline restructuring, post-secondary education and skills development.

Archives Project Preserves NWT Culture and Language

YELLOWKNIFE (August 22) – A joint project to preserve the political and cultural history of the Northwest Territories as seen through the eyes of Canada's public broadcaster has been completed by the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre and CBC North.

The collection of over 1,000 audio and video recordings, dating back to 1952, is now housed in the NWT archives at the Heritage Centre in Yellowknife. The locally produced programs, production tapes and audio and video footage feature prominent politicians and other well-known northerners talking about land claims, aboriginal self-government, mineral exploration, wildlife management and politics.

Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jake Ootes says the collection is an important component of recorded history of both the Northwest Territories and Nunavut. "Even though the NWT is a relatively new jurisdiction, it is rich in history," he said. "Many people can still remember when Joe Tobie made the first radio broadcast in a Dene language in 1969. Events of that type played a significant role in the rapid political change that has taken place in the last 50 years."

To facilitate public access, the materials, have been divided into four series: radio, television, administration and project and special events. In most cases, individual programs are catalogued and described item by item. Over 1000 CBC radio recordings, already housed in the archives, were also transferred from audiotape to compact disc to ensure the quality of the recordings was preserved.

CBC Radio has broadcast in Aboriginal languages in the NWT since the first Inuvialuktun radio program aired in 1960. CBC-TV debuted in the North in 1979. Both have captured and documented the diversity of languages spoken by Aboriginal northerners in their interviews and programming. Much of what has been recorded and is now preserved for future generations is the traditional knowledge of elders who spent their lives on the land, and experienced first-hand, the culture of their ancestors.

"Joining forces in this way permits both the GNWT and the CBC to fulfil their mandates of preserving and promoting culture and language," says Cathie Bolstad, Director of Television for CBC North, "Housing the collection in a public institution makes the richness of our heritage accessible to everyone."

New Inuvik Hospital Underway

YELLOWKNIFE (August 23) -- Minister of Health and Social Services, Jane Groenewegen today announced the \$37 million replacement for the current Inuvik Regional Hospital will go ahead. The project includes \$3 million in start-up work to be carried out this year.

The project, anticipated to be ready for occupancy in 2003, will include a transient centre, acute care beds, continuing care beds, and emergency health services.

"I am pleased that we are able to proceed with this important project," Mrs. Groenewegen said. "It provides the Beaufort-Delta with a modern infrastructure necessary to effectively serve regional residents and projected increases to regional industry. The GNWT is committed to this project. It is a critical component in ensuring that northerners continue to receive quality health care that is comparable to the rest of Canada."

In 1997 and 1998, the Inuvik Regional Health and Social Services Board, in conjunction with department staff, undertook studies to define current and projected needs for a regional facility and the ability of the existing facility to meet those needs. These studies determined that the most cost efficient alternative was to replace the existing structure built in 1957.

"I am pleased that the construction of this capital project is going ahead," Board Chair, Nellie Cournoyea said. "The Inuvik Regional Health and Social Services Board will work closely in partnership with the Department of Health and Social Services and all other involved players in order to make this project a reality."

Work will begin soon on the development of design options.

In Yellowknife, students can pick up their letters in the lobby of the Lahm Ridge Tower until 5:00 pm today or between 9 am and noon on Saturday. Outside of Yellowknife, students will receive their letters via courier.

"Many students have, however, already been notified and have begun their fall studies or are making arrangements to travel to school, rent apartments and pay their tuitions." Mr Ootes noted.

The improved Student Financial Assistance Program now provides increased financial support to all eligible post-secondary students. Mr. Ootes says he's pleased with the continued strong interest in post-secondary education. "Getting a good education is a key to a successful career," he said.

Proponents to Withdraw from Bidding Process in Hay River

YELLOWKNIFE (Sept 05) -- The Government of the Northwest Territories has requested both Northland Utilities Ltd and the Northwest Territories Power Commission withdraw their proposals for the provision of power in Hay River.

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Premier to attend First Ministers' Meeting

YELLOWKNIFE (Sept 08) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi will travel to Ottawa this weekend to discuss with the Prime Minister and first Ministers the restoration of federal health funding to provinces and territories.

The Premier and his colleagues will also discuss health innovation and renewal, early childhood development and infrastructure programs.

Premier Kakfwi is concerned about the basis on which funding will be distributed. "If funding is based on per-capita allocation, it will not offer the same degree of benefits to northerners as will be enjoyed by other Canadians," he says. "The cost of delivering health care in the North to a growing population in small isolated communities cannot be met when funding is allocated solely on the basis of population."

For every \$1 billion of health funding transferred by the federal government to provinces and territories under a per-capita agreement, the NWT receives only \$1.36 million. "Forced growth in our health service system alone is costing the GNWT \$11 million a year - and that doesn't begin to include money for social programs," the Premier says.

Mr. Kakfwi supports the Premiers' call for the full restoration of the Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) with an appropriate escalator but he says he wants to work with his counterparts to find a solution that will also meet the needs of northern governments. He says one such solution could be a minimum funding threshold for smaller jurisdictions like the NWT.

"My provincial colleagues have publicly recognized the need for special consideration for the territories and remote communities in areas such as transportation and infrastructure," Premier Kakfwi says. "Similar consideration will have to be given to health care and early childhood development."

