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Museum Reopens NWT Archives, Cleanup Continues After Fire

YELLOWKNIFE (January 6, 2012) – The Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre (PWNHC) reopened the NWT Archives yesterday after a chimney fire damaged a small area inside the building on Boxing Day.

Detected early in the morning on December 26, the fire was found in and around the chimney, resulting in damage to the mechanical and kitchen areas. The Fire Department responded immediately and contained the fire, lessening the impact to the rest of the Museum. The majority of the fire damage was limited to the Museum Café kitchen. Fire recovery teams have been working long days to ensure a comprehensive cleanup and that all affected areas are identified, from the basement to the roof. The exact cause of the fire is still unknown, pending further investigation.

All of the collections, artifacts, exhibits and climate controlled environments were undamaged and remain intact.

"We are very lucky that the fire was contained so quickly," said Barb Cameron, Director of PWNHC. "The response time from the fire department, the diligence of the fire recovery teams, and all of the people working to help us have all made a very difficult situation much easier. We thank them, and will open our doors to the public when the building is ready."

While the Fire Department made an initial estimate of the damage, an assessment is ongoing to identify the full cost of the damage.

The first step towards normal operation begins Thursday, January 5, with the reopening of the NWT Archives for regular hours: 9am to 12pm and 1pm to 4:30pm, Monday to Friday. Anyone visiting the Archives must sign in at the front desk, and access will be restricted to the Archives Reading Room and the washroom facilities. All other areas of the PWNHC will be closed until further notice.

The Archives houses the history of the NWT for safekeeping, including the oral tradition and history of NWT Aboriginal peoples, constitutional development in the NWT leading up to the creation of Nunavut, the activities of the Government of the Northwest Territories since 1967, the fur trade, aviation industry and the development of the mining industry.

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Two New Community Centres Benefit Fort Resolution

YELLOWKNIFE (January 10, 2012) – The Town of Fort Resolution had double cause for celebration last week as residents officially opened two community buildings. A new Youth Centre Complex and the retrofitted Antoine Beaulieu Hall will now provide opportunities for youth development and space for community gatherings.

"The Government of Canada is proud to be a partner in these wonderful projects in Fort Resolution that will help contribute to a healthy and vibrant community," said the Honourable Leona Aglukkaq, Minister of Health and Minister Responsible for the Canada Northern Economic Development Agency. "Canada's Economic Action Plan has helped to boost the economy and create jobs, while improving public infrastructure across Canada."

"The new Youth Centre Complex provides opportunities for young people to pursue healthy activities and creates a new learning environment in the community," said Robert C. McLeod, Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs. "Retrofitting older buildings like the Antoine Beaulieu Hall can add new life to infrastructure and provide updated spaces where communities can come together."

The new youth centre offers activities ranging from cultural and traditional games to computer classes, and includes space for recreational activities such as billiards. The total eligible cost was \$1.4 million. Federal funding was provided through the Provincial-Territorial Base Fund, which is part of the Building Canada plan.

Canada is providing the Northwest Territories a total of \$185.8 million under the Provincial-Territorial Base Fund. This funding has been fully committed toward 63 priority infrastructure initiatives worth over \$310 million.

The retrofitting of Antoine Beaulieu Hall, which included electrical and mechanical upgrades, has opened more space to accommodate large groups and community events. Antoine Beaulieu Hall benefitted from investments of \$250,000 from the Government of Canada. The Hamlet of Fort Resolution matched federal contributions with community public infrastructure funding provided by the GNWT. Federal support for this project came from the Infrastructure Stimulus Fund, part of Canada's Economic Action Plan.

Canada and the Northwest Territories are working together to create jobs and boost the economy while making significant investments that will help communities improve their infrastructure. The Government of the Northwest Territories worked with the Northwest Territories Association of Communities to ensure that infrastructure funds are delivered quickly and efficiently for priority initiatives throughout the territory.

The NWT Film Commission has been working in partnership with the City of Yellowknife to provide OFP with in-kind support by:


- providing direction on insurance and permit requirements,

Cabinet Meets With Beaufort-Delta Regional Council

INUVIK (January 11, 2012) -- The GNWT has concluded government-to-government meetings with the Beaufort-Delta Regional Council (BDRC).

All GNWT ministers were in attendance to speak to BDRC leaders about issues of mutual interest and concern, including the government-to-government relationship, devolution, energy initiatives, education, housing, and health and social services.

"These meetings are critical in developing and maintaining our government-to-government relationship," said Premier Bob McLeod. "My Cabinet colleagues and I are committed to developing a renewed relationship with Aboriginal governments and community leaders. They are our partners in almost all territorial initiatives, and we continue to work closely."

"The regional council meetings have been held over the past 20 years and we were pleased that all Cabinet members were able to attend and address our regional and community issues," said Nellie Cournoyea, CEO and Chair of the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation. "The Council, with the support of the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, presented our research findings, recommendations and priorities to the Premier and his colleagues, with a view to working with the GNWT to improve the conditions in the communities, including education, housing, health, and strengthening our culture and language."

The Beaufort-Delta Regional Council's priorities are:

- 1. Addictions and mental health research
- 2. Social housing and income support
- 3. Education
- 4. Culture and language
- 5. Devolution and self-government

The GNWT's priorities are outlined under the theme *Believing in People and Building on the Strengths of Northerners*. They include making progress on improving our economy, making investments in infrastructure, creating employment opportunities for Northerners, balancing development with environmental stewardship, addressing the cost of living in all of our communities, ensuring that NWT residents have adequate housing and concluding devolution negotiations.

"We have made progress in our discussions because of our shared priorities," said Premier McLeod. "We agree that our priorities are interrelated: we cannot address social issues like poverty and dependence if we do not have a strong economy, and for a strong economy, we need healthy, educated people. Investments in the Inuvik-Tuktoyaktuk highway will support sustainable development, and we agree on the need for a fibreoptic link to improve program and service delivery and increase economic opportunities throughout the valley."

All Cabinet ministers remain in Inuvik, attending government-to-government meetings with the Gwich'in leadership.

INUVIK (January 16, 2012) - The GNWT has concluded government-to-government meetings with the Gwich'in Tribal Council. All GNWT ministers attended these meetings and discussed issues of mutual interest and concern with Gwich'in leadership. The agenda included land claims implementation, infrastructure projects, building the economy, and devolution.

"Our government-to-government relationship is critical to maintaining and improving initiatives throughout the Gwich'in region," said Premier Bob McLeod. "My Cabinet colleagues and I believe in the importance of forums like this one. We can take the time to listen to each other and discuss regional issues in a collaborative environment. I was especially interested in the Gwich'in perspective on the relationship between health and justice, and have asked senior officials to follow up directly to complete this work. The leaders' proposal to develop a Beaufort-Delta Tourism Strategy has great potential to create jobs and show off our spectacular territory to the world. We also had encouraging talks about capacity building. We agree that governments need to invest in infrastructure and stimulate the private sector to create jobs. These are necessary steps toward our shared vision of a unified, sustainable and prosperous Northwest Territories."

The GNWT's priorities are outlined under the theme *Believing in People and Building on the Strengths of Northerners*. In the Gwich'in region, P3 investments for the Mackenzie Valley Fibreoptic Link will improve communications infrastructure, and the Shelter Policy Review will provide a long-term strategic framework for delivering housing.

First Fur Auction of the Year Sees Price Increases Across the Board

YELLOWKNIFE (January 16, 2012) -- Wild fur pelt prices in the Northwest Territories have surged up to 135% at the first wild fur sale of the season hosted by Fur Harvester's Auction Inc. in North Bay, Ontario on January 7, 2012.

The Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs (GMVF) program is a fur marketing service provided by the Government of the Northwest Territories. All proceeds from fur sold at auction through the program go directly to the hunter or trapper.

"NWT wild furs commanded exceptional prices at the first auction of the year and the market for our high-quality furs continues to grow," said David Ramsay, Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment. "The Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs program has been continuously recognized as a supplier of the finest northern Canadian wild fur, and our hunters and trappers should be commended for their ability to provide high-quality pelts for sale time and time again."

Notable pelt increases this year include cross fox, with an increase of 135%; red fox, with an increase of 120%; and beaver, with an increase of 105%. Increases were also seen in grizzly bear, muskrat, wolf and Arctic fox.

Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs' Arctic fox broke its previous record for top selling price, with a pelt going for the all-time high of \$200. Other pelts in high demand at auction were muskrat, where all pelts shipped to auction were sold, and beaver, where 95% of pelts shipped to auction were sold.


Total NWT sales at the auction totalled \$124,000 – the highest amount at this auction in recent years.

The next auction where Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs will be sold is the Fur Harvesters Auction on March 23, 2012 in Seattle, Washington.

Through the Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs Program, the Government of the Northwest Territories works in partnership with NWT harvesters and the fur industry to support and promote the NWT's traditional fur economy.

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Cabinet Meets With Tlicho Government

YELLOWKNIFE (January 17, 2012) – The GNWT and Tlicho have concluded government-to-government meetings. These were the first meetings with all GNWT Cabinet ministers and all Tlicho Government Executive Council members since the establishment of the Tlicho Government six years ago. While previous territorial governments met with the Tlicho leadership, this is the first time the Tlicho Government and entire GNWT Cabinet have met bilaterally to discuss how the two will work together. Senior officials of both governments have been directed to work together to develop a memorandum of understanding that will formalize the government-togovernment relationship.

"This is an important development that sets the tone for our continued work toward a united and prosperous Northwest Territories," said Premier Bob McLeod. "We have committed to bilateral meetings with the entire Cabinet and Tlicho Government leadership twice per year. A strong, independent north will be built on partnerships, and the GNWT is committed to working with the Tlicho Government as a key partner. I look forward to ongoing discussions with their leadership to determine a path forward for our shared and prosperous future."

"I was pleased that our two governments could come together and discuss areas of mutual interest," said Grand Chief Eddie Erasmus. "The dialogue about some challenging issues and our exchange of viewpoints was done with respect for each other and our mutual jurisdictions. I look forward to making progress where possible and to our future and regular intergovernmental forums."

During the two-day meeting (January 12-13, 2012), the governments discussed a number of shared interests:

- Presentations about devolution were provided by both governments.
- The GNWT agreed to provide further information about the formula for funding community governments, and will consider establishing a Tlicho Government – GNWT Working Group to discuss options for improving the operation of Tlicho community governments.

- The GNWT will introduce a new Wildlife Act. The GNWT will convene a meeting of Aboriginal governments and continue to work with them through the Wildlife Act Working Group.
- The Tlicho Government and GNWT committed to continue to work together on caribou management, housing, roads and the Water Strategy. A Tlicho Government representative will serve on the Aboriginal steering committee on water.
- The Tlicho Government and GNWT will continue collaborative efforts to support healthy living and prevention.

The meeting was conducted in the Tlicho language and English using interpreters. This is the fourth time Premier McLeod has met with Tlicho leadership since being elected. The most recent meeting was on November 17, 2011, the first time an NWT Premier had attended the Tlicho Assembly.

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Premiers Announce Health Care Innovation Working Group





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Successful Justice and Public Safety Ministers' Meeting in Charlottetown

YELLOWKNIFE (January 30, 2012) -- The federal, provincial and territorial (FPT) ministers responsible for Justice and Public Safety recently wrapped up their annual meeting in Charlottetown, Prince Edward Island.

Yukon Justice Minister Mike Nixon, Northwest Territories Justice Minister Glen Abernethy and Nunavut Justice Minister Daniel Shewchuk met with their federal and provincial counterparts to talk about issues of particular concern to the North and committed to continue working with federal and provincial ministers to improve access to justice for marginalized individuals and communities.

Territorial ministers called on the federal government to expand support for drug treatment courts to include other therapeutic models. This would allow the courts to provide offenders with an alternative to incarceration by offering the opportunity to complete a drug or alcohol addiction program.

"Together with our justice counterparts in the Northwest Territories and Nunavut we can work towards alternative programs that address the underlying causes of criminal activity and focus on rehabilitation," Nixon said.

Nixon led a discussion on the impact of Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) on the justice system. FPT justice ministers were unanimous in their agreement to continue moving forward on this priority issue, stressing the need to improve access to justice for disadvantaged people, including those with FASD.

Another issue of shared concern in the North that the territorial ministers addressed was the First Nations Policing Program.

"In the discussion on the First Nations Policing Program, all ministers recognized the importance of the program in addressing public safety challenges in First Nation and Inuit communities. Federal and provincial ministers also acknowledged the need for the expansion of the program to the North," Abernethy said.

"Our ministerial colleagues acknowledged the challenges and opportunities related to the administration of justice in northern and remote communities.

Federal, provincial and territorial ministers are committed to continuing to advance these discussions," Shewchuk said.

The next FPT Justice ministers' meeting will be held this fall in Regina.

YELLOWKNIFE (February 6, 2012) – The Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, has declared February 6th to 10th, 2012 as Apprenticeship Week in the Northwest Territories.

"Apprenticeships and occupational certifications have moved to the forefront of the economy in the Northwest Territories," said Minister Lafferty. "The 2012 theme *Get With Apprenticeships* is especially appropriate this year as the government works with industry and educational institutions to ensure the territory develops a work force ready to take advantage of job opportunities that result from emerging industries."

In the NWT there are 53 designated trades and 25 occupations that employ over 400 men and women. Aurora College offers technical training in Fort Smith and Inuvik for five trades, including plumber, carpenter, electrician, heavy equipment technician and housing maintainer.

"With the unique needs of our region, we rely heavily on trades," said Minister Lafferty. "Our region requires that we have certified people available to help us with our frozen pipes and furnaces, constructing our buildings, and ensuring that we are able to function no matter where we are or the season we're in. With our partners, Aurora College, Skills Canada, and the Mine Training Society, it is imperative that we provide education, certification and opportunity for those individuals wanting to explore a trade."


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Minister of Finance Introduces An Act to Amend the Borrowing Authorization Act

YELLOWKNIFE (February 9, 2012) -- Minister of Finance J. Michael Miltenberger introduced *An Act to Amend the Borrowing Authorization Act.* When passed, the Act will increase the amount the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) is allowed to borrow under the *Borrowing Authorization Act* from \$175 million to \$275 million.

The GNWT has two borrowing limits. The first, set under the territorial *Borrowing Authorization Act*, limits the amount the GNWT can borrow over the short term and was set by the GNWT itself. This is the limit that will change after the passage of the *Act to Amend the Borrowing Authorization Act*. The second, imposed by the Government of Canada under the *Northwest Territories Act*, sets an overall limit that includes the short-term borrowing under the territorial *Borrowing Authorization Act*. This federally imposed limit is currently \$575 million.

The current limit under the *Borrowing Authorization Act* has not been changed since 1995. During this period, government revenues and operations have grown, and the limit no longer provides the flexibility that is needed to manage the GNWT's day-to-day cash requirements. Increasing the limit will mean the Government will be better able to manage its cash.

"Our strategy of supporting the NWT economy during the fiscal crisis has left our cash reserves low," said Minister Miltenberger. "While the increase will allow the GNWT to carry more short-term debt, our current fiscal strategy will see us recovering our cash over the next few years. With increased cash reserves, the need to incur short-term debt to manage cash flow will be reduced."

The increase in the short-term borrowing limit will not affect the GNWT's credit rating or discussions with Canada to increase the long-term borrowing limit.

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NWT Housing Corporation providing funding to BETTY House

YELLOWKNIFE (Feb. 10, 2012) — The Northwest Territories Housing Corporation (NWTHC) is pleased to announce today that it will be providing \$2.3 million toward the construction of transitional housing for single women and women with children. This contribution to the Yellowknife Homelessness Coalition and YWCA Yellowknife for the construction of this housing project supports a critical shelter need in the NWT.

The Honourable Robert C. McLeod, Minister Responsible for the NWTHC, announced the funding in the Legislative Assembly earlier today. The Yellowknife Homelessness Coalition is spearheading fundraising and construction of the project; YWCA Yellowknife will be the owner and operator when the building opens.

The working name for this new facility is BETTY House (Better Environment to Transition in Yellowknife). It will be located on 54 Street, opposite Aurora College. The building will offer approximately 30 suites in a variety of sizes at affordable rental rates.

Women and children who need support while they re-establish homes will live at BETTY House for up to three years. Those women may have been living in an emergency shelter or may have recently arrived in Yellowknife and have nowhere else to go.

"The Northwest Territories Housing Corporation is pleased to participate in this essential project to support women and children in need of transitional housing. Contributing to the completion of Betty House forms a fundamental part of the Housing Corporation's overall priority of strengthening its approach to homelessness" says Minister McLeod.

Mayor Gordon Van Tighem shares his enthusiasm, "It is indeed exciting to hear the announcement by the Minister Responsible for the NWT Housing Corporation that they are committed to a substantial financial contribution to the Betty House. This moves our Homelessness Coalition a great leap forward in meeting their current highest priority to provide women and women with children in transition a hand up toward a brighter future."

"BETTY House will extend the continuum of services to single women and women with children, filling a long-standing gap," says Lyda Fuller, executive director of YWCA Yellowknife.

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"It requires the cooperation of many partners to make a housing project like Betty House a success. We appreciate the important contribution of the Yellowknife Homelessness Coalition and YWCA toward strengthening individuals and families through the work that each of these organizations provides to address homelessness in Yellowknife" adds Minister McLeod.

These units have been providing shelter to those at risk of being homeless. In 2004, the Coalition envisioned what later came to fruition as Bailey House. With the successful partnership of the federal and territorial governments as well as private business and community citizens, the newly constructed 32 unit men's transitional home was completed in 2008.

YWCA Yellowknife's housing programs include Alison McAteer family violence shelter, the emergency and transitional housing program for families at Rockhill and residential and in-home support for clients with mental health and developmental disabilities.



Keeping Traditions Alive Through Kayak-Making

TUKTOYAKTUK (February 14, 2012) -- A traditional sealskin kayak constructed by the students of the Mangilaluk School is the newest display at the Tuktoyaktuk airport.

Construction took place over the past several months and local Tuktoyatuk resident Darrel Nasogaluak led the project. Mr. Nasogaluak is a strong supporter of incorporating traditional knowledge into local schools and taught the students how to build the kayak using traditional tools and materials.

"I am pleased to see a significant and growing interest from youth around the territory in traditional projects and activities such as kayak-making," said Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment, David Ramsay. "I want to congratulate the high school students at the Mangilaluk School for their hard work completing the kayak, and a special thanks to Darrel Nasogaluak. I look forward to my next visit to Tuktoyaktuk to see it for myself."

This initiative took place through the Take a Kid Trapping program. The program introduces NWT youth to the traditional harvesting practices of hunting, trapping, fishing and outdoor survival. In 2011/12, the Take a Kid Trapping program hosted 49 projects in regions throughout the NWT, with over 2200 youth participants.

The program is delivered through schools and Aboriginal organizations and administered by the Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment in co-operation with the Departments of Municipal and Community Affairs and Environment and Natural Resources.

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Stanton Territorial Health Authority Introduces a 100% Tobacco Free Grounds Policy.

YELLOWKNIFE (February 14, 2012) Stanton Territorial Health Authority (STHA) is joining a growing number of hospitals and healthcare facilities across Canada that are challenging the way we think about healthcare – and the role of healthcare facilities.

Tobacco is the leading cause of preventable death and disease in the Northwest Territories. The NWT has one of the highest rates of tobacco use in the country - at 36% it is double the National average. As the largest healthcare facility in the Territory, STHA has an opportunity to make a strong statement about the dangers of tobacco use and the health risks associated with even minimal exposure to second-hand smoke. It has a responsibility to encourage a culture of healthy living, within the institution and greater community. By going 100% tobacco free STHA hopes to support other health centres, clinics, and facilities in the North that are considering similar strategies.

STHA does recognize the highly addictive nature of nicotine and has developed supports to make their patients feel as comfortable as possible. Nicotine Replacement Therapies (NRT's) will be offered to all patients. If this policy encourages patients to tackle their tobacco addiction, resources and support will also be available.

"I understand that this will be a challenging change for all of us. However, I think we can agree that this is a move in the right direction. We are doing a great job at treating diseases caused by tobacco, but what are we doing to prevent them? The new policy sends a clear message that tobacco use has no place in an institution dedicated to healing. I ask for your support to make this as easy a transition as possible." Kay Lewis, CEO





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2011 Student Assessment Results

YELLOWKNIFE (February 28, 2012) – The Northwest Territories results for the 2011 Alberta Achievement Tests (AAT), Functional Grade Levels (FGL) and attendance were released today.

"The results are important indicators that help us track student performance and the success of the education system in the Northwest Territories," says the Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Jackson Lafferty. "We are able to spot areas of concern and address them."

The results indicate that attendance must continue to be an area of focus. For the 2010-11 school year, average attendance was 84.3% across grades K to 12. Attendance affects how students perform in the education system and provides a strong foundation for learning and success. During the Aboriginal Student Achievement forums, Aboriginal leaders, education leaders, community members and youth consistently identified attendance as an area of concern. In 2011, the Department of Education, Culture and Employment launched a campaign throughout the NWT school system, focusing on rewards for attendance. The feedback from schools has been favourable, and a number of schools have continued the campaign for the 2011-12 school year.

There is a promising increase in both the FGLs and AATs over the last few years in English Language Arts, however, increases and decreases can fluctuate from year to year without being statistically significant. Variables like population, cultural and language disparities, and differing support structures can affect a student's developmental level, which requires a greater focus on the early years, and endorses the concept of education as a shared responsibility.

Literacy is a key area of focus to improve student success. The Department of Education, Culture and Employment is providing funding and professional development for literacy coaches in each region of the NWT as part of the Aboriginal Student Achievement Initiative. In August 2011, Minister Lafferty tabled the Aboriginal Student Achievement Education Plan, which details how the territory is working to improve educational outcomes.

While there are some areas for improvement, there are noteworthy successes, such as the marked increases in graduation numbers from the secondary school system. To ensure that success is built upon, tools like the AATs and FGLs will continue to provide overall information on the education system, which will help identify opportunities for improving the outcomes and making the education system both accessible and rewarding for students of all ages.


- 2011 results for the Alberta Achievement Tests (AAT), Functional Grade Levels (FGL), and attendance data.
- 2011 was the seventh year that students of the NWT have written the AATs. In addition,
 FGL data which is collected in May of each school year has been released for the NWT.
- Reporting FGL and AAT results provide an indication of NWT student performance.
- AATs are standardized tests that measure student performance in NWT curriculum in the areas of English Language Arts and Mathematics. Students in grades 3, 6 and 9 wrote the tests in May and June, 2011. The AATs provide a "snapshot" of a student's performance on one particular day, while FGLs show aspects of student performance over the full year.
- The FGL is the curriculum level at which a student is working for the majority of the school year in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Reporting is based on a variety of classroom assessment methods by teachers over the course of the year. FGL reporting was initiated in steps in the NWT, starting with grades 1-3 in 2004-2005, and expanding to grade 9 in 2006-2007.
- 2011 is the fifth year of full reporting.
- Also released, for the fourth year, is information regarding student attendance. Average attendance dropped from 86.1% in 2010 to 84.3% in 2011.

A summary of 2011 Alberta Achievement Test, Functional Grade Levels, and attendance results for the NWT is attached.

Functional Grade Level

A Functional Grade Level is the grade level of the curricular outcomes a student worked on for the majority of the school year. A student's FGL indicates that the student has mastered or achieved the curricular outcomes for the preceding grade level. Mastery means that a student has accomplished the curricular outcomes to a level where the student has a strong enough foundation to be successful in subsequent grade levels. In grade one, approximately 77% of students are able to work on Grade 1 curriculum. Overall, an average of about 65% of students are working at the appropriate grade level for their age in English Language Arts. In Mathematics, approximately 82% of grade one students are able to work on grade one curriculum and approximately 63% of students are working at the appropriate grade level of curriculum for their age.

English Language Arts








Proportion of NWT Students At or Above Grade Level in Mathematics 2010/11




Commencing in 2007 with changes to the NWT AAT/PAT Exclusion Policy, Superintendents were given the authority to excuse students from Alberta Achievement Testing if the students were on a documented Individual Education Plan (IEP) or if they were working on curriculum two or more grade levels below their grade of enrolment and had a documented Modified Education Plan (MEP). Should a student fulfill the above criteria and participate in the testing, for NWT reporting purposes, their results have been removed from the NWT results and the students have been considered excused from writing the tests. The numbers of students excused from the testing are still included in calculation of Students Achieving Acceptable Standard as a percentage of the total enrolment.





Deh Cho Bridge Milestone Reached

Fort Providence (February 28, 2012) – Canada's largest river, the Mackenzie, has now been spanned. Truss sections connecting the north and south sections of the Deh Cho Bridge came together on Sunday, February 26. Work crews shook hands across the newly connected trusses, marking a crucial milestone in the construction of the bridge.


Minister of Transportation David Ramsay thanked the crews, engineers, and department staff responsible for the joining of the two sides. "Our staff and contractors have worked through the winter to connect the north and south sections of the bridge, sometimes in unpleasant and difficult conditions," he said. "This connection will allow the next phases of work to take place." These works include the erection of the remaining A-pylon and cables, and the placement of deck panels.

Once the deck panels and A-pylons are in place, grouting and paving of the driving surface are expected to occur over the summer. Work on the abutments and the placement of the guardrail will follow, likely in the fall of 2012.

The Deh Cho Bridge is the first permanent structure across the Mackenzie River and is expected to be completed in the late fall of 2012, depending on construction progress on the remaining work.

GNWT receives PDR for the K'asho Got'ine District portion of the Mackenzie Valley Highway

Yellowknife (March 5, 2012) - At a handover ceremony at the Legislative Assembly on Thursday, March 1, Minister of Transportation David Ramsay received the completed project description report (PDR) for the K'asho Got'ine District portion of the planned Mackenzie Valley Highway (Got'ine means people).

The Minister accepted the PDR from Edwin Erutse, the President of the K'asho Development Foundation (KDF). Also attending from the KDF were Vice President Joseph Kochon, Secretary Treasurer William McNeely and Chief Richard Kochon. Chief Wilfred McNeely joined the presentation via teleconference due to a prior commitment. The K'asho Development Foundation represents approximately 1000 people who reside in the K'asho Got'ine District of the Sahtu Settlement Area. The PDR is a summary of information required to proceed to the environmental review of the highway project from the Tulita District to the Gwich'in Settlement Area.

Minister Ramsay says the PDR reflects the views and values of the people in the K'asho Got'ine District. "This PDR is a thoughtful examination of the important issues that must be addressed for this portion of the Mackenzie Valley Highway," he said. "It lays an important foundation for a project that will contribute to the sustainability of the K'asho Got'ine and their way of life."


"We have learned from the past that governments need to work closely with the people most affected by the project and plan together," says KDF President Erutse. "Our involvement in the creation of this PDR will help to make this project a success."

