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Following are four recommendations that I feel should be implemented to alleviate the problems. These problems have also been identified through the Minister's Forum on Education.

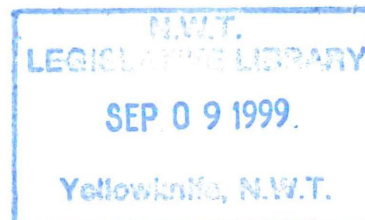