Mr. Kakfwi has expressed his concerns and suggestions in a letter to the Prime Minister.

Speed Limit Reduced on Highway #3

YELLOWKNIFE (Sept 15) -- Effective Monday (September 18, 2000), the speed limit for all vehicles travelling Highway #3 between Stagg River and Yellowknife will be reduced to 80 kilometres per hour.

Minister of Transportation, Vince Steen says the change reflects an increase in the volume of traffic on Highway #3 over the past three years and continued public concern regarding the behaviour of drivers travelling the 75-km of unpaved highway between Stagg River and Yellowknife.

Mr Steen says he's confident that reducing the posted speed limit will encourage drivers to slow down on the unpaved portion of the highway and reduce wear and tear on the highway itself.

A traffic survey conducted by the Department of Transportation this summer indicated that approximately half of all drivers on the highway travelled in excess of the current posted limit of 90 kilometres per hour. "Increased traffic and excessive speed have a detrimental affect on road conditions," Mr. Steen noted.

Alberta and Northwest Territories meet on Memorandum of **Understanding for Co-operation and Development**

EDMONTON — The first meeting of the Steering Committee for the Northwest Territories-Alberta Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) for Co-operation and Development was chaired today by Mike Cardinal, Alberta Minister of Resource Development and Vince Steen, Northwest Territories Minister of Public Works & Services and Transportation. The 1998 MOU is a broad agreement that provides an overarching framework for co-operative initiatives between the two jurisdictions.

"Today's meetings are an important first step in advancing additional partnerships between our jurisdictions. Mr. Steen and I discussed resource development activity in the north, transportation, trade, tourism and training. We have challenges which are unique to the north, and we have learned that co-operation will help us overcome those challenges," said Cardinal.

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NWT Premier says Gas Pipeline Should Benefit Canadians

CALGARY (Sept 20) – NWT Premier, Stephen Kakfwi says Canadians should not be content with simply being a corridor to move Alaskan gas to American markets.

Proven and potential gas reserves in the NWT mean a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline would be one of Canada's biggest energy developments. But, the Premier warns, the billions of dollars it represents will not flow into government coffers and local cash registers if Canadian oil and gas remains in the ground.

"Clearly, the reserves that would be accessed by the Mackenzie Valley Pipeline have the potential to establish the NWT as a "have territory" and keep Canada in the forefront of the continental gas market," he said.

The Premier told government, industry and First Nation representatives attending an oil and gas conference in Calgary that the Mackenzie Valley Pipeline is the only pipeline proposal that will allow for the development of Canadian oil and gas resources.

"I want to emphasize that we are talking about Canadian gas with the potential to generate royalties for the federal government and spin-off revenues for the provinces and territories – Canadian reserves that will create nation-wide business opportunities and thousands of jobs for Canadians, across this country," he said.

Industry estimates indicate the construction of the more-economical Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline with an offshore link to Prudhoe Bay will yield \$2 billion in wages and \$4 billion in purchases - most of which will be spent outside of the NWT.

The NWT Premier assured industry representatives, in particular, that any short-term challenges posed by aboriginal interests and environmental and regulatory processes are far outweighed by the benefits a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline will offer to Canadians.

Study Confirms Mackenzie Valley Pipeline as Best Route for Canadians

YELLOWKNIFE (October 6) -- A study by the Canadian Energy Research Institute (CERI) confirms the GNWT position that a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline, accessing both Mackenzie Delta and Prudhoe Bay gas reserves, is not only the least expensive transportation route for Canadian and American producers but will also provide the greatest fiscal benefits for Canadians.

The study, "A comparison of Natural Gas Pipeline Options for the North," was released today by GNWT Finance Minister Joe Handley. It shows projected Canadian tax and royalty revenues from a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline route exceed those of the ANGTS and Dempster Lateral route by \$3 billion dollars. The revenues to Canadian producers from the Mackenzie Valley route are \$5 billion greater than the ANGTS/Dempster alternative.

"The Mackenzie Valley route clearly provides more benefits to Canadians," Mr. Handley said.

The study compares and analyzes alternatives for transporting natural gas from the Mackenzie Delta and Beaufort Sea to the south and considers the impact of transporting Alaska's Prudhoe Bay gas on the economics of transporting Canadian gas.

"Without a pipeline from the Mackenzie Delta, Canadian producers have no means to bring Canadian gas to market," Mr. Handley said. "The lower cost of a Mackenzie Valley route also benefits American oil and gas interests. Clearly, the route that costs the least, poses the fewest environmental challenges and presents the greatest potential for ongoing discoveries is the best choice."

Four pipeline options are examined by the study: a stand alone Mackenzie Valley pipeline, the Mackenzie Valley pipeline with an off shore link to Prudhoe Bay; the Alaska Natural Gas Transmission System (ANGTS) route; and a combination of ANGTS and Dempster highway lateral.

The Canadian Energy Research Institute is an independent non-profit research institute based in Calgary. It specializes in the analysis of energy economics and related environmental policy issues. Federal Budget Good News for Taxpayers

YELLOWKNIFE (Oct 19) -- Finance Minister, Joseph Handley says yesterday's federal minibudget is good news for northern taxpayers. The Economic Statement presented Wednesday by federal Finance Minister Paul Martin contains an additional \$42 billion in tax reductions over four years, beyond those announced in his February budget.