All of the PDRs for the Mackenzie Valley Highway have now been completed. They are to be combined into a single project description report for use in the project's preliminary environmental screening. Funding for this work was cost-shared between the Government of Northwest Territories and the Government of Canada Northern Economic Development Agency.

Collective Bargaining Moves to the Next Phase

Yellowknife (March 6, 2012) – The third round of collective bargaining between the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and the Union of Northern Workers (UNW) concluded on March 1st. Since December, 2011, the parties have been negotiating the renewal of the collective agreement that expires March 31, 2012.

While significant progress has been made on a number of issues, the parties were unable to reach an overall tentative agreement through negotiations. As a result, the GNWT and UNW will be seeking the assistance of a mediator with the aim of concluding an agreement in the near future.

The GNWT remains committed to respecting and supporting its employees and the overall sustainability of the public service, while also maintaining the quality programs and services it provides to NWT residents. The government is doing this while continuing to manage its limited resources within the current fiscal environment.

The GNWT values its employees and believes this was demonstrated at the negotiating table by offering increases in compensation. While modest, the proposed compensation increases reflect the GNWT's current fiscal environment. Since 1999, the GNWT has supported a 38% increase in total compensation, compared to a 28% increase in cost of living over that same timeframe.

The GNWT continues to plan for next steps and remains optimistic that a tentative agreement can be reached with the assistance of a mediator.



Hazard Alert - Natural Gas Forced Air Furnaces & Carbon Monoxide Risk

March 14, 2012 - The Office of the Fire Marshal (OFM) has identified a concern with a number of natural gas-burning forced-air furnaces that have the potential to introduce carbon monoxide fumes into the living environment.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a colourless, odourless, tasteless, and toxic gas that is a product of incomplete combustion.

The Office of the Fire Marshal (OFM) has identified a concern with a number of natural gasburning forced-air furnaces that have the potential to introduce carbon monoxide fumes into the living environment.

Carbon Monoxide (CO) is a colourless, odourless, tasteless, and toxic gas that is a product of incomplete combustion.

Symptoms of Carbon Monoxide Poisoning:

- 1. Tiredness or lack of energy (drowsiness)
- 2. Pink discoloration of the skin
- 3. Headache
- 4. Nausea (sometimes referred to as flu-like symptoms)

The OFM is working with other regulatory agencies to determine the extent of this problem as quickly as possible.

All residential building owners with forced air natural gas furnaces should:

- 1. Install a functioning Carbon Monoxide Alarm in your home in the vicinity of a heat register/supply duct. (If one exists, recommended replacement is about 5-10 years- verify with manufacturer)
- 2. Have a qualified furnace service person inspect your furnace.
- 3. If the inspection reveals that the furnace is defective, repair or replace immediately
- 4. Contact the supplier of your furnace for warranty or replacement information.





Nature of Problem:

On inspection, a number of furnaces have shown significant cracks and breaching of the heat exchanger. The furnaces in question may also show evidence of cracks and degradation of the combustion chamber.

ALL RESIDENCES THAT CONTAIN A FUEL-FIRED APPLIANCE SHOULD CONTAIN A WORKING CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR

Cracks and breaching of the primary heat exchanger may introduce toxic carbon monoxide fumes into the living environment.

The OFM is working with a number of agencies to determine the cause of the failures.

IF YOUR CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTOR GOES INTO ALARM, OR IF YOU EXPERIENCE THE ABOVE SYMPTOMS, EVACUATE THE BUILDING TO FRESH CLEAN AIR IMMEDIATELY AND CALL THE LOCAL FIRE DEPARTMENT.

DO NOT ATTEMPT TO INSPECT OR REPAIR THE FURNACE YOURSELF! GET THE ASSISTANCE OF A QUALIFIED PROFESSIONAL FURNACE REPAIR PERSON.

DO NOT RE-OCCUPY THE BUILDING UNTIL THE HAZARDOUS CONDITION HAS BEEN CORRECTED.

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

Borrowing Limit Raised to \$800 Million

YELLOWKNIFE (March 15, 2012) – The federally imposed borrowing limit has been raised to \$800 million from \$575 million.

The increase represents the successful discussions between the federal Minister of Finance, the Honourable James Flaherty, and the three territorial Ministers of Finance about the definition and adequacy of the territorial borrowing limits.

"The new limit will help the GNWT to fund infrastructure priorities identified by the 17th Legislative Assembly and still manage its finances responsibly," Minister Michael Miltenberger said. "In these times of fiscal uncertainty with very real risks posed by external economic threats and internal cost pressures, the extra buffer between the borrowing limit and GNWT debt is welcome. I would like to thank Minister Flaherty for recognizing our ability to manage the increased borrowing capacity. This concludes one of our government's top federal-territorial priorities."

The increased borrowing limit does not change the GNWT's current fiscal strategy, which is governed by the *Fiscal Responsibility Policy*. That strategy is to pay down increased short-term borrowing incurred to support the NWT economy over the next two years. This will allow the GNWT to resume a more active infrastructure investment program in the last two years of the 17th Assembly while maintaining programs and services.

NTPC files General Rate Application

March 23, 2012 – Yellowknife, NT – Northwest Territories Power Corporation (NTPC) today filed its first General Rate Application (GRA) in five years.

NTPC is seeking Public Utilities Board approval for increases of seven percent effective April 1 in each of 2012, 2013 and 2014 and a five percent increase April 1, 2015. The proposed rates reflect increases in the cost of generating and distributing electricity that have occurred in the five years since the last GRA, including costs arising from the natural gas situation in Inuvik. NTPC is proposing that the rate increases be phased in over four years to help reduce the immediate impact on NWT residents.

The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) will make a contribution of \$33.8 million over three years to NTPC to allow it to phase in the proposed rate increases. GNWT contributions will be \$17.6 million in 2012/13, \$11.4 million in 2013/14 and \$4.8 million in 2014/15. Rates will be sufficient in 2015/16 to cover NTPC's revenue requirements and GNWT contributions will no longer be needed.

"This is a significant application for the Corporation and our customers for the next four years," Chairman of the NWT Power Corporation Brendan Bell said. "We encourage customers and communities to make their views known through the public hearing process."

The general public can receive information and make presentations to the Public Utilities Board and through the hearing process. Interveners can question NTPC's witnesses about the forecasts and analysis contained in the GRA.

Minister meets with Aboriginal Languages Revitalization Board

YELLOWKNIFE (March 27, 2012) – The Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, met with representatives of the Aboriginal Languages Revitalization Board last week.

"It is imperative that we continue our work to preserve and revitalize our languages," said the Minister. "We are beginning to see some progress in the awareness, interest, and resources available for language teachers and learners, due in no small part to the work of the Aboriginal Languages Revitalization Board. The work required to ensure the future of our languages is critical, and with the help of this Board, we are confident we will be successful."

The Official Languages Act mandates the board to provide the Minister with advice and recommendations for the maintenance, promotion and revitalization of the nine official Aboriginal languages of the Northwest Territories.

"We are pleased to be working to revitalize the languages of the NWT," said Acting Chair Dora Grandjambe. "We are working closely with the language communities, youth, elders and invested partners to provide pathways for learning and teaching, and we believe that our collective experience can provide direction and strong recommendations on how best to achieve our goals."

The Minister and the board discussed the need for more interpreters and translators, terminology development, languages training, recruitment and retention of language practitioners and instructors, the importance of elders in supporting the languages, community workshops, and orientations for board members.

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Seventh book released in The Land is Our Storybook series

YELLOWKNIFE (March 23, 2012) – <u>At the Heart of It</u>, the seventh book in The Land is Our Storybook series, was launched at the Prince Of Wales Northern Heritage Centre with authors Mindy Willett and Raymond Taniton.

The Land is Our Storybook series includes books for children that feature stories and culture from each of the traditional language groups in the Northwest Territories. Yellowknifer Mindy Willett has worked with storytellers, Elders and cultural leaders in communities across the Northwest Territories, as well as photographer Tessa MacIntosh, highlighting richly textured pictures of life in the North today. At the Heart of It was produced with former Grand Chief Raymond Taniton, and tells the story of the Sahtugot'ine, the people of Great Bear Lake.

"Ms. Willett and her co-authors have produced a tremendous series of books for children that showcase the Aboriginal cultural groups of the Northwest Territories," said the Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment.

"Projects of this nature help revitalize our many languages and cultures, and contribute to our efforts to maintain and preserve our traditional lifestyles for future generations."

At the Heart of It is available in the Yellowknife Book Cellar, along with the other books in the series.

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Chipewyan Dictionary Launch

FORT RESOLUTION (March 30, 2012) – Elders stood proudly in the gymnasium of Deninu School with dozens of hardcover English/Chipewyan dictionaries on Monday, March 26.

Students addressed the crowd in Chipewyan during the launch, welcoming community members and thanking Elders for their contributions to the dictionary project.

"The Dene Suline (Chipewyan) language revitalization efforts are strong and with the release of this language resource, we are one step closer to ensuring the future of the Chipewyan language," said Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment. "Supporting language revitalization will strengthen our communities, ensuring our children grow up 'strong like two people,' ready to lead productive lives while retaining their heritage."

For more than two years, Fort Resolution Elders worked tirelessly on this project, in partnership with the South Slave Divisional Education Council and the Yamozha Kue Society. The project also involved collaboration from dozens of community members, including several youth. This dictionary is a full-colour, 369-page resource documenting thousands of Chipewyan words, phrases and sentences, arranged both alphabetically and topically. It also includes a searchable CD with MP3 files linked to each word and phrase. Users can see the language and hear it as spoken by a fluent speaker.

"We are very proud of this dictionary," said Tom Beaulieu, MLA for Tu Nedhe. "When we began, the Elders on the project had one condition: that they would work in the schools, so students could ask questions. I've recently had students speaking with me in Chipewyan, which means that our efforts and approaches are working. Our community members must be commended for taking on such a complex and important project."

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Dene Languages Apps

YELLOWKNIFE (March 28, 2012) – The first Dene languages apps for iPhones and similar devices will be available for free download on the iTunes store in late April.

"I am very pleased to be announcing the launch of this important tool," said Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment. "We must ensure that our languages are preserved and revitalized for generations to come. Engaging our youth in learning their traditional languages through this new technology is a progressive and encouraging step."

In early 2011, the Department of Education, Culture and Employment partnered with the Yamozha Kue Society to develop the Dene Language Media applications for the five Dene languages. There were several other groups involved, including the Tlicho Community Services Agency, the Goyatiko Language Society, the Gwich'in Teaching and Learning Centre, the Dehcho Divisional Education Council Teaching and Learning Centre, the Sahtu Divisional Education Council Teaching and Learning Centre, and Paul William Kaeser High School.

"We are so pleased to see the results of such commitment from so many invested groups," said Raymond Sonfrere, Executive Director of the Yamozha Kue Society. "We try to work closely with the Dene languages communities with all of our projects, including the development of these tools, and we feel that the digital delivery method of making these available through an interactive app will help us engage our youth and family audiences."

The five Dene languages available in these apps are Tlicho, North Slavey, South Slavey, Gwich'in and Chipewyan. The apps are available for the touch-screen technology platforms and have language learning components, games and quizzes. Categories include family, actions, commands, food, animals, trapping and hunting. The next language apps to be developed will be in Cree, Inuvialuktun and Inuinnaqtun.

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Backgrounder: Dene Languages Apps

March 28, 2012

- Aboriginal languages in the NWT have suffered a tremendous decrease in intergenerational transmission within the past few decades.
- Teaching and Learning Centres, schools, Aboriginal governments and community language groups have developed many resources to aid in teaching and learning Aboriginal languages.
- As most Aboriginal languages are traditionally orally transmitted, there is a gap in resources for teachers.
- Electronic games and digital media are a way to reach youth who have grown up with technology at their fingertips.
- Early Childhood and School Services (EC&SS) has been developing a Dene Language Curriculum Teacher Implementation Guide (DLCTIG) to assist teachers with instructing the Dene languages following the Dene Kede curriculum.
- To assist with the DLCTIG, in early 2011, the Department of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE) partnered with Yamozha Kue Society (YKS) to develop Dene Language Media applications (apps) for the five Dene Languages.
- The Dene language applications have been developed as games in the Dene languages and are at a basic introductory language level. They will be distributed through the Apple Store, free of charge for use on touch screen platform hardware.
- The Touch games have a language learning component, games and quizzes. Categories include family, actions, commands, food, animals, trapping and hunting, among others.

- The following Dene Language Specialists from the five Dene languages contributed to the development of these applications by working on content, translation and recordings: Rosa Mantla, Tlicho Community Services Agency Mary Rose Sundberg, Goyatiko Language Society William Firth, Gwich'in Teaching and Learning Centre Andy Norwegian, Dehcho Divisional Education Council Teaching and Learning Centre Gladys Norwegian, ECE Jessie Campbell, Sahtu Divisional Education Council Teaching and Learning Centre, and Eileen Beaver, teacher, Paul William Kaeser High School. • Work on similar digital media applications will begin in April for the Inuvialuktun,



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Long-term policing agreement reached

YELLOWKNIFE (March 29, 2012) -- The Northwest Territories has reached a final agreement with the federal government for the renewal of the Territorial Police Services Agreement.

The current agreement expires on March 31. The new agreement has a 20-year term and features historic changes to management and financial transparency provisions. The agreement also continues to support local detachments working with communities to ensure an effective police force reflecting the diversity and needs of the people they serve.

"Through this new agreement, communities and people of the Northwest Territories will be better served," said Glen Abernethy, Minister of Justice. "It maintains effective policing services while using resources as effectively as possible. We look forward to working in close partnership with the RCMP for the next 20 years."

With the formation of a new contract management committee, the Government of the Northwest Territories, together with other provinces and territories, will have influence over cost and service decisions in an ongoing and co-ordinated way throughout the life of the new contract.

"Today is a significant milestone for RCMP Contract Policing," said Vic Toews, Canada's Public Safety minister. "I am very pleased to announce that the Government of Canada and the Government of the Northwest Territories have reached an agreement that will continue the relationship between the Royal Canadian Mounted Police and the people of the NWT for the next two decades."

The agreement will support continued progress in enhancing public confidence in police and marks a higher standard of accountability to the Northwest Territories. This new relationship is one of the important steps in creating more transparency and accountability for the RCMP as the Territorial Police Service.

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Colin Taylor Appointed Mediator for GNWT and UNW Negotiations

YELLOWKNIFE (April 2, 2012) -- Colin Taylor, a mediator with more than 30 years of experience, will be assisting the Government of the NWT and the Union of Northern Workers as they work towards a new collective agreement.

The GNWT and the Union have been negotiating a new collective agreement since December 19, 2011. After three rounds of negotiations, agreement was reached on a number of items. However, on March 1, 2012, the parties agreed to go to mediation to resolve the remaining issues.

"The GNWT is optimistic that a negotiated agreement can be reached with the UNW," says Sheila Bassi-Kellett, Deputy Minister of Human Resources. "Mediation is the next phase of this process. Mr. Taylor brings considerable experience in mediation, including public sector mediation, and we look forward to working with him and the union to reach an agreement."

Mr. Taylor earned a Bachelor of Arts and a Bachelor of Laws from the University of Alberta, and holds a Ph.D. in political science. A former law professor, his Alternative Dispute Resolution (ADR) practice has taken him across the country. He is a Chartered Mediator and Chartered Arbitrator (ADR Institute of Canada).

The schedule for mediation sessions will be set soon.

The collective agreement between the Government of the NWT and the Union of Northern Workers expired on March 31, 2012. Current terms and conditions of employment will remain in place during mediation.

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High Demand, High Prices for NWT Furs

SEATTLE, WASHINGTON (April 2, 2012) -- Over \$880,000 worth of Genuine Mackenzie Valley Furs (GMVF) were sold at a wild fur sale hosted by Fur Harvester's Auction Inc. on March 22, 2012, bringing total GMVF sales this year to over one million dollars.

Demand for NWT furs increased again this year, particularly from buyers in Russia and China. An NWT marten pelt went for an unprecedented \$380 and a lynx for \$400, the top auction prices for these species against all others from across Canada and the Northern US.

Average prices for all species increased by an average of 50-60% over last year, with beavers leading the way at 110%.

"NWT wild furs continue to be in high demand from buyers around the world, who have proven they will pay top dollar for the high-quality furs that NWT trappers continue to supply," said David Ramsay, Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment. "With these high sales, our trappers and their communities will continue to benefit."

GMVF wild furs will be sold at a Seattle auction again on May 20, and the final sale of the season will take place on June 21 in North Bay, Ontario.

The GMVF program is a GNWT fur marketing service for hunters and trappers in the NWT. All proceeds from fur sold at auction through the GMVF program go directly to the hunter or trapper.

By actively supporting the harvesting and marketing of wild fur through the GMVF program, the GNWT is taking action to diversify the economy and provide all communities and regions with opportunities and choices, key goals of the 17th Legislative Assembly.

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Three Territories to put a Pan-Territorial Focus on Infrastructure Needs

YELLOWKNIFE (April 3, 2012) – Ministers from Nunavut, Yukon, and the Northwest Territories have agreed to support a coordinated approach to working with the Government of Canada and highlighting shared challenges in infrastructure development. Together the territories will advocate for infrastructure programs that address the unique realities of building and maintaining infrastructure in the North.

All provinces and territories are working with Canada and with other jurisdictions in discussing what future infrastructure programs should look like. This partnership between the three Territories is not intended to work outside of that consultation process, but instead is intended to demonstrate the common issues that are faced in the three territories that are not experienced in the provinces.

"Working together to focus on shared priorities with Yukon and Nunavut is important in securing the future of infrastructure across the north," said Northwest Territories Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs, Robert C. McLeod. "Having infrastructure that is well maintained and meets standards is a step towards the Government of the Northwest Territories goal of building sustainable, vibrant, safe communities."

"By using a unified voice all three territories will be able to bring our infrastructure priorities to the forefront when working with our federal counterparts," said Nunavut Minister of Community and Government Services, Lorne Kusugak. "The unique infrastructure needs in the North will be better addressed by all parties working together."

"Predictable and sustainable long-term infrastructure support for our northern territories is essential," said Yukon Minister of Community Services, Elaine Taylor. "We share similar challenges in developing and maintaining community-based infrastructure in the North and will be looking for innovative ways to overcome these through the development of Canada's new long-term infrastructure plan."

The realities of building, repairing, and operating infrastructure in Canada's North are unique and costly. The reality of small remote communities which make up Canada's North is that they are spread over a vast landscape and require complex logistics. The high construction and maintenance costs coupled with the continued economic growth are all factors that reflect some of the on-going pressures facing northern community infrastructure. These parallel challenges continue to be addressed through innovative means of optimizing federal funding dollars. Through partnerships between the territories, it is hoped that future federal infrastructure programs are flexible to meet unique northern needs while building a stronger more sustainable north.

Recent federal infrastructure programs like the Building Canada Plan and the Gas Tax Fund have had significant positive impacts and are prime examples of how the Government of Canada and each territory have been able to work together to meet national program objectives and northern needs. Working together the three territories hope to help shape the permanent Gas Tax Program, which will succeed the current agreement that expires in 2014, and the programs that succeed the Building Canada Plan, scheduled to end in 2016.

Collectively the territories see an opportunity to continue with a funding model that meets the challenges of the North, and through partnerships with the Government of Canada will work to create jobs and boost the economy while making significant investments that will help communities improve their infrastructure.

"Today celebrates the steps taken toward dedicated government services for the NWT francophone community," said the Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment. "As one of our official languages, it is important for the francophone community to have the Secretariat to better serve the needs of the community."

The Secretariat also liaises with the Francophone community on a regular and ongoing basis regarding the provision of French language communications and services and manages Services TNO, the one-stop shop that brings together government services, or information about them, to members of the French community.


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New Long-Term Care Facility in Behchoko

YELLOWKNIFE (April 13, 2012) - The planned construction of a new long-term care facility was announced yesterday at a ground breaking ceremony in Behchoko, Northwest Territories. The new facility will replace the Jimmy Erasmus Seniors home and will provide services to 18 NWT long-term care residents.

"This new 18-bed long-term care facility will increase our system's capacity to offer the necessary supports and services to NWT residents as close to home as possible," said Minister of Health and Social Services, and Minister Responsible for Seniors Tom Beaulieu.

"By building facilities that are long-lasting and energy efficient, the GNWT is making sure that the needs of our residents will be met for years to come" said Minister of Public Works and Services, and Monfwi MLA Jackson Lafferty.

The Department of Public Works and Services awarded a design-build contract on behalf of the Department of Health and Social Services in December 2011. Construction of the new facility will begin in April 2012 and is scheduled for completion in September 2014.

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Backgrounder: Behchoko Long-term Care Facility

The Behchoko Long-term Care Facility will replace the Chief Jimmy Erasmus Centre, which will remain operational during the first phase of the project until the first nine bed wing is complete.

The project was approved in the 2012/13 GNWT Capital Estimates.

The Department of Public Works and Services (PWS) awarded a negotiated designbuild contract to Tli Cho Construction Ltd. in December 2011 for \$11,980,621.

The project will be completed in two phases: construction to begin April 2012, phase one to be completed August 2013, phase two completed in September 2014.

Phase one includes nine beds, living space, adult day program, rehab space and core building services.

Phase two will provide the remaining nine beds and living space.

Once completed, the facility will be 1935 m² in size, and will provide 18 long-term care rooms.

The single storey facility will include an envelope with thermal resistance insulation that meets the GNWTs Good Building Practice for Northern Facility guidelines.


The facility will be designed with barrier free access in mind to accommodate equipment and the mobility needs of residents, this includes wider hallways and accessibility ramps.

Design features include: visitor and staff parking, a lobby designed to accommodate activities and gatherings that will incorporate traditional and cultural aspects of the community, gardens, landscaping and an emphasis on natural light which is featured throughout the facility.

This is a facility to serve all NWT communities.

Admission of residents to the new facility will be determined by the Territorial Admissions Committee (TAC).

Energy efficiency features include low volume flush plumbing fixtures, a system that will recover heat from ventilation exhaust that will reduce building heating costs, and the ability to connect to the community's central biomass system.



Aviation Career Training Opportunities Continue to Expand

YELLOWKNIFE (April 16, 2012) - Residents of the Northwest Territories and Nunavut who are interested in careers in the northern aviation industry will be able to access scholarships and training opportunities under the Aviation Career Development Program (ACDP).

The newest scholarship provider is North-Wright Air. North-Wright joins current aviation partners Discovery Air, Adlair Aviation, and Keewatin Air, with each company providing a \$5,000 scholarship. The governments of Nunavut (four scholarships) and the Northwest Territories (six scholarships) provide the remainder of the 14 available scholarships.

"The skills these young northerners acquire will benefit all Nunavummiut and support our aviation industry," said Peter Taptuna, Minister of Economic Development & Transportation with the Government of Nunavut. "We look forward to having more of our pilots, aircraft mechanics, airport managers, and airline staff coming from this territory."

This was the first year that ACDP scholarships were awarded to residents of Nunavut. Recipients of the scholarship in 2011-2012 were Raven Beardy and Clayton Tartak from Rankin Inlet and Brent Crooks, Junior of Igaluit.

NWT Transportation Minister David Ramsay praised the commitment of ACDP's airline partners to the training of tomorrow's northern aviation employees. "Flying and maintaining aircraft and the management of airline and airport operations are essential to the sustainability of northern communities," he said. "The contributions from our airline partners demonstrate a strong commitment to northern economic development and our northern way of life."

NWT scholarship recipients for 2011-2012 are Brandon Drost from Fort McPherson, Joseph Villeneuve from Inuvik, Larisa Doyle from Fort Smith, and Adam Ahenakew, Adam Jensen, Bryce Styan, Kyla Zenko, Jennifer Waugh, and Josh Lippert from Yellowknife.

The intake for applications for a \$5,000 ACDP scholarship begins on June 1 of each year and closes on the last Friday of July.

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Building for the Future – Northern Solutions for Northern Housing and New Public Housing Rent Scale

Yellowknife (April 16, 2012) - The Honourable Robert C. McLeod, Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation (NWTHC) today announced the release of *Building for the Future - Northern Solutions for Northern Housing*, the NWTHC's new strategic framework for housing delivery in the Northwest Territories. This strategic framework is the result of the recently completed Shelter Policy Review carried out by the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT.) The Review was led by the NWTHC and the Department of the Executive and involved an extensive examination of housing need across the NWT.

"The NWTHC is pleased to share this long-term strategic framework that will guide the way forward in delivering housing programs and services to residents in need across the NWT," said Minister McLeod. "We look forward to implementing the actions outlined in the strategic plan, with some of the actions described in *Building for the Future - Northern Solutions for Northern Housing* being implemented during this fiscal year."

The strategic framework builds on the success of existing housing programs and services, incorporates changes where they are needed, and proposes new programming and services where gaps were identified in meeting the housing needs of NWT residents across the spectrum, from homelessness to homeownership. The feedback and input by NWT residents was very important to the review process and impacted the strategic direction that is outlined in the strategic framework.

Many common themes came out of the Shelter Policy Review process, one of the most critical was the call for a revised Public Housing Program rent scale. The NWTHC is also introducing a new public housing rent scale that will be implemented on July 1, 2012. The new rent scale is based on making rents simpler and more predictable, with increased fairness. The rent scale is designed to support self-reliance and strengthen the Public Housing Program.

The new rent scale will apply to approximately 2,400 public housing units currently operated by the NWTHC. "The change in the public housing rent scale is significant and I believe it addresses the concerns that residents have expressed for many years, including that the previous approach to calculating rent contributed to dependency and led to a disincentive to work," said Minister McLeod. The new public housing rent scale is described in the attached overview.

The change to the public housing rent scale is one element of the strategic priorities outlined in *Building* for the Future - Northern Solutions for Northern Housing. The priority areas include the following.

- Strengthening Public Housing
- Improving Homeownership Supports

- Increasing Housing Options in Non-Market Communities
- Improving Housing Services
- Strengthening the Approach to Homelessness and Transition Housing
- Addressing Housing Challenges for the Working Poor
- Developing Infrastructure Solutions Based on Individual and Community Needs
- Addressing Declining Federal Funding

"We recognize that a one-size fits all approach does not always address the individual needs of residents and their communities and the priorities outlined in the NWTHC's new strategic framework strengthens self-reliance and support for NWT residents to meet their varied housing needs," said Minister McLeod. "The actions set out in this strategic plan forms the foundation on which we can continue to build and strengthen the delivery of housing programs, services and supports to those in need, not only under this 17th Legislative Assembly, but also over the long-term."

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OVERVIEW OF NEW PUBLIC HOUSING RENT SCALES

- On July 1, 2012 the NWT Housing Corporation will implement new rent scales for public housing in the Northwest Territories.
- Rent will be based on the total monthly income of all residents of the household. All households will pay rent based on the following table.

