Day 1 | Monday. Today is the day we've been waiting for as we set off on our journey to Churchill, and on to Eskimo Point, above the tree line. We'll be greeted at the airport by our host, Don Baker, one of the Canadian Arctic's most active outfitters. After checking into the modern Tugalik Inn our host will provide a full

briefing and equipment check. Tugalik Inn - 1 night. Dinner included.


Day 2 | Tuesday. This morning, it's off by dog sled to the open tundra. In the evening our guides will construct an igloo (snow conditions permitting). Marvel at the ingenuity of the ancient snow house. Tonight as we nod off to a restful sleep, we know that time has no meaning in this vast land. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 3 | Wednesday. We awaken, break camp and leave our overnight home to succumb to the warmth of spring. After a full day on the trail we return to a welcome in Eskimo Point. Tugalik Inn - 1 night. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 4 | Thursday. This morning we tour the community of Eskimo Point with Don Baker. In the afternoon we board our Calm Air flight to Churchill. We'll be met by local naturalist and historian Bonnie Chartier. Arctic Inn - 1 night. Breakfast included.

Day 5 | Friday. This morning, Bonnie Chartier will take us on a tour of Churchill. In the afternoon we board our Canadian Airlines jet to Winnipeg and home, savouring the memories of an adventure of a lifetime.

Note: During your 2 day dog sled trip, chief outfitter and guide Don Baker will provide a full support camp nearby with skidoos, komatiks, tents, WC, medical supplies and emergency radio.



TRIP RATING. DIFFICULT

A trip of more strenuous exertion is featured with overnight stay in an igloo (weather permitting), or tents. May be physically demanding dependent upon weather conditions. Previous outdoor experience is suggested and a physician's check should be performed prior to departure.

Day 1. Today is the day we've been waiting for, so settle back and enjoy our Canadian Airlines flight to Winnipeg. Passengers joining the tour independently in Winnipeg will join your tour escort and fellow travelling companions at the Delta Winnipeg. Then it's off on a tour of the city - the legislative building topped by the "golden boy", the St. Boniface Museum, Osborne Street, Assiniboine Park and the impressive Manitoba Museum of Man and Nature. Tonight enjoy a reception and briefing on your Arctic adventure hosted by your tour escort. Delta Winnipeg - 1 night.

Day 2. Our journey today takes us first to Churchill, where a change of planes carries us on to the community of Rankin Inlet in the Canadian Arctic. Upon arrival we will be met by our hosts during our stay in Rankin Inlet, Jack and Caroline Anawak. This evening enjoy a presentation on the fascinating Inuit culture, the history of Rankin Inlet and the extremely fragile Arctic environment. Rankin Inlet Lodge -3 nights. Dinner included.

Day 3. Today, by tour bus, we explore Rankin Inlet including stops at the local craft shops featuring soap stone carvings and wall hangings. Next, we travel onto the Arctic Tundra to the Anawak's summer camp overlooking the Meliadine River. Here the Anawaks will unravel the history of the Inuit people at this 3,000 year old archaeological site complete with stone tent rings and caches. At the camp enjoy a hearty luncheon of northern foods. This evening we will visit with many of the community's elders and enjoy a demonstration of traditional Inuit games and a display of

Caribou and seal skin clothing. Breakfast, lunch and dinner

Day 4. This morning we fly north to the community of Repulse Bay and the Arctic Circle - imagine standing on the Circle itself! Our host in Repulse Bay will be Simeoni Natseck, local outfitter and hunter. After lunch our walk about the community will include the Hamlet office, The Bay, a soap stone carving demonstration and a visit to the local Co-op store to see some of the best carvings in the Keewatin region. We return to Rankin Inlet for a special Arctic Char dinner. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 5. Time this morning for some last minute shopping or photography around Rankin Inlet before we fly south to Eskimo Point, where our host and guide, Don Baker has arranged a special luncheon and demonstration of Inuit drum dancing. Next Don Baker will take us on a tour of Eskimo Point a traditional Inuit community including a visit to the Inuit Cultural Institute. In the late afternoon we will fly further south to Churchill, "polar bear capital of the world", where we will be met by local naturalist and historian Bonnie Chartier. Arctic Inn - 3 nights. Breakfast and lunch included.

