RWED Minister Pleased with Pipeline Announcement

YELLOWKNIFE (January 7) -- Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine says yesterday's announcement by Mackenzie Valley Producers Group and the Mackenzie Valley Aboriginal Corporation to proceed with preparation of a regulatory application for a gas pipeline is a positive signal for the economic future of the Northwest Territories.

"We have been waiting for this announcement for some time," he said. "Moving into the formal planning stages for a pipeline is a significant commitment on the part of producers and means groundwork to define the technical environmental and commercial aspects of the project can begin along the proposed route."

Mr. Antoine says, even in the short-term, NWT communities and northern businesses will benefit from the opportunities associated with the project definition phase.

"I am particularly pleased that the Aboriginal people of the NWT are a partner in this project and are working to have a significant share of the ownership in the proposed pipeline," Mr Antoine said. "This now provides Deh Cho leaders with a proposal to consider."

The NWT Minister of Resources wildlife and Economic Development was in Ottawa last month where he met with the Minister of Indian and Northern Affairs and members of the Western and Northern Liberal caucus on the status of economic development opportunities in the NWT.

"The fed government has told us that they will consider investment in the Northwest Territories once a pipeline application is filed," Mr Antoine said. "This announcement by the Mackenzie Valley Gas producers opens the door for federal investment to begin."

Northwest Territories Premier Stephen Kakfwi, DIAND Minister Bob Nault, NWT Aboriginal leaders and Mr. Antoine are scheduled to discuss devolution and resource revenue sharing at a meeting of the Intergovernmental Forum later this week in Fort Simpson.

Premier's Annual Address Focuses on People and Environment

YELLOWKNIFE (January 11) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi said yesterday that the Government of the Northwest Territories will work to mend the social fabric of the NWT and better reflect the important balance between environmental management and resource development.

In his second Annual Address to the People of the Northwest Territories, the Premier said that the GNWT's Non Renewable Resource Development Strategy has helped to create the positive economic climate needed to maximize the benefits of large scale resource development for the good of all residents of the NWT.

"Our economy has momentum," he told a luncheon of the Rotary Club of Hay River Sunrise. "In fact, compared to other jurisdictions in Canada, we're number one."

Mr. Kakfwi said the government will use this momentum to continue what it has begun and to focus on the North's greatest strengths and most precious resources – the identity, language and culture of the people of the NWT and the protection and management of its environment.

"The lands and waters that we call our own continue to be owned and managed by the federal government," the Premier noted. "It is time for this to end."

The Premier and Members of the Legislative Assembly have begun a process to identify a new name for Canada's emerging "have territory". He credited the entrepreneurial spirit of the North's original people for the historical and unprecedented manner in which the NWT has taken control of its future.

"It is this enduring northern spirit that gives me the pride and the confidence to say, we will complete the tasks that we have set out for ourselves," he said.

Address to the People of the Northwest Territories

Premier Stephen Kakfwi Friday, January 11, 2002 Rotary Club of Hay River Sunrise

Elders, youth, guests, leaders and people of the North.

It is the beginning of a New Year and also the mid-point of my term as your Premier. It is an honour to be here today to address you.

I want to take a moment to thank those of you who took the time to give me your statements of support this past October and the support that you gave to the economic and social and political direction in which your government, your territory and all people are heading.

Personally, I want to thank the Native Women's Association who gave me comfort, the chiefs, the Inuvialuit and Metis leaders who came to my defence, and the business and community leaders who came out publicly to declare their support for my leadership in the vision that we all share together.

I would like to highlight for you some of the key achievements that this government, this legislature, this cabinet, with your support, has achieved to date.

More than anything, we should recognize that in Canada and in North America we are enjoying an economy that is performing very well, driving primarily by natural gas exploration, diamond mine construction and the operation, as well as related resource sector activity. Our economy has momentum. In fact, compare to other jurisdictions, in Canada, we are number one.

To support this momentum, we are encouraging new partnerships with southern businesses. We are building capacity in our labour market and territorial business community. We are working to maximize northern employment, particularly for our young people, our youth. And we will continue to work to improve infrastructure, to serve our residents and the needs of industry.

The decisions that some of us made 25 years ago to begin taking control of our future, I believe are starting to produce results today.

It is recognized that the U.S. President Bush and our Prime Minister Chretien have had discussions about the Northwest Territories: the resources we have here and the will of the people to be part of a global economy.

Multi-national corporations are now discussing the future of the Northwest Territories with us, and the development of the resources. We have taken a lead in articulating the dreams and the visions of our people, and to carve out a place for ourselves not just in Canada, but in the global community. That is how we must continue to see ourselves if we are going to ensure ourselves a future.

It is historic to see that one day discussions and decisions made by any one of our Aboriginal land corporations here in the North would be discussed the following day in a boardroom in Houston or Calgary. Historically, in an unprecedented way, Aboriginal leaders declared at the beginning of 2000 that our people must have equity in any future pipeline down the Mackenzie Valley.

We developed a non-renewable resource strategy to help create a positive climate for investment and development in the North for ourselves and Canada and, again, on a global basis.

On Monday of this week the gas producers and Aboriginal pipeline corporations responded to this positive climate with a notice of intent to apply for a pipeline permit to see the construction of a pipeline to bring Canadian gas, northern gas to markets.

Even the federal government, which we have often criticized for inaction, has responded in part with funding for ice road construction, but more notably, Finance Minister Paul Martin found the political will to agree to a \$60 million adjustment to offset our costs incurred during division of the Northwest Territories.

It is apparent that we have created a new confidence amongst ourselves here in the Northwest Territories and in Canada. I believe Monday's announcement will only help convince our Prime Minister, Finance Minister Paul Martin, and indeed the northern Minister Bob Nault that we must work together to ensure that federal investment flows through the North so that we can get the support we need to maintain the course we have set for ourselves, and to continue to work to realize our full potential.

I want to address the importance of recognizing and using the full potential of all our peoples here in the territory:

The Inuvialuit, the Gwich'in, the Sahtu, the Deh Cho, the Akaitcho, the Dogrib, the Metis; those of you who have had the courage and the vision to come North years ago to make this your home; and those of you who have come recently with the intent, the strength and the vision to see this as a place to make your home.

Each and every one of us is challenged to help improve the health and well-being of our communities, our families, our women, our elders, our children.

Each day we are challenged with family violence, abuse in all its forms, poverty, inadequate housing, fetal alcohol syndrome, and the legacy of residential schools.

They all continue to assail us, to damage our social fabric. While the task of addressing these many issues is complex, I believe that together we can make a difference. But it will take the commitment of this government, in partnership with you the people to make positive change.

In keeping with that, in June of last year, our government hosted a major gathering of non-governmental organizations, community groups, Aboriginal governments and the federal government to develop a made-in-the-north social agenda.

We took this step because our social fabric is essential and must be balanced with resource development, employment and business initiatives. The task of completing a social agenda is in the hands of the Social Agenda Working Group, which will be reporting to us, to all of us in the near future.

Partnerships are fundamental to realizing our vision, and nowhere is this more apparent than our commitment to recognize and support Aboriginal governments. To date, relationships with Aboriginal governments have been improved by significant agreements such as the South Slave Metis Political Accord.

Progress has been made in regional land claim and self-government negotiations involving the Beaufort-Delta, the Dogrib Nation, and the Salt River First Nations. An agreement has been reached on a tri-partite action plan for both economic development and capacity building. We are especially pleased and proud with the progress made by an Intergovernmental Forum during this past year. This is a truly unique way of bringing together all levels of government to deal with

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territorial-wide issues.

Later today I will join Minister Jim Antoine, Aboriginal leaders and DIAJND Minister Bob Nault in Fort Simpson to discuss arrangements for future negotiations on resource revenue sharing and devolution.

As you know, the lands and the waters that we call ours continue to be owned and managed by the federal government in Ottawa. It is time for this to end. As I speak to you today, revenues from diamond mines operating in our backyard continue to see dollars flowing to Ottawa. This too must change.

All of us understand and respect the need to protect our lands, our resources and our environment. Our ancestors have done that. Our future generations demand that. Let me state categorically, this government is committed to ensuring that the land is protected for all our future generations, and for the duration of our term we will continue to work and to organize ourselves in ways that better reflect the important balance between environmental management and resource development.

We have also established an Energy Secretariat to produce a comprehensive strategy to include environmentally friendly energy sources. We will complete and implement this initiative by the end of our term. We need to recognize that territorial and regional boards and agencies established under land claim agreements are now very much a part of the environmental review and decision-making process on land use and development matters.

In the next two years, in co-operation with our Aboriginal partners and the federal government, we will work to improve and streamline our regulatory process.

Our work has already led to a dramatic increase in confidence by industry evidenced this week by this week's announcement.

We will continue to work: \square to expand community and regional capacity to manage and monitor the environment; \square to expand monitoring capabilities for air quality wildlife and forest inventory; \square to support local, regional, national and international actions to reduce emissions from pollutants including greenhouse gases; and \square to promote a reduction of energy consumption here in the North in our own homes, and in our communities.

Our ancestors were strong people. Their strength came from their belief in themselves - an unwavering belief in the gifts, resources and qualities given by the Creator. We that follow them must continue that tradition and face up to the challenge of every day by believing in ourselves.

This demands dedication to one another, to our diverse cultures and languages, our individual identities, and a commitment to see the development of a unique identity that will encompass all of us as a people of the new territory.

These are our greatest strengths and our most precious resource: our Aboriginal diversity of Inuvialuit, Metis, Gwich'in, Sahtu, Deh Cho, Dogrib and Akaitcho Dene. Together, with the diversity brought to our land by people who came North generations ago and those who have come recently make us truly unique.

We must find ways, each and every day to support and celebrate this diversity, to meet the challenges it presents so that we can together go into the future to meet the challenges that are confronting us.

Governments, both public and Aboriginal, must and will, continue to have a role in maintaining and reviving our languages, promoting and enhancing our cultures, and finding ways to encourage the development of a unique culture for all our peoples within the territory.

Last year we passed legislation to recognize our Aboriginal heritage, by declaring an annual holiday on June 21st. We are the first in Canada to make National Aboriginal Day a true holiday, a day to celebrate and to recognize our Aboriginal peoples.

We also continue to work to put our unique northern impression on educational programs and health care delivery, in naming of our buildings, and arts and crafts, eco and cultural tourism, northern sports and our country food.

We should recognize that many of our leaders and our communities have lead the way in seeking an identity by renaming themselves, reclaiming ownership of what is theirs.

Today we know Fort Norman as Tulita, Lutsel K'e was Snowdrift, Arctic Red River has become Tsiigehtchic, Fort Franklin is now Deline. We have Whati, Gameti, Wekweti.

These people and communities are putting a unique stamp on the map of Canada, a strong statement of culture and identity. We have an obligation to respect that. Our leadership initiatives must be recognized as contributing to the development of an identity for all of us our communities and our people.

A major challenge still facing us is to find a name for our territory, our home. It is a challenge that we must address together, as we seek to assume control of our future, our resources and our land, and to continue the work to develop a unique identity for ourselves.

Recently, Members of the Legislature collectively agreed on the need for a process to help us identify a new name for our territory - a process and a name that will symbolize for all residents our uniqueness, our unity, our diverse and unique makeup, and more than anything, declare our place in Canada.

MLAs have instructed Cabinet, and Cabinet has given our support to Minister Antoine and MLA Bill Braden of Yellowknife, to take the lead in this initiative and to provide recommendations at the March session of our legislature.

All of us have come a long way as governments and as peoples. Twenty-five years ago, many of us stood up to the oil and gas industry and the federal government of Canada and said there will be no pipeline until it is built to our benefit and on our terms.

Two years ago we shared our dream of having a territory that is self-sufficient, self-reliant. A territory where careful planning and strategic investment in large-scale resource development, could be maximized to improve the lives and the well-being of all our people, all northerners.

Earlier this week the Mackenzie Valley Producer Group and the Mackenzie Valley Aboriginal Corporation told us they are ready to proceed with the regulatory application for a gas pipeline. The Aboriginal people of the Northwest Territories have positioned themselves to seek one-third ownership of this pipeline, of this project.

We have come this far because we have a spirit, an entrepreneurial spirit that exists within each of us, each of our families, each of our peoples: the Gwich'in, the Sahtu, the Deh Cho, the Dogrib, the Akaitcho, the Metis families, the Metis Nation, and those of you who have come generations ago to make this your home.

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The spirit that brought you here, the spirit that has served you to survive and endure and development and establish families here is what we need to recognize, to celebrate and make use of.

It is this spirit that has given us the confidence and the power to rise above the obstacles that we face, to continue to be innovative and creative in the face of adversity, and to be courageous through the hard times that we have faced, face today and will face tomorrow.

It is this spirit that tells me that we will continue to stand resolute as we meet the challenges of tomorrow. It is this enduring spirit, this northern spirit that gives me the pride and the confidence to stand here today and say that I know and I believe with absolute confidence that we are able and we will complete the tasks that we've set out for ourselves in our vision.

Minister Introduces Plan for Reform of NWT Health and Social Services System

YELLOWKNIFE (January 16) -- Minister of Health and Social Services (H&SS) J. Michael Miltenberger today released his department's plan to improve the delivery of health and social services to the people of the Northwest Territories.

The Health and Social Services System Action Plan, 2002-2005 builds on the recommendations of reports and studies done on the NWT Health and Social Services system over the past eight years and the advice of NWT leaders, residents and health care professionals.

"It's time to move beyond studies and get on with substantial reform of the health and social services system," Mr. Miltenberger said.

The action plan, to be implemented over the next three years, addresses five major areas of improvement: services to people, support for staff, system-wide management, support to trustees and accountability. Under each of these major areas, actions are identified.

A Joint Leadership Council, established and chaired by the Minister of Health and Social Services, will lead and monitor the implementation of the action plan. This council includes the Chairperson of each Health and Social Services Authority as well as the department's Deputy Minister.

"This action plan seeks to ensure that the health and social services system of the NWT can provide residents of the NWT with the appropriate service, at the appropriate time by the appropriate provider," Mr. Miltenberger said.

On his appointment to the Health and Social Services portfolio in November 2001, Mr. Miltenberger committed to providing an action plan to the people of the Northwest Territories within 90 days of taking office. Today's announcement fulfils the Minister's commitment ahead of schedule.

Many other Canadian jurisdictions have also completed system-wide reviews and changes in the health and social services sector. "We have many common challenges," the Minister noted.


Mr Kakfwi also reiterated his continuing support for Western Arctic Member of Parliament Ethel Blondin-Andrew.

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Joint Leadership Council Begins Work to Implement Action Plan

YELLOWKNIFE (February 5) -- The newly formed Joint Leadership Council (JLC), responsible for the implementation of the Department of Health and Social Services (H&SS) Action Plan 2002-2005, met for the first time in Yellowknife Friday, February 1, 2002.

The JLC provides direction to the Joint Senior Management Committee (JSMC) made up of the Chief Executive Officers of Health and Social Services Authorities and senior managers from the H&SS Department who are responsible for the system wide coordination of operational activities.

Mr. Miltenberger says one of the first priorities will be to strengthen recruitment efforts for health and social services professionals. "The Joint Leadership Committee is also committed to establishing a closer working relationship with professional associations," he said.


Only flights departing from the Yellowknife Airport to other designated airports in Canada will be subject to the ticket charge when it takes effect on April 1, 2002.

Federal Finance Minister Paul Martin introduced the new security charge in his December Budget Speech as a means to recover the cost of tighter security measures at Canadian airports. Information released with the Budget Speech indicated that all Canadian airports would be subject to the charge.

Mr. Handley says he sought clarification from Ottawa on behalf of NWT travelers pointing out the effect that such a charge would have on the already high cost of air travel in the North.

Health Services Report Highlights Need for Healthy Choices

YELLOWKNIFE (February 7) – The cost of health services provided in the Northwest Territories for the treatment of preventable injuries due to accidents, heart attacks and strokes highlights the importance of prevention, health promotion and healthy lifestyle choices," Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger said today.

The Minister released *The NWT Health Services Report 2000* on the use of health services in the Northwest Territories between 1994 and 1999. It is the first such report on the NWT health system in over a decade. He says it will enable practitioners and decision-makers to analyze the use of health services and the relative costs of providing these services in the NWT.

"It will help us answer questions about who uses which services, when, how often and for what reason," the Minister said, "and will provide a baseline to measure future trends."

The report focuses on four areas of the NWT health system most used by NWT residents: hospitals; health centres and public health units; physician services; and medical travel.

"It illustrates the need to develop more responsive effective, responsible and sustainable methods of delivering and managing health services as reflected in our recently released *Health and Social Services System Action Plan, 2002-2005,*" Mr. Miltenberger said.

New Projects to Provide Increased Access to Furs and Hides

YELLOWKNIFE (February 8) -- Two pilot projects, developed by the Department of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED) will provide arts and crafts producers with increased access to dressed furs and hides.

The first project will focus on increasing the production of smoked moose hide. Funding will be provided for: the acquisition of green hides; mentoring programs to teach tanning skills to young people; processing procedures and technology transfers and projects that would make the tanning process less labour intensive.

The second project will increase the access to dressed furs for arts and crafts producers. Assistance will be available for youth mentoring programs and craft production as well as the purchase of either select lots of Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs for dressing or fur that has been locally dressed.

"The development of a healthy and successful fashion design industry in the Northwest Territories has been reflected in an increased demand for our arts and crafts," RWED Minister Jim Antoine says. "The success of these industries relies heavily on the availability of tanned hides - particularly moose hides and dressed fur."

Team Canada 2002 To Produce Future Results For NWT Business

BERLIN (February 19) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) signed in Moscow by Canada North Projects Ltd. with Petrospekt of St. Peterersburg is just the tip of the iceberg for business opportunities in Russia and highlights the importance of the Team Canada Trade Mission for the NWT business community.