- The zone where each community is included is based on their market conditions and Statistics Canada's Living Cost Differentials.
- All sources of income will be included in determining monthly rent. Seniors will receive a \$1,000 exemption in determining their monthly income.
- Tenants will also be responsible for paying 9 cent per kwh for their electricity use.





Key Questions and Answers Related to Building for the Future

What are the goals of the NWT Housing Corporation's Building for the Future strategic framework?

The goals of this strategic framework are:

- · strengthening Public Housing,
- improving homeownership supports,
- · increasing housing options in non-market communities,
- improving housing services,
- · strengthening the approach to homelessness and transition housing,
- · addressing housing challenges for the working poor,
- developing infrastructure solutions based on individual and community needs, and
- addressing the declining federal funding.

The NWT Housing Corporation's approach will be to build on the successes and progress over the last several years; to strengthen self-reliance and support for residents to meet their own shelter needs; and to recognize the difference between market and non-market communities in designing Northern solutions.

How does the NWT Housing Corporation plan to strengthen Public Housing?

The NWT Housing Corporation will be implementing a new rent scale that makes public housing rents simpler and more predictable, with increased fairness. It will also help address disincentives to work.


Rent will be based on gross income of all household residents. We will also introduce new minimum and maximum rents which will mean that every tenant will pay between 4.2% and 19.5% of their gross income, much lower than the national standard of 30% of income before affordability problems. Rent will also be assessed less frequently which will minimalize drastic changes in rents and will support self-reliance.

Additionally, we will plan to address adequacy and quality issues with public housing and continue modernization of our public housing stock. The NWT Housing Corporation will target incremental investment in major retrofits and replacement of older public housing units. There will be an emphasis on the development of multi-family units along with targeting the needs of elders and single people.

What do you mean by "disincentives to work"?

The NWT has heard a common concern that the current rent scale discourages some public housing tenants from working because it is perceived that any increase in employment income is offset by high increases in rent. This new rent scale will help decrease the disincentive to work and help tenants become more self-reliant.

How will homeownership supports be improved?

The NWT Housing Corporation will be making changes to homeownership programs to provide homeownership supports in a manner that supports community sustainability, expands the pool of potential clients, while ensuring support focuses on those with good chance of success as homeowners.

We will be also be expanding the availability and targeting of repair programs to help homeowners address the high rate of adequacy problems in homes. That is, the need for repairs to their homes. The approach that we are taking with this programming will reflect the capacity, cost of living and other factors that apply to each community and support homeowners in fulfilling their responsibility to maintain their homes,

What do you plan to do to increase housing options in non-market communities?

The NWT Housing Corporation plans to expand the availability of housing options in non-market and emerging market communities. Development of additional multi-family rental properties in these communities will be a priority. The focus will on communities with high demand for housing for teachers, nurses and other GNWT staff, although units will also be available for rent by any resident including staff of the federal, community or Aboriginal governments. There may be opportunity for the NWT Housing Corporation to partner with developers in this regard or for the NWT Housing Corporation may develop and operate these units as part of its market housing portfolio.

What is the NWT Housing Corporation's plan to improve housing services?

A key result of the Shelter Policy Review engagement process was a strong view among NWT residents that there is a need to improve overall awareness, skills, and opportunities for residents to support their own shelter needs. The NWT Housing Corporation plans to expand its existing programming to improve access to broader based education and advice on home maintenance and repairs and on budgeting and other shelter issues. The Corporation will also improve communication activities to increase awareness among residents of the role and programs of the NWT Housing Corporation.

Options will be examined for making materials and housing supplies available to residents in non-market communities. Additionally, the NWT Housing Corporation will be developing options related to providing housing assessments for homeowners in non-market communities to support better involvement of residents in the shelter needs. The NWT Housing Corporation is developing a pilot program to provide opportunities for residents to reduce arrears while supporting community or other shelter needs.

Additionally, the NWT Housing Corporation will be examining how it organizes the delivery of housing programs and services in communities to ensure delivery is arranged in a way that supports residents in meeting their housing needs.

How will you strengthen the approach to homelessness and transition housing?

The NWT Housing Corporation will ensure there is coherence and balance in the GNWT approach to homelessness and support for transition housing. The goal is to achieve a more integrated case

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management approach across departments dealing with homelessness, and ensure consistency in the approach to transition housing and improve coordination within the GNWT for agencies that provide services on behalf of multiple departments. As part of the effort, the NWT Housing Corporation will develop approaches for a more balanced approach to homelessness services and transition housing in communities outside of Yellowknife, and make investments to strengthen supports for critical services associated with homelessness.

How does the NWT Housing Corporation plan to address housing challenges for the working poor?

There is a significant program delivery gap in the housing continuum related to affordability challenges for lower income households in market rentals. Overall, some 548 households in core need are households with less than \$60,000 annual income living in market rental units (20% of all core need). The NWT Housing Corporation is looking at introducing programming that would provide support to these households. For instance, it would provide considerable support for young people starting out, lone parent families and recent migrants to a community.

How will you develop infrastructure solutions based on individual and community needs?


The NWT Housing Corporation's emphasis will be to ensure a Northern approach to home design, while still controlling costs. Providing homeowners with more input into their dwelling design and incorporating design elements to support seniors aging in place and persons with disabilities will also be included in the development of infrastructure solutions to meet the needs of individuals and communities.

The NWT Housing Corporation is also working to support approaches that allow development of housing infrastructure to provide training and education opportunities. It is important to recognize the role of housing infrastructure in supporting economic development and business opportunities. Additionally, the NWT Housing Corporation is working to support actions that ensure there is an adequate supply of lands to support housing infrastructure.

What will the NWT Housing Corporation's approach to addressing the declining federal funding?

The NWT Housing Corporation will be developing approaches to provide for an adequate and stable level of funding for the delivery of the Public Housing Program. Additionally, the NWT Housing Corporation will work with the federal government and other provinces and territories to develop a sustainable approach to funding social housing. Investments will be required to offset the reduced funding in the short-term.

The NWT Housing Corporation is also looking at other initiatives including reducing public housing stock in market communities, reducing operating costs through multifamily construction and energy efficient upgrades. As well, the NWT Housing Corporation is taking steps to increase revenues, including from other sources like the market rental program.






What will the next steps be for NWT Housing Corporation with Building for the Future?

The NWT Housing Corporation is currently are working on detailed implementation plans and schedule for activities to be undertaken during 2012-13.

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Key Questions and Answers Related to the Changes in the Public Housing Rent Scales

Why Changes Are Being Made to the Rent Scales for Public Housing?

- During engagement on the Shelter Policy Review, we repeatedly heard that people wanted us to change the rent scales to be simpler, more predictable, and fairer. They also wanted us to address the disincentive to work that many felt was a result of our old approach to rent.
- The new approach reflects what we heard from residents and addresses concerns that were raised. Tenants will clearly know the rent that they will be charged at different income levels.
- With the introduction on a new minimum and maximum rent, rent staying the same within income ranges, and a more gradual increase in rent as income increases many of the components that contributed to the disincentive to work have been eliminated.

What Are Some Of The Impacts On Tenants Of The New Rent Scales?

- With the new rent scales, some households will see rent increases and some will see declines in rent.
- Overall there are about 2,400 public housing units. Based on the past year, we expect that 675 households will see their rent decline by more than \$100 per month. Some 262 households will see rent increases of \$100 or more.
- We plan to introduce the new rent scales on July 1, 2012. This gives us time to communicate with our tenants so they are aware of the changes that are coming. We will use a variety of approaches to get this information widely disseminated so no one is caught by surprise when the new rent scales are introduced.


Are There Other Changes That Will Impact Public Housing Tenants?

- The other change that is being made is to increase the overall responsibility that public housing clients have for electricity for their units.
- Currently tenants pay 6 cents/kwh for electricity and the NWT Housing Corporation pays the rest.
 Many residents felt this high level of subsidy provide little incentive for tenants to conserve energy.
- On July 1, 2012 the portion of electricity costs that the tenants will be responsible for will increase to 9 cents/kwh.

What Are Some Of The Overall Benefits Of The New Rent Scales?

For tenants there will be a number of benefits:

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- o increased certainty for their rent when planning their family's budget,
- the ability to earn additional income without necessarily having a rental increase,
- the 675 household where rent will decline by more than \$100 per month will have a significant improvement in cost of living and the sustainability of our territorial communities, and
- the introduction of a new minimum rent will mean that every tenant will pay between 4.2% and 19.5% of their income in rent. This is much lower than the national standard of 30% of income before affordability problems.
- For the NWT Housing Corporation the benefits are a simpler rental system with increased fairness
 and transparency. Average operating costs for public housing units are approximately \$1,400 per
 month. For tenants paying minimum rent the subsidy will be about \$16,000 per year, while those at
 maximum rent will be on average receiving no subsidy on the operating costs.

• For the GNWT:

- the new approach to the rent scales means a fairer and more transparent system for subsidizing housing through the public housing program,
- setting rents at a broader zone rather than community by community approach represents a significant effort to address cost of living in communities with very high cost of living,
- the rent reduction of more than \$100 per month for about 675 modest income households is a significant contribution to the overall anti-poverty efforts of government and increases the sustainability of living in many of our smaller and remote communities, and
- o by addressing issues related to the disincentive to work a significant barrier to employment for many living in smaller NWT communities has been removed.

Are There Households Where Rents Will Increase?

- There are households where rent will increase, with about 262 households expected to have a rental increase of more than \$100 per month.
- The introduction of a new minimum rent of about \$70-\$80 per month is an increase from the current minimum rent of \$32 per month or \$0 rent in the case of Seniors that reside in public housing units without other adults.

Does This Mean Seniors Will Now Pay Rent?

- The new rent scales set rent based on household income. For all households with income under \$20,000 per year, rent will be \$70-\$80 per month depending on the community.
- Many public housing units where Seniors reside are in this income category and will pay \$70-\$80 per month in rent. Some Seniors, however, have much higher incomes and can afford to pay higher rents.
- Based on our information on public housing, 90% of units where one or more Seniors live alone (without younger adults) will pay the minimum rent.

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
- During discussions with Northerners as part of the Shelter Policy Review, the issue of fairness in the rent scale and Seniors paying \$0 rent was often raised. Many also spoke of fairness and ensuring that housing is affordable for all residents.
- We have offset the impact of this change by providing a \$1,000 per month income exemption for Seniors. This will have the impact of lowering rent for households with Seniors and ensuring that many public housing units with Seniors as tenants will pay the minimum rent.
- It shouldn't be forgotten that for a household paying the minimum rent, the government will be subsidizing the cost of their shelter by an average of about \$16,000 per year and this value is higher in remote communities where operating costs are higher.

When Will The Changes To The Public Housing Rents Come Into Effect?

- The new rent scales will come into effect July 1, 2012.
- Significant communication activities are planned over the next several months. A variety of approaches will be used to ensure tenants are aware of the changes in the rent scales and the impact on their households.

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GNWT and **UNW** Reach Tentative Agreement

YELLOWKNIFE (April 16, 2012) – The Union of Northern Workers (UNW) and the Government of the Northwest Territories have reached a tentative agreement for a new four-year collective agreement.

If ratified, the new collective agreement will be effective April 1, 2012 and will apply to the almost 4,000 UNW members employed by the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) across the Northwest Territories, as well as employees with the Workers' Safety and Compensation Commission in the NWT and Nunavut.

"I'm happy that both teams showed such strong commitment to find solutions to the complexity of the issues. I look forward to the opportunity to rebuild our working relationship," says Todd Parsons, UNW President.

"We are very pleased that an agreement has been reached," says Sheila Bassi-Kellett, Deputy Minister of Human Resources. "The UNW and the GNWT have collaborated to address the interests of both parties, despite the challenges of the current fiscal environment."

Both parties will be sending the tentative agreement for ratification.

Assembly of First Nations National Chief Shawn Atleo Supports Aboriginal Student Achievement Education Partnership Declaration

YELLOWKNIFE, NT (April 18, 2012) – The Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE), received support from the Assembly of First Nations (AFN) National Chief Shawn A-in-chut Atleo for the Aboriginal Student Achievement (ASA) Education Plan.

"Creating and supporting partnerships is the key to building stronger minds and a stronger north," says Minister Lafferty. "After the historic signing of the Declaration in July 2011 by all of the education and Aboriginal leaders in the Northwest Territories, we are delighted that National Chief Atleo supports this important initiative and is willing to become a signatory on the Declaration."

Since 2009, when the Department of Education, Culture and Employment began to develop the ASA initiative with its partners, there have been numerous forums held in various communities for community leaders, residents, and youth across the NWT. Feedback received at the forums confirmed the need to focus on critical priority areas: early childhood development and child care, student and family support, Aboriginal language and culture curriculum and resource development and literacy.

"To date, we have implemented a number of activities outlined in the ASA plan," said Minister Lafferty. "We are supporting literacy development in partnership with our education authorities; we have implemented the Early Development Instrument and revised the kindergarten curriculum; we continue our work with languages and culture, with one of our recent successes being the launch of the Dene digital languages apps; we have programs and training in place for learners of all ages; and we continue to engage students in the importance of staying in school, and parents with the importance of being involved in their children's education. These are but a few of our activities designed to increase awareness, opportunity, and build foundations for Northerners to lead healthy productive lives. With National Chief Atleo's endorsement of our Aboriginal Student Achievement Education Plan, our goals are closer to being realized."

"I would like to thank the Dene Leadership, the school boards and Minister Lafferty and the Government of Northwest Territories for all the good work done in building a foundation to not only reform but fundamentally transform education for First Nation, Métis and Inuit Peoples," said Assembly of First Nations National Chief Shawn A-inchut Atleo. "We must act today across the country so that our children have the same educational opportunities as other children while respecting the importance of our languages and cultures. We have demonstrated the success that can be achieved, if fully supported and enabled, right across this country. A new generation of young leaders is emerging and this is a new dawn of tremendous hope and opportunity for all of our people and for all of Canada."

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NWT's Sexually Transmitted Infection (STI) Rates Decrease

YELLOWKNIFE (April 18, 2012) Finally, the NWT is seeing a reduction in STIs. The NWT has seen a drop in the number of cases for Gonorrhea. Gonorrhea (also known as "The Clap") is a common STI that can be cured with antibiotics. However, if not treated early, it can seriously affect your health and may cause sterility.

The Report on Sexually Transmitted Infections in Canada: 2009 found Gonorrhea rates in the NWT drop by 20.1% from 2008 to 2009.

"This is an important milestone for us. For the first time ever, the NWT is seeing a drop in sexually transmitted infection rates," said Minister of Health and Social Services Tom Beaulieu. "It is through the good work of many people – public health officials, community governments, non-government organizations and our residents – that we have seen a downward trend. However, sexually transmitted infections continue to be a serious and ongoing health problem. We will continue to work with our partners and residents to bring these rates down even more."

Tackling STI rates in the NWT must be done using several approaches. This is especially true when targeting youth and young adults as they have the highest rates. Some of the approaches used by the Department of Health and Social Services are having health officials visit the communities and schools to raise awareness of STIs using tools like the youth sexual health website *respectyourself.ca* and the *Kiss Me Deadly* comic book. It is also through the work of partners like the Community Action Research Team (who raised STI awareness by doing door-to-door campaigns) in the Tlicho, nurses on the frontline who did 100% follow-up for individuals who tested positive, and community residents who took the initiative to get tested that the NWT has begun to see a decrease in rates.

"Raising awareness of STIs using several different approaches is working," said Acting Chief Public Health Officer Dr. Kami Kandola. "We have seen a drop in not only Gonorrhea, but also Chlamydia, which is the most commonly reported STI in Canada. We have found that the rates for Chlamydia dropped by 5.9% and Gonorrhoea dropped by 52.7% from 2008 to 2011. We will continue our efforts as we are making a difference."



In his time as Deputy Minister, Mr. Daniels has been responsible for overseeing the ongoing implementation of reforms to income security programs designed to help NWT residents achieve greater self-reliance, implemented initiatives to improve Frenchlanguage services, including Services TNO and the recently-opened Francophone Affairs Secretariat, led the development of the Aboriginal Languages Plan to help strengthen Aboriginal languages, and led the development of the Aboriginal Student Achievement Initiative intended to help close the education gap between Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal students.

"I would like to thank Mr. Daniels for his years of dedicated service to the people of the Northwest Territories," said Premier Bob McLeod. "His leadership and commitment have been instrumental to the success of Education, Culture and Employment, ensuring that NWT residents have access to educational opportunities and the supports they need to make productive choices and that our arts and culture continue to flourish."



GNWT Marks the 20th Anniversary of the Gwich'in Land Claim

YELLOWKNIFE (April 20, 2012) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) joins with the Gwich'in and all the people of the Northwest Territories to mark the 20th anniversary of the signing of the *Gwich'in Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement*. Premier McLeod offered his congratulations to the Gwich'in Tribal Council at Dene Leadership Meetings in Inuvik earlier this week.

The *Gwich'in Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement* was signed by the Government of Canada, the Government of the Northwest Territories and the Gwich'in Tribal Council on April 22, 1992. The Agreement was established to recognize and encourage the Gwich'in way of life and enhance their ability to participate fully in all aspects of the economy. The Agreement provides the Gwich'in with defined rights and a voice in decision making related to land, water, and wildlife harvesting and management within the Gwich'in Settlement Area.

"The *Gwich'in Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement* was one more step to self-sufficiency and gave the Gwich'in greater ability to control their future," said Premier Bob McLeod. "Building a strong, prosperous and sustainable territory is a priority for the Government of the Northwest Territories. We remain committed to working closely with the Gwich'in and all Aboriginal governments to realize this vision on behalf of all our residents."

Minister Robert C. McLeod will represent the Government of the Northwest Territories at 20th anniversary celebrations being held in Inuvik.

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Sharing Our Culture – Aboriginal Tourism Forum 2012



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Report to the Hay River Town Council

YELLOWKNIFE (April 25, 2012) - On April 23, 2012, representatives from the Department of Municipal and Community Affairs presented Hay River Town Council with a report detailing the results of the investigation into the concerns raised by former mayor Kelly Schofield about the town's operation. While the report points to a number of issues regarding the town's operation, there was no evidence that there has been any misappropriation or other wrongdoing.

"After our investigation, we have concluded that there was no criminal wrongdoing by the council or administration of the Town of Hay River," said Robert C. McLeod, Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs. "MACA has worked directly with the town and has provided 18 recommendations. The department will continue to support the town in the implementation of these recommendations if requested."

"I am quite satisfied with the report. It puts to bed the idea that there were wrongdoings occurring at Town Hall," said Hay River Mayor Ken Latour. "The findings and recommendations would be typical for many municipalities. The report does not say things are broken, it says there is room for improvement, and we are aware of that. Since this investigation was initiated two months ago, we have already made many improvements, and Council, administration and I will continue on this path. We appreciate the recommendations from MACA as well as their commitment to assisting us in implementing them."

On February 27, 2012, Mayor Kelly Schofield resigned his position on the town council. In his resignation letter, he stated four reasons: 1) misappropriation of municipal expenditures, 2) incomplete council-directed tasks, 3) breach of confidentiality within council, and 4) lack of support by majority of council. While the last three issues are internal to the operation of the town and its council, the first was a serious allegation. Mr. Schofield then asked the Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs to review the conduct of the town's council and administration.

The Minister responded by assigning MACA staff to investigate. MACA staff conducted two on-site visits and interviewed a number of people involved in the town's operation, including town staff, the former mayor, the acting mayor and the town's auditors. The following conclusions were reached:

At no point in the investigation did the team find any evidence that the SAO had done anything that was criminal or dishonest so that he would personally benefit from the resources of the Town. Given the team's understanding of what has transpired over the past 18 months, the allegation that there has been "misappropriation" is not founded.

What the team heard was that there was poor communication, inadequate consultation, weak inter-personal skills and lack of procedure followed. In response to this there was a general willingness from staff and Council to move forward to accept responsibility for past errors, and to seek more positive relationships.

There are eighteen recommendations in the report, focusing on addressing some of the operational issues that were discovered. The recommendations are operational in nature and range from supporting the development of the administration and council through training and professional development to updating bylaws and policies to better reflect the current circumstances of the town. In particular, bylaws related to council procedures and procurement processes could be updated.

MACA staff were pleased by the level of cooperation they received and by the efforts they saw to improve the relationships within the administration and between the administration and the council. The department will be available to assist the town in implementing recommendations if requested.

Summary Report

Investigation into concerns of former Hay River mayor

The Department of Municipal and Community Affairs (MACA) recognizes and respects the authority and autonomy of community governments. In rare cases where a municipal government is suspected of not providing responsible and responsive government to its citizens, MACA has a duty to investigate, take any necessary remedial actions and make recommendations for improvement.

Situation

On February 27, 2012, the mayor of the Town of Hay River, Kelly J. Schofield, delivered a letter of resignation to his council. On February 28, 2012, the Minister of MACA, Robert C. McLeod, received correspondence from the former mayor, together with a copy of his letter of resignation. In his letter to the Minister, the former mayor made the following request:

As outgoing Mayor, I respectfully request the support of your department for three things.

- 1) A comprehensive review of events of the past year that have undermined the operations of our Council and Mayor.
- Until such time as an independent review has taken place a moratorium on any major decisions regarding operations or capital expenditures.
- Your department's support in helping the Town assess options and directions to move forward regarding such things as the time of an election etc

MACA's Response

MACA determined an investigation was warranted due to the serious implications made by the former mayor in his letter of resignation. Of particular concern was his statement regarding "misappropriation of municipal expenditures".

By definition, misappropriation is:

Generally, the use of funds or property for a wrongful purpose. The term is commonly used in relation to persons who, while acting in a fiduciary capacity –e.g. as a banker, trustee, director of a corporation, etc.- misapply funds intended for another purpose or who convert another's funds for their own benefit." Canadian Law Dictionary

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i) a dishonest use of something as one's own.
 ii) any act of putting something to a wrong use.
 The Gage Canadian DictionaryⁱⁱI

In response to these concerns, a team of MACA representatives completed a number of on-site visits and interviewed members of the town council and administration.

Outcome of Investigation

From the interviews, the team determined that there was no misappropriation of municipal funds by the SAO. None of the people interviewed made any allegations that the SAO personally benefited from any of the procurement decisions that were made.

In light of the lack of criminal wrongdoing, there were no grounds to impose a moratorium on major decisions. There is no authority under the *Cities, Towns and Villages Act*ⁱⁱⁱ to impose this restriction without also placing the town under the control of a supervisor or administrator. Unless there is evidence of chronic mismanagement by the Senior Administrative Officer, the council, or both, these matters are left to the council.

Over the course of the investigation a number of concerns were raised. In response to these issues, the department has provided the town with recommendations ranging from encouraging professional development and training to improving communication and transparency.

MACA has also offered to continue to assist the Town of Hay River in implementing these recommendations and will continue to support the development of sustainable, capable, and accountable community governments across the territory.

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PRESS RELEASE: MINISTERS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE STATUS OF WOMEN REAFFIRM THEIR COMMITMENT TO ADDRESS PRIORITY ISSUES FOR WOMEN: ECONOMIC SECURITY, LEADERSHIP, AND ENDING VIOLENCE

HALIFAX - Federal-Provincial-Territorial (FPT) Ministers Responsible for the Status of Women gathered in Halifax on May 2 and 3, 2012. The annual meeting was co-chaired by the Honourable Rona Ambrose, Canada's Minister of Public Works and Government Services and Minister for Status of Women, and the Honourable Marilyn More, Minister responsible for the Nova Scotia Advisory Council on the Status of Women,

The meeting provided a valuable opportunity for Ministers to exchange insights and discuss developments in the priority areas of improving women's economic security, promoting women's leadership and ending violence against women, each with an ongoing focus on Aboriginal women.

FPT Ministers explored new avenues for advancing women's economic security. In their discussions on emerging issues and best practices, Ministers benefited from the expertise of non-governmental organizations working to promote girls and women in leadership roles and non-traditional occupations in science, engineering and the trades. They also learned about specific initiatives aimed at increasing Aboriginal women's and girls' participation in leadership and decision making.

FPT Ministers reaffirmed their commitment to ending violence against women and girls and the importance of engaging all Canadians on this issue. After hearing from leaders in this field, Ministers discussed the most effective ways to reach out to and work meaningfully with men and boys toward this end. They agreed that men and boys must be active participants and allies in solving this enduring problem.

The Ministers look forward to the release, proposed for 2013, of their jointly produced Measuring Violence Against Women: Statistical Trends. Last issued in 2006, the Statistics Canada publication presents national data on the major indicators of violence against women, including up-to-date details on the nature and extent of violence against women.

In recognition of the forum's 30^{th} anniversary and its valuable work to advance equality for women over the intervening years, FPT Ministers issued the Halifax Declaration (attached). While acknowledging past efforts, the forward-looking document emphasizes current priorities and plans for the future.

Prince Edward Island will host the next meeting in 2013.

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DECLARATION: BY THE MINISTERS RESPONSIBLE FOR THE STATUS OF WOMEN ON THE OCCASION OF THEIR 30TH ANNUAL MEETING IN HALIFAX

Preamble

We, the Ministers Responsible for the Status of Women, recognize that women and men are equally integral to Canada's prosperity and success in the world.

We are proud to have been able to work as a federal-provincial-territorial forum dedicated to the status of women, addressing issues of importance to Canadian women since we began meeting in 1981. Over that time, we have examined key concerns in the areas of women's health, women's economic security, Aboriginal women's issues and violence against women.

We have helped to advance equality for women in a number of concrete ways by:

- · working with other federal-provincial-territorial bodies on issues of mutual concern in the areas of health, labour and justice;
- releasing statistical reports on violence against women that are used by governments, non-governmental women's organizations, academics, and others involved in the policy process to address this serious issue and gui de future progress;
- · developing material to support the economic advancement of women, including resources to help employers create workplaces that attract, retain and promote women; and
- · hosting policy forums to support women's employment in sciences, engineering, trades and technology, and to explore solutions to end violence against Aboriginal women.

We are pleased to have witnessed significant advancements in the status of women in recent decades However, we recognize that inequalities persist and that further efforts are needed to empower women and girls, particularly the most vulnerable in our communities.

On the first International Day of the Girl on October 11, 2012, we will celebrate girls as powerful agents of change, and we will focus on ways to ensure they reach their full potential. We invite all Canadians to join us in celebrating this new annual event.

We are committed to examining concerns of particular importance to girls in our future efforts and actions.

We have made great strides in advancing gender analysis within our governments, and in ensuring the unique needs and experiences of diverse groups of Canadian women and girls are reflected in public policies and programs. We will continue to promote these practices within our governments. We encourage the use of gender and diversity analysis throughout civil society.



