Background

The Status of Women Council of the Northwest Territories was created in April, 1990, under the *Status of Women Council Act* of the Legislative Assembly of the NWT. The mandate of the Council is to work towards the equality of women in the NWT, through advice to the Territorial government, research, public education, advocacy on behalf of women, and assistance to women's groups. The Government of the NWT funds the operating costs of the Council through an annual contribution agreement.

Under the Act, the Council members are appointed by the NWT Minister Responsible for the Status of Women. During 1994-95, Di Ann Blesse and Eva Arreak were appointed to the Council and Bernadette Dean resigned.

The Council has an office located in space provided by the Government of the N.W.T. in Yellowknife. Written materials or videos can be borrowed from the Council office at no charge. We also provide information to the public on issues of concern to women. The Status of Women Council Community Worker can provide workshops and information to help women's groups to organize or work on projects or issues, or to help other groups who are working on issues of concern to women.

Involvement in meetings/conferences

The Council met in Yellowknife in October, 1994, and by conference call four times during 1994/95. During the year Council members and staff had ongoing contact with many individual women, local women's groups and territorial and national women's organizations.

Activities and Initiatives

Violence against Women, Children and Elders

We were pleased to see a number of territorial, regional and local organizations adopt resolutions similar to the Legislative Assembly zero tolerance Declaration on Family Violence during the past year. We were disappointed, however, by the GNWT decision to drop work on a detailed strategy to address violence, because of the work being done on the community wellness strategy. While we agree that community wellness is a key to reducing violence in the long-term, the very real needs of victims of violence must also be addressed in the present. These needs include shelter, counselling, advocacy, housing, programs for the chidren, legal support, and stronger legal means to keep the abuser away from the victims.

More public awareness and attitude change are also needed in order to reduce violence. We have received funding from GNWT Health & Social Services to produce a series of TV awareness clips on violence during the coming year. They will deal with the issues of spousal abuse, child abuse, elder abuse, sexual assault, sexual harassment, and substance abuse.

Sexual Harassment of Women

During 1994-95 we continued our efforts to support and advocate on behalf of women who have been sexually harassed in the workplace. The harrassing behaviour can range from sexual comments all the way to sexual assault. Several complaints have finally been settled, however this long and difficult process has shown that the GNWT does not have adequate mechanisms to deal with sexual harassment complaints, both within its own workplace and in non-government workplaces.

As a result of these cases, the GNWT is reviewing how sexual harassment complaints by its employees are handled. The *Fair Practices Act* has also been strengthened; it provides some legal recourse in cases of discrimination, including discrimination in the workplace. Our advocacy on behalf of women who have been sexually harassed has convinced us that NWT human rights legislation is desperately needed, along with awareness campaigns on sexual harassment, directed to employers and the general public.

Sexual Assault

We were outraged at the Daviault decision of the Supreme Court of Canada, which said that extreme drunkeness could be a defence to a crime of general intent, such as sexual assault. Our position was that drunkeness should never be a defence. The Govt. of Canada has proposed new legislation to define a "standard of reasonable care". It would state that people who voluntarily become so intoxicated that they lose control of their behaviour and cause harm to others, are violating this standard and can be held criminally responsible. This would in effect prevent intoxication from being accepted as a defence.

We supported amendments to the NWT *Limitation* of *Actions Act*, which removed the time limit for launching civil action in a sexual assault where the

perpetrator was in a position of trust for the victim, or where the victim was dependent on the perpetrator. This will benefit adult survivors of child sexual abuse, who may have repressed the memory of abuse for many years or did not feel ready to confront the abuser.

We have been working with several other groups on a review of the forensic evidence kit used in cases of sexual assault (the "rape kit"), and to look at ways to improve the response to victims of sexual assault. A report and recommendations based on this work will be available in July, 1995.

We are also involved with other groups in a needs assessment regarding short- and long-term help for survivors of sexual assault. We feel strongly that the silence and denial around sexual assault must be broken and ways found to treat victims and survivors. We believe sexual assault to be a significant factor in many suicides and suicide attempts by women and girls.

