Norman Wells, Northwest Territories, January 5, 2017— A thriving economy needs strategic investments in transportation infrastructure to keep people and goods moving efficiently. Investing in modern transportation infrastructure also helps create jobs and improve the quality of life of Northerners.

The governments of Canada and Northwest Territories today announced \$20 million in funding for the construction of a 14 kilometre all-season access road from Norman Wells to Canyon Creek. The project also includes the construction of 5 kilometres of roads surrounding Canyon Creek.

This investment will bring many benefits to local communities. It will improve the ability to transport goods and equipment throughout the area, while helping to open new business development opportunities in the Sahtu Region. The expanded road network will also provide increased reliability for shipments of essential supplies, and easier access to traditional hunting and fishing areas. Residents, businesses and contractors in the Hamlet of Tulita and the Town of Norman Wells will particularly benefit from the related business and employment opportunities. In addition, through training, this project will increase the capacity of local people and businesses to service future construction projects.


Canyon Creek All-Season Access Road

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Tłįchǫ All Season Road Achieves Important Milestone

January 11, 2017 - Whati, Northwest Territories

Whatì - Today, Member of Parliament for the Northwest Territories, Michael McLeod, on behalf of the Honourable Amarjeet Sohi, Minister of Infrastructure and Communities, the Honourable Bob McLeod, Premier of the Northwest Territories, the Honourable Wally Schumann, Northwest Territories Minister of Transportation and the Honourable Robert C. McLeod, Northwest Territories Minister of Finance, along with Tłıcho Grand Chief Eddie Erasmus, announced conditional approval of federal funding for the construction of the Tłıcho All-Season Road.

The federal government will provide up to 25 per cent of eligible project costs through the P3 Canada Fund.

The procurement of the Tłıcho All-Season Road through a Public-Private Partnership will start with the release of the Request for Qualifications in February 2017.

This project is currently undergoing an environmental assessment led by the Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board. Confirmation that funding is now available will inform the environmental assessment process in terms of possible timing of construction.

The Tłıcho All-Season Road will consist of approximately 97 kilometres of a new 2 lane road to the community of Whati, including four new bridges and one large arched culvert.

Currently served by a winter ice road, the Tłįchǫ region has overland access to the Yellowknife region and southern Canada for only three months of the year. During the remaining months, food and supplies are flown in at significant costs, with resulting food prices often 50% higher than in Yellowknife.

The existing winter road is challenged each year by changing lake ice and overland section conditions, resulting from significant variations in winter air temperatures and snowfall. Given the effects of climate change, efforts to improve the winter road system

have been a long standing priority for the Government of the Northwest Territories and the local communities.

NWT Education Leadership Collaborates on Instructional Practices

YELLOWKNIFE (January 23, 2017) – The Department of Education, Culture and Employment (ECE), the Northwest Association (NWTTA) and the Northwest Territories Superintendents' Association (NWTSA) today announced their col strengthening teacher instructional practices (STIP) across the NWT.

Teacher wellness and professional development fall under the banner of the Education Renewal strategy (2013), to en have access to experiences and resources that enhance their wellness in order for them to focus on excellence in teaching the exception of the ex

Currently, the NWT has the highest number of instructional hours in Canada for upper secondary, at 1045. Most other between 880 and 1000 hours. Despite having the highest number of required instructional hours across Canada, the N system is not meeting the needs of learners. Attendance, graduation rates, the Early Development Instrument (EDI), the Achievement Tests (AAT), Functional Grade Levels (FGL) and the Healthy Behaviour in School-Aged Children (HBSC indicates education leadership must take a different approach to engage with and help students succeed.

The STIP initiative will provide education boards across the territory the option to redirect up to 100 hours to allow for in planning, assessment, collaborative practice and ongoing professional development. Globally, research and implement is one of the most powerful factors in improving student outcomes.

Pilot projects will be conducted in the 2017-18 school year, to determine where improvements can be made and focus resources that will assist teachers with their teaching practices. The STIP initiative is not mandatory for participation.

Les leaders ténois en éducation collaborent au sujet des pratiques d'enseignement

Yellowknife, le 23 janvier 2017 – Le ministère de l'Éducation, de la Culture et de la Formation (MÉCF), l'Association des enseignants et enseignantes des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (AEETNO) et l'Association des surintendants des Territoires du Nord-Ouest ont annoncé aujourd'hui leur partenariat en vue d'un renforcement des pratiques d'enseignement (le Renforcement) sur l'ensemble du territoire.

Le bien-être des enseignants et leur perfectionnement professionnel font partie intégrante de la stratégie du renouveau en éducation (2013) pour garantir que les éducateurs vivent des expériences et accèdent à des ressources qui favorisent leur mieux-être afin qu'ils se concentrent sur l'excellence de leur enseignement.

Les TNO ont actuellement le nombre d'heures d'enseignement le plus élevé au pays pour le deuxième cycle du secondaire, soit 1 045 heures (le nombre d'heures oscille entre 880 et 1 000 dans la plupart des régions canadiennes). Malgré cela, le système d'éducation ténois ne parvient pas à combler les besoins de ses élèves. Les taux d'absentéisme et de décrochage, tout comme les données provenant de l'Instrument de mesure du développement de la petite enfance (IMDPE), du test de rendement de l'Alberta (TRA), des niveaux fonctionnels des élèves (NFÉ) et de l'enquête sur les comportements de santé des jeunes d'âge scolaire, révèlent que l'approche éducative doit être réorientée pour aider les élèves à réussir.

L'initiative du Renforcement offrira aux conseils scolaires ténois la possibilité de réaffecter jusqu'à 100 heures de travail du corps enseignant pour accroître les activités de planification, d'évaluation, de collaboration et de perfectionnement professionnel continu. Il a été démontré généralement que la mise en œuvre de ce type de pratique et la recherche associée figurent parmi les contributions les plus significatives à l'amélioration des résultats scolaires des élèves.

Des projets pilotes seront menés pendant l'année scolaire 2017-2018 pour déterminer quelles améliorations peuvent être apportées et quelles formations et ressources pourraient soutenir les enseignants dans leur pratique. La participation à l'initiative de renforcement est libre.

 Des études menées un peu partout dans le monde révèlent que le renforcement du perfectionnement professionnel et des pratiques d'enseignement des enseignants constitue le facteur le plus significatif dans l'amélioration des résultats scolaires des élèves.

- Certaines provinces canadiennes et certains pays (comme la Finlande) ont montré que des enseignants mieux préparés assurent un enseignement de meilleure qualité, ce qui engendre les résultats scolaires parmi les meilleurs au monde.
- Les enseignants des TNO (et du Nunavut) donnent le plus grand nombre d'heures d'enseignement au pays; de surcroît, ils font face à certains des milieux scolaires les plus difficiles et les plus diversifiés au Canada.
- Les enseignants des TNO travaillent environ 52 heures par semaine, se consacrant entre autres à des tâches de planification, d'évaluation, d'enseignement et de préparation pour satisfaire aux besoins quotidiens des élèves.

Territorial premiers meet to discuss northern policy

Joint news release

The premiers of Yukon, the Northwest Territories, and Nunavut met in Vancouver this week to discuss northern policy and common pan-territorial priorities, including sustainable development. Premiers reaffirmed their support for mining, and commitment to a robust, sustainable economy in the North.

Premiers discussed plans for cooperating on a pan-territorial vision for ongoing growth and development. The Government of NWT will lead the development of a Sustainable Development Strategy that will help ensure that Northerners have a strong, collective voice in ongoing discussions about the future of the North and have a role in shaping any decisions affecting the North and its people.

Premiers will also collaborate, and work with Indigenous peoples in their respective territories, to develop a common set of values and principles which will guide the development of a new Pan-Territorial Northern Policy.

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Government of the Northwest Territories Releases 2017-2018 Budget

YELLOWKNIFE (February 1, 2017) – Finance Minister Robert C. McLeod released the Government of the Northwest Territories' (GNWT) 2017-18 Budget today, highlighting \$55 million in new investments for initiatives related to the priorities of the 18th Legislative Assembly and to strengthen delivery of existing programs.

The balanced approach to managing expenditures has improved the Budget's medium-term projections. The 2017-2018 Budget proposes operating expenditures of \$1.66 billion and revenues of \$1.86 billion. The Budget projects an operating surplus of \$167 million and after accounting for infrastructure investments, an overall cash surplus of \$15 million for 2017-18.

Budget 2017-18 supports the five priorities of the 18th Legislative Assembly including the following highlights:

- Education, training and youth development
 - \$1.5 million for Junior Kindergarten with a commitment of another
 \$2.7 million before the end of the 18th Assembly to fully implement the program
 - \$3.0 million in additional support for employment in small NWT communities
- Cost of living
 - \$4.2 million in additional support for income assistance
 - \$750,000 to extend the NWT Child Benefit for more than 2,000 families with children who earn less than \$80,000 annually
 - \$500,000 for a new home repair program for Seniors
- Community wellness and safety
 - o \$750,000 for actions to address homelessness in Yellowknife
 - \$616,000 to implement a territorial wide 9-1-1 service
 - o \$6.4 million to address cost pressures in the medical travel budget
- Economy, environment and climate change
 - \$2.1 million for transboundary water agreements
 - \$14.0 million for the operating costs of the Mackenzie Valley Fibre Link project
- Governance
 - \$1.1 million increase for community government funding

 \$3.9 million to upgrade and ensure on-going maintenance for GNWT computerized administrative systems

Le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Quest publie son budget de 2017-2018

YELLOWKNIFE, le 1^{er} **février 2017** – Le ministre des Finances, Robert C. McLeod, a publié aujourd'hui le budget de 2017-2018 du gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO), qui propose d'investir 55 millions de dollars dans de nouvelles initiatives pour réaliser les priorités de la 18^e Assemblée législative et renforcer les programmes actuels.

L'approche équilibrée observée dans la gestion des dépenses a amélioré les projections à moyen terme du budget. Ainsi, le budget de 2017-2018 propose des dépenses de fonctionnement de 1,66 milliard de dollars et des recettes de 1,86 milliard de dollars, ce qui se traduirait par un excédent de fonctionnement de 167 millions de dollars et, une fois les investissements en infrastructures pris en compte, un excédent global de 15 millions de dollars en 2017-2018.

Le budget de 2017-2018 appuie les cinq priorités de la 18^e Assemblée législative, notamment grâce aux mesures suivantes :

- Éducation, formation et développement des jeunes
 - 1,5 million de dollars pour le programme de prématernelle, plus un engagement à investir 2,7 millions de dollars supplémentaires dans la mise en place complète du programme d'ici la fin du mandat de la 18^e Assemblée législative.
 - o 3,0 millions de dollars en soutien supplémentaire à l'emploi dans les petites collectivités.

Inuvialuit Settlement Region Communities Supported by Economic Development and Improved Housing

INUVIK, NORTHWEST TERRITORIES (February 24, 2017), - The Honourable Caroline Cochrane, Minister Responsible for the Northwest Territories Housing Corporation (NWTHC) and Homelessness, and Duane Ningaqsiq Smith, Chair and CEO of Inuvialuit Regional Corporation (IRC), signed a Memorandum of Agreement today to partner towards the renewal of social housing in Inuvialuit Settlement Region (ISR) communities.

Using investments provided under Federal Budget 2016, IRC will construct certain, affordable social housing units on lots owned by NWTHC and turn over the units to the NWTHC upon completion. These units will replace older and aging social housing units. This investment will improve the overall condition of the social housing stock, create more spaces to address homelessness, and help to address the high housing needs in the North and Inuit communities.

Additionally, Nappaq, the Inuvialuit-owned company contracted to construct these unites, is committed to using local trades and growing capacity within ISR communities. This work supports the objectives under the section 16 economic measures provisions of the Inuvialuit Final Agreement. These projects support economic development in these communities adding important social infrastructure, supporting local and regional businesses and creating training opportunities.

Federal Budget 2016 investments in affordable housing are providing targeted support to those who need it most, including in Northwest Territories, and create good jobs that help grow Canada's economy in a clean and sustainable way.

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Développement économique et amélioration des logements en appui aux collectivités de la région désignée des Inuvialuit

Inuvik, Territoires du Nord-Ouest (24 février 2017), – L'honorable Caroline Cochrane, ministre responsable de la Société d'habitation des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (SHTNO) et de la Lutte contre l'itinérance, et Duane Ningaqsiq Smith, président et directeur général de la Société régionale inuvialuite (SRI), ont signé aujourd'hui un protocole d'entente pour travailler en partenariat au renouvellement des logements sociaux dans les collectivités de la région désignée des Inuvialuit.

Au moyen des fonds prévus dans le budget fédéral de 2016, la SRI bâtira des logements sociaux sécuritaires et abordables sur des lots appartenant à la SHTNO, à qui ces logements seront concédés une fois leur construction achevée. Ces nouvelles unités de logement remplaceront les éléments âgés et vieillissants du parc de logements sociaux. Cet investissement permettra d'améliorer l'état général des logements sociaux, de créer davantage d'espaces habitables pour lutter contre l'itinérance et d'aider à répondre aux besoins élevés en matière de logement dans les collectivités nordiques et inuites.

De plus, l'entreprise inuvialuite Nappaq, qui a obtenu le contrat pour la construction de ces logements, s'est engagée à employer les corps de métiers locaux et à accroître les capacités au sein des collectivités de la SRI. Ces efforts appuient la réalisation des objectifs définis dans les dispositions sur les mesures économiques à l'article 16 de la *Convention définitive des Inuvialuit*. Ces projets stimulent le développement économique dans ces collectivités en y ajoutant une importante infrastructure sociale, en soutenant les entreprises locales et régionales ainsi qu'en créant des possibilités de formation.

Les investissements dans les logements abordables prévus dans le budget fédéral de 2016 offrent une aide ciblée à ceux qui en ont le plus besoin, notamment les Territoires du Nord-Ouest, et permettent la création de bons emplois qui contribueront à la croissance propre et durable de l'économie canadienne.

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Policy Direction to Public Utilities Board Intended to Limit Impact of Electricity Rate Increases on NWT Residents

YELLOWKNIFE (February 24, 2017) – The Minister Responsible for the Public Utilities Board (PUB), Glen Abernethy, today announced that the Executive Council of the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) issued policy direction on electricity rate setting to the Board. The direction reinforces long standing policy for government customers to pay more for electricity to keep rates lower for residential and small business customers.

By providing this direction, the GNWT is ensuring that electricity rates fall within target ranges as opposed to setting rates to 100% of the actual cost to generate and distribute power to customers. Strict application of a 100% costing approach results in unstable rates and would create significant rate changes across the NWT. A range allows for more flexibility to keep rates stable.

This direction also allows the PUB to set higher rates for the Government of the Northwest Territories and pass the savings on to non-government customers in the form of lower rates. Additionally, the Minister also provided direction to the PUB on limiting the maximum amount that electricity rates can be changed each year.

This direction is an important way that the GNWT is addressing the high cost of living in the NWT. Today's direction limits increases due to rate rebalancing to 1% annually for non-government customers, down from the previous rate of 3% percent. Without this direction, some NWT customers would have seen their electricity bill increase by as much as much as 7%.

- Subsection 14(1) of the *Public Utilities Act* give the GNWT the authority to issue direction to the Public Utilities Board.

Directives stratégiques données à la Régie des entreprises de service public pour limiter les répercussions de la hausse des tarifs de l'électricité sur les Ténois

Yellowknife, le 24 février 2017 – Glen Abernethy, ministre responsable de la Régie des entreprises de service public, a annoncé aujourd'hui que le Conseil exécutif du gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) a émis des directives stratégiques concernant la tarification de l'électricité à l'intention de la Régie. Ces directives renforcent la politique de longue date qui voyait les clients gouvernementaux payer leur électricité plus cher pour maintenir les tarifs bas pour les particuliers et les petites entreprises.

Ces directives permettent au GTNO de s'assurer que les tarifs de l'électricité restent dans les limites ciblées au lieu d'établir des tarifs correspondant à la totalité du coût réel de production d'électricité et de distribution aux clients. Une application stricte de l'approche de tarification à 100 % donne lieu à des tarifs fluctuants et entraînerait des variations considérables des tarifs aux TNO. Une fourchette de tarifs est plus flexible et aide à la stabilité des tarifs.

Ces directives stratégiques permettent également à la Régie des entreprises de service public d'établir des tarifs plus élevés pour le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest et de faire réaliser des économies aux clients non gouvernementaux en leur offrant des tarifs plus avantageux. Par ailleurs, le ministre a également transmis à la Régie la directive de limiter le taux de variation annuel des tarifs de l'électricité.

Ces directives stratégiques sont une mesure importante du GTNO pour agir sur le coût de la vie élevé aux TNO. La décision d'aujourd'hui limite les augmentations dues au rééquilibrage des tarifs à 1 % par an pour les clients non gouvernementaux, soit une baisse par rapport au taux précédent de 3 %. Sans cette mesure, certains clients ténois auraient vu leur facture d'électricité augmenter jusqu'à 7 %.

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NWT Commercial Fishing Strategy Released in Hay River

HAY RIVER (February 27, 2017) – A Strategy to Revitalize the NWT's Commercial Fishery was officially unveiled today in Hay River; the town that has been the hub of the territory's fishing industry over the last 70 years.

The Strategy for Revitalizing the Great Slave Lake Commercial Fishery describes steps, actions and investments, to be implemented over a five-year period, to restore the NWT's once-powerful Great Slave Lake commercial fishery. It is central to the Government of the Northwest Territories' (GNWT) stated mandate to diversify the NWT economy, create local jobs, and contribute to greater food security.

The Strategy was developed in partnership with the NWT Fishermen's Federation with particular attention to the expressed needs of current and prospective commercial fishers in the NWT. It will be advanced alongside a business plan developed by the Federation's Tu Cho Cooperative and \$1.4 million in funds committed by the GNWT for the revitalization of the sector.

The goals of the Strategy include increasing lake production, increasing processing in the NWT, growing the NWT market for Great Slave Lake Fish and accessing export markets.

The need to revitalize the NWT commercial fishery was first highlighted in the 2013 NWT Economic Opportunities Strategy. The development and implementation of the Strategy is a commitment in the Mandate of the 18th Legislative Assembly.

Hay River, le 27 février 2017 – Le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) a dévoilé sa stratégie pour revitaliser la pêche commerciale aujourd'hui, à Hay River, moteur économique du secteur depuis 70 ans.

La Stratégie de revitalisation de la pêche commerciale sur le Grand lac des Esclaves décrit les investissements et les mesures qui redonneront à la pêche commerciale sur ce plan d'eau son dynamisme d'autrefois d'ici cinq ans. Inuvik residents now benefiting from cleaner and more reliable drinking water

Inuvik, Northwest Territories, March 1, 2017—Access to clean and reliable drinking water is critical to the health and prosperity of Canadian communities. Investments in water treatment systems help safeguard the well-being of Canadians, protect the local environment and keep our communities healthy and liveable.

The governments of Canada and the Northwest Territories, along with the Town of Inuvik, are pleased to announce the completion of the new water treatment plant. The new plant will rely on modern filtration, disinfection and storage facilities to supply clean drinking water to the community for the next 40 years.

In addition, the Town of Inuvik is upgrading its utility corridor system, which involves replacing 540 metres of aging utilidor and two pumping stations that distribute water throughout the community and dispose of wastewater. More than half of the system has already been replaced, with the remainder expected to be complete by fall 2018.

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Recovery Strategy and Management Plan for Two NWT Species at Risk Finalized

YELLOWKNIFE (March 1, 2017) – The Northwest Territories (NWT) Boreal Caribou Recovery Strategy and the NWT Amphibian Management Plan were released this week.

This action fulfills the Government of Northwest Territories' responsibilities under the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act* and follows independent assessments completed by the NWT Species at Risk Committee and consensus agreements from the Conference of Management Authorities (CMA).

The CMA now has nine months to develop consensus agreements on the implementation of the NWT Boreal Caribou Recovery Strategy and NWT Amphibian Management Plan.

The Recovery Strategy and the Management Plan set out goals, objectives and recommended approaches for the conservation and recovery of boreal caribou and amphibians in the NWT. They do not result in any automatic prohibitions or protection for either species or their habitat.

The development of recovery strategies and management plans for species at risk in the NWT supports the 18th Legislative Assembly's priorities of environmental stewardship and encouraging coordination and effectiveness in resource management and recognizing traditional knowledge and land claims agreements.

Boreal Caribou:

- Were added to the NWT List of Species at Risk as a threatened species on February 27, 2014 because their small population size and an expected continuing decline in amount of their secured habitat.
- Main threats to boreal caribou in the NWT area habitat loss and habitat fragmentation from human-caused disturbance (i.e. seismic lines and roads) and natural disturbances (wildland fires).
- The recovery strategy was developed collaboratively and accepted by the boreal caribou management authorities (Wildlife Management Advisory Council (NWT); Gwich'in Renewable Resources Board; Sahtú Renewable Resources Board; Wek'èezhìi Renewable Resources Board; Tłıcho Government; and the Government of the Northwest Territories) with input from Aboriginal organizations and the public.

Amphibians

- Northern leopard frog and western toad were added to the NWT List of Species at Risk as threatened species on March 19, 2015 and February 25, 2016, respectively.
- All amphibians in the NWT share several threats in common including diseases such as chytrid fungus and ranavirus.
- Other threats include human activities that alter habitat, accidental human-caused mortality, increasing UV-B radiation, contaminants and climate change.
- The management plan was developed collaboratively and accepted by the boreal caribou management authorities (Wildlife Management Advisory Council (NWT); Gwich'in Renewable Resources Board; Sahtú Renewable Resources Board; Wek'èezhìi Renewable Resources Board; Tłıcho Government; and the Government of the Northwest Territories) with input from Aboriginal organizations and the public.

Finalisation du Programme de retablissement et du Plan de gestion pour deux especes tenoises en peril

Yellowknife, le 28 février 2017 – Le Programme de rétablissement du caribou boréal et le Plan de gestion des amphibiens des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (TNO) ont été publiés cette semaine.

Le dévoilement de ces publications s'inscrit dans les responsabilités du gouvernement ténois aux termes de la *Loi sur les espèces en péril* (TNO); il fait suite à des évaluations indépendantes réalisées par le Comité sur les espèces en péril des TNO et à des accords de consensus issus de la Conférence des autorités de gestion (CAG).

La CAG dispose de neuf mois pour mettre au point des accords de consensus pour la mise en œuvre du Programme de rétablissement du caribou boréal et du Plan de gestion des amphibiens.



Amphibiens:

- La grenouille léopard et le crapaud boréal ont été désignés comme des espèces menacées aux termes de la Loi sur les espèces en péril des TNO le 19 mars 2015 et le 25 février 2016, respectivement.
- Toutes les espèces d'amphibiens aux TNO font face à des menaces communes, y compris des maladies comme la chytridiomycose et le ranavirus.
- Ils sont également menacés par les activités humaines qui modifient leur habitat, les accidents mortels d'origine humaine, l'augmentation des rayonnements ultraviolets B, les contaminants et le changement climatique.



Government of the Northwest Territories Extends Key Mineral Exploration Program

YELLOWKNIFE (MARCH 8, 2017) — The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) today took another concrete action to support its foundational mineral exploration sector by extending a popular, effective program.

The Work Credit Program, originally introduced in 2015 to offset costs for mineral explorers during a downturn in commodity prices, will be extended for two years beginning April 1, 2017 in response to continuing challenges.

Under the *NWT Mining Regulations*, holders of recorded mineral claims in the NWT must complete work or submit cash in lieu to keep a claim active. Reported exploration work is assessed and approved by the Government of the Northwest Territories' Mining Recorder's Office.

With this program, the credit or value of this exploration work will be multiplied by 1.5 in the recording system — effectively increasing the value of work done and reducing burden on explorers operating in the NWT.

This program originally arose from recommendations made by the Mining Industry Advisory Board (MIAB), who identified work credits as a practical area for relief.

The extension is in-line with the GNWT's commitment in its mandate to support both mining and the exploration laying a foundation for future mines.

- Mining activities are responsible for roughly 1/10 NWT jobs.

Yellowknife, le 8 mars 2017 – En prolongeant ce programme populaire et efficace, le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) a posé aujourd'hui un geste concret pour soutenir le secteur fondamental de l'exploration minière.

Le programme de stimulation de l'exploration minière, initialement mis en place en 2015 pour compenser les coûts des entreprises d'exploration minière en raison de la baisse des prix des produits de base, sera prolongé pour deux ans à compter du 1^{er} avril 2017 afin de soutenir ces entreprises qui font sans cesse face à de nouveaux défis.

