### **NWT Releases 2010 Student Assessment Results**

**YELLOWKNIFE (January 13, 2011)** – The NWT's results for the 2010 Alberta Achievement Tests (AAT) and Functional Grade Level (FGL) were released today. Although there is little difference between this year's results and previous years, the GNWT is already taking steps to address areas of concern.

"The results are important indicators that help us track student performance and the success of the education system in the Northwest Territories," says the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jackson Lafferty. "With the results, we are able to spot areas of concern and work to address them."

Attendance is one area that needs improvement. The average attendance rate in the NWT is 86.1%, which translates into a student missing an average of one and a half days of school every two weeks. Early childhood is another area that needs immediate attention. Presently, one fifth of students are entering grade one and are not ready to do grade one work.

This school year, to help address these issues, the GNWT is funding attendance projects across the NWT, as part of the Aboriginal Student Achievement Initiative and Minister Lafferty is also hosting Regional Forums to engage community participation and support in developing a territorial education plan to improve student achievement.

Furthermore, 2011 marks the year that the Early Childhood Framework, supported by both ECE and the Department of Health and Social Services, undergoes an extensive review. This process includes extensive consultation with stakeholders and is already underway.

## **NWT Releases 2010 Student Assessment Results**

The Northwest Territories' (NWT) 2010 results for the Alberta Achievement Tests (AAT) and Functional Grade Levels (FGL) were released today.

This is the sixth year students have written the AATs, the FGLs have been tracked and the results for both assessments released for the NWT. Reporting FGL and AAT results provide us with an indication of NWT student performance.

AATs are based on the NWT curriculum in the areas of Language Arts and Mathematics. Students in grades 3, 6 and 9 wrote the tests in May and June, 2010. The AATs provide a picture of a student's performance on one particular day, while FGLs show aspects of student performance over the full year.

The FGL is the curriculum level at which a student is working, in Language Arts and Mathematics, for the majority of the school year. Reporting is based on a variety of classroom assessment methods used by teachers over the course of the year. FGL reporting was initiated in steps in the NWT, starting with grades 1-3 in 2004-2005, and expanding to grade 9 in 2006-2007. This is the fourth year of full reporting.

The 2010 AAT results for Mathematics are not available, as a new curricula for Mathematics was implemented. The 2009/10 school year was the pilot year for Grades 3, 6 and 9 Mathematics Achievement Tests that reflect the new 2007 Program of Studies. Standards will be set for the 2010 AATs after the June 2011 administration, and the 2010 Mathematics AAT results will then be available.


Also released, for the third year, is information regarding student attendance. Regular attendance is a critical factor in a student's successful education. Only if students are regularly present in the classroom, will they have the real ability to learn and provide themselves with a good future.

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## **Functional Grade Level**

A Functional Grade Level is the grade level of the curricular outcomes a student worked on for the majority of the school year. A student's FGL indicates that the student has mastered or achieved the curricular outcomes for the preceding grade level. Mastery means that the student has accomplished the curricular outcomes to a level where the student has a strong enough foundation to be successful in subsequent grade levels. In grade one, approximately 81% of students are able to work on grade one curriculum. Overall, an average of about 64% of students are working at the appropriate grade level for their age in English Language Arts. Results are slightly higher, in Mathematics where approximately 82% of grade one students able to work on grade one curriculum in Mathematics and approximately 67% of students are working at the appropriate grade level of curriculum for their age.






Proportion of NWT Students At and Above Grade Level in English Language Arts 2009/10





## **Alberta Achievement Test Results**

Commencing in 2007 with changes to the NWT AAT Exclusion Policy, Superintendents were given the authority to excuse students from Alberta Achievement Testing if the students were on a documented Individual Education Plan (IEP) or if they were working on curriculum two or more grade levels below their grade of enrolment and had a documented Modified Education Plan (MEP). Should a student fulfill the above criteria and participate in the testing, for NWT reporting purposes, their results have been removed from the NWT results and the students have been considered excused from writing the tests. The numbers of students excused from the testing are still included in calculation of Students Achieving Acceptable Standard as a percentage of the total enrolment.

The 2010 AAT results for Math are not available due to the implementation of new curricula for Math. The 2009/10 school year was the pilot year for of Grades 3, 6 and 9 Mathematics Achievement Tests that reflect the new 2007 Program of Studies. Standards will not be set for the 2010 AATs until after the June 2011 administration. After this is done, 2010 Math AAT results will be available.



## **Comment Deadline for New Safety Regulations Extended**

**YELLOWKNIFE (January 13, 2011)** – The comment deadline for the new NWT/Nunavut Safety Regulations will be extended to March 31, 2011.

"Many members of the NWT Construction Association and the NWT Chamber of Commerce have requested more time to examine the potential effect that the proposed changes to the Safety Regulations will have in the NWT," said Minister McLeod. "With the extension, stakeholders will have time to examine the proposed regulations in a coordinated manner and provide meaningful feedback to the Safety Regulation Review Committee."

After meeting with Minister McLeod, Bob Doherty, President of the NWT Construction Association, was pleased with the extension.

"I am also pleased that the Minister will be appointing Mr. Jack Rowe, of Rowe's Construction and one our Directors at the NWT Construction Association, to the Safety Regulation Review Committee effective immediately," said Mr. Doherty.

Both Minister McLeod and Mr. Doherty believe that Mr. Rowe's long experience as a contractor and businessman in the NWT will provide an informed perspective that will benefit the final recommendations of the Safety Regulation Review Committee.

"As a former general contractor and small business owner, I am aware of the challenges of operating in a cold weather climate and the need for safety regulations that recognize and allow for our northern operating realities," added Minister McLeod. "I will not be signing off on any Safety Regulations that do not balance northern operating realities with best safety practices and worker safety."

### Aboriginal Student Achievement Forums Continue in 2011

**YELLOWKNIFE (January 17, 2011)** – Strengthening ties between communities and education boards, as well as supporting students in getting a good education while retaining their Aboriginal language and culture, was the focus of the recent Dehcho Aboriginal Student Achievement (ASA) Regional Forum in Fort Simpson.

"We are looking at the education system in a different way," said the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jackson Lafferty. "During these Forums, we keep hearing about the importance of integrating Aboriginal language and culture, and the communities need to have an active role in this alternative approach to education in the NWT. If we work together, we can rebuild the foundation that is the voice of the NWT."

"The passion and suggestions from participants to increase Aboriginal graduation rates in our schools was phenomenal," said Mr. Kevin Menicoche, Member of the Legislative Assembly for the Nahendeh, who joined Minister Lafferty at the Forum. "I look forward to us working together for an educated North."

During the Forum, Dehcho First Nations Grand Chief, Sam Gargan, spoke to the importance of cultural balance saying that knowing your culture, language and traditional skills fully can make an individual "strong like two people."

Dehcho Divisional Education Council Chair, Martina Norwegian feels involving students in identifying learning needs and planning school programs is an important aspect of education. "This Dehcho ASA Forum is just one of the initiatives that can make this possible. With the participation and partnerships of the leaders, we can only succeed as we move forward."

Jim Antoine, Liidlii First Nations Chief, mirrored Ms. Norwegian's sentiments. "It is good to hear the voices of our youth asking for more involvement from our adults. The forum was a gathering of positive ideas for our future. Elders, Chiefs, education board members, teachers, and youth shared their feelings, ideas and experiences of current education realities of Dehcho communities. From the forum, we have renewed hope and a desire to get things done."

### 2011 Year of Road Safety

**YELLOWKNIFE (January 18, 2011)** – The year 2011 has been designated the National Year of Road Safety in Canada. In the Northwest Territories, the Department of Transportation's (DoT) Drive Alive program will continue initiatives to improve driver, passenger, cyclist, and pedestrian safety throughout the year.

Michael McLeod, the Minister of Transportation, says there are encouraging signs that drivers and passengers are taking road safety seriously, with traffic collision statistics from 2009 showing a continuation of a 20 year downward trend in the number of collisions. Minister McLeod remains concerned, however, with the high number of avoidable injuries and fatalities.

"Drivers are still driving when their judgment is impaired by fatigue, alcohol, and drugs, and that is costly in terms of injuries and fatalities that could have been avoided," he said. "By avoiding distractions, driving only when well-rested and sober, and wearing properly fitting occupant restraints, we can reduce the number of collisions further, and that will save lives."

During 2011, the Drive Alive program will focus on the following public awareness initiatives:

- 1. A pledge campaign to reduce the number of people who use their cell phone while driving;
- 2. An information campaign to increase the number of drivers and passengers using properly fitting seat belts and child restraints;
- 3. An awareness campaign to challenge residents to avoid driving when their judgment is impaired by fatigue, alcohol, and drugs;
- 4. A multi-media campaign on the need to drive at a speed appropriate for road and weather conditions, particularly in bison country.

The 2009 Traffic Collision Report, providing details of motor vehicle collisions, injuries, and fatalities in the NWT, is now available on DoT's website: <u>www.dot.gov.nt.ca</u>. The Report indicates that the number of NWT collisions declined 20%, the number of persons injured declined 14%, and there were five traffic fatalities, including two pedestrians.

## Phase 2 of the Single Use Retail Bag Fee Implemented

**YELLOWKNIFE (February 1, 2011)** – Beginning today, all paper, plastic and biodegradable bags will cost 25 cents in all Northwest Territories (NWT) stores.

"When we think about the three R's – reduce, reuse, and recycle – it is the first R (reduce) that is the most important," said the Minister of Environment and Natural Resources (ENR), J. Michael Miltenberger. "This program is a great example of a waste reduction program: the fewer bags that we use mean the fewer natural resources we consume and the less waste we produce."

Phase 2 of the Single Use Retail Bag Program is part of the Government of the Northwest Territories' (GNWT) Waste Reduction and Recovery Program Expansion and is intended to reduce litter on the land and in communities. The 25-cent environmental fee does not apply to bags used inside stores for unpackaged bulk items such as produce, bakery items, candy and small hardware items. It also does not apply to bags used for dry cleaning, prescriptions or primary packaging of prepared food.

Fees for single-use retail bags have consistently worked to reduce consumption, with higher fees linked to fewer bags purchased. Fees collected from Phase 2 of the program continue to go into the GNWT's Environment Fund to help pay for future waste reduction and recycling programs.

The GNWT's Waste Reduction and Recovery Program Expansion is part of the *Managing This* Land strategic initiative identified to meet the  $16^{th}$  Legislative Assembly's goal of an environment that will sustain present and future generations.

## AiP Important for the Future - Premier

**YELLOWKNIFE (February 2, 2011)** – Premier Floyd K. Roland says he's committed to keeping the devolution process moving forward and hopes a shared vision for a better future will encourage Aboriginal leaders to join and be part of the process whenever they are ready.

"In this Assembly, at the Northern Leaders table, and in our communities, we have sought and found unity when we have focussed on the future," the Premier said today in his Sessional statement to Members of the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly.

The Premier says he will be inviting Aboriginal leaders from across the NWT to engage with the GNWT in coming weeks, to determine their interest in finding a way forward together.

"To these leaders I say - come and be a partner in building our future together," the Premier said. "Help us realize true self determination."

Under a Final Devolution Agreement, residents of the NWT will gain the authority to decide how public lands and resources will be developed and used, to ensure the environment will sustain present and future generations. Devolution will also give the GNWT additional financial resources which could be used to help fund economic development programs, infrastructure investments, or invest in capacity building and education programs to ensure residents are trained and qualified to participate in – and benefit from – the economic activity going on around them.

Premier Roland says the signing of the Devolution AiP marks a significant step forward in meeting goals and priorities set out by Members of the Assembly.

"While we may continue to have differences, we cannot let those differences distract us from the goal we can all agree upon – that we make decisions today with future generations in mind."

## Budget Highlights Achievements and Lays out Sustainable Fiscal Path

**YELLOWKNIFE (February 3, 2011)** – Today, Finance Minister J. Michael Miltenberger presented the territorial Government's 2011-12 Budget.

The Budget, the last to be presented to the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly, focuses on consolidating the investments and achievements made over the past three years. Since 2008-09, the Government of the NWT has invested close to \$200 million in its strategic and energy initiatives. The 2011-12 Budget includes over \$85 million to continue work already underway and proposes an additional \$16.9 million in new investments toward realizing the 16<sup>th</sup> Assembly's vision for the NWT.

"Over the long term, the investments we have made will improve the lives of NWT residents, foster economic development, and unlock the tremendous opportunities our territory holds," said Minister Miltenberger. "Now, in the final year of our mandate, this Budget looks to consolidate the gains we have made, and finish and deliver what we have begun."

The aggressive policy of capital investment, adopted by the GNWT two years ago in response to the global economic downturn, will result in a record \$1.1 billion investment in roads, bridges, schools, health centres, housing, and other critical infrastructure by the end of 2011-12.

"Not only have we managed our way through the most serious economic downturn since the Great Depression, we have made investments and initiated policy changes in key areas that will benefit the NWT for years to come," the Finance Minister stated.

The Budget projects 2011-12 revenues of \$1.36 billion and operating expenditures of \$1.34 billion, an increase of 3.4 per cent from the current year. An operating surplus of \$17 million is forecast for 2011-12. The GNWT expects to borrow \$155 million at the end of 2011-12 to cover short term cash shortfalls. This debt will be paid off early in the following fiscal year. The Budget is in line with the plan laid out by Minister Miltenberger last year which will put the GNWT on a sustainable fiscal path.

"Two years ago, economic conditions required fiscal policies that supported businesses and created employment in the NWT, but these policies are not sustainable over the long-term. While we were, and are, prepared to incur some debt to address the downturn, we do not want to mortgage our future. This means keeping spending growth under control," added Minister Miltenberger.

He emphasized that achieving this will require significant effort in the years ahead. "It will mean setting clear priorities, focussing on finding efficiencies and putting our dollars where they will be most effective. It will mean continuing to seek creative new ways of doing things, being open to new ideas and being willing to challenge the status quo."

The Finance Minister forecasts growth in the NWT economy in 2011, noting positive trends in employment, population, and resource activity. The recently signed devolution agreement-in-principle, according to Minister Miltenberger, brings the people of the NWT one step closer to being in charge of how resources are developed and providing a share of the revenues from that development.

2011-12 represents the third year of the Government's four-year \$60 million Energy Priorities Investment Plan. The Budget includes \$17.5 million in energy investments designed to reduce the cost of living, to reduce the NWT's reliance on imported fossil fuels and to reduce the territory's greenhouse gas emissions.

The Budget includes no new taxes. However, effective April 1, 2011, property tax rates, tobacco tax rates, liquor mark-ups and a number of fees will be adjusted to reflect inflation.

# **Budget 2011-12 Highlights**

- The final Budget of the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly highlights the strategic investments made in priority areas over the past three years and outlines the fiscal approach taken by the GNWT to allow it to make the investments while maintaining fiscal sustainability.
- The NWT economy is showing signs of recovery from the global downturn but there are still risks to that recovery. The NWT economy is forecast to grow by 1.2 per cent in 2011-12.
- The 2011-12 Budget proposes operating expenditures of \$1.34 billion. This represents an operating expenditure increase of \$44 million, or 3.4 per cent from the 2010-11 Budget. Excluding compensation increases, spending growth is budgeted at 2 per cent.
- Total revenues are forecast to increase 2.9 per cent from a projected \$1.32 billion in 2010-11 to \$1.36 billion in 2011-12.
- The Government plans to invest \$171 million in 2011-12 in public infrastructure and housing. This investment will be financed through the \$17 million operating surplus budgeted in 2011-12, short-term debt, and non-cash items such as depreciation.
- The GNWT expects to borrow \$64 million at the end of 2010-11 and \$155 million at the end of 2011-12 to cover the short-term cash shortfalls needed to finance the Government's investments in infrastructure. This short-term debt will be paid off early in the following fiscal year.
- Total GNWT debt is forecast to reach a high of \$515 million at March 31, 2012, but will decrease thereafter as the fiscal strategy is implemented. Fully \$344 million, or 67 per cent, of the projected debt at the end of the 2011-12 fiscal year will largely be self-financing that is the costs of servicing the debt are financed by a dedicated stream of revenues from tolls and customers, and not by other government revenues.

## 2011-12 Expenditure Initiatives

The 2011-12 Budget proposes to invest \$16.9 million in new initiatives.

- *Supporting our Economy* From 2008-09 to 2010-11, the GNWT has invested a total of \$47 million in economic initiatives that supported economic diversification, gave NWT residents opportunities for training and skill development, and promoted the NWT as a great place to visit and live. This Budget includes \$15.3 million to continue initiatives started in the past three years and proposes \$3.2 million in additional investments including:
  - \$350,000 in additional funding for the Support to Entrepreneurs and Economic Development (SEED) Program to support the development of sustainable local economies.
  - \$1 million in annual support to extend the Tourism 2010 program (expires 2010-11) to 2015. The extended program, Tourism 2015, will continue ongoing programs from Tourism 2010 and will support outfitters as they adapt the tourism products and services they offer to new types of tourists.
  - \$145,000 to build on work in progress under the NWT Growth Strategy to stimulate growth in the NWT population.
  - \$925,000 to create the Small Community Employment Program to support short-term job creation projects and skill development in communities where incomes are among the lowest and labour markets conditions are the weakest.
- **Reducing the Cost of Living** Over the past three years, the GNWT has invested \$39 million in initiatives to reduce the cost of living, especially for those in the smallest and most remote communities. In addition to the \$17 million in the 2011-12 Budget to continue funding initiatives from prior years, there is \$2 million in additional funding including:
  - \$475,000 to expand the Community Harvesters Assistance Program for a total investment of \$1 million in 2011-12.
  - $\circ$  \$100,000 in investments to support a cost-effective and efficient food processing sector for the commercial harvesting, processing and marketing of fish and meat in the NWT.
  - \$50,000 to support the development of agriculture infrastructure in NWT communities in order to increase the availability of locally produced food.

- \$490,000 in additional funding to build ice crossings faster on the Mackenzie Valley winter road, to extend the ferry operating season on the Dempster Highway and to operate airport runways that have been extended in some communities.
- \$300,000 to perform a full review of the GNWT's policies for the provision of adequate, suitable and affordable housing in the NWT.
- \$150,000 in one-time funding to review the NWT Student Financial Assistance Benefits program.
- *Investments in People* From 2008-09 to 2010-11, the GNWT invested \$29 million in initiatives designed to enhance programs directed at education, health care, housing and policing services. Almost two-thirds of the GNWT's total operating budget funds programs in these areas. In addition to \$17 million to continue previous initiatives, the 2011-12 Budget provides \$2.5 million in new funds including:
  - \$300,000 to increase access to Aurora College School of Education programs in communities by directing more funds to Community Based Teacher Education programs. Programs funded under this initiative will allow the College to train more Aboriginal teachers and language and cultural instructors.
  - \$500,000 to implement further measures under the Aboriginal Student Achievement programs.
  - \$150,000 to implement a permanent Youth Ambassador program. This builds on the success of six pilot Youth Ambassador programs that recruited, trained and provided youths from most NWT communities with significant volunteer leadership development opportunities.
  - \$500,000 to further implement the *Healthy Choices Framework*, an investment to improve the health and wellness of NWT residents.
  - \$650,000 of ongoing funding to increase the availability of home care for seniors and other patients needing home care, which will allow these NWT residents to stay in their homes as long as possible and alleviate the higher costs associated with facility living and care.
  - \$75,000 for a pilot program to expand respite services and enhance caregiver support and training for families of children and youth with special needs outside of Yellowknife.

- \$150,000 to establish an Office of the Children's lawyer to provide legal services and representation for children in matters where a judge determines that a child needs independent legal representation.
- \$118,000 to fund a Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) Consultant position to support effective strategies and program modifications for individuals affected by FASD and other cognitive disabilities who come into contact with the justice system.
- Supporting Sustainable Communities The GNWT remains committed to the goal of achieving sustainable, vibrant and safe communities. By the end of 2011-12, the GNWT will have invested \$30 million in strategic new initiatives to increase safety and security, strengthen government program service delivery in NWT communities and improve small community employment opportunities. In addition to these territory-wide initiatives, by the end of the 2011-12 fiscal year the GNWT will have provided \$247 million in operating contributions to community governments and \$192 million for community infrastructure funding that provides communities with reliable financial resources enabling them to make their own choices. The 2011-12 Budget proposes \$2.3 million in new investments, including:
  - \$300,000 of ongoing funding to increase fire protection and public safety by providing all community governments with fire fighter and emergency management training.
  - \$100,000 to develop and implement a *Community Safety Strategy* that will identify community safety issues and the options available to communities to complement police work and help make communities safer.
  - \$150,000 to help community governments implement their Integrated Community Sustainability Plans that were developed as part of the Federal/NWT Gas Tax Agreement.
- **Protecting our Environment** Over the past three years, the GNWT has made \$26 million in new direct investments in protecting the environment and is committing \$12 million in this Budget for 2011-12 to continue these initiatives. The Budget proposes \$4.7 million in new initiatives including:
  - \$343,000 to implement the *NWT Water Stewardship Strategy*.
  - \$100,000 to develop and implement the new *Wildlife Act* to better protect and manage wildlife in the NWT.