Child and Spousal Maintenance

Maintenance (support) is money paid by one expartner to the other after the marriage or common-law relationship ends, to help with the living costs of the children and/or the ex-spouse. During 1994/95 amendments were made to the NWT *Maintenance Act* to entitle common-law ex-partners to apply for spousal maintenance; this will potentially benefit many women in the NWT. The new pamphlet and poster, entitled We Owe It To Our Children, have helped to raise awareness of child and spousal maintenance. The Maintenance Enforcement Office of the NWT Dept. of Justice has been doing excellent work to ensure that maintenance payments are made, for any Maintenance Orders that are registered with the Office.

In spite of this progress, we believe that the vast majority of NWT women are still not seeking or receiving maintenance from their ex-partners. More promotion of the program is needed, so that women become more aware of their right to seek maintenance. The legal process involved in obtaining a Maintenance Order is very slow, and family law matters are not given priority by Legal Aid. It can often take two years to obtain a Maintenance Order, and the process is particularly difficult and discouraging to women living in smaller communities in the NWT. Ways must be found to speed up the process and make it more easily accessible to women across the NWT. We also believe that support payments should not be counted as income under the Federal Income Tax Act or social assistance regulations.

Women and Politics

During 1994/95 the Council and the Native Women's Association of the NWT continued to work together to promote women's participation in the development of a constitution for the new Western Territory after division of the NWT in 1999. As part of this process, we received funding to hold a women's conference on the constitution in December, 1994, and a women's caucus before the first major constitutional conference in January, 1995. The Council, the Native Women's Association and many individual women attending the January constitutional conference stated that there must be guaranteed 50% representation of women in the Legislative Assembly of the Western Territory, and on government boards and agencies. We also want to see a Social Charter included in the new constitution.

We plan to continue our work on western NWT constitutional issues during 1995/96, in preparation for the next major constitutional conference in the spring of 1996.

In 1994 we responded to the Standing Committee on Legislation regarding how the "Ombudsman" (Access and Privacy Commissioner) office should be established. We believe this should be done as one office as soon as possible, with a review in two years to see if the two functions should be split. One very important role of the office should be to give people information on how to appeal unfair decisions or treatment by government and who to contact to do this. (Under the legislation the Access and Privacy Commissioner can only take up cases where all other appeal routes have been tried). If the office is well promoted and has part-time staff in communities, we believe the number of inquiries will be very large.

Women and Education


The Council and the NWT Network of the Canadian Congress for Learning Opportunities for Women (CCLOW-NWT) have completed our joint project to consult teen women in the NWT on their education and career planning.

A detailed report on the project has been produced, along with a project summary and a magazine-style report to the young women who participated. As a follow-up to the project, we are producing a kit containing discussion guides, activities and resources on education and career issues, for use by anyone working with girls and adolescent women.

The Council also provided feedback to the Dept. of Education, Culture and Employment on its Strategy to 2010 and on Bill 25, the proposed Education Act. We strongly believe that the Preamble to the Act must include a recognition of equality rights, and the right to a learning environment free from violence or intimidation. We are also extremely concerned about the number of young people who are leaving the formal school system at an early age. There is a huge need for alternative programs for these children, and for assessment services and programs to address a wide range of learning disabilities at all ages.

Child Care

During 1994/95 a number of improvements were made to the NWT Child Care program. Part-time and after-school care is now eligible for operating grants and parent subsidies. More low-income parents will qualify for the subsidy. Applications for parent subsidies are now assessed through a need test, rather than a simple income test. Higher start-up and operating grants are available for infant spaces or special needs children.

There are a number of issues in child care which must be addressed:

- many day cares have inadequate buildings and there is a need for capital grants to upgrade facilities
- in some communities with active day care committees, the lack of a suitable building is preventing the establishment of day care. The GNWT must provide several capital grants per year to allow for the construction of a facility in these cases.
- wages for child care workers are low and day cares cannot afford to offer benefits.
- many child care workers cannot access Early Childhood Education training in their community.

- A practical, hands-on training module that can be delivered in the community is needed.
- few children with severe disabilities can attend daycare because there is no funding for hiring special needs aids.