En vertu du *Règlement sur l'exploitation minière* des TNO, les détenteurs de claims miniers enregistrés aux TNO doivent réaliser des travaux sur leurs claims pour qu'ils restent valides, ou verser de l'argent en contrepartie. Les rapports sur les travaux d'exploration sont évalués et approuvés par le Bureau du registraire minier du GTNO.

Grâce à ce programme, le crédit ou la valeur des travaux d'exploration sera multiplié par 1,5 dans le système d'enregistrement, ce qui permettra d'améliorer la valeur des travaux effectués et de soulager les entreprises d'exploration ténoises.

À l'origine, ce programme a été créé à partir des recommandations formulées par le Conseil consultatif sur l'exploitation minière qui avait défini que les crédits pour travaux permettraient de soulager les entreprises concernées.

La prolongation de ce programme correspond à un des engagements inscrits par le GTNO dans son mandat : soutenir l'exploration et l'exploitation minière en vue d'ouvrir de nouvelles mines.

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European Union Opens Door to Inuvialuit Seal

YELLOWKNIFE (MARCH 9, 2017) — Inuvialuit-created sealskin products will be an option for fashion-conscious Europeans combatting next year's winter weather thanks to a long-standing lobbying effort led by the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT).

The European Union (EU) has accepted the Northwest Territories' (NWT) application to accept the Inuvialuit as a Recognized Body under the Indigenous exception to the EU seal products prohibition.

This will provide unencumbered access to the European market for seal products harvested in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region.

The Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment (ITI) will incorporate the marketing of NWT seal products under the Genuine Mackenzie Valley Fur brand. In collaboration with Inuvialuit Regional Corporation (IRC), ITI will also be advancing a certification program to promote consumer confidence in European travellers who will now be able to return home with sealskin products purchased in the NWT.

In support of its mandate to advance greater economic diversification for the NWT economy, the GNWT has committed to promoting the products of its traditional economy to international markets. These efforts further align with GNWT obligations under the Inuvialuit Final Agreement.

The GNWT collaborated closely with the federal Department of Fisheries and Oceans in its engagement of the EU.

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Le marché des peaux de phoque inuvialuites s'ouvre à l'Union européenne

Yellowknife, **le 9 mars 2017** – Les efforts soutenus du gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) pour percer le marché de l'Europe viennent de porter fruit. Ainsi, les *fashionistas* d'outre-Atlantique pourront dès l'hiver prochain se protéger élégamment des rigueurs hivernales avec des produits inuvialuits en peau de phoque.

En effet, à la demande des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (TNO), l'Union européenne (UE) a accepté d'appliquer aux produits inuvialuits l'exception, pour les Autochtones, à la prohibition des produits dérivés du phoque.

Cette décision permettra donc aux produits dérivés du phoque issus de la Région désignée des Inuvialuits d'accéder sans encombre au marché de l'Europe.

Le ministère de l'Industrie, du Tourisme et de l'Investissement (MITI) prévoit faire la promotion des produits dérivés du phoque ténois sous la marque des « Fourrures authentiques de la vallée du Mackenzie ». Le MITI s'associera aussi à l'Inuvialuit Regional Corporation (IRC) pour mettre au point une certification qui permettra aux touristes européens de ramener en toute confiance dans leurs bagages des produits en peau de phoque achetés aux TNO.

S'étant notamment donné comme mandat de favoriser une diversification économique accrue aux TNO, le GTNO s'est engagé à promouvoir auprès des marchés internationaux les produits issus de son économie traditionnelle – des efforts qui s'alignent par ailleurs avec les obligations propres au GTNO dans le cadre de la Convention définitive des Inuvialuits.

Le GTNO a collaboré de près avec Pêches et Océans Canada pour traiter avec l'UE.

Over the duration of the Summit, the NWT delegation participated in discussions in workshops, panel discussions, all of which provided delegates the opportunity to learn from other governments, share their experiences, and experience firsthand the national leaders discussing the recommendations that they had input into.

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Government of the Northwest Territories Finalizes Framework for Managing Recreational Leases

YELLOWKNIFE (March 16, 2017) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has completed an important step in advancing work to improve its land management practices by releasing the finalized Recreational Leasing Management Framework for the Northwest Territories.

This fulfills the first part of the 18th Legislative Assembly commitment to finalize the Recreational Land Management Framework and the plan for the Yellowknife periphery area.

The framework, now called the Recreational *Leasing* Management Framework, outlines six goals and associated priorities, which the GNWT is working towards as a means to improve the territorial government's recreational leasing practices.

The goals are:

- Recognize and respect uses of public lands
- Support recreation management planning in priority areas
- Modernize and clarify leasing practices and processes
- Enhance public awareness and understanding
- Address unauthorized occupancy
- Encourage compliance and strengthen enforcement

The GNWT will continue to consult with Aboriginal governments and engage the public as it moves forward and actions the priorities outlined in the Framework.

- The GNWT conducted broad public engagements that included eight public meetings in seven communities across the NWT, and offered online feedback options as well. Industry representatives were also invited to provide feedback.
- The GNWT sought input from, and consulted with, Aboriginal governments and organizations before finalizing the framework.
- The framework was renamed the Recreational *Leasing* Management Framework to better reflect the document's leasing focus and applies NWT-wide on both Territorial and Commissioner's Land managed by the GNWT.
- Yellowknife periphery area recreation management planning is advancing and the GNWT expects to release a draft Recreation Management Plan for the area outside and around Yellowknife, N'dilo, and Detah for public comment during the summer of 2017.
- Once finalized, the recreation management plan will include desired future conditions for recreational use in the study area, objectives and strategies for managing recreational use, and identification of opportunities for recreational cabin leasing. The GNWT will ensure Section 35 Consultation responsibilities are met prior to any decisions to approve the plan.

Il détaillera également les possibilités de location de terres à des fins de villégiature. GNWT Releases Request for Qualifications for the Tłįcho All-Season Road

YELLOWKNIFE (March 20, 2017) – Minister of Finance, Robert C. McLeod announced today that the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has begun the formal procurement process for the Tłįchǫ All Season Road (TASR) by releasing the Request for Qualifications (RFQ) to design, build, finance, operate and maintain an all-season road to Whatì.

The RFQ is the first stage in a competitive selection process to procure the TASR through a Public-Private Partnership (P3) in accordance with the GNWT's *Public-Private Partnership Policy*. The RFQ invites interested parties to submit responses indicating their interest in, and qualifications for, the TASR project. This includes an assessment on the technical and financial capacity to undertake the project.

Based on the responses to the RFQ, the GNWT intends to select a shortlist of up to three proponents to be invited to participate in the next stage of the procurement process, the Request for Proposals stage, pending a decision on the environmental assessment for the project.

To ensure that interested parties have a full and complete understanding of the P3 process and the project, and are able to provide their best submissions of qualifications for the project, the GNWT will hold a Project Information Session (Industry Day) on March 29, 2017, at the Explorer Hotel in Yellowknife.

Implementation Highlights of Inaugural Year: Mackenzie River Basin Bilateral Water Management Agreement Between the Government of Alberta and the Government of the Northwest Territories

The Alberta-NWT Bilateral Water Management Agreement was signed on March 18, 2015. The Agreement defines the ways the two governments will work together to manage transboundary waters to maintain ecological integrity of the aquatic ecosystem.

The Highlights Report helps mark Canada Water Week (March 20 - 27, 2017) to illustrate the significant cooperative efforts by the governments of Alberta and the NWT towards protecting our shared waters.

This new modern correctional facility will emphasize open cultural and educational areas to help support inmate rehabilitation and healing. The structure will take into consideration both the current and future needs of adult female inmates in the NWT.

The new building will be energy efficient and meet or exceed all safety requirements for inmates, staff and the community. As this represents the start of the new construction season, residents of Fort Smith will see increased activity on the site from now until the new structure is ready mid-2019.

Through strategic spending on infrastructure, the Government of the Northwest Territories will continue to support program and service delivery throughout the NWT.

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3D Kimberlite Mineral Chemistry Data From Slave Geological Province to be Released

YELLOWKNIFE (March 28, 2017) – A study will be released this week that reports new Kimberlite Indicator Mineral (KIM) Chemistry in the Central Slave Geological Province that has potential to benefit future exploration in the region to find the next diamond deposits.

This study is planned for release by the Northwest Territories Geological Survey (NTGS) on March 30, 2017 at 8:30 a.m. (MDT).

This is the latest geoscience research arising from the Slave Province Surficial Materials and Permafrost Study that was conducted from 2015-2016, designed to inform a variety of mineral exploration, geological and environmental research objectives.

Two earlier studies provide insight into the till samples collected from the same drilling. *NWT Open Report 2016-012* reports till geochemistry from the reverse circulation sampling, and *NWT Open Report 2016-018* reports KIM picking results.

Combined, the three reports provide a valuable new 3D till geochemistry and indicator mineral database for use to advance research and mineral exploration interests. The research for the three studies was carried out by the NTGS and funded by the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency (CanNor).

The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) values geoscience information as a way to inform decision making and increase public awareness. Enhancing the availability of geoscience information is a key component of the NWT Mineral Development Strategy.

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Publication de données chimiques tridimensionnelles sur la kimberlite de la province géologique des Esclaves

Yellowknife, le 28 mars 2017 – Une étude publiée cette semaine confirmera la présence de nouveaux minéraux indicateurs de kimberlite (MIK) dans la partie centrale de la province géologique des Esclaves, ce qui pourrait soutenir l'exploration diamantifère dans la région.

La Commission géologique des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (CGTNO) doit rendre publique cette étude le 30 mars 2017, à 8 h 30 (HAR).

Il s'agit des derniers résultats géoscientifiques d'une étude sur les matériaux de surface et le pergélisol dans la province des Esclaves. Cette étude avait été lancée en 2015-2016 pour définir divers objectifs de recherche en matière d'environnement, de géologie et d'exploration minérale.

Deux études antérieures portaient sur les échantillons de till recueillis lors des mêmes forages : le *Rapport public TNO 2016-012* décrit la géochimie du till à la suite de l'échantillonnage par circulation inverse, alors que le *Rapport public TNO 2016-018* rapporte les résultats du tri des MIK.

Ensemble, les trois rapports alimentent une nouvelle base de données sur la géochimie tridimensionnelle du till et des minéraux indicateurs qui s'avérera précieuse pour la recherche et l'exploration minérale. Les recherches ont été menées par la CGTNO et financées par l'Agence canadienne de développement économique du Nord (CanNor).

Le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) valorise les données géoscientifiques en tant qu'outil pour prendre des décisions et informer le public. La diffusion de données géoscientifiques fait partie intégrante de la Stratégie d'exploitation des minéraux des TNO.

Mackenzie Valley Fibre Line Construction Completed

YELLOWKNIFE (March 28, 2017) – The Mackenzie Valley Fibre Link (MVFL) achieved a major milestone on March 16, 2017 as the last two splice locations were installed, officially completing the construction of the 1,154 km fibre line between Inuvik and High Level, Alberta.

With this, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) is one step closer to fulfilling its Mandate commitment to complete the Mackenzie Valley Fibre Optic Link in order to help modernize the economy and enable growth in all economic sectors.

The project now moves into the next phase of work, which will consist of testing the performance and functionality before commissioning the system for service. The commencement target for the MVFL is June 1, 2017.

Inuvik is geographically gifted due its favorable Arctic location to track and receive data in real-time from polar-orbiting satellites. The GNWT, through the success of the MVFL, looks forward to continuing to support the growth of the remote-sensing and commercial satellite industry in Inuvik.

L'installation du réseau de liaison par fibre optique dans la vallée du Mackenzie est maintenant terminée

Yellowknife, le 28 mars 2017 – Le projet de liaison par fibre optique dans la vallée du Mackenzie (LFOVM) a atteint une étape majeure le 16 mars dernier : en effet, c'est à cette date que les deux derniers points de jonction ont été installés, complétant officiellement le réseau de 1 154 km entre Inuvik (Territoires du Nord-Ouest) et High Level (Alberta).

Le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) est donc plus près que jamais de réaliser son engagement visant à doter les TNO d'une liaison par fibre optique dans la vallée du Mackenzie pour moderniser l'économie ténoise et favoriser la croissance dans tous ses secteurs.

Le projet passera maintenant à l'étape suivante, qui consiste à tester la performance et la fonctionnalité du réseau avant de le mettre en service, ce qui est prévu pour le 1^{er} juin 2017.

La collectivité d'Inuvik jouit d'une position géographique avantageuse dans l'Arctique, puisqu'on peut y suivre et y recevoir des données en temps réel à partir de satellites en orbite polaire. GNWT Organizational Changes Taking Effect on April 1st

On April 1st, the GNWT will be implementing some organizational changes.

As you know, the GNWT has been taking steps to ensure a strong future for the NWT by exploring the most efficient and effective delivery of programs and services while reducing expenditures to meet budgets. One of these steps was a reduction in the number of GNWT Departments.

Six GNWT Departments will become three:

- The Department of Transportation and the Department of Public Works and Services will become the **Department of Infrastructure (Inf)**;
- The Department of Executive and the Department of Aboriginal and Intergovernmental Affairs will become the Department of Executive and Indigenous Affairs (EIA); and
- The Department of Finance and the Department of Human Resources will become the Department of Finance (Fin). The two central agency departments – Fin and EIA - will share a corporate services unit administratively housed in the Department of Finance.

If you are an employee in any of these Departments, you are aware of the changes and have been working for some time to prepare for the new structure. NWT Fur Surges at Season's Largest Auction

YELLOWKNIFE (April 3, 2017) — This year's biggest fur auction yielded strong results for Northwest Territories trappers as they will receive their largest payout in two years.

The annual Saga, American Legend and Fur Harvesters fur auction in Helsinki, Finland drew nearly half-a-million in sales for NWT wild furs sold under the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT)-managed Genuine Mackenzie Valley Fur (GMVF) brand — nearly doubling the total from 2016's auction.

Marten — the NWT's top-selling pelt— made up more than \$430,000 of the take with a 76% year-over-year increase in the average price for the prized pelts.

This year's auction included new buyers from the Asian and European markets engaged from the GNWT's presentation of GMVF Furs at the China Fur and Leather Products Fair in Beijing in January.

As part of its mandate to promote economic diversity through strategic investments in traditional harvesting, the GNWT is committed to increasing exports by promoting NWT fur products to international markets.

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Rebond spectaculaire des ventes de fourrures ténoises lors de la plus grande vente aux enchères de la saison

Yellowknife, le 3 avril 2017 — La plus grande vente aux enchères de l'année dans le secteur de la fourrure a donné d'excellents résultats pour les piégeurs des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (TNO), qui pourront ainsi toucher leur plus gros dividende en deux ans.

Les fourrures d'animaux sauvages ténois vendues sous la marque Fourrures authentiques de la vallée du Mackenzie (FAVM) – dont la gestion est assurée par le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) – ont généré des ventes de près d'un demi-million de dollars lors de la vente aux enchères annuelle de Saga, American Legend et Fur Harvesters à Helsinki (Finlande). Ces résultats sont près de deux fois supérieurs à ceux obtenus à la vente de 2016.

April 6, 2017 Ottawa, ON - The settlement of land claims is key to advancing reconciliation with Indigenous communities in Canada and creates the foundation for social development and economic growth that can generate benefits for Indigenous people and all Canadians.

Yesterday, the Honourable Carolyn Bennett, Minister of Indigenous and Northern Affairs, and the Honourable Bob McLeod, Premier and Minister of Executive and Indigenous Affairs for the Government of the Northwest Territories, met with leadership of the Dehcho First Nations, the Akaitcho First Nations and the Northwest Territory Métis Nation in Ottawa to discuss their respective land claims.

The meeting follows the submission of two reports from Ministerial Special Representatives who were appointed to facilitate discussions between the negotiating parties to advance resolution of their claims. The reports, which highlight current challenges in negotiations and provide recommendations to address them, provide the opportunity for a path forward with each Indigenous group in a spirit of reconciliation and collaboration.

Le 6 avril 2017 Ottawa (Ont.) - Le règlement des revendications territoriales est essentiel à la progression de la réconciliation avec les Autochtones au Canada; il constitue le fondement du développement social et de la croissance économique pouvant offrir des avantages aux Autochtones ainsi qu'à tous les Canadiens.

Hier, l'honorable Carolyn Bennett, ministre des Affaires autochtones et du Nord, et l'honorable Bob McLeod, premier ministre et ministre de l'Exécutif et des Affaires autochtones du gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest, ont rencontré des dirigeants des Premières Nations du Dehcho, des Premières Nations d'Akaitcho et de la Nation des Métis des Territoires du Nord-Ouest à Ottawa pour discuter de leurs revendications territoriales respectives.

Canadian Free Trade Agreement Signals Opportunities For Growth In Canada's North

YELLOWKNIFE (April 7, 2017) – The new Canadian Free Trade Agreement (CFTA) will make it easier for Northwest Territories (NWT) residents to do business across Canada while making allowances for the unique economic circumstances that exist in Canada's North.

The new Agreement focuses on reducing barriers to trade, investment and employee mobility to promote economic growth within Canada. The CFTA will replace the Agreement on Internal Trade (AIT) on July 1, 2017.

Through active participation in the negotiations, the GNWT achieved important flexibility for the NWT under the new CFTA, including the ability to continue to apply the Business Incentive Policy (BIP) to its procurements.

Additional improvements in the CFTA include:

- Strong and effective regulations to protect NWT residents and environment;
- Making northern agricultural development and food security national priorities;
- Expanded procurement flexibility for the NWT's municipalities, academic institutions, social services entities and health organizations; and
- The recognition of traditional knowledge in environmental regulation.

The CFTA provides opportunities for the NWT to develop its trade economy and further diversify sectors such as the arts, fisheries, forestry, manufacturing, tourism and traditional harvesting.

L'Accord de libre-échange du Canada porteur d'occasions de croissance dans le Nord canadien

Yellowknife, le 7 avril 2017 – Le nouvel Accord de libre-échange du Canada (ALEC) permettra aux habitants des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (TNO) de faire des affaires plus facilement avec le reste du Canada tout en tenant compte de la situation économique propre au Nord canadien.

Le nouvel Accord est axé sur l'élimination d'obstacles aux affaires, aux investissements et à la mobilité des employés afin de promouvoir la croissance économique au Canada. Il remplacera l'Accord sur le commerce intérieur (ACI) à compter du 1^{er} juillet 2017.

Consensus Agreement Reached On Management Plan For Polar Bears In The Northwest Territories

YELLOWKNIFE (April 10, 2017) – The Northwest Territories (NWT) Conference of Management Authorities (CMA), established under the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act* to manage and recover species at risk in the NWT, has reached consensus to adopt the *Inuvialuit Settlement Region Polar Bear Joint Management Plan* and the *Framework for Action for Management of Polar Bears in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region*.

These documents were developed through extensive collaboration between management partners and consultations with affected communities and jurisdictions with responsibilities for polar bear management in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region (ISR).

Polar bears were added to the NWT List of Species at Risk on February 27, 2014 as a species of special concern.

The *Inuvialuit Settlement Region Polar Bear Joint Management Plan* describes management objectives for polar bears in the entire ISR, including both the NWT and Yukon.

Management of polar bears in the ISR is jurisdictionally complex and the plan is intended to facilitate an integrated and common approach across all jurisdictions. To facilitate this process, a companion document, the *Framework for Action for Management of Polar Bears in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region* was developed which outlines recommended actions and areas where further work should be directed.

The adoption of the *Inuvialuit Settlement Region Polar Bear Joint Management Plan* and the *Framework for Action for Management of Polar Bears in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region* fulfills CMA responsibilities under the *Species at Risk (NWT) Act* to complete a management plan for polar bears.

The signed consensus agreement articulating this adoption was provided to the Minister of Environment and Natural Resources on March 27, 2017. The Minister is required to publish this agreement, as well as the *Inuvialuit Settlement Region Polar Bear Joint Management Plan* and the *Framework for Action for Management of Polar Bears in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region*, within three months.

The CMA now has until March 27, 2018 to develop a consensus agreement on the implementation of the *Inuvialuit Settlement Region Polar Bear Joint Management Plan* and the *Framework for Action for Management of Polar Bears in the Inuvialuit Settlement Region*.

This 'implementation agreement' will outline how the Management Authorities for polar bears in the NWT plan on implementing the management plan and framework for action.

Background:

- The CMA was established under the Species at Risk (NWT) Act to make decisions on listing, conservation, management, and recovery of species that may be at risk of disappearing from the NWT.
- Wildlife management authority in the NWT is shared between the Government of the Northwest Territories (through the Department of Environment and Natural Resources), wildlife co-management boards established under settled land claim agreements and the Tłįcho Government
- The CMA brings together all of these organizations (called 'Management Authorities') to make decisions on listing conserving managing and recovering species that may be at risk of disappearing from the NWT.
- All CMA decisions are made by consensus.

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Conclusion d'un accord de consensus sur un plan de gestion des ours polaires aux Territoires du Nord-Ouest

Yellowknife, le 10 avril 2017 – La Conférence des autorités de gestion des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (TNO), créée en vertu de la *Loi sur les espèces en péril* des TNO afin de gérer les espèces en péril du territoire et d'aider à leur rétablissement, a atteint un consensus pour adopter le « Plan de gestion conjoint de l'ours polaire dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits » et le « Cadre d'action sur la gestion des ours polaires dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits ».

Ces documents ont été élaborés grâce à une étroite collaboration entre des partenaires de gestion et à des consultations avec des collectivités et des autorités concernées par la gestion des ours polaires dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits (RDI).

Le 27 février 2014, l'ours polaire a été ajouté à la liste des espèces en péril des TNO en tant qu'espèce préoccupante.

Le « Plan de gestion conjoint de l'ours polaire dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits » décrit des objectifs de gestion des ours polaires dans toute la RDI, y compris aux TNO et au Yukon. L'autorité de gestion des ours polaires dans la RDI est complexe en matière de juridiction, et le plan est destiné à faciliter une approche commune et intégrée par les différentes autorités responsables. Afin de faciliter ce processus, le « Cadre d'action sur la gestion des ours polaires dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits » a été élaboré. Ce document d'accompagnement décrit les mesures et les domaines vers lesquels des travaux supplémentaires devraient être ciblés.

L'adoption du « Plan de gestion conjoint de l'ours polaire dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits » et du « Cadre d'action sur la gestion des ours polaires dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits » permet à la Conférence des autorités de gestion d'assumer ses responsabilités consistant à préparer un plan de gestion des ours polaires, en vertu de la *Loi sur les espèces en péril* des TNO.

L'accord de consensus signé énonçant clairement cette adoption a été remis au ministre de l'Environnement et des Ressources naturelles le 27 mars 2017. Il incombe à ce dernier de publier ledit accord, ainsi que le « Plan de gestion conjoint de l'ours polaire dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits » et le « Cadre d'action sur la gestion des ours polaires dans la région désignée des Inuvialuits », dans les trois mois.

La Conférence des autorités de gestion a maintenant jusqu'au 27 mars 2018 pour rédiger un accord de consensus sur la mise en oeuvre du Plan et du Cadre.

Cette entente présentera la méthode de mise en oeuvre des documents que les autorités de gestion des ours polaires aux TNO prévoient adopter.

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Changes To Non-Insured Health Benefits

YELLOWKNIFE (April 18, 2017) – In response to Health Canada's recent announcement that expecting mothers covered by the Federal NIHB program who have to travel outside of their home community to give birth will now be supported by one non-medical escort, the Department of Health and Social Services will extend this benefit to residents eligible under the Metis Health Benefits Policy and to non-indigenous mothers also.

Effective today, expecting mothers covered under the NIHB program, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) Metis Health Benefits Policy, and the GNWT Medical Travel Policy will be eligible to access this new benefit.

Health Canada has not yet clarified the guidelines that will be put in place for the NIHB benefit, but in consultation with Health Canada the GNWT will implement an interim measure that provides for a non-medical escort for expectant mothers 14 days prior to their due date. The Minister of Health and Social Services has provided an exception to the Medical Travel Escort Criteria Policy to mirror this benefit. This Policy and the NIHB guidelines will be updated once Health Canada provides final direction.

Yellowknife, le 18 avril 2017 – Santé Canada a annoncé récemment que les femmes enceintes bénéficiant du programme fédéral des services de santé non assurés (SSNA) qui doivent se déplacer hors de leur collectivité d'origine pour accoucher pourront désormais avoir le soutien d'un accompagnateur non médical. En réponse à cette annonce, le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux accordera également cette prestation aux résidents admissibles en vertu de la Politique sur le régime d'assurance-maladie pour les Métis et aux femmes enceintes non autochtones.