- \$350,000 to establish an Aboriginal Consultation Unit to provide policy advice and legal support to ensure that GNWT consultation practices remain effective and current.
- \$200,000 to establish critical wildlife protected areas under the *Protected Areas Strategy*.
- \$2.7 million to continue energy initiatives designed to replace diesel-generated electrical power.
- *Affordable Government* The GNWT seeks to deliver programs and services in the most efficient way. Work is ongoing to improve the way the GNWT plans and delivers infrastructure, improve human resource management, ensure effective service delivery in smaller NWT communities, and stabilize the GNWT's relationship with non-government organizations. New initiatives proposed in 2011-12 to improve the way the GNWT does business include:
  - \$1 million to implement strategies to attract and retain employees under the NWT Public Service Strategic Plan.
  - \$300,000 for implementation of the Financial Shared Services Model, which will consolidate government financial processing activities.
  - \$1.15 million to improve Government communications and service delivery to the public in French.
  - \$300,000 to expand the number of courses in the Aboriginal Language Summer Institute to allow more participants in the program.

### **Revenue** Initiatives

Budget 2011-12 contains no new taxes; however, effective April 1, 2011 property tax rates, tobacco tax rates, liquor mark-ups and some fees will be increased by the rate of inflation since their last increase.

- Working towards a final devolution agreement with the Government of Canada and NWT Aboriginal governments.
- Beginning a discussion about the choices that lie ahead to ensure the GNWT can continue to deliver quality programs and services, including health care, to the residents of the NWT.
- Continuing to address the NWT's significant infrastructure deficit by supporting critical transportation and energy projects.

### NWT Métis Nation Sign AiP to Ensure Participation in Devolution Negotiations

**YELLOWKNIFE (February 9, 2011)** – The President of the Northwest Territory Métis Nation, Betty Villebrun, today signed the agreement-in-principle (AiP) on devolution formalizing their intent to be a part of negotiations towards a final agreement.

The AiP was previously signed by Northwest Territories Premier Floyd K. Roland, Chair of the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation Ms. Nellie Cournoyea, and Canadian Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development and Federal Interlocutor for Métis and Non-Status Indians Mr. John Duncan.

"In signing the agreement-in-principle, we are in a position to influence the final agreement in the best interest of our citizens," Ms. Villebrun noted. "Our future is in our hands and will be determined by our ability to move forward together, working cooperatively towards a final agreement from which all NWT residents will benefit from NWT decision making and resource development."

"This agreement-in-principle represents an important step towards placing more decision making in the hands of the people and governments of the Northwest Territories," said Minister Duncan. "I am very glad that President Betty Villebrun, on behalf of the Northwest Territory Métis Nation, has signed on to this AiP. It is my sincere hope that other aboriginal groups will also join us in the near future. It is important that all of our organizations work together to help this process move ahead."

"The AiP represents the possibilities that can be realized for our Territory," Premier Roland said. "Signing the AiP will allow us to move forward – to take our rightful place as decision makers in the NWT, capitalize on the rich potential of our resources and fully realize the opportunities and choices that the future holds for our people."

Premier Roland also reiterates his hope that other Aboriginal governments will join in the next phase of the devolution negotiations process whenever they are ready.

"As leaders, we have always sought and found unity when we have focussed on our future," the Premier noted. "There is a place at the table waiting for each of our territory's regional Aboriginal leaders."

### **Integration of Mental Health Services Announced**

**YELLOWKNIFE (February 10, 2011)** – Mental health services and programs delivered through the Yellowknife Health and Social Services Authority (YHSSA) and the Stanton Territorial Health Authority (STHA) have now been integrated. The integration will improve visibility, access and care coordination for clients from across the Northwest Territories (NWT).

"Our goal as a government is to find ways of improving care for our residents," said Minister of Health and Social Services, Sandy Lee. "Integrating staff from the YHSSA social programs and the STHA mental health clinic into one community-based mental health team will improve care and ensure that our system runs efficiently and affordably."

Community-based adult services, case management, psychological services and psychiatric nursing have been relocated to the former Gibson Medical Clinic space, and renamed "Community Mental Health and Adult Services." Earlier this month, YHSSA began delivering services from this site and the Stanton Mental Health Clinic formally closed.

Community-based psychiatric services will be co-located with other counselling services currently located at the Yellowknife Primary Care Centre. Counselling services will also continue to be provided at the Frame Lake Community Health Clinic.

The integration is a priority in the Department of Health and Social Services' *A Foundation for Change*, and the Government of the Northwest Territories' efforts to realize the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly's goal of healthy, educated Northerners.

## Mackenzie Valley Fibre Optics Link Feasibility Study

**YELLOWKNIFE (February 15, 2011)** – The feasibility of running a fibre optics cable from the south of the Northwest Territories to Inuvik, and eventually to Tuktoyaktuk, is being studied by the Government of the Northwest Territories.

The Minister of Finance, J. Michael Miltenberger, says the fibre link is important in improving data communications for both the public and private sector in the communities along the route.

"The fibre link could greatly enhance program and service delivery in areas such as tele-health, on-line learning, and e-commerce, and help diversify the economy in the communities of the Beaufort-Delta and along the Mackenzie Valley," said Minister Miltenberger. "It is the first step in advancing the communications infrastructure needed for future economic development and modern program and service delivery."

A fibre optics cable to Inuvik would also encourage future development of the Inuvik Satellite Station Facility which has been identified as a world class location for receiving data from polar orbiting satellites pending a fibre optics connection.

The feasibility study will explore the potential fibre optics users; amount of use; technical feasibility of constructing the link; environmental, regulatory and permitting; governance and operational considerations for a fibre optics link; and costs and potential funding sources to install the fibre optics cable down the Mackenzie Valley.

Through the feasibility study, the Government of the Northwest Territories is continuing to take action to diversify and maximize the economic opportunities as envisioned in the *Northerners Working Together* plan.

### New Partnership to Develop Common Mine Safety Training Standards

**YELLOWKNIFE (February 15, 2011)** – New common standards for mine safety training are being developed by the Government of the Northwest Territories, the Northern Safety Association (NSA), and the three diamond mines in the NWT (BHP Billiton, Rio Tinto and De Beers Canada). The safety standards will be recognized by all three mining companies, and will provide NWT residents with mine safety training to improve their employment opportunities.

"Improving training opportunities to develop healthy, educated residents is a key priority for our Government," said the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jackson Lafferty. "With NSA's dedication in delivering safety programs to reduce workplace accidents, and the mines commitment in hiring residents of the NWT, our partnership will help us meet our goal."

In 2008, the GNWT and the three diamond mines signed a Memorandum of Understanding, to collaborate on the NWT Mining Workforce Initiative which develops programs that help NWT residents obtain the education and skills they need to work at the diamond mines, and finds ways to attract mine workers and their families to live and work in the NWT.

"Developing common standards for mine safety training in the NWT demonstrates the success of this MOU," said the Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment, Bob McLeod. "Initiatives based on partnerships help us retain a healthy mining industry in the NWT and provide continuing opportunities for our residents."

The Government of the Northwest Territories is investing in education and training programs to ensure residents, businesses and communities are able to take advantage of the opportunities that the development of our resources provides, as envisioned in the *Northerners Working Together* plan.

The objective of the ASEP program is to provide sustainable employment for Aboriginal people in major economic industries, leading to lasting benefits for Aboriginal communities, families, and individuals. The federal ASEP program ends on March 31, 2012. ASEP partnerships across the NWT have led to over 900 individuals gaining skills and employment.

Using this program, ECE works with Aboriginal governments, industry partners, regional training committees, Aurora College and other stakeholders to plan, invest and deliver training that leads to increased Northern participation in the labour market of the Northwest Territories. ECE has been a partner in four ASEP projects since the program was introduced in 2003 and has contributed over \$3 million in funding and in-kind resources to the success of these projects.

"ASEP has been a catalyst in bringing partners to the table to address training and employment needs," said Minister Lafferty. "It is working well and we need to find a way to convince the federal government to continue with this success."

Minister Lafferty met with Minister Diane Finlay, federal Minister Responsible for Human Resources and Skills Development, to urge the Government of the Canada to continue with its commitment to Aboriginal skills development.

"There is an ongoing need for Aboriginal training and partnership funding in the Northwest Territories to ensure continued labour force growth and development for all communities," said Minister Lafferty. "We will continue to press the federal government to invest in this important area."

ECE continues to support the three ASEP partnerships in the NWT and also delivers a variety of training and employment supports to ensure Northerners have the skills and ability to obtain meaningful employment.

The Department of Health and Social Services, in partnership with the NWT Suicide Prevention Steering Committee, will be offering the training program at the Gwich'in Wellness Camp outside of Inuvik from March 19 to 28, 2011.

The revised one-week curriculum will use Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training, and will consist of three phases that are culturally-relevant and community-based. The first phase will be grieving and healing work, the second phase will be community asset mapping, and the third phase will be planning to help communities address the issue of suicide.

"Anyone with intervention skills can intervene and save a life, which is why the program is open to all residents – and not just mental health professionals," said Minister of Health and Social Services, Sandy Lee. "With this new training program, community members will have the skills to help fellow community members."

Through the NWT Suicide Prevention Training Program, healthy living and wellness is being promoted which is a key priority in the Department of Health and Social Services' *A Foundation for Change* and the Government of the Northwest Territories' goal of healthy, educated residents.

"This initiative is in its third and final year," said Minister Miltenberger. "As it comes to a close, I am looking forward to seeing the final creative proposals."

# Auditor General's Report on the Deh Cho Bridge

**YELLOWKNIFE (March 1, 2011)** – Minister of Transportation Michael McLeod says the issues raised in a mid-project performance audit report of the Deh Cho Bridge project, released today by the Auditor General of Canada, have been previously identified and dealt with by the world class team brought in to manage the project.

The Auditor General's report was tabled in the Legislative Assembly today, and identified partnership risks in Phase 1 of the project that led to project delays and cost increases. The Auditor General also expressed concerns about some risk management measures, noting that risks related to the project's schedule, cost, and scope remain.

"Our team takes the need to appropriately manage project risks seriously, and all appropriate steps have been taken to mitigate identified risks," Minister McLeod noted. "Our focus remains on producing a quality and safe structure that will effectively serve the people of the Northwest Territories."

The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has accepted the three recommendations made by the Auditor General pertaining to improvements in the way large capital projects are managed in the Northwest Territories in the future.

The Deh Cho Bridge, when completed, will provide a reliable all-weather connection with the national highway system, and aligns with the 16<sup>th</sup> Assembly's priority of sustainable, vibrant, safe communities by improving transportation infrastructure to connect communities.

The GNWT's Deh Cho Bridge project team will hold a technical briefing on the project on Thursday, March 3 at 10:00 am in the second floor boardroom of the Lahm Ridge Tower. Out-of-town reporters can request to attend the briefing by teleconference.

# Mackenzie Gas Project: Nation-Building Project

**YELLOWKNIFE (March 10, 2011)** – Premier Floyd K. Roland says he hopes today's endorsement of the Mackenzie Gas Project (MGP) by the Government of Canada is a sign of even greater support to come.

The GNWT believes that sustainable and environmentally responsible resource development projects, like the Mackenzie Gas Project, will benefit NWT residents by diversifying the economy and empowering communities and regions with opportunities and choices as envisioned by the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly in its *Northerners Working Together* plan.

# FUNDING FLOWS IN SUPPORT OF NEW INITIATIVES ACROSS THE NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

Federal and territorial governments invest in key infrastructure under the Provincial-Territorial Base Fund

**Yellowknife, Northwest Territories, March 15, 2011** – The Governments of Canada and the Northwest Territories today announced an investment of over \$40 million toward important infrastructure initiatives across the Northwest Territories, as part of the 2010-11 Annual Capital Plan. The Honourable Rob Merrifield, Minister of State (Transport), and the Honourable Robert C. McLeod, Minister responsible for Municipal and Community Affairs, were in Yellowknife today to highlight these initiatives. They also recognized progress on the Yellowknife Airport Combined Services Building, which is scheduled to open this spring.

"Developing Canada's northern infrastructure remains a strategic priority for our government," said Minister Merrifield. "These important initiatives along with the new Yellowknife Airport Combined Services Building will have a positive impact on the quality of life and economic opportunities of the territory as a whole."

"Investment in infrastructure that supports the delivery of essential services at the territorial and local levels of government will continue to increase the quality of life and reduce the cost of living for all residents," said Minister Robert C. McLeod. "Continuing to invest in territorial and community infrastructure remains a top priority in developing a strong, healthy, vibrant North."

"The infrastructure initiatives across the NWT will strengthen the connections to our communities, and support economic development," noted the GNWT's Minister of Transportation and lead Minister Responsible for Infrastructure, Michael McLeod. "In this way, we are supporting our Government's priorities of sustainable, vibrant, safe communities and a diversified economy providing opportunities to our communities."

The funding announced today supports construction, upgrades and improvements for infrastructure initiatives identified in the Northwest Territories 2010-11 Capital Plan under the federal government's Provincial-Territorial Base Fund. Included among these initiatives are roadwork in Fort Smith, the replacement of a firehall in Hay River, the construction of bridges on the Mackenzie Valley Winter Road, as well as new





construction or improvements to water and wastewater infrastructure in Paulatuk, Fort Liard, and Nahanni Butte. The full list can be found in the backgrounder attached.

The Yellowknife Airport Combined Services Building was identified in the Northwest Territories 2007-08 Annual Capital Plan. The Governments of Canada and the Northwest Territories invested \$20.7 million towards this initiative through the Provincial-Territorial Base Fund. This new multi-use facility, which is nearing completion, will house a firehall, maintenance facilities for airports and highway equipment, as well as administrative space and offices.

Under the Provincial-Territorial Base Funding agreement of the Building Canada plan, Northwest Territories will receive a total of \$185.8 million from the Government of Canada for core infrastructure priorities such as water, wastewater, green energy, as well as safe roads. Funding is being made available to address territorial, local, and First Nation priorities and objectives. Northwest Territories and other partners will also contribute at least 25 per cent of total eligible costs under the initiative.

Across Canada, Infrastructure Canada has now committed over \$10.75 billion dollars toward more than 6,300 infrastructure projects as part of Canada's Economic Action Plan. When combined with the contributions of our funding partners, there is approximately \$31 billion dollars committed to infrastructure projects across the country.

# INFRASTRUCTURE INVESTMENTS IN THE NORTHWEST TERRITORIES

Canada and the Northwest Territories are working together to support key infrastructure under Building Canada, the Government of Canada's infrastructure plan. As part of this plan, the Provincial-Territorial (PT) Base Funding Agreement provides the Northwest Territories with \$185.8 million to support core infrastructure priorities.

This funding continues to help address core infrastructure priorities identified at both the territorial and community levels, including priorities such as water, wastewater, green energy, regional and community airports, as well as safe roads.

Today's announcement identifies infrastructure initiatives that are being jointly funded by the governments of Canada and the Northwest Territories, as well as other funding partners under the PT Base Fund as part of the Northwest Territories 2010-11 Annual Capital Plan. The total combined eligible costs of these initiatives are \$40.1 million.

Mackenzie Valley Winter Road Bridges	Additional bridges for the winter road.
Paulatuk Water Treatment Plant Upgrade	Scope will consist of a new water treatment plant to meet the new Canadian drinking water guidelines.
Fort Smith Paving Program	The existing roadways within the community of Fort Smith require major improvements and repairs. Depending on tender results the community is anticipating resurfacing some 10KM of roadway that were unable to be completed due to funding restrictions.
Whati Community Gym/Fitness Centre	To promote active living and lifestyles in the community. Build a community gym/fitness centre for the benefit of all residents.
Hay River Fire Hall Replacement	The town has commissioned a pre-design study for a new fire hall that will include needs analysis and population projections, and take into account response time and location, equipment requirements including ambulance and emergency response, site planning, scheduling and cost estimate.

#### 2010-2011 Annual Capital Plan – Initiative List

Construction of road to provide easier access to the current recreational camp which promotes healthy living, tradition and culture of the community. The project will consist of clearing, digging ditches, placing culverts, embankments, drainage work, as well as the construction of a 35 meters (approx) single lane bridge crossing a small creek.
Dismantling existing structure which was built in 1985 and replacing with a new 4 Bay garage that will serve as a proper storage/maintenance facility for new and existing equipment necessary for the community water, sewer and garbage collection services.
Existing community office building has reached its anticipated life span and requires substantial upgrades to meet national building code requirements for health and safety.
The existing community office was failing to meet the growing needs of community residents. The new office includes 10 offices, a photocopy room, a radio room attached to the new hall which can accommodate up to 300 residents, Council Chambers, mechanical and janitor's room, kitchen and increased storage space.
The project will involve a retrofit of the existing lagoon by removing sludges from its current two cells as well as building a proper berm around the two. The project will also consist of the construction of a new cell and 5km access road to reach the cell.
The project will include two priorities within its scope of work. The first priority is the sewage force main replacement near the lagoon, discharge replacement (valves and piping) and berm rehabilitation around force main replacement. The second priority includes instrumentation and controls upgrading for the sewage lift station and associated piping improvements.
The people of Tulita have sought a multi sport field ever since the old sport field was lost due to the construction of the new Chief Albert Wright School. Work will include clearing and leveling approximately 30,000 cubic meters for a baseball field with dugouts at one end and a soccer field with goal posts at the other.
Project will include a planning study to confirm the remaining life of the existing site and determine a new site. Perform an engineering design of new facility, construction of new site (including a new cell and access road) and the decommissioning of the old site.

Fort Liard Water Treatment Plant Retrofit	The Hamlet of Fort Liard is looking to complete a retrofit to their existing water treatment plant, ultimately extending the life of the plant by 10 to 15 years. Work will include two Manganese Greensand Filter Skids, replacement of internal mechanical, electrical and instrumentation components.
Nahanni Butte Sewage Lagoon/Solid Waste Site Relocation	The solid waste site in Nahanni has reached its full capacity and the community has begun to investigate a new location. Work on the project will include determining a site, decommissioning the old site, haul in fill material, clearing of new site, and digging a trench.
Total Eligible Cost of Initiatives:	\$40.1 million

#### Premier Signs Cancun Statement Promoting Energy Efficiency

**YELLOWKNIFE (March 17, 2011)** – Premier Floyd K. Roland has signed the Cancun Statement of Federated States and Regional Governments today on behalf of the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT).

The Cancun Statement was developed at the Climate Leaders Summit 2010 held in Cancun, Mexico on December 6-8, 2010. The Statement recognizes that an estimated 50 to 80 percent of the actions necessary to keep global mean temperature increases below 2 degrees Celsius will need to be implemented by sub-national governments. It pledges the signatories to continue and enhance efforts to promote energy efficiency, to support the transition to a low carbon transport system and to encourage renewable energy generation.

"Through our Greenhouse Gas Strategy and our Energy Plan, the GNWT is already taking action to decrease energy use, promote energy efficiency, encourage the use of renewable energy technologies and support sustainable transportation," said Premier Roland. "We will continue to support the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly goal of an environment that will sustain present and future generations."

During the next year, the GNWT will be revising the NWT Greenhouse Gas Strategy and the NWT Energy Plan. NWT communities, businesses and residents are encouraged to participate in the upcoming discussions to ensure actions appropriate to the NWT are identified in the revised documents.

### CANCUN STATEMENT OF FEDERATED STATES & REGIONAL GOVERNMENTS

#### **ON LOW CARBON & CLIMATE RESILIENT DEVELOPMENT**

**Recognizing** that a 'clean revolution' with a surge in the rate of deployment of energy efficient and alternative energy technology is now necessary to accelerate the transition to a global low carbon economy;

**Confident** in the fundamental scientific understanding of climate change and the urgent need for action that it demands;

**Motivated** by the enormous benefits a clean revolution will create, including longterm sustainable economic growth, enhanced energy security, increased competitiveness and new, green jobs;

**Mindful** of the fundamental role of federated states and regional governments ('states and regions') as incubators of this clean revolution and of the fact that subnational governments have responsibility for implementing an estimated 50 to 80% of the actions necessary to keep global mean temperature increase below 2 degrees Celsius above pre-industrial levels;

**Mindful** of the fundamental role of states and regions in developing sufficient responses to adapt to the most dangerous consequences of climate change;

**Reaffirming** the commitments already made by states and regions in 2005 (*Montreal Declaration*), 2008 (*Poznan Statement of Action*) and 2009 (*Copenhagen Statement of Federal States and Regional Governments*). Noting that these commitments have led to the development of a range of policies to encourage a low carbon economy within the jurisdictions of members of The Climate Group's States and Regions Alliance;

**Recalling** the *Paris Statement of European Regions* made to European Union leaders (March 2010) to warn that more ambitious climate and energy policies will be essential to powering future competitiveness, growth and jobs; the *Bonn Declaration of State and Regional Governments* (June 2010); and numerous other initiatives by states and regions in 2010 to strengthen cooperation between subnational governments globally in combating climate change and accelerating the shift towards a low carbon economy; Æ

**Recalling** the *Copenhagen Statement* in particular and the signatories' commitment to report back in 2010 on progress made, including progress against specific commitments made in the 'Billion Trees Endowment' in Annex of this Statement;

**Recognizing** that despite the groundbreaking efforts of states and regions to date, there remains an urgent need to accelerate the pace and scale of low carbon development and clean technology deployment;

Acknowledging that such change will require innovative public-private partnerships between governments and business to mobilize policies, technologies and financial mechanisms and create comprehensive low carbon solutions;

**Conscious** of the importance of sustainable land use practices in promoting low carbon development;

**Convinced** that practical action at the state and regional level can play a catalytic role in building confidence and trust for comprehensive and ambitious climate action at the national and international level;

**Emphasizing** the important role of states and regions to strengthen international solidarity and achieve concrete actions on adaptation and mitigation in the developing regions;

**Mindful** of the above, and as the world's most influential coalition of states and regions that committed in Copenhagen to taking practical action to expand low carbon technologies (such as building energy efficiency, energy efficient lighting, electric vehicles, renewable energy technologies); we further commit to:

Developing specific policies and/or financial mechanisms within our remit in the following areas to reduce greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions, stimulate green jobs and promote energy security:

#### Decreasing energy use

- We will encourage reduced GHG emissions resulting from overall energy consumption across areas of urban planning and land use management; and
- We will encourage behaviour change to save energy (local consumption, heating and cooling, electric appliance management etc.).