Most of the reductions in yesterday's announcement are targeted at individuals. Mr Handley notes reductions in personal income tax will benefit NWT residents by reducing overall federal and territorial income tax burdens. "I am pleased to see measures targeting students, working parents, and low income families," Mr. Handley said.

By 2001, a single-income family earning \$40,000 in the NWT will pay \$1100 less in federal tax and \$495 less in territorial tax compared to 1999.

Mr. Handley says that although the fuel tax credit for low-income earners is particularly welcome in the NWT, there are better ways for the federal finance minister to address high fuel prices in Canada. "The federal government needs to make investments to promote frontier gas development," he said. "This is the long-term solution to high energy costs. Federal investment is needed to ensure Canadians, and northerners in particular, realize the benefits from all resource development."

Yesterday's Economic Statement also proposes the introduction of a temporary 15 per cent tax credit aimed at encouraging mineral exploration. "This tax measure is encouraging," Mr. Handley said, "we will be looking for more details on the proposal to see how it will affect northern mining exploration."

GNWT Clarifies Facts Regarding Power Corporation Announcement to Employees

YELLOWKNIFE (Oct 19) -- In an effort to respond to concerns raised as a result of this week's announcement by the Power Corporation to its employees, the GNWT is clarifying the facts regarding the recently initiated review of the Power Corporation.

In a memo to staff this week, the NWT Power Corporation advised that the Board is deferring any decisions regarding layoffs arising from division-related downsizing of the Power Corporation. These decisions, that were expected to be announced on October 18, will be deferred until the GNWT has completed its "Review of Electrical Power Generation, Distribution and Regulation in the Northwest Territories."

The Board's commitment to defer these decisions comes as a result of direction given by the GNWT Cabinet that no final decision can be reached until the comprehensive examination and analysis of the role and mandate of the NWT Power Corporation is completed.

"The outcome of this study has not been predetermined," said the Honourable Joe Handley, Minister of Finance." The range of outcomes and their implications for the structure of the Power Corporation is broad. We need to look closely at the findings before we can reach decisions about issues as important as staffing."

"While the Board has acted prudently in dealing with the impacts of division of the NWT Power Corporation," said the Honourable Jake Ootes, Minister Responsible for the NWT Power Corporation, "they do not have all of the facts needed to reach a final conclusion regarding the Power Corporation's future staffing requirements. It is important to recognize that it is not the announcement of layoffs, but the decision about layoffs which is being put on hold until the study is completed."

The study is expected to be completed by November 30, 2000 and will be followed by a period of consultation and analysis.

Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre Acquires Unique Artifact

YELLOWKNIFE (Oct 26) – The Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre has acquired a unique and important artifact dating back to the early days of the fur trade in the Northwest Territories.

The "Yellow Knife Fort" (Fort des Couteaux Jaunes) journal - kept by Jean Steinbruck, an employee of the North West Company, during the winter of 1802/03 while he stationed at the fort on the South shore of Great Slave Lake, not far from present day Hay River.

Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes says "The Yellow Knife Journal" written in French on birch bark, is a reminder of the importance of the North West Company in the history of Canada's North.

"It is also important to note that the journal was recorded in French, the language of commerce for the North West Company and the language of Steinbruck's fellow voyageurs," he said. "It serves as a reminder of the Francophone legacy in the NWT fur trade."

The "Yellow Knife Fort Journal" was purchased earlier this year by the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre with financial assistance from BHP Diamonds Inc., Diamet Minerals Ltd., The McLean Foundation and the Department of Canadian Heritage through the Canada-NWT Cooperation Agreement for French and Aboriginal Languages in the NWT.

Father Rene Fumoleau will officially open an exhibit featuring the Yellow Knife Fort Journal on Sunday, October 29, 2000. The ceremony will begin another season of Amazing Family Sundays planned for this fall at the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre in Yellowknife.

A book by Henry Duckworth, *The Yellowknife Journal*, published by Nuage Editions last year, reproduces the text of the journal in its original version with an English translation.

Women and Children's Healing and Recovery Program Launched

YELLOWKNIFE (November 1) -- Minister of Health and Social Services, Jane Groenewegen, in co-operation with a number of key partners, today announced the launch of the Women and Children's Healing and Recovery Program.

The program, which began accepting clients in late September, provides a holistic approach to supporting the healing and empowerment of northern women who have experienced trauma. Trauma includes any major event in a woman's life, such as physical, sexual and emotional abuse, which makes her feel powerless or afraid.

"This program is an exciting step forward in developing responsive programming through partnerships," Mrs. Groenewegen said. "It is clearly a model we want to encourage in other regions."

The program recognizes and builds on the strengths of participants, and responds to their individual needs and issues. It was developed in an effort to overcome barriers women experience in seeking treatment and support, like access to childcare and discussing gender-sensitive issues like sexual and physical abuse in a more supportive setting.

The YWCA in partnership with the Yellowknife Women's Centre sponsors the pilot project, supported by the Department of Health and Social Services and the Yellowknife Health and Social Services Board. It is the result of a strong commitment and co-operative effort between government and non-government agencies at the local and territorial levels to improve programming to women.