The MOU worth \$250,000 annually was signed February 15, 2002, and sets the terms for the Yellowknife-based company to provide technology to its Russian partners for the manufacturing of wood frame structural building components.

"Our harsh and isolated environment has necessitated innovative and unique methods of construction ideally suited for the NWT," the Premier said. "The Team Canada forum allows us to market this proficiency beyond traditional markets."

While in Russia, Premier Kakfwi also joined Stefan Simek of Ferguson Simek Clark for meetings with government officials and business representatives. Last week, Prime Minster Chretién singled out Ferguson Simek Clark as a "Canadian business pioneer" in developing Canada-Russia partnerships and "a household name" in the Russian construction industry.

While immigration issues prevented Mr. Simek from finalizing any additional contracts in Russia, Premier Kakfwi says the expertise, equipment, training and materials perfected by the NWT construction industry will continue to be sought by Russian businesses.

Both Canadian and Russian businesses have raised concerns during the trade mission that immigration concerns have placed them at a competitive disadvantage with USA and European Businesses.

Premier Meets with Diamond Companies in London

BERLIN (February 19) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says he will continue to insist that De Beers allocate a percentage of all future NWT production to cutting and polishing operations in the Northwest Territories.

The Premier met with representatives of the diamond mining company last week in London England. He says it is obvious that more negotiations will be needed before an agreement can be reached.

"The De Beers' strategy is to sell all diamonds without identifying the source," Mr. Kakfwi said. "This does not necessarily work in the best interests of the NWT diamond industry."

While in London, the Premier also met with Rio Tinto representatives (Diavik) who confirmed that they will market diamonds based on national origination. "They have agreed that there is a premium to be obtained by marketing NWT diamonds," Mr. Kakfwi said.

The Premier's meetings with De Beers and Rio Tinto were part of a concerted effort by the Government of the Northwest Territories to maintain an open dialogue with the diamond industry regarding global perspectives and market trends.

Premier Kakfwi says he reiterated his request to De Beers officials that they show their presence in the diamond capital of North America by placing a company sign on the main street of Yellowknife.

"They have indicated to me that this will not be a problem," the Premier said.



The Government of the Northwest Territories will build on the partnerships it has established to balance its investment in the economy, environment and social fabric of the NWT.



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

2002-2003 NWT Budget Address Seeks Balanced Approach

YELLOWKNIFE (February 20) -- Saying the Government of the Northwest Territories must balance its investments in the strong NWT economy with investments in the NWT's people, communities and environment, Minister of Finance, Joseph Handley today introduced the GNWT's 2002-03 Budget in the Legislative Assembly.

Strong economic growth and large one-time revenue increases will provide the GNWT with a \$160 million operating surplus at the end of the current fiscal year. A surplus, Mr. Handley says, that will allow the GNWT to make investments that would otherwise not be possible.

"Today's budget responds to the concerns of individual NWT residents and proposals put forward by Members of the Legislative Assembly, Chiefs, community leaders, business and non-government organizations over the past two years," he said.

The Finance Minister say he's committed to laying the groundwork for future economic development while balancing this investment with support for the environment and funding to ease social pressures caused by rapid economic growth.

Support is also included for the NWT's cultural diversity. "This is one of our most precious resources and the source of our strength," Mr. Handley said.

The Minister says he will look for alternatives to the proposed Commercial Vehicle Permit Fee to finance the Highway Investment Strategy. Today's budget includes \$33 million for investment in the NWT highway system.

There is also tax relief for NWT taxpayers. If approved by the Legislative Assembly, increases to the personal, married, age and disability income tax credits will go into effect on July 1, 2002 saving a single taxpayer \$246 in income tax, and a single income couple \$575. Meanwhile, a minimum Cost of Living Tax Credit of \$250 per individual and \$500 per couple will go into effect for the 2002 tax year.

In the long term, however, Mr. Handley says expenditures will exceed revenues unless additional revenues are realized.

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While the 2002-2003 Budget includes \$64 million in additional operating expenditures, the Finance Minister says without additional one-time revenues, he expects revenues to fall in 2002-2003 and is forecasting a \$12 million deficit in the coming fiscal year.

"While we will invest a portion of our one-time revenue increases in economic and social initiatives, we must also set aside a portion to finance projected future deficits," he warned.

Ministerial Council on Literacy Convenes in Yellowknife

YELLOWKNIFE (March 6) -- The NWT's Ministerial Council on Literacy met for the first time in Yellowknife today. The Council, made up of representatives of the non-profit sector, employers, Aboriginal organizations, educational authorities and GNWT departments, was mandated by the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes, to provide guidance on the implementation of the NWT Literacy Strategy.

The Minister says the need to improve literacy levels is one of the most fundamental issues facing the GNWT today.

"Literacy is at the heart of education," Mr. Ootes said. "By working together, we can help to ensure the NWT Literacy Strategy is fully implemented and our goal of a literate society is realized."

The NWT's Literacy strategy, Towards Literacy: A Strategy Framework recognizes that the development and maintenance of literacy skills is a lifelong process. It acknowledges that literacy programs should be developed and supported in all the official languages of the NWT.

"It is appropriate that the Council meet for the first time during Education Week," Mr. Ootes said. "It is an opportunity to reflect on the increasing need for each of us to commit to a lifetime of learning as a means of understanding and embracing change."

Literacy is defined as an individual's ability to listen, speak, read, write, view, represent, compute and solve problems in one or more of the official languages of the NWT at a level of proficiency necessary to function in the family, in the community and on the job. Higher literacy levels are linked to healthy lifestyle choices, progressive social and economic development, greater employment opportunities and higher incomes.





Canada Gala Strengthened NWT Ties to Yukon and Alaska

YELLOWKNIFE (March 12) -- Minister of Education Culture and Employment Jake Ootes says a Canada Gala in Anchorage, Alaska on March 9, 2002 served to strengthen cultural and commercial relationships across the North.

Mr. Ootes and Minister of Public Works and Services, Municipal and Community Affairs Vince Steen joined Alaska legislators, NWT and Yukon government officials and representatives from the Petroleum Industry in a celebration of the Alaska-Canada relationship and to identify and promote areas of economic and political co-operation.

"With recent announcements confirming that the Mackenzie Highway gas pipeline will likely be constructed first, it is time to pursue the potential that has been created for increased trade and business opportunities between the Northwest Territories and both the Yukon and Alaska," Mr. Ootes said.

Alaska and the Northwest Territories already benefit from a close working relationship in several areas of common interest. They include the transportation of goods via the Mackenzie River into the Alaska North Slope and Bering Sea region, a pilot project for the community-based construction of a housing project in Stebbins, Alaska and community infrastructure development.

Future co-operation in the oil and gas sector could maximize resource development in both regions.

"Both Alaska and the NWT would realize significant benefits by combining our gas for transportation to market," Mr. Steen noted. "Given the lower capital costs and the economies of scale, a Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline would provide a double positive impact for both basins."

The Canada gala was hosted by the Canadian Consulate General, in collaboration with the University of Alaska, the Alaska World Affairs Council and World Trade Centre Alaska.

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NWT Premier Says Pipeline Development Must Respect Environment

VANCOUVER (March 13) -- Speaking to delegates at *The Globe 2002 Conference* in Vancouver, Premier Stephen Kakfwi today warned that although the people of the Northwest Territories welcome economic development, it must be done in a way that respects the environment and brings benefits to the Northwest Territories.

"Our sacred tie to the land has existed for thousands of years, he said. "We are aware of the balance required between developing our resources and ensuring our grandchildren's grandchildren have the same access to clean lakes, abundant wildlife and healthy land throughout the Northwest Territories."

The Premier praised British Petroleum for its goal to reduce greenhouse gas emissions to a point exceeding those set out by the Kyoto Protocol.

"When corporate partners share the important priority of the balance between development and environment, then we have a relationship built on a strong foundation, not mere platitudes." Mr. Kakfwi said.

The Globe Conference is one of the foremost settings for government and industry representatives to discuss how major developments in energy policy and sustainable development can be translated into technology solutions and business opportunities.

The Premier spoke as part of a Northern Leaders Summit addressing Continental Energy on the theme: *Balancing Business Opportunity and Environmental Risk*. He says he's confident that natural gas will flow through the Mackenzie Valley by 2008.

The panel will conduct community consultations before submitting their recommendations this summer on how the Government can support a healthy and sustainable arts and cultural sector in the NWT.

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Minister Says FAS Symposium Successful

YELLOWKNIFE (March 18) -- Minister of Health and Social Services Michael Miltenberger says an FAS Symposium in Yellowknife this weekend provided an excellent opportunity to discuss comprehensive and coordinated efforts to combat the reality of fetal alcohol syndrome.

Mr. Miltenberger says the symposium also provided an opportunity to highlight the GNWT's integrated approach to addressing FAS and FAE through a broad community-based approach of prevention and health promotion activities, early identification and intervention and the development of skills for parents and service providers.

"Our goal is to reduce the number of children who are born with the fetal alcohol effects," Mr. Miltenberger said. "But, it is also important that parents, social workers, health professionals and educators have the skills to assist children who must live with the damaging effects of pre-natal exposure to alcohol."

The GNWT's Department of Health and Social Services, as a member of the Prairie Northern Pacific FAS Partnership, organized the symposium for health professionals, social workers and educators from Western Canada.

The symposium also featured presentations from Dr. Loretta Fuddy, Deputy Director of Health, Government of Hawaii and Brad Bell, Co-ordinator Healthy Families, Department of Health and Social Services, Government of Yukon, on the development and implementation of effective home visitation programming for at-risk families.

This programming focuses on promoting positive parent-child interaction, effective child development strategies and increasing awareness for parents of social and medical services. Both speakers focused discussion on key challenges and similar building blocks for successful programs.

"It is very important that service provider's are made aware of practical and effective approaches to addressing needs," the Minister said.

First, Lessons from the Land, an interactive educational program available on the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre web site, provides an entertaining virtual journey from which visitors can learn about the NWT's many diverse indigenous peoples and cultures and gain a deeper appreciation for the NWT's unique heritage.

Second, the declaration of June 21st as a statutory holiday, by the GNWT, to mark National Aboriginal Day in the NWT and funding commitments to support community cultural events and activities in celebration of National Aboriginal Day.

"I encourage all residents of the NWT to reflect on the wealth our rich cultural heritage bestows upon us daily." Mr. Ootes said. "Residents of the NWT are rich in language, knowledge, resources and resiliency. A mark of distinction that is reflected in the global interest expressed for our heritage and culture."

Last December, representatives at the 56th Assembly of the United Nations General Assembly identified 2002 as the Year for Cultural Heritage. The Year 2002 marks the 30th anniversary of the Convention Concerning the Protection of the World Cultural and Natural Heritage.

Ministers Agree on Common Approach to Strengthening Recreation and Sport

YELLOWKNIFE (April 9) -- Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs Vince Steen and his colleagues responsible for sport, recreation and fitness in Canada have endorsed the first-ever Canadian sport policy. Ministers endorsed the policy during their meetings in Iqaluit, Nunavut April 5-7, 2002.

The policy will provide federal, provincial and territorial governments with a common approach to strengthening recreation and sport in Canada.

The policy was developed to create a more effective and transparent recreation and sport system in Canada. Territorial and provincial governments worked with the federal government to develop the policy. Extensive consultations were also held with the sport community, including a northern sport conference held in Yellowknife in July of 2000.

The new policy represents a shared vision and goals for recreation and sport development over the next ten years and commits all governments to setting targets for increased participation and enhanced high-performance sport in partnership with their sport communities. A key goal of the policy is to enhance the participation of Canadians in quality sport activities at all levels and in all forms of participation.

"Recreation and sport are an important part of life for people in the Northwest Territories," Mr. Steen said. "This new policy will help the Government of the Northwest Territories work with our partners to support a system that will allow all NWT residents to participate in recreation and sport to the best of their ability and interest."

Other goals of the policy include enhancing excellence, capacity and interaction. Ministers agreed to identify innovative funding sources for sport and recreation facilities, including an infrastructure program.

The policy also emphasizes the importance of sport and physical activity to the health of Canadians. Ministers shared this message with the Romanow Commission on the Future of Health Care in Canada during a collective presentation on April 7, 2002.

Ministers Agree on Common Approach to Strengthening Recreation and Sport YELLOWKNIFE (April 9)

The development of the Canadian Sport Policy is an outcome of the extensive consultation process launched in January 2000 by the federal Secretary of State (Amateur Sport) in conjunction with P/T governments. In April 2001, a federal discussion paper, Towards a Canadian Sport Policy, based on the consultations, was released and was the basis for discussion at the National Summit on Sport later that month.

The discussion paper was reviewed at the Meeting of F-P/T Ministers Responsible for Sport, also held in Ottawa in April 2001 immediately prior to the National Summit. At this meeting, the Ministers set themselves the deadline of a year to finalize the *Canadian Sport Policy* and implementation framework for collaborative action in sport. A work group of Deputy Ministers was charged with overseeing the completion of these initiatives.

Ministers agreed to consult with their respective sport communities in order to get their input in the development of the final document. The Canadian Sport Policy and F-P/T Priorities for Collaborative Action 2002-05 is the culmination of these efforts and were endorsed by Ministers at their conference in Iqaluit in April 2002.

The Vision of the Canadian Sport Policy is to have by 2012:

A dynamic and leading-edge sport environment that enables all Canadians to experience and enjoy involvement in sport to the extent of their abilities and interests and, for increasing numbers, to perform consistently and successfully at the highest competitive levels.

The Goals of the Canadian Sport Policy are:

Enhanced Participation

A significantly higher proportion of Canadians from all segments of society is involved in quality sport activities at all levels and in all forms of participation.

Enhanced Excellence

The pool of talented athletes has expanded and Canadian athletes and teams are systematically achieving world-class results at the highest levels of international competition through fair and ethical means.

Enhanced Capacity

The essential components of an ethically based participation/athlete-centred development system are in place and are continually modernized and strengthened as required.

Enhanced Interaction

The components of the sport system are more connected and coordinated as a result of committed collaboration and communication amongst the stakeholders.

Canadian Sport Policy

- Provides vision and direction for sport for the period 2002 to 2012 and challenges the sport community to share in their achievement.
- Commits to four goals for Canadian sport enhanced participation, enhanced excellence, enhanced capacity and enhanced interaction.
- Commits all governments to setting targets for increased participation and enhanced high performance sport in collaboration with their respective sport communities.
- Reflects the involvement of stakeholders not previously included in the policy development process.
- Emphasizes increased communication and collaboration among governments.
- Commits governments to strengthening their regular and formal communication with their respective sport communities.
- Will be implemented by complementary Action Plans developed by governments collectively and individually, bi-laterally and multi-laterally, and by the sport community.

F-P/T Priorities for Collaborative Action 2002-05

- For the goals of enhanced Participation, Excellence, Capacity and Interaction, 13 priorities and 22 actions have been developed for F-P/T collaboration. These are aimed at:
 - increasing the public's understanding of and participation in sport
 - increasing the participation of women, persons with a disability, Aboriginal peoples, and visible minorities
 - increasing sport and physical activity in schools
 - establishing targets for athlete and sport system performance
 - implementing the Competency Based Education Training program for coaching
 - developing a sport event hosting strategy
 - improving sport and recreation facilities
 - implementing the "Canadian Strategy on Ethical Conduct in Sport"
 - fostering the diversification of the resource base of sport organizations
 - enhancing Aboriginal sport development
 - increasing the awareness of sport within government
 - strengthening communication with the sport community and engaging in joint planning
 - enhancing collaboration between sport organizations
- The work plan for the implementation of the actions will be developed by officials in consultation with stakeholders.
- The F-P/T Priorities document will be up-dated and implemented on a three-year "rolling plan" basis.
- The F-P/T Priorities document is expected to be complemented by action plans developed by the federal government, provincial/territorial governments, and sport communities.



GNWT Increases Fur Price Program Payments

YELLOWKNIFE (April 9) -- The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) is increasing the Fur Price Program (FPP) payments it provides to trappers for trapped muskrats pelts.

The FPP program, administered by the Department of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED), offers NWT trappers an assured price for fur pelts in advance of auction. When fur pelts sell at auction, proceeds are charged against the advance with any residue being paid to the trapper.

NWT trappers currently receive a regular fur advance payment of \$2.50 per pelt plus an additional \$1.00 under the FPP for trapped muskrats. Today's announcement will increase the total advance payment for trapped muskrat pelts received in good condition to \$4.75

"The Fur Price Program is designed to be responsive to changes in fur prices RWED Minister Jim Antoine noted. "Muskrat pelts are bringing very good prices this year at various fur auctions."

The price will remain in effect until end of the 2002 Spring Trapping season.

GNWT to Lobby for Share of \$2Billion from Federal Infrastructure Fund

YELLOWKNIFE (April 11) - Premier Stephen Kakfwi says the GNWT will act quickly to ensure that federal money earmarked for infrastructure development in Canada flows to the Northwest Territories.

"It is in the best interest of both Canada and the Northwest Territories that this funding be targeted to strategic investments that will result in economic growth benefiting the North, the West and Canada," the Premier said.

An economic analysis completed by economists from the University of Calgary and released last week estimates that a Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline and economic spin-offs will add between \$40.8 and \$57 billion to Canada's gross domestic product and earn the federal government up to \$18 billion in revenue. More than 157,000 person-years of employment would be created over the lifetime of the project

"Strategic investments in infrastructure should support the development of NWT gas and a pipeline but also improve the quality of life for NWT residents at the community level," Mr. Kakfwi said.

The Premier's comments come on the heels of a visit to the NWT by Indian and Northern Affairs Minister Bob Nault and in response to recommendations from the NWT business coalition which recently lobbied federal Ministers and officials for investment in the NWT.

