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On behalf of the Ministerial Committee on Spousal Assault, I am pleased to submit our First Annual Report in accordance with the directive given to us in "Choices" - A Three Year Action Plan to address Spousal Assault.

BACKGROUND

The final report of the Task Force on Spousal Assault, prepared for the Minister Responsible for the Status of Women, Government of the Northwest Territories was accepted in May 1985.

The Ministerial Committee, made up of representatives from responsible Territorial and Federal Departments and community representatives, prepared a 3-Year Action Plan, "CHOICES" in response to the recommendations. The report was adopted in the February 1986 Session and implementation began April 1, 1986.

The Ministerial Committee, chaired by the Women's Secretariat has the mandate to facilitate and monitor the implementation of "CHOICES".

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

There has been positive response and interest from communities to increase their understanding of the problem of family violence and initiate solutions. It was recommended that:

**"Programs and services should be provided
which will encourage and enable families
and communities to help themselves and
wherever possible be community-based"**

The Department of Social Services has the lead role and has developed **"The Family Violence Prevention Program"**.

We have seen existing and new groups develop locally based programs and projects and access funds through this program and other agencies. Through visits to communities by resource people working in the area of family violence, individuals are beginning to come together as concerned citizens to focus on what kinds of services can be developed. There is a continuing demand for community development assistance, as well as information and audio visual materials.

It is clear that attitudes are beginning to change. Communities are more willing to acknowledge the problem and take responsibility for working towards solutions.

Social Services
NWT HC

Rental housing under the northern, rental and public housing programs is generally not available for emergency use such as transition housing. Housing, however, could be released for such use on a permanent basis.

The NWT Housing Corporation will approve the rental of a larger house to a family (over accommodate them) sponsored by the Department of Social Services or an approved society to provide transition accommodation in a community. The Department of Social Services will work with the Housing Corporation to assure a co-ordinated response.

In Yellowknife, the NWT Housing Corporation is willing to establish a unit at Lanky Court and offer a lease at economic rent. It will also assist in the planning and construction of house(s) if the capital is provided through the Department of Social Services.

Housing will be considered on a case-by-case basis.

NWTHC reported that the local Housing Authorities/Associations will work with Social Services to provide a home for victims of spousal assault. Social Services reports that there is not enough housing.

Counselling

16. Provide for professional Family Life Education Consultants to support victims of spousal assault, their families and offenders through training and advice to nurses, social workers, court workers, RCMP, community groups, volunteers and lay counsellors, and schools. (See pgs. 18, 37)

Health

The Department currently employs a Coordinator of Family Life Education who acts in a consulting/advisory capacity to all groups/departments wishing information on family life topics.

Three additional Family Life Education Consultants will report to the Coordinator, and provide regional coverage at a community level to increase knowledge and skills of both public and professionals trying to assist and support victims of violence.

Human sexuality, communication skills, parenting, decision-making and values identification instruction provide the key to healthy life-styles and responsibility - the basis of family violence prevention.

Solutions to the spousal assault problem must be community-based, taking advantage of the resources already in the community. Social Services will act in an advisory capacity and will take the initiative in forming community-based groups. Contribution funding should be made available through Social services.

10 communities have requested funding for community-based programs. 9 have been funded to March 31/87, others pending. May 86 - Ongoing.

Social Services

It is necessary to determine whether being convicted is enough of a deterrent for the batterer or if there is a need for further rehabilitation outside of the correctional facility.

A pilot project examining this and the effectiveness of anger control therapy will be conducted.

The Department of Health, RCMP, Social Services and Health and Welfare have already agreed to an interagency protocol referral system. The recommendation will involve participation by field staff as well as co-operation with other agencies in order to create procedures and protocols which can be applied across the Northwest Territories.

The Intergovernmental Medical Legal Committee has formulated guidelines for interagency referral: A Dept. of Health committee has designed forms to document all spousal assault cases presented for medical care, even those where the RCMP not called in, so a pattern of assault can be clearly seen in a patient's chart. Stanton Hospital has approved a policy and protocol for use of these forms; evaluated after a three month trial.

Community agencies/social workers will ensure that victims are informed of their rights and told that if their spouse has been issued a restraining order he/she does not have to be allowed back into the home. They will also help the victim develop an escape plan where the batterer ignores the order.

The current role of courtworkers is to assist in the advocacy process. They provide a referral service but do not act as social workers/counsellors.

Federal funding for the courtworkers' program does not allow them to act as an advocate for the victim.

The Department of Justice and Public Services will encourage the preservation of the current role of courtworker.

Native courtworkers advise victims about Court procedures. If asked they will tell victims when they need to go to Court. Victims will be referred to relevant support agencies including safe houses, family counselling, social services, legal aid. Refer victims to the Crown prior to the court date if the victim wants to speak to the prosecutor, give advise about peace bonds, restraining orders, separation agreements. Involved with transition houses and speaking to counsellors.

Federal funding for this program does NOT allow them to act as advocate for the victim. Justice will encourage the preservation of the current role of courtworkers.

36. Review legislation and prepare a draft ordinance on spousal assault.
(See pg. 28)

Justice

In Canada, assault is considered an offence under the Federal Criminal Code and is not within the jurisdiction of the Northwest Territories. Therefore, there is no initiative at present for Justice to prepare legislation dealing directly with spousal assault.

The Department of Justice is reviewing legislation on family law. Issues being considered include:

Assault is an offence under the Federal Criminal Code and not within the jurisdiction of the NWT. Justice Canada is ready, willing and able to consult if deemed appropriate by Territorial Justice.

Dept. of Justice will not be responding to this recommendation because Federal assault legislation is already in place. Justice is reviewing legislation on Family Law which includes spousal support obligations.

By: Justice Territorial New Mental Health Act passed in June 1985 and is broad enough for a perpetrator with psychological problems to be committed.

The Mental Health Act was amended at the 1985 second session of the Legislative Assembly. This recommendation was considered before the Act was passed. Although there is no specific provision dealing with batterers, the Department of Health believes that the provisions for nonvoluntary committal are sufficient to include a perpetrator of spousal assault "with suspected psychological problems".