A governing coalition of the various service providers has been formed to oversee program development and delivery. The coalition is currently chaired by the Status of Women Council. "The Council is pleased to support the program because it involves women, community organizations and government in developing a program that meets the needs of northern women and children in an effective and empowering way," Executive Director, Rosemary Cairns said.

Chair of the Yellowknife Health and Social Services Board, Ruth Spence says collaboration at the local level has been a priority for the board. "The strong holistic approach has brought together key agencies and people with the expertise needed for effective programming," she said.

Partnership agreements have been established between the YWCA and the Yellowknife Women's Centre to share service delivery. "As a result, children of participants will also benefit from the improved wellness and self-esteem their mothers gain from the program," says Lyda Fuller, the Executive Director of Yellowknife's YWCA. She notes that pre-school children of participants will have access to quality, licensed child care.

"In 2001, the program will also examine other ways to support the children of participants through expanded programming," Executive Director of the Yellowknife Women's Centre Arlene Hache adds.

The Healing and Recovery Program is available to women outside of Yellowknife. Housing may be available through the YWCA's Transitional Housing Unit.

Minister Introduces Strategy for NWT Roads

YELLOWKNIFE (Nov 09) - Minister of Transportation, Vince Steen yesterday unveiled his Department's highway strategy for the Northwest Territories.

Titled *Investing in Roads for People and the Economy: a highway strategy for the NWT*, the document presents a "vision" for the future of roads in the north. "As we move into the 21st Century, we must ensure that our transportation system also moves forward," Mr. Steen said. "This document presents a vision for our roads and an action plan to achieve our vision."

The Department of Transportation, using existing resources, has begun several new initiatives including the construction of a winter road to Colville Lake, new bridges on the Mackenzie Valley winter road system and the opening of discussions to obtain greater northern control of the Lupin winter road. It is also actively working on improvements to the existing highway system.

Investing in Roads for People and the Economy supports the government's commitment to improving the NWT's transportation system as outlined in *Towards a Better Tomorrow*, the Economic Strategy Panel's *Common Ground* report and the NWT Non-Renewable Resource Development Strategy.

The Department expects to benefit from the National Infrastructure Program in which the federal government has made a Canada-wide commitment of \$600 million for highway improvements.

"I believe this document will serve as a reliable guide for the work being undertaken by the Department in developing our highway system well into the new century," Mr. Steen said.

GNWT Files Motion Asking Equal Pay Tribunal To Adjourn

YELLOWKNIFE (Nov 10, 2000) -- The Government of the Northwest Territories today filed a Notice of Motion with the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal to adjourn from hearing any further evidence in the equal pay case presently being conducted in Ottawa.

At the beginning of the Tribunal process, the GNWT filed a motion challenging the ability of the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal to conduct an independent and fair hearing. The motion was based on a number of serious flaws the GNWT believes exist in the Tribunal's structure and process. The Tribunal denied the motion and the matter was judicially reviewed by Federal Court Justice Dubé.

Justice Dubé's ruling did not deal with the issue of independence. Instead, Justice Dubé ruled the GNWT lacked sufficient standing to bring the matter before him, because in his opinion, the GNWT was part of the Federal Government. The GNWT is appealing Justice Dubé's ruling.

Recently the Federal Court ruled in another equal pay case, involving Bell Canada, that the Tribunal was not sufficiently independent to provide a fair hearing based on several of the issues also raised by the GNWT. The ruling quashed the Bell Canada Tribunal until the applicable legislation is amended.

As the GNWT had made similar arguments to those presented by Bell, the GNWT requested the Tribunal put the issue of the Bell ruling on the agenda for its next session. The Tribunal responded by requesting the GNWT file a formal Notice of Motion to adjourn until the various legal issues are resolved. The GNWT filed its Motion on Friday November 10, 2000.

The Federal Court of Appeal will likely hear the Dubé appeal in April 2001.

Premier Announces Federal Contribution to GNWT's Non Renewable Resource Strategy

YELLOWKNIFE (Nov 14) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi and Western Arctic MP Hon. Ethel Blondin-Andrew, on behalf of Hon. Robert Nault, today announced \$3.7 million in federal funding for the completion of permanent river crossings along the Mackenzie Highway's winter extension between Wrigley and Fort Good Hope.

Funding for the two-year project, approved by the Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development, comes in response to the GNWT's Non-Renewable Resource Development Strategy (NRRDS) – Towards a Better Tomorrow.

"This funding sends a message to industry that Canada cares about their hopes and their plans to bring frontier resources to southern markets," Mr. Kakfwi said. "And it confirms to the Aboriginal people of the NWT that Canada shares the GNWT's commitment to ensure that benefits from non-renewable resource development in the NWT will not be allowed to pass them by."

The Government of the Northwest Territories will provide an additional \$2 million in funding for this partnership project.

"The Premier and his Ministers have done their homework as requested by Finance Minister Martin and produced the two strategies: the Non-Renewable Resource Strategy and the Common Ground Report. I will continue to work with Minister Martin and Minister Nault to address the need for federal investment dollars to respond to the north's increasing development demands. This announcement is an indication of Minister Nault's sensitivity to the need for a timely response on this particular request due to the short winter road season," said the Hon. Ethel Blondin-Andrew.