The federal government introduced its \$2 Billion Strategic Infrastructure Fund in December 2001 "to leverage public and private sector money for major projects across the country that meet the essential infrastructure needs of the 21st century economy and society."

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Transportation Minister Reaffirms Support for MacKenzie River Bridge

FORT PROVIDENCE (April 12) – Minister of Transportation Joseph Handley has reaffirmed the GNWT's qualified support for a privately built and operated bridge across the Mackenzie River (Deh Cho) at Fort Providence.

Speaking to members of the Fort Providence Combined Council Alliance, Mr. Handley said yesterday that the GNWT believes their proposal merits serious consideration and will make a contribution to advance work already completed by the Alliance. He also encouraged the Alliance to seek further support from the federal government.

"We like what we've seen so far," Mr. Handley said, "but we are not in a position to make a final commitment to the project at this time. We need to ensure that this is a good deal for the taxpayer and bridge users, as well as the community.

Mr Handley says the GNWT is prepared to work with the proponents of the project to confirm design and cost estimates, discuss financing arrangements and other terms of a potential agreement. The Department of Transportation, with the assistance of other departments, will also complete a comprehensive review of the proposal.

A feasibility study, funded through contributions from the GNWT and DIAND, was submitted to the government with a proposal in February. It proposes that the bridge would be privately financed and built with revenues coming from government savings and user fees. After 35 years the bridge would be handed over to the GNWT.

The Alliance, which includes the Deh Gah Got'ie Dene Council, the Fort Providence Metis Council and the Hamlet Council, welcomed the Minister's announcement. "We are very pleased with the Minister's response," Deh Cho MLA Michael McLeod said. "We know there is a lot of work to do, but this positive signal brings us one step closer".

Alliance representatives and Minister Handley concluded their meetings this week with an agreement to work towards a decision over the next few months.

NWT to use National Indicators to Measure Future Improvement

YELLOWKNIFE (April 15) -- Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes says results from the Canada-wide School Achievement Indicators Program (SAIP) will provide a valuable tool for educators in the Northwest Territories to assess the progress of NWT students.

However, the Minister says he has concerns about the level of NWT results.

The results, released last week, follow a pan-Canadian test of 13 and 16 year old students administered in the spring of 2001 by the Council of Ministers of Education, Canada (CMEC). In total, 41,000 students from across Canada were tested on either their ability to apply problem solving skills or understand mathematics content.

While NWT students overall scored better in the mathematical content component than in the problem solving assessment, they scored below the Canadian average in both age groups.

"The SAIP assessment is most valuable as a tool for monitoring progress within the NWT," Mr. Ootes said. "Combined with regular and ongoing assessment and evaluation in all NWT schools, these results will provide baseline data against which we can measure success in subsequent years,"

Additional details will be provided to the GNWT's Department of Education, Culture and Employment in a technical report that will enable the Department to conduct a thorough analysis of the results.

"I have instructed the department to complete an extensive analysis and come up with strategies to work, in consultations with education authorities throughout the NWT, to improve future test results," Mr. Ootes said.

"I'd like to see our results up there with the best of them."

NWT to use National Indicators to Measure Future Improvement YELLOWKNIFE (April 15)

The School Achievement Indicators Program (SAIP) is a cyclical program of pan-Canadian assessments of student achievement in mathematics, reading and writing, and science that has been conducted by the Council of Ministers of Education, Canada since 1993.

Because school curricula and the sequence in which specific content and skills are taught vary across the country, SAIP results help jurisdictions determine whether students across Canada reach similar levels of performance at about the same age.

The 2001 Mathematics results are the first available to the NWT since Division. In the NWT, 859 thirteen year olds and 442 sixteen year olds participated in the assessment.

SAIP results are most valuable as a tool for monitoring progress and are designed to complement existing assessments in each province and territory.

Assessment is an important part of academic advancement as it supports decisions related to program development and student promotion. In broader terms, regular assessment, using a wide range of assessment tools, helps inform decision making and policy development.

Details provided to the GNWT's Department of Education, Culture and Employment will enable educators and policy makers to identify measures to assess student performance on assessments and other factors within the education system that influence assessment results.

The strength of NWT schools and students also depends on factors like the continuity of teaching staff. The goal of the Aurora College Teacher Education program is to develop a homegrown northern teaching force in an effort to reduce teacher turnover, especially in small communities.

Initiatives like the Teacher Mentorship Program are intended to contribute to the retention of teachers by helping to ensure that teachers who are new to the North have the support they need to adapt quickly to the cultural and environmental adjustments many new teachers to the North encounter.

A new math curriculum was implemented in the NWT in 1996. Each January ECE provides inservice training for teachers who implement the Math curriculum in Yellowknife and regional centres. The need for more "hands on" learning opportunities in mathematics has been identified and a series of effective practices is being developed, documented and shared with parents and teachers.

A Student Support Needs Assessment carried out in all NWT schools two years ago provided the Department and the Divisional Education Councils with baseline data that identifies what types of support NWT students need to be successful. This data is being used to make informed decisions about programs needed to meet specific learning challenges in each school. In 2002, the

Department of Education Culture and Employment has committed an additional \$3 million to NWT schools specifically for student support.

In 1998, the Department of Education, Culture and Employment signed a Labour Market Development Agreement (LMDA) with the Government of Canada to deliver benefits and employment support for Employment Insurance claimants in the NWT. jobsnorth.ca is one more way of providing this information.

"This exciting new initiative is another demonstration of how NWT residents can embrace innovation to take command of their future," the Minister said.

Antoine says NWT is in Infrastructure Crisis

OTTAWA (April 16) – Minister of Resources Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine says the Northwest Territories is experiencing an infrastructure crisis.

Speaking to members of the Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs, Northern Development and Natural Resources, Mr. Antoine reiterated the GNWT's call for federal investment in the territory's infrastructure needs saying failure to do so could limit or impede the economic future of the NWT to the detriment of all Canadians.

"The pressures of resource development have strained our ability to provide new and maintain existing infrastructure," the Minister said. "Our highways are running past capacity and the municipal infrastructure of our communities is becoming overloaded."

The Minister is in Ottawa as part of a delegation headed by NWT Premier Stephen Kakfwi to lobby federal Cabinet ministers and the Prime Minister for a share of \$2Billion in Infrastructure funding announced by the federal government in the December 2001 budget.

Mr. Antoine also warned members of the Standing Committee that on-going debate in the US Senate to mandate a less economic gas pipeline route and provide subsidies for oil and gas producers could have a drastic impact on the development of Mackenzie Delta gas resources.

"It has compromised the Canadian position," he said.

The Minister encouraged the Government of Canada to evaluate the impact of oil and gas development in relation to its own position and the national interest.

"It is the dawn of a new era in the sustainable economic development of Canada," he said, "where the vision of a Canada that is prosperous from sea to sea to sea can finally be realized.

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Kakfwi says Federal Understanding has Increased for NWT Investment

OTTAWA (April 17) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says the Northwest Territories and the significance of NWT resource development to Canada are now legitimate features on the federal government's agenda. He says the support of INAC Minister Bob Nault and Western Arctic MP Ethel Blondin-Andrew has been critical in reaching this objective.

The Premier says federal officials have finally made the link between investing in NWT infrastructure and the contribution that NWT developments such as gas pipelines and diamond mines make to the economy of Southern Canada. The Premier, and Ministers Jim Antoine and Joe Handley, will conclude a three-day lobby in Ottawa today.

"Federal investment in NWT infrastructure will pay huge dividends for Canada," the Premier said. The federal government now understands the urgency we are placing on this issue. We need investment now because impacts are being felt now and preparations for future impacts must be started now."

In meetings with the Prime Minister, and Ministers John Manley and Paul Martin, the NWT delegation has also insisted that federal investment in the NWT, when it comes, must consider the inadequacy of percapita funding to the NWT and the GNWT's limited capacity to contribute in cost-sharing formulas.

"The GNWT is not about to reallocate resources from our social agenda to respond to the impacts being felt from resource development," Mr. Kakfwi said. That is why we are seeking federal investment."

The GNWT will formalize its proposal to the federal government later this month. Premier Kakfwi says it will be important for Industry and Aboriginal governments to endorse the GNWT's approach.

"We will need to demonstrate to the federal government that our collective investment not only responds to the need for better roads; a better quality of life for NWT residents; and getting the NWT into the economic mainstream – it also represents the fulfilling of a vision," he said.

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Premier and Ministers Encouraged by Week's Meetings

YELLOWKNIFE (April 19) Following a week of high-level meetings in Ottawa, Toronto and Calgary, Premier Stephen Kakfwi, Finance Minister Joe Handley and Resources Wildlife and Economic Development Minister Jim Antoine say they are encouraged by government and industry response to their efforts to promote investment in NWT infrastructure and resources.

The GNWT proposals seek federal investment from the Strategic Infrastructure Fund identified in the federal government's December 2001 Budget and are based on the GNWT's Non Renewable Resources Development Strategy (NRRDS) prepared, at the request of the federal government, two years ago.

Premier Stephen Kakfwi says NWT MP Ethel Blondin-Andrew and INAC Minister Bob Nault were critical to the success and timeliness of GNWT's meetings in Ottawa where the delegation met with Prime Minister Jean Chretien and Ministers Paul Martin and John Manley.

"We were able to cover a lot of ground," the Premier said.

Mr. Kakfwi, Mr. Handley and Mr. Antoine also used their travel to raise NWT concerns regarding US Senate initiatives to subsidize the transportation of Alaska gas and the potential consequences of such actions on the development of Mackenzie/Delta gas and a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline. Mr. Antoine spoke to members of the Standing Committee on Aboriginal Affairs, Northern Development and Natural Resources on Tuesday.

"MPs from all parties must remember that market disruptions by the United States government may strand Canada's NWT gas, he said. "These concerns need to be expressed to Washington."

Finance Minister Joe Handley, who leads the GNWT's efforts to secure federal funding, commended the contribution of the Northern Coalition, who lobbied in Ottawa for federal infrastructure investment in March. He says he's optimistic that both lobbies will pay off but warns that more work will be required.

"We will need to ensure continued support particularly from key federal Ministers," he said.

On Thursday, Premier Kakfwi also met with Premier Ernie Eves in Toronto to discuss potential benefits to Ontario from a Mackenzie Valley pipeline and NWT support for Ontario's emerging diamond industry.

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Finance Minister Says He Hopes Tax Increase will Discourage Smoking

YELLOWKNIFE (April 19) -- The Government of the Northwest Territories will increase its tobacco tax rate to 16.6 cents per cigarette and to 10.6 cents per gram of loose tobacco, Finance Minister Joe Handley announced today. The new rates will take effect on Monday (April 22, 2002). The tax rate on cigars will remain unchanged.

The new tax rate represents an increase of 75 cents for a pack of 25 cigarettes and increase of 2 cents per gram of loose tobacco. NWT tobacco taxes are determined based on a percentage of the retail price of cigarettes and tobacco. These retail prices have experienced a marked increase since the last change in tobacco tax rates of October 1, 2000.

Smoking is a major public health problem in the Northwest Territories. At 34 per cent, the smoking rate among adolescents in the Northwest Territories is twice the national rate.

"I hope that this does discourage individuals, especially young people, from smoking," Mr. Handley said.

Mr. Handley says evidence suggests that higher tobacco prices and taxes are an effective way to reduce and prevent smoking among adolescents. Various health organizations, including the Canadian Paediatric Society, recommend increased tobacco taxation as a means of reducing smoking among young people.

The increased tax revenue will also help to defray the costs associated with tobacco use. Based on a national study, the Department of Health and Social Services estimates the cost to the Northwest Territories for health care, residential care, fire damage, absenteeism from work and lost productivity from smoking to be \$31 million per year.

"Ultimately, the best way to reduce the severity and rate of tobacco-related illness is to decrease the number of people who start smoking," Mr. Handley noted.

Minister Announces Task Force on Organ and Tissue Donation

YELLOWKNIFE (April 23) – Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger today announced the appointment of a task force to review options for establishing an organ donor registry for the Northwest Territories.

The task force will define ways for NWT residents to become involved in organ and tissue donation and develop a long-term plan to improve NWT participation in the donation process. Task Force members include representatives from the Department of Health and Social Services, Stanton Regional Hospital and the general public.

"It is important to identify just how northerners, even living in this isolated area of Canada, might successfully participate in helping others who are in need," Mr. Miltenberger said.

In November 2001, the Minister committed to members of the Legislative Assembly that he would consider ways for NWT residents to use space on their NWT Health Care cards to allow for and facilitate organ donation. The task force is expected to have an action plan for this project in place by August.

I believe that many NWT residents would like to do more to support organ and tissue donation in Canada," Mr. Miltenberger said.

April 21-28 is National Organ Donor Awareness Week. At 13.7 per million of population, Canada's organ and tissue donation rate is one of the lowest rates among industrialized countries. Approximately 3,700 Canadians are waiting for organ transplants that could enhance or save their lives. From 1995 to 2000, 26 Northerners benefited from organ and tissue transplants.

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Minister Commends Retailers for Compliance with Tobacco Act

YELLOWKNIFE (April 23) – Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger today congratulated retailers in Hay River and Enterprise for their compliance with the federal *Tobacco Act*.

In a recent undercover investigation, a Health Canada Tobacco Enforcement Officer monitored eight, of the 14 retailers in Hay River/Enterprise who sell tobacco products to the public. None of the eight retailers sold tobacco products to underage youth.

Our efforts to discourage smoking by NWT youth is reliant on our partnerships with communities, health professionals and the private sector," Mr. Miltenberger said. "By refusing to sell cigarettes to minors, NWT retailers do a lot to prevent young people from lighting up for the first time."

The Department of Health and Social Services and the Health and Social Services Authorities work closely with Health Canada to support the federal *Tobacco Act*. Environmental Health Officers work together with the Federal Tobacco Enforcement Officer to educate NWT tobacco retailers about their responsibilities under the law.

A federal Tobacco Enforcement Officer visits NWT communities on a random basis every six to eight weeks to monitor compliance.

- 4. The purpose of this Act is to provide a legislative response to a national public health problem of substantial and pressing concern and, in particular,
 - a. to protect the health of Canadians in light of conclusive evidence implicating tobacco use in the incidence of numerous debilitating and fatal diseases;
 - b. to protect young persons and others from inducements to use tobacco products and the consequent dependence on them;
 - c. to protect the health of young persons by restricting access to tobacco products; and
 - d. to enhance public awareness of the health hazards of using tobacco products.
 - e.

PARTII

Access

Furnishing tobacco products

8. (1) No person shall furnish a tobacco product to a young person in a public place or in a place to which the public reasonably has access.

Defence

- (2) A person shall not be found to have contravened subsection
 - 1. if it is established that the person attempted to verify that the person was at least eighteen years of age by asking for and being shown documentation prescribed for the purposes of verifying age, and believed on reasonable grounds that the documentation was authentic.

Signs

9. Every retailer shall post, at retail, in the prescribed place and manner, signs in the prescribed form and with the prescribed content, that inform the public that the sale or giving of a tobacco product to a young person is prohibited by law, or that contain a prescribed health message, unless that retailer is exempted by the regulations from the requirement to post the signs.

Kakfwi Says Proposed Subsidies Threaten Marketability of Canadian NWT Gas

YELLOWKNIFE (April 24) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says he's concerned that an amendment, introduced yesterday, to a US Senate Energy Bill will strand Canadian natural gas and severely distort the North American gas market.

The tax amendment, designed to ensure construction of an Alaska natural gas pipeline, proposes floor price subsidies for Prudeau Bay gas producers worth up to \$2 million US per day to at last year's average natural gas price. Premier Kakfwi says proponents of the proposed Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline should be alarmed.

"The US Senate is gearing up to underwrite a pipeline project that is uneconomic," he said. "These subsidies could threaten the viability of North American natural gas markets and potentially undermine the need for a Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline for the foreseeable future."

The NWT Premier says there is no reason for American taxpayers and natural gas consumers to pay subsidies to companies that earned profits in excess of \$10 billion dollars US last year.


"Canada has a cheaper, faster and equally effective answer to North America's Energy needs," he said. "The Government of Canada has got to evaluate the impact of these measures in relation to Canadian interests. Action is required at the highest level to ensure fairness and balance consistent with US Canada energy trade relations."

An economic analysis completed by economists from the University of Calgary estimates that a Mackenzie Valley pipeline and economic spin-offs from the project will add between \$40.8 and \$57 billion to Canada's gross domestic product and earn the federal government up to \$18 billion in revenue. More than 157,000 person-years of employment would be created over the lifetime of the Canadian pipeline project

Minister Congratulates First NWT Diamond Polishers YELLOWKNIFE (April 25)

Diamond Polishing consists of two phases, crossworking and brillianteering. A crossworker creates the 17 primary facets of a rough diamond and is the second-to-last step in the diamond polishing process. The final step is brillianteering, in which the facets are polished.

Tina Nasholm-Rudkevitch has worked at Sirius Diamonds since 1998. The first woman to receive her certification, she took an intensive six month diamond polishing program in Victoria – a joint venture between Aurora College, Vancouver Community College and Sirius Diamonds, then pursued her interest at Sirius Diamonds where she is employed as a Crossworker. Tina says Occupational Certification gives Diamond Polishers a goal to work toward. The designation she has earned gives her a sense of accomplishment and, she believes, an acknowledgement of her skills by other diamond professionals.

Michael Brown also participated in the six month program in Victoria. He began working at Sirius in 1998. Although Diamond Polishing is quite different from what he thought it would be, Mr. Brown enjoys his work so much that he has encouraged others to begin working at Sirius. He's been involved in training some of these new employees and enjoys that aspect of the job, as well as the opportunity he has to work on large stones. He is now looking forward to obtaining a second endorsement as a Fancy Cut Specialist.