#### Promoting energy efficiency

 We will encourage and support energy efficiency solutions, for example in lighting systems, by enacting appropriate measures (legislation, regulations, programs and financial mechanisms within our jurisdictions;

- We will encourage reduced GHG emissions from energy consumption in urban environments through, for example, 'smart' services'<sup>1</sup>; and
- We will undertake ambitious programs on building refurbishment.

#### Supporting the transition to a sustainable transport system

- We will adopt appropriate measures within our jurisdictions to encourage the transition to a more sustainable transport system by inter alia:
  - Accelerating the uptake and promoting the use of more efficient internal combustion engine (ICE), alternative fuel and electric vehicles;
  - Developing rail for freight and passenger transport; and
  - Promoting sustainable public transport (i.e. car-sharing, centers of mobility and bicycle ranks in rail stations).

#### Encouraging renewable energy generation

- We will commit to stronger targets in light of declining prices for land- and marinebased renewable energy.
- We will encourage the transfer of skills and data from our experience with renewable energy.

Exploring more detailed sectoral agreements between states and regions (and potentially businesses) on renewable energy, energy efficiency and alternative fuel and electric vehicles from now to the17<sup>th</sup> Conference of the Parties (COP 17) in South Africa.

Continuing to expand this network of states and regions and increase our cooperation with national governments, cities, financial institutions, business and civil society.

Further expanding our engagement with an active mentoring states and regions in developing economies, recognizing the need to share our knowledge and resources with those most vulnerable and least able to respond to climate change (commit mentoring support to at least one other region, province or state in a developing nation).

Engaging the business sector in delivering on the commitments laid out herein.

Reporting back at COP 17 in South Africa on commitments and progress made with preparatory reporting conferences in the different world regions.<sup>3</sup> Emphasizing the ongoing necessity to reach an internationally binding agreement, we call on the Parties to the UNFCCC gathered in Cancun, to:

- Adopt a balanced package of substantive decisions on the core elements of mitigation, adaptation, technology, financing and capacity building in order to lay the basis for agreeing to a new global climate agreement by COP17; and in particular to:
  - Formalize and build upon the mitigation pledges already made since current mitigation offers are not sufficient to meet the 2°C threshold;
  - Launch the first stage of a REDD+ (Reducing Emissions from Deforestation and Forest Degradation) mechanism;
  - Get climate finance flowing to support adaptation, mitigation, technology and capacity building actions; and
  - Set ambitious targets in the field of energy efficiency and renewable energy.
- Recognize that there needs to be a shared commitment between the parties and the states and regional governments and that without this agreement the actions of states and regions and their communities will not be enough to meet the challenges of climate change or reap the rewards of moving to a low carbon economy.
- Formally recognize and acknowledge the important role of federated states and regional governments in the UNFCCC agreement for reaching these objectives.

#### World Tuberculosis Day – March 24, 2011

**YELLOWKNIFE (March 23, 2011)** – World Tuberculosis Day, March 24, increases public awareness that tuberculosis remains an epidemic in much of the world.

The rate of TB in the NWT is four to five times the national average – with about 30 per cent of NWT residents who have latent TB infections in their bodies which usually remains inactive and not a risk to the public. TB rates are highest among the Aboriginal population.

"TB is a curable disease if caught in time," said Minister of Health and Social Services, Sandy Lee. "Ongoing education and awareness about TB in the NWT are critical components for early diagnosis, and taking opportunities to treat the infection rather than the disease will eliminate future spread of this disease."

The Department of Health and Social Services continues to be proactive in its territory-wide TB campaign, "Think TB". The campaign targets both health care providers and the public to be vigilant in getting TB testing and treatment. The Department also ensures that all NWT health centres have the most current information about TB and how to prevent its spread.

#### **Canada Makes Funding Commitment to NWT Priority**

**OTTAWA (March 23, 2011)** – Premier Floyd K. Roland says Canada's commitment to construct an all-season road between Inuvik and Tuktoyaktuk demonstrates that NWT priorities are being heard and recognized in Ottawa. The road is an important first step for the Mackenzie Valley Highway project.

The Premier says the commitment reflects federal recognition that investment in northern infrastructure needs can promote financial recovery and nation building.

"The Prime Minister and his Government have worked with us to make significant advances on Devolution and the Mackenzie Gas Project. This commitment in Budget 2011 is a further demonstration of their ongoing commitment to the North and the NWT," the Premier said. "The construction of the highway between Inuvik and Tuktoyaktuk will support sovereignty, oil and gas development, and other economic opportunities for this region, the NWT and Canada,"

Minister of Transportation Michael McLeod also welcomed yesterday's announcement while noting Canada's recognition that the Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk road should be built and that the federal government is responsible for new transportation infrastructure in the NWT.

"We have worked hard with communities and Aboriginal groups to engage the federal government in discussions on how to fund and construct an all season road from Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk and a highway up the Mackenzie Valley," Minister of Transportation Michael McLeod says. "Our partnered approach on the Project Description Reports for the Highway provides a solid foundation for moving forward into construction."

Since 2007, the Government of the Northwest Territories has focussed significant effort on securing more and improved transportation infrastructure in the NWT and highlighting the benefits that northern development can bring for NWT residents and for Canada as a nation.

Members of the 16<sup>th</sup> Assembly unanimously endorsed the Mackenzie Valley Highway to Tuktoyaktuk as a priority of the Government of Northwest Territories, in 2009.

Once completed, the Mackenzie Valley Highway to Tuktoyaktuk will provide NWT residents with wide-ranging benefits including regional economic and employment opportunities through

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road construction and maintenance, improved community access and mobility, reduced cost of living, adaptation to climate change, and economic opportunities in the tourism sector. It will benefit all Canadians by providing an increased ability to assert sovereignty, earlier development of oil and gas resources, mining, and hydro projects, and improved economic sustainability for the territory.

#### Possible Late Opening for Merv Hardie Ferry

**YELLOWKNIFE (March 24, 2011)** – Low water levels in Great Slave Lake and fluctuating water levels at the Mackenzie River raise the possibility that the break in service for the Fort Providence crossing of the Mackenzie River this spring may be longer than usual.

In the past 30 days, water levels at the Fort Providence crossing have fluctuated between 149.5 and 150.5 metres above sea level. Over the same period last year, water levels rose from 150.55 to 150.68, with only minor fluctuations. The ferry requires consistent water levels of at least 150 metres before it can operate.

As part of its commitment to improve transportation access to communities, the Department of Transportation is engaged in preparations for spring operations, and will begin ferry services when safety permits. In its preparations, the Department is considering the potential impacts of service disruptions and delays, and is encouraging travellers and those planning food, fuel, and freight shipments into the North Slave region to do so as well.

The Department of Transportation will post regular updates on water levels and conditions on its website from breakup until the Merv Hardie ferry commences operations. # GNWT Honours 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of 'The Lost Patrol'

**FORT MCPHERSON (March 29, 2011)** – Representatives of the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) joined residents of Fort McPherson yesterday for a full regimental funeral re-enacted to honour the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of *The Lost Patrol*.

From 1904 to 1921, members of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police made annual dog team patrols between Dawson City, Yukon and Fort McPherson, NT to deliver mail and dispatches. In 1910, Commissioner Aylesworth Bowen Perry ordered the patrol to change direction, beginning in Fort McPherson and ending in Dawson City. Lacking a knowledgeable guide, the ill-fated, four-man patrol never made it to their destination. The patrol became known as *The Lost Patrol*.

Speaking on behalf of the Minister of Justice, Jackson Lafferty, during yesterday's commemorative ceremony, Director of Community Justice and Community Policing Shirley Kemeys Jones said *The Lost Patrol* symbolizes the constant sacrifice and devotion to protect and serve the residents of the Northwest Territories.

"The ultimate sacrifice of their lives continues to serve as a symbol of commitment and dedication for the RCMP. Their experiences have contributed to a long-standing legacy of respect and to fulfill the promise to protect and serve. This is a legacy from which we all continue to benefit from. It is a truly humbling experience to attempt to convey an appropriate level of gratitude to the members of *The Lost Patrol* and other members of the RCMP who have given their lives in the line of duty. We may never be able to do this beyond expressing our deepest thanks to them, and also to their families," said Ms. Kemeys Jones.

"To this day, the members of the RCMP "G" Division continue to protect us, despite the constant threat of danger and the unknown," she said.

## **NWT Furs Command High Prices at Seattle Auction**

**YELLOWKNIFE (March 30, 2011)** – Final numbers are in and over \$815,000 worth of Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs (GMVF) were sold at a wild fur sale hosted by Fur Harvester's Auction Inc. in Seattle, Washington on March 13, 2011.

This year, there was an increase in demand for NWT furs, especially from buyers in Russia and China, and GMVF pelts for mink, marten, fisher, arctic fox and red fox achieved the top auction prices against all other pelts from across Canada and the Northern US.

"Fur from the NWT is now recognized as some of the finest wild fur in North America," says Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment, Bob McLeod. "With that success, our trappers and their communities will benefit."

In total, an estimated \$942,000 worth of GMVF's have been sold at two wild fur sales in 2011, an increase of nearly \$300,000 from 2010. GMVF's will be sold at an auction again in Seattle on May 19, and the final sale of the season will take place on June 21, in North Bay, ON.

By actively supporting the harvesting and marketing of wild fur through the Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs Program, the Government of the Northwest Territories is taking action to diversify the economy and provide all communities and regions with opportunities and choices as identified in the 16th Assembly's vision of *Northerners Working Together*.

## Aboriginal Language and Culture Instructor Program Diploma

**YELLOWKNIFE (April 8, 2011)** – Beginning this fall, the South Slave region will offer the Aboriginal Language and Culture Instructor Program (ALCIP) on the K'átłodeeche First Nation Reserve.

"It is our goal, under the *Northwest Territories Strategy for Teacher Education*, to increase the number of Aboriginal language teachers in all regions of the NWT," said Minister of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE), Jackson Lafferty. "Community-based programs require strong partnerships, and the support of Chief Roy Fabian and his Council, along with the South Slave Divisional Education Council and their staff, will ensure this program's success."

ECE is providing \$300,000 to Aurora College to cover community-based program expenses. The College plans to deliver the program in partnership with the K'átłodeeche First Nation and the South Slave Divisional Education Council.

Aboriginal Language Specialists are an important part of the continued revitalization of the Northwest Territories' Aboriginal languages. Graduates of this program are eligible for certification to teach the South Slavey language and culture from kindergarten to grade 12 in NWT schools.

In 2007, the two-year ALCIP Diploma program emerged for the first time in Behchokò, with promising results. The development of an Inuvik-based program is also underway.

Increasing the number of skilled Aboriginal Language Specialists in NWT schools helps meet ECE's goals for the Aboriginal Student Achievement Initiative, as well as the Department's *Northwest Territories Aboriginal Language Plan – A Shared Responsibility*.

# NWT Residents Encouraged to Buckle Up

**YELLOWKNIFE (April 7, 2011)** – The Northwest Territories has Canada's lowest rate of seat belt use, and in the past five years, unbelted drivers and passengers were 13 times more likely to die as a result of a vehicle collision. This means that two to three deaths each year can be directly attributed to failure to wear a seat belt.

Buckle Up NWT, a new initiative under the GNWT's Drive Alive program, aims to reduce the number of fatalities each year due to not wearing a seat belt to zero, and increase the NWT rate of seat belt use to the national average.

"Each time there is a fatal collision in the NWT, families, friends, and communities suffer a great loss," said Transportation Minister, Michael McLeod. "We need to work together to ensure that the use of safety equipment, such as seat belts, becomes second nature for all drivers and passengers so that we can put an end to these preventable tragedies."

The NWT Fire Chiefs Association is joining with Drive Alive to support Buckle Up NWT. Association President Gerda Groothuizen says their focus is on prevention by encouraging the use of occupant restraints by all residents. "No one wants to be the one who deals with an accident scene where a child or parent has been seriously injured or killed, particularly when we know that the use of seat belts could have prevented that injury or death," she said. "We will be part of this effort to save lives and reduce the severity of collision-related injuries."

Over the next two years, the Buckle Up NWT campaign will engage youth as well as experienced drivers with information on the importance of seat belt use, with a particular focus on communities where seat belt use by drivers and passengers is an alarming 38% compared to 92% in Yellowknife. During the campaign, a contest will be held to find the community outside Yellowknife with the highest rate of seat belt use. The fire department of the winning community will receive \$5,000 toward rescue equipment to assist them to respond to vehicle collisions.

# Winter Road and Ice Crossing Season in Southern NWT Ending

The Ice Crossings over the Liard River near Fort Simpson and the N'Dulee Crossing of the Mackenzie River on the road to Wrigley are expected to close to low clearance vehicles within days, with closure for the season expected shortly after. Ice crossings and ice roads in the Inuvik region remain open and are in good condition. Please check the DOT website at www.dot.gov.nt.ca for further updates on these roads and crossings.

The 2010-2011 winter road and ice crossing season has been a successful one. Resupply to the North Slave region and the communities served by the Tlicho and Mackenzie Valley Winter Road systems is substantively complete.

Transportation Minister Michael McLeod thanked the DOT staff and contractors who worked long hours to keep the system operating. "We owe a lot to these people whose experience and skill are called upon to maintain our ice crossings and winter road system," he said. "They work in sometimes difficult conditions to ensure the communities we serve have the access they need."

A number of challenges were encountered and dealt with during this winter road and ice crossing season. A major winter storm in March shut down a number of winter road and ice road operations across the NWT for more than a week. Crews in the Tlicho, Deh Cho, Sahtu, and Beaufort Delta worked around-the-clock to re-open the system, and the extra cost of clearing up to two metres of snow from this single storm was more than half a million dollars. Unseasonably warm weather caused a delay in the opening to commercial weight traffic of some ice crossings and an earlier-than-usual closure to a number of southern NWT roads and crossings. And low

water levels in the Mackenzie River posed challenges in building the ice crossing, raising the possibility that the start of the ferry season at Fort Providence may be delayed due to low water levels.

The Department of Transportation is committed to continuous improvement to meet its responsibility to improve transportation access to communities, one of the actions identified under the Reducing the Cost of Living strategic initiative.

- Information on the Victim Notification Program;
- Help for victims of serious violent crime to complete a Victims of Crime Emergency Fund application; and
- Information about the progress of the victim's case.

The victim services program contributes to the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly's goal of ensuring communities are sustainable, vibrant and safe, and is one way the GNWT works with families and communities to improve the well-being of residents.

# Premier Asks Federal Candidates for Positions on Key Issues

**YELLOWKNIFE (April XX)** – Premier Floyd K. Roland has written to leaders of the federal political parties seeking their position on four key areas of importance to residents of the Northwest Territories (NWT).

He says Western Arctic voters need to know where their candidates and parties stand on questions regarding Governance, Economic Development, Fiscal priorities and the Environment.

In particular, the Premier wants to know what Western Arctic Candidates will do to advance the Agreement in Principle on Devolution. "Delaying or suspending the Devolution negotiations process now for the sake of a few votes is not in the interest our Territory or its residents," the Premier cautioned.

The Premier's letter was sent yesterday to the leaders of the Conservative Party, the Liberal Party, the New Democratic Party and the Green Party. It was copied to each of the candidates in the Western Arctic riding.

In addition to questions concerning Governance and Devolution, it asks Western Arctic Candidates to provide positions on the Mackenzie Valley Highway, Mackenzie Gas Project, Regulatory Improvement, and Infrastructure Investment Program Renewal; Fiscal priorities including Health Care, Housing and the NWT's Borrowing Authority; Climate change and Water Management.

The Premier has asked for responses by April 25th, 2011. Responses to the Premier's letter will be posted online for NWT residents to read.

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The Northwest Territories has made significant progress since I last wrote to party leaders during the 2008 election campaign asking leaders to state, on the record, your party's positions on priority issues for the Northwest Territories.

After many years of hard work, we have recently signed an Agreement in Principle on Devolution and the National Energy Board has given the green light for the Mackenzie Gas Project. Canada's investment in the long term economic sustainability of the NWT is already producing tangible results with the Project Description Reports for the proposed Mackenzie Valley Highway from Wrigley to Tuktoyaktuk underway.

Understanding that the NWT has the potential to fuel nation building projects, and that the actions taken today will have profound impacts for future generations, territorial residents have a right to know where you and your party stands on issues of critical importance to our region. We look to you for leadership and firm answers to the questions that follow.

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#### 1) DEVOLUTION AND GOVERNANCE

The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) is pleased to have secured an Agreement in Principle with the Government of Canada and, at present, the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation and the Northwest Territory Métis Nation, earlier this year. Devolution of authority over public lands and water has long been a priority of the GNWT and is the next logical step in the political development of our territory. Concluding the final agreement and undertaking necessary implementation work are required to achieve this longstanding objective.

- Will your party honour the Northwest Territories Lands and Resources Devolution Agreement in Principle and commit the necessary resources to conclude and implement a Final Agreement expeditiously?
- What commitment will you make that the NWT will have a say in landrelated decisions, such as the creation of national parks, while a Final Agreement is negotiated?

Concluding and implementing land, resource and self-government agreements is of critical importance to the GNWT, Aboriginal governments and the people of the NWT. Such agreements help clarify outstanding Aboriginal rights and provide certainty with respect to land ownership. The challenge ahead is to ensure the implementation of these agreements generates the promised, and expected, benefits.

- Both the territorial and federal governments have important obligations under these agreements. How will your party ensure the federal government meets its obligations under existing land, resource and selfgovernment agreements in the NWT?
- How will you ensure that communities with self-government agreements have the necessary resources to fully implement their settlements?

#### 2) ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT AND SUSTAINABILITY

Legal authority over resources is only one part of the equation. Access to those resources, and unleashing their economic potential, is just as essential.

#### Mackenzie Valley Highway

The strategic value of the Mackenzie Valley Highway (MVH) has been detailed repeatedly in documents including *Connecting Canada: Coast to Coast to Coast and, most recently, Northern Connections: A Multi-Modal Transportation Blueprint for the North.* 

The construction of a north-south highway is vital to reach many of the NWT's deposits of oil and gas, minerals and metals, and lakes and rivers with hydroelectric power potential. Improved infrastructure will also increase connections among communities, reducing living costs for NWT residents, making territorial businesses more competitive, and creating meaningful opportunities to diversify the economy in many of our more remote communities. Not to be overlooked, investment in the NWT's transportation infrastructure is an effective demonstration of Canada's sovereignty.

Construction of the MVH would assist us in adapting to changing climatic conditions. An all-weather link through the Mackenzie Valley would alleviate the increasing problems associated with reduced winter road reliability and reduced periods of operation.

A recent economic analysis of the impacts of constructing the Mackenzie Valley Highway found there would be 14,000 jobs during construction, a 20% increase in tourism, \$15.7 million in additional disposable income annually, as well as savings of \$1.5 to \$2.2 billion (exploration and well development) for the oil and gas industry if the Mackenzie Gas Project also proceeds.

- Recognizing that new transportation infrastructure remains a federal responsibility in the NWT, how would your party support the construction of the Mackenzie Valley Highway from Wrigley to Tuktoyaktuk?
- Funding of \$150 million over five years for the construction of the Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk segment of the MVH was identified in the recent federal budget. What is your position on this?

#### Mackenzie Gas Project

The recent issuance of the Certificate of Public Convenience and Necessity by the National Energy Board for the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline Project provides the necessary regulatory approval for this long sought initiative. Developed responsibly, this project will transform the economy of the NWT and provide southern markets with a reliable supply of clean energy for decades to come.

In addition to bolstering Canada's reputation as a world energy superpower, construction of the pipeline would create thousands of jobs and billions of dollars in economic activity across Canada. The potential impacts of the Mackenzie Gas Project during its lifetime are exceptional – over 200,000 person years of employment, \$86.3 billion in GDP and \$10 billion in tax revenues for the federal government. Clearly, what's good for the NWT is great for Canada.

As a direct beneficiary of these economic benefits, the federal government has an obligation to contribute to this extraordinary economic opportunity – just as it did for many years when today's energy powerhouse provinces, like Newfoundland and Labrador, Alberta and Saskatchewan, were first developing their resource wealth. The NWT expects nothing less than the chance to repeat their success.

- Are you and your party committed to seeing the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline project proceed?
- How quickly can the NWT expect action on this priority initiative if your party forms government?

#### Regulatory Improvement

The Northwest Territories is experiencing historically low investment in resource exploration and development across the territory due largely to our complex regulatory regime. Resource development investment, from grass roots exploration to full project development, is key to the NWT's self-sufficiency and prosperity.

- What are the key regulatory improvements that you would support to encourage economic development in the NWT?
- In light of the signing of the Devolution AIP how would you see Canada engaging GNWT in regulatory improvement initiatives?