The completion of seven permanent bridges on river crossings along the winter road is expected to increase the shipping season to the region from five to eight weeks, or almost 40 percent. The federal funding, allocated primarily to employ Aboriginal workers and contractors, requires a cash or in-kind contribution agreement from northern industry of \$200,000.

Premier Kakfwi says he looks forward to the continued support of the federal government for additional investments in the GNWT's NRRDS strategy. "This signals Canada's commitment to sharing the costs of preparing the NWT for the oil, gas and mining development that is in our mutual best interests," he said.

Premier Kakfwi Comments on Chief of Staff Issue

YELLOWKNIFE (Nov 17) -- Premier Kakfwi today commended the *Yellowknifer* for its apology to Lynda Sorensen and its retraction of false allegations that Ms. Sorensen was violating territorial law by acting as campaign chair for a federal candidate while on leave from her position as Chief of Staff.

"Today's apology and retraction categorically confirm the position I have taken in the House on this issue – that any allegations that the government has broken its own laws or that Ms. Sorensen was in conflict of interest are absolutely false," Premier Kakfwi said.

Ms. Sorensen gave the *Yellowknifer* the opportunity to review her employment contract and seek a legal interpretation confirming that there were no grounds for allegations of conflict of interest.

"I hope that today's editorial demonstrates that the allegations made against Mrs. Sorensen are without grounds," the Premier said.

Premier Kakfwi has been asked repeatedly to table Ms. Sorensen's employment contract in the Legislative Assembly. The attached backgrounder explains that the Premier is not at liberty to provide the document to the House because of process requirements under the *Access to Information and Privacy Act*.

The Premier has made every effort to comply with requests made by regular Members for additional information, while also balancing the government's obligation to prevent the unauthorized disclosure of personal information. Those details of the employment contract that can be released by the Premier were provided today to Accountability and Oversight Committee (AOC) Chairman, Charles Dent, in a letter providing all of the information requested by the AOC.

"I trust that the admission of false allegations in today's editorial, together with the information I have provided to Mr. Dent will bring closure to this issue," Mr. Kakfwi said.

Backgrounder:

Premier Kakfwi Comments on Chief of Staff Issue

Regarding the release of the Chief of Staff's Employment Contract:

- The Chief of Staff has an employment contract with the GNWT.
- The contract *does not* identify specific duties and responsibilities.
- The contract *does* contain *personal information* (for example, pay and benefit information).
- The Access to Information and Protection of Privacy Act establishes the public right to access certain government documents, but the Act also balances this right with the government's obligation to prevent the unauthorized disclosure of personal information.
- The Access Act *requires* government to formally notify an affected person when it is considering the release of a document that contains personal information.
- The Act also establishes the affected person's right to:
 - sufficient time to consider the matter,
 - offer comment on the potential release,
 - be formally notified of government's decision before the release of any information, and
 - appeal government's decision to the Access and Privacy Commissioner.



Premier Re-assigns Cabinet Portfolio

YELLOWKNIFE (Nov 30) – Premier Stephen Kakfwi has appointed Jane Groenewegen as the Minister Responsible for Seniors. Mrs. Groenewegen assumes the portfolio from Vince Steen, MLA for Nunakput, who will continue as Minister of Public Works and Services and Transportation.

"We have found that many of the issues that are of importance to seniors in the NWT relate to the responsibilities already held by Mrs. Groenenwegen in her role as the Minister of Health and Social Services," Premier Kakfwi said. "This change will allow the GNWT to more effectively address the needs of seniors living in the NWT."

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Aboriginal Leaders Meet in Yellowknife

YELLOWKNIFE (Dec 1) -- Aboriginal Summit leaders from across the Northwest Territories met in Yellowknife today with Premier Stephen Kakfwi, Minister of Aboriginal Affairs Jim Antoine and Minister of Finance Joe Handley to discuss how they can work together to ensure future prosperity for the Northwest Territories.

The majority of leaders agreed to begin a formal process to determine how the transfer of authority, currently held by the federal government, over lands and resources will devolve to appropriate territorial and Aboriginal governments.

GNWT Releases Response to Common Ground Strategy

YELLOWKNIFE (Dec 01) -- Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development, Joseph Handley today released *Securing Our Future*: the GNWT's response to recommendations made by the Economic Strategy Panel in its *Common Ground* strategy.

"I am confident that we can address the recommendations identified by the Economic Strategy Panel in the same spirit of co-operation and partnership that embodied the panel itself," Mr. Handley said. "Our goal is to develop a strong and stable economy that benefits all residents of the Northwest Territories."

The reponses identified by the government in today's document cover a wide range of recommendations, not all of which are aimed at the Government of the Northwest Territories. In areas where the lead responsibility is not that of the GNWT, the report indicates actions that the government will take in support of the recommendation.

The Economic Strategy Panel was formed in June 1999 to develop an economic strategy for the Northwest Territories. It tabled the *Common Ground* strategy in the Legislative Assembly in June, 2000 following extensive consultation with interest groups, federal, territorial, provincial and Aboriginal governments.

Key elements of the panel's strategy have already been used in drafting the GNWT's Non-Renewable Resource Development Strategy (NRRDS).