Tom Lupton is currently employed as a Brillianteer at Sirius. He says the highlight of his job is enhancing the natural beauty of the stone. He especially enjoys working on large stones and has been with Sirius since 1999, following the completion of the first Aurora College "Introduction to Diamonds" program.

Nearly 50 individuals are currently enrolled in Occupational Certification programs in the Diamond Industry at Sirius, Deton' Cho Diamonds and Arslanian Cutting Works in Yellowknife.

The certification program was piloted by two individuals who moved north with Sirius Diamonds in 1998. Brad Taylor, one of the individuals, is currently a trainer with Sirius Diamonds.

Mr. Finnemore has been in the diamond business in Belgium, South Africa and Siberia since 1965. He joined Sirius in 1998 and says the most gratifying thing about his work is passing along his knowledge and experience to students and watching the first NWT polishing plant become a success."







Collective Agreement Reached

YELLOWKNIFE (April 29) -- The Union of Northern Workers and the Government of the Northwest Territories have reached agreement for the renewal of their Collective Agreement.

Bargaining took place between the two parties during the week of April 22, 2002 with an agreement achieved on April 26, 2002. Both parties are pleased with the progress that was made during bargaining. Many improvements have been made to the employee compensation package.


Agreement was reached on issues including:

- A three year agreement, with increases to the pay line of 3% per year;
- Annual leave entitlements improved for employees with seven and more years of service;
- Shift changes require 14 days notice or overtime is paid for the first new shift;
- A \$440 increase to the Northern Allowance amounts for each community, with a commitment to review the Northern Allowance methodology;
- Availability of winter bonus days for employees who are not permitted to take their vacation during the winter months;
- Improvements to shift premiums and standby pay;
- Parental leave top up increases from 12 weeks to 17 weeks;
- Employees who act in a higher level position will receive a minimum of a 10% increase for the acting period;
- Reimbursement for professional membership fees;
- National Aboriginal Day is recognized as a statutory holiday;
- Standardization of language for hours of work for shift workers.

Antoine says Benefits of a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline are Long Term

YELLOWKNIFE (May 3) -- Minister of Resources Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine says the benefits of an Alaska highway pipeline do not compare to those of a Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline, which will open up new areas of Canadian gas for development and spawn development of the Canadian petroleum industry.

Commenting on a report commissioned by the Yukon Government, Mr. Antoine cautioned northerners to maintain a long-term outlook.

"There is no doubt that the construction of a pipeline, along the Alaska Highway will create employment and revenue, he said, "but at what cost? Subsidies proposed by US politicians to facilitate the construction of an Alaska pipeline will distort the North American natural gas markets significantly."

The Minister says he does not believe that provinces that produce and export natural gas are prepared to take that risk.

"What's in it for British Columbia beyond some intensive construction activity in BC and the Yukon over two or three winter seasons?" he asked. "What long-term benefits will Alberta derive from a bullet pipeline which simply moves Alaska gas through their province to Chicago? Canada must protest these subsidies."

The Government of the Northwest Territories maintains that Canada should support the development of Canadian gas reserves first. Economic studies show the potential impact of gas development in the NWT at \$57 billion dollars

"The economic impact of developing new gas resources in the NWT and connecting Mackenzie Delta natural gas to southern markets via a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline dramatically increases the benefits to Canadian industry and governments," Mr. Antoine noted.



Report Supports GNWT's Concerns about Alaskan Natural Gas Subsidies

YELLOWKNIFE (May 13) -- A report by an international energy industry consulting firm supports the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) assertion that proposed subsidies for Alaskan natural gas will severely distort the North American gas market.

The report, produced by Purvin & Gertz, examines the impact of the recent Energy Bill, passed by the United States Senate, allowing for a tax credit subsidy that sets the floor price of Alaskan natural gas at \$3.25 US in Alberta.

The report concludes that such a subsidy will eliminate the market risk for Alaskan gas and negatively impact production in all other North American gas basins. Long-term natural gas price forecasts for Alberta are all below this floor price. The study concludes that the annual subsidy could be as high as \$3US Billion and could be as high as \$45US Billion over a 15-year period.

"It supports what we have been saying," Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine, said. "Alaskan natural gas subsidies will hurt the development of Canada's natural gas resources possibly stranding NWT gas. The federal government must take an aggressive stand against these proposed subsidies, work with the NWT to ensure that Canadian gas is developed first and invest now to ensure that it happens."

Economic studies show that the potential economic impact of natural gas development in the NWT is \$57 billion nation wide.

Premier and Minister Call for Improvements to Canada's Health System

YELLOWKNIFE (May 16) - Minister of Health and Social Services, Michael Miltenberger says a comprehensive and integrated approach is needed to improve health care in Canada. The Minister and NWT Premier Stephen Kakfwi spoke today to the *Commission on the Future of Health Care in Canada* presenting eleven specific recommendations to its Commissioner Roy Romanow.

Mr. Miltenberger detailed many of the reform initiatives described in the GNWT's *Health and Social Services System Action Plan*. He emphasized the importance of collaboration between legislators, aboriginal leaders, health practitioners and other service providers to ensure accessible, high quality services for all NWT residents.

"We must act as one system if we are to be successful in providing the best possible service," Mr. Miltenberger said.

The Premier challenged the federal government to accept its fiduciary responsibility for providing health care to all Aboriginal people in Canada and to live up to commitments it has made to advance the health status of Aboriginal people.

"The piece-by-piece, bit-by-bit approach to providing health care for Aboriginal people does not work anywhere in this country," he said.

The GNWT's presentations highlighted many challenges to providing health care in the NWT They include the high costs of medical travel, the recruitment and retention of health care professionals and the increasing demands brought about by the rapid pace of economic development.

"While the health system itself needs reform, NWT residents must also play a direct role by choosing healthy lifestyles," Mr. Miltenberger noted.

"We have made a commitment to the people of the Northwest Territories that we will take a balanced approach to economic and social development," the Premier said. "I believe that our health care system is sustainable. It is, however, under funded."

"We are proud of the advances in our fur, fashion and jewelry design industries and look forward to celebrating the talents and achievements of our territory's talented artisan, craftspeople and designers."

Symposium delegates will see the *Beneath the Dancing Skies* production on Wednesday, June 19, 2002. A second show for the general public will be held on Thursday, June 20, 2002. Both shows will be staged at the Northern Arts and Cultural Centre in Yellowknife.

"Staging a show of this magnitude also provides an opportunity to train NWT residents in advanced lighting, sound, stage management and modelling techniques," Mr. Antoine noted. "This investment will raise the level of technical skills within our small, but growing, performing arts, television and film industry."

Handley to deliver Infrastructure Fund Request to Ottawa

(May 21) - Finance and Transportation Minister Joseph Handley will travel to Ottawa this week to deliver the GNWT's proposal for federal investment in NWT infrastructure development.

The GNWT committed to formalizing the \$133 million proposal in April following meetings with Canada's Prime Minister and key Cabinet members.

Federal officials have told the GNWT that the federal Strategic Infrastructure Fund (SIF), introduced in the December 2001 federal budget, is intended to flow funds to projects contributing to the economic growth and activity of all Canadians.

To that end, Mr. Handley will also deliver the recently published Wright Mansell report: An Evaluation of the Economic Impacts Associated with the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline and Mackenzie Delta Gas Development.

The report confirms the economic impact of a Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline and associated spinoffs at between \$40.8 and \$57 billion to Canada's gross domestic product. The project will also earn the federal government up to \$18 billion in revenue while creating 157,000 person-years of employment across Canada.

Options must Fit Kyoto Framework Antoine Says

CHARLOTTE TOWN (May 22) -- Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine says any new options to address climate change nationally must fit within the Kyoto framework.

"The Kyoto protocol is the only coordinated global plan on climate change," he noted.

Mr. Antoine reminded Canadian Environment and Energy Ministers meeting in Charlottetown vesterday that residents of the NWT are already experiencing the effects of climate change. He reiterated the NWT's commitment to continue working with Canada, the provinces and territories to develop options that will allow Canada to ratify the Kyoto Protocol.

Energy and environment Ministers yesterday reviewed Canada's discussion paper providing options to reach Canada's Kyoto target for reducing greenhouse gas emissions. An Alberta plan of action was also considered.

"Climate change is one of the most significant issues facing the world today. Northerners in particular must learn as much as possible about climate change to make the most informed decision on what actions to take," Mr. Antoine said.

A meeting to review the federal discussion paper with NWT stakeholders will be held in Yellowknife next month. It will be one in a series of stakeholder and public consultation sessions sponsored by the federal government to take place across Canada in June.

In support of its commitment to address climate change, the Government of the Northwest Territories is finalizing a greenhouse gas strategy and is in the process of consolidating its approach to the use of energy through a broad energy strategy.

In addition to investing in energy efficiency and supporting the development of alternative energy sources, the GNWT is also promoting the development of Mackenzie Delta gas reserves and hydroelectricity to increase the availability of clean energy sources for territorial, Canadian and North American markets.

Handley delivers Transportation Infrastructure Proposal

Ottawa (May 23) -- Minister of Finance Joseph Handley has delivered a Government of the Northwest Territories' transportation infrastructure proposal aimed at Ottawa's new \$2 billion Strategic Infrastructure Fund.

Titled, *Corridors for Canada*, the proposal calls for a federal investment of \$133 million in two NWT transportation corridors: the Mackenzie Valley and the Slave Geologic Province over a four-year period beginning in 2003/04.

The proposal could realize the construction of permanent bridges on the Mackenzie Valley winter road, reconstruction of the Dempster Highway and first-phase construction of the Inuvik-Tuktoyaktuk road. In the Slave Geologic Province corridor, the proposal identifies funding for the Deh Cho Bridge across the Mackenzie River near Fort Providence, reconstruction and paving of a section of Highway 3 and reconstruction of Highway 4.

The GNWT would contribute an additional \$67 million to the infrastructure plan. Aboriginal and industry partners would add another \$43 million.

"Industry cannot be expected to fully fund improvements to the public highway system, but should contribute to certain projects according to the benefits derived," Mr. Handley said.

The GNWT committed to formalizing its proposal in April following meetings with Canada's Prime Minister and Cabinet members. It is based on infrastructure requirements presented in the GNWT's Non-Renewable Resource Development Strategy.

"It is an investment in the vast resource potential of the Northwest Territories which includes oil and gas exploration and development, a Mackenzie Valley pipeline, expansion of the diamond mining sector, hydro development and opportunities for expansion of the tourism sector, Mr Handley said.

Miltenberger Meets with Federal Health Minister

YELLOWKNIFE (May 29) -- Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger says a meeting with federal Minister of Health Anne McLellan will provide the basis for continuing collaboration between the territorial and federal governments.

Mr. Miltenberger says the May 24th meeting in Edmonton highlighted a mutual interest in strengthening prevention and promotion activities.

"I was very pleased with Ms. McLellan's interest in working co-operatively to identify and address key issues," he said.

In discussions surrounding the Prairie Northern Pacific Fetal Alcohol Syndrome Partnership, which recently held its annual conference in Whitehorse, the two Health Ministers agreed that this partnership is an excellent example of how governments can share resources and move forward on improving FAS programs and supports.

Mr. Miltenberger raised several unresolved matters. Specifically, he identified the importance of improved communications and the need for a northern office for the Northern Secretariat of Health Canada.

"I feel that the Northern Secretariat, which has been organized to serve all three territories, should be located in the North and not in Ottawa," Mr. Miltenberger said.

Mr. Miltenberger also highlighted the need for sustained federal support for the NWT health system. He briefed the Minister on the GNWT's presentation to the Romanow Commission, including its call for a revised approach to funding which will recognize Northern needs and the critical importance of training health professionals to work in all areas of Canada.

Kakfwi Convinced of Ottawa's Support for Mackenzie Delta Gas Development

OTTAWA (May 30) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says he's convinced that the federal government will not allow Mackenzie Delta gas to be stranded.

The Premier's comments follow meetings with a number of federal Ministers aimed at securing infrastructure investment from the federal Strategic Infrastructure Fund (SIF). Mr. Kakfwi says he's confident that Ottawa will support Mackenzie Valley pipeline development and that the US Administration will confirm their stated position that North American markets determine the route and timing of any natural gas project.

The Premier first identified in April that proposed US Senate subsidies for Alaska gas would prevent Canadian NWT gas from reaching its market. In a meeting today with federal Resources Minister Herb Dhaliwal, Premier Kakfwi expressed appreciation for the federal Minister's stand and was assured that the fight will continue until these subsidies are removed from the US Senate energy bill.

Mr. Dhaliwal has not been alone in his support for Canadian gas. Canada's Deputy Prime Minister John Manley has also expressed grave concerns about the potentially market-distorting gas subsidies. Canada's US Ambassador Kergin expressed similar sentiments in an editorial for the Wall Street Journal. Meanwhile, trade Minister Pierre Pettigrew this week announced a program to promote Canada's trade messages on softwood lumber, agriculture and energy in the United States.

Premier Kakfwi says that while more work and support are still required, these developments bode well for the development of a Mackenzie Valley gas pipeline.

"Ottawa understands the benefits to Canada. Studies prove Alberta, British Columbia and Ontario will benefit substantially and increasingly Yukoners are being employed in the Beaufort Delta. Meanwhile, I will continue working to get Canada's Premiers on side," the Premier said.

More meetings are planned tomorrow with federal Ministers.

Government Takes Action on Tobacco

YELLOWKNIFE (May 31) – Marking World No Tobacco Day, Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger today released the GNWT's Action On Tobacco strategy.

The strategy outlines how the GNWT will address high rates of smoking in NWT society highlighted in Smoke Alarm, a report released by the Department of Health and Social Services one year ago. The strategy identifies 12 actions in four main areas of focus: prevention, protection, cessation and denormalization.

"For many NWT residents, smoking is considered normal, even respected, behavior," Mr. Miltenberger said. "It is not enough to protect youth from environmental tobacco smoke or assist smokers in overcoming their addiction. We must take a leadership role in changing attitudes towards smoking so that smoking is regarded as an unhealthy and undesirable behaviour in the eyes of our youth."

The Departments of Health and Social Services, Education, Culture and Employment, Municipal and Community Affairs and the Workers' Compensation Board contributed to the development of the strategy,

NWT Chief Medical Health Officer Dr. Andre Corriveau says to successfully reduce smoking in NWT homes and communities the issue must be tackled on a number of fronts.

"No single agency can reduce the prevalence of smoking in the NWT. It is only through coordinated actions by both government and communities that we will begin to influence how NWT residents regard smoking and see an improvement," he said.

Territorial Infrastructure Lobby Builds Federal Support

OTTAWA (May 31) -- Minister of Finance Joe Handley says a second round of meetings in Ottawa is helping to build a solid understanding of the NWT's transportation requirements among federal Ministers.

Mr. Handley and Premier Stephen Kakfwi met Thursday and Friday with Minister of Indian and Northern Affairs Nault, Minister of Resources Dhaliwal, Minister of Transportation Collenette and Minister of Industry Rock in Ottawa. They continued to lobby federal Ministers on the GNWT's Strategic Infrastructure Fund proposal: *Corridors for Canada* calling for shared federal and GNWT transportation infrastructure investments over the next four years.

"Support is growing among federal Ministers for federal investments now," Mr. Handley said.

The GNWT's proposal includes a highway and bridge investment program of \$200 million over four years with a federal share of \$133 million and an NWT share of \$66 million. The package also proposes additional industry contributions of \$43 million primarily through tolls on the proposed Deh Cho bridge.

"A key feature of our package is strong private sector and industry support," Mr. Handley noted The Inuvialuit Regional Corporation and Gwitch'in Tribal Council have already provided letters of support.

Federal Ministers are particularly interested in knowing how federal investment will provide concrete benefits to both the Northwest Territories and Canada.

"Benefits are not limited to improving the quality of life for NWT residents who drive and depend on NWT highways," Premier Kakfwi noted. "Federal investment will serve to accelerate and facilitate diamond mine, natural gas and pipeline developments in the NWT which will benefit all of Canada and particularly Alberta, British Columbia, and Ontario."

A federal response to the GNWT proposal is expected by the fall of 2002.


In the past, if a person became incapable of handling their financial affairs, an application had to be made to the Supreme Court. This required a lawyer and involved medical and financial assessments. Under the new *Act*, this costly and time-consuming process is avoided.

GNWT Takes Action on Review of Seniors Programs

YELLOWKNIFE (June 5) – Minister of Health and Social Services and Minister Responsible for Seniors J. Michael Miltenberger says government actions to improve programs and services for NWT seniors will produce tangible results over the course of one year.

The Minister today introduced an *Action Plan for Seniors Programs and Services* in response to issues identified by seniors and the GNWT and documented in a *Review of Programs and Services for Seniors*. The Action Plan identifies 28 specific actions to be taken by various GNWT departments and the NWT Seniors Society over the next year to improve seniors programming across departments and at the community level.

"This plan builds on the existing base of seniors programs and services, and creates an ongoing forum for seniors issues with both the current and future political leadership of this government," Mr. Miltenberger said.

In June 2000, Members of the Legislative Assembly recommended a comprehensive review of seniors programs and services. A multi-agency working group was created with representation from the NWT Seniors Society and GNWT Departments of Executive; Health and Social Services; Education, Culture and Employment; Municipal and Community Affairs; the Financial Management Board Secretariat; NWT Bureau of Statistics and the NWT Housing Corporation.

A series of public consultations were held in eleven communities across the NWT during the spring of 2001.

RWED Minister to Address World Diamond Congress

YELLOWKNIFE (June 14) – Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED) Jim Antoine will emphasize the Northwest Territories' growing international reputation as a diamond producing and manufacturing centre when he addresses delegates at the World Diamond Congress in Vancouver on Monday.

"This has to change," Mr. Antoine says. "To be truly Canadian, a polished diamond must be mined, cut and polished in Canada. We take exception to the confusion and uncertainty the Competition Bureau is creating for the Canadian diamond industry."