À compter d'aujourd'hui, les femmes enceintes bénéficiant du programme SSNA, de la Politique sur le régime d'assurance-maladie pour les Métis du gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) et de la Politique sur les déplacements pour raisons médicales du GTNO seront admissibles à cette nouvelle prestation.

En attendant que Santé Canada précise les lignes directrices qui seront instaurées pour le programme SSNA, le GTNO, en consultation avec Santé Canada, mettra en place une mesure intérimaire selon laquelle un accompagnateur non médical peut accompagner une femme enceinte 14 jours avant sa date prévue d'accouchement. Le ministre de la Santé et des Services sociaux a prévu une exception à la <u>Politique sur les critères décrivant</u> <u>l'accompagnateur médical</u> afin de refléter cette prestation. Cette politique et les lignes directrices du programme SSNA seront mises à jour lorsque Santé Canada émettra ses instructions finales.

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Work Underway To Support Cannabis Legalization In Northwest Territories

YELLOWKNIFE (April 20, 2017) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has begun the necessary work to prepare for the legalization of cannabis following the tabling of federal legislation in the House of Commons last week.

The GNWT established a multi-departmental cannabis working group in 2016 in response to federal plans to table legislation sometime in early 2017. The working group will now review the legislation to determine next steps to ensure the GNWT is prepared for legalization in July 2018.

Quick Facts

- The GNWT working group includes the Departments of Justice; Health and Social Services; Municipal and Community Affairs; Finance; Education, Culture and Employment; Infrastructure; and the Workers Safety and Compensation Commission.

- The proposed federal legislation sets the national age limit to purchase at 18 years of age, and will allow territories and provinces the ability to marry it with their minimum age for the purchase of alcohol.
- Canadians will be allowed to have a maximum of four plants per household, no taller than one meter in height. However, provinces and territories may reduce the amount.
- Adults who are 18 years or older would be able to legally possess up to 30 grams of dried cannabis, and share up to 30 grams with other adults. However, provinces and territories have the authority to reduce the personal amounts.
- Restrictions on where residents are able to smoke cannabis will follow regulations set out with regards to the public smoking of tobacco.
- Illegal distribution or sale of cannabis could lead to a maximum penalty of 14 years in prison under the Criminal Code of Canada.

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Travaux en cours pour préparer la légalisation du cannabis aux Territoires du Nord-Ouest

Yellowknife, le 20 avril 2017 – Après le dépôt du projet de loi fédéral sur le cannabis devant la Chambre des communes la semaine dernière, le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) a entrepris le travail qui pavera la voie à la légalisation.

- La distribution ou la vente illégale de cannabis pourrait entraîner une peine maximale de 14 ans d'emprisonnement en vertu du Code criminel du Canada.



Public Engagement and Transparency Website Launches

YELLOWKNIFE (May 31, 2017) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has launched a new Public Engagement and Transparency website as part of its ongoing commitment to increase accountability and transparency. The new website improves the GNWT's approach to reporting on ministerial travel expenses and meetings with outside parties.

The site will be updated each month, replacing the GNWT's previous approach of publishing quarterly PDF reports on ministerial travel expenses and meetings. Users will now be able to access information in a searchable and downloadable format, consistent with recognized principles of open data for governments to make their information freely available in reusable, machine-readable formats.

The new site is part of the Minister of Public Engagement and Transparency's response to direction in his mandate letter to promote awareness about information on government accountability.

École Allain St-Cyr Expansion Begins With Ground-Breaking Ceremony

YELLOWKNIFE (June 2, 2017) – Earlier today, Alfred Moses, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Wally Schumann, Minister of Infrastructure, and Mr. Simon Cloutier, Président of the Board of the Commission scolaire francophone officially launched the construction project for the expansion of École Allain St-Cyr.

With an investment of nearly \$12.8 million from the Government of the Northwest Territories, the construction project will include a gymnasium with a stage, two multipurpose classrooms, and instructional spaces for students with special needs, as well as open areas for students.

The result of many considerations and discussions, the working group solidified the plans for the construction earlier in the spring. The expansion will provide École Allain St-Cyr, the only French-first school in Yellowknife, with a dedicated community area, greater space for their growing student population, and the opportunity to expand further.

Minister Moses and Président Cloutier were joined by the Honourable Wally Schumann, Minister of Infrastructure, Yvonne Careen, Superintendent of the Commission scolaire francophone, Kevin O'Reilly, MLA for Frame Lake, and Jacques Lamarche, member of the Association des parents ayants droit de Yellowknife for the ceremonial groundbreaking.

The construction is planned for completion for late 2018.

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Appointment of Administrator under the Aurora College Act

YELLOWKNIFE (June 5, 2017) – Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Alfred Moses made the following statement today about the appointment of an administrator pursuant to *Aurora College Act* s. 31:

"After careful consideration, I have made a decision to appoint Mr. Denny Rodgers as Administrator of Aurora College. The Administrator will temporarily replace the Aurora College Board of Governors and assume their role and responsibilities, effective June 6, 2017.

"Mr. Rodgers brings a great deal of administrative and leadership experience to the Administrator position. Mr. Rodgers is currently the General Manager of the Inuvialuit Development Corporation. He was also Mayor of Inuvik from 2009 to 2012 and Chair of the Workers' Safety and Compensation Commission of the NWT and Nunavut from 2003 to 2009.

"At this time, I believe this to be the best course of action to take in light of the planned Foundational Review of Aurora College. The Administrator will help to ensure stability and continuity, as Aurora College will be expected to maintain normal operations through the course of both the Foundational Review and the implementation of the Review's recommendations.

"The Review, announced March 6, 2017, will help inform the government's long term vision for Aurora College and better position it to provide the necessary skills and knowledge our residents require to participate in, and contribute to the social and economic fabric of the NWT for decades to come.

"I have conveyed my gratitude to the departing members of the Board.

"As we undergo the transition to an Administrator and begin the Review process, I am confident that College senior administration and staff across the NWT will seamlessly continue to deliver services and programs to meet the needs of the student community."

The first video, <u>How to Use a Naloxone Kit</u>, is a step-by-step guide on how to use an injectable Naloxone kit. Naloxone is a life-saving medication that can temporarily stop or reverse the effects of an opioid overdose.



New Environmental Monitoring and Research Projects Funded in the NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (June 5, 2017) – Thirteen new environmental monitoring and research projects awarded through the Northwest Territories Cumulative Impact Program (NWT CIMP) will provided knowledge that will help ensure a healthy environment for Northerners now and in the future.

Announced on World Environment Day by Environment and Natural Resources Minister Robert C. McLeod, the 13 new projects funded during the 2017-2018 fiscal year will be led by First Nations, Canadian universities and Territorial and federal government departments. Total funding for the projects is more than \$700,000.

Topics range from tracking landscape change and cumulative impacts using remote sensing to the use of Traditional Knowledge in to better understand changes in boreal and barren-ground caribou habitat.

- A Steering Committee of Aboriginal, Territorial and federal governments guides the program and makes recommendations on project funding.



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Incentive Program Provides \$1 Million to NWT Explorers, Prospectors

YELLOWKNIFE (JUNE 7, 2017) – Nearly \$1 million is being invested in the future of Northwest Territories (NWT) exploration and prospecting thanks to the Government of the Northwest Territories' (GNWT) signature incentive program.

The Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment announced today the 2017-2018 funding recipients under the Mining Incentive Program (MIP) administered by their Northwest Territories Geological Survey division.

Seven corporate recipients and six prospectors were awarded funding for this coming year.

The MIP provides funding to qualifying exploration and prospecting projects to encourage work on existing projects as well as incent new projects in the NWT.

In March 2017, the GNWT announced funding for the MIP would be increased from \$400,000 to \$1 million — an adjustment designed to respond to an evolving operating environment since the program's inception in 2014. This intake was the first under the new funding allowance.

MIP is part of the *NWT Mineral Development Strategy (MDS)*, the guiding document for the GNWT's approach to support a strong, stable mining and exploration industry.

Implementing the MDS to support mining as the foundation of the territorial economy is a commitment under the GNWT's Mandate.



Mackenzie Valley Fibre Link goes live in Inuvik

INUVIK (June 12, 2017) – Premier and Cabinet of The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT), along with its partners, NorthwesTel and Ledcor Group, were in Inuvik this past weekend to celebrate the launch of the Mackenzie Valley Fibre Link (MVFL).

Construction of the 1,154 km fibre line between High Level, Alberta and Inuvik was completed in March 2017. It connects six communities in the Mackenzie Valley to high-speed internet and state-of-the-art telecommunications infrastructure and fulfils the Government of the Northwest Territories mandate commitment to complete the line in order to help modernize the economy and enable growth in all economic sectors.

Inuvik's favourable geographic location is ideal for tracking and receiving data in real-time from polar-orbiting satellites. The activation of the link will support the continued growth of the remote-sensing and commercial satellite industry.



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Interim Location identified for Sobering Centre Program

YELLOWKNIFE (June 14, 2017) – Glen Abernethy, Minister of Health and Social Services, announced that an interim location has been identified for the Sobering Centre program in Yellowknife. A collaborative effort by the Northwest Territories Health and Social Services Authority (NTHSSA), the City of Yellowknife and the Department of Health and Social Services has resulted in an agreement to host the program in the Yellowknife Community Arena until September 13, 2017.

The program will be launched on July 17, 2017.

The NTHSSA has reached an agreement with the NWT Disabilities Council to operate the Sobering Centre program, utilizing clinical support from within the NTHSSA.

City staff will continue to maintain and operate the building, on a cost-recovery basis (note that facility and operating costs are included in the HSS Sobering Centre budget).

The City of Yellowknife has reached an agreement with the Yellowknife Women's Centre to deliver the Street Outreach Service portion of the program for which the RCMP are providing an unmarked van.

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New Geophysical Reports provide insight into mineral potential of Slave Geological Province

YELLOWKNIFE (June 14, 2017) – Two airborne geophysical surveys will provide additional insight for prospectors and mineral development companies interested in exploration in the Slave Geological Province of the Northwest Territories (NWT). The studies, developed by the Northwest Territories Geological Survey (NTGS), provide detailed airborne magnetic and electromagnetic survey data from the promising region.

The new reports are entitled:

- NWT Open Report 2017-014. Aeromagnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton, NWT. Parts of NTS 75M and 75N
- NWT Open Report 2017-015. Airborne Electromagnetic and Horizontal-Gradient Magnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton Area, NWT, Parts of NTS 75M, 75N, and 76D

This is the second data release in 2017; an earlier <u>data set</u> of mineral chemical information was released in March. The work was funded by a joint agreement between the NTGS and the Canadian Northern Development Agency (CanNor) to inform a variety of mineral exploration, geological and environmental research objectives.

The NTGS is a science-mandated division of the Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment. Enhancing the availability of geoscience information is central to the Government of the Northwest Territories' stated mandate to implement the NWT Mineral Development Strategy.



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Backgrounder: New Reports on Slave Geological Province Mineral Potential to be Released

- Two new reports will provide additional insights for prospectors and mineral development companies interested in exploration in the central Slave Geological Province of the Northwest Territories (NWT). The region is highly prospective for diamond, gold, and base metal exploration.
- The new publications are:
 - NWT Open Report 2017-014. Aeromagnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton, NWT, Parts of NTS 75M and 75N
 - o **NWT Open Report 2017-015.** Airborne Electromagnetic and Horizontal-Gradient Magnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton Area, NWT, Parts of NTS 75M, 75N, and 76D
- Public geoscience information of this type provides a "roadmap" that helps to focus exploration efforts to the most mineral-prospective regions, thereby increasing exploration attractiveness and decreasing the regional footprint of exploration.
- The high-resolution data can provide valuable information on bedrock type, geological structures, and potential mineral deposits. This information is used by stakeholders to enhance geoscience knowledge, advance mineral exploration, and inform land use planning decisions.







Magnetic Survey

Between February 15 and April 20, 2017, an airborne magnetic survey was conducted for the NTGS by EON Geoscience Inc. in parts of National Topographic System (NTS) 75M and 75N. This survey consisted of one block of 87,696 line km with 100 m line spacing, 600 m tie line spacing, and 60 m instrument height.

• Electromagnetic Survey

Between February 19 and March 31, 2017, an airborne electromagnetic and horizontal-gradient magnetic survey was conducted for the NTGS by CGG Canada Services Ltd. in parts of NTS 75M, 75N, and 76D. A total of 4,578 line km was flown over six blocks with line spacing of 75 m, tie lines spaced at 750 m, and towed instrument height of 25 m.



- Deux nouveaux rapports donneront de nouvelles indications aux prospecteurs et aux sociétés d'exploitation minière qui souhaitent explorer le centre de la province géologique des Esclaves aux Territoires du Nord-Ouest (TNO). 

Petroleum Data Donation Encourages Economic Opportunities in the Sahtu Region

YELLOWKNIFE (June 15, 2017) – A donation of petroleum geophysical data to the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) valued at \$10 million may encourage exploration and investment in the Northwest Territories' Sahtu Region.

The donation comes from Mr. Alain Rostoker, former President of High Level Energy Co. Ltd. of Calgary. The information includes seismic reflection data, gravity geophysical data, and related information and interpretations on the Little Chicago area, 160 km northwest of Fort Good Hope. Making this information publicly available may help promote future petroleum exploration in this region.

To make this information publicly available to the broadest audience, the GNWT has requested that the Office of the Regulator of Oil and Gas Operations (OROGO) store this information and distribute it free of charge.



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REDI Initiative set to Increase Public Understanding and Awareness of Resource and Energy Development

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GNWT Introduces Changes to the Vital Statistics Act

YELLOWKNIFE (July 28, 2017) – The GNWT has introduced two important changes to the *Vital Statistics Act* that promote inclusion and respect: the ability to use single names based on traditional culture, and changing the sex designation on a birth certificate to better reflect gender identity.

Single traditional name as legal name

NWT residents can now use single traditional names as their legal name, as long as it is based on their traditional culture.

The amendment to the *Vital Statistics Act* to allow for use of single names on birth documents supports the efforts of NWT Indigenous people to reclaim their traditions and culture. This also applies to residents from other cultures that have a tradition of single names.

This is an important step in building a culture of respect and trust. Work continues to allow Indigenous characters to be used in GNWT databases so that these can appear on identity documents such as birth certificates, health cards and drivers' licenses.

To apply for a single name, residents will need to complete the <u>Application for Change of Name</u>.

A third option for gender on birth certificates

Individuals born in the NWT may now apply to change the gender on their birth registration without first having to undergo gender reassignment surgery.

The Northwest Territories is the first jurisdiction in Canada to offer a third gender option.

Individuals who do not identify as male or female can now choose gender X on their birth certificate if they were born in the NWT. This is to promote inclusion and fight discrimination against transgender and non-binary people.

To apply for a change in gender, individuals will need to complete an <u>application to Change Sex Designation</u> and include the required documentation. There are different forms: one for adults, one for minors and one for 16-18 years olds who live independently.

"The practice of using a single name was a part of Indigenous traditional practices and also used in other cultures. One of the legacies of colonization and residential school systems was the prohibition of this practice. The removal of the legislative barrier in the *Vital Statistics Act* that allows Indigenous people and residents of other cultures to reclaim their traditional names is one step in our commitment to support the revitalization of traditional practices and culture.

The changes to the *Vital Statistics Act* also marks an important step towards empowering transgender and non-binary people so that they can self-identify, without the requirement for them to undergo surgery to make changes to their birth registration documents. The amendments to the legislation will help build a respectful environment for transgender and non-binary individuals accessing GNWT services."

- Call to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (Action 17) asks for all levels of governments to enable residential school survivors and their families to reclaim names changed by the residential school system including revisions to official identity documents such as the birth certificate.
- The Department of Health and Social Services have notified other GNWT departments as well as the Government of Canada on changes to the *Vital Statistics Act*, and how these changes will affect them.
- The Department of Health and Social Services is currently working with other departments on making changes to information systems and databases to allow for Indigenous fonts. This is a complex and difficult process as changes will affect multiple information systems specific to Health and Social Services as well as other departments.
- The NWT is the first jurisdiction in Canada to offer a third gender option X.
- The Department of Health and Social Services does not have authority over other organizations/ jurisdictions acceptance of the gender X option or single names.
- NWT health card does not have a gender identifier so there is no need reapply for a new card.

COMMUNIQUÉ

YELLOWKNIFE, le 28 juillet 2017. Afin de favoriser l'inclusion et le respect, le GTNO apporte deux changements importants à la *Loi sur les statistiques de l'état civil* : il sera désormais possible d'utiliser un nom unique conforme à sa culture traditionnelle, ainsi que de modifier la désignation du sexe sur un acte de naissance pour mieux refléter l'identité de genre.

Un nom unique traditionnel comme nom officiel

Les Ténois peuvent maintenant faire de leur nom unique traditionnel leur nom officiel, tant que cette dénomination est conforme à leur culture.

Cette modification de la *Loi sur les statistiques de l'état civil* permet d'appuyer les efforts de réappropriation traditionnelle et culturelle déployés par les Autochtones des TNO. Cette Loi s'applique aussi aux Tenois se revendiquant d'une autre culture qui perpétue une tradition de nom unique.

Il s'agit d'une étape importante pour bâtir une culture de respect et de confiance. En outre, le GTNO poursuit son travail pour que ses bases de données acceptent les caractères des langues autochtones afin que ceux-ci puissent figurer sur des papiers d'identité tels que l'acte de naissance, la carte d'assurance-maladie et le permis de conduire. Pour faire une demande de nom unique, les résidents devront remplir une demande de changement de nom.

Une troisième option pour la désignation du sexe sur l'acte de naissance

Les personnes nées aux TNO peuvent maintenant faire une demande pour changer la désignation du sexe sur leur enregistrement de naissance, sans avoir subi préalablement une chirurgie de changement de sexe.

Les Ténois sont les premiers Canadiens à disposer d'une troisième option pour la désignation officielle du sexe.

Les personnes dont l'identité sexuelle ne correspond pas au sexe féminin ni au masculin peuvent dorénavant choisir le sexe neutre pour leur acte de naissance, à condition d'être nées aux TNO. Ce changement vise à favoriser l'inclusion et à combattre la discrimination contre les personnes transgenres et non binaires.

Pour faire changer leur acte de naissance, les personnes intéressées doivent remplir une <u>demande de modification de la désignation du sexe</u> et y joindre la documentation requise. Il existe trois formulaires de demande : un pour les adultes, un pour les mineurs et un pour les jeunes de 16 à 18 ans qui ne vivent plus chez leurs parents.

L'une des séquelles de la colonisation et du système des pensionnats est que cette pratique a été interdite. En levant l'obstacle légal contenu dans la *Loi sur les statistiques de l'état civil*, nous permettons aux Autochtones et aux membres d'autres cultures d'utiliser officiellement leur nom traditionnel, et concrétisons ainsi notre engagement à favoriser la revitalisation des différentes pratiques et cultures traditionnelles.

Les changements à la *Loi* constituent aussi un grand pas vers l'autonomie des personnes transgenres et non binaires, qui pourront dorénavant déterminer leur identité sexuelle elles-mêmes et modifier leurs documents de naissance sans avoir à subir de chirurgie. Ces modifications législatives favoriseront l'établissement d'un climat de respect pour les personnes transgenres et non binaires dans les services du GTNO. »

- Le rapport de la Commission de vérité et réconciliation (et plus précisément l'appel à l'action n° 17) demande à tous les ordres de gouvernement de permettre aux survivants des pensionnats et à leur famille de reprendre les noms qui ont été changés par le système des pensionnats, notamment par la révision de documents d'identité officiels comme l'acte de naissance.
- Le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux a informé les autres ministères des TNO et le gouvernement du Canada des changements apportés à la Loi sur les statistiques de l'état civil et des conséquences pour eux.
- À l'heure actuelle, le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux travaille, en collaboration avec d'autres ministères, à modifier les bases de données et les systèmes d'information gouvernementaux de façon à ce qu'ils acceptent les caractères des langues autochtones. Il s'agit d'un processus difficile et complexe, car il touche de nombreux systèmes utilisés par le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux, mais aussi par d'autres ministères.
- Le GTNO est le premier gouvernement au Canada à offrir le choix d'un troisième sexe, le sexe neutre.
- Le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux ne peut forcer d'autres organismes ou gouvernements à accepter le sexe neutre ou le nom unique.

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• Comme la carte d'assurance-maladie des TNO n'indique pas le sexe de son titulaire, il n'est pas nécessaire de demander une nouvelle carte.

This course (NT – CESCL) will provide the student with 2 days of instruction in erosion and sediment control. Upon successful completion of this course, you will be a Certified Erosion and Sediment Control Lead (CESCL) recognized by accrediting agencies, satisfying their training course requirements (renewable 3-year certification card). Construction projects greater than one acre in Washington and Alaska now require the availability of a CESCL. Municipalities in British Columbia are increasingly looking to Qualified Professionals to manage construction sites.

The north experiences distinct issues around ESC. This is standardized training with a northern perspective that uses the 2013 DOT Erosion and Sediment Control Manual as a reference. Upon completion of the training and passing an exam, you will receive a NT - CESCL certificate. We have offered this training already in Inuvik, Yellowknife, Fort Simpson and Hay River and it was well received every time. This training is open to all GNWT staff as well as GNWT stakeholders involved in erosion and sediment control.

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Changes To Non-Insured Health Benefits

YELLOWKNIFE (April 18, 2017) – In response to Health Canada's recent announcement that expecting mothers covered by the Federal NIHB program who have to travel outside of their home community to give birth will now be supported by one non-medical escort, the Department of Health and Social Services will extend this benefit to residents eligible under the Metis Health Benefits Policy and to non-indigenous mothers also.

Effective today, expecting mothers covered under the NIHB program, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) Metis Health Benefits Policy, and the GNWT Medical Travel Policy will be eligible to access this new benefit.

Health Canada has not yet clarified the guidelines that will be put in place for the NIHB benefit, but in consultation with Health Canada the GNWT will implement an interim measure that provides for a non-medical escort for expectant mothers 14 days prior to their due date. The Minister of Health and Social Services has provided an exception to the Medical Travel Escort Criteria Policy to mirror this benefit. This Policy and the NIHB guidelines will be updated once Health Canada provides final direction.



Changements aux services de santé non assurés

Yellowknife, le 18 avril 2017 – Santé Canada a annoncé récemment que les femmes enceintes bénéficiant du programme fédéral des services de santé non assurés (SSNA) qui doivent se déplacer hors de leur collectivité d'origine pour accoucher pourront désormais avoir le soutien d'un accompagnateur non médical. En réponse à cette annonce, le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux accordera également cette prestation aux résidents admissibles en vertu de la Politique sur le régime d'assurance-maladie pour les Métis et aux femmes enceintes non autochtones.

À compter d'aujourd'hui, les femmes enceintes bénéficiant du programme SSNA, de la Politique sur le régime d'assurance-maladie pour les Métis du gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) et de la Politique sur les déplacements pour raisons médicales du GTNO seront admissibles à cette nouvelle prestation.

En attendant que Santé Canada précise les lignes directrices qui seront instaurées pour le programme SSNA, le GTNO, en consultation avec Santé Canada, mettra en place une mesure intérimaire selon laquelle un accompagnateur non médical peut accompagner une femme enceinte 14 jours avant sa date prévue d'accouchement. Le ministre de la Santé et des Services sociaux a prévu une exception à la <u>Politique sur les critères décrivant</u> <u>l'accompagnateur médical</u> afin de refléter cette prestation. Cette politique et les lignes directrices du programme SSNA seront mises à jour lorsque Santé Canada émettra ses instructions finales.

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Work Underway To Support Cannabis Legalization In Northwest Territories

YELLOWKNIFE (April 20, 2017) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has begun the necessary work to prepare for the legalization of cannabis following the tabling of federal legislation in the House of Commons last week.

The GNWT established a multi-departmental cannabis working group in 2016 in response to federal plans to table legislation sometime in early 2017. The working group will now review the legislation to determine next steps to ensure the GNWT is prepared for legalization in July 2018.

We will work to ensure that a safe supply of cannabis is available to our residents while keeping it out of the hands of our children and youth, and reduce the criminal element that comes with the illicit drug trade."

Quick Facts

- The GNWT working group includes the Departments of Justice; Health and Social Services; Municipal and Community Affairs; Finance; Education, Culture and Employment; Infrastructure; and the Workers Safety and Compensation Commission.