Ministerial Mandate Letters

YELLOWKNIFE (May 14, 2012) – Premier Bob McLeod has provided all Cabinet ministers with mandate letters outlining their key strategic objectives and priorities for the 17th Assembly. These letters have been posted to the GNWT website at http://www.premier.gov.nt.ca/cabinet/.

"Our government is committed to transparency and accountability," said Premier McLeod. "As a public government, we serve all the people of the Northwest Territories and are responsible for making sure that NWT residents are aware of the activities, initiatives and decisions their government undertakes on their behalf. These mandates will provide our residents with an important tool for understanding and evaluating our actions as a government."

The mandates follow the priorities of the 17th Legislative Assembly, developed by all Members immediately after the October 2011 election. Cabinet members are accountable to the rest of Cabinet and to the Legislative Assembly for the activities of their assigned departments and agencies. Decisions must uphold the public good by balancing the interests of all Northwest Territories residents.

Some of the specific mandates assigned to Ministers include:

- Negotiate a Devolution Final Agreement and develop an implementation plan for responsible management of public lands and resources in the NWT.
- Develop and coordinate the implementation of a government-wide Aboriginal engagement strategy based on the principles of respect, recognition, and responsibility.
- Reform governance of the health and social services system, and improve measurement and accountability within the system.
- Undertake consultation in support of passing a new Wildlife Act.

- Develop and implement a sustainable Mineral Strategy and Economic Development Strategy for the NWT that targets all regions and all sectors of our economy.
- Work with communities to develop a comprehensive, territory-wide Community Safety Strategy.
- Build capacity of community governments to meet their administrative and management responsibilities.
- Develop and implement a comprehensive Early Childhood Development Framework.

Work on the mandates outlined in the letters has already begun. Mandates will be reviewed regularly and updated when necessary. The government will publish a results report outlining progress on the mandates each year.

Portfolio Mandates

Specific mandates for the Finance and Environment and Natural Resources portfolios are attached. These mandates may be amended from time to time, as circumstances require. You have also been named Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Power Corporation, Chairman of the Financial Management Board, and Government House Leader and will be called upon to respond to issues relating to these mandates.

In addition to the portfolios listed above, you will also serve as Chair of the Refousing Government Committee-of-Cabinet mandated to propose, track and evaluate efforts to improve operations, reduce red tape, and effectively manage resources.

Our Caucus colleagues have placed their trust in us to lead the Government of the 17th Legislative Assembly. As a Cabinet, it is critical that we act with honesty, integrity and impartiality and uphold the highest ethical standards in carrying out the responsibilities that have been entrusted to us. To this end, I expect that you will always conduct yourself in a manner that will bear the closest possible scrutiny.

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Partnering with the Government of Canada is critical where we share common priorities and it will be our collective responsibility to advance the government's federal engagement strategy. Through honest dialogue, and by working together, we will move forward to resolve the challenges we collectively face.

As a Minister, you are required to fulfill many roles. You are responsible and accountable to the Cabinet and the Legislative Assembly for your assigned departments and agencies. To this end, you will need to work closely with your respective Deputy Ministers. Your Deputy Ministers are responsible for providing you with expert advice and support, and are accountable for the management and operations of their department.

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I look forward to working with you, our Cabinet colleagues and all members of the Legislative Assembly to do our very best for the people of the Northwest Territories.

- Work with planning boards, federal government, GNWT departments and the public to finalize land use plans within the Dehcho and Sahtu Regions and to provide direction and approval in the 5 year review of the Gwich'in Land Use Plan.
- Take action on Climate Change by implementing actions outlined in the Greenhouse Gas Strategy and advancing community-based alternative energy initiatives.
- Implement the Barren Ground Caribou Management Strategy and recommendations from the Forest Fire Management Program Review with available resources.

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Aboriginal Participation in Devolution Grows: Sahtu Re-engage in Negotiations

YELLOWNIFE (May 22, 2012) – The Sahtu Secretariat Incorporated (SSI) has rejoined NWT devolution negotiations.

"The Sahtu Dene and Métis have been important participants throughout the devolution negotiations process since 2001, and we are pleased that SSI has joined us again to help shape the final agreement," said Premier McLeod. "We welcome all NWT regional Aboriginal governments to participate at the negotiations table and ensure the voices and priorities of their people are reflected in this historic agreement. While devolution does not affect Aboriginal and treaty rights, Aboriginal governments should take the opportunity to work together and help ensure the best possible devolution agreement for everyone in the NWT."

"The Government of Canada is pleased to see the Sahtu seize this opportunity to help shape the future of the territory and share in the benefits that will flow from devolution," said the Honourable John Duncan, Minister of Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada. "The Government of Canada's Northern Strategy envisions putting greater decision making in the hands of the people of the Northwest Territories. Working together through devolution, land claim and self-government negotiations and other initiatives, we will achieve remarkable progress towards this objective."

"We are pleased that the Sahtu have rejoined the negotiations and we look forward to working with them as we move forward," said Nellie Cournoyea, Chair and CEO of Inuvialuit Regional Corporation (IRC). "The participation of the Sahtu will bring additional depth and strength to the Aboriginal voice in these important negotiations, and will contribute to a more productive relationship with the GNWT and the development of a devolution agreement that will work for all regions of the NWT."

"We welcome our northern cousins to the devolution family with open arms," said Betty Villebrun President of the NWT Métis Nation (NWTMN). "Together, we can bring northern decision making on land and resources to the North, where it rightfully belongs.

Our future is in our hands and will be determined by our ability to move forward together, working cooperatively towards a final agreement from which all NWT residents will benefit."

"I am very pleased to see the Sahtu taking this step today," said Norman Yakeleya, MLA Sahtu. "It is important for the Sahtu to be at the table to have their views represented. It's always better to negotiate your own fate than to have others do it for you. The Sahtu are now owning up to 100 percent of our responsibility to determine our destiny."

NWT lands and resources devolution will transfer administrative authority and control over public lands, resources and rights in respect of water in the Northwest Territories from the Government of Canada to the GNWT. After devolution, the GNWT will be responsible for the management of public lands and natural resources in the NWT, including the delivery of related public programs, and will have the right to keep a share of the resource development royalties collected on NWT public lands. The GNWT will share up to 25% of its royalties with NWT Aboriginal governments – a sharing unprecedented in Canada. The Government of Canada, GNWT, IRC, NWTMN and SSI are currently in the final stage of devolution negotiations. Negotiations are expected to conclude in 2012.

Backgrounder: NWT Lands and Resources Devolution

The transfer or 'devolution' of federal powers to the provinces and territories has happened many times in the history of Canada and the Northwest Territories (NWT). Since 1967, the NWT has received provincial-type authority over health care, education, social services, highways, airport administration and forestry management in a number of separate transfers.

NWT lands and resources devolution will transfer administrative authority and control over public lands, resources and waters in the NWT from the Government of Canada to the GNWT. This will include authority to decide how Crown (public) lands and natural resources in the NWT are used and managed, including final approval for resource development projects. These powers currently rest with the federal Minister of Aboriginal Affairs and Northern Development Canada (AANDC).

After devolution, the GNWT will be responsible for the design and delivery of public programs related to land and resource management in the NWT, and will see its annual transfer payments from the Government of Canada increased to reflect the cost of providing services related to these new responsibilities. The GNWT will also have the right to collect and keep a share of the royalties from resource development on NWT Crown lands, which currently go directly to the federal government. This percentage is comparable to the arrangements provinces have under Equalization.

The GNWT has committed to sharing its royalties with NWT Aboriginal governments to help build their capacity: a revenue-sharing arrangement that is unprecedented in Canada. In addition to royalties, Aboriginal groups will benefit from a range of subjects being negotiated under the AiP, including a post-devolution bilateral agreement with the GNWT to coordinate and cooperate in the management of lands and natural resources.

The latest efforts to achieve a devolution agreement date back to the first meeting of the NWT Intergovernmental Forum in May 2000, when Aboriginal, territorial and federal government leaders identified lands and resources devolution as a priority. All agreed that transferring control of natural resources would promote the self-sufficiency and prosperity of the NWT by providing important economic development capacity to NWT governments and reducing their reliance on federal funding.

The most recent milestones in the negotiations have been the Devolution Framework Agreement and the Devolution Agreement-in-Principle (AiP). The Framework Agreement was signed in 2004 by the Government of Canada, GNWT and Aboriginal Summit, a caucus representing most of the NWT's Aboriginal groups.

Following the dissolution of the Aboriginal Summit in 2007, its member Aboriginal groups participated independently in negotiations and some chose to withdraw from active negotiations. To date, the Devolution AiP has been signed by three Aboriginal governments: the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, the Northwest Territory Métis Nation and, most recently, the Sahtu Secretariat Incorporated.

The signatories to the AiP are currently in the final stage of negotiations for the devolution of NWT public lands and natural resources. Other NWT Aboriginal governments may join the negotiations at any time. Final negotiations are expected to conclude in 2012. Implementation of the final agreement is expected to take approximately 18 months.

The Pacific NorthWest Economic Region (PNWER) Arctic Caucus met last week in Whitehorse, Yukon. Formed in 2009, this partnership between Alaska, Northwest Territories and Yukon provides a forum to share information, discuss issues of mutual concern, and identify areas for collaboration between the three jurisdictions and the rest of North America.

Over 50 delegates attended the Whitehorse gathering, including legislators and business leaders from Yukon, Alaska and Northwest Territories, as well as from Washington, Oregon and B.C. The conference addressed key issues of tourism, research and innovation and innovative aboriginal economic development examples in the region. Speakers came from the public sector, private sector and academia. Friday's luncheon keynote speaker described the role of the Yukon Environmental and Socio-economic Assessment Board.

The Arctic Caucus has explored tourism, trade, resource development and transportation challenges, among other issues. Rep. Bob Herron, leader of the Alaska delegation, noted that "the Caucus is in a good position to develop and highlight best practices and innovative solutions to challenges, solutions that should also be spread throughout the region."

Minister David Ramsay, Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment for the Government of Northwest Territories, has been the chair of the Arctic Caucus during the past year. The caucus hosted a major meeting in the US Capitol in Washington, DC in March. Minister Ramsay, said, "The Arctic Caucus has proven to be a valuable forum for identifying key issues in our northern regions. Collaboration is crucial in giving us a stronger voice to bring these issues forward to other governments and to improve our cross jurisdictional economic development opportunities."

During the meeting in Whitehorse, the position of Caucus Chair was passed to Currie Dixon, Yukon Minister of Environment and Economic Development. "Yukon is very proud to assume the responsibilities of Chair of the Arctic Caucus," Dixon Said. "We see the Caucus as a key mechanism for collaboration in pursuing our common goals and objectives, With the growing national and international interest in the north it is increasingly important for northern jurisdictions to engage with each other to strengthen our collective voice."

Addressing the issues – whether tourism or economic development – that affect northern communities, requires special attention to the scale and unique challenges of living in the North. Knowledge is a key vehicle to develop capacity and relate it to community concerns. There is a clear need for an educated populace and trained workforce; at the same time input from local communities is incorporated into research and economic development activities.

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An overarching theme of the Arctic Caucus meeting last week was the importance of infrastructure for economic development. One of the challenges identified is that future infrastructure must be managed for integration with current infrastructure. Energy and transportation infrastructure were important themes, both of which are necessary for thriving economies and healthy peoples. Examples of success stories in aboriginal development corporations and the Alaska Industrial Development Authority were discussed as innovative ways to leverage capital for infrastructure investment.

Tourism is also dependent on infrastructure. Tourism challenges include accessibility, high costs, and shortage of labor, as well as market competition, road conditions, and general lack of awareness. The importance and value of locally owned regional air carriers was a key element in this session as well. A pan-territorial marketing campaign, to include Alaska, was suggested as an action item for the PNWER Arctic Caucus to facilitate.

The meeting concluded Saturday with the endorsement of an Action Plan for northern development which will be pursued over the next year. The next annual meeting of the Arctic Caucus is to be hosted by Alaska in Anchorage, Alaska July 14 - 18, 2013.

PNWER, as North America's largest public-private partnership, has a role in increasing advocacy for Arctic issues; recognizing a distinct economic region, and sharing best practices across the US – Canada border. Previous Arctic Caucus meetings have taken place in Barrow, Alaska in 2010; Yellowknife, NWT in 2011; and next Arctic Caucus annual meeting will be held July 14-18, 2013 in Anchorage, Alaska.

Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre Celebrates One Millionth Visitor

YELLOWKNIFE (May 24, 2012) – Ten days after its 33rd anniversary, the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre (PWNHC) celebrated its one millionth visitor, who entered the building during a public program organized by Ecology North on the morning of April 26, 2012.

The millionth visitor was Starr McLachlan, who visited the PWNHC with her year-old daughter, Ula, newborn son, Stig, and mother-in-law, Ann McLachlan. They were participating in the Eco Mamas and Papas event, one of the family-oriented Earth Week activities hosted at the museum by Ecology North. The PWNHC provides space for community participation in a wide range of events and activities related to the arts, culture and heritage of the NWT.

"I am thrilled to learn the one millionth visitor was the mother of a young family interested in learning more about the natural and cultural heritage of the north," says Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment. "It is especially significant that this happened during an event hosted by one of our community partners who share the value of public education with the outreach programming objectives of the Northern Heritage Centre."

The Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre opened on April 16, 1979, with just over 14,000 visitors during the first year of operation. Over the past decade, the museum has earned a reputation as one of the top tourism destinations in the Northwest Territories. Annual visitation has increased to approximately 35,000 yearly visitors from all NWT communities and over 25 countries. Visitor statistics are compiled daily by security staff.

Starr is a true northerner who was born in Inuvik and grew up in Tsiigehtchic, Kugluktuk, Fort Smith, Pine Point and Yellowknife. She currently lives in Yellowknife with her family, and visiting the museum has been a family affair for as long as she can remember. As a young girl she remembers being a regular at the PWNHC's Amazing Family Sundays events along with her sisters Ella and Cleo and her mom, Karin.

To celebrate and recognize Starr as the PWNHC's one millionth visitor, the Department of Education, Culture and Employment will honour her at a later date with a museum plaque and a culturally appropriate gift, a Dene baby belt, handcrafted in the NWT with moosehide, canvas, beads and stroud. The gift symbolizes the importance of family and the strong bond between parents and babies.

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Budget Protects Programs and Services and Rebuilds for the Future

YELLOWKNIFE (May 24, 2012) – Today, Finance Minister J. Michael Miltenberger presented the first budget of the 17th Legislative Assembly.

The 2012-13 Budget projects an operating surplus of \$74 million; returning the GNWT to its first surplus in five years. The Budget includes no new taxes. However, effective April 1, 2012, property tax mill rates, liquor mark-ups and a number of fees were adjusted for inflation.

"The large capital investments the last government made have paid off and we are seeing the return of private investment and signs of recovery in most industries. In keeping with our plan, we are ending our fiscal stimulus and restoring the balance between revenue and expenditures," said Minister Miltenberger. "Given our fiscal reality, we are focusing on protecting existing programs and services and rebuilding for the future."

The 2012-13 Budget proposes \$35 million in new funding to meet the priorities of the 17th Legislative Assembly. This includes investments in housing, community safety, energy initiatives, and economic development.



Helen Kitekudlak is the community counselor at Helen Kalvak School in Ulukhaktok. Since beginning work in the classroom as a teenager and for the past 40 years, she has shown a genuine desire to make a difference to the people of the Beaufort Delta through education and partnerships. Helen takes great pride in her work and is a positive influence on all the students.

She received her teaching certificate from Aurora College and her Bachelor of Education from the University of Saskatchewan. She has taught all grades from one to nine and has a great understanding of her students. Helen believes in working with each student's strengths and making a positive and lasting impression on her students. She has the respect and admiration of her colleagues, the students and the entire community.

Betty Barnaby of Fort Good Hope is both a teacher and a student. Throughout her 20 year career, she has always believed in the power of education and instills that belief in her community. Betty has always gone above and beyond in pursuit of education. She has continually returned to school to expand her knowledge. She recently graduated from Aurora College with her Bachelor of Education degree and is now another step closer to her dream of receiving her Masters of Education.

Chris Baron has been an active Kindergarten to Grade 5 educator in the Tlicho region for the past 25 years. Chris started her career as a teacher in Saskatchewan before coming north to Gameti. She spent 5 years teaching at Jean Wetrade Gameti School and then moved to Behchoko, where she has taught for the past 20 years. She is a strong advocate for literacy, and has always placed emphasis on teaching her students to be strong readers. Chris believes in teaching every child, at their own level, to be the best that they can be, and to appreciate their own cultural identity.

Angela James is known throughout the North as an educator who believes in the importance of community and culture in the school. Over a career that spans more than 20 years, Angela taught English and French in Yellowknife for 6 years before operating the Dene Cultural Camps with her family, for all schools in Yellowknife. In their last year of hosting the camps, more than 2000 students from Grades 1 to 12 participated in the learning adventure where they experienced the heritage, culture and language of the Dene people. This experience was the basis of her thesis for her Master's Degree in educational leadership: "Dene Cultural Camps: A Culture-Based Educational Model for Aboriginal Education in the Northwest Territories."

During her 12-year tenure as Principal, K'alemi Dene School has become a community centre for cultural and social activity as well as learning. Her introduction of the School Elder program has given Weledeh culture an honoured and integral place in student life. Recently, Angela took on the leadership role of Director of Early Childhood and School Services with ECE.

Margaret Thom has contributed to the education of her people through her work as Community Counselor at Deh Gah Elementary and Secondary School for over 20 years. She has taken a lead role in supporting graduates by travelling with them to visit post-secondary institutes, assisting them in the application process, exploring funding options with them and even travelling with them to secure housing and orient them to their new community. She continued her support of many students after they left her school and went on in their education journeys. Margaret recognizes the importance of traditional teachings in education and she has made sure that the culture, value and beliefs of the people of the Deh Cho are present in all the school does, from counseling to parental involvement to classroom work. Through her ability to share her knowledge and passion, students and staff receive a strong grounding in the culture of the people whose land they live on. In 2009, Margaret became the first Elder Representative on the Aurora College Board of Governors. She is now impacting students and educators from Kindergarten to the College level and ensuring that the importance of education is highlighted in the community and that culture is in the forefront of our education system.


Kevin Antoniak has been an instructor at Aurora College's Thebacha Campus in the Environment and Natural Resources Technology Program for 30 years. Throughout his career, Kevin delivered difficult content, like botany and statistics, in a straight forward and easy to understand manner. He positions students to achieve success through clearly defined evaluation and continually pushing them beyond their comfort zones. His instructional methodology has always been hands-on and developmental, in manageable and achievable steps. Much of Kevin's instructional work has taken place in the field, where he has continually provided excellence in instruction, often under difficult conditions. He has played a significant role in the convocation of approximately 200 diploma graduates, many of whom now comprise 20% of the Department of Environment and Natural Resources' entire workforce.

Dr. Curtis Brown has spent the past 24 years expanding horizons for youth throughout the Northwest Territories and Nunavut as teacher, principal and Superintendent. Through these roles and his commitment to excellence in teaching, he has had a lasting and profound impact in the areas of school leadership, student achievement and the development of innovative and inclusive programming. Curtis played an instrumental role in developing the Principal Certification Program, which is a required course for all principals in the NWT, and ensuring its continued success 20 years later. It comes as no surprise, given his interest and passion for building leadership capacity that his doctoral thesis was in the area of school leadership. His focus on student achievement provides a glimpse into his visionary and dedicated service to students, including directing the development of an innovative and effective literacy program in the South Slave, which has dramatically benefitted hundreds of students.

Throughout his career, Curtis has been a strong advocate for alternative programming and expanded opportunities for students. While serving as Principal of Chief Jimmy Bruneau School (1991-1994), his efforts to extend and expand programming for students received national attention and his school was heralded as "the school where students are dropping back in".

More recently, in his role as Superintendent of the South Slave Divisional Education Council, he provided direct support in the creation of the territory's first "Store Front School" that has become the model for other alternative programs in the NWT. Since inception, the Phoenix School has provided an alternative educational setting for more than 200 students. In just three years of operation, the school has celebrated the graduation of 30 students - many of whom had been disengaged and had left school.

His "student first" attitude has not gone unnoticed. He was presented with the Canadian Superintendent of the Year award in 2011, awarded by the Canadian Association of School Administrators.

Government of Northwest Territories Welcomes Changing Directions, Changing Lives: The Mental Health Strategy for Canada

YELLOWKNIFE (June 7, 2012) – Building on last month's overwhelmingly successful release of Canada's first-ever mental health strategy, the Mental Health Commission of Canada is in Yellowknife to launch Changing Directions, Changing Lives: The Mental Health Strategy for Canada. The Strategy was shaped and informed by the experiences and input from thousands of Canadians, including considerable engagement in Northwest Territories.

"The release of this Strategy marks a historic milestone for our country, the millions of Canadians living with mental health problems and illnesses, their families and, all those who are working to ensure that every Canadian can enjoy the best mental health," said Commission President and CEO, Louise Bradley. "Ensuring that the mental health needs of people in Northwest Territories are met will require participation on all levels, working together in areas like funding, incentives for professionals in remote regions, enhanced training locally, and better use of technologies."

The Commission is holding regional events across the country to extend the conversation about how the Strategy can improve mental health and about what can be done to bring the Strategy to life in our communities. While in Yellowknife, Commission representatives presented the Strategy to members of the Standing Committee on Social Programs, as well as members of the Legislative Assembly, representatives from Aboriginal community health organizations, family caregivers and government officials.

"Mental health is an issue that affects us all," said Tom Beaulieu, Minister of Health and Social Services. "We are pleased that our northern voice was heard in the development of this National Strategy on Mental Health, and even more pleased to be part of the northern launch of *Changing Directions, Changing Lives*. I am also happy that many of

our territorial partners were able to be with us today. I look forward to our continued collaboration on this important issue."

The release of Changing Directions, Changing Lives: The Mental Health Strategy for Canada marks the first time that Canada has created a shared vision and set of priorities that will guide the efforts of the public and private sector, the service delivery sector and all Canadians to improve mental health outcomes.

It sets out recommendations for change that promise to improve quality of life for Canadians in every province and territory, grouping them into six key strategic directions:

- 1. Promote mental health across the lifespan in homes, schools and workplaces, and prevent mental illness wherever possible;
- 2. Foster recovery and well-being for people of all ages living with mental health problems and illnesses, and uphold their rights;
- 3. Provide access to the right combination of services, treatments and supports, when and where people need them;
- 4. Reduce disparities in risk factors and access to mental health services, and strengthen the response to the needs of diverse communities and Northerners;
- 5. Work with First Nations, Inuit and Métis to address their mental health needs, acknowledging their distinct circumstances, rights and cultures; and,
- 6. Mobilize leadership, improve knowledge and foster collaboration at all levels.



Aboriginal Engagement Strategy

YELLOWKNIFE (June 11, 2012) – The GNWT has made a formal commitment to a set of principles and key actions to strengthen and renew relationships with its Aboriginal government partners. "Respect, Recognition, Responsibility: The Government of the Northwest Territories' Approach to Engaging with Aboriginal Governments" was developed based on discussions with Aboriginal governments and community leaders. It has been produced in all NWT official languages.

"We need to build strong relationships at all levels – leaders, senior managers and all staff," said Bob McLeod, Minister of Aboriginal Affairs and Intergovernmental Relations. "Aboriginal governments are our partners as we work together to serve the people we represent. Our government is committed to a new approach to building greater collaboration and participation, so we can all achieve our shared goals in a spirit of mutual respect, recognition and responsibility."

"Respect, Recognition, Responsibility" affirms that the GNWT will:

- continue to recognize and respect the constitutionally protected rights and treaty rights of Aboriginal peoples, as well as existing Aboriginal rights agreements;
- be open, flexible and responsive in working with the diverse governance structures of regional Aboriginal governments and understanding the unique interests and challenges of each region and community; and
- will make every effort to share information and knowledge, help build capacity, enhance our
 government's participation at Annual General Assemblies and other important events, and establish
 regular formal meetings with each Aboriginal government in the NWT.

The Aboriginal Engagement Strategy supports the 17th Legislative Assembly's priority of strengthening relationships with Aboriginal governments, as outlined in *Believing in Our People and Building on the Strengths of Northerners*.

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GNWT Emergency Bulletin: Liard River (June 12, 4:30 p.m.)

June 12, 2012

On Friday, June 8th, rising water levels in the Liard River created a flood risk in the communities of Fort Liard and Nahanni Butte. River levels continued to rise and reached flood levels in Nahanni Butte, leading to the evacuation of the community by air. Members of the community who were evacuated are staying in Fort Simpson. Fort Liard has not been evacuated.

Municipal and Community Affairs (MACA)

GNWT officials visited Nahanni Butte on June 11th to survey damage to municipal infrastructure. Flood waters have not receded and it is expected that evacuees will need to remain in Fort Simpson for several more days. Arrangements are being made to ensure provisions are in place and suitable accommodations are provided to evacuees.

Once a more thorough assessment of damage in Nahanni Butte is complete, MACA will work with municipal, territorial and federal partners to determine whether disaster financial assistance will be sought through federal programming.

MACA remains in contact with municipal officials in Fort Liard and there are currently no concerns regarding elevated flood levels. Evacuation of the community is not expected at this time.

Transportation (DOT)


The Liard River ferry crossing at Fort Simpson and the N'Dulee ferry crossing remain closed until further notice. DOT reports that high flow rates and debris continue to delay the resumption of operations. Once water levels allow, landings on each side will have to be rebuilt.

A Shared Path Towards Wellness - Mental Health and Addictions, 2012 - 2015

June 12, 2012 - Mr. Speaker, at the appropriate time today I will table our action plan, "A Shared Path Towards Wellness - Mental Health and Addictions, 2012 – 2015."

The new action plan will help improve mental health and reduce addiction in the NWT. A Shared Path Towards Wellness will create a more efficient system that will allow residents to receive assessment, treatment and support services when and where they need them. The three-year action plan builds on the existing system, and incorporates innovative ideas from our stakeholders to better coordinate and integrate our services.

The action plan has three key elements.

The first is Community Focus and Engagement – communities have said that they are in the best position to determine their own culturally appropriate solutions. This plan will let communities drive and guide community-based Mental Health and Addiction programs, with our support, not the other way around.

The second key element is Collaborative Partnerships with Other Departments and Agencies – this plan ensures that departments and agencies will work collectively to address mental health and addictions issues. An example is ensuring that effective addictions programming is available for residents in our correctional facilities.

The third key element is to develop an Integrated Continuum of Care – the action plan will be building upon our existing Integrated Services Delivery Model. Services will be integrated to ensure that front-line service providers will work together. There will also be integration from community level services through regional services to territorial services to create a seamless system. While every effort will be made to make services available at the community level; there will still be some specialized services that can be more efficiently delivered at the regional or territorial level.