"Common Ground provided a comprehensive and insightful view of the NWT economy, the issues we face and the direction we need to take to address those issues," Mr. Handley said. "It provided the economic focus for our departmental business-planning process and the basis for an action plan aimed at moving our economy forward."

Government Releases Electrical Power Review Report for Consultation

YELLOWKNIFE (Dec. 4) – The GNWT today released the *Report on the Review of Electrical Power Generation, Distribution, Regulation and Subsidization in the NWT.* The review looked at all aspects of electrical power including security of supply, quality and reliability of service, cost of service, affordability of rates, responsiveness to client needs, adaptability and return on investment.

The report was completed under the direction of Finance Minister Joe Handley, NWT Power Corporation Minister Jake Ootes and Public Utilities Board Minister Roger Allen. Mr. Jim Roberston, a long time NWT businessman and former CEO and President of NWT Power Corporation, was chosen to head up a specialized team of utility and energy experts tasked with doing the review.

"The government is pleased with the quality of the report and that it was delivered on time," Mr. Handley said. "Now we can get on with the broader consultation necessary before Cabinet considers the recommendations."

The report and its recommendations are being released to solicit wide input from the public. "We need to determine what people think about the report because this is an issue that affects all residents of the NWT," said Minister Allen. The government will undertake consultation with many groups over the next few months and review all input received.

"The NWT Power Corporation Board of Directors will have an opportunity to discuss the report when they meet in early December," Mr. Ootes said. "This is a detailed report and it will take some time for the Power Corporation Board to digest the contents and provide advice to the government."

The GNWT wants to be in a position to make decisions on the report's recommendations by the end of the fiscal year.

Premier Kakfwi Assumes Responsibility for the NWT Power Corporation

YELLOWKNIFE (Dec. 4) – Premier Stephen Kakfwi will assume the role as Minister Responsible for the NWT Power Corporation, effective 5:00 p.m. today. The Premier takes over this portfolio from Jake Ootes, MLA for Yellowknife Centre, who continues as Minister of Education, Culture and Employment.

The Premier will also take over responsibility for assessment and implementation of the *Report on the Review of Electrical Power Generation, Distribution, Regulation and Subsidization in the NWT*, released earlier today by Minister of Finance, Joe Handley.

"I want to thank Ministers Handley and Ootes for their excellent work in bringing us to the point where we have concrete recommendations to consider on the future of the NWT Power Corporation," Premier Kakfwi said.

The Premier also acknowledged the contribution of Public Utilities Board Minister Roger Allen to this work. He stressed the decision to take on the portfolio is part of his ongoing intention to ensure a fair balance in the workload of his Cabinet Ministers.

"Mr. Handley offered to head up the power generation review at a time when my attention was otherwise occupied. He has ably fulfilled this commitment and it is now time for me to take this high profile work to its next phase," Premier Kakfwi said.

The decision to consolidate ministerial responsibility for the Power Corporation with implementation of the review will enable the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment to focus on various key strategies the department is undertaking related to literacy, early childhood education, languages and employment. The findings of the power generation review have implications for all departments and many key government initiatives.

"Bringing coherence to all aspects of power distribution in the Northwest Territories will require a high degree of interdepartmental coordination within the GNWT that is consistent with my role as Minister responsible for the Executive," Premier Kakfwi said.

GNWT Pleased with CRTC Decision on Communication Services in the NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (Dec 05) -- Minister of Public Works and Services Vince Steen says the CRTC decision on Long Distance Competition and Improved Service for NorthwesTel Customers will go a long way towards improving the provision of telecommunications services to residents of the NWT.

For over two years, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has been actively involved in a series of formal public proceedings to improve the quality of telecommunications services in high cost areas such as the NWT. Part of these proceedings also considered opening Northwestel's long-distance operating area to competition.

Although not all of the GNWT's requests were met by the November 30th CRTC decision, Mr. Steen says he believes that the overall decision is a good one. "In particular," he said, "the GNWT is pleased that the market will be opened to long distance competition in January 2001 and that long distance rates will be improved significantly."

The Minister notes, however, that the decision has also raised concerns regarding the total level of investment in system improvements, the timeframe for introduction of toll-free internet access for communities, and the availability of features such as call display and voicemail. It is hoped that these issues will be resolved as more details of the decision become available.

The GNWT plans to actively participate in all reviews and proceedings established to monitor the implementation of Northwestel's System Improvement Plan.

First Diamonds Receive GNWT Certification

YELLOWKNIFE (Dec 06) -- The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has certified the first diamonds under its program to certify diamonds as mined, cut and polished in the Northwest Territories. These certified CANADIAN ARCTIC TM diamonds, which must also meet a minimum standard of cut established by the NWT diamond industry, are from Deton'Cho Diamonds, one of two companies participating in the GNWT's Certification Program.

"Our certification program will provide consumers with a guarantee that they are buying a truly northern diamond," Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development Joseph Handley says. "It gives northern manufacturers like Deton'Cho Diamonds and Arslanian Cutting Works Ltd. an edge in the competitive diamond market place."

CANADIAN ARCTIC TM diamonds are the first and only diamonds in the world to have their origins certified by a government. The program, which has been reviewed by the RCMP, is based on an intensive monitoring and auditing process implemented with each participating company. It follows the rough diamond from the mine through the diamond factory. Participation in the certification program is voluntary.