#### Infrastructure Investment Program Renewal

While the Northwest Territories has benefited from recent federal infrastructure programs such as the Canada Strategic Infrastructure Fund, the Building Canada Plan and the Knowledge Infrastructure Program, we are still facing growing infrastructure deficits in the areas of municipal infrastructure, transportation and information technology infrastructure. Aging and underdeveloped infrastructure, increasing resource development pressures, and climate change impacts are contributing to this growing infrastructure deficit. There is a pressing need for the federal government to develop, in consultation with the three territorial governments, a long-term base plus funding program that addresses the unique issues and challenges of Northern infrastructure.

- With current federal infrastructure programs such as the Building Canada Plan, Infrastructure Stimulus Fund and Canada Strategic Infrastructure Fund drawing to a close, what will you and your party do to ensure the unique infrastructure needs of the NWT are addressed?
- What would you do to improve communications infrastructure in the NWT, including high-speed internet service?

#### 3) FISCAL PRIORITIES

The high cost of providing essential public services such as health care and education in the NWT continues to present challenges to our government. To ensure the continued sustainability of remote communities, to build and maintain a healthy society and to increase NWT residents' quality of life, we need assurance of continued federal fiscal support.

- The GNWT counts on adequate and stable funding through the Territorial Formula Funding (TFF) arrangements to provide essential public services to NWT residents. Do you commit your party to ensuring adequate ongoing TFF levels?
- Recognizing the high per capita costs of delivering health services in a large, sparsely populated territory, what will you and your party do to provide fair, sustainable health care funding above the Canada Health Transfer in the NWT?
- Do you commit your party to ensuring there will be no additions to the *Canada Health Act* (e.g. long-term care, pharmaceuticals) without full funding by the federal government?

# • Would you support forgiving student loans for graduating medical and health care graduates in return for service in rural/remote northern communities?

Housing needs in the NWT are far greater than in southern jurisdictions as a result of the region's geographic, climatic, economic and social conditions. The high cost of building, maintaining and operating housing in the territory make housing unaffordable for a large proportion of the population, particularly in small non-market communities, without government support. Recent capital investments by the federal and territorial governments are a short-term step in addressing NWT housing needs. However a great deal of work, collaboration and ongoing investment is vital if the growing need for housing and the challenges posed by our aging housing stock are to be addressed over the long term.

- How will you and your party help to address the critical shortage of social and affordable housing to sustain the NWT's social housing stock?
- What will you do to address the decreasing level of support for operations and maintenance from the federal government?

#### **Borrowing Authority**

Currently the GNWT requires federal government approval in order to borrow. The size and definition of the limit set by Canada on this authority have a very real impact on the GNWT's ability to support needed investments in infrastructure that will grow the NWT economy and improve the lives of our residents. Canada needs to consider its role in the long term development of the NWT. A longer term perspective on the borrowing limit, one that enables the GNWT to make large, financially sustainable, investments would be a win for both Canada and the NWT.

The GNWT is committed to our *Fiscal Responsibility Policy* which is based on the principle of living within our means and avoiding unaffordable levels of debt. If there must be a legislated borrowing limit, a formula-based approach mirroring the requirements of the *Fiscal Responsibility Policy* is preferable to an arbitrary amount.

• Does your party support the establishment of a responsible borrowing limit that reflects the fiscal maturity of the GNWT and that facilitates badly needed infrastructure investment in the Northwest Territories?

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### 4) ENVIRONMENTAL ACTION

#### <u>Climate change</u>

NWT residents are already experiencing the dramatic impacts of climate change. Permafrost degradation, changing snow loads, changing water flows and shoreline erosion threaten existing infrastructure and facilities throughout the NWT. It also advocates integrating climate change risks in to new infrastructure planning, incorporating traditional and local knowledge into planning, and developing new technologies and materials responsive to the changing northern climate. Governments and residents of the NWT are taking action to reduce our greenhouse gas emissions and to identify ways to adapt to changes in our climate. However, adaptation measures will require substantial investment in community and transportation infrastructure. Investment is also needed to develop renewable energy.

• What programs will you and your party implement specifically to help the NWT further reduce its greenhouse gas emissions and to assist the territory in adapting to and mitigating the existing and anticipated impacts of climate change?

#### Water Management

The federal government currently has the mandate for water management in the NWT. In May 2010, Indian and Northern Affairs Canada and the GNWT signed *Northern Voices, Northern Waters – NWT Water Stewardship Strategy*. The Strategy represents a significant policy commitment on the parts of the Governments of Canada and the NWT to ensure the "Waters of the Northwest Territories will remain clean, abundant and productive for all time." Yet, the Strategy alone is not enough. Only concrete and wellfunded actions will achieve our joint objectives.

- What actions and funding commitments toward water monitoring and research is your party prepared to make to advance the Action Plan in support of the NWT Water Stewardship Strategy?
- Does your party support the recommendations of the scientific team contained in "Lower Athabasca Water Quality Monitoring Plan Phase 1", and will you commit to developing and implementing a holistic monitoring program within the NWT in subsequent phases of this Plan?

#### **MOVING FORWARD**

While not an exhaustive list of the challenges and opportunities facing the NWT, this overview of our priorities highlights the issues of greatest importance to the Government and people of the Northwest Territories.

The GNWT recognizes the necessity, and power, of partnerships – with the federal government and also with Aboriginal governments, industry, and communities. Working together holds the key to a stronger NWT. We are anxious to learn how you see our government's relationship with the incoming federal government unfolding in the years ahead.

Your considered response is important to the future of the NWT, and to all of Canada. Written answers to the questions we have posed will further inform NWT residents and facilitate their decision-making regarding the upcoming election. This letter, as well as your responses to it received by April 25, 2011, will be made public on the GNWT website.

The Premier is committed to advancing negotiations on Devolution and continues to meet with NWT leaders, communities and organizations to correct misinformation and increase understanding about the Agreement-in-Principle signed in January.

# **Ministers Say Economic Potential High - Devolution Critical**

**YELLOWKNIFE (April 20, 2011)** – The potential for ongoing growth in the NWT economy and the key role Devolution will play were highlighted yesterday by Deputy Premier, J. Michael Miltenberger, and the Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment, Bob McLeod, at the Annual General Meeting of the NWT Chamber of Commerce in Yellowknife.

Speaking on behalf of the Premier, Minister Miltenberger emphasized the need for residents of the NWT to have direct control over their future.

"All Governments and people of the NWT must play a role in decisions concerning our collective future," the Minister said. "Living up to our potential as a territory is always going to be difficult – if not impossible – unless we have authority over our own lands, waters and resources."

Minister McLeod highlighted the potential economic impacts of large scale infrastructure investments like the Mackenzie Gas Project and the Mackenzie Valley Highway.

"The pipeline is a basin-opening project and nation-building endeavour that will be a key economic driver for our future. Constructed and operated in an environmentally and socially responsible way, the pipeline will provide a secure supply of natural gas to southern markets," said Minister McLeod.

Minister McLeod also spoke of the potential associated with the diamond and mineral projects currently being considered in the NWT including the proposed Gahcho Kue mine, Prairie Creek lead zinc mine and the Nechalacho rare earth project.

One of the priorities in the Department of Health and Social Services action plan, *A Foundation for Change*, is to improve vaccination rates across the NWT and improve communication around diseases.

# South Slave Minister's Regional Forum on Aboriginal Student Achievement Focuses on Revitalizing Language and Culture

**YELLOWKNIFE (Thursday, April 28, 2011)** – Language and culture revitalization was the focus of the South Slave Aboriginal Student Achievement (ASA) Minister's Regional Forum on Hay River's K'atlo'deeche First Nation Reserve, April 5 to 7, 2011.

This was the fifth in a series of forums hosted by the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jackson Lafferty, to hear from community and youth representatives, educators and Aboriginal governments. Feedback from the forums will help direct development of territorial, as well as community specific, education plans.

"The Northwest Territories (NWT) is unique in its multitude of recognized languages and cultures," says the Minister. "Many of our Aboriginal languages are disappearing; we must work diligently to preserve and revitalize these, which in turn revitalize our cultures. We will succeed by working together to develop a plan to engage our children and youth in their Aboriginal language."

K'atlo'deeche First Nations Chief, Roy Fabian, spoke to the importance of Dene language and culture. "The expressed concern for the well being of young Dene in the future is in all the hearts of the people involved in the Forum. Returning to the Spirit of being Dene with strong Dene beliefs, values, knowledge and skills based on the Integrity of the Land is vital for Dene Culture and Language to survive."

"It was a great workshop. It really widened my eyes on what the education system is lacking and why," says grade 12 Diamond Jenness Storefront School student, Tali Warrington. "I believe that the people are going to take what we youth have been saying and make some progress in upgrading our educational system."

Grade 11 student, Jake Basil, of Lutsel K'e Dene School, says, "I think this is a great way to get everyone's ideas coming together and sharing options and ideas to rebuild our cultures and traditions for the future."

Mattie McNeill's comments, as the former principal of Chief Sunrise School, long time South Slave educator and keynote speaker, mirrored the high school students' outlook. "I think this

forum is an opportunity for us to explore our willingness to shift and share power for decision making and political action in order to improve Aboriginal student achievement."

Dear Premier Roland:

Thank you for your letter of April 12, 2011 asking about the policies of the New Democratic Party of Canada as they concern the people of the Northwest Territories. At the outset, let me first say how much I have enjoyed my visits to the NWT. I have always received a warm reception from Northerners. I believe this is because Northern values and NDP values are often very similar.

The NWT is well served by MP Dennis Bevington. Dennis, more so than any other MP, has put on to the national stage the real concerns of the North. Because of his efforts, for example, Northerners received an increase to the Northern Residents Tax Deduction. He was also successful in having the House of Commons Committee on Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development conduct an in-depth study into Northern Economic Development. He ensured that funding commitments for the expansion of Nahanni National Park Reserve were guaranteed in writing. Dennis was also able to build majority House of Commons support for his bill to increase the borrowing limit for the NWT.


I have answered your questions below in the order in which they were asked. Thank you again for the opportunity to provide the people of the Northwest Territories with specific and detailed answers to their many issues and concerns.

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- **Question:** Will your party honour the Northwest Territories Lands and Resources Devolution Agreement in Principle and commit the necessary resources to conclude and implement the Final Agreement expeditiously?
- **Answer:** The attainment of province- like powers by the Northwest Territories is fully supported by the New Democratic Party of Canada. We disagree however with the manner by which the current agreement-inprinciple was reached. For example, a New Democrat Minister of Indian Affairs and Northern Development would never renege on the fiduciary duty to the Aboriginal people of the North in the manner that Minister Duncan did by his refusal to meet with the Dene. The history of constitutional development in the NWT has shown conclusively that cooperation and agreement with all stakeholders is the key to success.

With regards to the current devolution agreement-in-principle, a New Democrat government would review it with the intent of ensuring the maximum transfer of province-like powers to the people of the NWT. We would achieve this objective through a tri-partite process involving representatives of the Aboriginal people of the NWT, the Territorial Government and the Government of Canada.

- **Question:** What commitment will you make that the NWT will have a say in land-related decisions, such as the creation of national parks, while a final agreement is negotiated?
- **Answer:** For far too long the federal government made decisions about the lands of the Northwest Territories -- without involving Northerners. A recent example of this was the decision by the Conservative government to allow sub-surface protection of the Edehzhie (Horn Plateau) area of the Dehcho to lapse October 31, 2010. The Harper Conservatives took this action, despite a plea by your own Minister of the Environment to continue the protection of Edehzhie.

A New Democrat government would work, in cooperation with NWT governments, Aboriginal and public, in making decisions about the future of Northern lands.

• **Question:** Both the territorial and federal governments have important obligations under these agreements. How will your party ensure the federal



government meets its obligations under existing land, resource and selfgovernment agreements in the NWT?

- **Answer:** A New Democrat government, as part of a national policy of renewal, will build a new partnership on a nation-to-nation basis with the Dene, Inuivialuit and Métis people of the NWT. This national policy will restore a central element of social justice and reconcile the hopes of Aboriginal people with those of all Canadians. A key element in this will be respecting the full intent of the modern treaties. As such, a New Democrat government would completely fulfil its obligations to the North's many agreements.
- **Question:** How will you ensure that communities with self-government agreements have the necessary resources to implement fully their settlements?
- **Answer:** At our 2006 national convention, delegates from the Northwest Territories insisted that our policies regarding implementation funding for Aboriginal agreements must meet the full cost of implementation and that incremental funding for public governments must also meet the full cost of implementation.

# **Economic Development and Sustainability**

- **Question:** Recognizing that new transportation infrastructure remains a federal responsibility in the NWT, how would your party support the construction of the Mackenzie Valley Highway from Wrigley to Tuktoyaktuk?
- Answer: In our 2011 election platform, we commit to creating a Northern Highways investment fund designed to assist in the completion of the Mackenzie Valley Highway. A New Democrat government would introduce amendments to the *Northwest Territories Act* transferring this authority to the territories. MP Bevington introduced a private member's bill to do this April 30, 2009.
- **Question:** Funding of over \$150 million over five years for the construction of the Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk segment of the MVH was identified in the recent federal budget. What is your position on this?
- **Answer:** We note that the promised funding for this vital infrastructure project would only start next year and only at the rate of \$30 million per



year. We believe that this level of funding is insufficient to complete the highway construction project.

The first priority of our Northern Highways investment fund would be to secure the completion of the Dempster Highway from Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk. At the same time, we would re-examine the more than \$300 million dollars in planned cuts to Northern programs as laid out in the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development's 2011-12 Expenditure Plan. We think it is wrong to cut back funding which supports Northern youth and women, builds community capacity and provides environmental protection while only promising future funding for the highway. New Democrats believe all these are important, and accordingly, should be properly supported.

- **Question:** Are you and your party committed to seeing the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline project proceed?
- **Answer:** New Democrats have supported and continue to support this important project. We recognize that oil and gas will continue to play a prominent role in our energy mix in the medium term. We will develop in consultation and cooperation with provincial, territorial and Aboriginal governments, unions, energy providers, environmental organizations, and other stakeholders a comprehensive strategy for our country's long-term energy security in a lower carbon future. Our energy policies will put Canadians first.

In Northern terms, this means the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline must only proceed in a manner that protects the environment, respects land, resources and self-government agreements, while providing significant benefits to Northerners.

- **Question:** How quickly can the NWT expect action on this priority initiative if your party forms government?
- **Answer:** Because completion of the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline would significantly improve Canada's energy security and the reduced greenhouse gas footprint from the burning of natural gas, a New Democrat government would take all appropriate steps to ensure this project is completed in a timely fashion.
- **Question:** What are the key regulatory improvements that you would support to encourage economic development in the NWT?



• **Answer:** The current system of environmental and other regulatory approvals in the Northwest Territories grew from a desire by Northerners to have a say in how their lands and waters are used. New Democrats fully support the environmental regulatory processes as laid out in land claim final agreements like the Inuvialuit Final Agreement.

There is still work to be done, however, to perfect these systems. New Democrats support many of the recommendations of "Road to Improvement" also known as the McCrank Report. For example, the NDP fully supports recommendation number one. "A priority should be given to completing the Land Use Plans in all areas, and obtaining their approval from the federal government." We also support the recommendations concerning impact benefit agreements, closing gaps in environmental protections, and cumulative impact-monitoring, to name a few.

- **Question:** In light of the signing of the Devolution AIP how would you see Canada engaging GNWT in regulatory improvement initiatives?
- **Answer:** A New Democrat government would work in cooperation with the governments of the Northwest Territories, Aboriginal and public. We would use this tripartite process to implement changes with a goal to increasing the amount of control Northerners have over how their lands and waters are protected.
- **Question:** With current federal infrastructure programs such as the Building Canada Plan, Infrastructure Stimulus Fund and Canada Strategic Infrastructure Fund drawing to a close, what will you and your party do to ensure the unique infrastructure needs of the NWT are addressed?
- **Answer:** As we state in our 2011 election platform, a New Democrat government would continue current federal infrastructure funding commitments, like those under the *Building Canada Fund*.


We will also develop a stable, predictable Canadian infrastructure plan, to include; funding public transit by one additional cent of the existing gas tax, significant new funding for affordable and social housing; maintaining the Gateways and Border Crossings Fund, creating a Northern Highways investment fund, providing federal investment in major green energy projects across the country and funding for sewer and water treatment. As it is NDP policy, any infrastructure funding for the North must take into consideration the cost of doing business in the North.



- **Question:** What would you do to improve communications infrastructure in the NWT, including high-speed internet service?
- **Answer:** In our platform, New Democrats commit to ensuring all Canadians have access to broadband and a robust digital economy. To achieve this, we will apply the proceeds from the advanced wireless spectrum auction to ensure all Canadians, no matter where they live, will have quality high-speed broadband internet access. We will expect the major internet carriers to contribute financially to this goal.

# **Fiscal Priorities**

- **Question:** The GNWT counts on adequate and stable funding through the Territorial Formula Funding (TFF) agreements to provide essential public services to NWT residents. Do you commit your party to ensure adequate ongoing TFF levels?
- Answer: New Democrats believe in fairness in Canada's dealings with its partners in Confederation. At our 2008 national convention, delegates from the Northwest Territories were instrumental in seeing that our policies ensure that funding for Canada's territories should be based on the actual cost of delivering government programs and services in the North. This policy is in sharp contrast to the approach from the Conservatives and Liberals that both insist on using a per-capita formula which short changes the North.
- **Question:** Recognizing the high per capita costs of delivering health services in a large, sparsely populated territory, what will you and your party do to provide fair, sustainable health care funding above the Canada Health Transfer in the NWT?
- **Answer:** As we outline in our platform, a New Democrat Government would negotiate a new ten-year health accord with the provinces and territories in 2014. The accord will guarantee a continued strong federal contribution including the 6 per cent escalator to Canada's public health care system in return for a clear, monitored and enforced commitment to respect the principles of the *Canada Health Act* and to the integrity and modernization of health care. As noted above, it is NDP policy that the special conditions and costs of delivering government programs and services in the North must be taken into consideration when funding is provided.



- **Answer:** New Democrats believe that downloading of costs to other levels of government is not in the best interests of Northerners. We would ensure that all necessary and appropriate funding be in-place before additions are made to the *Canada Health Act*.
- **Question:** Would you support forgiving student loans for graduating medical and health care graduates in return for service in rural/remote northern communities?
- **Answer:** In our platform, we commit to working with the provinces and territories to address the shortage of doctors, nurses and other health care professionals. Specifically, our plan calls for training 1,200 new doctors over the next 10 years, adding 6,000 new training spaces for nurses over six years while substantially increasing the number of training spaces for other health professionals. As part of this process, we will work- in collaboration with the provinces and territories- to establish programs aimed at recruiting and supporting low-income, rural and Aboriginal medical students. Forgiving student loans may be a workable element of this process, but a holistic approach developed in cooperation must be used rather than the current 'here's the solution, take it or leave it' approach of the Conservatives.
- **Question:** How will you and your party help to address the critical shortage of social and affordable housing to sustain the NWT's social housing stock?
- **Answer:** The current shortage of social and affordable housing across Canada is directly related to the killing of Canada's housing programs by the Liberals in the 1990's. Since that time, social housing agencies have struggled to meet the growing need for affordable and social housing. The need for housing assistance is most acute in the North, where the percentage of households in core need is much greater than elsewhere.

As part of our platform, we commit to providing significant new funding for affordable and social housing. New Democrats will do this by enacting legislation to ensure secure, adequate, accessible and affordable housing for Canadians. To increase the supply of affordable housing, we will restore funding for the homeowners Residential Rehabilitation Assistance Program, and the Affordable Housing Initiative. Our platform also commits us to



doubling the funding for forgivable loans under the *Home Adaption for Seniors' Independence Program*, to help elders remain in their own homes.

- **Question:** What will you do to address the decreasing level of support for operations and maintenance from the federal government?
- **Answer:** The decreasing levels of operations and maintenance support from the federal government are directly due to federal policies that have been calculated to shift the costs onto the territories and provinces. While these policies were enacted by the Liberals in the 1990s, they have been fully supported by the Conservatives since 2006.

As I said earlier, New Democrats believe in fairness for all within Confederation. Support for operations and maintenance of social housing must be addressed in any new national housing initiative. A New Democrat government would work in cooperation with the territories, provinces and other housing stakeholders to address the need for on-going operations and maintenance support.

- **Question:** Does your party support the establishment of a responsible borrowing limit that reflects the fiscal maturity of the GNWT and that facilitates badly needed infrastructure investment in the Northwest Territories?
- **Answer:** As you know, New Democrats have already been working on this issue. During the last parliament, Dennis Bevington brought forward his Private Member's bill to increase the borrowing limit for the Northwest Territories. His bill, which received support from the majority of Members of Parliament, would have established the NWT's borrowing limit at 70 per cent of the territories' total estimated revenues. It was unfortunate that the Conservatives were the only party opposing the bill, preferring instead to continue the current situation where the North must first seek permission from Ottawa, before it can borrow.

At committee hearings into the bill, it was revealed by Northwest Territories Finance Department officials that the review of the borrowing limit currently underway was only administrative. They confirmed that this review did not take into consideration the adequacy of the current borrowing limit or whether there is a need for a borrowing limit.

New Democrats do not believe any of the territories should be forced to come, cap-in-hand, asking for Ottawa's permission to borrow the funds



necessary to ensure the people of the North have the basic infrastructure that is often so acutely needed. The Government of the Northwest Territories has shown commendable fiscal maturity and responsibility, as reflected in Moody's Investors Services Aa1 credit rating for the NWT.