The World Diamond Congress will provide an opportunity for the Government of the Northwest Territories to promote its diamond certification program and explore further marketing opportunities for Canadian ArcticTM diamonds.

"We want to see that benefits to our residents and Canadians are maximized," the Minister said. "Recognizing that a Canadian diamond must be cut and polished in Canada is critical to the success of our growing diamond cutting and polishing industry."

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Historic Signings Mark Government's Commitment to the Future

YELLOWKNIFE (June 19) -- Minister of Aboriginal Affairs Jim Antoine says the settlement and implementation of land resources and self government agreements across the NWT is an important commitment by the GNWT to the future of the Northwest Territories.

Addressing members of the Legislative Assembly today, Mr Antoine noted that two historic agreements, to be celebrated this weekend, will work to give NWT residents greater control, authority and responsibility over decisions in their communities and their regions.

On Saturday in Fort Smith, the Salt River First Nation will host a ceremonial signing ceremony to commemorate their treaty settlement agreement signed in January of this year.

"This Agreement represents the fulfillment of Canada's obligations to the Salt River First Nation based on Treaty 8 signed over 100 years ago," the Minister said.

On Sunday in Inuvik, the Gwich'in and Inuvialuit will celebrate the signing of the Beaufort Delta Agreement-in-Principle. Final Agreement negotiations will lead to new and restructured governments for the Beaufort Delta Region to serve and represent all residents, while respecting the Gwich'in and Inuvialuit inherent right of self-government.

"It serves as an example to other regions across Canada that a new relationship can be forged between Aboriginal and Non Aboriginal people to realize political change," Mr. Antoine said.

Weekend celebrations in Fort Smith and Inuvik have been scheduled to coincide with territorial celebrations of National Aboriginal Day, celebrated for the first time this year as a statutory holiday for NWT residents.

The Minister of Aboriginal Affairs will travel with NWT Premier Stephen Kakfwi, Minister of Health and Social Services Michael Miltenberger, federal Minister of Indian and Northern Affairs Bob Nault and Western Arctic MP Ethel Blondin Andrew to join NWT residents in their celebrations.

Governments to Provide Advance for Healing

YELLOWKNIFE (June 20) The Governments of Nunavut and the Northwest Territories will advance \$3.2 million to fund treatment plans and pay expert expenses related to the healing and recovery of individuals abused by Edward Horne. Eighteen plaintiffs began treatment at the Somba K'e Healing Lodge in Yellowknife June 17, 2002.

The advance payment comes as a result of significant progress in negotiations between the Governments and representatives of the 82 plaintiffs and three estates. A previous advance of almost \$1milion was made to plaintiffs in January, 2002.

Legal action was commenced against the NWT and Nunavut governments in January 2001 for damages incurred by plaintiffs from sexual abuse between 1971 and 1985 when Mr. Horne was employed as a teacher for the Government of the Northwest Territories. Agreement was reached that year to use alternative dispute resolution procedures available under the rules of the court to work towards an expeditious settlement of the litigation.

Counsel for the plaintiffs and defendants will continue to negotiate over the summer and are optimistic that a settlement of all claims can be achieved by the end of September.


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Agreement Reached in Equal Pay Complaint

YELLOWKNIFE (June 25) -- Minister Responsible for the GNWT Public Service Joe Handley, National President of the Public Service Alliance of Canada (PSAC) Nycole Turmel and Acting Chief Commissioner of the Canadian Human Rights Commission (CHRC) Anne Adams today announced a settlement has been reached in the equal pay for work of equal value pay dispute filed against the GNWT by the PSAC in 1989.

The negotiated settlement respects and protects the rights of former and current GNWT unionized employees and addresses the legal and financial concerns of the three parties.

The settlement, to be shared by thousands of eligible current and former unionized indeterminate, term and casual employees, is valued at \$50 million. Compensation eligibility will be based on a person's position and length of service in a variety of female dominated occupational groups that existed in various GNWT Departments, Boards and Agencies between March 28, 1989 and March 31, 1998.

"This is a fair and equitable settlement," the Minister said. "It respects the rights of our employees, it effectively and efficiently ends years of potential legal processes and financial uncertainty for employees, taxpayers and the government, and it allows us to now focus our energies on building a strong public service to deliver programs and services to Northerners."

"Once again, our determination and perseverance in the fight for equal pay for work of equal value has paid off. With this agreement, the work of all of our members employed by the GNWT has been recognized. It is a tremendous achievement for all concerned," PSAC National President, Nycole Turmel said.

Anne Adams, Acting Chief Commissioner of the CHRC, welcomed the result, noting that the Commission had been instrumental in assisting the Union and the GNWT to reach an agreement. "It is in everyone's interest to end this lengthy litigation. Settlements like this help to close the wage gap between men and women."

Of the total \$50 million, some \$23 million has already been distributed to 4,300 unionized current and past GNWT employees.

The Canadian Human Rights Tribunal officially approved the terms of the settlement on June 25, 2002 with the issuance of a Consent Order. The Consent Order acknowledges the settlement meets all the requirements of the Canadian Human Rights Act and thus brings the complaint process to an end.

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The first compensation payments will be mailed out in December 2002. The process of compensating eligible employees will be completed by December 31, 2004.

The GNWT will undertake a publicity campaign to inform people of the agreement and how it might affect them.

Income Tax Reductions to Take Effect July 1

YELLOWKNIFE (June 26) -- Reductions in the NWT's personal and corporate income tax rates take effect July 1, 2002. Minister of Finance Joe Handley, announced the personal income tax reductions in the February 2002 Budget. The Minister announced the corporate income tax cuts earlier this month.

Effective July 1, 2002, the general corporate income tax rate will decline from 14 per cent to 12 per cent. The small business rate will decline from 5 per cent to 4 per cent.

Source income tax deductions from employees' wages and salaries will also be adjusted July 1st to reflect increases announced in the February Budget for the Personal Basic Amount, Married and Equivalent-to-Married Amounts, Age Amount and Disability Amount.

Employees who are declaring an age amount, disability amount, or are claiming a spouse, common-law partner, or equivalent-to-married status, and want the increased credits recognized in the tax withheld from their pay, should provide their employers with a revised TD1NT.

Taxpayers not claiming any of these credits do not need to fill out a new form. New TD1NT forms are available at: http://www.ccra-adrc.gc.ca/E/pbg/tf/td1nteq/td1nt-02e.pdf Taxpayers do not need to fill out a new federal TD1.



Other members of the Board of Directors are Albert Elias of Inuvik, Charles Furlong of Aklavik and Darrel Beaulieu of Yellowknife.



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GNWT Increases Fur Price Payment Programs

YELLOWKNIFE (July 19) -- The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) is increasing the Fur Price Program (FPP) it provides to trappers for seal pelts.

The FPP program, administered by the Department of Resources Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED), offers NWT trappers an assured price for pelts in advance of auction.

These prices will be based on the grade of a pelt: Grade 'A' pelts will receive \$60, grade 'B' pelts \$45 and grade 'C' pelts \$30.

Minister of Resources Wildlife and Economic Development, Jim Antoine says changes in the fur price program are based on community consultation and market fluctuations.

"We are very excited that NWT seal pelts are once-again in high demand," he said. "In the past three year, we have witnessed an increase in the price of seal pets. We are adjusting our program to stay competitive in the market."

The new prices will take effect for this summer's harvest.

Minister Announces Increases to Homeownership Program for Yellowknife

YELLOWKNIFE (July 23) -- The Northwest Territories Housing Corporation will provide affordable homeownership under the Expanded Downpayment Assistance Program (EDAP) for up to 189 families in Yellowknife over the next five years.

The Expanded Downpayment Assistance Program (EDAP) assists families in purchasing homes through conventional financing by providing down payment or loan assistance, based on a sliding scale, geared to income.

Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation Roger Allen says the NWT Housing Corporation will broaden its criteria for EDAP client selection in Yellowknife beginning in mid-August.

"There is a severe housing shortage in Yellowknife right now. We are addressing this problem head-on," Mr. Allen said. "This initiative will work to provide more families with an opportunity to own homes while increasing the availability of public housing units to low-income clients."

For applicants who meet the criteria, first priority will be given to existing tenants in subsidized rental housing units and then to applicants who have been on the waiting list for subsidized rental housing for a continuous period of over one past year.

"The housing crisis in Yellowknife requires a quick and decisive response," Mr. Allen noted.



Minister Announces Increases to Homeownership Program for Yellowknife YELLOWKNIFE (July 23)

The NWT Housing Corporation will begin delivering EDAP in Yellowknife in mid-August 2002.

The objective of the Expanded Downpayment Assistance Program (EDAP) is to provide assistance for families to obtain homeownership through conventional financing. Under the Program, the NWT Housing Corporation makes downpayment assistance available to reduce the monthly operating expenses for those clients who wish to buy, build or repair their home.

The level of assistance available varies depending on the client's income and the cost of the home being bought, built or repaired. The client must qualify for a private mortgage or loan. The mortgage or loan is based on the cost of the house less the sliding scale subsidy provided by the NWT Housing Corporation.

For new construction, purchase or purchase/repairs, the sliding scale subsidy ranges from 40% of the cost (maximum construction cost of \$180,000 including land) for lower families to 10% for higher income families.

Under the repair or expansion (addition of new bedrooms in case of overcrowding) option, the maximum eligible project cost is \$67,500 (75% of the building component (\$90,000) of the maximum construction cost). The sliding scale subsidy ranges from 40% for lower income families to 25% for higher income families.

The Corporation's first priority for delivery of EDAP in Yellowknife will be applicants who currently are tenants in a subsidized rental housing unit or applicants who have been on a waiting list for a subsidized rental housing unit for a continuous period of over one year.

Client Criteria

The client must be at least nineteen (19) years of age or older and have resided in the NWT for five (5) years, one (1) year of which must be continuous prior to approval.

Clients who have previously received assistance under specified programs may not be eligible for assistance under the EDAP.

The client's income must be below the Core Need Income Threshold (CNIT) for Yellowknife.

The CNIT is the maximum level of income that a household can earn and qualify for Housing Corporation programs.

The client is required to have a mortgage or loan approved.

The client must have sufficient income to pay for all ongoing operating, mortgage/loan and maintenance costs for the house.

Clients who already own their houses are only eligible for the repair/expansion portion of the program.

Clients who reside outside community boundaries will be eligible if they qualify for mortgage financing or CMHC is willing to underwrite the mortgage. Others may still receive assistance from a NWTHC guarantee to the bank on a case-by-case basis;

The assistance provided under the program is limited to one loan per client and his/her partner on a once in a lifetime basis for home purchase and new construction.

Land tenure must be acceptable.

The Aviation Career Development Program provides money, summer employment and mentoring to NWT aviation students. The bursary program is jointly funded by the Department of Transportation and Canadian North and supported by Northern Air Transport Association.

"Aviation has played a key role in the development of the North and will continue to be a vital factor in our continuing economic growth, Minister of Transportation Joe Handley said. "We are grateful for the support this program has received from both Canadian North and NATA."

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Department of Transportation to Host National Airports Roadeo in Yellowknife

The roadeo is open to the public at no charge and will be staged on the grounds of Adlair Air located at the western end of Yellowknife Airport.

Kakfwi Outlines US Subsidy Battle at Annual Premiers Conference

HALIFAX (August 02) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says the US administration, Canadian government and natural gas producers on both sides of the border agree that an Alaska natural gas floor-price subsidy, included in US Senate energy legislation, must be removed before it is approved by the President.

"US Energy Secretary Abraham has made it clear to the Senate that the US administration will not accept a billion dollar-a-year subsidy on Alaska gas, he said. "Minister Dhaliwal has also made it clear that the Canadian federal government will not allow Mackenzie Delta gas to be stranded at the expense of this subsidized Alaska gas."

The NWT Premier thanked the American and Canadian governments for their support. "Several Alaska producers also say that an Alaska gas pipeline is uneconomical at this time and for the foreseeable future," he noted.

The Alaska gas floor-price subsidy will distort North American gas market by removing all market risk for Alaska North Slope gas and leaving all other North American production, including Mackenzie Delta gas reserves, subject to risk - possibly stranding Canada's NWT gas for over a decade.

While the NWT opposes market-distorting subsidies, it recognizes that public investment through loan guarantees and profit-sensitive royalty regimes may be required to share the risks of Arctic energy projects.

The Premier remains confident that producers will go forward with an application to construct a Mackenzie Valley pipeline sometime in 2003. He says the elimination of Alaska gas subsidy provisions in US legislation will create further confidence and serve to accelerate the process.

Speaking at the Annual Premiers' Conference in Halifax, the NWT Premier also gave strong support to ratification of the Kyoto Protocol on greenhouse gas emissions.

"It's time for action by governments because we are already feeling the effects of climate change in the North," he said.

PREMIER'S STATEMENT

The August 5, 2002 edition of the News/North contains a report entitled "Big city dreamers can go south: Premier".

The report is based upon comments I made three weeks ago at the Dene Nation Annual Assembly in Fort Simpson.

In my remarks today, I want to set the context for my comments and to clarify any misunderstanding which the News/North report may have created.

As Premier I have been a strong advocate of developing NWT resources.

I will continue to be a strong advocate, but always on the condition that we have the ability to make decisions on the management and development of our resources and to control the impacts which resource development bring to our environment, to our society and to our communities.

When I spoke in Fort Simpson, my intention was to challenge the Dene Nation and all NWT residents to think about their future as we come to terms with what development will mean to our environment, our society and our communities.

We have been and will continue to make tradeoffs between the impacts of diamond mines and gas pipelines and protection of our land and wildlife.

I want to be confident that between Aboriginal governments and public government we have the processes in place to consider and make the tradeoffs and **balance** the impact of development on our environment.

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I also want all of us to have the confidence that we are well placed to **balance** the impacts of development on our society and our communities, especially our youth. Our youth are our future and they were well represented at the Dene Assembly.

That's why I suggested that we need to think about how much growth, particularly in terms of population in the larger centres, can be managed in the NWT and the needs of new residents in the larger communities **balanced** with the needs of residents in smaller communities.

We need to think of what Yellowknife and the NWT will be if we do not control the impact of development and create a balance between the best of what we have now and what further development will produce.

My observations in Fort Simpson should not be portrayed as discouraging people from moving to the north, raising a family and making a contribution. My intention was to get NWT residents, in Yellowknife, regional centres and smaller communities, to think about balance.

As Premier, I believe such discussion and debate about the important issues concerning our future are essential as we work together to achieve a productive and prosperous tomorrow for all citizens of the Northwest Territories.

Kakfwi says GNWT Agenda Remains Unchanged by PM's Announcement


"The Prime Minister has not retired yet," Mr. Kakfwi noted. "There are many important pieces of business that we look forward to completing with him."

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Proposed Revisions to Business Incentive Policy Released

YELLOWKNIFE (August 22) – Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED) Jim Antoine today released proposed revisions to the Business Incentive Policy (BIP).

The updated policy clarifies the definition of a BIP business and strengthens administrative procedures. It establishes formal complaint mechanisms and sets new thresholds for the application of BIP bid adjustments.

"While NWT businesses are becoming more competitive, there is still a need for a Business Incentive Policy to encourage and support the development of a healthy private sector," Mr Antoine said. "These revisions address the criticisms and concerns raised by NWT businesses and industry during public consultations on BIP."

Established in 1992, the BIP applies to any procurement contracts, other than employment, entered into by Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) departments and agencies. The policy is administered by RWED.

Proposed Revisions to Business Incentive Policy Released YELLOWKNIFE (August 22)

What is the Business Incentive Policy?

The Business Incentive Policy (BIP) is an economic policy of the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) that applies to any procurement contract entered into directly by the GNWT, with the exception of employment contracts. The BIP also applies to any procurement contract entered into where 51 percent or more of the funding for the contract, or for the operations of the procuring organization, is provided by the GNWT. Generally this means it applies to GNWT departments, GNWT funded boards and agencies, and NWT municipal/community governments receiving at least 51 percent of their operating funds from the GNWT.

The BIP requires procurement authorities to make purchases below a certain threshold only from approved northern businesses. For procurement over these thresholds it requires the procurement authority to make preferential adjustments to bids of approved northern and local businesses during the bid evaluation process. Pursuant to the BIP, a Registry of approved northern businesses is maintained by the GNWT.

Why was the BIP revised?

The current BIP has been in place since 1992. Concerns and criticism have been raised that the BIP does not meet key needs of the NWT business community such as access to government contracts or provide fair and consistent contract administration. The BIP also did not reflect the changing NWT economy.

The proposed policy is based on the comprehensive consultation done with the public and the business community across the NWT during the winter and spring of 2001.

What were the key issues and design considerations in shaping the proposed BIP?

Major issues included:

- Accountability and transparency.
- Policy definition of a northern business.
- Monitoring and enforcement.

What are the major changes in the proposed BIP?

Most of the major changes include:

- clarification of definitions applying to the BIP;
- the definition of a BIP Business;
- strengthened administrative procedures;
- a formal complaint mechanism; and,
- new thresholds for the application of the BIP bid adjustments.

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Why was a new definition for a BIP business required?

The NWT business community has raised concerns about the old definition not recognizing the contribution of business to the NWT economy. The new definition was developed in cooperation with the NWT Chamber of Commerce, the NWT Construction Association and the Northern Manufacturers' Association.

What is the new definition for a BIP business?

To be eligible for registration under the proposed policy, a BIP Business must:

- maintain legal registration in the NWT;
- maintain a current business license issued by a municipal corporation or the GNWT, where applicable;
- operate from an owned or leased bona fide place of business in the NWT and has done so prior to the date of application;
- comply with the *Payroll Tax Act (NWT)* and not have any overdue returns or liabilities under that Act;
- in the case of a corporation, files, or undertakes to file, a Federal Corporate Income Tax Return that allocates taxable income to the Northwest Territories, or would allocate taxable income to the Northwest Territories if the corporation had taxable income;
- in the case of a co-operative association, files, or undertakes to file, a Federal Corporate Income Tax Return that allocates taxable income to the Northwest Territories, or would allocate taxable income to the Northwest Territories if the co-operative had taxable income:
- in the case of a partnership, the majority interest in the partnership is owned by NWT Residents;
- in the case of a sole proprietorship, the sole proprietor is an NWT Resident.