A certificate confirming that the diamond was mined and cut in the NWT accompanies each polished diamond. Each certificate includes a GEMPRINT, an international computerized identification system that provides an image much like a fingerprint, of each diamond. Using GEMPRINT each polished diamond is scanned and its "fingerprint" portrayed on the accompanying certificate thereby linking the polished diamond to the certificate.

CANADIAN ARCTIC TM diamonds are now available at Brinkhaus Jewellers in Calgary and Vancouver and at selected dealers in the NWT.

GNWT Welcomes Announcement from Alaska North Slope Gas Producers

YELLOWKNIFE (December 6) – Premier Stephen Kakfwi says he's encouraged by the announcement made today by three major Alaska North Slope Gas producers. BP, Phillips and ExxonMobil have agreed to a joint work program on the Alaskan Gas Pipeline Project to coordinate the design, costs, permitting, structure and overall viability of a northern pipeline.

"The Government of the Northwest Territories has consistently maintained that American gas producers will be the decision makers in determining how Alaskan gas will reach US markets," Premier Kakfwi said. "At the end of the day, we believe the economic benefits of the Mackenzie Valley pipeline route will compel Alaskan gas producers to share that route with us."

The GNWT holds that Mackenzie Valley pipeline is viable as a stand-alone route but recognizes that additional economic efficiencies will be gained by linking to Alaskan gas.

Premier Kakfwi pointed to this week's signing of a memorandum of understanding between the Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board and the National Energy Board as a big step towards creating a single-window environmental review process in the NWT. "Achievements like this demonstrate that the NWT is committed to facilitating oil and gas development in the NWT and we look forward to working with members of the Alaska Gas Pipeline project to explore further ways to make this project a reality," he said.

While today's announcement is good news, it underscores the urgency of making appropriate investments now to ensure that northerners maximize the benefits from oil and gas development. "We trust that the federal government shares our sense of urgency and will continue to join us in making additional strategic investments in the infrastructure and training needed for gas oil and mineral resource development in the Northwest Territories," the Premier said.

NWT Recognizes the World's First Certified Diamond Polishers

YELLOWKNIFE (December 08) -- Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes presented Brad Taylor and Andy Thatcher of Yellowknife with certificates yesterday making them the first Certified Diamond Polishers in Canada.

In presenting their certificates from the NWT Apprenticeship, Trade and Occupations Certification Board, Mr. Ootes acknowledged the rigorous testing and exacting standards that must be met to acquire this designation.

"Mr. Taylor and Mr. Thatcher have achieved a level of expertise in diamond polishing that is recognized around the world," Mr. Ootes said. For both men, the certification process included completing written examinations and two days of rigorous testing in which each was required to polish six diamonds to exacting specifications.

The NWT has taken the lead in developing Occupational Standards for Diamond Polishers. In association with industry professionals from Belgium, Germany, the United States and South Africa, it completed *The Diamond Polisher Occupational Standards Manual* - a document outlining the only comprehensive diamond polishing standards to exist in the world.

Occupational Standards are a tool that industry can use to assess the skills and expertise of individuals working in a field. A standard outlines the necessary knowledge, skills and attitudes a person requires to perform competently in a given occupation. Certification in a designated occupation indicates that an individual has attained a level of competence in that occupation as determined by industry.

Recent efforts by the Department of Education have also lead to the development of occupational standards for Security Officers, Camp Cooks, Hunting Guides, Fresh Water Angling Guides and Warehouse Technicians.

"The demand for these standards endorses the need and desire of industry, business and government for a professional work force," Mr. Ootes said. "The government is committed to working with industry to develop standards that ensure NWT residents are ready to take advantage of the many job opportunities being created by work in emerging industries."

GNWT Assists Fort McPherson with High Costs of Water Supply System

YELLOWKNIFE (December 8) — Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs Roger T. Allen announced today that the Government of the Northwest Territories will provide assistance to the Hamlet of Fort McPherson to reduce the high cost of supplying water to its residents.

Residents of Fort McPherson have been concerned with the quality of their drinking water supply. This year, MACA is investing nearly \$3 million to develop a new water source for the community. In the interim, the community continues to rely on its existing water system.

The Department of Public Works and Services (PWS) operates the community's water supply system on a full charge-back basis. Recently, the community raised water rates significantly in an effort to cover the higher costs of maintaining the existing system, additional water treatment and testing.

At a meeting this week with Fort McPherson Mayor William Koe, Mr. Allen agreed to provide financial assistance to the community. As part of the plan, the Department of Public Works and Services (PWS) will cap their billings to the community for the rest of the fiscal year. The plan will eliminate the deficit in the Hamlet's water account and allow the rates for private customers to drop back to previous levels.

"Residents should not be expected to absorb the higher costs that have accumulated over the past years," Mr. Allen said, "If we don't help out, Fort McPherson will have to cope with a large deficit in their water supply system accounts."

"I want to thank Mackenzie Delta MLA David Krutko for raising this issue with me during the last Session of the Legislative Assembly," the Minister said, "and I thank Minister of Public Works and Services Vince Steen for assisting us in finding a workable solution."

Cabinet Supports National Aboriginal Day as Statutory Holiday for NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (December 12) – Premier Stephen Kakfwi today announced the government's intention to make National Aboriginal Day a statutory holiday in the Northwest Territories.