Day 6. Today we tour Churchill - the busy port with its grain elevators, Cape Merry, the rugged Hudson Bay coast,

the Town Centre and the famous Arctic Trading Company. At high tide we'll cross the Churchill River to the 18th century Hudson's Bay Company fortress – Fort Prince of Wales. During our crossing if conditions permit we'll observe part of the vast population of Beluga whales which inhabit the mouth of the Churchill River during the short summer

Day 7. We're off across the Central Tundra south of Churchill aboard a huge six wheel drive Tundra Bus. Keep an eye out for a chance sightseeing of Barrenland caribou, white foxes, polar bears and the great number of breeding bird species inhabiting the region in summer. We return to Churchill in the late afternoon. Lunch on the Tundra included.

Day 8. This morning visit the Eskimo Museum housing one of Canada's finest collections of Inuit carvings and artifacts depicting the Inuit way of life. It ended far too soon but take back the new friendships and the special memories of the incomparable beauty and warm hospitality of Canada's Arctic as you return to Winnipeg this afternoon.


CLOTHING TIPS.

It's best to dress for cool weather. As with all Arctic travel you'll find it much more comfortable to layer your clothing. The standard list of clothing outlined in the introduction on page 2 will prove sufficient.

Trip Rating: Easy

This trip highlights the scenic and cultural aspects of the Arctic communities, using strictly hotel accommodations and ground transportation by van or bus. Short hikes and community walks will be taken. These trips are suitable for all ages and inclinations. Each group is limited to a maximum of 18 travellers.





Sila Lodge on Wager Bay.

The wildlife resources alone are worth the trip to Sila Lodge. Across Wager Bay is one of the Arctic's major denning areas for polar bears. Located within a short hike from the Lodge is a nest of gyrfalcons.

Sila ("outdoors" in Inuktitut) Lodge is a modern lodge with all the conveniences. The scenery is spectacular, with soaring cliffs and rolling hills representative of the Arctic topography.

Day 1 | Monday. It's arrived, an adventure like none other for the amateur and professional naturalist! Leave Winnipeg by Canadian Airlines to Churchill and on to Rankin Inlet in the Arctic. Met by our local guides at the airport, we'll transfer to the Rankin Inlet Lodge. Rankin Inlet Lodge — 1 night. Dinner included.

Day 2 | Tuesday. Enjoy a morning tour of Rankin Inlet with Jack and Caroline Anawak. This afternoon it's off by chartered Twin Otter on a one and a half hour flight to incredible Wager Bay. Arriving at the airstrip above Sila Lodge, we'll be met by our hosts for the next seven days, Louis Pilakapsi and John Tatty. Louis and John are two Inuits with a dream to operate a lodge in Wager Bay, where they spent their childhood. Tonight after dinner, we'll gather to learn about the safety rules and operating procedures at the Lodge. Sila Lodge—7 nights. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 3 | Wednesday. After a filling breakfast we'll take a walk with our lnuit guides up to Sila Falls (3kms) and beyond, to view Wager Bay from an excellent vantage point. The wildflowers are spectacular and there is every chance to spot caribou of the Wager Bay herd. Returning to the Lodge for lunch we'll set out in the afternoon for Gull Lakes, an easy hike to view the many species of bird life in the area-red-throated loon, king eider, semi-palmated sandpiper and plover. Evening is at our leisure. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 4 | Thursday. A full day outing is planned for us today. We'll go by boat across the bay on a search for — polar bear! One of the most exciting times in any visitor's trip to

the Arctic is their first sighting of a polar bear in the wild. The experience of seeing this majestic animal is beyond description. Along the way we'll pass by a black guillemot colony while looking out for seals in the water. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 5 | Friday. After breakfast we'll set out by boat again to Boat Cove. Walking along the north shore of Wager Bay while investigating the numerous Inuit archeological sites and the abundant wildlife, we come ashore for an outdoor picnic luncheon. After lunch we'll travel by boat to Douglas Harbour, again spotting the bountiful wildlife and bird life of the coast. Watch for seals and polar bear. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 6 | Saturday. Today we visit the old Hudson's Bay Company post, abandoned in the 1950's when the fur trading activity moved on to Repulse Bay. Passing through the reversing falls at the head of Wager Bay, we'll come upon the Post where many of the artifacts left by the traders are still in evidence. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

CLOTHING TIPS

You should be advised that winds can blow quite hard in Wager Bay and produce uncomfortable wind chill conditions when travelling in the open boats from the lodge. In addition to the standard list of clothing you should bring the following: Waterproof rubber boots, two-piece rain suit, long underwear, (polypropylene or silk for moisture), hat with a brim for the sun, long sleeved turtle necks, day back pack for hiking, bug jacket with repellent (at least 95% DEET).