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- The proposed federal legislation sets the national age limit to purchase at 18 years of age, and will allow territories and provinces the ability to marry it with their minimum age for the purchase of alcohol.
- Canadians will be allowed to have a maximum of four plants per household, no taller than one meter in height. However, provinces and territories may reduce the amount.
- Adults who are 18 years or older would be able to legally possess up to 30 grams of dried cannabis, and share up to 30 grams with other adults. However, provinces and territories have the authority to reduce the personal amounts.
- Restrictions on where residents are able to smoke cannabis will follow regulations set out with regards to the public smoking of tobacco.
- Illegal distribution or sale of cannabis could lead to a maximum penalty of 14 years in prison under the Criminal Code of Canada.

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Travaux en cours pour préparer la légalisation du cannabis aux Territoires du Nord-Ouest

Yellowknife, le 20 avril 2017 – Après le dépôt du projet de loi fédéral sur le cannabis devant la Chambre des communes la semaine dernière, le gouvernement des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (GTNO) a entrepris le travail qui pavera la voie à la légalisation.

En 2016, le GTNO a créé un groupe de travail interministériel sur le cannabis en réaction à l'intention qu'avait affichée le gouvernement fédéral de déposer un projet de loi au début de 2017. - Les adultes de 18 ans et plus pourront avoir légalement en leur possession un maximum de 30 grammes de cannabis séché et en partager jusqu'à 30 grammes avec d'autres adultes. Les provinces et territoires auront toutefois le pouvoir de réduire la quantité autorisée.
- La consommation de cannabis dans les endroits publics sera soumise aux mêmes restrictions réglementaires que le tabac.
- La distribution ou la vente illégale de cannabis pourrait entraîner une peine maximale de 14 ans d'emprisonnement en vertu du Code criminel du Canada.



The site will be updated each month, replacing the GNWT's previous approach of publishing quarterly PDF reports on ministerial travel expenses and meetings. Users will now be able to access information in a searchable and downloadable format, consistent with recognized principles of open data for governments to make their information freely available in reusable, machine-readable formats.

The new site is part of the Minister of Public Engagement and Transparency's response to direction in his mandate letter to promote awareness about information on government accountability.



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École Allain St-Cyr Expansion Begins With Ground-Breaking Ceremony

YELLOWKNIFE (June 2, 2017) – Earlier today, Alfred Moses, Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Wally Schumann, Minister of Infrastructure, and Mr. Simon Cloutier, Président of the Board of the Commission scolaire francophone officially launched the construction project for the expansion of École Allain St-Cyr.

With an investment of nearly \$12.8 million from the Government of the Northwest Territories, the construction project will include a gymnasium with a stage, two multi-purpose classrooms, and instructional spaces for students with special needs, as well as open areas for students.

The result of many considerations and discussions, the working group solidified the plans for the construction earlier in the spring. The expansion will provide École Allain St-Cyr, the only French-first school in Yellowknife, with a dedicated community area, greater space for their growing student population, and the opportunity to expand further.

Minister Moses and Président Cloutier were joined by the Honourable Wally Schumann, Minister of Infrastructure, Yvonne Careen, Superintendent of the Commission scolaire francophone, Kevin O'Reilly, MLA for Frame Lake, and Jacques Lamarche, member of the Association des parents ayants droit de Yellowknife for the ceremonial groundbreaking.

The construction is planned for completion for late 2018.

Appointment of Administrator under the Aurora College Act

YELLOWKNIFE (June 5, 2017) – Minister of Education, Culture and Employment Alfred Moses made the following statement today about the appointment of an administrator pursuant to *Aurora College Act* s. 31:

"After careful consideration, I have made a decision to appoint Mr. Denny Rodgers as Administrator of Aurora College. The Administrator will temporarily replace the Aurora College Board of Governors and assume their role and responsibilities, effective June 6, 2017.

"Mr. Rodgers brings a great deal of administrative and leadership experience to the Administrator position. Mr. Rodgers is currently the General Manager of the Inuvialuit Development Corporation. He was also Mayor of Inuvik from 2009 to 2012 and Chair of the Workers' Safety and Compensation Commission of the NWT and Nunavut from 2003 to 2009.

"At this time, I believe this to be the best course of action to take in light of the planned Foundational Review of Aurora College. The Administrator will help to ensure stability and continuity, as Aurora College will be expected to maintain normal operations through the course of both the Foundational Review and the implementation of the Review's recommendations.

"The Review, announced March 6, 2017, will help inform the government's long term vision for Aurora College and better position it to provide the necessary skills and knowledge our residents require to participate in, and contribute to the social and economic fabric of the NWT for decades to come.

"I have conveyed my gratitude to the departing members of the Board.

"As we undergo the transition to an Administrator and begin the Review process, I am confident that College senior administration and staff across the NWT will seamlessly continue to deliver services and programs to meet the needs of the student community."



Department of Health and Social Services Releases First of a Five-Part Video Series to Spread Awareness About the Dangers of Opioid Misuse and Abuse

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

New Environmental Monitoring and Research Projects Funded in the NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (June 5, 2017) – Thirteen new environmental monitoring and research projects awarded through the Northwest Territories Cumulative Impact Program (NWT CIMP) will provided knowledge that will help ensure a healthy environment for Northerners now and in the future.

Announced on World Environment Day by Environment and Natural Resources Minister Robert C. McLeod, the 13 new projects funded during the 2017-2018 fiscal year will be led by First Nations, Canadian universities and Territorial and federal government departments. Total funding for the projects is more than \$700,000.

Topics range from tracking landscape change and cumulative impacts using remote sensing to the use of Traditional Knowledge in to better understand changes in boreal and barren-ground caribou habitat.

- Each year, NWT CIMP funds approximately 30 scientific and Traditional Knowledge projects (totalling approximately \$1.5M), which generate new information about caribou, water and fish while providing community training and capacity building opportunities.
- A Steering Committee of Aboriginal, Territorial and federal governments guides the program and makes recommendations on project funding.

Incentive Program Provides \$1 Million to NWT Explorers, Prospectors

YELLOWKNIFE (JUNE 7, 2017) – Nearly \$1 million is being invested in the future of Northwest Territories (NWT) exploration and prospecting thanks to the Government of the Northwest Territories' (GNWT) signature incentive program.

The Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment announced today the 2017-2018 funding recipients under the Mining Incentive Program (MIP) administered by their Northwest Territories Geological Survey division.

Seven corporate recipients and six prospectors were awarded funding for this coming year.

The MIP provides funding to qualifying exploration and prospecting projects to encourage work on existing projects as well as incent new projects in the NWT.

In March 2017, the GNWT announced funding for the MIP would be increased from \$400,000 to \$1 million — an adjustment designed to respond to an evolving operating environment since the program's inception in 2014. This intake was the first under the new funding allowance.

MIP is part of the *NWT Mineral Development Strategy (MDS)*, the guiding document for the GNWT's approach to support a strong, stable mining and exploration industry.

Implementing the MDS to support mining as the foundation of the territorial economy is a commitment under the GNWT's Mandate.

Mackenzie Valley Fibre Link goes live in Inuvik

INUVIK (June 12, 2017) – Premier and Cabinet of The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT), along with its partners, NorthwesTel and Ledcor Group, were in Inuvik this past weekend to celebrate the launch of the Mackenzie Valley Fibre Link (MVFL).

Construction of the 1,154 km fibre line between High Level, Alberta and Inuvik was completed in March 2017. It connects six communities in the Mackenzie Valley to highspeed internet and state-of-the-art telecommunications infrastructure and fulfils the Government of the Northwest Territories mandate commitment to complete the line in order to help modernize the economy and enable growth in all economic sectors.

Inuvik's favourable geographic location is ideal for tracking and receiving data in realtime from polar-orbiting satellites. The activation of the link will support the continued growth of the remote-sensing and commercial satellite industry.



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Interim Location identified for Sobering Centre Program

YELLOWKNIFE (June 14, 2017) – Glen Abernethy, Minister of Health and Social Services, announced that an interim location has been identified for the Sobering Centre program in Yellowknife. A collaborative effort by the Northwest Territories Health and Social Services Authority (NTHSSA), the City of Yellowknife and the Department of Health and Social Services has resulted in an agreement to host the program in the Yellowknife Community Arena until September 13, 2017.

The program will be launched on July 17, 2017.

The NTHSSA has reached an agreement with the NWT Disabilities Council to operate the Sobering Centre program, utilizing clinical support from within the NTHSSA.

City staff will continue to maintain and operate the building, on a cost-recovery basis (note that facility and operating costs are included in the HSS Sobering Centre budget).

The City of Yellowknife has reached an agreement with the Yellowknife Women's Centre to deliver the Street Outreach Service portion of the program for which the RCMP are providing an unmarked van.

- The Northwest Territories Health and Social Services Authority Yellowknife Region Is working to design a program for a sobering centre in Yellowknife.
- The City of Yellowknife has been working in collaboration with the RCMP to establish the Street Outreach Service, which will work in collaboration with the sobering centre.
- This program recognizes the importance of providing a range of supports for individuals who may be homeless and/or dealing with chronic mental health and addictions issues, and who need a place to go during the day as an alternative to spending their time on the street.
- The program will operate 12 hours per day, seven days a week. The final operating schedule will be determined in consultation with the Safe Ride program operators and other partners.
- Final costs will not be known until program design is done and a longer-term location secured, but the budget for staff and program operations is approximately \$900,000.
- Although the facility will be available later in June, our contractor requires time to recruit staff and finalize program delivery details.

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New Geophysical Reports provide insight into mineral potential of Slave Geological Province

YELLOWKNIFE (June 14, 2017) – Two airborne geophysical surveys will provide additional insight for prospectors and mineral development companies interested in exploration in the Slave Geological Province of the Northwest Territories (NWT). The studies, developed by the Northwest Territories Geological Survey (NTGS), provide detailed airborne magnetic and electromagnetic survey data from the promising region.

The new reports are entitled:

- NWT Open Report 2017-014. Aeromagnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton, NWT, Parts of NTS 75M and 75N
- NWT Open Report 2017-015. Airborne Electromagnetic and Horizontal-Gradient Magnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton Area, NWT, Parts of NTS 75M, 75N, and 76D

This is the second data release in 2017; an earlier <u>data set</u> of mineral chemical information was released in March. The work was funded by a joint agreement between the NTGS and the Canadian Northern Development Agency (CanNor) to inform a variety of mineral exploration, geological and environmental research objectives.

The NTGS is a science-mandated division of the Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment. Enhancing the availability of geoscience information is central to the Government of the Northwest Territories' stated mandate to implement the NVVT Mineral Development Strategy.



Backgrounder: New Reports on Slave Geological Province Mineral Potential to be Released

- Two new reports will provide additional insights for prospectors and mineral development companies interested in exploration in the central Slave Geological Province of the Northwest Territories (NWT). The region is highly prospective for diamond, gold, and base metal exploration.
- The new publications are:
 - NWT Open Report 2017-014. Aeromagnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton, NWT, Parts of NTS 75M and 75N
 - NWT Open Report 2017-015. Airborne Electromagnetic and Horizontal-Gradient Magnetic Survey of the Central Slave Craton Area, NWT, Parts of NTS 75M, 75N, and 76D
- Public geoscience information of this type provides a "roadmap" that helps to focus exploration efforts to the most mineral-prospective regions, thereby increasing exploration attractiveness and decreasing the regional footprint of exploration.
- The high-resolution data can provide valuable information on bedrock type, geological structures, and potential mineral deposits. This information is used by stakeholders to enhance geoscience knowledge, advance mineral exploration, and inform land use planning decisions.







Magnetic Survey

Between February 15 and April 20, 2017, an airborne magnetic survey was conducted for the NTGS by EON Geoscience Inc. in parts of National Topographic System (NTS) 75M and 75N. This survey consisted of one block of 87,696 line km with 100 m line spacing, 600 m tie line spacing, and 60 m instrument height.

• Electromagnetic Survey

Between February 19 and March 31, 2017, an airborne electromagnetic and horizontal-gradient magnetic survey was conducted for the NTGS by CGG Canada Services Ltd. in parts of NTS 75M, 75N, and 76D. A total of 4,578 line km was flown over six blocks with line spacing of 75 m, tie lines spaced at 750 m, and towed instrument height of 25 m.



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Document d'information : Publication imminente de nouveaux rapports sur le potentiel minéral de la province géologique des Esclaves

- Deux nouveaux rapports donneront de nouvelles indications aux prospecteurs et aux sociétés d'exploitation minière qui souhaitent explorer le centre de la province géologique des Esclaves aux Territoires du Nord-Ouest (TNO). La région possède un potentiel élevé en diamants, en or et en métaux communs.
- Les nouvelles publications s'intitulent :
 - o **Rapport de données brutes des TNO 2017-014.** Levé magnétique aérien du craton central des Esclaves, TNO, dans des secteurs de SNRC 75M et de 75N.
 - Rapport de données brutes des TNO 2017-015. Levé électromagnétique et levé magnétique à gradient horizontal aériens de la région du craton central des Esclaves, TNO, dans des secteurs de SNRC 75M, de 75N et de 76D.
- L'information géoscientifique publique de ce genre fait office de « feuille de route » et contribue à concentrer les efforts de prospection sur les régions au plus fort potentiel minéral, ce qui rend l'exploration plus intéressante et en limite les répercussions régionales.
- Les données à haute résolution peuvent fournir de précieux renseignements sur le type de substratum rocheux, les structures géologiques et les gisements minéraux potentiels. Elles sont utilisées par les intervenants pour faire avancer les connaissances géoscientifiques et l'exploration minière, et pour orienter l'aménagement territorial.



• Levé magnétique

Du 15 février au 20 avril 2017, un levé magnétique aérien a été effectué pour la Commission géologique des Territoires du Nord-Ouest (CGTNO) par EON Geosciences Inc. dans des secteurs de 75M et de 75N du Système national de référence cartographique (SNRC). Ce levé portait sur un bloc constitué de 87 696 kilomètres linéaires à espacements de 100 m et de lignes de raccord à espacements de 600 m, et l'altitude de l'appareil était de 60 m.

• Levé électromagnétique

Du 19 février au 31 mars 2017, un levé électromagnétique et un levé magnétique à gradient horizontal aériens ont été effectués pour la CGTNO par CGG Canada Services Ltd dans des secteurs de 75M, de 75N et de 76D du SNRC. Au total, 4 578 kilomètres linéaires ont été survolés dans six blocs à espacements de 75 m, les lignes de raccord étant espacées de 750 m, et l'altitude de l'appareil utilisé était de 25 m.

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Petroleum Data Donation Encourages Economic Opportunities in the Sahtu Region

YELLOWKNIFE (June 15, 2017) – A donation of petroleum geophysical data to the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) valued at \$10 million may encourage exploration and investment in the Northwest Territories' Sahtu Region.

The donation comes from Mr. Alain Rostoker, former President of High Level Energy Co. Ltd. of Calgary. The information includes seismic reflection data, gravity geophysical data, and related information and interpretations on the Little Chicago area, 160 km northwest of Fort Good Hope. Making this information publicly available may help promote future petroleum exploration in this region.

To make this information publicly available to the broadest audience, the GNWT has requested that the Office of the Regulator of Oil and Gas Operations (OROGO) store this information and distribute it free of charge.



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REDI Initiative set to Increase Public Understanding and Awareness of Resource and Energy Development

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GNWT Introduces Changes to the Vital Statistics Act

YELLOWKNIFE (July 28, 2017) – The GNWT has introduced two important changes to the *Vital Statistics Act* that promote inclusion and respect: the ability to use single names based on traditional culture, and changing the sex designation on a birth certificate to better reflect gender identity.

Single traditional name as legal name

NWT residents can now use single traditional names as their legal name, as long as it is based on their traditional culture.

The amendment to the *Vital Statistics Act* to allow for use of single names on birth documents supports the efforts of NWT Indigenous people to reclaim their traditions and culture. This also applies to residents from other cultures that have a tradition of single names.

This is an important step in building a culture of respect and trust. Work continues to allow Indigenous characters to be used in GNWT databases so that these can appear on identity documents such as birth certificates, health cards and drivers' licenses.

To apply for a single name, residents will need to complete the <u>Application for Change of Name</u>.

A third option for gender on birth certificates

Individuals born in the NWT may now apply to change the gender on their birth registration without first having to undergo gender reassignment surgery.

The Northwest Territories is the first jurisdiction in Canada to offer a third gender option.

Individuals who do not identify as male or female can now choose gender X on their birth certificate if they were born in the NWT. This is to promote inclusion and fight discrimination against transgender and non-binary people.

To apply for a change in gender, individuals will need to complete an <u>application to Change Sex Designation</u> and include the required documentation. There are different forms: one for adults, one for minors and one for 16-18 years olds who live independently.

"The practice of using a single name was a part of Indigenous traditional practices and also used in other cultures. One of the legacies of colonization and residential school systems was the prohibition of this practice. The removal of the legislative barrier in the *Vital Statistics Act* that allows Indigenous people and residents of other cultures to reclaim their traditional names is one step in our commitment to support the revitalization of traditional practices and culture.

The changes to the *Vital Statistics Act* also marks an important step towards empowering transgender and non-binary people so that they can self-identify, without the requirement for them to undergo surgery to make changes to their birth registration documents. The amendments to the legislation will help build a respectful environment for transgender and non-binary individuals accessing GNWT services."

Quick facts:

- Call to Action from the Truth and Reconciliation Commission (Action 17) asks for all levels of governments to enable residential school survivors and their families to reclaim names changed by the residential school system including revisions to official identity documents such as the birth certificate.
- The Department of Health and Social Services have notified other GNWT departments as well as the Government of Canada on changes to the *Vital Statistics Act*, and how these changes will affect them.
- The Department of Health and Social Services is currently working with other departments on making changes to information systems and databases to allow for Indigenous fonts. This is a complex and difficult process as changes will affect multiple information systems specific to Health and Social Services as well as other departments.
- The NWT is the first jurisdiction in Canada to offer a third gender option X.
- The Department of Health and Social Services does not have authority over other organizations/jurisdictions acceptance of the gender X option or single names.
- NWT health card does not have a gender identifier so there is no need reapply for a new card.

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YELLOWKNIFE, le 28 juillet 2017. Afin de favoriser l'inclusion et le respect, le GTNO apporte deux changements importants à la *Loi sur les statistiques de l'état civil* : il sera désormais possible d'utiliser un nom unique conforme à sa culture traditionnelle, ainsi que de modifier la désignation du sexe sur un acte de naissance pour mieux refléter l'identité de genre.

Un nom unique traditionnel comme nom officiel

Les Ténois peuvent maintenant faire de leur nom unique traditionnel leur nom officiel, tant que cette dénomination est conforme à leur culture.

Cette modification de la *Loi sur les statistiques de l'état civil* permet d'appuyer les efforts de réappropriation traditionnelle et culturelle déployés par les Autochtones des TNO. Cette Loi s'applique aussi aux Tenois se revendiquant d'une autre culture qui perpétue une tradition de nom unique.

Il s'agit d'une étape importante pour bâtir une culture de respect et de confiance. En outre, le GTNO poursuit son travail pour que ses bases de données acceptent les caractères des langues autochtones afin que ceux-ci puissent figurer sur des papiers d'identité tels que l'acte de naissance, la carte d'assurance-maladie et le permis de conduire. Pour faire une demande de nom unique, les résidents devront remplir une demande de changement de nom.

Une troisième option pour la désignation du sexe sur l'acte de naissance

Les personnes nées aux TNO peuvent maintenant faire une demande pour changer la désignation du sexe sur leur enregistrement de naissance, sans avoir subi préalablement une chirurgie de changement de sexe.

Les Ténois sont les premiers Canadiens à disposer d'une troisième option pour la désignation officielle du sexe.

Les personnes dont l'identité sexuelle ne correspond pas au sexe féminin ni au masculin peuvent dorénavant choisir le sexe neutre pour leur acte de naissance, à condition d'être nées aux TNO. Ce changement vise à favoriser l'inclusion et à combattre la discrimination contre les personnes transgenres et non binaires.

Pour faire changer leur acte de naissance, les personnes intéressées doivent remplir une demande de modification de la désignation du sexe et y joindre la documentation requise. Il existe trois formulaires de demande : un pour les adultes, un pour les mineurs et un pour les jeunes de 16 à 18 ans qui ne vivent plus chez leurs parents.

« L'utilisation d'un nom unique fait partie des traditions autochtones, mais aussi de celles d'autres cultures. - Le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux a informé les autres ministères des TNO et le gouvernement du Canada des changements apportés à la *Loi sur les statistiques de l'état civil* et des conséquences pour eux.

- Le ministère de la Santé et des Services sociaux ne peut forcer d'autres organismes ou gouvernements à accepter le sexe neutre ou le nom unique.

Working through the industry's best entry level and highest professional Erosion and Sediment Control designations, we deliver the education, ethics and infrastructure to ensure a strong growth in the field of erosion and sediment control.

"To be the voice of Erosion and Sediment Control in Canada. Increasing awareness, understanding and promoting Best Management Practices throughout the Industry to achieve compliance and results in order to Protect our Natural Environment Nationwide"

This course (NT – CESCL) will provide the student with 2 days of instruction in erosion and sediment control. Upon successful completion of this course, you will be a Certified Erosion and Sediment Control Lead (CESCL) recognized by accrediting agencies, satisfying their training course requirements (renewable 3-year certification card). Construction projects greater than one acre in Washington and Alaska now require the availability of a CESCL. Municipalities in British Columbia are increasingly looking to Qualified Professionals to manage construction sites.

The north experiences distinct issues around ESC. This is standardized training with a northern perspective that uses the 2013 DOT Erosion and Sediment Control Manual as a reference. Upon completion of the training and passing an exam, you will receive a NT - CESCL certificate. We have offered this training already in Inuvik, Yellowknife, Fort Simpson and Hay River and it was well received every time. This training is open to all GNWT staff as well as GNWT stakeholders involved in erosion and sediment control.



Mobile Addictions Program Piloted in Fort Smith

FORT SMITH (September 11, 2017) – A community-based mobile addictions pilot program is being delivered in Fort Smith that is responding to a need identified by elders and community members for culturally-safe addictions programming. The program is made possible by a collaboration between the Government of the Northwest Territories, the Salt River First Nation (SFRN) and Poundmaker's Lodge Treatment Centres, which is a facility of excellence with a long standing history of supporting NWT residents in their healing.

The program started on August 21, 2017, and is being delivered in three phases, with each phase running for two weeks, followed by two weeks for participants to implement personal learning. This program integrates therapeutic counselling, on the land activities, cultural teachings, community capacity building and education on addictions and recovery, and will conclude on October 28, 2017.

The Fort Smith mobile addictions pilot program is an example of how NWT residents, government and our partners are working together to foster wellbeing and safety by focusing on mental health and addictions and ensuring that services are delivered locally with culturally-appropriate methods. The GNWT applauds the Salt River First Nation and Poundmaker's for their implementation of this grassroots mobile addictions treatment initiative.



GNWT Submits Expressions of Interest for Federal Funding for Key Transportation Corridors

YELLOWKNIFE (September 12, 2017) - The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) has submitted Expressions of Interest to the Government of Canada seeking funding for two major transportation infrastructure projects: construction of the Slave Geological Province Access Corridor (SGP); and projects to advance the Mackenzie Valley Highway(MVH). Making strategic investments in transportation infrastructure and securing funding for these particular projects is a key "Economy, Environment and Climate Change" mandate item of the 18th Legislative Assembly.

A stronger NWT highway system will help reduce the cost of living, improve the business case for investment in our economy, and create opportunities for businesses and residents that will allow for healthier, more vibrant communities. - The Federal Budget 2017 announced a second phase of the federal government's <u>Investing in Canada Plan</u>, which will provide more than \$180 billion over 12 years to support infrastructure projects across Canada.

- Federal funding would provide up to 75% of eligible costs to territorial government project proponents.
- Submitting these Expressions of Interest is the first step in securing funding.
 Transport Canada will evaluate all Expressions of Interest and notify both successful and unsuccessful applicants within 30 business days from the date of submission as to whether a project proposal will be moving forward. Successful applicants will be invited to submit a comprehensive project proposal by no later than November 6, 2017.



Government of the Northwest Territories Confirms Location of Long-term Sobering Centre

YELLOWKNIFE (September 12, 2017) – The Minister of Health and Social Services, Glen Abernethy, announced that the government has signed a lease for a long-term location of the Yellowknife Day Shelter and Yellowknife Sobering Centre. The building is located at 5111 50th Street.

Finding a location for the Yellowknife Sobering Centre which can also support the Day Shelter program has been a priority of the Government of Northwest Territories. The new location was chosen after assessing 22 potential sites in order to find a suitable location.