New Democrats support the removal of colonial relics like the borrowing limit from the *Northwest Territories Act*. As you stated in the 2006/07 Budget Address, "This borrowing limit flies in the face of the principle of territorial political autonomy. It reflects an outdated and unreasonable view that we cannot make sound financial decisions on our own. And it does not reflect the fact that the Government's borrowing ability should be based on our capacity to finance debt rather than be set at a fixed level."

# **Environmental Action**

- **Question:** What programs will you and your party implement specifically to help the NWT further reduce its greenhouse gas emissions and to assist the territory in adapting to and mitigating the existing and anticipated impacts of climate change?
- **Answer:** Dealing with the crisis of climate change is a central plank in the New Democrat's commitment to Canadians. We are committed to taking practical first steps to tackle climate change. A New Democrat government will adopt the Climate Change Accountability Act, legislation to ensure that Canada meets the long-term target of reducing our greenhouse gas emissions to a level 80 per cent below that of 1990 by the year 2050, and we will establish interim targets for the period 2015-2045. We will put a price on carbon through a cap-and-trade system, which will establish hard emissions limits for Canada's biggest polluters to ensure companies pay their environmental bills and create an incentive for emissions reductions. As Prime Minister, I will work closely with President Obama and his administration in Washington to ensure a coordinated response to climate change. Our party is committed to advancing the idea of an integrated continental cap-and-trade system ensuring a level economic playing field for North American businesses. A New Democrat government will establish effective programs to help Canadian communities, particularly those in the North where the effects of climate change are being felt the most, to deal with the significant impacts of a warming planet. We will also insist that this nation lives up to our international obligations to assist developing countries in mitigating and adapting to climate change.



- **Question:** What actions and funding commitments toward water monitoring and research is your party prepared to make to advance the Action Plan in support of the NWT Water Stewardship Strategy?
- Answer: In 2007, the Northwest Territories Legislative Assembly passed a motion declaring, "All peoples have a fundamental human right to water that must be recognized nationally and internationally, including the development of appropriate institutional mechanisms to ensure that these rights are implemented." New Democrats agree with this motion. We also agree with the vision of "Northern Voices, Northern Waters" that, "The waters of the Northwest Territories will remain clean, abundant and productive for all time."

"Northern Voices, Northern Waters" promotes an ecosystem-based approach within watersheds to improve water stewardship that reflects the deep and fundamental relationship between residents and the waters of the Northwest Territories. It sets a common path forward for water partners to take steps today to ensure water is used respectfully for the benefit of generations The Strategy will improve decision-making processes, information sharing and communications among all parties involved in water stewardship activities in the NWT.

Providing funding support for an action plan is the next crucial step in ensuring "Northern Voices, Northern Waters" becomes a reality. A New Democrat government would support funding to advance the action plan. Unfortunately, I am concerned that funding for this action plan is part of the more than \$57 million cut from the Department of Indian Affairs and Northern Development's 2011/12 budget for "contributions for promoting the safe use, development, conservation and protection of the North's natural resources."

- **Question:** Does your party support the recommendations of the scientific team contained in "Lower Athabasca Water Quality Monitoring Plan Phase 1" and will you commit to developing and implementing a holistic monitoring program within the NWT in subsequent phases of this Plan?
- Answer: In our platform, New Democrats state our strong support for science-based monitoring and enforcement for the oil sand sector, particularly the waters of the Athabasca. During the 2008 election at a stop in Fort Smith, I committed to protecting the Athabasca watershed. I made that



commitment on the banks of the Slave River and a government I lead will fully support the implementation of this program.

Monitoring by itself, however, is not sufficient. The federal government must be prepared to take its responsibilities in protecting a watershed that flows through three provinces and the NWT. Canada must be prepared to enforce its laws and, where necessary, introduce stronger regulations to protect the environment.

Hello Mr. Premier,

The Green Party has asked me, in association with some of our other northern candidates to prepare this response to your letter.

In addition to these responses, I would like to say that my first priority is the people of the NWT, and this trumps any Party policies. I will work with whichever party is governing to ensure that northerners get a fair shake, and my door will always be open to listen to the concerns of all levels of government, Territorial, Aboriginal self governments, and Municipalities.

1. A) I will work with whichever party forms the government to ensure the NWT is moving forward on a Devolution Agreement that works for the people of the NWT with all necessary resources.

B) I believe any Province or Territory should have a voice at the table with regards to the creation of national parks.

C) Any obligations under existing land, resource and self government agreements must be met by the federal government, no ifs ands or buts.

D) I will support and implement initiatives to ensure communities with self-government agreements have the necessary resources to fully implement the settlements. In order for implementation to be successful, communities need to be supported with strong infrastructure and an investment in education. Additionally We have allocated \$800 M / year specifically to First Nations towards education, safe drinking water and housing. In addition, we propose a complete (fully costed) national affordable housing strategy, to the tune of \$400 M / year, plus \$150 M / year for energy retrofits for low income housing stock. Our municipal program allocates \$2.4 B a year towards six funds that focus on affordable housing, water/wastewater, brownfield remediation, sports/culture/recreation, mass transit, and cycling/pedestrian promotion.

2) A) The MVH needs to be built and I will support all initiatives to build it.

B) The funding for the Inuvik/Tuk highway should be in any federal budget that is tabled once parliament resumes.

C&D) I will work to ensure any development on the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline meets and exceeds the recommendations set out by the National Energy Board, and the regulations in place in the NWT and Canada and that there is sufficient monitoring in place to make sure the project meets those recommendations and regulations. We also need to ensure that the Economic, Environmental, and Social costs of the pipeline are taken into account.

E&F) We need the Land Claims settled and a Devolution Agreement in place so that there is no ambiguity to the regulations in place. Settling the Land Claims and getting a Devolution Agreement in place will encourage economic development in the NWT. Once a Devolution Agreement is in place, it would be up to the Territory to decide what regulatory improvement initiatives should be in place.

G) I will work with those other 125+ rural and northern MPs to educate southern MPs as to the unique infrastructure needs of the NWT. By presenting a united voice in Ottawa, we can make the Government of Canada realise how important these initiatives are to the NWT. The Green Party also has a fully costed municipal program that focuses on six areas: each is allocated a 'Superfund' of \$500 million/fund/year, to which municipalities can apply for grant funding to replace the less specific Canada Strategic Infrastructure Fund (CSIF). These areas are:

a) Community Housing Options Promotion (CHOP) Fund supporting a national housing program to build energy efficient co-ops and affordable housing units where there is a shortage of such housing options;

b) Water and Waste Treatment Facilities (WWTF) Fund to upgrade water treatment, sewage treatment and recycling facilities to make them efficient, safe and sustainable;

c) Community Brownfield Remediation (CBR) Fund to provide assistance in cleaning up toxic and brownfield sites;

d) Sports, Cultural and Recreational Facilities (SCRF) Fund to support the development of green recreational and cultural facilities and refurbish existing facilities;

e) Mass Transit Promotion (MTP) Fund to improve and expand urban mass transit infrastructure and inter-modal connections, as well as car-sharing initiatives; and,

f) Cycling and Pedestrian Promotion (CPP) Fund to support pedestrian and cycling infrastructure and smart-growth developments that transform urban areas and towns into walkable communities linked by transit to reduce the need for owning and using cars.

Other relevant goals in our platform include:

· A continuation of the gas tax commitment to allow for stable and predictable funding;

• An increase of the Gas Tax Transfer to municipalities to 5 cents/litre to be used in funding sustainable transportation initiatives such as public transit, cycling and pedestrian infrastructure and rural roads;

• A tax policy shift to create a new pool of long term municipal infrastructure funding by allowing municipalities to issue new Municipal Registered Retirement Savings Plans Bonds (MRRSPsBs) which can be held in RRSPs and self-directed RRSPs; and,

• An allocation of one cent from GST on an approximate per capita basis to municipal governments for "Green Cities" initiatives, ensuring (through contractual agreements) that the funding is not used in ways that encourage urban sprawl, but instead to reduce sprawl and greenhouse gas emissions, conserve electricity and water, increase densification, expand convenient, safe, reliable and affordable public transit, and build cycling and walking paths.

H) There are a few initiatives being suggested by the other parties with regards to high-speed internet service in the NWT. These are not sufficient. I have heard goals of 1.5Mbps in every community in 3 years, well I can get better than that on my cell phone in Yellowknife right now. 1.5Mbps was fast ten years ago, making that the end goal is like suggesting we will upgrade everyone's 8-track players to cassette tape players when everyone else is already using iPods. It is not sufficient and leaves every child, business, and government agency at a disadvantage compared to the majority of Canadians. I will work to put real high speed internet into every community. In my opinion, anything less than 5Mbps is not acceptable. The Green Party also recognises that information access should be a right, not a privilege, for all Canadians. We also see that youth are increasingly connected through virtual communities online, and that young people are intrinsic to healthy community development. We are concerned about the increasing corporate control of media, and wish to see arms length media bodies remain free of political interference.

# 3A) Yes

B) I will work with the other parties to ensure health care funding is sufficient for all Canadian jurisdictions. We are committed to addressing health concerns where we can get the most return for our investment: that is, at the prevention end. We recognize the need for reliable, accessible acute care, and that the best way to reduce wait times and improve over all access to the health care system is to reduce the number of people within it through preventative health care. This includes education as a major comment (eg: 500 million annual investment in early childhood education, and programs focusing on first nation education), to ensure that we change direction as a country and start becoming fitter and more active, and make healthier lifestyle and dietary choices. We also propose in our platform a 300million/year investment in a national pharmacare program.

# C) Yes

D) Yes. In addition, we have a \$1 Billion allocated to a municipal youth employment program that allows for youth to be employed within their community for a year, completion of which makes them eligible for a tuition credit for post-secondary education.

E) We need a national housing strategy to ensure all Canadians have adequate housing and I will work with the other parties to try and make this happen. As mentioned above, we have allocated \$800 M / year specifically to First Nations towards education, safe drinking water and housing. In addition, we propose a complete (fully costed) national affordable

housing strategy, to the tune of \$400 M / year, plus \$150 M / year for energy retrofits for low income housing stock. Our municipal program allocates \$2.4 B a year towards six funds that focus on affordable housing, water/wastewater, brownfield remediation, sports/culture/recreation, mass transit, and cycling/pedestrian promotion.

F) Whatever I can to keep those levels from decreasing. The Green Party supports the implementation of a tax shift, to move taxes off of things we want, like jobs (ie: income splitting), and onto things we don't want, like carbon emissions. We recognise that Canada's future lies with a clean energy economy, and especially in the north we see that we cannot keep subsidizing oil and gas - we only perpetuate this dependency. the north is being affected very heavily by climate change, and we need to invest in our communities in order to increase their resilience and help support this shift towards a clean energy economy. We focus in our housing initiatives (cited above) on supergreen construction and consequent reductions in energy needs. Also, I recognize that the NWT is looking at a carbon tax, and believe that this would work best at the territorial level, as 9/10 times, Ottawa does not realise the additional burden national strategies like this would put on northerners.

G) Yes

4A) The federal government needs to ensure there is adequate funding for initiatives like the Con Mine Energy Project and ENR's Biomass initiatives.

B&C) There needs to be adequate monitoring of water in the NWT and I would support initiatives to make sure these monitoring agencies have sufficient funding to protect the water of the NWT.We have set aside in our platform 800 million per year towards First Nations focused programs around safe drinking water, housing, and education. Additionally, one of our municipal superfunds (cited above) focuses on water/wastewater.

Thank you for your letter of April 12, 2011, in which you outline issues of importance to the Government and clizers of the tother to the subjects that you have identified, the Liberal Party of Canada's positions are below:

# Devolution and Governance

The Liberal Party supports devolution, which has been a longstanding goal of the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT). In pursuit of that goal, a Liberal government will work respectfully with the GNWT and all aboriginal groups in the Northwest Territories to include them and secure their support for an Agreement in Principle, That may require improving that Agreement as part of renewed efforts to achieve results.

A Liberal government would work through the Land Claims Implementation Coalition, to negotiate fair and reasonable terms for full implementation of the spirit and intent of selfgovernment agreements. We will meet with representatives of communities with self government agreements and the GNWT to determine what resources are required.

## Economic Development and Sustainability

## Mackenzie Valley Highway

The next federal budget under a Liberal government will recommit to funding of \$150 million over five years for the construction of the Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk segment of the Mackenzie Valley Highway (MVH).

A future Liberal government will also work with other levels of government and the private sector to put in place a Canadian Transportation and Infrastructure Strategy that targets long-term economic benefits. As a first step, additional support for the construction of the MVH from Wrigley to Tuktoyaktuk would be considered. Any plan must ensure maximum socio economic opportunity for each community impacted by the Highway.

## Mackenzie Gas Project

The Liberal Party has been very supportive of the Mackenzie Valley Gas Pipeline project, but have maintained that it be done in a responsible, sustainable way, fully recognizing the interests of key communities, including Aboriginal stakeholders. We will explore ways to ensure that the aboriginal pipeline group can maintain ownership of 30% of this project.

With a green light from federal regulatory bodies, a Liberal government will begin work immediately to ensure all Northerners; especially Aboriginal people have access to the appropriate training to be qualified for as many of the construction jobs as possible, as the project proceeds. It is anticipated that the private sector would make a decision at the end of 2013, and would begin construction 2015. Socio-economic development must begin before this.

#### Regulatory Improvement

Liberals believe in the sustainable, responsible development of Canada's natural resources. Indeed, the goal of regulatory regimes is to ensure that proposed projects will not put Canadians' health at risk, nor cause irreparable damage to the environment. However, we also recognize that regulations should not be an overly burdensome and bureaucratic hindrance to economic development. A Liberal Government would look at ways of increasing efficiency in the regulatory process, without opening settled land claims.

A Liberal government will work closely with the GNWT, other governments, and the private sector to identify regulatory improvements that can further bolster economic development while safeguarding human safety and environmental protection.

## Infrastructure Investment Program Renewal

As noted earlier, a Liberal government will work with other levels of government and the private sector to put in place a Canadian Transportation and Infrastructure Strategy to replace the existing federal infrastructure programs whey they expire in the coming years. A Liberal government will work directly with the GNWT to identify the unique infrastructure needs of the Northwest Territories as that long term strategy is put in place.

A future Liberal government is committed to achieving the goal of 100% high-speed internet connectivity within three years of being elected. We will be pleased to work directly with the GNWT and the private sector in the achievement of this objective.

#### **Fiscal Priorities**

The Liberal Party has committed to maintaining the 6 percent annual increase of the Canada Health Transfer and to convene a First Ministers meeting within 60 days of being sworn into government. We will launch work on new funding arrangements, and system-wide reforms to secure the future of health care in Canada.

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As Prime Minister, I also look forward to working with you and the other territorial premiers on the future of the Territorial Formula Funding arrangement.

To attract new medical professionals to the North, a Liberal government will work with the territories to forgive up to \$40,000 of student debt for doctors and \$20,000 for nurses and nurse practitioners who choose to practice in designated Northern communities. In addition, a Liberal government will also invest \$40 million over the next two years, in partnership with the provinces and territories, to develop and fund additional programs to strengthen rural and remote health services

A Liberal government will work with provincial, territorial and municipal partners to put in place a renewed Affordable Housing Framework. The new Framework will feature a long-term commitment by the federal government, replacing the collection of temporary programs that currently exist. In our first two years in government, Liberals will increase federal investment in affordable housing by \$550 million.

#### Borrowing Authority

A Liberal government would work with the GNWT to ensure there is a responsible borrowing limit that facilitates additional infrastructure investment in the Northwest Territories.

## Environmental Action

### Climate Change

A Liberal government will tackle the challenges of climate change head on by launching a Canadian Clean Energy Partnership with the provinces and territories to work together on Canada-wide objectives for managing the transition to the low-carbon economy of the future.

This will include a new, permanent \$400 million Green Home Renovation Tax Credit, an investment in a Renewable Power Production Incentive to quadruple Canada's supply of low-impact renewable energy and the development of a cap-and-trade system.

## Water Management

In addition to the NWT Water Stewardship Strategy signed by the Government of Canada and the GNWT in May 2010, a future Liberal government will also work with the provinces and territories to develop a comprehensive Freshwater Strategy to address the challenges of ground water contamination, drought and flooding, as well as better water consumption efficiency. We will begin by investing \$100 million annually towards this Strategy, rising to \$125 million at full implementation.

We commend the work completed thus far for the Lower Athabasca – Water Quality Monitoring Plan, and strongly support the recommendations of the scientific team.

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A Liberal government will also work to finalize the trans-boundary water agreement among those jurisdictions in the Mackenzie River basin.

I would like to thank you again for your letter. I look forward to working with you, and the Government of the Northwest Territories, in the future.

# Premiers release pan-territorial papers on energy and climate change at the Northern Premiers' Forum

**Yellowknife, Northwest Territories (April 28, 2011)** – Territorial premiers released the *Pan-Territorial Adaptation Strategy* and the *Pan-Territorial Renewable Energy Inventory* in Yellowknife today at the conclusion of the ninth annual Northern Premiers' Forum.

"These documents underscore the need for northern governments to work together to address climate change and to explore renewable energy supplies," said Floyd K. Roland, NWT Premier and chair of this year's Northern Premiers' Forum."These papers build on priorities outlined in our Northern Vision document released in 2007. Territorial governments are working together to expand the use of renewable energy in ways that will reduce the cost of energy for residents, communities, businesses and industry in our North."

"Northern premiers believe that a pan-territorial approach to important issues leads to a better quality of life for northerners," said Yukon Premier Dennis Fentie. "We are committed to working on a strategic common approach to highlight to Canada the unique needs of the North in areas such as health care funding and infrastructure development."

"The predicted effects of climate change stand to have far-reaching effects on the North. Through a collaborative effort, the three territories have prepared these two documents to ensure we both adapt to these changes, and explore our use of renewable energy that will lead us into the future," said Nunavut Premier Eva Aariak.

Territorial premiers have a long history of cooperation and partnership. Premiers Roland, Fentie, and Aariak are committed to working together to improve the quality of life for all northern residents. The Northern Premiers' Forum not only formalizes the partnership but also provides an opportunity for the territorial premiers to develop northern solutions to issues of common concern.

The increasing international attention on the circumpolar world, and the economic, environmental and political significance of the Canadian North in particular, underscores the importance of territories working together.

Territorial premiers discussed a number of issues at the forum including:

- circumpolar issues
- health promotion and sustainability
- northern housing
- policing in the North; and
- northern infrastructure

Circumpolar issues played a central role at the forum when premiers met with the Canadian Permanent Participant representatives to talk about the upcoming Arctic Council Ministerial meeting on May 12<sup>th</sup> in Nuuk, Greenland.

Premiers also discussed their common territorial interests in the work of the Arctic Council and agreed to work together with the federal government to ensure Canada's chairmanship of the Arctic Council, which begins in 2013, is productive and reflects the interests of northerners.

This year's forum will be the last to include the participation of Canada's longest currently serving Premier and NPF co-founder, Hon. Dennis Fentie.

"On behalf of Premier Aariak, I would like to acknowledge the contribution, guidance and commitment that Premier Fentie has provided to this Forum and through it to advancing the issues and interests of Canada's North and its people at the national level," Premier Roland said.

The next Northern Premiers' Forum will be hosted in Nunavut in 2012.





### **Release of the Northwest Territories Energy Report**

**YELLOWKNIFE (Thursday, May 19, 2011)** – The Northwest Territories (NWT) Energy Report was released today by the Ministerial Energy Coordinating Committee (MECC). Highlights of the report include: opportunities to develop alternative energy sources, reducing the high cost of energy in the territory and an overview of GNWT energy projects and programs.

"Early in the mandate of the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly, our government made an unprecedented \$60 million commitment to address energy issues in the NWT," said Minister Bob McLeod, Chair of the MECC. "The NWT leads the country in the installation of commercial wood pellet boilers, we have invested millions of dollars in energy conservation and efficiency programs, and we continue our efforts to develop local sources of energy supply for communities."

The NWT Energy Report includes current information regarding a number of initiatives outlined in the NWT Energy Plan (2007), the NWT Greenhouse Gas Strategy (2007), and the Energy Priorities Framework released by the MECC in 2008. Also included in the report is an environmental scan of energy resources, development, and use in the NWT, as well as details on GNWT investment in energy programs and initiatives.

MECC is comprised of Minister Bob McLeod in his role as Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment, Premier Floyd Roland, as Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Power Corporation, Minister Michael Miltenberger in his role as Minister of Environment and Natural Resources, and Minister Michael McLeod, Minister of Public Works and Services.

By reducing imported fossil fuels and mitigating the environmental impacts of energy use, the GNWT is taking action to maintain an environment that will sustain present and future generations, a key goal of the 16<sup>th</sup> Assembly.

# **Release of CD-ROM Dene Kede: Trails to Becoming**

**YELLOWKNIFE (Friday, May 20, 2011)** – The Department of Education, Culture and Employment, District Education Councils and Regional Aboriginal Governments will launch *Dene Kede: Trails to Becoming* CD-ROM on Tuesday evening, May 24, 2011. The disc is a teacher orientation tool for Northwest Territories' (NWT) educators on the Dene Kede curricula and rolls out to all NWT schools in the fall.

"This new tool further prepares teachers for their role as culture-based educators and enhances the quality of teacher training on Dene Kede as the foundation of learning for students in the NWT," says Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jackson Lafferty. "In keeping with the 21<sup>st</sup> Century's advancement of technology, we must adapt our teaching methods to ensure the survival of our languages, culture and identity."