Day 7 | Sunday. Today we hike to Caribou Flats, high behind the lodge. Our lunch will be packed for an outdoors picnic. We'll observe caribou feeding in the area between two picturesque lakes, and usually water birds such as Arctic loons. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included. Day 8 | Monday. Today we set off on a 14km trail after a short boat ride. Along the way we'll look out for wildlife such as Arctic fox, wolf and maybe even a wolverine.

The land with many gorges and rapids is a photographer's dream. For the last great vista of Wager Bay, this is the spot. Return to the lodge in time for dinner, tired but fulfilled. *Breakfast*, hunch and dinner included.


Day 9 | Tuesday. All morning is dedicated to packing up our gear. After a farewell lunch at the lodge, the Twin Otter arrives all too soon. On the short flight back to "civilization" we reflect on the adventure and experience of discovering Arctic flora and fauna in its natural state. An experience like none other. Arriving in Rankin Inlet, we are met and transferred to our hotel. Rankin Inlet Lodge — 1 night. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 10 | Wednesday. Homeward bound today but still a chance to explore Rankin Inlet to purchase that last-minute souvenir or to savour the final moment in the Arctic. Breakfast included.

TRIP RATING: MODERATE




Day 1. As we board our Canadian Airlines jet flight in Winnipeg bound for Churchill, the excitement begins to build. For this is a photography adventure second to none. In Churchill we will be met by local naturalist and historian Bonnie Chartier who will take us on a tour of the community. Arctic Inn — 1 night.

Day 2. This morning it's off to Southampton Island and Coral Harbour aboard Calm Air. Coral Harbour, a community with a fascinating history of its own. Upon arrival at the airport in Coral Harbour we'll be met by the Ningeocheak family, our hosts for the next week. After dinner, time to walk about the community and visit with the local people. Leonie's Place — 2 nights. Dinner included. **Day 3.** Today a community tour of Coral

Harbour and a short drive out to Kirchoffer Falls. Keep a close watch for snowy owls. The remainder of the day will be spent briefing and going over safety procedures for your trip to Coats Island. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 4. This morning we're off aboard the Ningeocheak's 47' Longliner to Coats Island. We arrive in the evening at the Coats Island Base Camp, our well appointed tent camp with all the comforts of home. Coats Island Tent Base Camp — 4 nights. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 5. We'll awake to a home-cooked breakfast and then it's off to small Bencas Island to the north to view the many Walruses - a once in a lifetime photographic opportunity A day camp has been set up on Bencas Island for lunch. We'll also check out the ancient inukshuks (Inuit markers) and the old whaling artifacts in evidence on the island. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.



Day 6. Today, we arise bright and early to capture the incredible Murre Cliffs of eastern Coats Island. The sun shines directly on the cliffs early in the morning making for a spectacular setting. Enroute with Jimmy Ningeocheak we search for polar bear, that majestic animal so emblematic of the north. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 7. We'll hike inland today on the island's tundra to view the waterfowl and caribou. Stopping off for a picnic lunch, the silence of the Arctic amazes us. Continuing on, we'll keep a sharp eye out for Arctic foxes. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 8. This morning, our last on Coats Island, we'll pack up and get ready to board our Calm Air Twin Otter as it lands on Coats Island. Saying good-bye to our guides and hosts we take one last shot of the island as we fly to Rankin Inlet. Upon arrival we are taken to the hotel by our local guides, Jack and Caroline Anawak. Rankin Inlet Lodge — 2 nights. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 9. Today we explore Rankin Inlet by tour bus, including stops at the local craft shops featuring local soap stone carvings and wall hangings. Next, we travel onto the Arctic Tundra to the Anawak's summer camp overlooking the Meliadine River. Here the Anawaks will unravel the history at this 3,000 year old archeological site, complete with stone tent rings and caches. At the camp enjoy a hearty luncheon

of northern foods. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 10. Time this morning for some lastminute shopping or photography around Rankin Inlet before we fly south to Churchill and on to Winnipeg. We can't wait to get our film processed for the permanent memories of our Arctic adventure that we'll treasure for years to come. Breakfast included.