The new combined Day Shelter and Sobering Centre location requires extensive upgrades to make it ready to receive clients. The GNWT is working with other partners to quickly assess the scope of renovations that will be required to ensure that all regulatory requirements are fulfilled.

Since early July, the Sobering Centre program has been operating out of the City of Yellowknife's Community Arena, but that space will be required for other programming beginning in mid-September. Once the final scope and timing of the required renovations are known, the GNWT will work with partners to identify another interim location to ensure that services to clients continue during the transition period, as both the Sobering Centre and Day Shelter programs prepare to move to the new location.

With current operations of the Yellowknife Sobering Centre, at its temporary location at the Yellowknife Community Arena, there is already evidence of helping those in need. An average of 10 individuals have been accessing the centre daily with about half of these clients coming to the Sobering Centre by way of the City of Yellowknife's Safe Ride Program.

This new location will allow intoxicated clients who need a warm safe place to recover from the effects of alcohol and other drugs to access support services under one roof and a safe place to be during the day. 

- The new location will also accommodate between 30 and 40 Day Shelter clients at any one time and as many as 26 clients (men and women in separately designated spaces) in the Sobering space.
- Clients are to be a minimum of 19 years of age and the length of stay is a maximum of 17 hours per visit.
- The new location is single story, accessible and has approximately 440 square meters (4750 square feet) of space.
- The 5-year negotiated lease has been signed between the GNWT and Northern News Services (building owner).
- The next steps for the program will be the finalization of the design for the renovations and the issuance of a procurement process to secure a contractor to complete the construction.

Good afternoon. It is a pleasure to be here today, joined by colleagues, neighbouring governments and community leaders from all across Western Canada. This conference is an important one as it brings our jurisdictions together for focused discussions on ways we can work together to achieve greater economic prosperity.

Canada, and particularly the North are facing critical challenges. The moratorium in offshore exploration in the Beaufort Sea which was announced earlier this year was established without consultation and has already had major impacts on our economy and on our communities.



Minister Meets With Education Board Chairs

YELLOWKNIFE (September 15, 2017) - Minister of Education, Culture and Employment, Alfred Moses, met with Education Board Chairs last Friday to highlight strategies to address mental health and wellness of students and teachers. The group has decided to take a thematic approach to their meetings focusing on such matters as indigenizing education, student support and Skills 4 Success.

The group reviewed recent Northwest Territories data and testing results from a number of different sources. The empirical data paints a clear picture of student needs both in the classroom and as they relate to each other and to lifestyle factors. Participants agreed the information will be extremely useful to determine how to direct resources to the most needed areas.

Chairs had previously identified youth mental wellness as an important issue facing students, teachers and communities, expressing a desire to know more about the root causes and new ways to support students. Minister Moses and Department officials provided a presentation on mental health supports for schools that detailed programs for students such as self-regulation, access to mental health counselors through Northern Counseling and Therapeutic Services, and a Department of Health and Social Services program called Talking About Mental Illness or TAMI.

Teacher wellness and how teachers support students with mental health needs was also addressed in the meeting, with professional development to be offered to teachers to help them identify students who may need help or support.

The Department of Health and Social Services (HSS) also shared details of the proposed Youth Mental Health Strategy. The group followed with a productive discussion on how to collaborate to further strengthen supports to students and where investments would make the most difference. HSS consultation with youth clearly identified that young people want a strengths-based approach to the work with mental health and wellness that respects their individuality, thoughts, concerns and privacy.

The group was also provided with an excellent presentation from the Chair of the Tłįcho Community Services Agency. Chair Ted Blondin highlighted the TCSA's recently-completed work entitled *Tłįcho History: Tłįcho Stories From Long Ago*. The curriculum features teacher and student resources enabling Tłįcho youth and others to connect more closely to their culture and heritage. Chair Blondin offered to share these resources with his colleagues.

The next meeting is set for the fall and will focus on indigenizing education and a review of new and supporting data.



Supporting Children and Seniors in the NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (September 15, 2017) – The Minister of Education, Culture and Employment is pleased to announce the two latest improvements to Income Security Programs in the Northwest Territories (NWT).

The Senior Citizen Supplementary Benefit will improve support for seniors, and the NWT Child Benefit is better supporting families with children across the NWT.

This month marks an increase in the Senior Citizen Supplementary Benefit. NWT senior citizens who are receiving the federal Guaranteed Income Supplement automatically receive the NWT Senior Citizen Supplementary Benefit on the same cheque. Previously \$160 per month, the benefit now increases to \$196 per month, and will support approximately 1,200 seniors across the NWT.

Through a joint initiative with the Department of Finance, NWT Child Benefit rates increased in July 2017. More families are now able to access this benefit, as the family income threshold for eligibility has increased to\$80,000. Approximately 2,200 families are benefiting from these changes.

These changes are part of continued actions to support the 18th Legislative Assembly's priorities to address the cost of living, foster healthy families, improve the affordability of childcare, and reduce poverty by increasing the benefits to low and modest income families.

- Monthly NWT Child Benefits for eligible families are automatically included with the Canada Child Benefit payment received from the federal government.



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
Delays Expected on Highways 1 and 2


Live Test of the NWT Alert Ready System

YELLOWKNIFE (September 19, 2017) – On September 20th, 2017 at 9:55am, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) will issue a live test of NWT Alert Ready, the Northwest Territories public alerting system. Residents may see and hear the public alert test on radio stations and cable networks across the NWT.

NWT Alert Ready is being developed to provide public alerts to NWT residents during emergencies and disasters and is part of the national public alerting system "Alert Ready". The system is currently under development with full implementation expected in 2019. Public awareness testing is conducted up to five times a year to ensure system functionality and availability. This test is part of efforts by the GNWT in cooperation with NWT broadcasters to ensure the safety and security of residents during emergencies.

Alert Ready is designed to deliver critical and potentially life-saving alerts to Canadians through television and radio. The Alert Ready system is developed in partnership with federal, provincial and territorial emergency management officials, Environment Canada and the broadcast industry to ensure you receive alerts immediately and know when to take action to keep yourself and your family safe.

Government of the Northwest Territories and the Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board Release Guidelines for Effluent Mixing Zones

YELLOWKNIFE (September 20, 2017) – The Land and Water Boards of the Mackenzie Valley and the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) are pleased to announce the release of the <u>Guidelines for Effluent Mixing Zones</u>.

In the Mackenzie Valley, the use of water and the deposit of waste into water is regulated under the *Waters Act*. Responsibilities associated with the approval, issuance, administration, and enforcement of water licences are shared by the Boards (Mackenzie Valley Land and Water Board, Gwich'in Land and Water Board, Sahtu Land and Water Board, and Wek'èezhìi Land and Water Board) and the GNWT.

In recognition of their collective responsibility for water licensing, the Boards and the GNWT have collaborated in the development of these Guidelines. The Guidelines are intended to improve the clarity and consistency of water licensing decisions involving the use of mixing zones in the regulation of waste discharge across the NWT.

Quick Facts

- A mixing zone is an area where effluent—waste—is deposited and first mixes with the receiving body of water.
- As described in the Boards' Water and Effluent Quality Management Policy, mixing zones may be established on a case-by-case basis for licensed undertakings that discharge waste into receiving waters such as rivers, streams, or lakes.
- Water licences for these types of activities typically include effluent quality criteria
 prescribing the maximum allowable concentrations or quantities of any contaminants
 of potential concern in the waste discharge stream.
- Mixing zones, if established, aid in determining effluent quality criteria for individual water licences.





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Geoscience Information Leads to Largest Staking Rush Since 2014

YELLOWKNIFE (September 22, 2017) – The release of new data on the Slave Geological Province this summer has led to the largest staking rush in the Northwest Territories since 2014.

The staking rush has contributed to an increase in claim numbers this year. So far in 2017, there have been 184 claims in the NWT totaling 139,019 hectares. In comparison, a total of 83 claims were staked in 2016 totaling 42,404 hectares.

The surge followed the June 22 release of two geophysical reports on the Slave Geological Province by the NWT Geological Survey. During the same timeframe, 45 claim tags were sold and 107 claims maps were issued.

The Slave Geological Province is an area of high diamond potential, and major diamond companies were amongst those staking claims.

The reports were jointly funded by the NWT Geological Survey and the Canadian Northern Economic Development Agency (CanNor) to inform a variety of mineral exploration, geological and environmental research objectives.

The Government of the Northwest Territories is committed to supporting mineral exploration and the mining sector as part of its mandate.


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People Are Our Number One Priority Say Territorial Premiers in New Vision For Sustainable Development

YELLOWKNIFE, NT /WHITEHORSE, YT/IQALUIT, NU (September 22, 2017) – Northwest Territories Premier Bob McLeod, Yukon Premier Sandy Silver and Nunavut Premier Peter Taptuna today released the Pan-Territorial Vision for Sustainable Development. In it, they declare that residents of the territories deserve the opportunity to achieve the same aspirations for themselves and their families as other Canadians – including good health, high-quality education and sustainable middle class jobs.

The three Premiers stand together to foster long-term development of northern economies on a foundation of responsible resource development, job creation, and economic diversification – in addition to investments in transportation, energy and communications infrastructure, and innovation.

A key principle of the Pan-Territorial Vision is that northerners must have the tools and authority to manage their own affairs and make decisions on the future of the North, which offers an important opportunity to advance Indigenous reconciliation. The Premiers will take a leadership role as they work with the federal government, territorial Indigenous governments and organizations, and affected stakeholders to bring about their vision of sustainable economic development for the residents of the three territories – and will participate in the development of Canada's proposed Arctic Policy Framework.

Quick Facts

- In the Northwest Territories, the resource sector accounts for nearly 40% of our GDP. By comparison, tourism accounts for 3.5% and fishing .01%.
- Approximately half of all NWT residents are Indigenous, representing the majority of people living in 29 of the territory's 33 communities.
- Yukon's resource sector accounts for 10.1% of the territory's GDP. Construction accounts for 8.5%, while tourism is estimated at 3.9% of GDP (in 2014).
- Yukon's population is presently 38,300, it is estimated that Indigenous people account for 23% of the territory's population. Whitehorse is the territory's largest community, at 29,634. Destruction Bay is Yukon's smallest community, with 54 residents.
- Nunavut's population has a median age of 22, making it the youngest in Canada. It is also one of the fastest growing; the 2015 population was just over 36,700 compared to 26,000 in 2001. Inuit represent 85 per cent of the population and form the foundation of the territory's culture. Nunavut is a territory that spans two million km2 of Canada, extending north and west of Hudson Bay, above the tree line to the North Pole.
- Nunavut's 25 communities range in size from tiny Grise Fiord (population 163) to Iqaluit (population 7,542), the capital.
- The largest employer in Nunavut is government federal, territorial and municipal. New jobs are rapidly emerging in the mining and resource development sectors. Important growth is also occurring in the tourism and fisheries sectors, and in the Inuit art sector. The realization of Nunavut's full economic potential will, in part, be contingent upon the improvement of the territory's infrastructure.

Responsible, sustainable resource development and job creation is the cornerstone of the territorial economies. Resource projects provide education, training and employment opportunities in communities as well as direct indigenous participation in supply and services business development.

We are positioned to drive innovation in cold climate resource extraction. As we work to responsibly develop our resources we will continue to collaborate with Indigenous governments and organizations, the federal government, and industry partners to sustainably and responsibly develop our economies. Through this work we will also ensure that the benefits of development improve the quality of life for our citizens and continue to protect the environment for future generations. The territories are endowed in the natural resources essential to the technologies that support the expanding green economy.

ECONOMIC DIVERSIFICATION

Diversification is an essential factor in the success of sustainable economies. Across various regions, the territories are home to emerging and established sectors such as tourism, traditional economies, agriculture, film, digital media, arts and crafts, forestry, manufacturing, information technology, and commercial fishing.

Partnership with Indigenous governments and organizations, industry and the federal government will strengthen territorial economic diversification, balance interests and ensure benefits are dispersed more broadly across and within the territories. The territories will seek to strengthen and establish infrastructure, increase educational resources, and develop innovative partnerships to deliver leading edge business and entrepreneurial mentorship services to drive new business and employment opportunities.

INFRASTRUCTURE

Large scale investment in northern transportation infrastructure corridors including highways, harbours, ports, airports and rail will create investment and economic opportunities in the North. The development of clean, affordable energy alternatives and connecting to hydroelectric grids will reduce the costs of living and doing business in the north and increase investment in the territories.

Resource potential and expanding northern sovereignty challenges make northern development a matter of national interest. Federal investment in northern infrastructure will lever private sector investment and maximize opportunities for exploration and development.

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Connecting communities through telecommunications infrastructure is key to supporting innovation and technology development, creating prosperity, and increasing the well-being of citizens living in remote areas.

INNOVATION

Many northern communities and industries rely on diesel as their main energy and heat source. New innovative technologies and modernized energy systems will provide alternative energy sources for communities and industries that have limited energy generation options.

The adoption of renewable and innovative technologies will decrease communities and industrial reliance on carbon intensive fuel sources and further our sustainable and, environmentally responsible development. Innovative energy and heating solutions as well as responsible industry practices will play an important role in the future of the North. Partnerships across all levels of government and with the private sector will create these innovative solutions and enable the north to prosper.

Alors que nous travaillons à exploiter nos ressources de manière responsable, nous continuerons à collaborer avec les gouvernements et les organisations autochtones, le gouvernement fédéral et les partenaires industriels à développer nos économies de façon durable et responsable. Par ce travail, nous nous assurerons également que les avantages du développement améliorent la qualité de vie de nos citoyens et continuerons à protéger l'environnement pour les générations futures. Les territoires sont riches en ressources naturelles essentielles aux technologies qui soutiennent l'économie verte en expansion.

Diversification économique

La diversification est un facteur essentiel du succès des économies durables. Dans leurs différentes régions, les territoires abritent des secteurs nouveaux et établis comme le tourisme, les économies traditionnelles, l'agriculture, le cinéma, les médias numériques, l'artisanat, la foresterie, la fabrication, les technologies de l'information et la pêche commerciale.

Un partenariat avec les gouvernements et les organisations autochtones, l'industrie et le gouvernement fédéral renforcera la diversification économique des territoires, conciliera les intérêts, et garantira une meilleure répartition des avantages entre les territoires et à l'intérieur de ceux-ci. Les territoires s'efforceront de renforcer les infrastructures existantes et d'en créer de nouvelles, d'augmenter les ressources en éducation, et de constituer des partenariats novateurs afin d'offrir des services de mentorat de pointe dans les domaines commerciaux et entrepreneuriaux, et de favoriser ainsi de nouvelles possibilités d'affaires et d'emploi.

Infrastructures

Les investissements importants dans les corridors de transport du Nord, dont les routes, les ports, les aéroports et les chemins de fer, créeront des possibilités économiques dans le

Nord. Le développement de solutions de remplacement propres et abordables en matière de production d'électricité, et le raccordement aux réseaux électriques réduiront ce qu'il en coûte pour vivre et faire des affaires dans le Nord, et augmenteront les investissements dans les territoires.



Des solutions novatrices en matière d'énergie et de chauffage, ainsi que les pratiques responsables des industries, joueront un rôle important dans l'avenir du Nord. Les partenariats entre tous les ordres de gouvernements et avec le secteur privé créeront ces solutions novatrices, et permettront au Nord de prospérer.



Geological Materials Storage Facility Opens Doors to Future Exploration

YELLOWKNIFE (September 25, 2017) – The Government of the Northwest Territories is committed to supporting mineral exploration, and with the grand opening of the new NWT Geological Materials Storage Facility access to geoscience data is now easier than ever before.

The facility houses the largest publically available collection of kimberlites in the world. It will allow analysis of historical core samples to test new mineral exploration ideas at a fraction of the cost of drilling new ones.

Managed by the NWT Geological Survey, the facility consists of a 900 m² unheated warehouse and an adjacent heated area where clients can examine samples year-round.

Enhancing the amount of publically available geoscience information is part of ITI's work to implement the NWT Mineral Development Strategy, a commitment under the Mandate of the Government of the Northwest Territories.



Tourism in NWT Reaches Record Breaking Numbers

YELLOWKNIFE (September 25, 2017) – Tourism numbers reached record heights in the Northwest Territories (NWT) in 2016-17. For the first time, visitor spending surpassed the \$200 million mark and over 100,000 visitors travelled to the NWT.

The results bode well for the overall goal of Tourism 2020, the GNWT's five year strategy for tourism development, which seeks to increase the value of the NWT tourism industry to \$207 million annually by 2021.

Other highlights released by the Department of Industry Tourism and Investment today include a 23% increase last season in the aurora viewing sector which contributed close to \$50 million to the economy. Leisure travel to the NWT has increased from 56% to 70% over the last 10 years while business travel is recovering.

As the single largest renewable resource-based industry in the NWT, the Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment is committed to growing the sector and the economic opportunities it creates.



Glen Abernethy: Territorial Health Investment Fund Announcement



Good morning everyone. I want to extend a special welcome to Parliamentary Secretary Blair and thank MP McLeod for bringing us together for this important announcement.

Our government is committed to maintaining and improving the health and well-being of NWT residents by making sure they have access to insured health services.

This investment by the Government of Canada will help make sure that residents will receive the services they need in key areas. It will allow more patients who require critical medical services that are only available outside the territory to have access to that care.

It will support NWT's oral health program and help prevent oral disease, especially in young people.

It will also allow us to continue our work to build a culturally respectful health and social service system.

On behalf of the residents and Government of Northwest Territories, I want to sincerely thank the federal government for your partnership and for this important investment, which will make a vital difference in the health care that northerners receive.

I would like to speak to you in more detail about the three programs this investment will support, but let me first set the stage on how we got here.

Our residents and the Federal Government understand that the Northwest Territories is unique and we appreciate Canada's ongoing willingness to make special arrangements to ensure NWT residents get services comparable to southern Canada.

The unique demographic composition of our population, supported by years of government-to-government cooperation and negotiated land, resources and self-government agreements, means the GNWT has a legitimate and accepted role in providing public services to Indigenous and non-Indigenous Northerners alike.

I have travelled throughout the Northwest Territories, and met with many stakeholders and listened to their concerns. Some common themes were found:

Residents wanted better access and program support for Medical Travel, improve the health outcomes for our residents and providing education to our residents regarding cultural competency.

Medical travel is necessary due to the uniqueness of the NWT. The realities are that we need to go south for specialized services. To assist this program, we are committing \$5 million dollars per year for the next four years to support patient transportation to receive the services they need to become healthy again.

For the next four years we will be investing \$2.1 million dollars per year to continue the development of our oral health strategy and supporting our work in cultural competencies.

Improving oral health outcomes for children aged 0-5 is a priority of the 18th Legislative Assembly.


- · Funding for oral health will be used for three objectives:
 - Creating an integrated oral health program for all children within the NWT;
 - Prevention and promotion activities that emphasize oral health as a part of overall health; and,
 - Reduction of costs to the health system associated with acute dental treatments through increased prevention activities.

The final area of reinvestment will focus on improving cultural competencies.

I am truly proud of the work we have accomplished in this area. A key component of our commitment to *Building a Culturally Respectful Health and Social Services System* is being realized through the roll-out of cultural safety training for front-line workers.

This training will help eliminate gaps and barriers to services that some residents experience while receiving services. Ideally our staff will be better trained to provide culturally respectful health care programs and services.

Delivering quality health services over long distances to small, isolated communities is an ongoing challenge for all of the territories. The Government of Canada is committed to improving the health services available to all Northerners.

On behalf of the Honourable Ginette Petitpas Taylor, Minister of Health, Parliamentary Secretary Bill Blair along with Glen Abernethy, Minister of Health and Social Services for the Northwest Territories, announced today an investment of \$28.4 million over four years to support health system innovation in the Northwest Territories. This is the Territories' portion of the Territorial Health Investment Fund, which was renewed in Budget 2017 for \$108 million over four years.

The Territorial Health Investment Fund is designed to support efforts by the territories to innovate and transform health care systems, and to ensure that Northerners have access to the care they need. The funding will flow through a grant mechanism to maximize flexibility and minimize administrative burdens.

The funding announced today will allow the Northwest Territories to customize projects to meet unique priorities, including an oral health strategy, and will strengthen cultural competence within the health system. Part of the funding will also help mitigate costs related to medical transportation which is an integral part of insured services in the Northwest Territories due to the high number of small remote communities.



Thank you for the opportunity to speak today on the achievements, opportunities and challenges of Canada's North from the perspective of its people. Not only am I Premier of the NWT, I am also a proud Indigenous northerner who was born in raised within its borders.

The message I hear most from NWT residents is that they want to have access to the same opportunities as people who live in what we refer to as "the south". This means access to good jobs, a strong community, infrastructure and the wellness that helps to create health.

The reality is that outside of the capitol city, this is not the case in the Northwest Territories. Our government is working to change this. We are working to lower the cost of living and increase community wellness and quality of life in each of our communities.

Today I am going to focus on infrastructure and the sustainable development of our natural resources as important tools to achieving wellness. A strong economy, including having local good paying jobs, is critical to health people and healthy communities.

Indigenous people in every community must have opportunities to build self-reliance, live in healthy, vibrant, prosperous communities, and reach their full potential. And in the Northwest Territories we are focused on building the foundation required to make this a reality.

Our achievements have paved the way for our future, including a long history of negotiating and implementing ground-breaking land claims and self-government agreements. Indigenous ownership, investment and participation in all aspects of the economy, including the resource industry are key to our success.

Resource development must be both sustainable and responsible. This links to another achievement in the NWT, our regulatory system that has equal representation from the GNWT and Indigenous governments. Together we assess projects and make recommendations on not only whether or not they proceed, but the conditions under which they proceed. We ensure that social and environmental responsibilities are integrated into our territorial regulatory regimes.

Indigenous governments and communities work closely with developers to influence project designs and minimize environmental impacts. They also negotiate and sign Impact Benefit Agreement to ensure the partnership created during project development is fulfilled throughout the lifecycle of a project.

This is because, Indigenous governments and organizations are integral to the economic future of the territories and we have a responsibility to uphold treaty and claims obligations.

Partnerships with Indigenous governments, industry and the federal and territorial governments strengthen territorial economic diversification, balance interests and ensure benefits are dispersed more broadly across the territory.

So how do we deal with our challenges, including the high cost of living, the lack of infrastructure and the lack of good jobs? Learning from other Arctic regions we focus on the basics. In partnership with Canada we need to build territorial and community infrastructure to support healthy communities. That includes roads, which most of our communities do not have access to.


Resource development can create the jobs that communities need and become a foundation for diversification. The NWT is home to many of the minerals that will fuel the global green economy, including cobalt, gold, lithium, bismuth, and rare earth elements.

The makers of batteries, solar panels, wind turbines, hand held electronics and computers rely on these minerals to make their products more efficient.

As this progress continues, these technologies, and the raw materials inside them will push innovation in every sector and move the world towards the green economy we are all working towards.

Accessing these minerals means the chance for resources from our territory to help solve the most pressing environmental and energy issues we face across the globe.

And because of the way we do business, we will be able to take advantage of this opportunity to use these resources sustainably and responsibly, so that we can meet our goal of creating strong, vibrant communities with healthy people.

Delivered Friday, October 13, 2017

Good morning, I am pleased to be in Iceland this week representing the people and Government of the Northwest Territories.

The Northwest Territories – along with Nunavut – is one of two Canadian jurisdictions where Indigenous people are in the majority. Our two jurisdictions are also the only two in Canada whose Legislative Assemblies typically have a majority of Indigenous representatives and whose Premiers have historically also been Indigenous.

I live in and represent a constituency in the territorial capital of Yellowknife, but was born and raised in Fort Providence, Northwest Territories.

Fort Providence is a small community in the Dehcho Region with a population of around 800 people. Almost 90 per cent of the people who live there are Indigenous, with 52 percent of them speaking an Aboriginal language as of 2014.

There is a lot of talk in Canada about reconciliation with Indigenous people right now, about how Canada has to do better for Indigenous people. This is a good and honourable ideal, but I think it obscures the diversity of Indigenous experiences in Canada, including the progressive approach already practiced in our Northern territories.

The Northwest Territories has taken great strides towards political self-determination in the past four decades, with a number of land, resources and self-government agreements having been settled and more in active negotiations. We have 11 official languages, including nine Aboriginal languages enshrined in legislation, our schools offer Aboriginal language teaching and with Nunavut we were the first jurisdictions in Canada to create a mandatory curriculum for high school students to learn the legacy and history of residential schools. Currently, the majority of the Members of our Legislative Assembly, including five of seven Cabinet Ministers, Indigenous. There is more work to do but I am very proud to point to the NWT as an international example of how true reconciliation, particularly economic self determination, can be achieved.