Mr. Speaker, this action plan was developed by engaging key stakeholders in the addiction and mental health fields. It included health care professionals, social services professionals, GNWT departments, aboriginal governments, and community groups. We also talked to people from across the territory who have experienced mental health and addictions issues and been clients in our system. I would like to thank everyone involved in the creation of this action plan.

This action plan sets out the direction we will be heading during the next three years. It already builds on work the Department is doing to strengthen our service delivery by focusing on four goals:

- Promoting Understanding, Awareness and Acceptance;
- Focusing on the Person;
- Improving the Availability of Services; and
- Improving the Effectiveness of Services

The strategy will lead us to expand culturally appropriate on-the-land healing programs delivered by communities. It will support offering more community-based addictions treatment programs like the Matrix program in Fort Smith. It will ensure that existing services like the Nats'ejée K'é Treatment Centre and detoxification services are effective.

We have heard from so many people that addictions is the key issue in the NWT. We know that addictions break families apart, destroy communities, and rob individuals of a happy productive life.

To better understand community issues and community solutions to addictions I will be establishing a public forum. This forum will include experts in the addictions field and members of the public. I have asked MLAs to nominate individuals who they feel would be an asset to this forum.

We can accomplish a lot in the next three years to achieve this Assembly's vision of strong individuals, families and communities. However, for this action plan to be successful, we will need to work together. Government departments, Aboriginal governments, and community groups need to make a collective commitment to improving access to services and building strong communities for their people.

Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

The GNWT is committed to improving the availability and effectiveness of mental health and addictions treatment. This three-year action plan is a road map for improving mental health and reducing addictions.

The four goals of the action plan are:

- promoting understanding and awareness
- focusing on the person
- improving the availability of and access to services
- improving the effectiveness of services

This action plan will transform our system by streamlining services so individuals with mental health or addiction problems can access the programs and services they need. We want to make sure that our residents who have addictions or mental health problems get the support they need to be independent, self-reliant and active members of their communities.

Our action plan was developed in partnership with stakeholders. We spoke to people from across the territory who had experienced mental health and addiction issues and had been clients in our system. We also engaged key stakeholders in the addiction and mental health fields. This included health care professionals, social services professionals, GNWT departments, aboriginal governments, and community groups. The final product brings together the experience of those with lived experience and promising program practices from across Canada.

- Only 64% of NWT residents rate their mental health as good or very good, compared to the Canadian average of 73%;
- The proportion of NWT residents hospitalized for a mental illness remained fairly stable over the last 15 years, at about 1.4% of the population;
- Of persons hospitalized for mental illness:
 - o 58% are for substance-related disorders;
 - o 16% are for mood disorders;
 - 12% are for schizophrenia and psychotic disorders;
 - o 8% are for anxiety and adjustment disorders; and
 - o 6% are for other mental health disorders.
- The average rate of 1.8 suicides per 10,000 (2003-2007) is 65% higher than the Canadian average of 1.1 per 10,000 (2005).
- From 2000-2009, 45% of unintentional-injury deaths in the NWT were related to alcohol intoxication (Office of the Chief Coroner, 2012).
- 43% of residents report that they typically consume 5 or more drinks on one occasion. This is an increase from 34% in 1996.
- 64% of residents aged 15-24 consume 5 or more drinks on a single occasion, and 1 in 4 engage in heavy drinking at least once per week.
- At least 11% of the population is using cannabis weekly.
- The number of people who reported trying an illicit drug (cocaine/crack, hallucinogens, speed, ecstasy and heroin) at least once in their lifetime increased from 16% in 2002 to 24% in 2009.
- The Mental Health Commission of Canada released <u>Changing Directions, Changing Lives: The Mental Health Strategy for Canada</u> on May 8, 2012.



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GNWT Emergency Bulletin: Liard River (June 15, 5pm)

On Friday, June 8th, rising water levels in the Liard River caused a flood in the community of Nahanni Butte. Most residents of the community were evacuated to Fort Simpson, where they remain. The GNWT is currently assessing conditions in the community to determine when it will be safe for residents to return to their homes. On Monday, June 18, Deputy Premier Jackson Lafferty will visit Nahanni Butte and meet with evacuees in Fort Simpson.

Municipal and Community Affairs (MACA)

GNWT officials visited Nahanni Butte today to assess conditions in the community, survey the scope of any damage, and determine if it is safe to return residents to the community. Based on the assessment, MACA does not recommend residents return to the community and it is likely they will remain in Fort Simpson for several more days.

Up-river from Nahanni Butte, flood waters have begun to rapidly recede and it is expected that they will continue to do so over the weekend. MACA personnel will continue to monitor water levels through in-person visits and by communicating with residents who chose to not evacuate.

Once a more thorough assessment of damage in Nahanni Butte is complete, MACA will work with the community government of Nahanni Butte to determine whether this event will qualify for funds under the Disaster Assistance Policy.

Once it is safe to return to the community, transportation will be arranged for evacuees and MACA will work with the community government and other partners to help ease the transition for residents.

Transportation (DOT)

Operations of the Johnny Berens ferry at the N'Dulee ferry crossing on the road to Wrigley have resumed. Rebuilding of the landings at the Liard ferry crossing near Fort Simpson (Lafferty ferry) has begun, and operations of the ferry are expected to resume in the next 20-30 hours. Restrictions on some vehicles types such as motor homes and super B trucks may be required until water levels return to normal.

The advisory on travel on Highway #7 (the Liard Highway) is lifted. Travellers on Highway #7 can still expect soft roads, reduced speed limits in sections, and sections of road reduced to a single lane due to very soft conditions. Traffic is restricted to vehicles weighing less than 4500 kg. fully loaded. Road bans are in place throughout the Fort Simpson region.

New Mandate and Name for Mackenzie Valley Pipeline Office

INUVIK (June 19, 2012) – The mandate of the Mackenzie Valley Pipeline Office in Hay River has been expanded.

Increases in resource development activity, particularly in the Sahtu region, have led the GNWT to expand responsibilities for the office and give it a new name to reflect the expanded mandate: the Mackenzie Valley Petroleum Planning Office (MVPPO).

Speaking today at the 2012 Inuvik Petroleum Show, Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment David Ramsay said the renewed mandate will ensure residents of the NWT continue to benefit from all resource development projects in the NWT to the greatest degree possible, while minimizing the potential impacts.

"This is an opportune time to broaden the mandate of the office to allow the GNWT to contribute staff and resources to address other areas of resource development in the NWT," Ramsay noted. "It will also allow us to continue our efforts on the Mackenzie Gas Project as required and maintain our capacity to deal with the challenges and opportunities this project will bring."

The expanded mandate of the Mackenzie Valley Petroleum Planning Office includes strategic planning, government coordination, support to Aboriginal communities and businesses, and communications support associated with petroleum resource development in the Mackenzie Valley. This includes the Mackenzie Gas Project and future development projects.

In *Believing in People and Building on the Strength of Northerners*, the 17th Legislative Assembly identified the Mackenzie Gas Project as a priority in achieving a diversified economy that provides all communities and regions with opportunities and choices.

On Friday, June 8th, rising water levels in the Liard River caused a flood in the community of Nahanni Butte. Most residents of the community were evacuated to Fort Simpson, where they remain. The GNWT is currently assessing conditions in the community to determine when it will be safe for residents to return to their homes.

Municipal and Community Affairs (MACA)

Deputy Premier Jackson Lafferty, MLA Kevin Menicoche and Chief Clayton Konisenta visited Nahanni Butte yesterday, June 18th, and met with evacuees in Fort Simpson. Senior officials from the Executive, Municipal and Community Affairs, Transportation, the NWT Housing Corporation and NWT Power Corporation (NTPC) also attended.

Preliminary assessment of the community shows that flood waters have receded considerably, but there is still a substantial amount of standing water in many low spots. Damage to private homes does not appear to be as bad as first suspected, but not all homes were accessed. There has been damage to community infrastructure, including the band office and gymnasium.

The power plant was flooded and remains out of operation. NTPC estimates it will take three to four days to resume operations and another two to get the community back on line. Community infrastructure, such as telephones and water treatment, will remain out of service until power is returned to the community.

MACA does not recommend that residents return to the community at this time. Estimates are that it will take one to two weeks to restore community services, making it safe for residents to return.

Once a more thorough assessment of damage in Nahanni Butte is complete, MACA will work with the community government of Nahanni Butte to determine whether this event will qualify for funds under the Disaster Assistance Policy.

Once it is safe to return to the community, transportation will be arranged for evacuees and MACA will work with the community government and other partners to help ease the transition for residents.

MACA will lead a committee of regional and local representatives, including the Chief and Band Manager, and representatives from NWTHC, NTPC, Environment and Natural Resources and NorthwesTel to organize clean-up efforts.

Transportation (DOT)

Water has receded from the runway at Nahanni Butte, but it will require several days of warm weather for the ditches to drain and for the runway to dry out to allow for a proper assessment. An assessment crew from Airports division is expected to visit Nahanni Butte later in the week to assess the runway conditions and any remediation required.

Ferry operations at Fort Simpson (Lafferty) and on the road to Wrigley (Johnny Berens) have resumed. Delays are being experienced on the Lafferty because declining water levels require regular work on the approaches.

An inspection of the Nahanni Butte access road did not note any problems. However, the road traverses some wet lands that might not stand up to repeated heavy loads. A further inspection of the road is underway to determine its capacity.



GNWT Reaffirms Commitment to Inclusive Schooling and Early Childhood Development

YELLOWKNIFE (June 19, 2012) -- Minister of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE) Jackson Lafferty reaffirmed the Government of the Northwest Territories' (GNWT) commitment to inclusive schooling and early childhood development today.

As part of the Legislative Assembly's review and approval of the 2012-13 Main Estimates, the GNWT has agreed to reallocate \$1 million to early childhood development. This new investment in early childhood development is being funded through a reallocation from funds previously allocated to inclusive schooling.

"Investments in early childhood development benefit our children and prepare them to enter the school system ready to learn, reducing the need for more supports later on," said Minister Lafferty. "We worked with Members of the Legislative Assembly to identify funding in ECE's budget for early childhood development during the recent budget session. With their help, we have come up with a solution that invests in this important priority while continuing to provide inclusive schooling programs and services across the NWT."

ECE provides \$26 million annually to school boards to fund inclusive schooling. This funding is part of the approximately \$150 million ECE provides to school boards, out of a total departmental budget of \$300 million, for the education of children from Kindergarten to Grade 12. The internal funding transfer represents less than one percent of overall school board funding. The school boards have the ability to allocate their budgets each year to a variety of programs and services.

Funding for inclusive schooling is provided through a formula based on 12 categories of expenditure. ECE reviewed past spending in these 12 categories to identify opportunities for reallocating funds while ensuring minimal impact on programs and services.

Members of the Legislative Assembly approved the GNWT's 2012-13 budget on June 8, 2012.

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BACKGROUNDER:

INCLUSIVE SCHOOLING FUNDING REALLOCATION TO EARLY CHILDHOOD DEVELOPMENT

Inclusive Schooling is based on a philosophy or a belief system which welcomes all learners and values each as both unique and capable of learning.

There are twelve areas for expenditure for the school boards to allocate funding provided by ECE. This funding allows education authorities to provide support systems and services to enable all students to be included as full participants in regular, age-appropriate classes within their home communities:

- 1. Inclusive Schooling Consultants
 - Funding is based on the prior year average salary and benefits for consultants (territorial and inclusive schooling consultants).
- 2. Program Support Teachers
 - Funding is based on the prior year average salary for teachers.
- 3. Counsellors
 - > Base funding is provided for each community.
- 4. Program Assistance
 - Strategies, materials and personnel used to provide programming supports to meet the learning needs and goals of individuals and groups of students.
- 5. Magnet Facilities
 - Certain institutional facilities provide services to non-resident students and thus exhibit a high concentration of students with very challenging needs. These facilities have been identified as requiring additional supports and the education authority can access funding based on the average number of annual FTE students accommodated at the facility. Funding is only provided for magnet facilities designated as such by ECE as defined above.
 - > The following are identified as Magnet Facilities operating in the NWT:
 - Group Homes:
 McAteer House (Yellowknife)
 Territorial Treatment Centre (Yellowknife)
 Trail Cross (Fort Smith)
 Young Offender Facilities (YOF):
 North Slave YOF (Yellowknife)
- 6. Staff Development
 - The staff development formula includes base funding and funding for travel in accordance with the number of communities that each council serves.

7. O & M (Travel & Minor Projects)

> Travel and Minor Projects funding is for minor projects, travel and supplies.

8. Student Transportation

An additional per student allocation is provided for students requiring special transportation, such as buses with wheelchair lifts, or private vehicles.

9. Southern Placements

There may be extraordinary situations when a southern placement is necessary because an education authority is unable to provide a program for a student, despite having met all the requirements as outlined in the Inclusive Schooling Directive. Other such instances may occur where placements are initiated by the GNWT Department of Health and Social Services in consultation with the relevant education authority.

10. Healing and Counselling

➤ It is recognized that, in pursuing their academic goals, students may need help in addressing personal, social, or emotional issues. Counselling and Healing refer to strategies and supports designed to address behavioural, social, emotional, and healing issues, including residential school recovery.

11. Student Success Initiatives

- The SSI aims to improve student learning and performance. Education district level projects are funded to improve student achievement in a range of areas. To address the particular needs of small communities, funding has been set aside to provide more targeted assistance to one or two small community schools. Such schools are deemed "focus schools" and present some of the following characteristics:
 - a significant percentage of students who function below grade level;
 - a high percentage of students who have been identified as having special needs or learning disabilities;
 - the need for cultural enrichment, or;
 - a high rate of nonattendance.
- ➤ A focus school will be identified where the school community demonstrates the readiness to address such issues that have been identified for its school. Final determination of focus schools rests with the Department.

12. Coordination of Integrated Services

Provides supplementary funding provided to education authorities to work with other social agencies.

The three areas affected by the funding reallocation:

- Coordination of Integrated Services provides supplementary funding provided to education authorities to work with other social agencies. The entire \$480,000 formula allocation would be reduced in the 2012-13 School Year (SY);
- Staff Development provides funding for staff development related to student support services. The formula allocation would be reduced by \$275,000 or 18% in the 2012-13 SY; and

• Magnet Facilities provides funding for non-resident students accommodated in group homes and young offender facilities. The formula allocation would be reduced by \$245,000 or 16% in the 2012-13 SY.


The overall impact of this funding reallocation is less than one (1%) percent of the total funding provided by the Department to Divisional Education Councils and District Education Authorities in the NWT.

Working with federal, provincial, and territorial governments to improve sport and recreation opportunities for Northerners will result in a strong north built on partnerships and healthy, educated people free from poverty as envisioned by the 17th Assembly of the Government of the Northwest Territories.

Minister Participates in Expressions of Reconciliation Ceremony in Saskatoon

YELLOWKNIFE (July 3, 2012) – Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, offered a gift during the Expressions of Reconciliation ceremony at the recent Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) national gathering in Saskatoon.

The ceremony gives individuals, organizations, and representatives of the parties to the Residential Schools Settlement Agreement the opportunity to make statements, presentations, or apologies directly to survivors.

"I have attended the Truth and Reconciliation gatherings since the beginning," said Minister Lafferty. "This most recent gathering in Saskatoon was especially noteworthy for me; I had the opportunity to speak at the Expressions of Reconciliation ceremony and present the Commission with a gift reflecting the Northwest Territories' commitment to the important work the TRC is doing."

The Minister presented a pair of hand-crafted Dene children's slippers, created by a Tlicho residential school survivor. The slippers are symbolic of the strong Aboriginal cultures of the NWT that survived residential schools, and the steps the North is taking on a path to healing, reconciliation, and a hopeful future. The Minister and the TRC Commissioners simultaneously placed the slippers in the TRC Bentwood Box, which reflects the strength and resilience of residential school survivors and their descendants, and honours those survivors who are no longer living. The box travels with the TRC to all seven National Events throughout Canada. At the end of the TRC's mandate, all of the offerings in the box will be housed in the National Research Centre.



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Tłicho Government and GNWT Sign Memorandum of Understanding

YELLOWKNIFE (July 3, 2012) – Members of the Executive Councils of the Tłįcho Government and the 17th Legislative Assembly met bilaterally on Friday, June 29th for the second time. Leaders met in Yellowknife to discuss issues of shared importance and to sign "Working Together", a memorandum of understanding recognizing the importance of their government-to-government relationship.

"Working Together" is a commitment to work together in a spirit of respect, recognition and responsibility on matters of mutual interest. The agreement acknowledges the unique and evolving relationship between the two governments and identifies areas of cooperation including housing, income support, infrastructure, and community governance.

"I am very pleased to sign this memorandum of understanding today to formalize the relationship we have with the Tłįcho Government," said Premier Bob McLeod. "The people of the Northwest Territories need their governments to work together to help create a strong and prosperous territory that provides benefits to all of them. The Government of the Northwest Territories is committed to strengthening our relationships with Aboriginal governments and the agreement we have signed today demonstrates that commitment."

Grand Chief Edward Erasmus said, "I too am pleased to be able to sign this Memorandum of Understanding with the leaders of the GNWT today. This MOU is an agreement to work together...government-to-government. The MOU sets out the reasons we want to work together and how we will go about doing so. It is important that as the leaders of the two governments we work together for the good of our people in our communities. There are so many areas where we have overlapping interests, and if we don't work together, it is our people who suffer in the end."

At the meeting, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and Tłįcho Government followed up on work from the last meeting and a number of new matters of shared interest, including:

 Issues surrounding the implementation of community governments, housing, harmonization of GNWT income support and the Tłįcho Government Harvesters Subsidy, and an update on the creation of a new Wildlife Act. Of particular note are the collaborative efforts between the GNWT and the Tłįcho Government around the delivery of training programs for staff for the new Jimmy Erasmus Seniors Home in Behchokö. Both governments will provide funding to train a number of staff to work in the new facility.

There were also a number of new matters of shared interest, including:

 The Wekweeti Winter Road and Tlicho winter roads generally, establishing agreements for shared facilities for early childhood programs and Tłįcho Community Services Agency schools, forest fires and their aftermaths, and local employment.

Formal government-to-government meetings and the signing of an intergovernmental cooperation MOU are commitments contained in the GNWT's Respect, Recognition, Responsibility: The Government of the Northwest Territories' Approach to Engaging with Aboriginal Governments. These commitments support the 17th Legislative Assembly's vision Believing in People and Building on the Strengths of Northerners.

The Tłįchǫ Government introduced "Iłè dǫ gha gọita …in Tłįchǫ Unity", a strategic framework and intentions 2009-2013. In Tłįchǫ Unity describes the vision and mission of the Tłįchǫ Government and speaks to the desire to build effective intergovernmental relationships to ensure collaboration in ways that protect the land and environment, and improve people's lives in the communities.

The Executive Councils of the 17th Assembly and Tłįcho Government have committed to meet bilaterally twice per year. The last meeting was held January 12-13.

Vision and Anti-Poverty Priorities Identified For a Poverty-Free NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (July 3, 2012) – The groundwork for an NWT anti-poverty strategy and action plan was laid out last week at a roundtable in Hay River. The participants reached consensus on a draft vision and strategic priorities and started discussions on guiding principles and goals and objectives. Participants also agreed on a theme: *Poverty-Free NWT*.

"I am pleased with the progress we made over the three days," said Gloria latridis, Chair of the Poverty-Free NWT Steering Committee. "It is especially encouraging that there was the commitment and time taken to develop common understandings about the many challenges and potential solutions."

The roundtable participants represent the GNWT, Aboriginal governments, municipal governments, labour and non-government organizations, and a person experiencing poverty.

"It's exciting to be part of the process that is going to make a difference in people's lives," said steering committee member Christine King. "Since I am among the working poor, I'm grateful to know that there is an increased understanding among the group about the nature of poverty."

"The strategy is a way to repair a tattered social safety net for the people who need it most," said Bob Simpson, representing the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation.

The discussions last week were informed by the results of the 2011 *What We Heard from Northerners about Poverty* report, the *No Place for Poverty* workshop in 2010, poverty strategies developed in six provinces and Nunavut, and additional research information.

A second roundtable will be held in the fall to continue work on the strategy and action plan. Participants will be engaging communities in discussions about the draft strategy and action plan in the coming fall and winter. Those discussions will include conversations about community action plans.

30-Year Old Taicho Drum Songs Released on CD

Education, Culture and Employment Jackson Lafferty, will present the first CD copies of drum songs to the Tłicho chiefs at the annual Tłicho Gathering in Wekweètì.

In 1982, Robert Janes, Director of the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre (PWNHC) in cooperation with the Dene Nation and CBC North, contracted anthropologist Ronald Wright to record Dene music. This project was to both preserve a sample of traditional Dene music and share the music with the world.

Recorded in Behchoko, the songs have been preserved in the NWT Archives at the PWNHC. PWNHC, CBC North and the Tłįchǫ government worked together to finalize the recordings and produce the CD, *Songs of the Tłįchǫ Drum Dance*.

"We are extremely excited about this project," said Minister Lafferty. "Music and celebration are a big part of the foundation of our northern cultures. Some of these songs haven't been heard or performed in 30 years, and today, they are remastered and produced on a CD to share with other cultures. This is a tremendous gift. The songs are part of our heritage, and we look forward to sharing them with the families and communities of the original musicians, and with the world."

A celebration with the original anthropologist, Ronald Wright, is planned for the fall at the PWNHC.



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
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GNWT Announces 2012 Council of the Federation Literacy Award Recipient

Created in 2004 by the Premiers of Canada, the award recognizes the valuable contributions made by Canadians across the entire spectrum of literacy, including family, Aboriginal, health, workplace and community literacy. In the NWT, the award is customarily given to an adult learner who has overcome obstacles, demonstrated outstanding progress in the pursuit of literacy skills in any of the NWT's official languages, helped others to improve their literacy levels, and was enrolled in classes within the past 18 months.

2012 Council of the Federation Literacy Award Recipients

Lisa O'Blenis - Alberta

Lisa O'Blenis is a volunteer tutor with the Calgary Public Library's Learning Advantage Program, which pairs volunteers with adult literacy learners to achieve their reading, writing and numeracy goals. O'Blenis is committed to lifelong learning and to helping adults overcome their literacy challenges. By customizing lessons and supporting her students, O'Blenis goes above and beyond to provide learners with the necessary literacy skills for the home, workplace and further education. Thanks to O'Blenis' help, one of her students received his Canadian citizenship and will now be attending the University of Calgary. When not volunteering as a literacy tutor, O'Blenis works in volunteer management, supporting and coordinating a team of over 500 volunteers. O'Blenis has a positive impact on her students and is a true champion for literacy in Alberta.

Literacy Alliance of the Shuswap Society (LASS) - British Columbia

LASS approached the literacy scene with the attitude of "what can we do to help or support you" rather than "this is what we're doing." In addition to fostering community collaboration and partnerships, LASS has delivered a variety of well-received literacy programs that target learners across all ages and sectors. For example, the One-to-One Children's Literacy Program has involved over 200 community volunteers across 13 schools. In only four months, participating children significantly increased their reading speed and their reading accuracy. LASS exemplifies commitment to innovative literacy practices and positive literacy outcomes for all learners as they work to weave literacy into the culture of the communities in School District 83 – North Okanagan Shuswap.

Tina Bergen - Manitoba

Tina Bergen had a passion for learning as a child in Paraguay where her schooling stopped at age 12. She moved with her young family to Canada, where "a whole new world opened up and it was like her mind had come to life." When Bergen was laid off from the local manufacturing plant there was an opportunity to pursue a job in the Residential Care field. This work required a grade 12 diploma so she enrolled at South Eastman English and Literacy Services to improve her writing skills. Within six months Bergen finished Stage 3, wrote a book, *Turbulence, Transitions and Triumphs* and enrolled in high school courses. She inspires other learners through her writing, volunteering on the board and her successful transition to the adult learning centre.

Maria (Candy) Mateo – New Brunswick

Maria (Candy) Mateo came to Canada from El Salvador in 1994. Her desire to learn English inspired her to improve her literacy skills. Mateo struggled to communicate with Canadian friends, find work and read the Bible. Attempting various methods of learning the language – including using a Spanish-English dictionary, borrowing books from the library and watching Sesame Street – she began her quest to get a GED, as she wrote, "before I start walking with a cane." It has been a long journey but in May 2012, Mateo achieved her GED. Her goal is to go to college and train to find meaningful employment. Mateo notes it was with the support of her family and friends and her deep faith in God that she was successful.

Elizabeth Cormier – New Brunswick

Elizabeth Cormier left school at the age of 18 because she was pregnant. School was not important to her – until the day she became a mother. She came to the realization she had responsibilities as a parent and no education. Cormier obtained work, but nothing that paid well, and it was hard living on little money. She did not want her daughter to be in the same situation, so she made her a promise she would finish high school, obtain her GED and go to college. At 35, Cormier decided to go back to school and is now on her way to achieving her goal. In her own words, "I am going to graduate with honours; the honour of creating a better future for myself."

Karra Dillon – Northwest Territories

Karra Dillon is a young Inuvialuit woman living in her home community of Tuktoyaktuk, Northwest Territories. She left school at an early age to start a family and returned to school in 2010 in order to pursue a career. This spring she graduated from the Aboriginal Language and Culture Instructor Program at Aurora College in Inuvik, NT. Dillon came to the program as an emerging speaker and has worked hard to become a very skilled Siglitun Inuvialuktun speaker. Dillon's love of her language and culture is also expressed through traditional drum dancing. Dillon plans to pursue additional upgrading towards her new goal of entering the Bachelor of Education Program.

Kimberlly (Kim) Nielsen - Nova Scotia

As a single mother of four children, when her youngest was ready to leave for university, Kim Nielsen decided to go back to school. Her first step towards this goal was to enroll at the Queens Adult High School, a decision that ultimately changed her life. As a student she stood out due to her dedication, her leadership qualities and her commitment; she will graduate in June 2012 with honours. Nielsen participated in a wide range of activities ranging from fundraising to volunteering in a technology mentoring program in a seniors' residence. She plans to attend the Continuing Care Program at a Nova Scotia Community College. Nielsen will no doubt thrive in the health care profession as she is a nurturing, trustworthy, talented individual with a sparkling personality.