"The people of the NWT place importance on recognizing the significant contribution of Aboriginal cultures to the NWT and all of Canada," Premier Kakfwi said. "Declaring National Aboriginal Day as a day of holiday and celebration across the Northwest Territories will demonstrate the importance this particular day holds for people of the NWT.

Other jurisdictions have designated statutory holidays of special significance to their populations, such as Nunavut Day in Nunavut, and Family Day in Alberta.

"Declaring June 21st a statutory holiday would provide all people of the NWT, both Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal, with an opportunity to participate in National Aboriginal Day celebrations," the Premier said.

Premier Kakfwi promised the Members of the Legislative Assembly that he would bring this initiative forward if Aboriginal people and organizations in the NWT expressed significant support for this day as a statutory holiday. It is hoped that a Bill to establish June 21st as a statutory holiday can be introduced and passed at the February 2001 sitting of the Assembly.

Canada has recognized June 21st, the first day of summer, as National Aboriginal Day since 1996.

Student Support Needs Assessment Released

Yellowknife (December 13) – A report released today by Minister of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE) Jake Ootes says schools in the Northwest Territories have made significant progress in addressing the diverse learning needs of their students.

"The Student Support Needs Assessment Report" is the result of extensive research by the Department of Education, Culture and Employment during the 1999/2000 school year. Using interviews with teachers and other educators, information was collected to identify the individual learning needs of students enrolled from Kindergarten to Grade 12 and the practices and procedures currently in place to support them.

"This report recognizes and values the diversity that exists in NWT classrooms," Mr Ootes said. "It will assist the education system in identifying and providing the kinds of learning supports required in our schools and will allow us to focus our supports in areas of greatest need."

Among the priorities identified by teachers are the need to increase training and professional development opportunities for education/support assistants, and more counselling services for students. Teachers also identified the need for smaller class sizes, lower pupil/teacher ratios, greater parental involvement and improved behaviour and attendance.

The report is the first of its kind in the NWT since Division. The data will guide ECE, Divisional Education Councils and District Education Authorities in distributing resources in a way that will allow each school to better meet the needs of its students.

Backgrounder:

Student Support Needs Assessment Released

The goals of the Student Support Needs Assessment Survey were to:

- Collect data on NWT students regarding supports necessary to enhance the learning of individual students.
- Determine what practices and procedures are in place in NWT schools to support students in learning.
- Identify the gaps between learning supports required and those currently in place.

Methodology:

- Interviews with teachers about students (Classroom Profile) were conducted from January to June 2000.
- Interviews with Principals and School Administrative Teams about support practices and procedures in the school (School/Community Profile) were conducted in the same time frame.
- In schools with an enrollment greater than 150 students, all the interviews were done in person.
- Phone interviews were conducted with schools with populations less than 150 students.
- Information was gathered on 9,619 students, in 46 schools in seven NWT school divisions.
- The collected data was analyzed and compiled by ECE and the NWT Bureau of Statistics.

The top five needs for student support identified by teachers in the Student Support Assessment were:

- Trained classroom support staff
- Counsellors in the school
- Reduced class size or lower pupil/teacher ratio
- Program Support Teachers
- Parental Support for Students

Additional priorities identified by teachers include literacy, student behaviour, regular and prompt attendance at school and support for students coping with family related issues.

Next Steps:

- The Schools Planning and Resource Committee (SPAR), that consists of representatives of directors (DEC), comptrollers, ECE and H&SS staff, developed a four-year action plan that provides recommendations on the approach to allocation of the additional monies that became available to the education system as a result of the recent amendments to the *Education Act*.
- There were two aspects to the task. First was an allocation structure for the 2000/01 school year. The second was to develop a multi-year plan.
- Recommendations for the funding allocations for the multi-year plan will be made by the SPAR committee once it has had the opportunity to review the report.



Finance Ministers Support Restoring Formula Financing

YELLOWKNIFE (December 13) – Provincial and territorial finance ministers meeting in Winnipeg say they support the restoration of the five per cent cut made to the territories' formula financing expenditure base in 1996-97.

Speaking on behalf of NWT Finance Minister Joe Handley, NWT Deputy Premier Jane Groenewegen said she welcomed the backing of provincial counterparts for the restoration of Formula Financing transfers. "I'm extremely pleased that provincial minister's have provided their support," she said. "We were forced to make drastic cuts in spending to cope with the 1996 reduction. We continue to feel the impact today in terms of the strain on our ability to deliver programs."

The federal government reduced funding under the Formula Financing Agreement as a deficit reduction measure in 1996-97. For the pre-Division NWT, this amounted to about \$56 million, or approximately \$30 million for the post-Division NWT. Since 1997, only about one-quarter of the reductions have been restored through increases in Canada Health and Social Transfer (CHST) funding.

In September, provincial and territorial premiers succeeded in convincing federal decision makers that restoration of the CHST should be the first priority once the federal deficit was conquered and a surplus was achieved. Following the September First Minister's meeting, the federal government announced the addition of \$23.4 billion in CHST funding to the provinces and territories over the next five years.

Provincial and territorial finance ministers hope to meet with their federal counterparts as soon as possible to discuss these issues.

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