Based on the Dene Kede Kindergarten to Grade 6 curriculum, *Dene Kede: Trails to Becoming* follows the 'Seven Steps to Dene Kede' as outlined in the Teacher Resource Manual. This interactive approach is broken down into eight sections:

- The first four sections transport the user into the past, before contact with European explorers and settlers. Users assume the roles of children and journey on the land where they learn traditional Dene ways.
- The next three sections allow users to reflect on what they learned about Dene ways and apply it to teaching Dene Kede.
- The last section reviews Dene Kede and provides tools for thinking about Dene ways of knowing.

"The signing of an AiP between the GNWT, Canada, the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation and NWT Métis Nation, represents a major step forward in achieving a decade-long goal for NWT residents," Premier Floyd K. Roland said. "It was only possible with the dedication and hard work of our devolution team, admirably led by Dr. Gerein."

In announcing the new appointment, Premier Floyd K. Roland says the milestone signing of the Agreement-in-principle on Devolution in January and plans to move forward with final negotiations dictate that leadership for the negotiation team be located in the NWT.

"I am very much a proponent of this change; this is the right thing to do and a good time to do it, Dr. Gerein said. "Mr. Goldney and I have worked together for nine years; he is an exceptional individual with excellent leadership skills."

## Aboriginal Government and Education Leaders Support Education Partnership Declaration

**YELLOWKNIFE (Friday May 27, 2011)** – Minister of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE), Jackson Lafferty, hosted a meeting with Aboriginal government and NWT education leaders on Aboriginal Student Achievement (ASA) in Yellowknife this week.

"Creating and supporting partnerships is key to building stronger minds and a stronger north," says Minister Lafferty. "All parties agreed that education is our top priority. We are committed to working together to provide quality education for all students and to eliminate the achievement gap between Aboriginal and other students."

Minister Lafferty provided leaders with a status report on the ASA Initiative and shared results from the Regional Minister's Forums. Feedback from the forums confirmed the need to focus on early childhood development and child care, student and family support, Aboriginal language and culture curriculum and resource development and literacy.

Another common message was that everyone plays a part and has responsibilities when it comes to educating our youth. All regional participants expressed the need to support an education system built on strong relationships at the community, regional and territorial level.

"I asked the leaders to join me in signing an Education Partnership Declaration that speaks to the importance of continuing to work together on the Aboriginal Student Achievement initiative. I am happy that all the Aboriginal and education leaders were in agreement, recognizing how powerful our collective voices are in improving our children's future."

Minister Lafferty is currently working towards all parties signing the Education Partnership Declaration this summer. The signed Declaration will be included in the Education Plan that the Minister will table, on behalf of the partners in the Legislative Assembly this August.

### Using Appropriate Child Occupant Restraints – Another Healthy Choice

**YELLOWKNIFE (Tuesday, May 31, 2011)** – This is Safe Kids Week 2011. Its focus, this year, is child passenger safety – protecting children in vehicles through the use of properly fitting child occupant restraints.

"It is everyone's responsibility to protect those who are most vulnerable, says Minister of Transportation Michael McLeod. "The proper use of child occupant restraints is an important way to protect our children when travelling."

In the NWT, Transport Canada reports that only 38% of children and adults in communities outside Yellowknife are buckled up. The GNWT is taking action under the *Building Our Future* strategic initiative to reduce injuries of children and adults related to motor vehicle collisions. Under its Drive Alive program, it has launched the *Buckle Up NWT* campaign which reminds adult drivers and passengers to ensure every person in each vehicle is belted in safely every trip, every time.

In addition, the Departments of Health and Social Services and Transportation have joined with Safe Kids Canada to provide information and promote the use of properly fitting child occupant restraints under the Healthy Choices Framework.

"We are working together to make it easier for our residents to make better choices in their daily lives", Minister of Health and Social Services Michael Miltenberger says. "Safety equipment such as car seats and booster seats are proven to save lives and reduce injuries – but we must make the conscious choice to use them."

Safe Kids Week is promoted by Safe Kids Canada, the national injury prevention program of the Hospital for Sick Children. Executive Director Pamela Fuselli says that rear- and forward-facing car seats, booster seats, and seat belts used at appropriate stages of child development have been proven to reduce injuries and save lives.

# Yellowknife Student wins Apple® iPad for Financial Fitness

**YELLOWKNIFE (Friday June 3, 2011)** Ecole St. Patrick High School student Trey Talbot is the NWT winner of the Canadian Securities Administrators (CSA) *Financial Fitness Challenge*.

The Canada-wide online contest provided videos, Facebook and Twitter tips to help youth increase their financial literacy. It used interactive tools and scenarios to demonstrate important financial principals such as balancing needs versus wants, budgeting, saving and investing.

"For the fourth year in a row, the NWT had the highest per-capita participation rate in Canada at six times the Canadian average," said Justice Minister Jackson Lafferty. "That's really impressive! I would like to congratulate Trey and hope he continues on the road to a healthy financial future."

Talbot, a 16-year-old Grade 10 student, was presented with his prize at the Securities Office in Yellowknife on May 31.

The CSA is made up of securities administrators from all provinces and territories. They educate Canadians about the securities industry, the stock markets and how to protect investors from investment scams. In the NWT, this work is carried out by the Office of the Superintendent of Securities, part of the territorial Department of Justice.

The GNWT is committed to supporting a fair, appropriately controlled investment environment that provides proper protection for NWT companies and investors. #### Federal Commitment to Mackenzie Valley Highway to Tuktoyaktuk Project is Welcome

**YELLOWKNIFE (June 8, 2011)** A key priority of the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly received a welcome endorsement in the federal Budget Monday. The Government of Canada reaffirmed its commitment to spend \$30 million per year over the next five years to advance the Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk portion of the Mackenzie Valley Highway project.

Premier Floyd Roland says the federal commitment is an important first step in a project that will move the NWT towards greater economic self sufficiency and, in doing do, advance Canada's sovereignty in our North. "This funding recognizes the importance of supporting exploration, oil and gas development, and other economic opportunities in the NWT for the good of Canada," he said. "It fits with the federal government's stated northern strategy and the progress we have made on Devolution and the Mackenzie Gas Project."

Minister of Transportation Michael McLeod notes that there is a lot of work ahead. "We will work closely with our partners to ensure that this project moves forward," he said. "We must still address the gap between the federal commitment and the projected cost of the road, but this is still an important step toward our goal of building an all-weather highway from Wrigley to Tuktoyaktuk."

The Government of Canada had previously provided funding for the completion of the Project Description Report (PDR) for the Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk portion of the Highway which has allowed the project to proceed to the environmental review stage. Construction activities could begin as early as this winter.

Since 2007, the Government of the Northwest Territories has focussed significant effort on securing more and improved transportation infrastructure in the NWT and highlighting the benefits that northern development can bring for NWT residents and for Canada as a nation.

# New Training Facility to Improve Emergency Crew Training in NWT

**YELLOWKNIFE** (Thursday June 9, 2011) – A new burn structure has been added to the NWT Emergency Services Training Centre. The modular structure, designed for firefighters and rescue crews to practice scenarios for the battling of structure fires, was officially opened today.

Minister of Transportation Michael McLeod says partnerships were the key to finding the resources required for the new burn structure. "Our excellent relationship with the Yellowknife Fire Department, with each department supporting the other, continues with this project," he said. "The contributions of Diavik Diamond Mines Inc. and BHP Billiton EKATI Diamond Mine will further support our efforts to make training for fire and emergency response crews in the Northwest Territories more available and effective."

Yellowknife Mayor Gordon Van Tighem says the new facility will fill a crucial need. "Our crews need a facility to practice their skills and improve their response times," he said. "Having all of our training in one place will certainly improve both the quality and affordability of that training."

In addition to the ability to practice fighting structure fires, the Yellowknife Airport Fire Training Facility will allow crews to practice extrications, the use of hand-held extinguishers, and rescues from downed aircraft. These capabilities will benefit community fire departments and mine rescue crews around the territory.

President and Chief Operating Officer of Diavik Diamond Mines Inc. (DDMI) Kim Truter said "safety is our most important value at Diavik and part of our legacy with local communities includes building local infrastructure. When approached for support, we recognized this facility would meet community needs and is very much aligned with the way we work."

Paul Harvey, Asset President of BHP Billiton EKATI Diamond Mine says, "We welcome the opportunity to participate in a project that has so much potential for the mines, airports, and

communities of the Northwest Territories," he said. "This facility is an investment in both safety and effective emergency response."

The new burn structure at the Yellowknife Airport Fire Training Facility was opened today by Minister McLeod, Yellowknife Fire Department Deputy Chief Jason Davidson, DDMI President and COO Kim Truter, and BHP Billiton EKATI Diamond Mine Asset President Paul Harvey. The opening was followed by demonstration events by the Yellowknife Airport and Yellowknife Fire Departments and mine rescue crews from the Diavik and EKATI diamond mines.

The Yellowknife Airport Fire Training Facility will be used by communities, industry, and businesses to support emergency training. The Facility supports the priority of the 16<sup>th</sup> Assembly for safe communities.

A properly fitting bike helmet could help avoid head injuries, and could ultimately save a life."

"This work, completed by the Gwich'in Tribal Council, confirms that working in partnership with Aboriginal groups is an effective way to plan and move forward on major projects."

In 2008, the Mackenzie Valley Highway to Tuktoyaktuk project received the unanimous support of Members of the 16<sup>th</sup> Assembly. The project is to complete an all weather highway from Wrigley to Tuktoyaktuk on the Arctic Coast. Project Description Reports are underway for the portions of the planned highway south of the Gwichin's Settlement Area. Once those PDRs are complete later this year, they will be combined and the project will enter its environmental review phase.

When completed, it will improve the economics of energy and mining exploration and development in the region, enhancing economic development opportunities throughout the Northwest Territories. The Mackenzie Valley Highway to Tuktoyaktuk will also reduce the cost of living in communities along the highway. The completed highway will benefit all Canadians by enhancing sovereignty and economic activity.

"We've developed a program that will give Their Royal Highnesses an opportunity to meet people from across the NWT and learn about who we are and the territory we live in. We already know the NWT is a great place to visit, work and live and we want to share that with the Duke and Duchess. ## **GNWT Looking to Revamp Housing Programs**

**YELLOWKNIFE (Thursday, June 23, 2011)** – NWT residents are invited to participate in a review that will refocus the GNWT's approach to providing housing programs and services.

The Shelter Policy Review will include workshops with regional and community leadership, meetings with residents, clients, and non-government organizations that provide housing services, and an online survey for NWT residents.

"We know that housing is one of the most important issues in our communities," said Robert C. McLeod, Minister Responsible for the NWT Housing Corporation. "This review is an important step in re-focusing the GNWT's approach to housing. We want to hear the views and ideas from as many NWT residents as possible."

When completed, the review will outline a long-term vision for housing in the Northwest Territories. It will increase consistency in the way programs are developed and delivered, address the decrease in funding from the Canada Mortgage and Housing Corporation, and propose solutions to housing infrastructure challenges. The report will be submitted to the Members of the 17<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly for their consideration in setting the next government's policies.

"Improving the quality and cost of shelter is a priority for the GNWT," said Minister McLeod. "Housing costs are a significant factor in the cost of living in our territory. I am committed to finding greater effectiveness, efficiencies and a more client-focused, service-oriented approach to housing programs in our communities."

# Territories sign Memorandum of Understanding to further explore university models

**YELLOWKNIFE (Thursday, June 30, 2011)**—The ministers responsible for education in Canada's three territories signed a Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) today to express their mutual interests and goals in exploring approaches for university development in Canada's North.

The governments of Yukon, Northwest Territories and Nunavut are committed to providing and supporting consistent, accessible, quality post-secondary education opportunities to all northerners, and recognizing the importance of offering an educational environment that includes a balance of academic and traditional lifestyles and pursuits.

"Signing this MOU takes the first step to bring our governments' shared goal of university development in Canada's North to reality," said Minister of Education, Culture and Employment for the Government of the Northwest Territories Jackson Lafferty. "It is the next logical step in the evolution of our post-secondary institutions and will enhance the learning environment for northerners by providing quality post-secondary education close to home, where family and community supports are available."

"We are excited to explore university models and advance the post-secondary capacity of Canada's North," said the Honourable Patrick Rouble, Yukon's Education Minister. "This Memorandum is a commitment among our three territories to further develop practical, quality post-secondary options for northern students."

"We know that our young people are the key to building our future and we want to help them develop the skills and abilities needed to take on leadership roles in our territory," said Premier Eva Aariak, Nunavut Minister of Education. "A high-quality educational environment that maintains a balance between academic excellence and the culture, values and lifestyle of our northern students will provide the support they need to achieve success."

"This is part of our continuing commitment to Nunavummiut to increase post-secondary opportunities in all occupational categories from career training to professional education," said the Honourable Daniel Shewchuk, Minister responsible for Nunavut Arctic College.

To undertake this work, the three governments will form a tri-territorial committee to develop options on how to move forward with university development in Canada's North. The Committee will work collaboratively to advance discussions with the Government of Canada on investments to support university development in Canada's North.

The committee will include two representatives from each territorial government and an appointed chair. Participation from additional stakeholders is also being considered. The Committee will produce a discussion and options paper this summer for Ministerial consideration.

# National Strategy on Inuit Education Released

"This strategy will incorporates community, regional and territorial engagement, and aims to bring together key players in Inuit education from across Canada."

The strategy is the result of two years of intense work by the National Committee on Inuit Education. The Committee is made up of representatives from federal, provincial, territorial and regional governments, as well as school boards and regional and national Inuit organizations.

"As partners of the Committee on Inuit Education," says Nellie Cournoyea, Chair and CEO, Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, "We are pleased that the Strategy document has been completed and is ready for implementation. The task towards its implementation will take a dedicated team effort to build upon the key elements of the strategy in stressing the importance of early childhood education with a strong focus on retaining and relearning Aboriginal languages.

# **GNWT Responds to Independent Leishman Review**

**YELLOWKNIFE (JULY 12, 2011)** – An Independent External Quality Assurance Investigation, conducted by Dr. Douglas C. Perry with findings submitted directly to the Stanton Territorial Health Authority, endorses the professional response of Stanton employees and recommends:

- 1. Consideration be given to establishing trained in-house special constables with legislated powers to restrain and assist in direct patient care.
- 2. Emergency Medical Services (EMS) personnel be reminded to encourage family member(s) to attend with patients at the Emergency Department, especially in cases involving potential mental health issues or other instances where communication may be compromised.

"Our priority is to provide the highest level of quality health care services for NWT residents," Minister Miltenberger says. "We are appreciative and respectful of Dr. Perry's recommendations and will take all necessary steps to ensure the excellent standard of care provided by the Stanton Hospital and its employees is protected and maintained."

In April 2011, the Minister of Health and Social Services, J. Michael Miltenberger directed the Stanton Territorial Health Authority to conduct a review to cover all aspects of the November 2009 Allisdair Leishman incident. The Independent External Quality Assurance Investigation and recommendations of Dr Perry honours the request made in the Legislative Assembly. The Minister directed the review to make recommendations, as necessary, to improve safety and security for patients and staff at the Stanton Territorial Hospital – and to improve the overall quality of care for patients.

The Department of Health and Social Services is working with the Stanton Territorial Health Authority and the Department of Justice to assess cost and other requirements regarding the establishment of special constables.

The Department will also work with municipalities, governments and organizations operating ambulance service to ensure that EMS personnel encourage the patient's family members to attend them at the Emergency Room.

In accordance to the *NWT Evidence Act*, and consistent with national practice, the report cannot be shared externally by the Stanton Territorial Health Authority.

On July 11, the Minister has met with family representatives to discuss the Independent External Quality Assurance Investigation recommendations and to reiterate the ongoing commitment the Department and Stanton have to provide an appropriate level of care now and in the future.

In his concluding remarks, the Premier encouraged participants to voice opinions about their specific concerns, and to seek out ways to address them in a respectful manner.

"My time for moving this forward is coming to a close, but yours is just beginning," he said.

"When it comes to politics, you have the power to create change," he said. "You have seen this world through more modern eyes than I did while growing up in Inuvik. Take what you've learned, share it and grow it. Plant that seed, nurture it, let it grow, and work that soil."

#### Aboriginal Languages Institute Returns to NWT

A partnership between the Department of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE) and the University of Victoria Certificate Program in Aboriginal Language Revitalization, the two-week Institute runs from July 11<sup>th</sup> to the 23<sup>rd</sup>, 2011 and brings together 19 participants from across the NWT.

"Our territory is culturally rich, but we still have a lot of work to do to strengthen and maintain these cultures. We are striving to enable more people to speak their Aboriginal language in the coming years."

The partnership with University of Victoria (UVic) program capitalizes on the University's relationship with the En'owkin Centre, the post-secondary educational institution of the Okanagan First Nations known for its commitment to language revitalization. En'owkin Centre and University of Victoria staff and faculty worked closely with ECE's Official Languages Division and community language coordinators to develop the Institute. The program is being delivered at the Yellowknife Campus of Aurora College.

The long-term objective of this initiative is establishing the delivery of this language institute program as a regular language revitalization program. Plans are already under way for an expanded Aboriginal Languages Institute to be offered in partnership with the University of Victoria later this fiscal year.

#### **GNWT Provides More Support to the NWT Film Industry**

**YELLOWKNIFE (July 18, 2011)** The NWT film industry has become one of the territory's most promising sectors and is in a great position to grow, thanks to recent changes by the Government of the Northwest Territories.

In addition to the restructuring of Film Commission staff, \$100,000 in new dedicated annual funding has been made available for NWT film industry projects. The money will be distributed through ITI's Support to Entrepreneurs and Economic Development (SEED) Policy starting this fall.

"For many aspiring filmmakers in the NWT, finding financial support has always been an issue" said Minister McLeod. "With this support, we hope to see even more films produced in the NWT that use our rugged landscape and vibrant cultural essence as a backdrop."

The Department of ITI's increased support for the NWT film industry is an example of its commitment to creating a diverse, sustainable economy as envisioned in the 16<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly's *Northerners Working Together* plan.

### Historic Signing at Dene Assembly

**FORT PROVIDENCE (Wednesday, July 20, 2011)** – Aboriginal leaders in the NWT are providing unprecedented support for the Education Partnership Declaration (EDP), a GNWT initiative spearheaded by Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jackson Lafferty. The EPD marks the first time Aboriginal leaders have united in such a strong show of support for education.

The EPD was signed by Minister Lafferty, National Chief Bill Erasmus, and the Grand Chiefs at the Dene Assembly last week. This historic signing indicates the importance all Aboriginal leaders attach to the educational success of their people.

"Signing this Declaration with the Grand Chiefs and the National Chief means that we all believe education is the way forward to ensure a healthy future for our people," said Minister Lafferty, emphasising the importance of the signing in regards to the future of youth and the NWT. "I want to thank the Chiefs for their vision and leadership and for the strength and unity they have showed. Today we have made real progress for our people."

"This initiative is very important as it demonstrates our commitment towards education and the improvement of our lives in the North," said National Chief Bill Erasmus. "We encourage everyone to support it and make it real."

The EPD sets out the guiding principles that all Aboriginal government and education leaders agreed to at a series of regional consultation meetings on Aboriginal Student Achievement (ASA). The ASA initiative is designed to close the education success gap between Aboriginal and other students.

The EPD contains three articles:

Article 1- We recognize that public education aims to achieve quality education for all students and we all have roles and responsibilities for making improvements that will eliminate the gap in education achievement between Aboriginal and other students.

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Article 2 – We commit to working together and supporting each others' work to provide a quality education system in the Northwest Territories at the territorial, regional and community levels that will eliminate the gap in education outcomes between Aboriginal and other students.

Article 3 – We agree that the priorities for attention and action that will help eliminate the education achievement gap between Aboriginal and other students are:

- Early childhood and childcare
- Student and family support
- Aboriginal language and culture curriculum and resource development
- Literacy

The EPD will be tabled in the Legislative Assembly in August along with the Minister's ASA Education Plan, a follow up to the ASA Status Report tabled in May (<u>http://www.ece.gov.nt.ca/Whats\_New/ASA%20Interim%20Report%20May%202011%20final.pdf</u>).

The Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, the Northwest Territories Métis Nation and the Chairs of the Education Authorities and Aurora College will also sign the EPD in the coming weeks, making it the most widely supported education document ever produced.

## **Raising the Profile of Northern Issues at PNWER Annual Summit**

# Yellowknife Health and Social Services - Same Day Services

**YELLOWKNIFE (JULY 28, 2011)** – The Yellowknife Health and Social Services Authority (YHSSA) has initiated "Same Day Services" at the Yellowknife Primary Care Centre and Frame Lake Community Health Clinic in response to suggestions from clients and staff in an operational review conducted in April.

Same Day Services will replace "Walk-In" services formerly delivered at these sites. Same Day Services allow clients to schedule appointments with a Nurse Practitioner, Nurse or Physician, on the day that they call for the appointment.

"We expect that Same Day Services will help increase the number of same day appointments available to clients; provide easier access by allowing clients to book appointments by phone; and reduce appointment waiting times. We look forward to client feedback about Same Day Services over the coming months," said Les Harrison CEO of YHSSA.

Effective July 18, 2011, the following changes have occurred:

## 1) Scheduling of Same Day Appointments

- Clients will be able to book "Same Day Appointments" by calling the clinics Clients will no longer be required to come in person to clinics to book appointments for evening services.
- There are a limited number of Same Day Appointments available each day. These appointments will be provided on a "first call basis".
- 2) **Expanded access to appointments** "Same Day" appointments can now be scheduled from
  - 12:30 p.m. to 8:15 p.m. Mondays and Tuesdays and Saturdays from 10:15 a.m. to 2:15 p.m. at the Yellowknife Primary Care Centre.
  - 12:30 p.m. to 8:15 p.m. Wednesdays and Thursdays at Frame Lake Community Health Clinic.