Annie Neglak – Nunavut

Annie Neglak spent her early years growing up as her ancestors had for many years – on the land near the outpost camp of Bathurst Inlet, in western Nunavut. Separated from her family and sent away to residential school, she was denied an education because she was considered "too old". Instead, she was put to work at the school. Neglak always desired not only to right this personal wrong, but also to advocate for her people. In her late fifties, she began the journey toward literacy. Neglak completed Adult Basic Education and then enrolled in the Social Services Worker Program at Nunavut Arctic College. She continued to return to Adult Basic Education for upgrades that allowed her to complete her college diploma. Neglak has become a passionate promoter of literacy. As an elder, she is a role model to all Inuit who struggle with adversity, and continues to gives back to her people.

Community Literacy of Ontario – Ontario

Community Literacy of Ontario (CLO) is a network of community-based literacy agencies. CLO was created in 1994 and is located in Barrie. They have a passion for literacy, for learning and for the power of community. Their mission is to provide resources, information, and practitioner training. They believe in making practitioner training highly accessible and were an early adopter of online learning. CLO offers face-to-face training, online workshops, webinars, self-study training modules, podcasts, online videos and more. While CLO may be small, they have always dreamed big and worked hard to support Ontario's community-based literacy agencies in the important work they do in helping adults to improve their literacy and numeracy skills.

Terry Affleck - Prince Edward Island

At the age of 63, Terry Affleck learned to read and today at the age of 66, he is one subject away from achieving his grade 12 equivalency. In the 1950s, early in Affleck's schooling, low self-esteem and rebellion set in and literacy became problematic. He decided to quit school in order to work and his parents accepted his decision. Affleck was always a good worker and found employment easily. He believed he did not need more education until children arrived on the scene and he could not help them with their homework. For years, Affleck was convinced people thought he could read until a good friend suggested he take advantage of a literacy tutor. After two years with a tutor, Affleck experienced a dramatic change – he could read and enjoyed it, but most of all he realized that with a little more effort he could finally complete high school.

Romain Audet - Québec

When he began his literacy journey at the Saint-Prosper Centre d'éducation des adultes, Romain Audet could read and write a little; his math skills were non-existent. This led him to be extremely shy around others. After a while, his taste for learning grew, as did his self-confidence. His progress now enables him to go to the library, make a budget and use tools such as grammar books, dictionaries and the computer to upgrade his skills. Audet has also formed new friendships and varied his hobbies, which allows him to enjoy life more within his circle of friends. In short, as he himself says, "My life has changed. I'm no longer alone. I feel good about myself!"

Gordon Li – Saskatchewan

When Gordon Li came to Canada more than 20 years ago, he was fluent in Chinese and Russian but had few English skills. He attended community-based literacy programs, including those at the Regina Public Library, Regina Open Door Society, the Lifelong Learning Centre and the Regina Literacy Network. He considers society to be his classroom. Li is dedicated to promoting learning and literacy engagement among adult learners. He is a peer tutor, a volunteer interpreter and assists immigrant entrepreneurs. He is currently a learner leader and the treasurer for the Regina Literacy Network as well as a member of Saskatchewan Literacy Network's provincial speakers' bureau and adult learner focus committee. In 2010, Li received *Celebrating Seniors*, the first provincial senior volunteer award.

Doris Roberts - Yukon

Doris Roberts is an elder of the Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in from Dawson City. She has made it her life's work to study, recover and teach her traditional Hän language. Upon returning to her family after residential school, Roberts worked hard to re-learn the language she had not been allowed to speak. She then began teaching others. Roberts also played a pivotal role in recovering Hän language and songs that had been entrusted to the Tanacross of Alaska. Her teaching now includes songs, stories and performances that had been missing for 100 years. The Tr'ondëk Hwëch'in now perform these traditional songs at their gatherings. Because of Roberts' efforts and dedication to the Hän language, community members are hopeful that Hän will once again be a strong and vibrant language, and a strong part of their culture.

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Contractor Named for New Hay River Health Centre

YELLOWKNIFE (July 27, 2012) -- The Departments of Health and Social Services, Public Works and Services and the Hay River Health and Social Service Authority are pleased to announce the award of the contract for the design and construction of the new Health Centre in Hay River.

The project has been awarded to a local firm, Arctic Canada Construction LTD, in partnership with Bird Design Build Construction Inc. This partnership will combine knowledge of design and construction in northern communities with professional resources and skilled trades personnel to create a Health Centre that will meet the needs of Hay River and surrounding communities for the next 50 years.

The new Health Centre will be a state of the art facility that will provide primary care, acute and emergency care services and medical/surgical day care. It will also offer rehabilitation, dialysis, diagnostic and lab services, and a range of support services, including food services, laundry, maintenance, material management, medical records and pharmacy.

The operational planning and functional programming are complete for the new Health Centre. The next step will be finalization of the schematic design this fall, which will pave the way for work on the foundation to commence in the spring. It is anticipated that there will be a three year design and construction period, with the new Centre opening its doors in the fall of 2015.

The Minister of Health and Social Services, Tom Beaulieu and MLAs for Hay River, Jane Groenewegen and Robert Bouchard, invite residents of Hay River to attend a public meeting at the community hall in Hay River at 7 p.m. on August 13th, 2012 for a presentation on this exciting project and the plans for the next phases of development.

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2012-2017 Species Status Assessment Schedule Released

YELLOWKNIFE (July 30, 2012) – The 2012-2017 schedule identifying species to be assessed to determine if they are at risk has been released by the Northwest Territories (NWT) Species at Risk Committee.

The Species at Risk Committee reviews the species status assessment schedule every year and revises it as needed.

Species scheduled for assessment in 2012 are Peary Caribou, Hairy Braya, Polar Bear, and Boreal Woodland Caribou. In 2013, species scheduled for assessment are Barrenground Caribou, Dolphin-Union Caribou, and Northern Leopard Frog. Species were prioritized for status assessment using a checklist of the following six factors: uniqueness; trends; community concern; rarity; threats; and percentage in the NWT.

More species are scheduled for assessment in 2014-2017.

The Species at Risk Committee, established by the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act*, is an independent committee of experts responsible for assessing the biological status of species at risk in the NWT. The Committee will use the assessments to make recommendations on the listing of species at risk. The assessment categories are Extinct, Extirpated, Endangered, Threatened, Special Concern, Not at Risk, and Data Deficient.

Species Status Assessment Backgrounder

- The Species at Risk (NWT) Act provides a process to identify, protect and recover species at risk in the NWT. The Act applies to any wild animal, plant or other species managed by the Government of the Northwest Territories. It does not apply to fish, marine mammals or migratory birds. It applies everywhere in the NWT, on both public and private lands, including private lands owned under a land claims agreement.
- The Species at Risk Committee (SARC), established by the Species at Risk (NWT) Act, is an independent committee of up to 15 experts responsible for assessing the biological status of species at risk in the NWT.
- Species status assessment will be done at the territorial level, and the results may be different from assessments done at the national level. Assessments will be based on species status reports that include the best available traditional, community and scientific knowledge of the species.
- Status assessments are scheduled to be done on 25 species between 2012 and 2017.
- Species were ranked in order of priority for assessment using a checklist of the following six criteria:
 - Uniqueness How distinct or special it is; species are given higher priority than subspecies and subspecies are given higher priority than distinct populations.

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
- Trends A species whose numbers, or amount of habitat, are showing a decline is a higher priority than a species with stable or increasing populations or habitat.
- Community concern Species with a high level of community concern in the NWT are given a high priority.
- Rarity A species with one small population in the NWT is higher priority than a species that is abundant.
- Threats A species with threats affecting more than half the population is a higher priority than a species with threats of minor or no impact.
- Percentage in NWT A species found only in the NWT is a higher priority than a species that is widespread.

Assessment Categories

SARC recommends each species assessed be placed in one of the following status categories:

- Extinct no longer exists anywhere;
- Extirpated no longer exists in the wild in the NWT;
- Endangered facing imminent extirpation or extinction;
- Threatened likely to become endangered if nothing is done;
- **Special Concern** may become endangered or threatened because of threats and biological factors;
- Not at Risk not currently at risk of extinction; or
- **Data Deficient** not enough information to determine status.

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Richard Hardy Receives the Diamond Jubilee Medal

The Honourable Glen Abernethy and the Honourable Ethel Blondin-Andrew, Chairperson of the Sahtu Secretariat, presented the Diamond Jubilee Medal to Mr. Hardy.

This commemorative medal has been created by the Government of Canada to recognize the outstanding contributions and achievements of 60,000 deserving Canadians of all ages and from all walks of life. 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Aviation Scholarships Awarded

YELLOWKNIFE (August 14, 2012) — Seven scholarships under the Aviation Career Development Program (ACDP) have been awarded to first-time recipients in the first intake of the 2012-2013 school year. ACDP helps support NWT students to pursue careers in the NWT's aviation industry.

The \$5,000 scholarships are funded by the Department of Transportation in partnership with Discovery Air, First Air, Keewatin Air, and North-Wright Airways. The Government of Nunavut's Department of Economic Development and Transportation funds a further six scholarships for residents of Nunavut. The intake for Nunavummiut applicants has been extended to September 28, 2012.

This is the 12th year of the program. To date, half a million dollars in scholarships have been awarded to help pay for aviation-related education and training.

Minister of Transportation David Ramsay congratulated the seven recipients, all first-time applicants. "Each of these candidates demonstrated an interest in entering the vital aviation field, as well as a commitment to return to the North when they are finished their training and education," he said. "The future of the northern aviation industry depends on young people from the North receiving the training and experience they need to play their role as pilots, maintenance engineers, operations specialists, and aviation managers."

As an Aviation Career Development Program partner, the Department of Transportation contributes up to \$30,000 per year to improve skills for northern workers in the NWT aviation industry. Encouraging people to enter or remain in the workforce is a priority of the 17th Legislative Assembly.

I have already been impressed by her creative approaches to resolving issues, and I look forward to working with her in this new role. Ms. Watters recently won the Dave Ramsden Public Service Award for Career Excellence for her 34 years of public service, with impressive contributions to Health and Social Services, Education, and, most recently, Justice.

The Department of Justice's mandate is to administer justice, including policing and corrections in the Northwest Territories. This mandate will be carried out in a manner that respects community and aboriginal values and encourages communities to assume increasing responsibilities.

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Watch out! Bison Season Has Begun

YELLOWKNIFE (August 15, 2012) -- Drive with extra caution: that's the message for drivers on highways 3, 5, and 7 from mid-August until mid-December. The additional caution is required because more than 75% of bison collisions in the Northwest Territories occur during this four-month period.

"Watching for bison, bears, moose, wolves, fox, and other animals on NWT roads is a year-round requirement," says Transportation Minister David Ramsay. "Drivers in bison country must be particularly cautious at this time of the year because of the much higher rate of collisions. We can all do more to avoid collisions and injuries on our roads and trails."

Each year, an average of 20 collisions with bison are reported to police in the Northwest Territories, and on average, two people are injured each year. The last fatality was in 2009, when a passenger who was not wearing a seat belt was involved in a bison collision on Highway 3.

Drive Alive, the road and trail safety information program of the Government of Northwest Territories, reminds drivers that collisions with bison and other animals are avoidable if you take three steps to protect yourself and your passengers:

- 1. Watch for movement on the highway and in the right-of-way. Ask your passengers to help you watch out for bison and other animals.
- 2. Drive at a speed appropriate for road and weather conditions. Reduce speed at dusk and during the night, particularly on Highway 3.
- 3. Whenever possible, drive on highways 3, 5, and 7 during daylight hours only, before dusk.

If you are involved in a bison collision, your best chance to avoid injuries or death is to ensure everyone in your vehicle is securely buckled up. Drivers should carry a satellite phone or SPOT locater device whenever they drive between NWT communities.

A third of all bison collisions on Highway 3 occur on the Yellowknife side of Frank's Channel Bridge. Half of all collisions occur on each side of km. 165, the approximate mid-point of the highway. This means that the entire highway from the Mackenzie River to the outskirts of Yellowknife is bison country, and extra caution must be exercised throughout the length of the highway.

Similarly, drivers on Highways 5 and 7 must be aware of the potential of bison on and near the highway at all times.

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Gwich'in Forest Management Plan Signed in Fort McPherson

FORT MCPHERSON (August 16, 2012) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT), the Gwich'in Tribal Council (GTC) and the Gwich'in Renewable Resources Board (GRRB) signed the Gwichi'n Forest Management Plan: A Framework for Forest Management in the Gwich'in Settlement Area in Fort McPherson this morning.

The plan was signed by GTC President Robert A. Alexie, NWT Minister of Environment and Natural Resources (ENR) J. Michael Miltenberger and GRRB Interim Chair Eugene Pascal.

"We hope this important milestone will be matched by other productive joint initiatives in the near future. We don't want to lose sight of the forest for the trees," said GTC President Alexi. "The fact that our first agreement is a Forestry Management Plan is a good sign. It's our intention to focus on the big picture in the days to come."

He also expressed thanks to GTC staff who worked on the tripartite initiative.

"We want to congratulate the GTC Lead, Director LRI Norman Snowshoe, Jozef Carnogursky, LR Technical Advisor, and Mardy Semmler, Lands Manager, for all their hard work and a successful outcome."

"Forest resources play and important role in the lives of the Gwich'in people - providing fuelwood, wildlife habitat, food plants, medicine, economic opportunities and spiritual and cultural benefits," added ENR Minister Miltenberger. "This plan is an important step in cooperative and collaborative forest management between Government of the Northwest Territories and the Gwich'in people."

The Gwich'in Forest Management Plan covers a number of key areas including: forest protection, forest health, commercial harvesting; harvesting for personal use; tree clearing for development activities; sustainable harvest levels; harvest of non-timber forest products and, conservation zones.

It identifies concerns and outlines solutions to guide forest-related activities in the Gwich'in Settlement Area for the wise management and protection of forests.

Implementation of the forest management plan includes the development of five-year work plan to address concerns and solutions contained in it.

The process to develop the plan began in 1995 in accordance with the Gwich'in Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement.





Gwich'in Forest Management Plan Backgrounder

- The Gwich'in Comprehensive Land Claim Agreement (GCLCA) provides for collaboration in the management of natural resources.
- Under the GCLCA, the Gwich'in Renewable Resources Board (GRRB) has the power to approve forest management plans and policies within the Settlement Area.
- Forests in the Gwich'in Settlement Area are on Crown Land and Gwich'in Private Land.
- The GNWT has territorial legislative jurisdiction over forest management in the Gwich'in Settlement Area (GSA). Forest harvest activities in the NWT are regulated through the NWT Forest Management Act.
- Forest harvest activities may also be subject to the *Mackenzie Valley Resources* management Act, the federal Fisheries Act and the Environmental Protection Act.
- A Forest Advisory Committee with representatives the Gwich'in Tribal Council (GTC), GRRB and Department of Environment and Natural Resources (ENR) was formed in 2000 to complete a framework for a management plan for the area.
- The Forest Management Plan will guide forestry activities in the GSA.
- It addresses community concerns regarding the level of commercial timber harvest, fuelwood harvesting, forest protection and tourism.
- It also identifies key issues for forest management in the GSA. Current status, concerns and priorities for directed action have been identified in the following areas: commercial tree harvesting; tree harvesting for personal use; sustainable harvest levels; development activities; conservation zones; forest protection; including forest protection; forest health; forest renewal; harvest of non-timber products; wildlife; heritage resources and traditional knowledge.
- The plan is a living document. It will be updated periodically to reflect current status and issues raised by communities. It will be reviewed every five years.







Celebrating the Life of Catherine Beaulieu Bouvier Lamoureux

FORT PROVIDENCE (August 17, 2012) – Catherine Beaulieu Bouvier Lamoureux will be celebrated as a National Historic Person this weekend.

Ms. Lamoureux is the first NWT woman to receive this designation from the Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada.

"We remember Catherine and honour her memory by carrying on her work and the things she stood for: the family and the community," said Premier Bob McLeod. "We can be especially proud that in Catherine's case oral histories were used to recognize her as a person of national historic significance. This has never been done before by the National Historic Sites and Monuments Board of Canada. It is a testament to Catherine's legacy that she was able to speak to us across the generations and that the importance of oral traditions to the indigenous cultures of the NWT are being recognized."

"The work which brought us to this commemoration required countless hours of time which spanned over decades with the contributions and accounts of many," said Albert Lafferty, President of the Fort Providence Métis Council. "On another level it offers us a glimpse in time which goes back for generations, and into centuries past when the early explorers and newcomers were venturing into the Northwest of what was to develop and later become Canada. It is also about our adaptation, emergence as a new culture, while bearing in mind the sacrifices, endurance and early contributions which were made to our country."

The nomination was made by the Fort Providence Métis Council, which will be hosting celebrations all weekend and unveiling a plaque to emphasize the important role culture plays in shaping our territory.

As a woman of energy and ability and a caregiver, Catherine Beaulieu Bouvier Lamoureux stands as an iconic figure among the Métis of Fort Providence and the Mackenzie Basin. She is still revered as the "old mother of all of us," an outstanding inspiration and role model to her people as *Kokum Baie*, "one who gives and sustains life," and *Ehtsu Naats'i*, "Grandmother of the winds," referring to her great abilities as a traveller.

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Canadian Zinc and Government of Northwest Territories Advance Co-operation on Prairie Creek Mine Development

Premier, Ministers, and Dehcho Grand Chief Visit Prairie Creek Mine Canadian Zinc and Department of Transportation Sign Collaboration Agreement

Yellowknife, NWT, August 28, 2012 – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) continues to advance its co-operation with Canadian Zinc Corporation ("CZN") to further the August 2011 Socio-Economic Agreement between GNWT and Canadian Zinc with regard to the development of the Prairie Creek Mine.

On August 13th, 2012 Hon. Bob McLeod, Premier of the NWT, together with David Ramsay, Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment and Glen Abernethy, Minister of Justice and Human Resources, were accompanied by Herb Norwegian, Grand Chief of the Dehcho First Nations (DCFN) on a visit to the Prairie Creek Mine. They toured the facilities and witnessed the increased site activities as the mine moves forward toward production.

The Premier, Ministers, and Grand Chief were particularly interested in the ongoing training programs for the local residents of the region. The Government of the Northwest Territories has committed financial and in-kind support toward the Prairie Creek Mine's *More than a Silver Lining* training program. The \$4.2 million Silver Lining training program is funded by the Government of Canada and managed by the Mine Training Society, in partnership with CZN and the GNWT.

The Dehcho First Nations also supports the program through the provision of an income allowance for all DCFN members participating in the training. **Herb Norwegian, Grand Chief of the Dehcho First Nations** commenting on the Aboriginal training programs said: "Here is an opportunity to get some education and get to work. It's the first step to working your way to the top."

So far in 2012 the local Silver Lining training program has trained 62 individuals, with many of the graduates joining the staff at the Prairie Creek Mine, Canadian Zinc's Fort Simpson office, or service providers to the Project. These training programs included Office Administration, Mineral Exploration Field Assistant, Environmental Monitors, Heavy Equipment Operators, Diamond Drill Helper, Advance Medical First Responder, and Camp Cook.

Following the visit to Prairie Creek, Canadian Zinc and the GNWT Department of Transportation signed a Collaboration Agreement to ensure effective co-operation

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related to the public transportation infrastructure that will support the Prairie Creek Mine project.

Transportation Minister David Ramsay says the Collaboration Agreement will help ensure that both public needs and mine activities are supported. "We have agreed to work closely with Canadian Zinc to ensure public safety by identifying areas of Highway 7 and the Nahanni Butte access road that require enhancement or upgrading," he said. "This co-operation will help the Department to plan future work on these roads to maintain and enhance these roads effectively."

Canadian Zinc plans to use the existing Northwest Territories public transportation system to bring goods, fuel and equipment by road to the Mine and to transport its mineral products from the Mine to world markets. As part of this collaborative agreement, to assist in priority setting, CZN will provide reports to the Department of Transportation on its anticipated road transportation requirements for the construction and operation of the Prairie Creek Mine.

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

Department of Transportation Recognized for Innovative Management

YELLOWKNIFE (AUGUST 29, 2012) – The Department of Transportation (DOT) has been recognized for innovative management by the Institute of Public Administration of Canada (IPAC). DOT was one of nine national finalists for the IPAC/IBM Award for Innovative Management for its *New Aboriginal Engagement Processes for Planning Major Infrastructure Projects*. The submission, which was for planning and consultation work required for the Mackenzie Valley Highway Project, came in second overall. This is the second IPAC/IBM Award for Innovative Management for the Government of Northwest Territories in the past seven years. This project shared information and knowledge with Aboriginal governments and helped build capacity within Aboriginal governments and at the community level.

Through the Aboriginal Engagement Strategy, "Respect, Recognition and Responsibility", the GNWT is committed to principles and action to strengthen and renew relationships with Aboriginal government partners through projects such as the Mackenzie Valley Highway. The strategy commits the territorial government to be open, flexible, and responsive in working with the diverse governance structures of regional Aboriginal governments and in understanding the unique interests and challenges of each region and community.

Premier Bob McLeod congratulated the department for its recognition. "The Government of Northwest Territories is continually seeking ways to improve our engagement of our Aboriginal stakeholders and partners," he said. "This initiative, which is focused on bringing Aboriginal governments and organizations into the decision-making process, has now been recognized nationally as a model for best practices in Aboriginal consultation and engagement."

Minister of Transportation David Ramsay was pleased. "The department, led by Mackenzie Valley Highway Director Jim Stevens, developed effective partnerships with Aboriginal governments and organizations along the proposed right-of-way to develop project description reports for the highway," he said. "We expect those partnerships will continue to grow, ensuring that the people and communities benefitting from the construction of the Mackenzie Valley Highway will be key participants in its planning and construction."

The Department established partnerships with land claim groups and organizations to lead, develop, and manage the project description reports for sections of the proposed Mackenzie Valley Highway within their regions (Dehcho, Tulita District of the Sahtu, K'ahsho Got'ine District of the Sahtu, Gwich'in Settlement Area). The reports are used to initiate the environmental assessment of the project, and provide an overview level of terrain, wildlife, vegetation and archaeology in the area where the highway and material sources are being considered.



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Transitional Rent Supplement Program

YELLOWKNIFE (August 29, 2012) – The Transitional Rent Supplement Program will begin on September 1. It supports low- to moderate-income residents in private market rental housing, and provides a rent subsidy of up to \$500 per month for two years.

"Our Shelter Policy Review showed that too many people were slipping through the cracks," said Minister Robert C. McLeod. "They don't qualify for public housing, but still struggle with housing costs. This program addresses housing challenges for the working poor. It will give them the help they need to get ahead and move into homeownership."

The Shelter Policy Review included broad-based engagement with Northerners, and resulted in <u>Building for the Future</u>, the NWT Housing Corporation's strategic plan. The Transitional Rent Supplement Program is a strategic priority under that plan. This approach builds on the successes and progress over the last several years, strengthens self-reliance and support for residents to meet their own shelter needs, and recognizes the difference between market and non-market communities in designing Northern solutions.

Eligible applicants must be:


- 19 years or older
- Residents of the NWT for at least one year
- Living in private market rental housing
- Paying more than 30% of their income for shelter

Addressing housing needs by completing and implementing the Shelter Policy Review is a priority of the 17th Legislative Assembly. Following the Assembly's direction, the NWT Housing Corporation has also developed fair and sustainable public housing rent scales and is selling public housing stock where this makes sense and putting higher-density housing units in small communities.

Premier Meets with Dehcho First Nations Grand Chief

YELLOWKNIFE (August 31, 2012) – Premier Bob McLeod met with Dehcho First Nations Grand Chief Herb Norwegian on August 27. This was the first meeting between the two government leaders since Grand Chief Norwegian's election in June. The agenda included devolution, the *Wildlife Act*, land use, and the flood in Nahanni Butte.

"This was a productive meeting that set the tone for our continued government-to-government relationship and work toward a united and prosperous Northwest Territories," said Premier McLeod. "We can listen to each other in the spirit of respect, recognition and responsibility, and we can work together in the best interests of all of our people. The territorial government will continue to recognize and respect the constitutionally protected rights and treaty rights of Aboriginal peoples, as well as existing Aboriginal rights agreements."

"The moment has arrived to a make a deal on crucial issues so that we can all move on with our lives," said Grand Chief Herb Norwegian.

The 17th Legislative Assembly met as a caucus at Cli Lake near Fort Simpson from August 26-29, 2012. The Assembly's priorities are outlined under the theme *Believing in People and Building on the Strengths of Northerners*. A strong relationship between the territorial, Aboriginal and local governments will build a sustainable future for the Dehcho region and the rest of the territory. The GNWT and Dehcho First Nations share a vision of strong individuals, families and communities sharing the benefits and responsibilities of a unified, environmentally sustainable and prosperous Northwest Territories. Both governments are committed to self-government and sustainable economic development while maintaining the integrity of the land and Aboriginal traditions.

NTPC Takes Action on Yellowknife Power Outages

September 4, 2012 – Hay River, NT – Northwest Territories Power Corporation has begun implementing a comprehensive, multi-pronged action plan to address the recurring issue of power outages in the Yellowknife area.

"NTPC is committed to providing safe and reliable power to the residents of the NWT," says Emanuel DaRosa, president and CEO of NTPC. "We are attacking the issue of outages from every angle in order to be sure we are providing the level of service that we, the GNWT and residents expect."

He said NTPC's plan will build on success the corporation has had in recent times using new technology to prevent outages caused by birds at the Jackfish generating plant in Yellowknife.

"The new bird and rodent deterrent system installed at Jackfish this year has been successful in preventing outages from what used to be a frequent source of problems in the past," DaRosa said.

He said NTPC is quickly moving forward on a number of fronts at the same time. For example, NTPC has hired a contractor to begin clearing trees and brush along the entire 30-kilometre length of the Bluefish transmission line, work that will be done in conjunction with a foot patrol of the line to look for damage to wires or towers that may be causing outages.

NTPC also plans to hire a contractor with a special infrared and corona detecting camera to fly the entire transmission system in a helicopter to look for hot spots or electrical discharges.

DaRosa said NTPC is also actively addressing the issue of outages related to lightning strikes on the high-voltage transmission lines, the cause of more than twice as many outages in 2012 as the previous year.

"Lightning, once an infrequent occurrence in the NWT, has been occurring more frequently and later in the summer," he said. "We are examining our entire system, not just Yellowknife, to determine what can be done to address this serious issue."

He said Inuvik, where lightning was extremely rare, has experienced two outages this summer caused by lightning strikes.

In the meantime, NTPC is installing additional lightning protection where required throughout the network, DaRosa said.



He said NTPC is also looking at how equipment and staff respond to events with a view to improving how to manage issues that could result in outages.

"We're conducting a protection coordination study to contain and minimize the impact of line faults and lightning strikes," he said. "We're also planning to undertake a stability study to ensure that when there are faults or lightning strikes, our generators respond as smoothly as possible to avoid issues that could cause the system to black out."

"NTPC can't promise to prevent every outage," he said. "I can commit that we will do our utmost to improve system reliability."