Why are thresholds being introduced?

During our consultations, the NWT business community expressed the need for a dollar value cap on the application of BIP bid adjustments. The caps recognize that northern businesses maintain an inventory of goods for small amounts but would likely have large orders delivered from the south providing little value added to the NWT. The thresholds are consistent with those contained in the AIT.

What are the new thresholds for the application of the BIP bid adjustments?

Credit Cards and Sole Source Contracts

No Bid Adjustment will be applied to credit card purchases or sole source contracts.

Goods Contracts

For Goods Contracts, excluding credit card purchases or sole source contracts, a 15 percent Bid Adjustment will be applied to the NWT Content. An additional 5 percent Bid Adjustment will be applied to any Local Content.

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For Goods Contracts in excess of \$25,000, the Bid Adjustment will be applied to no more than \$25,000 of the bid amount.

Service Contracts

For Service Contracts, excluding credit card purchases or sole source contracts, a 15 percent Bid Adjustment will be applied to the NWT Content. An additional 5 percent Bid Adjustment will be applied to any Local Content.

For Service Contracts in excess of \$100,000, the Bid Adjustment will be applied to no more than \$100,000 of the bid amount.

Construction Contracts

For Construction Contracts, excluding credit card purchases or sole source contracts, a 15 percent Bid Adjustment will be applied to the NWT Content. An additional 5 percent Bid Adjustment will be applied to any Local Content.

For Construction contracts in excess of \$1,000,000, the bid Adjustment will be applied to no more than \$1,000,000 of the bid amount.

What does the new complaint system do for the government and business community?

There was no formal complaint system in the previous policy. Concerns about application procedures and compliance were raised during the public consultation. The new system addresses those concerns. It also provides clear direction about who will address these issues.

How does the new formal complaint mechanism work?

Applicants that have been denied registration by a BIP Qualification Committee may appeal in writing to the BIP Senior Management Committee.



Recruitment and Retention of Nurses is Top Priority for H&SS Minister

YELLOWKNIFE (August 28) -- Minister of Health and Social Services Michael Miltenberger says the recruitment and retention of nurses continues to be the number one priority for his Department and health and social services authorities in the NWT.

The Minister chaired a meeting of the NWT's Health and Social Services Joint Leadership Council (JLC) made up of the chairs of the seven NWT health and social services authorities August 24-25 in Yellowknife.

The Council and the Department of Health and Social Services, in consultation with partners in government, professional associations and the Union of Northern Workers, are preparing a number of identified short and long-term solutions for consideration by the JLC on September 20, 2002. Mr. Miltenberger says he hopes a course of action can be identified at that time.

"Training northern nurses and ensuring effective and efficient service deliveries are already key components of the GNWT's ongoing efforts to address the shortage of nurses in the Northwest Territories," the Minister noted. "But the situation demands that still more steps must be taken."

Mr. Miltenberger says it is important to recognise that the current nursing shortage is not simply a northern issue, but in fact is a nation-wide problem. He says he will pursue the issue with his federal, provincial and territorial colleagues at a meeting of Canada's health ministers to be held next week in Banff.

"The need to address the issue of attracting nurses to the NWT and keeping them here is critical to the sustainability of the NWT's health system, Mr. Miltenberger said.

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Minister of Health and Social Services Orders Stanton Review

YELLOWKNIFE (September 3) -- Minister of Health and Social Services Michael Miltenberger has ordered an operational review of the Stanton Territorial Hospital in Yellowknife.

"Residents of the NWT are fortunate to have a hospital capable of providing the calibre of care that this facility provides, the Minister said. "This review will ensure that current challenges such as those posed by the recruitment and retention of health care professionals do not compromise Stanton's reputation for providing high quality health care."

The independent review, to be completed by the end of October, will be co-ordinated by a project steering committee chaired by the Deputy Minister of Health and Social Services and including two members of the Stanton Board of Trustees and a senior member of the Financial Management Board Secretariat.

"Reviewing operational practices and identifying possible improvements are an accepted means of ensuring that the highest possible service standards are maintained," Mr. Miltenberger noted.


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OPERATIONAL REVIEW

Stanton Territorial Health Authority

BACKGROUND

Historically, Stanton has provided a high level of care locally, regionally and for the entire Territory. However, there is growing concern related to the provision of health care services through the Stanton Territorial Health Authority. These concerns are primarily related to a growing shortage of health care professionals at Stanton and a high turnover rate. This lack of stability has resulted in a ward closure and reductions in service levels in key areas. Over the past year the hospital has had difficulties in maintaining service levels in several of the major specialty areas, including Surgery, the Intensive Care Unit, and more recently, in the Obstetrics Unit.

A second area of concern is the recent turnover of key managers within various departments of the hospital and the difficulties being experienced in recruiting new middle managers. The turnover in key management positions* compounds the recruitment difficulties in the clinical program areas.

Underlying this situation is a perception that there is a growing problem with morale at Stanton. Over the past two years there have been many references by nurses, physicians, and other health care professions to low morale at Stanton and the potential negative impact on quality of services.

Finally, the ongoing issue with how the hospital manages the Human Resource function within the guidelines of the Delegated Authority is an area of concern. The Minister Responsible for the Public Service has delegated the authority for hiring of staff, and for administration of Pay and Benefits, to the Authority. On several occasions over the past two years significant concerns with human resource management have been addressed in writing by both the Financial Management Board Secretariat and the Deputy Minister of Health and Social Services.

This combination of factors could negatively affect the key responsibility that the Stanton Territorial Health Authority has in providing health care services for the people of the Northwest Territories unless these concerns are fully analyzed and addressed. There is a need to review management practices to ensure measures are in place to improve recruitment and retention of health care professionals, and that through improved stability the reputation of Stanton Territorial Health Authority, as a high quality health care facility, is maintained.

The Minister of Health and Social Services has directed that an Operational Review of the Stanton Territorial Health Authority be undertaken. This will be in the context of the items noted above.

OPERATIONAL REVIEW PARAMETERS

The Minister of Health and Social Services is committed to ensuring a high quality of health care continues at Stanton and that the high level of turnover and morale issues are effectively addressed. The Minister has directed the Department and the Board of the Stanton Territorial Health Authority to address these matters through an operational review as follows:

- Assess strengths and weaknesses in the overall management of Stanton Territorial Health Authority and make recommendations for any improvement, particularly in light of the current operating environment of health care worker shortages and ward closures.
- 2. Assess strengths and weaknesses in the current Human Resource management practices and make recommendations for remediating deficiencies, if any.
- 3. Over the past two years Stanton hospital has experienced a great deal of difficulty in recruiting and retaining health care professionals. The review will identify what are internal vs systemic (system-wide) factors contributing to staff turnover at Stanton and make recommendations to address these with a particular focus on the internal factors. A review of this area will include a report on the exit interviews of staff that have already left the organization. Further follow up of staff that have left will be completed to ensure complete information in this area. As well, existing staff will be interviewed on a confidential basis to gather information on the current circumstances related to retention.
- Investigate and assess the current state of morale at Stanton and if necessary recommend appropriate actions to address morale issues.
- Delegated Authority the hospital has specific authority delegated to it for hiring and administration of pay and benefits. It is recommended that a full review of the management of this delegation of authority be undertaken. A particular emphasis will be placed on measuring compliance in the areas highlighted in previous correspondence.

August 29, 2002

The Project Steering Committee will provide the Minister with detailed and general observations in each of these areas. A full report, including recommendations for improvement, will be provided to the Minister by October 15, 2002. The Minister will in turn brief the Board of Trustees of Stanton Territorial Hospital on the findings of this review.

Minister Urges Coordinated Approach to Federal Program Funding

YELLOWKNIFE (September 10) Minister of Education Culture and Employment Jake Ootes says a National Aboriginal Round Table discussion on skills and learning, will provide an excellent opportunity for affected stakeholders to identify how they can work together to address Aboriginal skills and learning shortages throughout Canada.

The National Aboriginal Round Table, spearheaded by federal Minister of Human Resources Development Jane Stewart, will meet tomorrow in Yellowknife.

Mr. Ootes says he would like to identify a more co-ordinated method for distributing federal resources allocated for Aboriginal skill development and learning programs.

"Funding allocations come from a variety of sources – each with differing stakeholders conditions and target outcomes, Mr. Ootes said. "It challenges our ability to make the most of ever dollar that is provided."

The Minister says the idea of a territorial training committee, currently under development with representation from industry, federal, territorial and Aboriginal governments, is one example of how funding can be pooled and actions co-ordinated to ensure maximum benefit for all ages of the NWT's population.

"We're at the same table," the minister said, "all we need is a committed and collaborative step forward."

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2002 NWT Arts Council Award Winners

YELLOWKNIFE (September 12) -- The NWT Arts Council has recommended 34 artistic projects and recipients for awards this year. In total \$140,000 will be distributed to Northwest Territories musicians, painters, carvers, photographers, playwrights, writers and artisans.

Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes says the project funding will allow artists and organizations to share their talents and vision with all residents of the NWT.

"The recipients of these awards represent the creative ambassadors of our culture," he said. "NWT Arts Council contributions enable us to show our support for their endeavours."

Funding will be provided to a variety of groups, individuals, and arts organizations. It will fund diverse projects ranging from a multimedia CD/DVD highlighting the music and images of Kole Crook's life, to workshops for Scottish country dancing, quilting and film techniques for shooting and editing, to a screenplay about a young girl trying to assist her sister's spirit find her way to peace after committing suicide.

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Canada Not Bound By 25 Year Old Treaty

EDMONTON (September 18) - Minister of Resources Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine says Treaties, Agreements and Statutes identified to support gas development 25 years ago are no longer applicable to today's discussions surrounding an Alaska gas pipeline.

The Minister has asked federal Minister of Natural Resources, Herb Dhaliwal to confirm the legal status of these 25-year-old agreements.

Minister Dhaliwal has told American lawmakers supporting subsidies for the development of Alaskan natural gas that a pipeline will not pass through Canada without the support of the Government of Canada. In response, however, officials and legislators have suggested that Canadians are already handcuffed by the 1977 Agreements.

"The Alaskan gas project is not the same. The natural gas industry has been transformed and ageold understandings regarding the role of private financing versus public guarantees are being challenged as I speak," Mr. Antoine noted. "Canada did not agree to these conditions 25 years ago. We are certainly not bound by them now."

The United States Congress is currently considering subsidies to favour the development of an Alaskan natural gas pipeline over the more cost-effective Mackenzie Valley proposal.

"We are by no means restrained from responding to an ill-advised measure proposed by the American Congress," Mr. Antoine said.

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Weledeh Student Named to Present Book to Queen Elizabeth II

YELLOWKNIFE (September 20) -- Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes has announced that Kendra Qilluniq, a grade five student at Weledeh Catholic School in Yellowknife, has been chosen to present Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II with a commemorative book of stories written by students in the Northwest Territories.

Ms. Qilluniq will travel to Ottawa in October to meet and present to the Queen: Voices of our Youth: Stories for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in Honour of the Golden Jubilee from Students of the Northwest Territories.

The Minister says he's proud that someone who shows such excellent leadership at such a young age will represent the NWT. "Kendra is an excellent ambassador for the youth of the NWT," he said.

Weledeh School principal Merrill Dean nominated Ms. Qilluniq for the honour. "Kendra is committed to her schooling and works hard to be successful at all she attempts," Ms. Dean noted. "She has a strong sense of justice and is always one of the first to play fair."

Ms. Qilluniq was chosen at random based on her principals' nomination to present the project to Her Majesty. Kendra and her family will be invited to attend the "Towards Literacy" luncheon to receive her copy of the book from the Minister September 30, 2002 (12:00pm) in the NWT Legislative Assembly's Great Hall.

The book of stories was created and published by the Government of the Northwest Territories as a literacy project to commemorate the Queen's Golden Jubilee. Fifty-six story contributions were received from seven schools across the Northwest Territories.

Voices of our Youth: Stories for Her Majesty Queen Elizabeth II in Honour of the Golden Jubilee from Students of the Northwest Territories is on display in the NWT Legislative Assembly's Great Hall. Additional copies will be distributed to schools and libraries across the NWT.

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Editorial Shows Opposition to Subsidies is Consistent and Strong Antoine Says

WASHINGTON (September 24) - Minister of Resources, Wildlife & Economic Development Jim Antoine says a recent editorial by the Wall Street Journal is a reflection of the mounting opposition to proposed floor price subsidies for Alaskan natural gas.

The Government of the Northwest Territories, Government of Canada, the Bush Administration, ExxonMobil, the Canadian Association of Petroleum Producers, the Cato Institute and the Sierra Club have all taken public positions against the proposed subsidies.

"We have all consistently raised the same concern," Mr. Antoine said. "A floor price subsidy will only serve to distort markets and will benefit Alaskan gas producers, at the expense of all other natural gas basins in Canada or the US."

While the Government of the Northwest Territories remains strongly opposed to the use of floor price subsidies, it does not object to the use of more traditional government incentives to assist resource development projects. Incentives such as loan guarantees, accelerated depreciation schedules and profit sensitive royalty regimes can allow government to share project risks with developers.

"On the other hand, a guaranteed floor price will remove all market risk for the producer lucky enough to receive it," Mr. Antoine said. "If anything, this will threaten, not enhance, continental energy security."

Forecasts using the proposed subsidy level show that the subsidy, if provided, will total almost US\$ 20 billion.

"We can find no credible forecasts that show a sustained gas price above US\$ 3.25 million BTUs at AECO," the Minister said. "This subsidy will never be repaid."

Editorial Shows Opposition to Subsidies is Consistent and Strong Antoine Says WASHINGTON (September 24)

In its analysis of the proposed subsidy, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) notes that:

- Floor price subsidies benefit only the recipient. All other basins in North America will be negatively impacted.
- Fully two-thirds of the route for an Alaskan gas pipeline will cross through Canada. The Government of Canada is adamantly opposed to the use of subsidies.
- Given the change in terms for the proposed Alaska Highway project and the proposed subsidies, the GNWT believes that the Transit Treaty¹, the U.S.-Canada Agreement on Principles², the 1977 Northern Pipelines Decision³, the Northern Pipeline Act⁴ are no longer applicable.
- British Petroleum has offered an alternative to the floor price subsidy contained in the U.S. Senate energy bill. It calls for the subsidy to be calculated at the wellhead as opposed to AECO in Alberta.
- The impact of British Petroleum's wellhead subsidy would still provide billions of dollars in subsidies to an uneconomic project. GNWT analysis shows that at current prices, the subsidy would provide British Petroleum and its partners with over \$60 million per month in taxpayer assistance.
- There is neither a time limit nor volume limit on the Alaskan gas that would be allowed to claim this subsidy. The consequence would be an influx of exploration and development dollars into Alaska, reducing expenditures in all other basins.
- British Petroleum claims that their Alaskan subsidy is simply another use of already existing United States tax legislation. This is not correct. Section 29 credits are used in the United States to support the development of technologically difficult gas sources such as tight gas or non-conventional, coal bed methane gas. Alaskan gas is not non-conventional; it is simply farther from market.
- On June 28 in Anchorage, Alaska, Lord John Browne, Chief Executive Officer for British Petroleum, said that the company was not seeking any subsidies. Specifically, he said "So this is not a debate about subsidy. We are not asking for any subsidy. We do not want corporate welfare."

Alaskan Pipe Dream

There are many excellent reasons for President Bush to veto the energy bill now in House-Senate conference. One of the best is its mandate for a natural-gas pipeline through Alaska, which the conference approved last Thursday. If the bill passes with the Senate's language, taxpayers will be on the hook for up to \$20 billion in subsidies and another \$10 billion in loan guarantees.

There's a lot of gas up there in the frozen North and it makes sense to figure out a way to get it down to the lower 48. But isn't that a job for the private sector? The Bush Administration thinks so, as does the government of Canada, and a private energy consortium is pushing for a shorter and arguably cheaper route through Canada.

However, Congress has a different idea, and the Senate version of the energy bill would do two counterproductive things: First, require that a pipeline go through Alaska or not at all, and second, approve a tax credit to guarantee a floor price for Alaskan gas.

Let's start with some pipeline basics. There are two possible routes for delivering gas from the Arctic to American consumers: the Alaska Highway route and the Mackenzie Valley route through Canada. As the nearby map shows, the problem for those who support the much-longer Alaska route is that two-thirds of it passes through Canada anyway. Similarly, a portion of the Mackenzie Valley route goes under American waters in the Beaufort Sea.

The energy bill provision would pre-empt the market by mandating the building of the Alaska Highway route, and it would forbid the federal government from giving Canadians permission to build under the Beaufort Sea. And therein lies the rub: Canadians are on record as saying that if Congress goes ahead with this route mendate, they might not issue permits for the two-thirds of the pipeline that runs through their territory. Given the cross-border political battles that would ensue, the likely upshot would be that we'd end up with no pipeline at all.

The good news is that Canada's position is more or less the same as the Bush Administration's. Energy Secretary Spence Abraham recently wrote, in a letter to conference chairman Billy Tauzin (R., La.), that the Bush Administration believes "market forces should select the route of the pipeline" and "strongly opposes the price floor tax subsidy provision in the Senate bill and any similar provision because it would distort markets, could cost well over \$1 billion in annual lost revenue, and would likely undermine Canada's support for the construction of the pipeline and thus set back broader bilateral energy integration." Other than that, how was the play, Mrs. Lincoln?