As far back as 20 years ago, the Royal Commission on Aboriginal Peoples, noted that "the North is the part of Canada in which Aboriginal people have achieved the most in terms of political influence and institutions appropriate to their cultures and needs."

At the same time, however, the Royal Commission noted that "the North itself is a region with little influence over its own destiny. Most of the levers of political and economic power continue to be held outside the North and, in some cases, outside Canada."

Devolution of responsibility for lands and resources to the Government of the Northwest Territories in 2014 theoretically put an end to the colonial practice of federal bureaucrats in Ottawa – 2000 miles away – making the decisions that most affect the Northwest Territories and its people.

Even so, colonialism is not entirely absent, as we saw last December when the Government of Canada declared a unilateral moratorium on oil and gas development in the Arctic without prior consultation with either the public government of the Northwest Territories or the Indigenous people of the region.

It has become increasingly clear that if Northerners want a sustainable future with viable options, we need to lead the planning.

That's why I joined with the Premiers of Nunavut and Yukon to issue our Pan-Territorial Vision for Sustainable Development last month.

Our vision is built on the recognition that the people of the Northwest Territories, Nunavut and Yukon are our number one priority and our most important resource. We want our people to have opportunities to build self-reliance, live in healthy, vibrant communities and build their capacities to reach their full potential.

We need a strong, sustainable economy to achieve that goal, built on the foundation of responsible resource development and job creation that is the cornerstone of the territorial economies.

But we also recognize that a resource economy – while a significant source of wealth to our residents – cannot be our only focus. We know we need to diversify, to expand into other sectors that can give residents in all our communities good jobs that will last well into the future.


Large-scale investment in infrastructure is going to be one of the keys to growing and diversifying our economy. That will need to include investments in transportation infrastructure like highways, harbours, airports and rail to connect our territories to markets and our people to opportunities. It will also need to include investments in clean, affordable energy alternatives and connections to hydroelectric grids that will reduce the cost of living and doing business in the North.

Innovation will be another key, driving the development of a Northern knowledge economy built on unique research and commercialization opportunities.

With decades of experience in safe and responsible resource development, we are already positioned to drive innovation in cold climate research extraction. As one of the regions of the world already feeling the effects of climate change, we already have significant experience in adaptation and mitigation. We are also now positioned to be a leader in high tech, with the recent completion of the Mackenzie Valley Fiber Line creating opportunities to expand the Inuvik Satellite Station Facility, one of the best locations for communicating with polar orbiting satellites.

Ladies and gentlemen, the people of the Arctic want what everybody else wants. They want good jobs and a good standard of living, they want to be healthy and educated, and most of all, they want a sustainable future for themselves and their families based on their own vision and priorities.

The three territories have a vision for that future and we are eager to join with you to create a sustainable Arctic that will continue to support our communities and our people and allow them to achieve their aspirations.

Municipal Administrator Appointed in Norman Wells

YELLOWKNIFE (October 18, 2017) – The Minister of Municipal and Community Affairs (MACA) has determined that the Municipal Corporation of the Town of Norman Wells ('the Town') is experiencing operational difficulties.

Under the authority provided through section 155(1) of the *Cities, Towns and Villages Act*, SNWT 2003, c22, the Minister has dissolved the Town Council and appointed a Municipal Administrator effective October 18, 2017. The Minister has appointed Eleanor Young, Deputy Minister of MACA, as Administrator for the Town.

MACA will continue to provide support to the community government through the various programs and services offered by the department. The Administrator will be focused on developing new and amending existing council bylaws to ensure there are clear authorities, operations and procedures for future elected Councils. Providing this direct support is consistent with the Government of the Northwest Territories' goal of building stronger relationships with community governments and stakeholders, as outlined in the 18th Assembly's Mandate.

Quick Facts

- On July 4, 2017 the Minister of MACA appointed John Hazenberg of Seventh Generation Inc. to complete a municipal inspection of the Town of Norman Wells.
 The purpose of the inspection was to confirm whether or not the local government had complied with all legislated requirements in the conduct of its business.
- The Inspector's Report indicated that the community government was experiencing operational difficulties and recommended that the Minister appoint a Municipal Administrator.
- After lengthy engagement with the Mayor and Council and after reviewing the Report of the Municipal Inspector, the Minister has issued an order appointing a Municipal Administrator.
- As of the effective date of the order, the Town Council is dissolved. The Municipal Administrator will assume all of the responsibilities and authorities of the Council,

- including finding ways to engage the public in decisions and providing direction and supervision to the SAO.
- This is an exceptional step and taken only when deemed necessary by the Minister. Municipal Administration has only been used in two cases since 1999, and, in one of those cases, it was at the request of Council.



First NWT Agriculture By-Laws Now In Development



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Bob McLeod: Presentation to Standing Committee on Indigenous and Northern Affairs

Madame Chair, members of the Committee, thank you for the opportunity to present to you today in relation to your study of modern treaties and self-government throughout Canada.

The Government of the Northwest Territories has made it a priority to advance, finalize and implement land, resources and self-government agreements, including post-devolution initiatives.

We appreciate this opportunity to participate in your Committee's study and hope that it will contribute to continued progress on this important initiative for the people of the Northwest Territories.

The Government of Canada has made strong statements about the importance of a renewed relationship with Indigenous peoples and the contribution of colonial structures to the unacceptable socio-economic condition too many Indigenous people in Canada find themselves.

We strongly agree on the importance of Canada renewing relationships with Indigenous peoples. We also believe we have much to offer in terms of how to renew that relationship and support self determination.

We believe that constitutionally-protected agreements are the highest form of recognition of Aboriginal rights.

We also believe that final Indigenous rights agreements are the appropriate tool to codify those rights in the legal and constitutional framework of Canada.

The GNWT believes that the certainty provided by final rights and self-government agreements is central to the health of our communities, our economy, and our environment.

Our government has been committed to negotiating and implementing land, resources and self-government agreements in the Northwest Territories for over forty years.

Today, there are five settled land claims in our territory and two settled self-government agreements.

Our government works in partnership with these claimant groups on a government-to-government basis unlike those typically seen in southern Canada.

Our government-to-government approach is formally enshrined in our *Intergovernmental Relations Policy* and reiterated in *Respect, Recognition, Responsibility*, our approach to engaging with Indigenous governments, published in 2012.

Canada's *Principles* have many similarities to *Respect, Recognition and Responsibility* including a formalized recognition of the Inherent Right to Self-government.

Our approach respects and incorporates the commitments made in settled claim agreements and is further supported by bilateral MOUs we have entered into with several Indigenous governments.

It is important to point out that our policy doesn't just recognize those Indigenous governments with a settled claim. We also formally recognize as governments those Indigenous governments who are also currently in negotiations or have a right to negotiate.

In addition to the settled claims the GNWT is currently implementing, negotiations continue on three other regional claims and our government remains committed to seeing these claims finalized and implemented.

Settling these claims is a priority, and we continue to look for new ways to bring negotiations to a successful conclusion.

That commitment included the appointment of two Ministerial Special Representatives by myself and Minister Carolyn Bennett to look closely at claim processes in the Dehcho, Akaitcho and South Slave regions.

As a result of that work, we were able to table innovative new offers with the NWT Metis Nation and Akaitcho. The offers were designed to be as flexible as possible and allow Indigenous governments to choose how best to pursue their own priorities through the claim process.

Another innovation of the GNWT to support the settlement of claims is looking at the option of negotiating a generalized interest in resource development.

Generalized interest would allow Indigenous governments to receive a share of revenues from the development of resources on all lands in their region, not just on settlement lands.

Aboriginal rights and self-government agreements remove barriers to economic development, reduce legal ambiguities, and increase Indigenous self-sufficiency. These agreements clearly layout the responsibilities for public and Indigenous governments and define the modern relationship between them.

Our interest and priority, as a public government, is in ensuring that our residents have fair and equitable services, no matter where they live or what Indigenous government they may be a part of.

One of the distinctive aspects of the Northwest Territories is the central role of Indigenous people in our society.

It is important to understand that the Government of the Northwest Territories has evolved alongside the negotiation of Aboriginal Rights Agreements. The vision that established the GNWT saw a future where the public government and Indigenous governments worked together to meet their respective priorities.

Ours government has always existed in the context of Indigenous rights and been deliberately shaped by a determination to respect and recognize those rights.

The GNWT supports self-determination of Indigenous people and Indigenous governments in the NWT and has developed as a public government with self-government in mind.

Our system of partnership and public governance in the Northwest Territories was designed to ensure that Indigenous views and priorities are reflected in public policy decisions and the design and delivery of public programs and services.

Indigenous people in the NWT participate in both public government and Indigenous government, in implementing regulatory frameworks, and in building capacity in communities. Twelve of the 19 Members of the Legislative Assembly today are Indigenous, including five of seven Cabinet Ministers.

Every Premier since division of the territories in 1999 has been Dene or Metis, including myself. Before division, only two non-Indigenous people have been Premier or government leader.

Settled claims have established new, unique institutions of public government that guarantee Indigenous governments' rights to participate in decisions about land and resource development.

The *Mackenzie Valley Resource Management Act* – passed as part of the implementation of settled claims in the NWT – provides that Indigenous governments have the authority to name members to the land and water boards that oversee decisions about land and resource development here.

I need to be clear that this does not mean Indigenous people have a right to be heard by decision makers, it means that – in the Northwest Territories – Indigenous people are the decision makers.

This unified approach unique to the Northwest Territories was not an accident, it was a deliberate choice to ensure that Indigenous rights are respected here in the territory they have called home for generations.

Indigenous governments across the NWT own economic development corporations, which are active players in important projects that contribute to our GDP. Close collaboration with Indigenous governments and corporations is one way the Government of the NWT is working toward reconciliation.

The Northwest Territories is in a more advanced place than many parts of the country in the area of settling claims and integrating programs and services for Indigenous residents.

Our system is integrated and considers the Indigenous perspective as part of delivery. The conclusion of Aboriginal land, resources and self-government agreements has remained a priority for the GNWT.

We are as eager as the federal government and Indigenous governments to move forward with negotiations and implementation of self-government.

Canada has introduced several new approaches into negotiations. While on the face it, these approaches should encourage innovative negotiations and more meaningful agreements, we have significant concerns.

We understand the interest of all parties in advancing agreements. However, we feel that a lack of clarity in Canada's new approach is delaying, rather than advancing processes.

Ambiguity around the newly released principles and other approaches that Canada seems to have discussed with Indigenous organizations, but that haven't been explained to the Government of the Northwest Territories or other provincial or territorial governments. This is creating confusion and perhaps raising unrealistic expectations.

For example, Canada is now open to wide-ranging interest-based discussions, blending the specific claim and comprehensive claim models, broadening negotiations beyond existing agreements, and may no longer seek certainty in agreements. These developments run the risk of:

- Introducing delays into already lengthy processes as the parties assess new information
- Returning some negotiations to "ground zero"
- Wasting time and resources discussing things that are unlikely to be approved by any government
- Introducing uncertainty about the mechanics of implementation
- Removing the ability of all governments to rely on final agreements

It is my understanding that the new Principles have not been accompanied by changes to negotiating mandates, leaving parties to negotiations to try to guess at intents.

We are also concerned that Canada is in effect "changing the rules of the game" in the middle of the game.

Indigenous governments with finalized agreements made calculated choices under the existing policies and rules. Clarify is required as to whether Canada will re-open negotiations in areas with settled agreements. Inequity may be created by allowing for increased flexibility only for those who have not been able to achieve agreements in the past.

Starting in the 1960's the federal government began transferring program responsibility from Canada to the GNWT. The most recent of these devolutions was the transfer of responsibilities for lands, water and resource management.

This last devolution was unique in that negotiations included not only Canada and the GNWT, but also Indigenous governments. All Indigenous governments were invited to the table, with most of them agreeing to participate.

Another unique feature of this last devolution was the creation of the Intergovernmental Council and the sharing of resource revenues.

Now, in addition to resource revenues included in settled rights agreements, the GNWT also shares 25% of the resource revenues from public lands with NWT Indigenous governments who signed the devolution agreement.

- Aboriginal rights agreements affect every part of the way Indigenous and public governments administer the NWT:
- the way we manage our lands,
- the way we deliver social services,
- the way we raise revenues, and
- the way we govern our communities.

Reconciliation requires a national dialogue to ensure as a country we are moving forward together. The same is true of the NWT. This means both collective action and collaborative decision making about our future. We strongly urge Canada to support that national discussion and to not make these critical decisions without collaboration with your partners in provinces and territories.

Our framework for sharing resource revenues is intended to support Indigenous governments, including building capacity to take on program and service delivery. It too can serve as a model for the federal government when it looks to issues such as its own resource revenue sharing.

In summary, we are pleased with the overall direction that the Federal government is taking in terms of reconciliation. We are, however, concerned that Canada is forgetting the NWT when it is making national policy. Our current framework, a public government working in collaboration with future Indigenous self government, with clear processes for taking on authority and transitioning funding, is one that should be supported, not torn apart.

We will also continue to engage with the federal government, with provinces and territories and Indigenous governments as work around Indigenous relations in Canada evolves.

We will continue to work within our government to advance self-government and support Indigenous populations beyond negotiations as well. The GNWT also continues to implement the relevant calls to action of the Truth and Reconciliation Commission and support other efforts to address social and economic gaps between Indigenous and non-Indigenous Northerners.

As Canada considers changes to financial relationships, it is important that the unique program and service delivery models of the Northwest Territories be considered and in our view, preserved.

Changes to the approach to new agreements creates many questions for our government about how they will fit into our existing governance structures. This also creates a different kind of uncertainty for us. Our first priority is to provide continuous service to all our residents, with changes to these services focusing only on improvement. We also want to make sure that existing work both at the territorial government and at the community level is not lost with change.




Release of "Cannabis Legalization in the Northwest Territories – What We Heard Report"

Yellowknife (October 24, 2017) – Louis Sebert, Minister for the Department of Justice with the Government of the Northwest Territories would like to announce that the <u>Cannabis Legalization in the Northwest Territories What We Heard Report</u> has been tabled in the Legislative Assembly and is now available to the public.

Last spring, the Government of Canada introduced the proposed <u>Cannabis Act</u> and made a public commitment to legalize cannabis across Canada by July 2018. The Government of the Northwest Territories is tasked with developing and implementing territorial legislation that will establish measures to control the distribution and retail of cannabis, the minimum age for purchase and consumption, public smoking of cannabis and other issues. The GNWT is taking all the necessary steps to ensure effective measures are in place to protect the health and safety of the people and communities in the NWT.

From July 11 to September 22, 2017, the GNWT invited NWT public and stakeholders to provide feedback on the principles being proposed to guide the GNWT's work on the safe regulation of cannabis in the north. This process resulted in over 1100 online submissions and saw strong turnouts and thoughtful discussion at the community engagements. This was an important step in understanding the views and concerns of residents and demonstrates the GNWT's continued commitment to improving opportunities for meaningful public input into government decisions.

The information gathered through public engagement is presented in the <u>What We</u> <u>Heard Report</u> and will significantly inform the legislation currently under development. Residents will continue to be kept informed throughout this process and are encouraged to visit the GNWT Cannabis Legislation website for more information.


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Premier McLeod Issues Red Alert and Calls for Urgent National Debate on the Future of the Northwest Territories

OTTAWA (November 1, 2017) – Premier Bob McLeod issued the following statement on the future of the Northwest Territories:

"Today I am issuing a red alert and calling for an urgent national debate on the future of the Northwest Territories.

The promise of the North is fading and the dreams of northerners are dying as we see a re-emergence of colonialism.

For too long now policies have been imposed on us from Ottawa and southern Canada that, despite good intentions sometimes, and ignorance other times, are threatening our economic potential and the decades long work that we as a government have taken on Indigenous reconciliation. Whether it be ill conceived ways of funding social programs, or new and perplexing restrictions on our economic development, our spirit and energy are being sapped.

Everything we have built is in jeopardy. Reconciliation was a fact of life for our government years before it gained national prominence. Five of the seven cabinet ministers of the GNWT are indigenous. As am I. I was born in Fort Providence, NWT, a small Northern community where hunting, trapping and fishing continue to be important activities for most. I know this land and I know its people. We have forged a relationship and partnership with indigenous governments based on mutual respect and recognition, that is leading the way to increased self-determination, and more opportunities for indigenous participation in the economy.

We have formal government to government relations with NWT Indigenous governments, and the progress we have made on land and resource agreements is unparalleled anywhere else in Canada. We put our money where our mouths are; following devolution of responsibility for land and natural resources in 2014, we made the decision to unconditionally share 25 percent of resource revenues with NWT Indigenous governments. We are proud to be on the forefront of preserving Indigenous languages, of which there are nine in the NWT, all of them official languages of our territory. Indigenous and non-indigenous live and work side by side. Our children go to school together, and we all share the same health care system, built on and informed by local indigenous culture.

All of this is in jeopardy.

New funding approaches that distinguish between peoples may help to improve outcomes on reserve in southern Canada, but could divide Northern communities,

threatening the services and programs all NWT residents have come to expect and enjoy. Policy makers need to understand that what works in the south doesn't always work in the North before they make decisions that could stretch the social fabric of our communities thin.

Restrictions imposed on our vital energy and resource sector – 40 percent of our economy and source of middle class jobs and incomes for many of our people - are driving companies away, and with that go the jobs that sustain healthy families and community life. Staying in or trying to join the middle class will become a distant dream for many.

Decades before any other government in Canada, our government and its predominantly Indigenous leaders was making reconciliation a reality by working to incorporate the aspirations and priorities of their own people in the priorities and programs of the territorial government. It pleases me to see the federal government taking action in this area, but we need to make sure it does not undo the hard-won progress that the North has already made, reflected in several settled land, resources and self-government agreements and devolution. This danger can be avoided if we understand that real reconciliation requires that Indigenous people have both political and economic self-determination.


This means that northerners, through their democratically elected government, need to have the power to determine their own fates and the practice of decisions being made by bureaucrats and governments in Ottawa must come to an end. Decisions about the North should be made in the North. The unilateral decision by the federal government, made without consultation, to impose a moratorium on arctic offshore oil and gas development is but one example of our economic self-determination being thwarted by Ottawa.

Protecting the promise of the North and saving the northern dream requires all Canadians to join together. It requires a national debate. Today I call on all Members of Parliament – regardless of political stripe – to facilitate a special debate on the floor of the House of Commons .The people's house is where this conversation needs to start.

But we need to continue that conversation in the North, in dialogue with the people who live here. I am also asking the Prime Minister to bring his Cabinet to the Northwest Territories so that they can see firsthand the advances we have made in Indigenous reconciliation as well as the unique challenges in delivering critical services such as health care and education as well as the urgent need for investments in our infrastructure.

Today, I am publicly offering myself and the Cabinet of the Northwest Territories to meet with the Working Group of Ministers on the Review of Laws and Policies Related to Indigenous Peoples so that we can share our considerable experience and expertise with respect to Indigenous reconciliation.

The time is upon us to reset the course of the North. Meaningful reconciliation requires it, and the dream of a true north, strong and free, depends on it."



Arsenic Warning Signs Installed at Lakes With High Arsenic Around Yellowknife

YELLOWKNIFE (November 6, 2017) — The Government of the Northwest Territories and the City of Yellowknife have installed arsenic warning signs to these highly accessible lakes in the Yellowknife area:

- Frame Lake
- Jackfish Lake
- Kam Lake
- Rat Lake

These signs complement other steps taken earlier this year to raise awareness about this important issue amongst residents and visitors.

The Government of the Northwest Territories has also launched an interactive map that shows concentrations of arsenic in lakes surrounding the Yellowknife area. Clickable coloured dots on each lake provide longitudinal and latitude coordinates to make it easier for residents and visitors to identify which lakes to take precautionary steps.



The Canadian Council for Public-Private Partnerships

Delivered on November 7, 2017

Good morning. Thank you for the opportunity to speak today about the importance of infrastructure investment to the growth of the Northwest Territories.

The Government of the Northwest Territories, or the GNWT, has recognized the opportunities public-private partnerships (P3s) can bring to help the government address its current infrastructure deficit, which is currently around \$3 billion, and other key strategic infrastructure projects that would help stimulate our economy and improve services to our residents.

In 2011, the GNWT approved a *Public-Private Partnership Policy* to start advancing the use of P3s for large infrastructure projects in the NWT. Because the GNWT has a consensus government, the Policy has a robust Process Convention that requires a meaningful and formal consultation to take place between the Government and the Regular Members of the Legislative Assembly to ensure political support is obtained prior to advancing a project to the procurement process. The principles of the Policy are however the same as one would expect to ensure the successful delivery of any P3 project. These include: a fair, transparent, and accountable process; a high value for money is achieved over the life of the agreement with appropriate consideration of risk transfer, opportunities for innovation, revenue generation and community issues; and of course, that the private sector partner receives a fair return on investment.

I am happy to report that we have successfully used this Policy to advance two P3 projects in the NWT.

On November 3, 2014 the GNWT signed an agreement with Northern Lights General Partnership to design, build, finance, operate and maintain a 1,300 kilometer fibre line through the Mackenzie Valley.

The construction and operation of the Mackenzie Valley Fibre Line will help support economic growth and diversification in the NWT and as Inuvik is geographically gifted to transmit and receive data from satellites in geo-synchronous orbits, it will facilitate expansion of the Inuvik Satellite Station Facility. It will also provide innovative program and service delivery opportunities to the communities of the NWT. The project will provide a key opportunity for NWT businesses seeking to participate in the global marketplace.

The Mackenzie Valley Fibre Line route is within an areas of discontinuous permafrost in the southern part of the NWT and areas of continuous permafrost in the northern part of

the NWT. In addition to the over 450 water crossings, the route also has to be mindful of areas that provide habitat for a wide range of wildlife, fish and vegetation species.

Since reaching service commencement in August 2017, we have two local Internet Service Providers utilizing the system and between the federally owned Inuvik Satellite Facility and the privately owned Canada Satellite Ground Station Inuvik, agreements are in place with 3 international space customers and two research companies. The project continues to show great local, national and international interest, and we anticipate to have new customers in the near future.

On September 24, 2015 the GNWT signed its second P3 agreement with Boreal Health Partnership to design, build, finance and maintain a new 280,000 square feet Territorial Hospital, double the size of the existing facility, that will offer outpatient and inpatient services including: emergency, medical imaging, dialysis, obstetrics, pediatric, cardio and mental health departments, as well as day procedure and surgery suites.

The construction on the new hospital started last fall, and will see the current facility replaced by a new purpose-designed facility that will address patient needs and provide high-quality health care delivery for NWT residents.

Why did the GNWT advance these projects as P3s beyond the positive Value for Money considerations?

As a small jurisdiction, the GNWT has limited capacity to initiate a number of very large complex projects at any time and therefore does not maintain, on a full time basis, the core project management and technical capacity to undertake this kind of high risk work. The P3 approach allowed the GNWT to access the project management resources and expertise required for these complex projects.

We face a number of challenges when it comes to the planning and constructing of infrastructure in the North. The foremost issue that a P3 proponent has to consider is the cost of building on the North.

The NWT is an extremely large land mass, roughly the size of France and Germany combined, with many small dispersed communities which challenge our infrastructure system. Our thirty -three communities require their own supporting infrastructure, such as affordable housing, water treatment plants, waste disposal systems and recreational facilities. There are only five communities connected to hydro-generated power and all of the rest rely on power generation plants in the community.

Many of our communities are not connected to an all-weather road system. These communities rely on marine, air and winter roads for annual resupply, including supply of bulk commodities such as fuel. This isolation directly contributes to higher costs of living, as well as higher costs to develop and maintain critical infrastructure.

The NWT, in general, also faces unique challenges when it comes to the development of infrastructure due to the scarcity of trades and skilled labour, short construction seasons, and transportation and energy costs, resulting in overall construction costs that are significantly higher than those experienced in southern jurisdictions.

Being a small market means our construction costs continue to fluctuate due to linkages to the economic outlook in southern jurisdictions, particularly Alberta. Specifically, labour and products, and their associated supply and demand within the construction industry, directly affect construction costs for northern projects. If it is booming in Alberta it is difficult to get a large project underway in the NWT.

These challenges have led some of our best northern-based general contractors to relocate their primary workforce to southern jurisdictions where they enjoy fewer market-driven risks and longer construction seasons.

As we have seen with Stanton Territorial Hospital Renewal Project, P3s can be used mitigate these challenges by leveraging the buying power, financial capacity, project management expertise and project delivery capacity of the private sector to transfer appropriate risks and achieve value-for-money for key public infrastructure in the North.