He said Yellowknife and the NWT in general are more vulnerable to outages than other parts of Canada because they aren't connected to the North American transmission grid.

"When a transmission line, such as the Snare line, feeding 80 per cent of the power to Yellowknife, is damaged, we must replace it with diesel-generated electricity, but we can't reroute power around that line or supply customers from other sources already on the system, like they can in other parts of Canada," DaRosa said. "That's just a fact of life in the North at this point."

VANCOUVER (September 5, 2012) -- Premier Bob McLeod and Minister of Environment and Natural Resources Michael Miltenberger are attending the Rosenberg International Forum on Water Policy, the preeminent forum for water policy study. Premier McLeod will speak about the NWT's approach to collaborative management of natural resources and balanced, sustainable development. This approach creates economic opportunities for the people of the NWT while ensuring northern conservation priorities are met. Minister Miltenberger will speak about the NWT Water Stewardship Strategy, which aims to keep the waters of the Northwest Territories clean, abundant, and productive for all time.

"I grew up on the Mackenzie River and I've seen first-hand how development in the south can affect our Northern waters," said Premier McLeod. "The Mackenzie River Basin has global significance and our government is committed to seeing its ecological values preserved while sustainably developing our resources to create benefits and opportunities for Northwest Territories residents in their communities and regions."

"Water is life in the Northwest Territories," said Minister Miltenberger. "We are working with our partners to ensure we have integrated watershed management. I look forward to hearing from the experts at the forum. We all have a role to play in ensuring that NWT waters are sustained for human use and that northern ecosystems remain healthy and diverse."

The forum will convene at Simon Fraser University September 5-7, 2012 and will identify legal and scientific principles relevant to the processes leading ultimately to a coordinated Mackenzie Basin-wide approach to management, as well as prioritize knowledge gaps. The forum is co-hosted by the Walter and Duncan Gordon Foundation and SFU's Adaptation to Climate Change Team (ACT).

The Government of the Northwest Territories' <u>Aboriginal Engagement Strategy</u> commits the territorial government to continue to work with Aboriginal governments to ensure responsible stewardship over NWT lands, water and air.



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GWICH'IN TRIBAL COUNCIL RE-JOINS DEVOLUTION NEGOTIATIONS

YELLOWNIFE (September 13, 2012) – The Gwich'in Tribal Council (GTC) has signed the Devolution Agreement-in-Principle (AiP) and will rejoin the negotiations to transfer Crown land and resource management responsibilities from the Government of Canada to the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT).

The President of the Gwich'in Tribal Council, Robert A. Alexie, called the signing of the Agreement-in Principle a bold first step. "This historic undertaking creates a new partnership to foster economic stability and political security in the Gwich'in Settlement Region and throughout the Territory. For too long we have dealt with uncertainty and a lack of clear direction. Our people are ready to build on their hard-won past accomplishments and join the global community as equal partners. Today we look to further progress with confidence and faith in the process."

"I am pleased to welcome the Gwich'in back to the table to ensure that the voices and priorities of their people are reflected in this historic agreement," said Premier Bob McLeod. "The GTC was an important participant in shaping the AIP for almost ten years and we welcome them back to the devolution negotiation table. When we work together, we can make sure we negotiate the best possible devolution agreement for all NWT residents and governments."

"We are pleased that our neighbours, the Gwich'in Tribal Council, have signed on to the Agreement-in-Principle and we look forward to working with them in the future," said Nellie Cournoyea, Chair and CEO of Inuvialuit Regional Corporation (IRC). "The participation of the Gwich'in will provide additional strength for the position of Aboriginal governments in these important negotiations, as we work towards a devolution agreement that will benefit all regions of the NWT."

The AIP includes a number of provisions that directly benefit the Gwich'in, including:

- A seat at the table to negotiate the final agreement to ensure that Gwich'in concerns and interests are addressed, along with funding to support Gwich'in participation.
- A share of resource revenues from Crown land, in addition to the revenues the Gwich'in already collect from development on Crown land throughout the Mackenzie Valley.

NWT lands and resources devolution will transfer administrative authority and control over public lands, resources and rights in respect of water in the Northwest Territories from the Government of Canada to the GNWT. After devolution, the GNWT will be responsible for the management of public lands, resources and rights in respect of water in the NWT, including the delivery of related public programs, and will have the right to keep a share of the resource

development royalties collected on NWT public lands. The GNWT has agreed to share up to 25% of its royalties with NWT Aboriginal governments – a sharing unprecedented in Canada. The governments of Canada, the NWT, GTC, IRC, Northwest Territory Métis Nation and Sahtu Secretariat Incorporated are currently in the final stage of devolution negotiations. Negotiations are expected to conclude in 2012.


The 2012 Trade Mission to China is an initiative of the <u>Council of the Federation (COF)</u>. Objectives include:

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
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Statement of Condolence to the Family of Peter Lougheed, Former Premier of Alberta, From Premier Bob McLeod

New Agreement Provides \$6 Million Investment in NWT Agriculture

YELLOWKNIFE (September 17, 2012) -- Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment David Ramsay has given his support to the multi-lateral Growing Forward 2 Agreement for Agriculture. This sets the stage for bilateral negotiations to take place between the federal and territorial governments on a new five-year joint funding agreement for agriculture in the NWT. Ministers of Agriculture and Agri-foods met in Whitehorse last week.

"Agriculture in the NWT has witnessed tremendous growth in interest and participation over the past number of years," said Minister Ramsay. "Almost all of our communities have seen the benefit of agriculture development and have expressed keen interest in seeing it continue."

Growing Forward 2 will provide up to \$1.2 million per year for the NWT agriculture sector over the next five years – a funding increase of almost \$500,000 per year.

"Increasing the supply of locally produced food, diversifying the food basket and lowering the cost of food for families are priorities for the NWT. This new agreement will go a long way toward helping us address these needs," Minister Ramsay said.



Premier McLeod Promotes NWT Tourism in China

SHANGHAI, CHINA (September 18, 2012) -- Premier Bob McLeod spoke at the Shanghai Tourism Bureau yesterday and at a Canadian Tourism Commission event in Beijing on Friday to promote the NWT as a spectacular destination for Chinese visitors.

"We offer authentic cultural getaways," said Premier McLeod. "The Northwest Territories offers you a true wilderness experience, away from the hustle and bustle of the city. You can get out of our capital city with a five-minute cab ride from your hotel, and be cross country skiing on a remote frozen lake or hiking in the woods. Or you can take a bush plane or a boat to get further into the wilderness."

Premier McLeod is promoting the NWT as an ideal tourist destination for Chinese visitors. A representative of the territory's tourism industry is participating in the trade mission to build relationships with business contacts in China and increase Chinese tourism to all regions of the NWT. Chinese tourism added \$1.5 million to the NWT economy in 2011.

China is Canada's fastest-growing tourism market, and travel to Canada has increased dramatically since China granted Canada Approved Destination Status in 2010. This means Canada can actively market in four main Chinese cities, making this the time for the NWT to capitalize on increased Chinese interest. Chinese tourists are especially interested in the NWT's Aboriginal cultures, wilderness experiences, and outdoor adventures.

The 2012 Trade Mission to China is an initiative of the <u>Council of the Federation (COF)</u>. Objectives include:



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Territorial Justice Ministers Work Together on Northern Issues

WHITEHORSE (September 18, 2012) — Territorial justice ministers Mike Nixon of Yukon, Glen Abernethy of Northwest Territories, and Daniel Shewchuk of Nunavut met today in Whitehorse to discuss justice and public safety issues of particular concern to the North.

As host, Nixon shared some of his department's recent successes and innovations including the establishment of the Yukon Police Council, the Justice Wellness Centre, and Yukon's integrated offender management program.

"I was pleased to share these important Yukon initiatives with my territorial counterparts," Nixon said. "I believe that by sharing innovations and best practices with our sister territories we can improve the administration of justice for all northerners."

In preparation for the upcoming federal, provincial, territorial justice ministers meeting the territorial ministers discussed mutual concerns, such as the high cost of administering justice in the North, the need for more legal aid funding, and the effect that federal changes to the Criminal Code will have on Aboriginal and northern communities.

"As territorial ministers we need to work together to help our federal colleagues understand the specific challenges involved in delivering justice services in the North, and the important role to be played by Ottawa in addressing these challenges," Abernethy said.

The ministers also took the opportunity to tour the new Whitehorse Correctional Centre.

"I was very impressed with Yukon's new correctional centre. The state of the art design and direct supervision model at the Whitehorse Correctional Centre is something Nunavut has tried to reproduce in our new facility in Rankin Inlet," Shewchuk said. "Yukon's experience and knowledge will continue to be a valuable resource when the Rankin facility opens."

Following the meeting, the ministers will attend the Symposium on Policing in Northern and Remote Canada in Whitehorse on September 19 and 20.

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Minister Beaulieu Returns From the Canada Northwest Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder Meeting

YELLOWKNIFE (September 19, 2012) – Minister of Health and Social Services Tom Beaulieu attended the Canada Northwest Fetal Alcohol Spectrum Disorder (FASD) Partnership Ministers' Meeting on September 14 and 15 in Saskatoon. The meeting, chaired by Saskatchewan Social Services Minister June Draude, celebrated the achievements of the Partnership and discussed its future.

"FASD is 100% preventable, but all of us still find it difficult to diagnose and to estimate the true magnitude of the problem in our jurisdictions," said Minister Beaulieu. "We still have to rely on rough estimates of how many people are actually affected by FASD. We need more accurate information to ensure that what we are doing prevents FASD and makes a difference in the lives of people who are already affected by it."

Ministers from western provinces and territories reviewed the annual report and provided feedback and direction to the partnership's research network. A number of speakers shared their knowledge on topics such as FASD prevalence and economic impacts.

Ministers also agreed to extend an invitation to their eastern provincial colleagues and to the federal government to attend the first international conference on prevention of FASD, to be held in Alberta in September 2013.

"Prevention is the most important thing we can do to eliminate FASD," said Minister Beaulieu. "Communities have the answers we need to address the issue. As I move forward with the Minister's Forum on Addictions, I hope to hear their suggestions."

The NWT has been a member of the Canada Northwest FASD Partnership since 1999. The partnership is an alliance of seven jurisdictions that works toward the development and promotion of an interprovincial and inter-territorial approach to FASD prevention, intervention, care and support.

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Premier and NWT Business Representatives Explore Opportunities in China

HONG KONG, CHINA (September 20, 2012) – Premier Bob McLeod, MLA Robert Hawkins, Chair of the Standing Committee on Economic Development and Infrastructure, and the NWT business delegation met with potential Chinese investors and business partners to discuss ways to diversify the NWT economy and keep the territory prosperous. The meetings have focused on the potential for developing the Chinese markets for the NWT's wild fur, oil and gas.

"Relationships and transparency are key to Chinese investors," said Premier McLeod. "Every meeting we've had has focused on building relationships with Canadians and Canadian companies. We have spoken about how Chinese investment could strengthen and diversify our economy: investments in hydro initiatives, socially responsible and environmentally sustainable mining, and the NWT's traditional economy will provide all communities and regions with opportunities and choices. I share their desire to maintain relationships with political and business leaders; it has been key to my approach as Premier and it will benefit all sectors of the NWT economy. We've seen good interest in our oil and gas resources and our mineral resources, including some positive developments for Avalon Resources. And I'm pleased about the excitement I've seen here about NWT wild furs."

China is the world's lead manufacturer of fur garments and has a high demand for the NWT's natural, high-end wild fur. NWT fur is always in high demand at auctions, with China as one of the top buyers. Demand from China has been increasing year after year, with buyers interested in mink, marten, arctic fox and red fox.

While in Hong Kong, Premier McLeod and the NWT delegation have held meetings with representatives of the tourism, financial, and jewelry industries. The premier also participated in a briefing with Canada's Consul General and in a wreath-laying ceremony at Sai Wan War Ceremony.

Earlier this week, Premier McLeod witnessed an agreement signed between the NWT's Ice Wireless, Iristel and Huawei Canada to enter into a multi-year, multi-million contract to provide 3G cellular services to rural and remote communities in the Northwest Territories and toured the Huawei research and development facility. Improved access to broadband Internet would significantly improve health, education and business services throughout the Mackenzie Valley, and pursuing investments in a Mackenzie Fibreoptic Link is a priority for the 17th Legislative Assembly.

The Premier also visited the Suntech solar panel manufacturing facility in Shanghai. Suntech is a world-leading solar energy company that designs, develops, manufactures and markets high-output, cost-effective solar products for electric power applications.

Exploring the use of environmentally-friendly alternative energy solutions is part of the Government of the Northwest Territories' ongoing commitment to reducing our dependence on imported diesel and lowering our greenhouse gas emissions.

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NWT Furs Achieve Highest Sales in Over 20 Years

YELLOWKNIFE (September 25, 2012) -- <u>Genuine Mackenzie Valley Fur</u> sales totaled over \$1.5 million this year, the highest in over 20 years. This is an increase of over 25% in the last year, and is a result of increased demand from buyers in China, Russia, Greece and Turkey.

"NWT trappers provide excellent furs for sale at auction and have earned our territory a well-deserved reputation as a provider of some of the best wild furs in the world," said Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment David Ramsay. "I want to congratulate our trappers for continuing to supply a high-quality product resulting in the highest sales in over two decades, and encourage them to continue to provide top-quality furs for sale next season."

Demand for muskrat and fox continues to exceed supply at auction, and many species experienced gains over last year's prices. This includes marten (41% increase), muskrat (33% increase), and fox (25% increase).

The Genuine Mackenzie Valley Fur program is a GNWT marketing service for hunters and trappers. All proceeds from fur sold at auction through the program go directly to the hunter or trapper. Participants receive a guaranteed advance fur payment, prime fur bonuses, and a grubstake payment for those who ship a high volume of pelts through the program.

By actively supporting the harvesting and marketing of wild fur, the GNWT is taking action to diversify the economy and provide all communities and regions with opportunities and choices, key goals of the 17th Legislative Assembly.

Northwest Territories Recipients Honoured During Literacy Week

There are 4 Literacy Awards given out each year in the Northwest Territories (NWT).

The awards are advertised throughout the NWT using print media, emails, radio ads and the Department of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE) website. Once the nomination deadline has passed, a Ministerial Literacy Awards Selection Committee is formed of literacy experts from both the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and Nongovernment Organizations (NGO), to choose the winners. Nominees are scored using scoring templates, and the highest scoring nominees receive the awards.

Karra Dillon - Council of the Federation (CoF) Literacy Award. Announced earlier this summer, this is a special medallion awarded by the Council of the Federation in each of Canada's thirteen provinces and territories to celebrate outstanding literacy achievements. The award is customarily presented to an adult learner. Ms. Dillon is a young Inuvialuit woman who left school at an early age to start a family. In 2010, she returned to school in order to pursue a career, and enrolled in the Aboriginal Language and Cultural Instructor Program (ALCIP) at Aurora College in Inuvik. Ms. Dillon began the program as an emerging speaker and worked hard to become very skilled and fluent in Siglitun Inuvialuktun. Her love of her language and culture is also expressed through traditional drum dancing. Ms. Dillon plans to pursue additional upgrading toward her new goal of entering the Bachelor of Education Program.

Patrick Bailey - The Ministerial Literacy Award (Youth Learner). This award celebrates a young adult's commitment to literacy and honours their literacy achievements. Mr. Bailey entered into the Adult Literacy and Basic Education (ALBE) program at Aurora College's Norman Wells Community Learning Centre in 2010 and has made great strides in pursuit of improving his literacy skills. With a near perfect attendance record, Mr. Bailey's diligence and hard work ethic over the last academic year led to his acceptance into the Bachelor of Science program at Full Sail University in Florida.

Kate Powell and Lucinda Summers - The Ministerial Literacy Award (Educator). This award honours outstanding practitioners in the field of literacy. This year's recipients are the Literacy Coordinator and Program Support Teacher, respectively, at Deninu School in Fort Resolution. Ms. Powell's and Ms. Summers' strong leadership and dedication to literacy have seen many improvements to the community and the students, including a 16% drop in students on Student Support Programs and a more than 35% increase in students' literacy rates in the last two years. As a result of their efforts, all students are now reading at or above their grade level and parents and community members are fully engaged in literacy awareness.

Literacy Outreach Centre - The Ministerial Literacy Award (Organizations). This award recognizes a group's exceptional dedication to promoting and enhancing literacy in one or more of the NWT's eleven official languages. The Literacy Outreach Centre successfully provides programs that involve and engage adults with and without disabilities in Yellowknife. The

Literacy Outreach Centre partners with service providers, such as the Salvation Army, Centre for Northern Families' Women's Shelter, YWCA, Yellowknife Public Library, the Baker Centre and the Yellowknife Association for Community Living. These partnerships help deliver programming that applies adult learning principles which allow for individualized learning plans and have the flexibility to adapt measuring tools, support learner self-assessment and goal setting. The Outreach Centre has played a major role in developing the literacy, social and life skills of the city's marginalized, hard-to-reach adults and adults with disabilities over the past 12 years.

Coming Together to Prepare for Opportunities in the Sahtu

NORMAN WELLS (September 26, 2012) -- The Sahtu Exploration Readiness Session is taking place in Norman Wells this week, with over 100 representatives from industry, government, Aboriginal organizations and corporations, community leaders and small business in attendance to discuss and identify the best ways to prepare for the boom in exploration that will take place in the region over the coming years.

Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment David Ramsay addressed attendees at a luncheon earlier today. "We can work together to translate the potential in the Sahtu into jobs, investment, business growth, training opportunities, infrastructure development and growth for our communities and Aboriginal corporations," he noted. "We are all here today to ensure that the Canol shale oil play is understood and developed in a way that will become the new model for responsible and sustainable development and can be an economic legacy for the people of the Sahtu and Northwest Territories."

"The Sahtu is the sweet spot for energy in the North. I am pleased that ITI organized this forum to find out what the oil companies are planning this winter and future developments," said Norman Yakeleya, Sahtu MLA. "We are preparing ourselves, like our ancestors prepared themselves for hunting or trapping; we must survive."

The two-day session covers a range of topics that allows attendees to discuss and provide input on the many opportunities and possible challenges related to Sahtu development. Agenda topics range from maintaining a safe and healthy workforce, to local business preparedness, to the long-term potential and opportunity of shale oil development in the area.

Industry will be on hand to discuss the best ways to work together for a successful work season and exploring best practices for oil exploration.



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Family Violence Front-Line Workers Receive Valuable Training

YELLOWKNIFE (September 27, 2012) -- People who assist and support those affected by family violence have come together from across the Northwest Territories to receive training and information and learn from each other.

"Through our partnership with the Department of Health and Social Services, we have a commitment to quality training for front-line workers," said Justice Minister Glen Abernethy. "Through focused workshops like these, workers learn to be as effective as possible. Additionally, each person received a day-long presentation about how to ensure they are giving proper consideration to their own self-care, as we know the dangers of compassion fatigue run high in their lines of work."

The three-day training continues to fulfill recommendations from the <u>2011 evaluation of the *Protection*</u> <u>Against Family Violence Act</u>, as well as the GNWT's commitment to address how working with victims of crime affects workers both professionally and personally.

Front-line responders from the RCMP, shelter workers, and victim services heard from professionals on the nature of violence and the best ways to respond to victims and perpetrators. After learning best-practice concepts, participants were able to apply them in role-play through safety planning, victim impact statements and emergency protection order applications.

The main presenter, Dr. Allan Wade, spoke at École St. Patrick High School and to the public on September 24. These talks focused on the language people use when talking about violence and the effect that has on victims of violence and on offenders.

"We all need to be aware of the influence and impact of our words when we talk about the harm of spousal and partner assault," said Minister of Health and Social Services Tom Beaulieu. "It's not an abusive relationship, we need to call assault what it is. It's time to bring the issue of family violence into the light where we can talk and have people understand this is not just a personal family matter."

The GNWT continues to support and provide training opportunities for front-line workers so they are better able to assist victims of violence. Training and public presentations were made possible through the contributions and support of the Departments of Justice and Health and Social Services, the YWCA of Yellowknife, and the Native Women's Association of NWT.

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Reel Improvement in Film Industry Heralded at Yellowknife Film Fest

YELLOWKNIFE (September 27, 2012) -- The Yellowknife Film Festival kicks off tonight, and Minister David Ramsay will be in attendance – in film form – to give his congratulations to Western Arctic Moving Pictures and the NWT Professional Media Association on behalf of the NWT Film Commission. The NWT Film Commission will also be a panel member at the first-ever NWT Filmmaker and Producer Forum, to provide information about the commission and discuss what has been achieved in the past year.

The forum is supported in part by the Departments of Industry, Tourism and Investment and Education, Culture and Employment.

"We have been working closely with the NWT film industry to advance this industry and are pleased with the success we have achieved together in this year alone," said Minister of Industry, Tourism and Investment David Ramsay. "Although we realize there is much more to do, we will continue to work with the NWT film community to ensure this industry grows. This will strengthen and diversify the NWT economy with the work of our talented filmmakers while showcasing the NWT as a filming destination."

The Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment works through the NWT Film Commission to provide assistance to production companies filming in the NWT, and also to promote the local film industry through the <u>Film Suppliers Guide</u> and other initiatives. A dedicated fund of \$100,000 is available for the film industry through the <u>Support for Entrepreneurs and Development (SEED) Policy</u>, which was oversubscribed in its first year with several NWT filmmakers receiving funding for various film production and promotion activities.

"We have a strong mandate to help support and promote the arts and film communities in the NWT," said Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Jackson Lafferty. "It is imperative that we continue to provide opportunities for support and create open discussions on how best to accomplish our goals for the artists across the territory. Events like the NWT Filmmaker and Producer Forum help contribute to our rich cultural mosaic, and further assure our efforts to preserve and revitalize our collective heritage in the North."

The Department of Education, Culture and Employment supports training and careers in the arts and cultural industries, arts education, public access to and participation in the arts, and art creation through the NWT Arts Council and Northern Film and Media Arts Contributions programs.

The NWT was recently profiled in <u>The Location Guide</u>, a comprehensive online guide containing information for production companies looking for information on filming in various international locations.

Supporting programming for the NWT film industry is one way to maximize opportunities and support economic diversification of the NWT, a key goal of the 17th Legislative Assembly.

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COMPREHENSIVE CURRICULUM FIRST OF ITS KIND IN CANADA

YELLOWKNIFE (October 2, 2012) – A comprehensive curriculum on Residential Schools was launched today at the start of a three day information session for teachers from the Northwest Territories and Nunavut.

Launched by the Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment with the Government of the Northwest Territories and the Honourable Eva Aariak, Minister of Education with the Government of Nunavut at an opening ceremony, this curriculum is the first comprehensive teaching guide of its kind in Canada. Marie Wilson, Commissioner of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission, was on hand to receive the first copy of the teacher's guide and deliver the keynote address.

"A significant part of our history is in this curriculum," said Minister Lafferty. "The coursework and resources enclosed are the result of exhaustive research and provide a deeper understanding of the impacts of residential schools on the Aboriginal peoples of Canada. This will give our students insight into the challenges faced by survivors, and a context for healing and reconciliation."

With support from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC) and the Legacy of Hope Foundation, the Residential Schools curriculum is now a key section of the Northwest Territories Northern Studies course and the Nunavut Social Studies course. It covers topics ranging from the history and legacy of residential schools, traditional education and learning, colonialism, assimilation, the *Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement*, the Federal apology, the TRC and what reconciliation may look like. It also includes literature and stories of former residential school students shared through audio and video clips, allowing students to learn of both the positive and negative impacts that school life had on individuals.

"I hope this resource enables and challenges students to think about the past and the impact of education on the future," said Premier Eva Aariak. "This is the first time Nunavut and Northwest Territories have worked together on a project like this and this ground-breaking curriculum is the result of a strong partnership between our two territories."

The curriculum was piloted in March of 2012 with a select number of schools across the Northwest Territories and Nunavut.

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

Students were really moved by what happened to earlier generations at residential school. One student asked, "Why can't we just forget about it?"

I could tell that Shi-Shi-etko was a little emotional for a couple of the students so I decided to have students respond in their journals.

Can really see how the students are progressing and understanding this idea of loss and what was lost, identity. Starting to have some great conversations come out of these activities.

The audio files, timeline and essay all worked really well together. It led to a great discussion on the cultural/political context of colonization around the world. We talked about Africa and the mess that ensued there as a result of this time period, and I had the great question, "I thought the word aboriginal was only used in the Americas?"



Second Antipoverty Roundtable Held in Inuvik

INUVIK (October 5, 2012) – Building on the success of the June 2012 roundtable, the second antipoverty roundtable was held this week in Inuvik to further shape the Antipoverty Strategy. This strategy is a partnership between the Government of the Northwest Territories and Aboriginal governments, business, industry, non-profit and nongovernmental organizations.

At the roundtable in Inuvik this week, Minister Glen Abernethy and Alfred Moses, MLA Boot Lake, welcomed the group and acknowledged the importance of their work. Participants continued work on the foundation of the strategy, including the goals and actions that will make a difference in the lives of people who most need support. They discussed topics such as increasing affordable housing; providing supports to children, youth and families; and contributing to sustainable communities. The participants also focused on ways services can be integrated and seamless along a continuum that both prevents poverty and increases opportunities for self-sufficiency among those already living in poverty.

"Poverty is complex and requires a wide array of perspectives in order to address the challenges," said Gloria Iatridis, Associate Deputy Minister of Education, Culture and Employment and Chair of the *Poverty-Free NWT* Steering Committee. "By having a collaborative process and involving various stakeholders, we allow for those different views and ideas. Our biggest challenge is to narrow down the priorities."

"It is encouraging to see the commitment and goodwill around the table in this collaborative process," said Julie Green, a steering committee member representing the No Place for Poverty Alliance. "Regardless of the role and expertise of everyone at the table, each is passionate about addressing poverty and making life better for everyone in the NWT."



Colville Lake Celebrates Bigger and Better Airport

Colville Lake, Northwest Territories, October 9, 2012 — A celebration was held in Colville Lake to mark the completion of a new airport terminal and runway, built by the Government of Northwest Territories Department of Transportation with support from the Government of Canada and the community.

The longer and wider runway enables larger planes to land, which helps to reduce the cost of goods and supplies delivered to the area. As well, the relocation of the runway will free up land for community development. Thirty-four Colville Lake residents were hired to complete the work.

"Like many Northern communities, Colville Lake depends on its airport for the delivery of essential goods and services," said the Honourable Leona Aglukkaq, Minister of Health, Regional Minister for the North, and Member of Parliament for Nunavut. "Thanks to this new terminal, the Sahtu region will benefit from safer, more efficient transportation year-round. Our Government is proud to have invested in this important initiative that created local jobs and will serve Colville Lake residents now and into the future."