So why is Congress even considering an Alaskan pipeline? Meet Frank Murkowski, a GOP Senator from Alaska who is now running for Governor. Having all but lost the fight for drilling in ANWR, Mr. Murkowski is out to bring Alaska home a pipeline as a consolation prize — even if that means sticking it to taxpayers. The politics gets worse. In exchange for his own support for the Alaska pipeline, Senate Majority Leader Tom Daschle gets Senator Murkowski's support for one of the South Dakota Democrat's pet causes, ethanol subsidies. Moreover, this horse trade gives the Democrats something that, at least superficially, looks like a pro-development energy policy.

Senator Daschle and Alaska Governor Tony Knowles also figure that a pro-Alaska pipeline position helps the Democratic gubernatorial candidate, Lt. Governor Fran Ulmer. And even if she loses, the thinking is that support for an Alaskan pipeline will help whichever Democratic candidate (probably Governor Knowles) runs for Mr. Murkowski's Senate seat. Governor Knowles is at least acknowledging some reality: He's just written an op-ed for Canada's National Post calling for both pipelines. So there we have the ultimate conclusion of America's energy politics: If you can't settle on just one pipeline that wouldn't make it without government support, push for two.

Let's hope this political scam dies in conference along with the rest of the energy bill, or that Mr. Bush will put us out of its misery with a veto.





Hardy now NWTPC Vice Chairperson

YELLOWKNIFE (September 24) – Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Power Corporation (NWTPC) Joe Handley today announced the appointment of Rod Hardy as Vice-Chairperson of the NWTPC Board of Directors.

Mr. Hardy, a retired businessman from Tulita, currently serves as a Director on the NWTPC Board of Directors. He has been involved in community politics for several years and also serves on the NWT Metis-Dene Development Fund Board.

Stanton Operational Review Commences

YELLOWKNIFE (September 25) -- Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger, today announced that the operational review of the Stanton Territorial Health Authority is underway.

An independent team of evaluators from Edmonton-based Western Management Consultants will conduct the review. The seven-member independent team has extensive expertise in operational and human resource planning and evaluation, particularly in the health sector and hospital administration.

The consulting firm was awarded the contract following an invitational tender that included submissions by three firms.

"We recognize the public's concerns in regards to the staffing shortage at Stanton, and the need to identify short term actions to resolve the immediate situation," Mr. Miltenberger said. "While our first priority is to ensure all hospital units are fully staffed, our actions cannot be limited to recruiting activities. We must work to keep the professionals we hire and this review will help Stanton do this."

The review will complement recruiting activities already underway by Stanton and H&SS Department staff. The final report will recommend specific management and staffing actions to increase recruitment and retention of staff. The team will report on progress and provide a final report to the Minister by the end of October.



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Premiers Launch Public Awareness Campaign for Health Care Funding

CALGARY (September 27) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says he hopes a national advertising campaign launched by Canada's Premiers will increase Canadians' awareness to health care challenges brought about by the reduction of federal funding.

The national campaign, sponsored by the Premiers' Council on Canadian Health Awareness, was launched this morning in Halifax.

"It's an unprecedented step," the NWT Premier said, "but it is critical that Canadians understand: the federal government is not paying its fair share of health care costs."

Federal contributions to health care have declined dramatically over the years from 50 percent in the 1960's to only 14 percent today. Canada's Premiers are calling for a new funding partnership with the federal government that will restore federal health funding to at least 18 percent.

"The lack of federal funding is impacting Canadians across the country - including residents of the NWT." Mr. Kakfwi said. "By working to correct this imbalance in funding responsibilities, we hope to increase our own capacity to address the health care challenges we are facing."



Premier Says Support For Resource Development is Threatened

CALGARY (September 27) -- Premier Stephen Kakfwi says the lack of any real federal response to NWT infrastructure needs is threatening Aboriginal support for a Mackenzie Valley Pipeline and the GNWT's capacity to prepare for development.

"We have invested as much as we can without upsetting the perilous balance of our economic and social fabric," the Premier told senior oil and gas representatives at a Calgary luncheon today.

Aboriginal support for a gas pipeline was identified almost three years ago on the understanding that significant federal investment would realize development and accrue benefits to the people of the NWT; and real and timely negotiations would begin on northern control and ownership of northern resources.

While the possibility of a natural gas pipeline has spawned development activity in the oil and gas sector, Premier Kakfwi says the Government of the Northwest Territories is yet to realize any significant investment from the Canadian government.

"In the absence of any benefits, and without an agreement on devolution and resource sharing, major resource development is of little value to the Government of the Northwest Territories," Mr. Kakfwi said.

NWT Participates in Canada-Wide Reporting on Health Indicators

YELLOWKNIFE (September 30) – Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger says a new reporting framework initiated by provincial and territorial Health Ministers will provide a consistent basis for jurisdictions to compare, improve and reform their health care systems. The 2002 Report to Residents of the NWT on Comparable Health and Health System Indicators was made available today.

For the first time ever, provincial and territorial health Ministers are reporting to their citizens concurrently on a set of comparable health indicators. The reports provide Canadians with reliable information about the health of the population and the performance of Canada's health system.

"Our participation in this cross-Canada initiative will provide NWT residents, health care professionals, policy makers and the GNWT with an effective and consistent comparison on which to base our discussions and decisions," Mr Miltenberger said.

The technical information presented by the report contributes to the NWT baseline of information previously presented in the 1999 Health Status Report and 2000 Health Services Report. The Department of Health and Social Services will continue to work in partnership with other jurisdictions to improve and prepare similar reports every two years.

Today's release honours a September 2000 commitment made by Canada's Premiers to provide regular reporting on a set of common indicators for health status, health outcomes and quality of service.

All regional reports were reviewed by an independent auditor to ensure compliance with pre-set reporting requirements and the accuracy of the information.

Department of Transportation Pleased with Brake Safety Roadside Inspections

YELLOWKNIFE (October 3) – Special roadside brake inspections, conducted in September by the Department of Transportation, show a high level of compliance among the vehicles checked.

Thirty-one commercial vehicles, inspected during the 12-hour event at Enterprise and Inuvik weigh scales, identified only three defective brakes out of 336 checked. All three were on the same truck, which was placed out of service until the brakes were repaired.

The vehicle inspections were completed as part of *Operation Air Brake*, a national brake safety campaign that originated in Canada in 1998, and is sponsored by the Commercial Vehicle Safety Alliance (CVSA), the Canadian Council of Motor Transport Administrators (CCMTA), the Federal Motor Carrier Safety Administration (FMCSA) and Transport Canada.

"Operation Air Brake is showing the desired results," Minister of Transportation Joseph Handley said. "Although they are still the most frequent equipment violations on commercial vehicles, brake-related defects and out-of-service conditions are on the decline."

Operation Air Brake is just one of many campaigns and initiatives undertaken by the Department of Transportation to ensure NWT highways are safe for all users.

The Premier says the decision was made by Members of the Executive Council in August to allow for full and complete consideration of a proposed energy strategy by all Members of the Legislative Assembly.





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
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Allocation of Seniors Housing in Inuvik Resolved

INUVIK (October 10) -- Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation Roger Allen says a resolution has been identified for the delivery of six Seniors' Independent Living Homes in Inuvik.

Twelve seniors' housing units were originally allocated for construction in Inuvik: six independent living homes and six units within a six-plex.

Although construction of the six independent living homes is currently near completion on Centennial Road, the Town of Inuvik and the Inuvik Seniors Society could not identify a mutually agreeable location for the six-plex.

Following a meeting with the Inuvik Seniors' Society on Tuesday, Mr. Allen says land will now be identified and the remaining six units delivered as independent living homes with construction commencing in the spring of 2003.

"This solution meets the agreement of all parties," Mr. Allen said. "We can now move forward and provide this much-needed housing for seniors."

These homes are constructed under the Seniors' Housing Initiative. The Seniors' Housing Initiative is a comprehensive five-year plan to provide affordable, suitable and adequate housing to seniors in the Northwest Territories.

Provisional Settlement Reached in Horne Litigation Case

IQALUIT (October 11) -- A provisional settlement has been reached between the Governments of Nunavut and the Northwest Territories and representatives of victims sexually abused by Ed Horne, a teacher employed by the Government of the Northwest Territories, between 1971 and 1985.

Members of the legislative assemblies of the Northwest Territories and Nunavut will be asked to ratify the expenditure of approximately \$21.5 million for the settlement.

Legal action in this matter was taken on behalf of 82 plaintiffs and three estates in January 2001. An agreement was reached later that year to employ alternative dispute resolution procedures through the Nunavut Court of Justice to facilitate an expeditious settlement of the litigation.

The NWT and Nunavut governments have already made two advance payments totaling almost \$4.2 million to plaintiffs in January and June of 2002 to fund treatment plans and pay expert expenses related to the healing and recovery of individuals.

Ministers from both Territories say they are relieved that a resolution has been reached without prolonged litigation.

"This is a fair and compassionate conclusion to a difficult case," Nunavut Finance Minister Kelvin Ng said today.

"The focus must now be on healing," NWT Minister of Justice Roger Allen said.

Minister Revokes NTPC Appointments

YELLOWKNIFE (October 15) -- Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Power Corporation (NTPC) Joseph Handley has revoked the appointments of the Directors of the NTPC Board of Directors.

The Minister's action comes in response to the refusal of NTPC Directors to comply with specific direction from the Executive Council issued pursuant to the *Northwest Territories Power Corporation Act* - Section 8(4). Refusal to comply with the direction issued by the Executive Council contravened the *Act* and left the Minister with no choice but to revoke their appointments.

The NTPC Board of Directors was directed by the Executive Council on October 11, 2002 to withdraw its General Rate Zone Phase II application to the NWT Public Utilities Board (PUB) and to submit a new General Rate Application Phase II submission based on the existing PUB-approved rate structure.

As the Act requires that a Board of Directors of not less than six directors be in place, the Minister has appointed an Interim Board comprised of six senior Government officials with the function of the Interim Chairman being assigned to the Cabinet Secretary Elizabeth Snider. The appointments of this Interim Board will take effect at 12:00pm Wednesday October 16, 2002 but will only extend for a few weeks while the process of seeking permanent directors from outside the government is undertaken.

Human Rights Act is Leading Edge Legislation in Canada

YELLOWKNIFE (October 29) -- Minister of Justice Roger Allen says proposed NWT Human Rights Legislation is on the cutting edge of human rights legislation in Canada.

Members of the Legislative Assembly began their final review of the proposed legislation in the Legislative Assembly today.

"With this Act, we are looking to the future," Mr. Allen said.

Once passed, the proposed legislation will replace the NWT's existing *Fair Practices Act*. It represents almost three years of consultation and development, both by the Department of Justice, and the Legislative Assembly's Standing Committee on Social Programs.

"This Act challenges all of us to examine the way we deal with other people and to ensure that we treat people with dignity and respect," the Minister noted.

Northwest Territories legislation will be among the first in Canada to include protection against discrimination based on social condition. It will also protect NWT residents from discrimination on the basis of sexual orientation and gender identity.

The Act introduces a Human Rights Commission for the NWT to work with people and communities on human rights promotion and education.

"The Human Rights Act will be an important piece of legislation for the Northwest Territories," the Minister said. "It signifies our recognition of the importance of tolerance, dignity and respect – and a commitment to uphold these principles."



Alcohol-Related Motor Vehicle Collisions Reduced

YELLOWKNIFE (November 6) -- The Department of Transportation's 2001 Traffic Accident Facts report indicates that the number of motor vehicle collisions in the Northwest Territories involving alcohol has been cut by almost 50 percent since 1992.

Statistics compiled by the department and contained in the recently published report show the number of collisions in which alcohol was a known factor dropped from 91 in 1992 to 48 last year. Over that same period, the number of people injured or killed in collisions where alcohol was involved also declined from 62 in 1992 to 36 last year.

Minister of Transportation Joseph Handley says increased emphasis on education, awareness and enforcement have contributed to the positive trend.

"It's encouraging," the Minister said.

Overall, alcohol was a known factor in seven per cent of all collisions in 2001 and contributed to 17 per cent of all traffic injuries. Five per cent of all drivers involved in collisions had been drinking or were impaired by alcohol. For those drivers, 65 per cent were between the ages of 25 and 34.

"Drinking-and-driving continues to be a major social issue," the Minister said. "A strong commitment and sustained effort is still needed to change attitudes and behaviours that contribute to this problem."

The Coalition's reception and show attracted federal Ministers, senior bureaucrats and departmental officials with a northern development responsibility. NWT MP Ethel Blondin-Andrew and Senator Nick Sibbeston also attended the Wednesday evening function at Ottawa's Chateau Laurier hotel.

The GNWT was represented by Premier Kakfwi, Finance Minister Joe Handley and MLAs David Krutko and Jane Groenewegen.

While federal infrastructure Minister Allan Rock revealed in a meeting with Finance Minister Handley that there is no additional funding for the GNWT's Corridors for Canada proposal in Ottawa's Strategic Infrastructure Fund, he commended the NWT for the quality of the proposal.

"It appears it will take longer than I would have wished to secure additional investment, but I am encouraged that Minister Rock has agreed to work with the GNWT in considering our infrastructure needs in the federal planning of a ten year infrastructure program which was announced in the recent Throne Speech" said Minister Handley.

Premier Kakfwi was encouraged by expressions of support from DIAND Minister Bob Nault, in his remarks at the Coalition's Wednesday evening resources show.

"We have made a strong impression in Ottawa about the national importance of strategic infrastructure investments in the Northwest Territories. We need to remain determined. We need to keep working to find additional sources of infrastructure funding." Kakfwi remarked.

"The NWT Business Coalition has done a remarkable job, largely using their own time and resources, to keep the NWT's infrastructure objectives on the national agenda" he said.

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Minister Receives Final Report on the Stanton Operational Review

YELLOWKNIFE (November 7, 2002) – Today, the Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger, received the final report on the Operational Review of Stanton Territorial Health Authority from independent consultants brought in for this project.

"The consultants have done their work. Now it is time for us to carefully analyze the recommendations and then to act on these findings," stated Minister Miltenberger.

The final report identifies 37 recommendations in three main areas – overall management, human resources management and compliance to legislation, policies and other key documents that set direction for the Authority.

The Stanton Board of Trustees has received the report and is reviewing the recommendations. The Board will be working with the Minister and Department of Health and Social Services to prepare a plan to address the consultant's recommendations. This implementation plan will be released with the final report by November 19th, following briefings with Stanton staff and key stakeholders.

"I recognize the need to work closely with the Stanton Board so that the recommendations are acted upon," stated the Minister. "I also want to recognize the very high level of interest and response from Stanton's Board and employees. Without their active participation this review would not have been possible."

The review was conducted by an independent team of evaluators – Western Management Consultants – a consulting firm based out of Edmonton. The consultants completed their review on time, as identified in the project's terms of reference.

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Minister Releases NWT Recruitment and Retention Plan

YELLOWKNIFE (November 14) – Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger, today released the Retention and Recruitment Plan for NWT Allied Health Professionals, Nurses and Social Workers.

The Minister says the plan, developed through consultation with a broad range of individuals and stakeholders, builds on current initiatives to develop a northern workforce, retain current staff and successfully recruit in the professions experiencing shortages.

The new Retention and Recruitment Plan features initiatives to enhance the current Employee Development Program, bursaries to attract and retain current NWT nursing and social work students and the implementation of a mentorship program for social workers.

The plan also includes an assessment and review of staffing models and classifications in relation to other positions within the GNWT's public service and a commitment to work with the Department of Education, Culture and Employment on longer-term aspects of the program.

These initiatives will work to recognize the valued contributions of health and social services professionals in the NWT and bring stability to our workforce," Mr. Miltenberger said. "Staff are already implementing this plan to ensure that workers, and the health and social services system as a whole, reap the benefits as soon as possible."


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MOI Signed for Construction of Deh Cho Bridge

FORT PROVIDENCE (November 15) - The Government of the Northwest Territories and Fort Providence Combined Council Alliance today signed a Memorandum of Intent (MOI) for the construction of the Deh Cho Bridge at Fort Providence.

The MOI outlines the conditions and steps required for both parties to reach agreement on the design, financing, construction and operation of a bridge across the Mackenzie River. The document also commits the parties to begin formal negotiations towards this goal.

A key requirement of the MOI is that the bridge meets agreed standards at a cost of not more than \$55 million. The Alliance will be required to obtain all necessary environmental permits and arrange equity and debt financing.

Minister of Transportation Joe Handley signed the Memorandum of Intent today on behalf of the GNWT. "We are very pleased that the Deh Cho bridge proposal has advanced to this important point," he said. "While much work remains to be done, this is an important step towards the eventual completion of a bridge."

"We are one giant step closer to making this proposal a reality," Deh Gah Got'ie Chief Sam Gargan said. "We are confident that we can satisfy these conditions. This project is bankable."

President of Fort Providence Metis Council and member of the Alliance's Bridge Committee Albert J. Lafferty says public consultation is now the most important task facing the Alliance. "There will be a commercial vehicle toll on the bridge," he said. "We need to ensure that people understand the proposal and know that it's a good deal for them."

If a final deal can be reached, construction of the kilometre-long structure could be completed by the summer of 2005. The GNWT will pay the Alliance the proceeds of a bridge toll on commercial trucks and the amount saved by eliminating current ferry and ice bridge operations. This money will pay for bridge maintenance and debt servicing while providing a return on equity to the Alliance. The bridge will be paid for in 35 years and then transferred to the GNWT.

Volunteers Key to Restorative Justice Programs

YELLOWKNIFE (November 15) -- Minister of Justice Roger Allen today praised volunteers from across the Northwest Territories who have combined to make the NWT's restorative justice programs one of the most active in Canada.

The Minister's recognition of volunteers comes as federal, provincial and territorial governments across Canada mark Restorative Justice week (November 17-24 2002).