Income and Employment

During 1994/95 we provided input to two major initiatives - the Federal Social Security Reform initiative and the NWT Income Support Review. Some key points that we made:

- equality of opportunity for women must be a basic principle in all programs.
- there must be support for training designed specifically to meet women's needs and interests.
 Most economic development and training initiatives in the NWT have been in sectors where very few women work, such as mining or construction.
 There is little support for sectors which are more interesting to most women, or for special training programs to encourage women into non-traditional work. This is not equitable and this way of doing things must change, so women are able to benefit more.
- women's self-employment in arts and crafts should receive support similar to that given through trappers/harvesters assistance programs.
- there must be community control over programs and resources for job creation, social assistance, and training and employment
- people should not be forced into work projects or training in order to receive social assistance, but should be strongly encouraged into training/employment by providing options and support that truly meet their needs.

With respect to the Investing in People work activity pilot projects of the GNWT, we are concerned that few women are benefitting, as most projects are in areas such as construction or harvesting caribou. Women must be involved in all decisions about what kinds of work activity or training programs will take place.

Women's Health

During 1994/95 we continued to work closely with the GNWT Department of Health and community organizations to develop a comprehensive resource kit on women's health issues and the rights of health consumers. Four booklets were produced and distributed, covering safer sex, your rights and responsibilities as a health care consumer, getting ready to visit your health care provider, and selfesteem. The Council also produced a video on Women and AIDS/STDs, entitled "Our New Sexuality", and a series of TV awareness clips for women on safer sex.

There are other women's health issues which we are discussing with the Dept. of Health. These include a possible breast cancer mammography screening program and ways to promote awareness and prevention of breast and other cancers in women.

Women and Substance Abuse

The Council and four community women's groups are working in partnership to talk with women about their experience of substance abuse, and what is needed to provide effective treatment and support for them. This project will also look at ways to raise awareness of FAS/E and do effective prevention with high-risk women. Funding for this needs assessment project has been provided by Canada's Drug Strategy, and the Women's Program of Status of Women Canada. The findings will enable ourselves and others to advocate for the support and services that women need to deal with substance abuse and to prevent alcohol-related birth effects in children.

Community Wellness Strategy

The Council participated in the Working Group consultations which helped develop the directions for the Strategy. The Strategy will basically set out a new way for the GNWT to work with communities to bring about community wellness. Communities will identify their own needs, goals and priorities for community wellness, and the GNWT will collaborate with them in various ways to enable them to reach their goals. Key areas are training and education for caregivers and others; prevention, healing and treatment; inter-agency co-operation; and community empowerment. The full Strategy is to be presented to the Legislative Assembly in early 1997.

Although we have been frustrated by some confusion in the process of developing the Strategy, we generally support the direction the GNWT is taking. Frontline workers, women's groups and other community people have been saying for a long time "give us the resources and support, and we will deal with our problems".

Workshops Manual

The From Dark To Light: Regaining A Caring Community manual is a project of the Women's Community Action Team (WCAT), an ad hoc committee of the Status of Women Council. Many facilitators and community people from across the NWT helped develop it. We believe the manual will be a valuable tool to assist community people in facilitating their own workshops in their community. It was officially launched at the Legislative Assembly in Yellowknife on March 8, 1995, and is available in English, French, and Inuktitut syllabics. We are deeply grateful to the many funders who supported the project.

During 1995/96 we will be developing a detailed funding proposal for a follow-up phase to train interested community people in facilitation skills and the use of the workshops manual.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

March 31, 1995

NOTE1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Capital Expenditures

Capital expenditures are considered to be an expense in the period of acquisition.

b) Fund Accounting

A fund basis of accounting has been followed. Related revenue and expenditures have been grouped into funds, based upon their purpose.

c) **Revenue Recognition**

Revenue is recorded in the period specified in the funding agreements entered into with government agencies and other organizations. Funding received in advance of making the related expenditures is recorded as deferred revenue.

d) Allocation of Expenditures

Common expenditures have been allocated to programs based on an estimate of the services provided.

NOTE 2 DEFERRED REVENUE

Deferred Revenue is unexpended contributions during the fiscal period that is transferred by agreement into the subsequent period.
