The Heritage Training Program offers a variety of learning opportunities for northerners who:

- already work in the museums or heritage field and want to upgrade their skills and knowledge
- are interested in starting a heritage or museum project in their community
- need training in order to pursue paid or volunteer work with a museum or heritage-related project
- want to learn more about the preservation and interpretation of the heritage of the Northwest Territories

Archaeology Field Schools

Since 1983, the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre field schools have combined traditional knowledge with science. While working on archaeological sites in camp situations, students learn about the relationship between past and present knowledge, and help scientists to discover new information. Field schools were held on the Canol Road in the Mackenzie Mountains, Arviat, and at Gupuk, in the Mackenzie Delta in 1989.

Accredited Courses

We have information about university, college and non-credit courses and programs in museum and heritage studies across Canada and the U.S., as well as apprenticeships, correspondence courses and other sources of training. Check with the Heritage Training Program for information and assistance.

On-Site Follow-Up

It's often exhilerating to go away and learn new things. But sometimes it can be difficult to apply new knowledge and skills back on the job. The Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre staff can assist you in putting new knowledge and skills to practical use at your place of work.

Internships/Apprenticeships

On-the-job training is available at the Prince of Wales Northern Heritage Centre for a limited number of candidates interested in pursuing careers in museums or a related field. Internships generally involve at least a few months of work at the Centre in Yellowknife. An internship or apprenticeship can be designed to suit your specific career or project goals.

Travel Assistance

The Heritage Training Program provides financial assistance to help with travel costs for people wishing to attend a workshop. Funds will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis. The Basics of Collections Management Yellowknife - September 26-28, 1989

What to collect, how to collect it, and how to keep it. This workshop is aimed at museums, historical societies and projects which already have, or are acquiring a collection of artifacts and specimens.

Planning for a Collection Igaluit - October 17-19, 1989

Building a museum? Planning a cultural, educational, or visitors' centre? If you need some pointers on defining your collection goals and designing a building or programs, this workshop is for you.

The Basics of Archives Management Yellowknife - November 21-23, 1989

This workshop covers the basics of collecting, handling, cataloguing and storing archival materials. Find out what to collect and what to do with photograph albums or oral history tapes. There will be time to discuss the development of *your* archives.

Learn the basics of designing and producing an exhibit. There will be hands-on experience with exhibit techniques such as typesetting, silkscreening and layout.

Museums and heritage centres are more than just buildings full of old things. Learn how to tell the stories behind artifacts in a way that gets people excited about their history.


Locations and Dates - To Be Announced