"Economic opportunities accompany infrastructure development, and the new airport at Colville Lake is an excellent example of this principle," said GNWT Transportation Minister David Ramsay. "As the Sahtu region continues to prepare for the development of its natural resources, investments in transportation infrastructure will provide ongoing benefits. Our partnership with the Government of Canada to build this airport will pay dividends for the community, the region, the NWT, and all Canadians."

This \$12.8-million initiative received financial support through the Provincial-Territorial Base Fund, which is part of the Building Canada plan. Through this program, the governments of Canada and the Northwest Territories work together to support infrastructure priorities across the Territory.


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Inuvik's East Three School Official Grand Opening

INUVIK (October 10, 2012) – This morning marked the official grand opening of Inuvik's new super school, East Three.

"Students need sound infrastructure with a healthy and safe environment to learn and grow in," said the Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment. "A new school means a fresh start for the community and endless possibilities for students. I want to congratulate everyone involved with this project, and thank them for all their hard work."

The Honourable Robert C. McLeod, Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs and MLA for Inuvik-Twin Lakes, spoke on behalf of Minister Lafferty at the event.

Eagerly anticipated by the residents of Inuvik, the official opening of East Three School marks the beginning of a new chapter in education for the community. Involving students, teachers and community members and leaders throughout the design and construction of the project has helped make the school and the learning environment a community-wide priority.

Designed by Pin Taylor Architects, the super school replaces both Sir Alexander Mackenzie School and Samuel Hearne Secondary School. Sachs Harbour, Paulatuk and Tuktoyaktuk Celebrate Completion of New Airport Terminals

Northwest Territories, October 10, 2012 — Significant infrastructure investments in three northern communities have improved air transportation across the region.

Most of the year, the Sachs Harbour, Paulatuk and Tuktoyaktuk airports are the only means by which goods and supplies can reach these remote Arctic communities. Thanks to joint funding from the governments of Canada and Northwest Territories, three new energy-efficient airport terminals have replaced aging facilities, improving transportation infrastructure and providing residents and visitors with a better travel experience.

"These new airport terminals are vital to supporting the increasing growth and prosperity of Canada's Northern communities," said the Honourable Leona Aglukkaq, Minister of Health, Regional Minister for the North and Member of Parliament for Nunavut. "Our Government is proud to have invested in these three important projects that created local jobs and will have a positive economic impact in each region."

Transportation Minister David Ramsay said "We are pleased the Government of Canada partnered with us to improve airport facilities in these northern communities. Strategic investments in transportation infrastructure help strengthen and diversify our economy, and increase economic opportunities throughout the NWT."

The Government of Canada contributed \$700,000 towards the construction of the Tuktoyaktuk Airport through the Infrastructure Stimulus Fund, with the Government of the Northwest Territories contributing the balance of the total project cost of \$2.32 million. The Government of Canada contributed \$450,000 to both the Sachs Harbour and Paulatuk Airport terminals through the Infrastructure Stimulus Fund, part of Canada's Economic Action Plan. The Government of the Northwest Territories contributed the balance of the Sachs Harbour terminal's \$1.10 million total project cost and the Paulatuk airport's \$1.12 million total project cost.


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GNWT Exceeds Greenhouse Gas Emissions Target

YELLOWKNIFE (October 11, 2012) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has exceeded its greenhouse gas emissions target. The 2007 NWT Greenhouse Gas Strategy set a target to reduce emissions from GNWT operations to 10 percent below 2001 levels by the year 2011. Actual reductions were 30 percent lower, from 54 kilotonnes (Kt) in 2001 to 37 Kt from GNWT operations in 2011. "We are committed to responsible stewardship of our environment, to help it sustain present and future generations," said Environment and Natural Resources minister J. Michael Miltenberger. "This achievement gives our government confidence that we know what actions to take to meet, and potentially exceed, our next target to stabilize greenhouse gas emissions from all of the NWT." The NWT Greenhouse Gas Strategy 2011-2015 territorial targets for the entire NWT are:

- Stabilize emissions at 2005 levels (1,500 Kt) by 2015:
- Limit emissions increases to 66 percent about 2005 levels (2,500 Kt) by 2020; and,
- Return emissions to 2005 levels (1,500 Kt) by 2030.

A recent greenhouse gas inventory released by Environment Canada reports NWT emissions in 2010 at 1,325 Kt. The GNWT 2011 Corporate Greenhouse Gas Inventory, which reports on greenhouse gas emissions from GNWT operations for the 2011 calendar year, has been submitted to The Climate Registry. The Registry is a non-profit collaboration among North American states, provinces and territories. It sets transparent standards to calculate, verify and publicly report greenhouse gas emissions in a single registry.





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GNWT AND GTC SIGN AGREEMENTS TO FORMALIZE RELATIONSHIP

AKLAVIK (October 15, 2012) – Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) Premier Bob McLeod and Gwich'in Tribal Council (GTC) President Robert A. Alexie signed three agreements on Friday to formalize their government-to-government relationship.

The three agreements were:


- the Devolution Agreement-in-Principle
- a Gwich'in Tribal Council Government of the Northwest Territories Umbrella Intergovernmental Agreement Regarding Intergovernmental Cooperation and Coordination,
- a Memorandum of Understanding for Contracting within the Gwich'in Settlement Area (Contracting MOU), and

"The signing of these agreements strengthens the relationship between the Gwich'in Tribal Council and the Government of the Northwest Territories, which is a priority for the 17th Assembly," said Premier McLeod. "These agreements represent a commitment to the way we will work together as partners to achieve shared priorities that support the Gwich'in."

"We hope to get three things from these three agreements," said President Alexie. "A place at the decision table. More economic opportunities in our communities. And control over our own economic and political future. That's the intent. That's the goal. We are action oriented."

The new intergovernmental agreement lays out a series of formal information-sharing commitments by both governments. This includes the commitment that the members of the GNWT Executive Council and GTC Board of Directors will meet each year in the Gwich'in Settlement Area to establish priorities, identify areas of cooperation and set timelines. The Contracting MOU establishes a process to improve the participation of Gwich'in businesses in GNWT contracting within the Gwich'in Settlement Area.

Today's event was also an opportunity to formalize the GTC's return to devolution negotiations through a formal signing of the Devolution AIP by Premier McLeod, President Alexie and the Presidents of the four Gwich'in Councils: Jozef Carnogursky, Danny Greenland, Carolyn Lennie and William Koe. The Devolution Agreement in Principle was agreed to and signed in Yellowknife on September 11, 2012. GTC negotiators have been meeting with GNWT representatives regularly since the signing.



Main table negotiations on devolution are targeted to conclude this year, with devolution planned to take effect on April 1, 2014.

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
Backgrounder:

Memorandum Of Understanding For Contracting Within The Gwich'in Settlement Area – The Contracting MOU establishes a process towards improving the participation of Gwich'in businesses in GNWT contracting. There is a target of a minimum of 50 percent by value of all GNWT contracts in the Gwich'in Settlement Area over the term of the MOU going to Gwich'in businesses through the regular GNWT contracting process. For the overlap communities of Aklavik and Inuvik, it is the intention of the parties that the minimum target of 50 percent of GNWT contracting by value would include both Gwich'in and Inuvialuit businesses. The MOU's term will be from October 12, 2012 to September 30, 2017. The GNWT will provide lists of planned capital and O&M projects according to a schedule, and will provide a one-time contribution of \$20,000 to assist the GTC in updating the registry of Gwich'in businesses. Senior officials from both governments will meet regularly to discuss and review the GNWT's proposed contracts in the GSA.

Devolution Agreement-in-Principle (AiP) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and the Government of Canada, along with the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, Northwest Territory Métis Nation, Sahtu Secretariat Incorporated and Gwich'in Tribal Council, are currently in the final stage of negotiations to transfer or 'devolve' responsibility for the management of public lands, resources and rights in respect of waters in the NWT from the

federal to the territorial government. The Devolution AiP is an important step towards the development of a final agreement, and outlines financial and other terms that the signatories have agreed upon so far. The AiP is not a legally binding document but represents the honourable intentions of the signatories to include these terms in the final agreement. Negotiations are anticipated to conclude in 2012, with the transfer to take effect on April 1, 2014. Gwich'in Tribal Council – Government of the Northwest Territories Umbrella Intergovernmental Agreement Regarding Intergovernmental Cooperation and Coordination — The Intergovernmental Agreement will enhance government-to-government relations between the GTC and GNWT by strengthening and encouraging interaction, cooperation and coordination. The agreement outlines protocols for communication, commitments for regular meetings and priority areas for discussion between the two governments. It also establishes a formal process for issues to be raised and resolved in a manner that reflects both Gwich'in and public interests. The agreement is for a four-year term with options to review, update and extend.



NWT Residents Honoured at Minister's Cultural Circle Ceremony

YELLOWKNIFE (October 17, 2012) – Five Northwest Territories residents and organizations were honoured this morning at the second annual Minister's Cultural Circle Award Ceremony. The event took place in the Great Hall of the Legislative Assembly and was as a way to recognise the important and lasting contributions of those dedicated to the arts and cultures of the North.


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Backgrounder

Purpose: To provide lasting recognition and gratitude to those who contribute to the preservation and promotion of cultures and heritage in the Northwest Territories. The Cultural Circle helps build awareness among all northerners about the importance of promoting, protecting, preserving and celebrating our unique culture, heritage and ways of life.

Eligible Recipients:

Youth Category - Youth, 25 years of age and under, who demonstrate a strong commitment to engaging in the arts, cultural learning and cultural practices.

Individual Category - Individuals who demonstrate a strong commitment to preserving and promoting culture through participation in various arts, culture and heritage-related activities.

Elders Category - Elders, 50 years of age and older, respected for their contributions of practicing, promoting, guiding, teaching, leadership, vision, or hands-on participation in the areas of art, culture, heritage and language.

Group Category - Any organization, corporation, institution, organizing committee or social club that plays a lead role in developing and supporting activities that celebrate, promote or preserve the arts, culture and heritage.

Criteria:

- Must be a current resident of the Northwest Territories (except where awarded posthumously)
- Must have made a significant, long-term contribution to the arts, culture and heritage.
- Must be independently motivated by a genuine desire to make a difference.

2012 Minister's Cultural Circle Award Recipients:

Spending time with Elders and working with language, traditional knowledge and cultural projects, 23-year-old **Doris Taneton** is a strong young aboriginal leader. She is fluent in both English and North Slavey, participates in northern governance conferences and dedicates time to working with local projects such as the Deline Knowledge Project.

Reflecting on what it means to practice traditional culture in a contemporary world, **Melaw Nakehk'o** demonstrates a strong level of commitment and enthusiasm to share her journey of learning the knowledge of her elders. Earlier this year, she set out to learn the art of tanning moosehides and has since been supporting other women wanting to learn the art form, thereby beginning a cultural revitalization movement among the younger generations of the Northwest Territories.

Since retiring from her position as an Inuvialuktun teacher, **Lillian Elias** has only increased her pride and passion in preserving her language and culture. She continues teaching the language to adults in her community in the evening; she hosts an annual language camp for youth and young children at her bush camp; and she assists the cultural centre, aboriginal languages programs and elementary language teachers with the making of language materials. Her passion is to see all young adults in her community speak Inuvialuktun.

Recognizing that youth were struggling to be "strong like two people" after leaving their communities to attend post-secondary school or employment opportunities, the **Tlicho Government** introduced the **Tlicho Imbe Program** in 2011. This summer employment program hires Tlicho youth to spend eleven weeks in their own communities, working with and learning from community Elders, and learning modern safety skills and technology. Youth earn first aid, canoe safety and GPS mapping certification as well as learning traditional skills, such as fishing, drum and paddle making, sewing, hide preparation, traditional medicines and travel routes. The Tlicho Imbe Program is the beginning of a successful cultural revitalization in all the Tlicho communities.

As both an artist and an Inuvialuktun language teacher, **Jean Harry**'s work has profoundly impacted the younger generations of Sachs Harbour residents to continue learning their language. Through her love of her language and culture, she has influenced the development of many leaders, teachers and young Inuvialuit across the North. For all her work in and support of the Inuvialuktun language and culture, Jean Harry receives the Minister's Choice



NWT Credit Rating of Aa1 / Stable Confirmed for GNWT

YELLOWKNIFE (October 23, 2012) – The Government of the Northwest Territories' Aa1 credit rating has been confirmed by Moody's Investors Service. A high investment grade credit rating provides assurance that the GNWT's fiscal plans are sound.

The <u>credit analysis</u> was published October 18th following Moody's annual review of the GNWT's fiscal plans, outlook, and borrowing activity. While economic growth in the north has been uneven due to the volatility of the global economy, the credit risk is mitigated by the territory's low debt burden.

"We have adopted fiscal policies that have supported the economy by maintaining spending and by investing significantly in infrastructure, but remain committed to our goal of long-term fiscal sustainability," said Michael Miltenberger, Minister of Finance.

Moody's credit rating recognizes the GNWT's ongoing good financial management in uncertain economic times, based on a well-developed fiscal framework and <u>Fiscal Responsibility Policy</u>. The analysis noted the potential for higher resource revenues and greater fiscal flexibility in the future as a result of devolution and expects the GNWT's debt burden to remain stable under the new federal borrowing limit. A territorial economy that generates high employment rates and GDP per capita contributed to the GNWT's credit rating.

The GNWT's rating is on par with Manitoba and Saskatchewan. The highest possible credit rating issued by Moody's is Aaa, one level above the GNWT's. The NWT's debt burden is low when compared to that of most Canadian regional governments.

The GNWT has retained an Aa1 credit rating since 2008-09. A high credit rating allows the GNWT to build a strong, sustainable future for our Territory by making strategic infrastructure investments that will increase northern capacity, strengthen and diversify the economy, and increase employment opportunities where they are most needed.

Announcement: Moody's Releases Annual Report on the Northwest Territories

Toronto, October 19, 2012 -- In its annual report on the Northwest Territories (NWT), Moody's Investors Service says that the Canadian territory's Aa1 issuer rating is supported by a well-developed fiscal framework and a low debt burden. The high investment-grade rating also reflects the territorial economy, which, while narrowly based and focused on resource development, generates high employment rates and GDP per capita.

The NWT's fiscal plan is guided by a Fiscal Responsibility Policy that includes guidelines with respect to the types of activities for which debt can be issued as well as limits on total debt and debt servicing costs to ensure affordability. "The Fiscal Responsibility Policy includes reporting and accountability mechanisms to ensure compliance and, as such, should help to ensure continued fiscal discipline," says Moody's Assistant Vice President Jennifer Wong, lead analyst for the NWT.

On a non-consolidated basis, the territory is estimated to have registered a deficit position of C\$33.7 million (2.4% of revenues) in 2011-12. However, the territory's 2012-13 Budget projected that growth in federal transfers and taxation revenues will offset planned increases in expenses, resulting in an operating surplus of C\$74.1 million (4.9% of revenues) in 2012-13. "By keeping expenditure growth close to the projected revenue growth, surpluses are projected to continue in the medium term. Given the territory's prudent policies, NWT's plan to return to operating surplus appears achievable," explains Ms. Wong.

The NWT, like the Canadian provinces, maintains substantial control over expenditure and revenue levers, although at present, resources revenues are controlled at the federal level. The territory, however, has signed a devolution agreement-in-principle with the federal government, and while negotiations are on-going, an agreement could mean a transfer of legislative authority over lands and resources to the NWT and potentially higher resource revenues and greater fiscal flexibility.

In recent years, deficits and an increase in capital expenditures have led to additions to NWT's net debt, which measured 22.6% of revenues at March 31, 2011. However, NWT's debt burden remains relatively low compared to the Canadian provinces, and is expected to remain relatively stable in the medium-term.

With an economy limited primarily to natural resources and associated industries, growth in real GDP has been volatile in NWT. In 2011, real GDP contracted by an estimated 5.8%, reflecting weak diamond production and a fall in capital investments. The territory projects growth to resume at 6.5% in 2012, as investments and exports recover strongly from 2011 levels.

The rating agency's report is a yearly update to the markets and does not constitute a rating action.

How will borrowing be approved?

Answer:

The Legislative Assembly will annually approve the Government's long-term borrowing requirements as well as the maximum short-term (repayable within one year) borrowing requirements in the Appropriation and Borrowing Authority Act.

In the unlikely event that short-term borrowing cannot be repaid in one year and must be repaid through long-term debt, approval of the Legislative Assembly will be sought.

How will the Government monitor this Policy?

Answer:

The Minister of Finance is committed to annually review and, where required, update the borrowing and performance measurement criteria for the management of debt.

How will the Government be held accountable?

Answer:

Annually, when the *Public Accounts* are presented to the Legislative Assembly, the Minister of Finance will report on the debt management results of the Government.

What are the performance criteria that borrowing will be measured against?

Answer:

Debt to Revenue RatioIn the lowest 4 among provinces.

Debt per CapitaIn the lowest 5 among provinces and territories.

Debt Servicing Costs (Interest), as a % of Revenue
In the lowest 4 among provinces.

Message from the Chairman of the Financial Management Board

The Government of the Northwest Territories must make investments every year to respond to the needs of the people of our Territory.

The Government must invest in programs and services, in capital infrastructure, and in a wide array of other needs. Often the Government does not have the immediate cash to make these investments and must borrow the money required. But how much can the Government afford to borrow? What investments should the Government borrow for? What investments should it not borrow for? How can the Government be held accountable for these borrowing decisions?

These are the questions the GNWT asked itself. The answers it came up with have been incorporated into a new Fiscal Responsibility Policy. The Government is committed to making fiscal decisions within the guidelines and limits contained in this Policy. It is also committed to reporting to NWT residents on how well it is managing the fiscal affairs of the GNWT.

We are committed to providing NWT residents with responsive and responsible government. This new Fiscal Responsibility Policy is one of the ways we intend to honor that commitment.

The Fiscal Responsibility Policy provides the following answers to the tough questions on fiscal management and borrowing:

What will this Government borrow for?

Answer:

- Capital infrastructure.
- Self-liquidating investments (e.g. those that generate immediate or direct savings or new or enhanced revenue streams).
- Repayable loan programs (e.g. student loans, working capital advances for the Business Credit Corporation).
- The Government will not borrow for day to day operating requirements.

How will the Government finance investment in infrastructure?

Answer:

- 50% minimum from cash generated from operating surpluses.
- 50% maximum through short or long-term borrowing.

How much debt will be considered affordable?

Answer:

"Affordable debt" will be considered the level of debt where the corresponding annual debt servicing payments do not exceed 5% of total annual revenues.

Debt servicing payments will include interest, incidental costs associated with the administration of debt, and the principal repayments and/or contributions to sinking funds.

How will the Government repay its debt?

Answer:

Infrastructure debt will be repaid over a period not to exceed the lesser of 20 years or the useful life of the asset.

Debt for self-liquidating investments will be repaid from the new revenues such as user fees, tolls, or expenditure savings.

Debt incurred to finance repayable loan programs will be repaid from cash generated from the loan repayments and corresponding interest revenue.

What if the Government does not manage its investments, borrowing and debt within the parameters of the Policy?

Answer:

If debt servicing payments exceed 5% of total revenues, the Government is required to generate additional operating surpluses in the following two years.

The additional surpluses must be used to repay sufficient debt principal so that debt servicing payments will decrease to 5% of revenues by the third subsequent year.



MINISTER OF EDUCATION, CULTURE AND EMPLOYMENT CALLS FOR OTHER JURISDICTIONS TO DEVELOP DEDICATED RESIDENTIAL SCHOOLS CURRICULUM

YELLOWKNIFE (Wednesday, October 31, 2012) – To build on the success of the early October launch of the Northern Studies 10 curriculum, the Honourable Jackson Lafferty today officially introduced the materials to the public with a call to jurisdictions across Canada to develop their own dedicated residential schools curricula.

The completed curriculum was announced earlier in October at a three day inservice for teachers that will be using the new curriculum in schools across the Northwest Territories and Nunavut. The curriculum was launched by the Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment with the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT), the Honourable Eva Aariak, Minister of Education with the Government of Nunavut (GN), and Marie Wilson, Commissioner of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (TRC).

"Our original hopes for this curriculum have been exceeded by the overwhelming response we had with the launch to our teachers," said Minister Lafferty. "We built on the valuable research gathered by the Legacy of Hope Foundation with the intent of both informing our students and communities of the broad impact residential schools had on our aboriginal people, as well as providing them with a path to reconciliation and healing. The exposure through the media and the requests for more information from across Canada has shone a light on the need for other jurisdictions to develop their own dedicated curricula. As Commissioner Wilson stated, this is not just Aboriginal history; this is Canadian history."

The Residential Schools curriculum is now a key section of the Northwest Territories Northern Studies course and the Nunavut Social Studies course. It covers topics ranging from the history and legacy of residential schools, traditional education and learning, colonialism, assimilation, the Indian Residential Schools Settlement Agreement, the Federal apology, the TRC, and what reconciliation may look like. It also includes literature and stories of former residential school students shared through audio and video clips, allowing students to learn of both the positive and negative impacts that school life had on individuals.

Minister Lafferty was joined by Mr. Richard Kistabish, Chair of the Legacy of Hope Foundation, to highlight the GNWT and GN's materials and the educational products developed by the Legacy of Hope. Through the exhaustive research and careful handling of this sensitive subject matter, both the Governments' and Legacy of Hope's products are providing a more comprehensive look at the history and legacy of the residential schools in Canada, and resources for healing and reconciliation.

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DEH CHO BRIDGE TO OPEN NOVEMBER 30

FORT PROVIDENCE (November 6, 2012) The official opening of the Deh Cho Bridge will be held on Friday, November 30, 2012.

In a Minister's Statement read in the Legislative Assembly this afternoon, the Honourable David Ramsay, Minister of Transportation, advised Members that final construction work is being completed on the bridge. He expressed satisfaction with the project's imminent completion. "The Deh Cho Bridge represents a tremendous improvement in the level of service over the current ferry and ice road crossing, and will increase economic development in our territory," he said. "Children born today will still be using this bridge in their retirement years."

Minister Ramsay credited the decision of the Legislative Assembly to provide additional resources for the Bridge with ensuring completion this year. The money was used to settle claims and accelerate construction, bringing the total construction cost for the Bridge to \$202 million. The Minister noted that a delay in the Bridge opening could have meant substantial additional costs and the loss of toll revenue that will now be avoided.

The Deh Cho Bridge will provide year-round access to the North Slave Region of the Northwest Territories, eliminating the uncertainty that comes from the current ferry and ice crossing system. The Bridge will reduce environmental risks and impacts by no longer needing the half a million litres of fuel used annually to power the ferry.

The Department of Transportation is working closely with the community of Fort Providence to plan a celebration the afternoon of November 30, honouring the contributions of the community and those involved in the design, construction, and oversight of the project. More detailed information on the celebration will be posted beginning November 22 on the project website at www.dehchobridge.info.

The Deh Cho Bridge will provide year-round access to the North Slave Region of the Northwest Territories, eliminating the uncertainty that comes from the current ferry and ice crossing system. The bridge will reduce environmental risks and impacts by eliminating the need for idling, half a million litres of fuel annually to power the ferry, and the possibility of a spill into the Mackenzie River.

A toll on commercial vehicle operators is in place, and information on toll collection and enforcement has been provided to commercial operators. Further information on the Deh Cho Bridge toll can be found at www.tolling.ca.

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FIRST TERRITORIAL HEALTH BEHAVIOURS IN SCHOOL-AGED CHILDREN REPORT RELEASED.

YELLOWKNIFE (November 6, 2012) – The Department of Education, Culture and Employment, in collaboration with the Department of Health and Social Services, released a report today exploring the health perceptions, choices and experiences of school-aged children in the Northwest Territories (NWT). The report, titled <u>Health and Health-Related Behaviours Among Young People: Northwest Territories</u>, is based upon data collected through the national <u>Health Behaviours in School-Aged Children (HBSC) study</u>.

"Every student deserves a good education and a high quality of life and NWT schools play a more central role in promoting healthy choices and behaviours than in many other parts of Canada," said the Honourable Jackson Lafferty, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment. "By working with the Department of Health and Social Services, we have a significant opportunity to foster both a positive learning environment and help encourage constructive choices and healthy behaviour."

The HBSC study aims to gain new insight and increased understanding of the health, wellbeing and health behaviours of young people and their social contexts, especially in the school environment. The 2010-11 report is the first time that information on the health behaviours and choices of NWT youth has been provided to the territory. It provides valuable information to identify areas of concern in the Northwest Territories and to help focus programming to improve the health-related behaviours of our young people.

"Healthy behaviors and best practices for life start in the school environment, everyone has a role to play to encourage children to make healthy lifestyle choices. I am pleased with the results of this report," said Minister of Health and Social Services, Tom Beaulieu.

"In examining the connections between contextual factors and mental health, one key theme emerges: interpersonal relationships matter," said Dr. John Freeman, Director of the Social Program Evaluation Group at Queen's University and co-Principal Investigator of the HBSC study. "No matter how mental health is measured and no matter what interpersonal relationship is concerned, adolescents with positive interpersonal relationships tend to fare better in terms of mental health."

The HBSC is conducted every four years by Queen's University in partnership with the Public Health Agency of Canada (PHAC) and Health Canada. Data is collected through school-based self-report surveys among 11 to 15 year-olds. This age group represents the life-period when physical and emotional changes take place and important life and career decisions are beginning to be made. These results can reveal much about the long-term health choices our young people are making

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The national 2010 HBSC report, <u>The Health of Canada's Young People: a mental health focus</u>, was released earlier this year.

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PLANNED APPROACH TO NWTHC-HELD HOMEOWNERSHIP MORTGAGES

YELLOWKNIFE (November 6, 2012) – The Honourable Robert C. McLeod, Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation (NWTHC) has announced a revised approach to helping homeownership clients address their mortgages and arrears. This approach aims to provide client homeowners with a fresh start while meeting their responsibilities as homeowners.

"Addressing housing needs is a priority of the 17th Legislative Assembly. The NWTHC has committed to improving homeownership supports for NWT residents in <u>Building for the Future</u>" said Minister McLeod. "I have heard our clients' frustration regarding their mortgage payments and arrears. This is an opportunity for us to work together, to reset the clock for our clients and to put these households in a better position to address their housing needs."

The adjusted approach brings historical mortgage client files more into line with the NWTHC's current approach to homeownership support. Applying current practices to existing mortgages will reduce the amount of arrears owed by clients. Approximately 400 clients will have their outstanding mortgage balances significantly reduced, depending on household individual circumstances, and affordable re-payment options will be offered.

In the coming weeks, NWTHC staff will be contacting each client to review a new agreement and to discuss payment options available to them. "We hope that clients welcome the chance to adjust their debt in a positive direction" says Minister McLeod.