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Same Day Services provide quick access to appointments for health issues that do not require a visit to the Emergency Room. YHSSA continues to offer regular clinic appointments for the scheduling of physical exams, routine pap tests, wart treatment and other minor procedures, follow-ups for lab or other diagnostic results, injections or narcotic medication refills.

### Update on Elective Surgeries – Stanton Territorial Hospital

**YELLOWKNIFE (Aug 2, 2011)** – Stanton Territorial Hospital is targeting August 12, 2011 to resume elective surgeries. This target date is based on current sterilization equipment showing consistent safety results.

Issues with infection control and sterilization equipment are a common occurrence in all hospitals. Patient safety and risk management will continue to be the priority for Stanton Territorial Hospital.

## GNWT Encourages Smokers to Live a Smoke Free Life

**YELLOWKNIFE (August 12, 2011)** To support residents in the stop smoking challenge, Nicotine Replacement Therapies (NRT's) will be available to all NWT smokers and smoking cessation prescription drugs will be covered under NWT health care benefits, Health and Social Services (HSS) Minister Miltenberger announced today.

"Every year we needlessly lose friends, family and loved ones due to smoking related deaths," Miltenberger said. "Smoking is the single biggest preventable cause of death. It is of special concern because the NWT has double the national rate of smokers. The options that we have in place provide smokers with direct support to quit, living a smoke free lifestyle and improving not only the quality of their health but of their families' health as well."

The quit smoking options available to smokers include NRT's and prescription medications. The GNWT covers the cost for approximately three months supply per year of these products to residents. Private sector employers may also offer cessation supports depending on their benefit plans.

Smokers can also get one-on-one support from their doctors and nurses to quit smoking. The GNWT has worked with the Centre for Addictions and Mental Health to provide training on smoking cessation to 45 healthcare providers throughout the territory.

HSS Authorities also offer tobacco cessation assistance. People can ask their health care providers for more information about supports and programs offered within their communities.

Another support system available to smokers is the NWT Quitline. This is a toll free help line staffed by trained cessation counsellors. For more information on the NWT Quitline and on tips on how you can quit, please visit <u>www.nwtquitline.ca</u>.

The GNWT is also working with the Alberta/NWT Lung Association, to offer the Smart Steps program in three or four NWT workplaces. The Smart Steps program provides a series of brief facilitated sessions in a workplace. The sessions help participants motivate themselves and prepare for a quit date.

## GNWT co-hosts 2011 Arctic Ungulate Conference in Yellowknife

**YELLOWKNIFE (August 15, 2011)** – The Government of the Northwest Territories, in partnership with the Governments of Nunavut and Yukon, is proud to host the 2011 Arctic Ungulate Conference in Yellowknife from Aug. 22 to 26. This will be the 13<sup>th</sup> international conference.

The event is held every four years and focuses on the management and status of Northern ungulate species, such as caribou, moose and bison. Over 200 delegates are expected to attend the conference, including scientists, researchers, co-management boards and government officials from across the world.

This year, the theme of the conference is "Challenges of Managing Northern Ungulates." The conference will include traditional, local and scientific knowledge and an Indigenous Talking Circle to share traditional knowledge about sustainable ungulate harvesting.

Presentations will address a variety of topics, including climate change and increasing human presence on the land, as well as the challenges to developing recovery plans for declining ungulate populations such as caribou and reindeer. Other sessions include: a cross-country comparison of northern ungulate management; research and monitoring; health and disease; and, physiology and nutrition.

The conference has two sessions that are free and open to the public:

On Tuesday, August 23<sup>rd</sup>, a storytelling session hosted by Paul Andrew will be held from 7:00 p.m. to 10 p.m. at the Tom Eagle Memorial Hall in the Tree of Peace. Delegates and the public will be welcomed to tell stories relating to the importance of ungulates, such as caribou, to northern people.



JEPP support efforts across our territory to increase emergency preparedness capacity through training, education, and improved telecommunications," said Robert C. McLeod, Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs. "The Government of Canada is a valuable partner in protecting the safety of people and property in communities across the Northwest Territories."

"Through JEPP, the Government of Canada has been helping provinces and territories prepare for emergencies for over 30 years," said Canada's Public Safety Minister Vic Toews. "All governments share a responsibility to invest in emergency preparedness and help keep Canadians safe."

Projects supported by JEPP improve emergency preparedness capacity and support the GNWT's goal of sustainable, vibrant, safe communities as envisioned in the 16<sup>th</sup> Assemblies' *Vision of Northerners Working Together*.

The Prairie Creek silver/zinc/lead mine has the potential to provide significant direct and indirect employment benefits and business opportunities to the NWT and in particular to the Dehcho Region. We are committed to developing and operating the Project in a manner that contributes to the social, economic and cultural well-being of the Northwest Territories and, in particular, the residents and communities in the region", stated John Kearney, Chairman and CEO of Canadian Zinc Corporation and the President of the Northwest Territories and Nunavut Chamber of Mines.

### **NWT Residents Honoured at Cultural Circle Ceremony**

#### BACKGROUNDER

**Purpose:** To provide lasting recognition and gratitude towards those who contribute to the preservation and promotion of cultures and heritage in the Northwest Territories. The Cultural Circle helps build awareness amongst all northerners about the importance of promoting, protecting, preserving and celebrating our unique culture, heritage and ways of life.

#### **Eligible Recipients:**

*Youth Category* - Youth, 25 years of age and under, who demonstrate a strong commitment to engaging in the arts, cultural learning and cultural practices.

*Individual Category* - Individuals who demonstrate a strong commitment to preserving and promoting culture through participation in various arts, culture and heritage related activities.

*Elders Category* - Elders, 50 years of age and older, respected for their contributions of practicing, promoting, guiding, teaching, leadership, vision, or hands-on participation in the areas of art, culture, heritage and language.

*Group Category* - Any organization, corporation, institution, organizing committee or social club that plays a lead role in developing and supporting activities that celebrate, promote or preserve the arts, culture and heritage.

### Criteria:

· Must be a current resident of the Northwest Territories (except where awarded posthumously)

· Must have made a significant, long-term contribution to the arts, culture and heritage.

• Must be independently motivated by a genuine desire to make a difference.

### 2011 Minister's Cultural Circle Award Recipients:

Fourteen year old **Evan Tordiff** prides himself in his Métis heritage. He loves being on the land, learning new things and is very active in his community of Fort Smith. Evan demonstrates a strong commitment to cultural learning and practices through numerous activities, including going hunting every fall, setting and checking his own traps, taking part in Traditional Trapping workshops on his own time and practicing building shelters and setting up camp on his own in the bush. He received the first Junior Trapper award at his school's Spring Camp at Hanging Ice for his remarkable harvesting skills and was recommended to be a local guide for his knowledge of the land for a documentary on the Slave River. Evan is well respected in his community.

Elder **Abel Tingmiak**, of Inuvik, is an Ambassador for the Inuvialuit culture. He spends his time revitalizing and teaching Inuvialuit traditions to younger generations. He is a founding member of the revitalization of the Inuvialuit/Inuit games, demonstrating them locally, regionally, nationally and internationally, and offering lessons to youth to learn the different games. Abel teaches drum dancing skills and songs to students at Sir Alexander Mackenzie School, including teaching grade 5 students to make Inuvialuit drums. He ensures to pass on not only the skills and traditions, but the history behind each of them. Abel is a staple of the North and is well respected by all in his community, region and across the territory.

**Ben Nind** of Yellowknife has served as the Artistic Director of the Northern Arts and Cultural Centre (NACC) for the past nine years. His dedication to the arts in the North has seen many professional

musicians, theatre productions and artists come North to perform. Ben devoted many hours to expanding NACC's outreach program to 22 communities across the territory. He personally takes the time to assist Northern artists and performers achieve their visions and dreams. He was also instrumental in developing an NWT Arts and Culture Strategy. Ben is well respected in the greater arts community of the Northwest Territories.

The Aklavik Delta Drummers and Dancers have been performing for more than 30 years. Originally formed by Inuvialuit elders to revive the songs and dances taught to them by their elders, they travelled to Inuvialuit communities to encourage others to take part. Now, though many of these elders passed away, the group thrives, showcasing the traditions and cultures of the Inuvialuit around the globe. The group continues providing youth, both in and outside of school, with lessons and thus passing on their culture and language.

**Chief Jimmy Bruneau School** worked diligently with the Tlicho Community Services Agency to develop the unique, culture and land based course, *Trails of Our Ancestors*. The course gives Tlicho people, in particular Tlicho youth, the opportunity to re-trace the past through the eyes of their Elders. It provides an opportunity for the youth to learn and practice the lifestyle of traditional travel by canoe and helps teach them to respect the land, their culture and language and the Tlicho way of life. For fifteen years, Chief Jimmy Bruneau School has encouraged youth to spend their summer travelling the traditional water routes their ancestors used for centuries. Students earn 5 credits toward their high school diploma by taking this course. For all their work on and support of this course, Chief Jimmy Bruneau School receives the Minister's Choice Award.

## GNWT Expresses Condolences for the Tragedy in Resolute Bay

**YELLOWKNIFE (August 22, 2011)** – Flags at Government of Northwest Territories buildings across the NWT have been lowered to half mast following the tragic loss of First Air Flight 6560, which crashed near Resolute Bay Saturday claiming the lives of four crew and eight passengers.

Premier Floyd Roland and Minister of Transportation Michael McLeod were the first to sign the Book of Condolences has been set up at the Yellowknife Airport to allow the public to express their heart-felt thoughts to the NWT aviation community and the families and friends of those impacted by this tragic event. The Book will remain at the Airport until Sunday, August 28, after which it will be entrusted to First Air's Yellowknife Office. Any flowers or gifts dropped off at the Airport will also be passed on to First Air's Yellowknife office.

"Despite the vast distances that separate us, we – as northerners – are a tightly knit community and the impacts of this tragedy extend well beyond the boundaries of our northern territories to touch us all." Premier Roland said in a statement to the Legislative Assembly. "Our lives and communities will be forever changed."

Minister of Transportation, Michael McLeod echoed the Premier's sentiments. "We grieve for the loss of the passengers and crew of Flight 6560. We depend on the courage and skill of the men and women who crew our aircraft, and I am saddened that some of our very best have been lost to us through this tragic event."

The Department of Transportation continues to work with investigators, and provide assistance to First Air as they deal with this unfortunate event. The Yellowknife Health and Social Services Authority has provided grief counsellors to loved ones of the victims. Other GNWT resources stand ready to assist the people of First Air and the families of the victims of Flight 6560 as required.

## Territorial Premiers Welcome Extension of Territorial Health System Sustainability Initiative (THSSI)

**Yellowknife (August 25, 2011)** – Canada's Northern Premiers are welcoming today's announcement by Prime Minister Stephen Harper to extend Territorial Health System Sustainability Initiative (THSSI) funding until March 31, 2014.

Northern Premiers acknowledged the Prime Minister's ongoing commitment to addressing the unique challenges of the North - noting that the extension of THSSI funding reflects the recognition that Canada's territorial governments face added costs and challenges in the delivery of all programs and services – and especially in the areas of health care.

THSSI funding will provide \$30 million per year divided among the three territories to undertake health system innovation and management, participate in pan-territorial health initiatives, and offset medical transportation expenses.

"Investments in the long term well being of our population contribute to the sustainability of our communities and our territories. Through them we are strengthening our North and contributing to a stronger Canada," NWT Premier Floyd Roland said.

"Working collaboratively, our governments have proven that northerners can receive the same high quality health care as the rest of Canada. The Territorial Health System Sustainability Initiative helps to achieve this standard by offsetting the high cost of medical travel, and building capacity at the community level to reduce long-term reliance on the health care system," Nunavut Premier Eva Aariak said.

"Improved access to health care for the citizens of all three territories is the result of northern premiers working together with Canada on a common set of principles. Economic and social development across the North relies on a foundation of healthy people, healthy communities, and an adequate health service network and infrastructure," Yukon Premier Darrell Pasloski said.

Northern Premiers made special note of the work completed by territorial health ministers to advance the renewal of this funding, and thanked federal Minister of Health Leona Aglukkaq for her support in promoting their request.

Premiers also recognized the support of Western Premiers and the Council of the Federation for the extension of the THSSI funding, which has achieved demonstrated success in developing

new and innovative long-term approaches to territorial health planning and in building on the cooperative relationship between territorial and federal health departments.

## Territorial Premiers Welcome Extension of Territorial Health System Sustainability Initiative (THSSI)

In 2005, the federal government provided the three territories with a five-year \$150 million targeted fund. The Territorial Health Systems Sustainability Initiative (THSSI) was designed to facilitate the transformation of territorial health systems to ensure greater responsiveness to the needs of northerners and improve community-level access to services. In 2010, the federal government extended THSSI supplementary funding by \$60 million over two years to consolidate progress made.

The three broad goals of the THSSI funding are to:

- reduce the reliance over time on the health care system;
- strengthen community-level services; and
- build self-reliant capacity to provide services in-territory.

Today's formal extension of THSSI funding to March 31, 2014 is comprised of \$60 million to be shared among the three territories over the next two years.

There are three components to this funding:

- 1. The Territorial Health Access Fund (total \$13 million per year) intended to reduce reliance on the health care system, strengthen community level services and build capacity to provide services in-territory.
- 2. The Medical Travel Fund (total \$15 million per year) intended to offset expenses for medical transportation.
- 3. An Operational Secretariat Fund (total \$2 million per year) intended to fund panterritorial projects, support the functioning of a federal/territorial Health Assistant Deputy Ministers Working group and provide resources to manage THSSI commitments.

## **Territorial Health Access Fund**

Through its Territorial Health Access Fund, THSSI has provided funding for the following regional initiatives since its inception:

### Nunavut

- Training for Community Health Representatives to better address prevention and health promotion
- A full-time pediatrician to provide expert direction for the care of sick children
- Expansion of midwifery services and education program to another regional centre
- Additional physicians to reduce out-of-territory travel and to provide better quality health care within Nunavut
- Orientation program for nursing graduates to facilitate the transition of nursing knowledge and skills to from expert nurses to novice nurses
- Mental Health Worker integration for new graduates into employment opportunities

### Northwest Territories

- Additional Nurse Practitioners and Community Health Nurses to improve patient access in remote communities;
- Initial development of a Territorial Chronic Disease Management Strategy to help reduce the severity and incidence of chronic diseases like diabetes, mental health, heart disease and cancers;
- Extension of the dialysis program at Stanton Territorial Hospital to six days a week;
- A review of the capacity of the Health and Social Services Authorities to implement a territory-wide endoscopy management system;
- Anti-smoking campaign targeting youth 8-14 years old;
- Consideration of policy and service delivery options for midwifery practices outside of hospital/health centre parameters.

### Yukon

- the chronic conditions support program which is a collaborative care model that suits the Yukon context;
- nurse mentorship and other activities to support health human resource recruitment and retention;
- the Yukon health line which provide 24/7 access to health information and advice across Yukon;

- a palliative care team that supports service providers and individuals wherever they reside;
- o mental health care, including enhanced services in the rural communities; and
- $\circ$  telehealth, which is now available in all Yukon communities.

## **Operational Secretariat Fund**

THSSI supports pan-territorial initiatives that will have a significant impact on northern health care including a Medical Travel Review, the Social Marketing Pan-Territorial Project, and the Mental Health First Aid Project.

- A review of the medical travel system is being undertaken on medical travel programs, best practices and technologies in order to improve clinical care pathways and find efficiencies in medical travel practices.
- The Government of Yukon is leading a social marketing project with activities in all three territories.
- The NWT is leading a project to adapt the Mental Health First Aid course for use with a northern population. The project involves revising and adapting the curriculum and piloting it in communities in each of the three territories.

### **GNWT Opens new Data Centre**

**Yellowknife (August, 26, 2011)** – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) opened its new Data Centre today. Minister Responsible for Public Works and Services Michael McLeod, officially cut the ribbon on the new facility this afternoon.

"The new Data Centre will ensure that the information technology (IT) that our departments, boards and agencies need to deliver high quality programs and services to NWT residents is in place for the next 20 years," the Minister said.

The state-of-the-art facility supports government programs and services which increasingly rely on specialized digital information systems and applications such as video conferencing, electronic records and database systems. With business resumption capabilities and sophisticated back-up systems, the Data Centre ensures that these critical government functions are delivered reliably to NWT residents.

In addition to the unique user requirements of this facility, energy efficiency standards were achieved with the help of PWS' Design and Technical Services division and the <u>2009 Guidelines</u> for Good Building Practices for Northern Facilities. This GNWT facility far exceeds the national Eco-Energy Validation Program's energy-efficiency standards, and is 25 per cent more energy efficient than buildings built for similar purposes.

A heat recovery system incorporated into the design of the building allows the new Data Centre to reuse waste heat from computer and other IT equipment to heat the actual building. Once fully operational, surplus heat will also be used to heat the adjacent Government Warehouse located on the same site, substantially reducing greenhouse gas emissions and operations and maintenance costs.

## Fast Actions Demonstrate Commitment to Independent NWT – Premier Says

**YELLOWKNIFE (Monday August 29, 2011)** -- Premier Floyd Roland says the Prime Minister's quick actions, last week to confirm ongoing operation of water-quality monitoring stations in the Northwest Territories demonstrate Canada's commitment to working in partnership with the NWT – and in the true spirit and intent of Devolution.

Premier Roland addressed the predicted closure of 21 NWT monitoring stations in a meeting with Minister of Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development John Duncan Thursday in Yellowknife. His concerns echoed those expressed by NWT Minister of Environment and Natural Resources Michael Miltenberger in response to questions in the Legislative Assembly.

In a telephone call to Minister Miltenberger Friday morning, the Federal Environment Minister confirmed that any speculation surrounding the closure of water monitoring facilities in the Northwest Territories had been premature.

While Premier Roland says he's pleased with the Prime Minister's continued demonstration of support for a strong and independent North, the confusion arising out of this issue reiterates the importance of having decision making authorities devolved to the people of the Northwest Territories.

"Our Territory has the means and the leadership to guide its future – and to play a role in ensuring the sustainability of our resources and environment," the Premier said. "This misunderstanding should bring home to all of us exactly how tenuous our current dependence is."

"Our advancement of the Water strategy is dependent on the ability to continue and affect water monitoring in the NWT," Minister Miltenberger says. "The best way to secure and protect our place in making these important decisions is to reach an Agreement on Devolution."

## PhD Student Awarded with Prestigious Award for Northern Research

**Yellowknife (Tuesday August 30, 2011)** As a result of his extensive research and field work in the Northwest Territories (NWT), Carleton University PhD candidate Mr. Thomas Mumford has been awarded the prestigious W. Garfield Weston Award of Northern Research.

Mr. Mumford's studies focus on the Nechalacho rare-earth element deposit at the Blachford Lake Intrusive Suite in the NWT. The Blachford Lake area is home to significant mineral deposits of rare-earth elements, important components in the emerging green economy, as products turn towards more energy efficient sources and technologies.

"Research like Mr. Mumford's is instrumental in the discovery of new mineral deposits that contribute to the sustainability of the NWT mining industry and provide employment and business opportunities for NWT residents," said Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment, Bob McLeod. "His high-quality work will allow us to take advantage of opportunities rare-earth elements will provide. I want to offer my congratulations to Mr. Mumford on receiving this welldeserved award."

Mr. Mumford plans to create a model that describes the formation of the entire Blachford Lake Intrusive Suite. This model will be used to guide future exploration for rare-earth elements.

The Association of Canadian Universities for Northern Studies honoured Mr. Mumford with this award as part of the Canadian Northern Studies Trust awards program. The program aims to develop a group of scholars and scientists with northern experience while enhancing post-secondary education opportunities for northern Canadians.

This project is funded by the Strategic Investments in Northern Economic Development (SINED) program administered by the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency (CanNor) and supported by the Northwest Territories Geoscience Office (NTGO). The NTGO enables Mr. Mumford to complete his research, allowing him to work through its office and with

## Minister Jackson Lafferty Honours Life of Beaufort Delta Elder

**YELLOWKNIFE (Friday, September 2, 2011)** – Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jackson Lafferty, today expressed his condolences to the family and friends of Beaufort Delta elder Elizabeth (Liz) Hansen, who passed away recently after a brief illness. Ms. Hansen was a respected educator who dedicated her life to the promotion and preservation of the Gwich'in language.

"It is with a heavy heart that I express condolences to the Hansen family today," said Minister Lafferty. "Ms. Hansen was a valued and well respected member of the Beaufort Delta Education Council and an exceptional advocate for the education of our students. Her knowledge of and enthusiasm for the Gwich'in language will forever be remembered through her work with the Gwich'in language curriculum."

Ms. Hansen enrolled in the Teacher Education Program at the University of Saskatchewan in September 1959. She earned her teaching certificate in April 1961 and returned to the Northwest Territories to begin her teaching career.

Liz began teaching in Hay River and spent time teaching in Tulita before moving to Inuvik. She retired in 1993 but was called back to teaching almost immediately as the Gwich'in Language Instructor at Samuel Hearne Secondary School until June 1995.