Our economic future depends on our ability to develop the infrastructure necessary to support today's and tomorrow's industries. This includes energy infrastructure that lowers costs, improves system reliability, and reduces environmental impacts; communications infrastructure, like the Mackenzie Valley Fibre Line, that changes the way we transmit and use information and allows the NWT to diversify our economy into knowledge-based industries; all- weather roads to make it easier for people and goods to travel between communities and reduce the costs of doing business. We also need to work with our communities to improve the quality of community infrastructure, particularly housing.

Now is the time to invest in the great potential of our Territory.

We have diamond mines both in operation and under construction. We have mineral and base metal projects in various stages of development. We have hydro potential; and world class proven oil and gas reserves. But with the downturns in the price of oil and gas and other commodities, governments have to promote and foster this growth more than ever to keep our economies strong. We must also take advantage of technology made available through investments such as the MVFL to diversify our territorial economy to better deal with the fluctuations that ultimately come with non-renewable resource development.

The resource development sector accounts for nearly 40% of our GDP. By comparison, tourism accounts for 3.5% and fishing .01%. Diversifying our economy is critical to providing opportunities for our residents and we have begun that work in agriculture, fisheries, manufacturing and knowledge economy to improve the possibility of economic prosperity.

However, for the foreseeable future, resource development will continue to be our path to stability and resource prosperity is blocked by a lack of infrastructure. Nowhere is the economic link between infrastructure and mining prosperity as obvious as it is in the Northwest Territories.

Long distances and challenging landscapes mean more expensive projects. We struggle to get our resources to market economically and our infrastructure deficit is among the largest of Canada's sub-national jurisdictions.

Last week, our Premier spoke publicly about the fading dreams of the North as we see a re-emergence of colonialism, as reconciliation was a fact of life for our government before it gained national prominence. From our perspective, real reconciliation requires that Indigenous people have both political and economic self-determination. This means that northerners, through their democratically elected government, need to have the power to determine their own fates and the practice of decisions being made by bureaucrats and governments in Ottawa must come to an end. Decisions about the North should be made in the North.

Northerners are innovative, self-sufficient and resilient, and want to do their part to contribute to a strong country. We need the kind of well-paying, long term jobs that come with sustainable economic development to achieve this. One of the ways we hope

to continue to work towards this goal is through partnership, a key element of how we operate.

Government-to-government collaboration and partnership is an integral part of the North's foundation. All levels of government have an important role in ensuring future generations can thrive, and Indigenous governments are essential partners in shaping that future and creating opportunities and prosperity in their communities and regions.

The Prime Minister talks about wanting to grow the middle class by making sure people have access to good jobs that pay them well. Northerners want the same thing for themselves. We want an opportunity to grow the middle class that will create good sustainable jobs for Northerners. And we have an opportunity to grow our economy, and Canada's, through the development of strategic transportation corridors. We can do this through innovative financing and partnerships, such as P3s.

Transportation has always been at the forefront of enabling Northerners to grow and develop our economy. Never has the role that transportation plays been more important to guaranteeing our future growth and prosperity than it is today.

Today, I'd like to provide you with some details about a few strategic infrastructure projects being considered to help achieve the NWT's full potential.

The GNWT and the Tłįchǫ Government worked together on studies related to the development of an all-weather road to Whatì. The Tłįcho All-Season Road would provide several benefits, including eliminating the existing winter road and the problems we have had with warmer winters and limited access into the region. Increased access to mineral potential will increase investor confidence, and drive exploration to continue developing the region's economic potential. The project was referred to environmental assessment on July 27, 2016, which is still ongoing.

On January 11, 2017, the federal government provided conditional approval of federal funding for the construction of the Tłįcho All-Season Road. The federal government will provide up to 25 per cent of the eligible project costs through the P3 Canada Fund. A Request for Qualifications (RFQ) was released earlier this year and the Government of the Northwest Territories has since reviewed responses to the RFQ and identified the three successful proponents who will be invited to participate in the next stage of the competitive selection process, the Request for Proposal (RFP) stage. The timing of the RFP stage will be subject to progress on the environmental assessment process.

The Mackenzie Valley all-weather highway project, if built, would run all the way from Alberta to Tuktoyaktuk and enable our territory to grow stronger and become more self-sustaining. The highway will strengthen connections between our communities, and, significantly reduce the cost of doing business in the Mackenzie Valley, where much of our world class reserves of oil and gas are located. The Mackenzie Valley Highway is gaining momentum through innovative partnerships with Aboriginal community governments and the federal government.

The most northern section of the Mackenzie Valley Highway, between Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk, is complete. This project will be the first all-weather road to the Arctic Ocean. It was funded in partnership with the federal government, and is described as "a project of national significance," recognizing its importance to the country's position on security, sovereignty, and economic development. The Inuvik to Tuktoyaktuk Highway will open to the public next week.

The next priority segment of the Mackenzie Valley Highway is between Wrigley and Norman Wells, which has the potential to unlock vast petroleum reserves and connect communities to the all-weather road system. The Government of the Northwest

Territories recently submitted an Expression of Interest to Transport Canada for funding to advance this project, including its individual components, under the National Trade Corridors Fund. This Expression of Interest was accepted, and the Government of the Northwest Territories was invited to submit a comprehensive project proposal to Transport Canada in early November. A P3 business case is also underway.


The third corridor I would like to highlight spans the NWT to Nunavut's Arctic Coast. The mineral-rich region of the Slave Geological Province and connection to a deep water port in western Nunavut holds significant possibilities for a strengthened, sustainable partnership with industry and our government partners. The region holds world-class deposits of base metals, precious metals, and diamonds and is a significant contributor to the NWT economy. Increased all-weather access would improve industry's ability to operate successfully in the North.

An assessment of the economic feasibility and P3 potential of the construction of the Slave Geological Province Access Corridor is currently underway. Similar to the second project I highlighted, the Government of the Northwest Territories has submitted an Expression of Interest to Transport Canada for funding for this project under the National Trade Corridors Fund. This Expression of Interest was accepted, and we were invited to submit a comprehensive project proposal in early November.

We have heard about the slowing forecasts in resource development activity over the next five to fifteen years and its possible effect on the NWT economy. With a flat revenue outlook, the GNWT will be challenged to sustain programs and services or make capital investments in future years.

Continuing to make strategic investments in infrastructure to support responsible development is one way our government can promote economic growth and prosperity for all residents./ To accomplish this, we will need to continue to embrace innovative funding partnerships such as P3s.

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Government of the Northwest Territories Releases the 2016-2017 Public Accounts

YELLOWKNIFE (November 8, 2017)— Today, Robert C. McLeod, Minister for the Department of Finance with the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) released the GNWT Public Account information for 2016-17.

In an effort to meet the GNWT's commitment to improve openness and transparency, the Public Accounts are being released to the public prior to being tabled in the Legislative Assembly. Accompanying the Public Accounts is a plain language companion document intended to be used as a tool to help the public better understand their government's finances.

Highlights from the 2016-17 Public Accounts include:

- An operating surplus of \$175 million, \$35 million more than what was originally budgeted. The operating surplus is an important part of funding the acquisition of capital assets.
- Overall, \$368 million was spent in 2016-17 to acquire capital assets.
- An increase in net debt of \$65 million in 2016-17. Short-term debt decreased by \$43 million during the year.
- Total expenses were \$7 million less than budgeted for 2016-17 and total revenues were \$28 million more than budgeted.

The GNWT continues to manage growth in spending, while making targeted investments to encourage economic growth and address the infrastructure deficit. Infrastructure investments focus on health care, education and transportation and make the Northwest Territories a safer, more competitive and productive Territory, while supporting the creation of jobs in construction and related industries.

Quick Facts:

- The revised Financial Administration Act allows for Public Accounts to be released
 to the public before being tables in the Legislative Assembly. This is in line with the
 Government's mandate to provide improved planning, transparency, accountability
 and fiscal responsibility.
- The Public Accounts were signed October 26th, 2017 and received an unqualified audit opinion.

- The timeliness of the Public Accounts improved almost 3 weeks (signed November 14th in 2016).
- The budget surplus was mainly attributable to an increase of \$20 million in personal and corporate income tax revenues.
- Debt was incurred to finance capital infrastructure and supports working capital requirements for programs and initiatives. This past fiscal year's increase is largely attributable to the financing related to public/private partnerships of \$142 million for work done to date on the Mackenzie Valley Fibre Link and Stanton Territorial Hospital Renewal projects.
- Overall, the Territory's economy decreased by 0.1% in 2017 as measured by real GDP. This decline is the result of a decline in the construction and mining, oil and gas sectors in the 2016 calendar year.




YELLOWKNIFE (November 8, 2017) – Premier Bob McLeod issued the following statement today to clarify numbers provided in recent interviews on the future of the Northwest Territories:

Last week I issued a public red alert calling for a national debate about the future of the Northwest Territories. This call was based on continuing questions the Government of the Northwest Territories has concerning federal plans for the North and their commitment to investing meaningfully in its ongoing social and economic development in a strategic and coordinated way.

In subsequent interviews, I made the comment that 52 percent of the NWT's land was protected, meaning land not currently available to the GNWT for development. I have since had those numbers verified and would like to clarify that 43 percent of the land in the Northwest Territories is currently unavailable to the GNWT for development. This includes currently protected lands, lands withdrawn for conservation and lands proposed for conservation, as well as lands withdrawn for land claim negotiations and settlement lands held by Indigenous governments, as detailed in the attached map.

I also stated that resource development accounts for 40 percent of the NWT economy when measured as a percentage of Gross Domestic Product (GDP), when taking both direct and indirect contributions into account. GDP changes constantly with activity in the NWT economy and there have been several years since 1999 where the direct and indirect impacts of resource development have accounted for 40 percent or more of GDP. As of 2015, the most recent year for which figures are available, resource development contributed 32 percent to the NWT economy. While the numbers change from year to year, the fact is that resource development has been and continues to be the single biggest driver of the NWT's economy.

The confusion over the numbers is unfortunate, as it is shifting the focus from the real issue, which is that the people of the NWT must have a say in defining the future of their territory and can no longer be an afterthought in Ottawa. Whatever the actual numbers, the fact of the matter is that our government has not received any clear indication that Canada has a coherent vision or plan for the NWT's long term future that is guiding decisions they are already making and implementing in the NWT. The federal government's decisions have a significant impact on the NWT and its people and we are eager to partner with them to improve the lives of Northerners. But we need to be sure that Canada is prepared to truly listen and understand the NWT's priorities and then commit to pursuing them with us.




Inuvik Tuktoyaktuk Highway to Open Early November 15 for Tuktoyaktuk Residents


"From bush-bound prospectors, to tour operators sharing our spectacular territory, entrepreneurs have always been at the heart of our territory's economic progress.

Wally Schumann: Opening Remarks - Geoscience Forum

It is great to be here at the 45th annual Geoscience Forum and to see how much this event has grown over the years. I would like to recognize the Northwest Territories (NWT) and Nunavut Chamber of Mines and staff of the Department of Industry, Tourism and Investment for organizing this important event each year and for the invitation to speak here tonight.

The foundation of our economy for the foreseeable future is resource development. The Northwest Territories abundant natural resources are not only key to growing and sustaining our economic future but are also essential to lowering the cost of living, as well as developing training, educational and capacity building opportunities. Our economy depends on the strength of this foundation and the revenues and opportunity it provides, and the people, all of you in this room today, to be part of building and maintaining that foundation.

Canada needs need a solid vision for strategically investing in the North in order to support economic development – and this includes infrastructure. We want to develop the North to have the same benefits as Southern Canada, and our partners in this room will benefit from our prosperity and development. A strong Northern economy benefits everyone.

Our natural resources are not only the key to growing and sustaining our economic future but are essential to lowering the cost of living, to developing training, educational and capacity building opportunities.

The broader development of our resources will contribute to the GDP not just of the NWT, but also to neighbouring jurisdictions, and to all of Canada.

Diversifying our economy is necessary to providing opportunities for our residents and to create a resilient economy, but the reality is that the development of the resource sector remains the cornerstone of our economic stability.

The partnerships that we will build will help the Northwest Territories move forward to become a far greater part of the Canadian economy, and give our residents the opportunity of economic self-determination.

However, our path to stability and resource prosperity is disadvantaged by a lack of clear plan for federal strategic investments in infrastructure. Nowhere is the economic link between infrastructure and economic prosperity as obvious as it is in the Northwest Territories.

Our economic future depends on our ability to develop the infrastructure necessary to support today and of tomorrow.

Meaningful investment in transportation infrastructure would unleash the potential of the North to contribute to Canada's wealth, and the time is now to do so, to help us build the Nation.

Transformative investment in Canada's North by the Federal government in partnership with our government and our Indigenous partners will strengthen Canada's position internationally, and help it become a leader in the circumpolar world.

This we truly believe, and that's why our government is investing in this work now, to help us grow our economy and improve the lives of our residents.

We have a vision of a strong, prosperous territory that provides opportunities for all our communities and regions. Sustainable, responsible development of our natural resources is a significant part of realizing that vision, and strengthening our economy through the responsible development of these resources will allow us to reach our full potential.


Our renewed focus on mapping the geoscience of our territory has proven successful. Reports released this year on the potential of the Slave Geological Province has led to the largest number of claims in the NWT since 2014.

We have invested approximately \$3.4 million in support for geoscience, marketing, Aboriginal capacity building, and our ongoing annual funding for the Mining Incentive Program.

The GNWT has responded to the needs in our marketplace by implementing, and extending, incentives for exploration. This includes our Work Credits Program which we extended by two years.

Explorers now have access to an extraordinary collection of core samples from past work completed across the territory at the new geological materials storage facility here in the city. This will allow analysis of historical samples for new mineral potential at a fraction of the cost of drilling new samples.

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Bob McLeod: Max Awards – Welcoming Remarks

Good evening and welcome to the NWT Max Awards. It is an honour to be here to celebrate the NWT & Nunavut's Chamber of Mines' 50th anniversary with the inaugural Max Award event that celebrates excellence in mining and exploration.

Before I begin, I would like to take a moment to recognize and welcome my colleagues who have joined us this evening. Seeing this room full of Northern leaders, field experts and residents is a reminder of the unique way that we all live, work and celebrate together in the Northwest Territories in a more integrated way than in other parts of Canada.

Taking the time to recognize achievements and excellence in mining and exploration – the single biggest sector of our economy and major employer for our people – is important for our territory.

The people and businesses that will be honoured this evening have made lasting contributions to our territory; are making strides in areas like environmental and social responsibility and are leaders in an industry that we rely so heavily on.

In the Northwest Territories the land has given us what we need to sustain life. Over the years our relationship to the land has changed but one thing that has remained the same is the way we rely on the land for our economic survival. We see this in many areas, but the most significant demonstration can be seen with the discovery of diamonds. Thanks to this discovery, the northern diamond industry has surpassed \$50 billion in produced mineral value and has made Canada a leader in the international diamond trade.

NWT residents, governments, and businesses across the NWT have benefitted from resource development such as diamond mining for decades, but we cannot take this sector and its contribution to our economic prosperity for granted.

As Premier of the Northwest Territories, it is my responsibility to advocate on behalf of all the residents of the north and ensure that the needs of northerners are being met. The North is in a time of change and we need to make sure our voices are heard.

For too long now policies have been imposed on us from Ottawa and southern Canada that are threatening our economic potential and we do not see a clear plan from Canada or a commitment to making the significant investments that would lead to transformative development of our territory and its economy. This needs to change. While in Tuktoyaktuk yesterday, Federal Ministers Sohi and Bennett stated the importance of northerners making decisions for northerners.

We know that right now the best jobs in our territories come from resource development and sectors that support it. We understand that we can't rely on resource development forever and need to diversify our economies but while we are doing that, we need to make sure that Northerners can stay employed in the resource development sector that has contributed so much to the North already.

To do this, we need to ensure people are trained to get and keep jobs; communities are prepared for the social and economic impacts; we maintain and improve the legal and regulatory framework that ensures resources can be developed safely; and the territory has the infrastructure it needs to support responsible development.

Over the last year, you have heard me speak about the need for decisions about the north to be made with the north in mind and by northerners, and this has never been more important. The Northwest Territories and its people deserve an equal opportunity to be valued participants in the Canadian economy and to achieve economic self-determination. We need your support in helping us achieve this.

One thing I have learned over my years in government and politics is that you don't get what you don't ask for. I was in Inuvik and Tuktoyaktuk yesterday for the opening of the new Inuvik-Tuk Highway. Connecting Tuktoyaktuk and extending Canada's road system from sea to sea to sea had been a longstanding dream for the people of the region.

But they did not simply dream, they got out there and made sure that decision makers in Yellowknife and Ottawa knew it was a priority. Our government was there with them, making sure that Northern voices were being heard in Ottawa and Northern priorities were getting the attention they deserved.

In this room there are leaders, advocates, scientists, industry leaders and experts, and residents. Decisions about the future of Canada's North have a direct impact on the lives and economic future of our residents and that is why it is so important to be part of the conversations that will have impacts on our way of life.


The ITH is an example of the good things that happen when Northerners come together and make their voices heard. If we hope to see further economic growth and development here, you need to join us in speaking out. We can no longer rely on the good intentions of others to look out for the needs of our people.

The NWT has a long history with resource development, especially in mining and oil and gas and we have learned a lot over the years. As I look into the crowd tonight and see businesses and leaders who will be honoured for their excellence in innovation and best practices I am reassured that together we can create a stronger, resource rich, sustainable north that all residents can be proud of.





Alberta and Northwest Territories Release First Joint Report on Bilateral Water Agreement

YELLOWKNIFE (**November 21, 2017**) – The Government of Alberta and the Government of the Northwest Territories are pleased to report on the outcomes of the first year of implementation of the *Alberta-Northwest Territories Transboundary Water Management Agreement* to maintain the ecological integrity of our shared waters.

Working Together to Manage Our Shared Waters, released today, is the inaugural annual report of the bilateral committee responsible for implementing the Agreement.

One of the most comprehensive of its kind, this historic agreement lays the foundation for long-term cooperative management of the water shared between Alberta and the NWT. It establishes decision-making mechanisms between the jurisdictions, and joint monitoring of water quantity and quality, as well as biological indicators.

The first year of implementation (2015-2016) saw substantial progress towards expanding our understanding of the Slave and Hay river basins. Other highlights include:

- Establishment of a Bilateral Management Committee, which includes representatives from Alberta and the NWT (including an Aboriginal member)
- Reporting on the state of knowledge for the Hay River Basin and groundwater knowledge in transboundary regions of the Mackenzie River Basin, NWT
- Assessment of 2015 water quality and quantity data for the Slave and Hay rivers
- Review of traditional knowledge research in the Hay and Slave river basins
- Establishment of emergency response protocols and processes to give each jurisdiction prior notification of proposed development and activities

Quick Facts

- The Alberta-Northwest Territories Mackenzie River Basin Bilateral Water
 Management Agreement was signed on March 18, 2015. It is the second in a series
 of bilateral agreements to manage water in the Mackenzie Basin, the largest river
 system in Canada.
- Five provincial and territorial jurisdictions share the Mackenzie River Basin, each with its own legal and regulatory framework. As the ultimate downstream jurisdiction, much of the Northwest Territories' water resources are influenced by management decisions in upstream jurisdictions.
- To promote a cooperative approach to water management, the Governments of Canada, NWT, Yukon, British Columbia, Alberta and Saskatchewan signed the Mackenzie River Basin Transboundary Waters Master Agreement in 1997, committing all six governments to work together towards managing shared water resources in a sustainable manner for current and future generations.
- Bilateral agreements provide a long-term framework to both upstream and downstream jurisdictions to manage shared water resources and ensure that upstream jurisdictions do not unreasonably harm the aquatic ecosystem of downstream jurisdictions.
- To date, three bilateral agreements have been signed between Mackenzie River Basin neighbouring jurisdictions, including the NWT-Alberta Bilateral Agreement.


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
Inuvik Access Road - Culvert Replacement


"Ensuring adequate support for housing is of great importance to the Government of the Northwest Territories. We appreciate the Government of Canada's recognition of the need for long-term support and partnership on housing.

"There is acknowledgment from the Government of the Canada that the North and specifically the Northwest Territories requires proportionately more support to reach the housing conditions of southern Canada.

"Now that the federal government has released their vision, I anticipate that we will have more details shortly. I hope that we can come to an agreement that will set the stage for renewal and transformation.

"The housing needs of the NWT are many and the operating environment is difficult. Our own particular considerations and challenges will need to be reflected in any agreement going forward.

"The Government of the Northwest Territories is committed to working with the federal government to create a strong and comprehensive approach to providing housing for NWT residents."



The Government of the Northwest Territories Proposes a Way Forward for the Legalization of Cannabis in the NWT

YELLOWKNIFE (NOVEMBER 24, 2017) – Minister of Justice Louis Sebert released the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) proposed plan for legalizing cannabis in the NWT today. This is an important step in designing a system that will provide controlled access to a safe supply of recreational cannabis for NWT residents in order to maintain the health and safety of residents and communities across the North.

The Cannabis Legalization in the Northwest Territories: The Way Forward report provides an overview of the GNWT's proposed approach on the matters for which the GNWT is responsible, including: minimum age, possession limits, public smoking, the sale and distribution of recreational cannabis, impaired driving, workplace safety and public education. The Way Forward report takes into account input received through the cannabis public engagement process, as well as other important factors, including interjurisdictional considerations, coordination with enforcement partners, practical and financial implications for implementation in the required timeframe and current research on the health impacts of cannabis.

The GNWT plans to introduce legislation for the consideration of the 18th Legislative Assembly in the February/March sitting, in order to meet the federal deadline of July 2018. The GNWT looks forward to working with Standing Committees to ensure the necessary legislation is developed and reviewed according to normal processes prior to the federally-imposed deadline.

The GNWT will continue work to develop the policies and programs necessary to address the legalization of cannabis in the Northwest Territories.

Quote:

"Our government is working to make sure the NWT is ready with a framework for regulating recreational cannabis when the Government of Canada makes it legal in July 2018. We know this issue matters to Northerners and that is why we have made public engagement a priority and will continue to keep residents informed throughout this process as we work with the Members of the Legislative Assembly to ensure we have the appropriate laws, guidelines, policies and programs in place to achieve an orderly management of legal cannabis by July 2018.

Quick Facts:

- The proposed minimum age for the possession and consumption of cannabis for NWT residents is 19 years.
- Adults 19 and older will be allowed to possess up to 30 grams of dried cannabis or its equivalent in a public place. Adults will also be allowed to grow up to 4 plants per household for personal use.
- Adults 19 and older will be allowed to smoke cannabis in their homes. Public smoking of cannabis will be prohibited in certain areas in order to protect others from second-hand smoke exposure.
- The NWT Liquor Commission will be responsible for the importation and sale of cannabis in the NWT. Initially, NWT residents will only be able to purchase cannabis through liquor stores or by a mail order service run by the NWT Liquor Commission.
- NWT communities will have the option to hold a plebiscite to prohibit cannabis, similar to the options currently available to restrict alcohol.
- The Workers' Safety and Compensation Commission (WSCC) will be responsible for reviewing occupational health and safety regulations and consulting with employers, labour groups and workers to ensure that any changes or additions adequately address impairment issues.
- The GNWT will set up new sanctions for drug-impaired driving.



Robert C. McLeod: Presentation to the Standing Committee on Fisheries and Oceans, Bill-C55 - An Act to Amend the Oceans Act and the Canada Petroleum Resources Act

Delivered on November 27, 2017 Check Against Delivery

Good Day.

I am here today to bring to your attention the Government of the Northwest Territories concerns with Bill C-55 – An Act to amend the Oceans Act and the Petroleum Resources Act.

In making the is presentation I will be sharing with you some of the recent history of the Northwest Territories so that you can hopefully understand both our specific concerns and the cumulative impact of federal actions, including Bill C-55, on the people of the Northwest Territories.

The Government of the Northwest Territories supports self-determination of Indigenous people and Indigenous governments and has developed as a public government with self-government in mind. We have been at the negotiating table with Canada and Indigenous governments from the territory for many years, negotiating land claims and self-government.

Of particular interest to this intervention is the Inuvialuit Final Agreement, which created the Inuvialuit Settlement Region and was signed by Canada, the Inuvialuit, Northwest Territories and Yukon in 1984. The current Prime Minister's father's signature is on that agreement. I am an Inuvialuit beneficiary myself.

On April 1st 2014 the Government of Canada and the Government of the Northwest Territories brought into force the Northwest Territories Land and Resources Devolution Agreement. This agreement was negotiated over many years and finally gave the Government of the Northwest Territories responsibility for onshore land, water and resource management.