Trip Rating: Moderate







Day 1 | Wednesday. Our flight to Ferguson Lake begins in Winnipeg by boarding a Canadian Airlines jet to Churchill and on to Rankin Inlet via Calm Air. 
Day 2 | Thursday. We're off fishing as our Inuit guide takes us to the first fishing spot of the day. At noon we'll head for the shore to cook up some fresh lake trout. In the late afternoon we'll make our way back to the Lodge. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 3 | Friday. More of the same fabulous fishing awaits today. Our arms will be tired and we look forward to returning to the Lodge and its sauna and whirlpool facilities. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 4 | Saturday. Fish for Grayling today. These "sailfish" of the Arctic offer the fishermen an excellent opportunity to use that ultra-light equipment we brought along. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 5 | Sunday. Fishing starts early for us today to get those last hours in. We return to the Lodge to pack up and depart for Rankin Inlet for an overnight stay. Rankin Inlet Lodge 1 night. Breakfast, lunch and dinner included.

Day 6 | Monday. This morning we'll be taken on a short tour of the community. Then it's homeward bound through Churchill.




TROPHY FISHING ONLY

What to expect from the Arctic.

What the Arctic expects from you, and how to prepare for your holiday.

As you have gone through the various special holidays offered, you will have found that there is a little more preparation involved than for an ordinary vacation. While many of the facilities and services are very familiar in a southern context, one must never forget that the Arctic is, in most cases, the very same as it has been for thousands of years. The distances are great, sometimes staggering. The level of services is not as sophisticated as that of major centers. And the land and climate can be quite unforgiving. By making the proper preparations this unique destination can provide an experience that will touch you with its simplicity, grandeur and mystery. No one ever leaves the Arctic and does not feel changed somehow.

Culture.

The lifestyle and culture of the lnuit has changed rapidly over the last thirty years. Most of the people, especially those under 40 years, speak English and Inuktitut. Many of the elders of the society do not. Our hosts will look after interpreting. The lnuit that you will meet will be warm, friendly and helpful. The people of the Arctic are its greatest strength. All previous Canada's Arctic visitors considered the most rewarding aspect of their holiday their interaction with the people that live here.

The right attitude.

It takes a special kind of person to visit the Arctic. The watch word is go there with no preconception and an attitude of openmindedness about the land, its ways and people.

The affinity our guides feel for the land assures you a most enjoyable holiday. For your safety, directions given by the guides should be adhered to at all times. Although there may seem to be no recognizable danger, centuries have taught the Inuit how to survive the rigors of the Arctic, and those lessons have been hard ones.

Weather conditions.

Everything is done according to the weather. The climate of the land has shaped the people and their culture.

Things do not always happen right on time and not always exactly as planned. This is part of the adventure of a new land. The weather may affect your flight schedules, daily itineraries, and clothing requirements. And while we can safely alter our trip, we can't alter mother nature.

Clothing requirements.

The guiding philosophy should be to dress in layers so you can adjust according to the weather. A general rule of thumb is to dress as if it were October in southern Canada or northern United States.

Health requirements.

Generally speaking, you should be in good health. People of all ages have come to the Arctic in past years and enjoyed their holiday. There is a good deal of walking over uneven terrain involved and this should be taken into account in your plans.

There are no drugstores in the area. You should make sure that you bring along adequate supplies of any prescriptions you may be taking.

Each northern community has a nursing station, but rarely a doctor. Arctic nurses are specially trained to perform simple medical treatments. More extensive problems will have to be administered to in Churchill.

Meals in the Arctic

Because of the cost of transportation of food, prices are substantially higher than what you will be used to. In nearly all cases, the tours include most meals.

The guides will always try to provide at least a sampling of northern native foods for you. Fish such as Arctic char and lake trout are generally plentiful. The serving of caribou is tightly controlled, and as such may not be available at all times.

Meals at the lodging establishments are of the home-cooked variety and are nutritious and filling. While the fare is plain, you will find the food delicious.

Having a drink.

Alcoholic beverages are restricted in most communities. Possession of alcohol is illegal in Eskimo Point and Coral Harbour. It cannot be purchased in any of the communities. Lodges operating outside of the communities do sell alcoholic beverages in their lounges.



Tips and advice for the photographer.

The Arctic scenery has frustrated many photographers, professional and amateur alike, with its wide open vistas. It seems virtually impossible to capture on film that feeling of vastness.

However, there are some things that can help you. In SLR 35mm photography you are advised to carry three lenses, a wide angle lens, a standard lens and, if possible, a telephoto lens up to 300mm. All of these lenses will provide excellent photo opportunities of scenery, people and wildlife.

A polarizing filter is essential for most applications due to the amount of glare off the water or especially from the snow during the spring.

In the Arctic you'll be amazed at how quickly you'll shoot off a roll of film, so always bring along lots of extra rolls. The film you desire may not be available at the retail stores in the community, or may be outdated.