"Without our diverse group of volunteers, we would not have the community justice system we have today," the Minister noted. "Their dedication and hard work is creating safer communities and helping to create a justice system that reflects our cultures and values."

The GNWT's restorative justice program helps communities develop alternative ways of dealing with criminal justice issues. They include referring offenders to community justice committees rather than the courts, arranging for links between communities and offenders in correctional facilities and crime prevention activities with youth.

More than 100 volunteers across the NWT deliver the majority of the GNWT's restorative justice activities through local committees or other community initiatives.

The Minister says the theme for this year's Restorative Justice week "Towards a Justice that Heals" is particularly appropriate for the NWT. "Our restorative justice programs focus on healing everyone affected by the crime – the offender, victim and community," Mr. Allen said.

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Operational Review of Stanton Hospital Released

YELLOWKNIFE (November 15) -- Minister of Health and Social Services Michael Miltenberger says results of the Stanton Territorial Health Authority Operational Review will ensure that Yellowknife's Stanton Hospital continues to provide high quality care for all residents of the Northwest Territories.

Mr. Miltenberger initiated the review, conducted by Western Management Consultants, in September. It includes a review of the Stanton Hospital's management, human resource services and delegated authority.

The final report contains 37 recommendations, that address a wide range of issues, and includes terms of reference for the implementation of these recommendations.

It is important that we move quickly to ensure that these recommendations are implemented in a timely manner and that progress is reported regularly," Mr. Miltenberger said.

The Stanton Territorial Health Board will play a key leadership role in the follow up of this report. Broader recommendations will also require a direct role by Stanton administration and staff, the Department of Health and Social Services and the Financial Management Board Secretariat.

"We are fortunate to have a hospital of the calibre of Stanton," the Minister said. "This review has identified the steps we must take to preserve and maintain this facility.

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Antoine Pleased Energy Bill Dies in US Congress

YELLOWKNIFE (November 15) – Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine is applauding the decision by the United States Congress to drop its draft energy bill.

"The draft bill was deeply flawed by the provision of a floor price subsidy for Alaskan North Slope gas," Mr. Antoine said. "It deserved to be dropped from consideration."

The Government of the Northwest Territories, the Government of Canada, the Bush Administration and many gas producers adamantly opposed the proposed floor price subsidy to provide Alaskan gas with a competitive advantage over all other North American basins.

"It flies in the face of reason for a single gas project to receive a taxpayer funded floor price subsidy," the Minister noted. "If the project is so badly needed, the market will support it without the need for government assistance."

The Government of the Northwest Territories does not oppose the use of more traditional incentives such as accelerated depreciation allowances, loan guarantees and profit sensitive royalty regimes.

We will continue our opposition to a price subsidy if Congress chooses to revisit this subject in the New Year," Mr. Antoine said.




Peter Allen, President of Nexus Group Limited, a Yellowknife consulting company, has been designated as Vice-Chairperson.

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Out of the North – Top of the World Skiers (the T.E.S.T. program)

YELLOWKNIFE (November 25) -- A commemorative video highlighting the highly successful TEST (Territorial Experimental Ski Training) cross-country ski program was launched Saturday in Yellowknife by Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs (MACA) Vince Steen and Minister Responsible For Youth, Roger Allen.

Out of the North – Top of the World Skiers was produced by a former coach of the program Bjorger Pettersen. The short video takes a historical look at the internationally-recognized TEST program which ran in the Northwest Territories from 1964 –1998 and highlights the program and its achievements.

"This video, and the government's original support for the TEST program itself, demonstrate the GNWT's commitment to foster an environment that encourages active living for all NWT residents," Mr. Steen noted.

Skiers from the TEST program frequently competed at an international level and were so successful that at events such as the 1972 Sapporo Olympics, the Canadian national ski team was made up primarily of NWT residents.

Minister Responsible for Youth Roger Allen, himself a TEST participant, says he's pleased the Government of the Northwest Territories supported the initiative.

"Our youth represent the future of the NWT," he said.

The video will be distributed to all NWT schools and communities, as well as Sport North, the NWT Ski Division and their affiliates. Copies of the video are available through the Sport Recreation and Youth Division of the Department of MACA.

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Revisions to Public Housing Scale Ensure Break to Those Most in Need

YELLOWKNIFE (November 27) -- Revisions to the GNWT's harmonization of public housing and income assistance programs are now ready for implementation on April 1, 2003.

Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jake Ootes says the changes come in response to concerns raised by members of the Legislative Assembly regarding the program's impact on seniors and students.

The Harmonization initiative announced in November 2001 introduced a common income assessment tool to be used with all NWT residents applying for public housing and income assistance.

Concerns were raised that the implementation or transition to this new harmonized method of assessing income would negatively affect NWT seniors and students who currently pay little or no rent at all.

Seniors and students currently in public housing will now be grandfathered and will pay between \$20 and \$200 per month, depending on their income, during the first year of the program. In subsequent years, their rent will go up by \$50 per month each year until it reaches a final maximum of \$400 per month.

"NWT seniors living in public housing will continue to pay the lowest rent of almost any jurisdiction in the country," Minister Responsible for the NWT Housing Corporation Roger Allen notes.

Changes to the Harmonization Program will work to ensure that the initiative meets its original intent: to simplify the delivery of services to clients and to see the greatest benefits flow to those most in need of them.

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Approval Reached on Division of Museum Collections

YELLOWKNIFE (November 27) -- An agreement has been reached to divide the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre's museum and archives collections between the Government of Nunavut and the Government of the Northwest Territories.

The division of the nearly 100,000 individual objects and more than 540 linear meters of archival records, currently housed at the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre, was negotiated through a separate process following the creation of Nunavut in 1999.

Workings groups, established to make recommendations on how the collections would be allocated, negotiated the agreement with the guiding principle that the appropriate governments would retain the items where the most historical and cultural significance was demonstrated.

GNWT Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jake Ootes also commended the working groups tasked with the division. "Their careful consideration to these objects and records has resulted in the completion of an agreement without any arbitration," he noted.

Hon. Jack Anawak, Minister of Culture, Language, Elders and Youth, Government of Nunavut says he's pleased with the results of the negotiations, and congratulate the working groups for their success in completing this complex initiative. "I look forward to the day when our heritage collections can be returned to their home in Nunavut," he said.

The collections that are to be turned over to the Government of Nunavut will remain at the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre until such time as there are museum and archives facilities, as well as staff trained to care for those priceless collections, in Nunavut.

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Premier Welcomes Romanow Recommendations

YELLOWKNIFE (November 29) – Premier Stephen Kakfwi says he's pleased to see priorities raised by the Government of the Northwest Territories reflected in yesterday's report of the Royal Commission on the Future of Health Care in Canada.

"Mr. Romanow's Report supports the Government of the Northwest Territories' position that a single, publicly-funded health care system is critical to ensuring quality services for all NWT residents," the Premier noted.

GNWT presentations to the Romanow Commission in Yellowknife in May also highlighted the need to address Aboriginal health and the challenge of providing health care in remote communities of the NWT.

Beyond its strong call for increased federal health care funding, the Romanow report, *Building on Values* – *The Future of Health Care in Canada*, recommends an immediate injection of funds into five targeted areas: rural and remote access, diagnostic services, primary health care, home care and drug coverage for expensive therapies.

The Premier says that while the Northwest Territories stands to benefit from this immediate and targeted funding, he's disappointed that the report falls short of endorsing funding based on need.


"We were clear to Mr. Romanow that federal funding based solely on population size does not recognize the NWT's unique health and social conditions or the challenges we face in providing full access and service delivery," the Premier said.

The Government of the Northwest Territories will be examining the report in greater detail over the next few weeks. Federal, Provincial and Territorial Ministers of Health will meet in early December to discuss the implications of the report with the Federal Minister.

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Minister Announces Additional Resources for Health Care

YELLOWKNIFE (December 3) – The Government of the Northwest Territories will invest an additional \$8.3 million in human resources for the NWT's health and social services system Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger announced today.

The new resources will be dedicated to creating 42 new positions within the health and social services system, including:

- Ten (10) nursing positions at Stanton Territorial Hospital to address immediate relief, training and cross-training requirements;
- Thirteen (13) physicians positions, (10 general practitioner and 3 physician specialists), to increase community access to physicians and enhance specialized life-saving services at the territorial level;
- Fourteen (14) entry-level nursing positions to guarantee employment for NWT nursing graduates;
- Three (3) nurse practitioner positions to facilitate the introduction of nurse practitioners as part of implementing a new model of primary health care in the NWT; and
- Two (2) midwife positions to complement work, currently underway, to facilitate midwifery practice in the NWT.

An additional \$537,000 will also be directed to support ongoing training and mentorship programs.

"These new positions and resources will have a very real impact on frontline health care professionals working in the NWT," Mr. Miltenberger said. "They will increase our capacity, not only to provide high quality accessible services but, to address the serious concern of burn-out in frontline staff as well."

Extra resources will allow the GNWT to build on recommendations identified in the *Retention and Recruitment Plan* released in November. They will also support ongoing efforts to develop a comprehensive human resource plan and a new model for primary health care in the NWT as identified in the *Health and Social Services System Action Plan* in February.

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While, today's announcement is a significant step in the GNWT's commitment to address challenges within the NWT health and social services system, the Minister says it will not be the end of the government's work on this issue.

"I look forward to continuing discussions with frontline workers and other stakeholders as we move to our shared vision of a stable, northern workforce," Mr. Miltenberger said.

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Kakfwi, Fentie Meet to Discuss Several Issues **02-130** - Wednesday, December 04, 2002

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CALGARY (December 4) - Premier Dennis Fentie of the Yukon Territory and Premier Stephen Kakfwi of the Northwest Territories had their first face to face meeting only three days after Premier Fentie was sworn in. The meeting was warm and lively and included a discussion of several major issues of importance to both jurisdictions.

"Premier Fentie and I both agree that the market will decide the pipeline route. Our job is to work together to ensure our territories benefit from development, no matter where it occurs in the North", said Premier Kakfwi.

The two Premiers are looking forward to joining Premier Okalik of Nunavut in the near future in a revitalized Northern Premiers' Council, where the three northern Premiers discuss common priorities and issues of mutual concern.

"One of my priorities as a new Premier is to encourage much more east-west collaboration with our northern neighbours, and I am very encouraged that Premier Kakfwi and I are off to a great start", said Premier Fentie.

The Premiers agreed to pursue further discussions on climate change, economic development, training, job opportunities and health care and they agreed on the importance of involving their Aboriginal partners in shaping the future of the North.

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Analysis on Economic Impacts of Kyoto Protocol Now Available

YELLOWKNIFE (December 6) – A preliminary analysis shows that the Northwest Territories would suffer few economic impacts from the implementation of the Kyoto Protocol. Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development (RWED) Jim Antoine released the analysis today.

"This analysis should provide some comfort to those people opposed to the Government of the Northwest Territories' continued support for the Kyoto Protocol," Mr. Antoine said.

The analysis, developed by the federal government, is based on a "reference case" and includes the impacts of approaches currently being discussed to implement the Kyoto Protocol. It assumes a Mackenzie Valley pipeline would be in production by 2012 and states that the pipeline project will not be affected by ratification of the Kyoto Protocol.

While the analysis forecasts that measures aimed at energy efficiency will result in a reduction in the demand for electricity during the next two decades, no impact is expected on the demand for oil and gas or on diamond mining and other mineral industries in the NWT.

"We will continue to monitor federal government plans to implement Kyoto in an effort to identify potential economic impacts on the NWT," the Minister said.

Costs relating to the impact of climate change are not included in the analysis. These include disruption to winter road schedules and increased maintenance on all-weather roads because of permafrost deterioration. The analysis also does not describe who will pay the costs of any new climate change measure that might be implemented in the NWT.

"I am especially pleased with the progress made in regards to skill development, training and education," said Minister Ootes. "There are opportunities for our respective jurisdictions to work on making our learning systems more effective, especially for students. We are truly moving forward on cooperative efforts."

Gary Friedel stated, "There are many projects currently underway that will require an effective transportation system between Alberta and the Northwest Territories. Development of our northern highways is essential to the generation of new economic opportunities and resulting employment in the North."



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GNWT Applauds De Beers for Decision to Supply Rough Diamonds to NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (December 9) – Minister of Resources, Wildlife and Economic Development Jim Antoine is applauding De Beers Canada for its decision to supply rough diamonds from its Snap Lake mine to diamond manufacturers in the Northwest Territories.

Mr. Antoine says he was clear in an August meeting with Gary Ralfe, Managing Director of De Beers, in London that the Government of the Northwest Territories was not prepared to compromise its policy on maximizing benefits from northern resource development.

"That policy includes providing rough diamonds to the NWT's diamond manufacturing industry," the Minister said.

On Friday De Beers Canada President Richard Molyneux committed to negotiating the supply of rough diamonds from De Beer's Snap Lake project with the Government of the Northwest Territories. The announcement coincides with the onset of negotiations on a socio-economic agreement with the Government of the Northwest Territories.

"De Beers is living up to its reputation of being a good corporate citizen," Mr. Antoine said.

De Beers would join BHP Billiton and Diavik Diamond Mines in providing rough diamonds directly from NWT mines to NWT manufacturers.

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Federal Government Still Not Clear on Funding

YELLOWKNIFE (December 9) – Minister of Health and Social Services J. Michael Miltenberger, says he will continue to lobby his colleagues and the federal government to support a floor for the allocation of federal health care resources.

The need for an allocation of base funding was a key recommendation made by the Minister and Premier Stephen Kakfwi to the Romanow Commission last May in Yellowknife. "It's a point that we will have to keep pushing at every opportunity," Mr. Miltenberger said.

The Minister met December 6th with his federal, provincial and territorial colleagues from across Canada to discuss how jurisdictions will continue working together to improve health care across the country following the release of the Romanow Commission report.

"The federal minister has confirmed her commitment to work with all jurisdictions and stakeholders but has not provided any indication on how much money will be made available to the provinces and territories," the Minister said.

Mr. Miltenberger says he's pleased to see that the position taken by the federal government supports existing health care initiatives in the NWT.

"The work we have set out for our own health care system, as indicated in the *Health and Social Services System Action Plan*, is consistent with the priority areas identified by my colleagues," he said. "These include the delivery of front line services, Aboriginal health, and the expansion of home care and mental health services."

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Kakfwi Commends Coalition for Report

YELLOWKNIFE (December 10) -- Minister Responsible for the Status of Women Stephen Kakfwi says a research paper released yesterday by the Coalition against Family Violence represents a significant step towards addressing one of the Northwest Territories' most tragic problems.

Family Violence in the NWT: A survey of Costs, Services, Data Collection & Issues for Action examines the costs and hurdles that must be overcome to address family violence in the NWT. It includes a compilation of data on family violence, examines issues related to the response of support services to family violence, and identifies key considerations for the development of an action plan.

"This document reflects the direct input of grassroots agencies and frontline workers who work tirelessly on issues specifically related to family violence" the Minister said.

Participants in the study provided forty-two recommendations to help stakeholders address family violence in the NWT. Their recommendations cover general services and strategies, shelters & safe homes, family violence & victims programs, criminal justice system, children & youth and other services.

"We look forward to participating with the Coalition in the development of an action plan that will work towards the elimination of family violence in the NWT," Mr. Kakfwi said.

Kakfwi Commends Coalition for Report YELLOWKNIFE (December 10)

Earlier this month, Federal Provincial and Territorial Ministers Responsible for the Status of Women released a major report titled "Assessing Violence against Women: A Statistical Profile".

The Ministers originally commissioned the report from Statistics Canada in September 2000 as a means to develop indicators on violence against women and as part of a long-term commitment to address violence against women.

"Assessing Violence Against Women: A Statistical Profile" provides a readily accessible, but partial, portrait of women's experiences of violence. It includes preliminary information regarding possible changes in the prevalence and severity of violence against women that could serve as benchmarks and is intended to be used by governments, women's organizations, non-governmental agencies, academics and those involved in the policy process.

This statistical profile of violence was produced to increase awareness about the prevalence and severity of acts of violence against women and to help chart progress and identify direction for future action on emerging problems. The document gives an overview of how widespread and serious violence against women is.


However, the surveys on which these statistics are based do not capture the full reality of violence in relationships. The report contains data primarily on one form of violence – domestic violence but contains limited information on the other forms of violence against women, such as sexual assault and criminal harassment. Current detailed data on these are lacking.

Ministers Responsible for the Status of Women believe this publication represents an important and critical beginning for various sectors to develop more complete and comprehensive set of indicators. All governments plan to monitor the situation of violence against women and determine the best prevention strategies.

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GNWT Awards Tanker Contract to Buffalo Airways

YELLOWKNIFE (December 19) —Two five-year contracts for air and land-based tanker services for forest fire management in the Northwest Territories have been awarded to Buffalo Airways Ltd.

Buffalo Airways is the only totally northern-owned air tanker service provider capable of serving the needs of the Government of the Northwest Territories.

In making its decision, the Minister says the GNWT considered Buffalo Airway's strong seven-year track record of quality service and ensuring NWT residents benefit through employment, training and investment in infrastructure.

"Buffalo Airways has also followed through with its commitment to move its aircraft maintenance program to the Northwest Territories. This created additional full time employment," the Minister said.

The contract for the CL-215 tankers will have a total fixed cost of \$8.1 million and total variable costs of not more than \$14.3 million over its five-year term.

The land-based DC-4 services contract awarded to Buffalo Airways will have a total fixed cost of \$7 million and variable costs of no more than \$1.9 million over its five year term.

In announcing the five-year contracts, Mr. Antoine noted that that many other jurisdictions in Canada are currently renewing their fire-management aircraft.

"We will develop a public contract process for the provision of future air tanker services to the government beginning in the third year of this air tanker services contracts," the Minister said.

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
