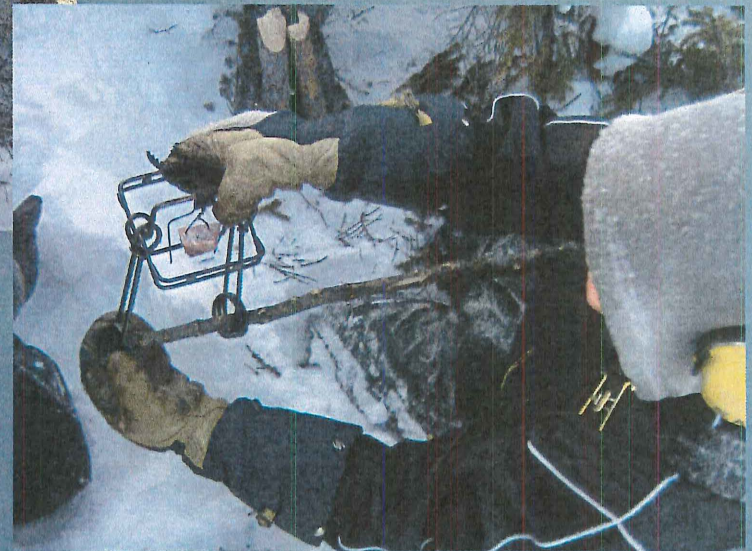

Day 1 February 18, 2006 Rabbit Skin Crossing

Weather: Warm

Left town around 12 noon. Got to camp and had to cut fire wood and get water. Cleaned in and around the cabin and then had something to eat. We set four hooks for fish. There's lots of work to be done when you come to a camp; you never come to a camp that's clean around here.



Day 2 February 19, 2006 Rabbit Skin Crossing

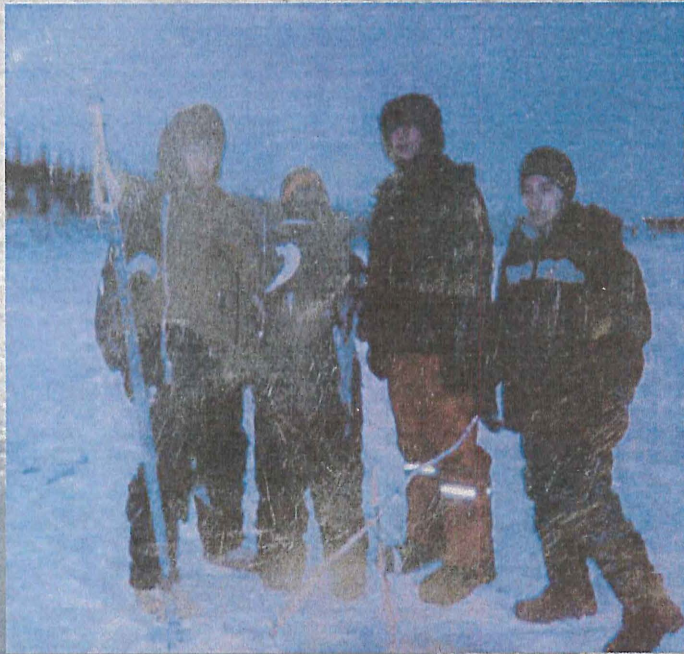
Weather: -12°

We went to see our hooks: two fish. Had a great meal and set rabbit snares. The students are sure happy to be out here. They want to learn some things about bush life. They have to learn lots. Even me. I'm seventy four years old and I learn something new every day. Even the weather is not like 1950: warm year-round. In the evening, I tell them stories about how it used to be. They sure like that.

Day 3 February 20, 2006

Rabbit Skin Crossing

Weather: -14°



Went to check the fish hooks and rabbit snares. We caught 2 fish and 3 rabbits. So we are very happy. Today we show them how to make open fire and what dry wood looks like, safety with a chainsaw, how to work on skidoos, and firearms safety. All of these things we show them. Today is something new too: I have a partner to help with the work. It's a lot of work for one person. We have three skidoos and five boys and more coming.