Prior to our 2014 devolution, the federal government made all resource management decisions in the territory.

For the people of the Northwest Territories and the nine Indigenous governments that signed on to the agreement, devolution was a game changer. Devolution meant that decisions about the Northwest Territories land, water and resources would finally be made in the Northwest Territories. This is something the vast majority of Canadians take for granted. The engagement of First Nations, Inuit and Metis governments and inclusion of resource-revenue sharing was historic.

What does this have to do with Bill C-55?

Section 3.2 of the Devolution Agreement contains a commitment for Canada, the GNWT, with the participation of the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, to commence negotiations for the management of oil and gas resources in the Beaufort Sea, and other northern offshore areas. This commitment includes the negotiation of resource revenue sharing resulting from offshore oil and gas development.

Negotiations were to start 60 days after the signing of the devolution agreement – which occurred on June 23rd, 2013. That means that negotiations should have begun no later than August 23rd, 2013.

Despite repeated requests from both the GNWT and the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, the federal government has not been willing to sit down to negotiate this critical agreement.

On December 20th 2016, the Prime Minister called my Premier 20 minutes before announcing that all Arctic Canadian waters were indefinitely off limits to future offshore Arctic oil and gas licensing.

"Indefinite" - that was the word the Prime Minister used, and neither the yet-to-benegotiated interests of the Government of the Northwest Territories, nor the rights of the Inuvialuit were taken into consideration prior to that decision being made.

This is despite other provisions in a separate agreement included in the Devolution Agreement and signed by then Minister Valcourt, Premier McLeod and Nellie Cournoyea, Chair and CEO of the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, that states that the parties will share information around terms and conditions of licences as well as any other petroleum resource management matter which the parties consider appropriate to share. Surely an indefinite moratorium fits the description of appropriate information to share through our trilateral committee.

It concerns us greatly as a government that despite a clear commitment to negotiate the management off the offshore including resource revenues, Canada made the unilateral decision to shut down development in that area.

Yes, the announcement also said there will be a five-year scientific review.

But almost one year later we still don't know exactly what will be included in that review. In addition, as a direct result of the federal government's refusal to begin negotiations on the offshore, the NWT has no clear role in the review of a decision that clearly impacts the livelihoods of our people.

Now, Bill C-55 is on our lap, proposed legislation that will once again impact the offshore.

Bill C-55 has made it all the way though second reading in the House of Commons, and contains significant increases in Ministerial power and authority, and yet again, the GNWT was not consulted on its development. Specifically, we are very concerned with the amended ability for the Minister of Fisheries and Oceans to designate Marine Protected Areas by order and without consultation.

We are also concern that the amended Bill will give the appropriate Minister under the Canada Petroleum Resources Act the ability to simply cancel an oil or gas interest in an area that MAY be designated as a Marine Protected Area.

So, let me recap for you:

• The federal government is still refusing to fulfil its commitment and come to the table to negotiate the management of oil and gas resources in the Beaufort Sea with the GNWT and the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation.

While actively avoiding this commitment:

- The Prime Minister announced an indefinite moratorium in the Beaufort, and is creating a process to review this moratorium without allowing the GNWT to define its jurisdiction and interests; and
- Significant increases in federal Ministerial authority have been added to both the Oceans Act, and the Canadian Petroleum Resources Act in Bill C-55, which is making its way through parliamentary review, again without any consultation of the GNWT.

AND, all of this is being done in the absence of any clear federal enunciation of their vision for the Arctic.

Although the Prime Minister announced the development of an Arctic Policy Framework at the same time as he announced the moratorium, the federal government has not given the policy framework the same momentum as Bill C-55.

We are involved in the Arctic Policy Framework and look forward to seeing our priorities reflected in it.

We face the very real possibility that prior to a clear statement of Canada's vision for the Arctic, and prior to the required consultation, that Bill C-55 will become the law of the land.

Similar to our position prior to devolution, we are being relegated to bystanders in decisions that affect the very livelihoods of our communities.

I do not want to give the impression that the NWT does not support conservation. Many of our residents continue to pursue traditional lifestyles, in many cases hunting, trapping and fishing a predominate source of income and food for NWT households. Conservation is integral to our way of life in the NWT.

We also live daily with the legacy of decision making far from home prior to today's robust regulatory regime. The NWT is home of one of Canada's more toxic waste sites. If the current contents of Giant Mine were to enter into the water system there is sufficient arsenic there to kill the entire world population ten times over.

It is for that reason that the Northwest Territories is on track to surpass the 17% Canada Target 1 conservation target for 2020. Once the planning and decision-making processes are completed, the Northwest Territories conservation network will extend from 13.5%, which is its current size, to 20.4% of the territory.

The NWT offshore is also currently home to two Marine Protected Areas. The Tarium Niryutait and Anguniaqvia Niqiqyuam Marine Protected Areas, and marine portion of our Terrestrial Protected Areas, cover over 5300 square kilometres of the Inuvialuit Settlement Region.

In addition to conservation, it is important that NWT residents are provided with every opportunity to enjoy a good quality of life.

Every Northerner deserves the opportunity to experience the wellness and the strength of community that people equate with Canada and with being Canadian.

The Government of the Northwest Territories has a clear vision of what is needed to achieve this bright future for the people of the Northwest Territories. But the reality is that right now, this is not the experience of the Indigenous people living in the NWT's remote communities.

The Government of the Northwest Territories is working to change this. We are working to lower the cost of living and increase community wellness and quality of life in each of our communities.

The key to achieving this vision is sustainable development through economic diversification, and developing our many natural resources that can be used to drive the global green economy.

We understand that opportunity and personal and community wellness are derived from educational attainment and good jobs, which are integral aspects of reconciliation. Achieving our vision through sustainable economic development will create these opportunities in each of our communities.

We need a strong federal partner who wants to be a part of creating this positive future for all of our remote communities in the NWT, including the infrastructure that most of the rest of Canada takes for granted.

For centuries, people have been coming north looking to take advantage of its natural resources and northerners have had to adapt to those demands. Once it was whale oil and fur, right now its diamonds. Our people had hoped that oil and gas would be a part of that story, too, but it appears that southern tastes and priorities have changed again. As a result, Northerners are being asked to sacrifice their hopes for good jobs and a strong economy yet another time because of decisions made elsewhere.

In a public forum in Yellowknife last summer the Prime Minister acknowledged that he had closed one door of economic opportunity for our territory, but committed to work towards opening many more doors. We appreciate this commitment, but Northerners are still waiting to hear what the plan is and how Canada intends to open those other doors.

In summary, for your purposes today, I need you to leave you with two thoughts for your consideration.

First, the GNWT has concerns with Bill C-55 as drafted, specifically the increase in unilateral authorities given to federal Ministers.

Secondly, the NWT, although cold and remote, is a real place with 44,000 people living it, in 33 communities, who are right now living with the cumulative impacts of your decisions.

It is easy from Ottawa to say that there has not been real economic impact from this decision, because your budgets are of a scale that doesn't show the economic impact that even a \$7.2 M decrease in activity, as the federal government has described it, can have in a region like the Beaufort Delta. It is easy from where you are to miss the importance residents place in that money coming from outside of government.

You may not feel it here, but the unfulfilled federal commitment to negotiate responsibility for the offshore with the Government of the Northwest Territories and the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, the imposition of the moratorium, and now Bill C-55 arriving in Parliament without our consultation are all connected.

They have created a cascade of mistrust that we asking you to recognize and begin to repair.


The decisions you make here in Parliament "for us" and without consulting us, have a direct impact on our lives, our economies, and our community wellness.

You cannot understand the impacts of these decisions for two reasons, firstly because our reality is not your reality, and secondly because you have not consulted us.

I am asking you today to take the first step in beginning to repair what could, and should, be a strong relationship between the federal government the Government of the Northwest Territories. This step is to ensure that there is northern and Indigenous involvement in key decisions that impact Northern lives, including traditional activities. This action supports reconciliation and shows respect for both the Government of the Northwest Territories and existing Agreements with Indigenous peoples in the NWT. Please uphold this country's strong commitment to consultation:

- Amend the Bill C-55 to ensure that federal Ministers do not have the unilateral authority to make decisions about Canada's marine environment without consultation; and
- Ensure there is a proper consultation process for Bill C-55.

Premier McLeod Responds to Canada's Apology to LGBTQ+ Canadians

YELLOWKNIFE (November 28, 2017) – The Premier of the Northwest Territories Bob McLeod issues the following statement today in response to Canada's apology to LGBTQ+ Canadians:

"Today marks an important day for LGBTQ+ communities across our nation as the Prime Minister of Canada issues a formal apology to the LGBTQ+ Canadians for the discrimination and injustices they and their families have suffered. This day marks a step forward in a journey towards healing and a more equitable nation for all residents of this country.

"As Premier of the Northwest Territories I am pleased to see Canada making this apology. Our government believes that Northerners and all Canadians alike should be able to live their lives free of discrimination and persecution. As the first jurisdiction in Canada to offer a third gender option on a birth certificate, we remain committed to ensuring individuals across the north are empowered and feel safe in the communities they call home.

"I commend the Prime Minister of Canada for issuing this apology and putting Canada at the forefront of this issue. The Northwest Territories stands strong with Canada and this message."

GNWT and NWT Seniors' Society Partner to Improve Seniors' Programs and Services

YELLOWKNIFE (November 29, 2017) – Minister Responsible for Seniors Glen Abernethy and NWT Seniors' Society Past President Leon Peterson announced a new partnership today to develop a report card on Government of the Territories (GNWT) programs and services for seniors. The report card will be an opportunity to inventory and assess the effectiveness of GNWT programs and services either designed for or accessed by seniors, determine how well they are meeting seniors' needs and identify areas for potential improvement or better coordination.

An important goal of this collaboration will be to address seniors' perceptions of fragmentation that arise in their dealings with the GNWT when they are viewed primarily as clients of particular programs or departments. This work will be based upon the recognition that NWT seniors interact with the GNWT across the full range of programs and services. The goal of promoting successful aging will involve ensuring physical, social, mental, emotional and spiritual activities are valued and integrated into the daily lives of all NWT residents.

Officials from the GNWT and the NWT Seniors' Society will meet early in 2018 to begin discussions on preparing the report card, including identifying programs and services for review, assessment criteria and a work plan to complete the proposed report card within the term of the 18th Legislative Assembly. The report card will be available towards the end of this Assembly for consideration as part of its priority-setting and planning activities for the next Assembly.

The partnership was confirmed in a meeting between the Minister and NWT Seniors' Society Executive Director Barb Hood and follows on presentations from the Society to the Social Envelope Committee of Cabinet and the Legislative Assembly Standing Committee on Social Development.

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
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Minister Abernethy Applauds Results of Anti-Poverty Roundtable in Norman Wells


"Each year for the past five years, non-government organizations, stakeholders that include band councils and indigenous governments, and Members of the Legislative Assembly, have been meeting with government officials to share their knowledge, success stories, challenges and innovative approaches to addressing the complex issue of poverty in the Northwest Territories.

"Participants at this year's roundtable worked hard to advance the development of a definition of poverty in the NWT that is reflective of how poverty is experienced by NWT residents, and respectful of the diverse peoples and cultures of the territory. Participants also helped to set priorities for action through discussions about their most urgent issues, and open dialogue on a range of topics including housing and homelessness; early childhood development and services for children; mental health and addictions; and the distinction between poverty management versus poverty reduction.

"I want to thank all of this year's Anti-Poverty Roundtable participants who made the time and travelled to Norman Wells for this important event. While I am aware that not everyone who had hoped to be at the roundtable was able to attend, we were able to have representation from all regions and sectors contributing to some very informative and insightful discussions. I know that we will all build on this year's outcomes and strengthen our approach towards reducing poverty in all of the communities.

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Request for Proposals Released for the Thcho All Season Road

YELLOWKNIFE (December 5, 2017) – The Government of the Northwest Territories has issued its Request for Proposals (RFP) for the construction of the Tłįchǫ All-Season Road (TASR). Three proponents identified through a Request for Qualifications will be invited to submit proposals: Aurora Access Partners, NAE Transportation Partners and North Star Infrastructure.

Technical submissions for the RFP are due on August 9, 2018, and financial submissions are due on August 29, 2018.

The TASR project is currently undergoing an environmental assessment by the Mackenzie Valley Environmental Impact Review Board. This regulatory process will ensure the project is undertaken in an environmentally, socially, and culturally sound manner. The RFP is being released at this time in alignment with the environmental regulatory schedule and to provide the time required for the three proponents to prepare the RFP documents.



Caroline Cochrane: National Day of Remembrance and Action Vigil

Delivered on December 6, 2017

Welcome everyone, this evening we gather together to mark this National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women.

I would like to thank the Status of Women Council, the Public Service Alliance of Canada North - NWT Regional Women's Committee, and the Northern Territories Federation of Labour for working collaboratively to organize this event tonight.

On this date 28 years ago, fourteen young women were murdered at the Ecole Polytechnique in Montreal. Although it was 28 years ago, some of us, myself included, remember this horrific day like it was yesterday.

These young women were not killed due to family violence or because of a personal vendetta against them individually. These women were killed only because they were **women**: women seeking higher education in non-traditional fields; women who wanted to challenge the stereotypes of women's roles that limited what they could do. This stereotyping has held so many of us down and continues to exist today.

The National Day of Remembrance and Action on Violence Against Women was created to ensure we do not forget these fourteen women who died in our fight for equality and equal opportunity.

Today we also reflect on violence against women in the Northwest Territories and throughout Canada. Twenty-eight years later women who seek non-traditional occupations are still judged negatively by many. Often people do not see this judgment as violence if there is no physical marks to bear, however, women in powerful or non-traditional occupations often feel additional expectations, are second guessed on decisions, and sometimes set up to fail simply because of their gender. This in itself is violence and we need to continue to challenge the voices of those who put down women simply due to their occupational choice.

December 6th is a key date in The Sixteen Days of Activism on Violence Against Women and Girls.

The Sixteen Days of Activism began on November 25th, the International Day for the Elimination of Violence Against Women, and ends on December 10th, International Human Rights Day.

This year's theme for the 16 days is hashtag MYActionsMatter.

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The MYActionsMatter campaign asks Canadians what we can do to prevent genderbased violence, and invites each of us to focus on the five ways in which we can strengthen our efforts to end this violence, including:

- Listening
- Believing
- Speaking out
- Intervening
- Acting

Creating communities that take a stand against all forms of violence is essential to changing societal values and social attributes. The #MYActionsMatter campaign is one way to change attitudes and foster communities that value and protect women from gender based violence. We only have to look at the past few months on social media to see the impact that brave women can have by speaking out on harassment and assault by men in positions of power.

Their voices - our voices - have influenced people to start seeking real solutions.

These women who were brave enough to come forward against men of great influence are part of the history of women who pave the way for others to stand up against injustices enacted on us solely because of our gender. Each time a woman speaks out she opens the door for more to follow.


Although I speak of women who have taken a stand, it is also important to recognize that we need men to stand with us against gender stereotyping, expectations and assumptions. We need men to challenge their own thinking when they consider the roles and abilities of women and to challenge others who vocalize negative assumptions, judgments, and those cruel comments thrown out as "jokes" that continue to perpetuate the negative stereotypes.

As I have said so often and will continue to say, this is not a women's issue, it is not a men's issue. Gender violence is a societal issue and only when all of us stand together to promote equality will the violence end.

I would like to thank all of you for being here this evening to take a stand for women and girls, and working to end gender-based violence and discrimination.

Our actions count - and now is the time to act.

Human Rights Decision on IA Payments

YELLOWKNIFE (December 11, 2017) – Minister of Education, Culture and Employment is acknowledging a Decision made by the Human Rights Commission on the process surrounding how some Income Assistance payments are made to clients.

"The Department of Education, Culture and Employment provides residents of the Northwest Territories with Income Assistance benefits to assist with basic needs such as food, clothing and shelter.


In 2010, at the request of the Hamlets, community members and the District Education Authorities, the Department agreed to provide a food voucher payment system to suppliers in the communities of Tuktoyaktuk, Ulukhaktok and Aklavik.

While one of the primary principles of the Income Security Programs is providing consistent, equitable access to all of our programs, in unique circumstances we will work with communities to ensure the security and well-being of members.

The Department recently received a Decision made by the Human Rights Commission that the food voucher system is discriminatory. As a response, we will be returning to the standard approach of providing Income Assistance payments directly to clients.

Beginning in February 2018, all Income Assistance clients across the Northwest Territories will be receiving their payments directly.

We will continue to deliver programs that encourage self-reliance and ensure that they respond to the needs and realities of our residents."



New 'X' Gender Option Now Available on NWT Driver's Licences

YELLOWKNIFE (December 11, 2017) – Residents of the Northwest Territories (NWT) now have the option to display an 'X' in the sex section of driver's licence and identification cards issued by the Department of Infrastructure.

This change helps to ensure services offered by the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) are inclusive and respectful of transgender, two-spirit, intersex, and non-binary residents.

To change the gender identifier on a driver's licence or identification card, residents must fill out an application or renewal form and visit an NWT issuing office. There is no additional fee or requirements for residents to make this change.

- 'X' is a standard accepted by the International Civil Aviation Organization Standards, which promotes consistency among travel documents
- This change helps the GNWT meet the diverse needs of residents, and is consistent with the *Vital Statistics Act*.
- The GNWT does not have authority over how other organizations/ jurisdictions recognize or accept the gender X option.

 INF continues to work with the Department of Health and Social Services to allow for Indigenous fonts and diacritics, such as the glottal stop, on driver's licences and identification cards. This is a complex and difficult process as changes will affect multiple information systems.



Fourth Intergovernmental Council Meeting Held in Yellowknife

YELLOWKNIFE (December 18, 2017) – The Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and the Indigenous government partners to the Devolution Agreement met last week in Yellowknife at the fourth annual meeting of the Intergovernmental Council.

Leaders from the GNWT, Inuvialuit Regional Corporation, Northwest Territory Métis Nation, Sahtu Secretariat Incorporated, Gwich'in Tribal Council, Tłįchǫ Government, Acho Dene Koe First Nation, Salt River First Nation, Denínu Kų́ę First Nation and the Kátł'odeeche First Nation were involved in the meeting and discussed a range of issues related to lands and resource management.

At the meeting, leaders discussed the necessity to work together on shared priorities, on developing a collective vision for the Northwest Territories, through a collaborative process to develop the northern elements of the Arctic Policy Framework. This vision includes creating the conditions that support sustainable economic development in communities, provide benefits for communities, recognize our Agreements and Treaties and ensure that all signatories to the Devolution Agreement have a voice.

The partners also discussed the evolving nature of Government to Government relationships between public and Indigenous governments and ways to enhance communication and work collaboratively on Intergovernmental Council land and resource issues. Members of the Council discussed the need to create a model of governance in the Northwest Territories that reflects the reality of our shared responsibilities.

Premier of the Northwest Territories committed to working with Indigenous Governments and the Government of Canada to collaboratively develop the new relationship of respect, recognition and responsibility.

Quick Facts

- The fourth Intergovernmental Council Meeting was held in Yellowknife on Friday, December 15, 2017.
- A key feature of the Devolution Agreement is the establishment of an Intergovernmental Council to allow the public and Indigenous governments to cooperate and collaborate on matters related to lands and resource management.
- The Council is established by the Northwest Territories Intergovernmental Agreement on Lands and Resources Management.
- The Intergovernmental Council allows governments to share ideas, discuss common priorities and interests and also explore ways to harmonize their respective land and resource management practices, share capacity and avoid duplication.

- Under the Devolution Agreement, the GNWT committed to share up to 25% of its resource revenues with Indigenous Governments that have signed on as partners. In 2016-2017, the GNWT has disbursed a total of \$6,801,655 to its partners. Since Devolution, the GNWT has disbursed \$20,612,991 to its partners. This revenue is in addition to any resource revenues the Indigenous governments may have received from a land claim or self-government agreement. This no-strings-attached funding provides Indigenous Governments the ability to decide how they choose to use or invest that revenue based on their priorities."



YELLOWKNIFE (December 18, 2017) – Today, Premier Bob McLeod announced the release of a special digital multimedia project commissioned to commemorate 50 years of government in the Northwest Territories.

As the year comes to a close, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) is proudly reflecting on what has been accomplished over the last 50 years – particularly the contributions made by the dedicated public servants.

- Before 1967, some administration for the territory was carried out in the NWT, but most decisions were made in Ottawa.
- Giving the territory more autonomy and establishing a capital in the North were key recommendations of the Carrothers Commission, setup by the federal government to study the future of NWT governance.
- In January 1967, Yellowknife was declared the new capital.
- In the fall of 1967, the seat of the territorial government was officially moved which
 was a big step towards making the government more responsive to the needs of
 northerners.



Live Test of the NWT Alert Ready System


YELLOWKNIFE (December 18, 2017) – On December 20th, 2017 at 1:55pm, the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) will issue a live test of NWT Alert Ready, the Northwest Territories public alerting system. Residents may see and hear the public alert test on radio stations and cable networks across the NWT.

NWT Alert Ready is being developed to provide public alerts to NWT residents during emergencies and disasters and is part of the national public alerting system "Alert Ready". The system is currently under development with full implementation expected in 2019. Public awareness testing is conducted up to five times a year to ensure system functionality and availability. This test is part of efforts by the GNWT in cooperation with NWT broadcasters to ensure the safety and security of residents during emergencies.

Alert Ready is designed to deliver critical and potentially life-saving alerts to Canadians through television and radio. The Alert Ready system is developed in partnership with federal, provincial and territorial emergency management officials, Environment Canada and the broadcast industry to ensure you receive alerts immediately and know when to take action to keep yourself and your family safe.

Premier McLeod Urges Federal Government to Keep its Promises

YELLOWKNIFE (**December 19, 2017**) – Northwest Territories Premier Bob McLeod issued the following statement to mark the first anniversary of the Government of Canada's unilateral decision to impose an indefinite moratorium on offshore oil and gas activity in the Arctic on December 20, 2016:

"On June 25, 2013 the Government of Canada entered into an agreement with the Government of the Northwest Territories (GNWT) and five regional Indigenous governments to transfer administration and control of public lands and resources in the Northwest Territories to the people who live here. As part of that agreement, the Government of Canada committed to enter into negotiations with our government and the Inuvialuit Regional Corporation (IRC) over the shared management of oil and gas resources in the Beaufort Sea within 60 days of the signing of the Devolution Agreement.

"More than four years later, the only substantive action the GNWT has seen from Canada concerning management of offshore oil and gas has been its decision to forbid development, a decision that did not take the views and priorities of the GNWT or the IRC into account. That the federal government would not consult either of our governments when it has already acknowledged our legitimate rights to be involved in management of these resources in the Devolution Agreement continues to be a mystery that it has not yet explained.

"There have been no meaningful negotiations between Canada, the GNWT and the IRC to date. One meeting was held between officials in July 2013 to discuss commitments flowing from the Devolution Agreement, but it would be inaccurate to characterize these as "negotiations". The GNWT has also provided federal officials – at its request – a written statement of its interests in the offshore in 2014, but has received no response to date.

"Our government does not understand Canada's reluctance to enter into meaningful negotiations on the offshore as it has promised to do pursuant to section 3.20 of the Devolution Agreement, in spite of repeated requests from the GNWT and the IRC.

"We are prepared to negotiate and have raised this issue in many letters to Prime Minister Trudeau, Minister of Crown Indigenous Relations and Northern Affairs Bennett and Minister of Natural Resources Carr, as well as in face-to-face meetings and telephone conversations, to no avail.

"If Canada was serious about fulfilling its promises to the people of the NWT and the Inuvialuit, we would expect it to commit to a clear negotiations process, including establishing a negotiations framework and concrete schedule for negotiations agreed to by all three parties. No such steps have been taken so far.


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"This lack of action to fulfill a negotiated commitment is characteristic of Canada's continuing disregard for the Government of the Northwest Territories. As the duly elected representatives of all NWT citizens, we expect to be consulted on a government-to-government basis by Canada on matters that involve our legally-established jurisdiction and which affect our residents.

"Passing discussions with our officials or inviting them to take part as one of many attendees in meetings with other parties, many of which do not hold any legislative authorities, is not meaningful consultation in our view and does not meet our understanding of respectful government-to-government relations.

"Rather than demonstrating a genuine interest in hearing, understanding and incorporating the views of the NWT's public government into its policies and decisions, it seems like Canada is simply seeking to check a box and move on with its plans. Canada may be satisfied with this; the people of the NWT expect more."