Liz continued to working with the Beaufort Delta Divisional Education Council as a Consultant for Gwich'in Language Instruction. Even as her illness progressed, Liz made valiant efforts to continue her work as a Gwich'in Language Curriculum Developer. Although she was already requiring the use of a wheel chair, she attended the Beaufort Delta Aboriginal Student Achievement regional forum in May 2011.

When it was evident that Liz required hospitalization toward the final days of her illness, her conviction to complete the work that she started was still very strong. Liz requested an office

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space at the Inuvik Regional Hospital and, with the support of caring staff, a small office was created so that Liz could work on the Gwich'in Language Curriculum.

Ms. Hansen's dedication and commitment to education in the Northwest Territories was remarkable. She was passionate about ensuring that the Gwich'in language and culture is sustained through the continued education of children and youth.

Its members include the Departments of Industry, Tourism and Investment; Education, Culture and Employment; BHP Billiton Canada Inc.; Diavik Diamond Mines Inc.; and De Beers Canada Inc. The purpose of the MOU is to maximize employment opportunities from diamond mining for NWT residents. Through the MOU, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and the diamond mines are working collaboratively towards two main objectives – develop the skills of NWT workers, and attract and retain a skilled NWT workforce.

#### **Backgrounder: Northwest Territories Recipients Honoured During Literacy Week**

There are 4 Literacy Awards given out each year in the NWT.

The awards are advertised throughout the NWT using print media, emails, radio ads and the ECE website. Once the nomination deadline has passed, a Ministerial Awards Selection Committee is formed, consisting of literacy experts from both the GNWT and NGOs, to pick the winners. Nominees are scored, using scoring templates, and the highest scoring nominees receive the awards.

**Sylvia Clement -** Council of the Federation (CoF) Literacy Award. Announced earlier this summer, this is a special medallion awarded by the Council of the Federation in each of Canada's thirteen provinces and territories to celebrate outstanding literacy achievements. The award is customarily presented to an adult learner. Ms Clement is recognized for her tremendous enthusiasm and commitment to both her own education and the education of her children and younger brother. For the past two years, she has attended the Norman Wells' Community Learning Centre where she is working hard towards completing the courses necessary to receive her high school diploma and attend college.

**Clarissa Rogers -** The Ministerial Literacy Award (Youth Learner). This award celebrates a young adult's commitment to literacy and honours their literacy achievements. Ms. Rogers overcame many obstacles and returned to school after five years to reach her goal of completing a high school diploma. Having the highest average score in her class, as well as the best overall attendance recognized her diligence and hard work over the last academic year.

Lea Lamoureux - The Ministerial Literacy Award (Educator). This award honours outstanding practitioners in the field of literacy. This year's recipient is a teacher and principal at Kaw Tay Whee School in Dettah. Ms. Lamoureux's strong leadership and dedication to literacy has seen many improvements to the school and the students, including additions to the library both in English and in the Weledeh dialect. As a result of her efforts and her role as a literacy leader in the community, many students are now reading at or above their grade level.

**Chekoa Program** - The Ministerial Literacy Award (Organizations). This award recognizes a group's exceptional dedication to promoting and enhancing literacy in one or more of the NWT's eleven official languages. The Chekoa Program has successfully created programs that involve and engage N'Dilo and Dettah children and youth in learning and improving their English and Weledeh literacy skills while having fun. Recognising that a child's first teachers are their parents, Chekoa staff also work closely with parents in the community, providing workshops on how to assist children with homework and the fundamentals of teaching children how to read and do math.

# World Breastfeeding Week October 1 to 7, 2011

Along with the Department of Health and Social Services and Regional Health and Social Services Authorities, several organizations work towards the protection, education, promotion and support of breastfeeding in the NWT. They include the NWT Breastfeeding Committee, the Yellowknife Breastfeeding Support Group: *Moms, Boobs and Babies* and the Canadian Prenatal Nutrition Program (CPNP).

The Canada Prenatal Nutrition Program (CPNP) supports breastfeeding moms in many ways. Many moms consider weaning early because they need to go back to work or they think they can't work breastfeeding into their lifestyle.

"We provide participants with breast pumps so that they can store their milk for future use says Diana Trang, CPNP Nutritionist, Beaufort Delta and Sahtu Health and Social Services Authorities, "That way, their baby still gets all the benefits of breast milk and moms still have flexibility."

The Stanton Territorial Hospital Authority supports breastfeeding as a best practice for Moms. "Breast milk is the ideal food for newborns and infants. It is safe, gives babies the nutrients they need for healthy development and contains antibodies that help protect infants from common childhood illnesses," says Carla Skauge, Prenatal Coordinator, Northern Women's Health Program, Stanton Territorial Hospital. Breastfeeding is also a preventative approach to childhood obesity.

#### Medal of Bravery

On November 17, 2007, retired firefighter Vince Sharpe rescued two occupants from a burning trailer home, in Inuvik, Northwest Territories. Mr. Sharpe stopped his vehicle when he noticed smoke coming from the door of the residence. At the same time, a woman ran outside, coughing and crying that her father was inside. Although he was unable to see due to the abundant smoke, Mr. Sharpe crawled inside, located the victim and dragged the unconscious man outside. Advised that there was still another man in the trailer, Mr. Sharpe crawled in again, feeling his way forward, until he located the second victim. He finally succeeded in bringing the young man to safety. Mr. Sharpe's quick actions saved the lives of both men.

### New ITI Minister Supports Tourism

**Yellowknife (November 3, 2011)** Minister David Ramsay gave his inaugural speech as the Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment (ITI) and spoke about the importance of tourism in the Northwest Territories (NWT) at the NWT Tourism Conference and Annual General Meeting this week.

Minister Ramsay recognized the efforts of NWT Tourism staff and Board of Directors, the Tourism Marketing Advisory Committee (TMAC), the Aboriginal Tourism Champions Advisory Council and tourism owners and operators across the territory. He outlined how the GNWT is committed to working with the tourism industry and Aboriginal organizations to grow and develop the Aboriginal tourism sector in the NWT, as well as highlighted GNWT tourism funding programs such as the Tourism Training Fund.

"Not only will this training fund help to increase the number of people with the skills necessary to obtain work in tourism, it will also help to provide NWT tourism employers with a workforce trained to meet their needs," said Minister Ramsay. "I have great confidence in our tourism sector and look forward to working with the tourism industry to explore ways to attract more visitors to our beautiful territory".

The Tourism Training Fund will cover up to 75 per cent of training costs for businesses or individuals engaged in or employed in nearly any tourism sector in the NWT and will enhance the skills of people working in the tourism industry.

TMAC was established in 2006 as a consultative body for the Minister of ITI. The Committee represents the broad interests of the NWT's private sector government and tourism industry. Its role is to set priorities and strategies for the promotion and marketing of the NWT by facilitating industry input and leveraging knowledge, networks and financial partnerships.

### NWT Premier and Cabinet Ready to Get to Work

**YELLOWKNIFE (Nov. 7, 2011)** – Premier Bob McLeod and the Cabinet of the 17<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly held a day-long planning retreat at the Sah Naji Kwe Lodge near Behchoko on Nov. 3, 2011. Discussions included approaches to engaging with NWT Aboriginal leaders, the timeline around establishing a Cabinet agenda for implementing the priorities of the 17<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly, improving government communications, Devolution and managing relations with federal, provincial and territorial governments.

Cabinet took advantage of the location to have a lunch meeting with Tlicho Chiefs, following-up on the Premier's commitment to hold bilateral meetings with regional Aboriginal governments made after the successful meetings with Aboriginal leaders in Dettah last month.

"We had positive discussions with the Tlicho Chiefs and they have invited us to the next Tlicho Assembly," said Premier McLeod. "As residents of the NWT, we all face similar challenges and share common interests. Forging good working relationships with Aboriginal leaders and focusing on the things we share in common will help make sure that the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) is working to serve the interests of all the people of the NWT."

The Premier has already called and spoken to Aboriginal leaders from each region of the NWT to discuss opportunities for working together more closely. He plans to pursue bilateral meetings with leaders from each regional Aboriginal government, before holding another joint meeting in the near future. The Premier also met with the Yellowknives Dene First Nation in N'Dilo on Nov. 4, 2011 and is looking forward to meeting with other band Chiefs in their communities.

### Premier meets with Sahtu leadership

DELINE (Nov. 16, 2011) – Premier Bob McLeod met with Sahtu leadership Monday, November 14, 2011 as part of the GNWT's continuing commitment to work with Aboriginal and community leaders.

"We have a shared interest in creating a strong and prosperous territory," said Premier McLeod. "We continued our discussions from the successful meeting we held in Dettah just after the territorial election. The Sahtu leaders were very clear about their vision for the region. I know we can work together to build consensus and move forward as a territory."

During the meeting, community representatives asked to meet with the Honourable Tom Beaulieu, Minister of Health and Social Services; the Honourable J. Michael Miltenberger, Minister of Environment and Natural Resources; and the Honourable Robert C. McLeod, Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation. Premier McLeod made a commitment that over the life of this government, all Cabinet ministers will visit all regions of the territory to discuss residents' concerns and work with them to resolve their issues.

"We are developing a new relationship with communities across the NWT," said Premier McLeod. "Our territory is diverse, but we are united by common interests and a shared desire to overcome our challenges. The GNWT represents all residents and is committed to making the partnerships that are needed to benefit the entire territory. 

# Premier appears at Tłįcho Assembly

**BEHCHOKO (Nov. 21, 2011)** – Premier Bob McLeod attended the Tłįchǫ Assembly Thursday, November 17 to discuss the government's work and priorities with the leaders of the Tłįchǫ Government. This is the first time an NWT premier has appeared at the Tłįchǫ Assembly, and the third time Premier McLeod has met with Tłįchǫ leaders since being elected. The most recent meeting was on November 3.

"Our territory is strong, and we are even stronger when we work together," Premier McLeod said through an interpreter. "We are taking our first steps toward a shared vision: a unified, sustainable and prosperous Northwest Territories. The Tłįchǫ Government is a key partner in this work. We must all share in the benefits and responsibilities of the territory we are building together."

During the meeting, Tł<sub>2</sub>ch<sub>2</sub> chiefs spoke about community concerns such as housing, health, education, community infrastructure and winter roads. Premier McLeod committed that senior-level staff would follow up to resolve these issues. Members of the Legislative Assembly have identified those issues as priorities and have already begun the early work that is required.

Grand Chief Eddie Erasmus said, "We appreciate this Premier's commitment to work together with the Tłįchǫ Government, and we look forward to greater communication between our two governments on issues of mutual interest in the future. Greater communication can lead to greater collaboration, and we hope that by working together, we will avoid the difficulties that have affected our relationship in the past."

# Grubstake Program to Provide More Support to Trappers

**YELLOWKNIFE (November 22, 2011)** The GNWT is doubling the number of fur pelts trappers can claim under the Grubstake program, from 200 to 400 pelts per trapper. This enables the most productive trappers to receive additional start-up funding in the fall of 2012.

"The increase to the pelt threshold is in direct response to requests from our productive trappers," said Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment, David Ramsay. "Wild fur from the Northwest Territories is in demand from buyers around the world, and this increase will provide eligible trappers with funds to defray a portion of their start-up costs at the beginning of each trapping season. It will also stimulate increased production of wild fur."

Under the Grubstake program, a payment of \$5 per pelt of any fur-bearing species is paid to all trappers who ship at least 20 fur pelts to auction, now to a maximum of 400. This payment is in addition to the guaranteed advance and prime fur bonus that are paid to eligible trappers through the Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs Program. Grubstake payments occur in the fall prior to the start of the new trapping season and are based on production from the previous year's fur harvest.

Trapping season in the NWT runs from October to June, the period when fur is most market-ready. Trappers who participate in the program must have General Hunting Licenses or be land-claim beneficiaries. Fur can be brought to the wildlife officers at local Department of Environment and Natural Resources offices to be entered into the program.

Through the Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs Program, the Government of the Northwest Territories works in partnership with NWT harvesters and the fur industry to support and

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promote the traditional fur economy. In the 2010/11 fiscal year, the program invested \$121,709 into the NWT trapping industry.

### National Day of Remembrance

**YELLOWKNIFE (November 22, 2011)** -- Tomorrow is the National Day of Remembrance for victims of road crashes in Canada. Each day, an average of six people lose their lives due to collisions on Canada's streets and highways. Each year, an average of 3.5 people are killed on Northwest Territories roads, and for every person killed, 75 people were injured, many of them seriously. The Day is set aside to remember these victims and to consider ways we can reduce the number of collisions in the future.

"We should think every day about how we can help our friends and loved ones be safe," said David Ramsay, Minister of Transportation. "The National Day of Remembrance is set aside to consider the consequences when avoidable collisions, injuries, and deaths occur on our roads and trails."

At 861 collisions, 173 injuries, and four deaths, 2008 was the worst year for collisions in the Northwest Territories since 1992. The record has improved significantly since then. The <u>2010 NWT Traffic Collision Facts Report</u>, which has just been released, reports that 585 collisions occurred in the NWT in 2010, the lowest number in more than 20 years. There were also 113 injuries and three fatalities in 2010. To this point in 2011, there have been no fatal collisions in the NWT.

Drive Alive, the GNWT's road safety information program, reminds residents that the proper use of seat belts, child car seats, and booster seats can reduce the number of deaths and serious injuries on our roads. This requires a community-wide effort to encourage friends and loved ones to protect their families by using occupant restraints. In 2013, as part of the Buckle Up NWT campaign, the community with the largest percentage of seat belt users will win \$5,000 for their fire department and an all-expenses-paid concert in the community with award-winning Aboriginal artist Leela Gilday.

- Youth Trapper based on age and productivity in the GMVF Program.

A fifth award, Youth Trapper NWT, is presented to the most productive youth trapper.

Through the GMVF program, the GNWT works in partnership with NWT trappers, the fur industry, and the Department of Environment and Natural Resources to support the territory's traditional fur economy.

Marilyn Maring received the *Youth Trapper NWT* award for being the most productive youth trapper in the territory.

Through initiatives such as Trapper Recognition programs, the GNWT is taking steps to diversify the economy and provide all communities and regions with opportunities and choices, a key goal of the 17<sup>th</sup> Legislative Assembly.

### **Corrections Northern Recruit Training Program Graduation**

**YELLOWKNIFE (Nov. 25, 2011)** – Today, twelve northerners are ready to take their places in the workforce as they graduate from the Corrections Northern Recruit Training Program.

This six-week program gives NWT residents the technical and theoretical skills required to be successful in the Corrections Service.

"While many of the graduates are successful in obtaining positions within the GNWT, that isn't the only place they can work," said Minister of Justice, Glen Abernethy. "Today's graduates will be ready for entry-level positions in our correctional facilities or security-oriented positions anywhere in the North. We are proud to build a trained Northern workforce."

The program was developed in 2009 because the Corrections Service faced significant challenges recruiting northerners with the basic qualifications to work in the corrections field. Successful graduates will continue to the final part of their program: paid casual staff positions that include a workplace orientation where they obtain direct on-the-job experience. They will then have the skills and training to apply for permanent positions at youth or adult correctional facilities in the NWT or follow their own alternate career aspirations.

To date, 64 people have graduated from the Corrections Northern Recruit Training Program, and interest remains high. Graduates have successfully obtained GNWT positions in Fort Smith, Hay River, Inuvik and Yellowknife.

#### Minister Beaulieu meets with Health Ministers

**YELLOWKNIFE (Nov. 28, 2011)** – Minister of Health and Social Services Tom Beaulieu met with provincial, territorial and federal Ministers of Health and Wellness in Halifax, Nova Scotia November 24-25, 2011.

Ministers renewed their commitment to focus on common issues affecting provinces and territories, including accelerating innovation to improve care for patients and families and promoting healthy living. Agenda items at the meeting included a general discussion about the renewal of the 2004 Health Accord, shared priorities related to healthy living, and a presentation from the Mental Health Commission of Canada.

"At the meetings, I highlighted for other Health Ministers our current social conditions and their influence on our health status, as well as the continued need for investment in other factors that influence population health, such as housing, employment and education," said Minister Beaulieu.

At the meeting, Minister Beaulieu spoke about the importance of suicide prevention in NWT communities and the need for continued investment and partnership with the federal government and non-government organisations. "We need to talk about suicides, continue to invest in community-based solutions, and understand contributing issues that lead to suicides, like mental health and addictions," he said. The federal, provincial and territorial governments agreed to explore further opportunities to work together on this critical issue.

The Ministers endorsed a report on childhood obesity, which includes joint activities they will be undertaking to tackle this issue. "Childhood obesity is a growing problem that is reaching epidemic proportions in Canada," said Minister Beaulieu. "In the NWT, we need to encourage families to move away from processed foods and promote a healthy diet based on traditional foods, while we continue our efforts to get northerners to be more physically active."

# GNWT receives the Project Description Report for the Tulita District portion of the planned Mackenzie Valley Highway

**Norman Wells (November 30, 2011)** – Minister of Transportation David Ramsay today received the completed Project Description Report (PDR) for the portion of the planned Mackenzie Valley Highway going through the Tulita District of the Sahtu Settlement Area.

The PDR was presented to the Minister by Ethel Blondin-Andrew, the President of 5658 NWT Ltd., an Aboriginal organization established by the Tulita Land Corporation, Norman Wells Land Corporation, Fort Norman Metis Land Corporation, and Tulita Dene Band. This marks another milestone in the Mackenzie Valley Highway project from Wrigley to Tuktoyaktuk.

The PDR provides a summary of information required to proceed to the environmental review phase of the project relative to the Tulita District. Minister Ramsay says the PDR work demonstrates the value of partnerships with Aboriginal organizations.

"The decision to partner with Aboriginal organizations along the proposed right-of-way helps ensure that local knowledge contributes significantly to the final report," said Minister Ramsay. "This approach helps ensure that the concerns and interests of the people in the Tulita District of the Sahtu Settlement Area are taken into account."

"I believe the completion of the PDR by the 5658 NWT demonstrates the ability of aboriginal organizations to fully participate in the planning of major public infrastructure projects such as the Mackenzie Valley Highway," said Ethel Blondin-Andrew, President of 5658 NWT.

This is the third PDR that has been completed for the Mackenzie Valley Highway to Tuktoyaktuk. Another two PDRs for the project are in the final stages of preparation.



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#### Governor General of Canada to Open New Exhibit at Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre

**December 8, 2011** – Their Excellencies the Right Honourable David Johnston, Governor General of Canada, and Mrs. Sharon Johnston will be at the <u>Prince of Wales</u> <u>Northern Heritage Centre</u> today to open the *Hunters of the Alpine Ice* exhibit.


The exhibit opening will occur as part of Their Excellencies' official visit to the Northwest Territories from December 7-11. This is their first official visit to the NWT since His Excellency's swearing-in as Canada's 28th Governor General in October 2010 and will include Yellowknife, Fort Smith, Hay River and K'atl'odeeche First Nation.

"I am thrilled to have the Governor General of Canada experience some of our Northern lifestyle and culture," said the Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment. "To have Their Excellencies open this exhibit at our museum is tremendous, and provides the opportunity for us to share a piece of important cultural history with them."

Archaeologists from the museum worked with Tulita elders to document high alpine ice patches that have been used by *Shut'aot'ine*, or Mountain Dene hunters, for thousands of years. While hunting caribou on the ice patches, hunters left behind parts of their hunting equipment, which were preserved in the ice for hundreds of years. This ice is now melting, exposing the fragile artifacts to the elements and putting them at risk of destruction. The work is critical, and the team must visit the sites each year to monitor them for new discoveries.

Hunters of the Alpine Ice opens at 3:00pm in the Museum Café. A public presentation on the NWT Ice Patch Study will be held at 7:00pm on December 8<sup>th</sup> in the museum auditorium.



- simplifying the collective agreement so that it is clear and concise for employees and managers; and
- increasing flexibility in work scheduling to support more effective program delivery.

The GNWT and UNW meet December 19-22 to begin negotiations, with negotiations continuing in the New Year. # NTPC to Restrict Natural Gas Use in Inuvik, NT

**Yellowknife (December 20, 2011)** —The Northwest Territories Power Corporation (NTPC) announced it will be switching almost entirely to diesel fuel generation in Inuvik, starting early in the new year. The move, made with the support of the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT), will benefit all gas customers in the Town of Inuvik, extending Inuvik Gas' rapidly dwindling capacity to meet the town's needs.

"NTPC and the GNWT came together quickly to address the issue," says Brendan Bell, Chairman of NTPC. "Together, I think we've been able to develop a plan that meets the needs of the people of Inuvik while keeping the cost of electricity stable."

Currently, Ikhil Joint Venture is contracted to supply NTPC with natural gas from the nearby Ikhil well to produce electricity. In the fall, Ikhil announced that the gas field could be empty in less than two years. The move to diesel is expected to double the life of the gas field, increasing the amount of time residents will have access to natural gas.

The Government of the Northwest Territories will contribute funds to cover the difference in cost between diesel fuel and natural gas for power generation.

"Given the NWT-wide electricity rate pressure we will be facing in the near future, we felt we needed to insulate rate payers from additional unforeseen increases," says Michael Miltenberger, Minister responsible for the NWT Power Corporation. "This move will stabilize the situation and allows us more time to find a long-term solution for the residents of Inuvik."

In addition to the production of electricity, more than 80 per cent of homes in Inuvik rely on natural gas for heating. Denny Rodgers, Mayor of Inuvik, believes that the transition to diesel for power generation is the right move until a longer term solution can be found.

"Anything that can be done to give residents longer access to natural gas for heating will have a positive impact on the community. We appreciate NTPC's willingness to be flexible and work with us on this issue."