Day 4 February 21, 2006

Rabbit Skin Crossing

Weather: -16°

Went to the hooks and got four fish and two rabbits. We went hunting for moose but had no luck. Worked on wood and water. We are thinking of moving to the next camp, but not yet. Will show them how to set marten traps and beaver traps. Days are getting long so it's good to work late.

Day 5 February 22, 2006

Rabbit Skin Crossing

Weather: Cold

We get two more fish and one rabbit and went hunting, but no luck. We are thinking of moving to Inland Lake where we can hunt caribou and set net under the ice. We are trying to teach them everything we know.

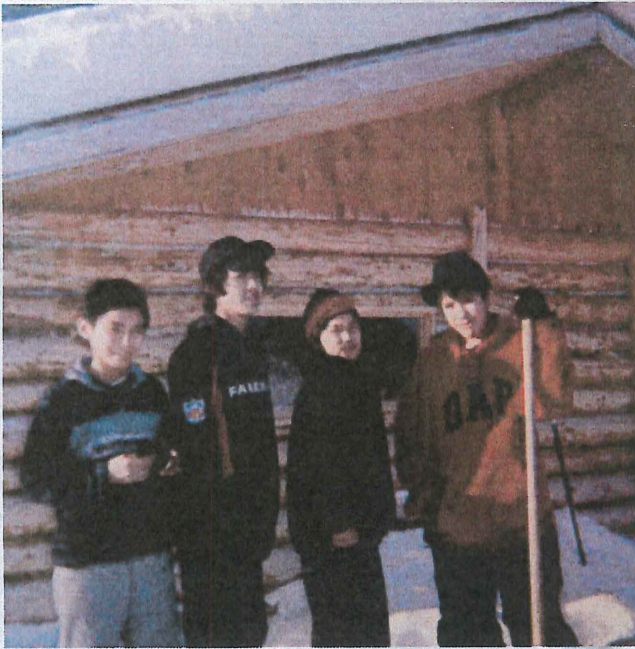
Day 6 February 23, 2006

Island Lake

Weather: Very cold wind

We left Rabbit Skin around 10 in the morning and made fire at the game warden's cabin. We got here, made fire, cleaned up the cabin and worked on wood and water.





Day 7 February 24, 2006 Island Lake Weather: -36°

We had to work on wood. There was no wood at the cabin. Very cold. We went to look for caribou but it was too cold. We had lots to do around the cabin. We banked the wall with snow so that it would be warm in the cabin. I was telling students old time stories for about two hours: When I was a kid I worked hard for Mom and Dad every day. Work and wood and ice for water. And we play only after all the work is done. No skidoo, dog team. They like me telling them these stories.

Day 8 February 25, 2006

Colville Lake Weather: -38°

We went to get more gas and oil. We want to hunt and get some meat and fish for the students to take home. The gas price is really high.



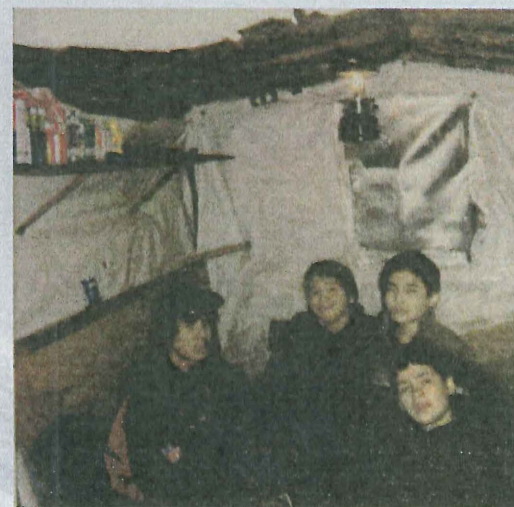
Day 9

February 26, 2006

Colville Lake

Weather: -37°

We went hunting and got two caribou and went to the nets and got some fish. So we have fish and meat to take home. So we never came for nothing. I tell the students If you work hard you get what you want. If you don't work, you get nothing. I tell them Bush life is not like town life. Now they know.



Day 10

February 27, 2006

Island Lake

Weather: -34° and cold wind



We came back from Colville Lake and shot one moose on the way to here. Lucky students are very happy now. We went to the nets when we were there. So we got fish too. We got 8 martens too. We had only 15 traps so it's O.K. Better than nothing. They know how to skin martens now.

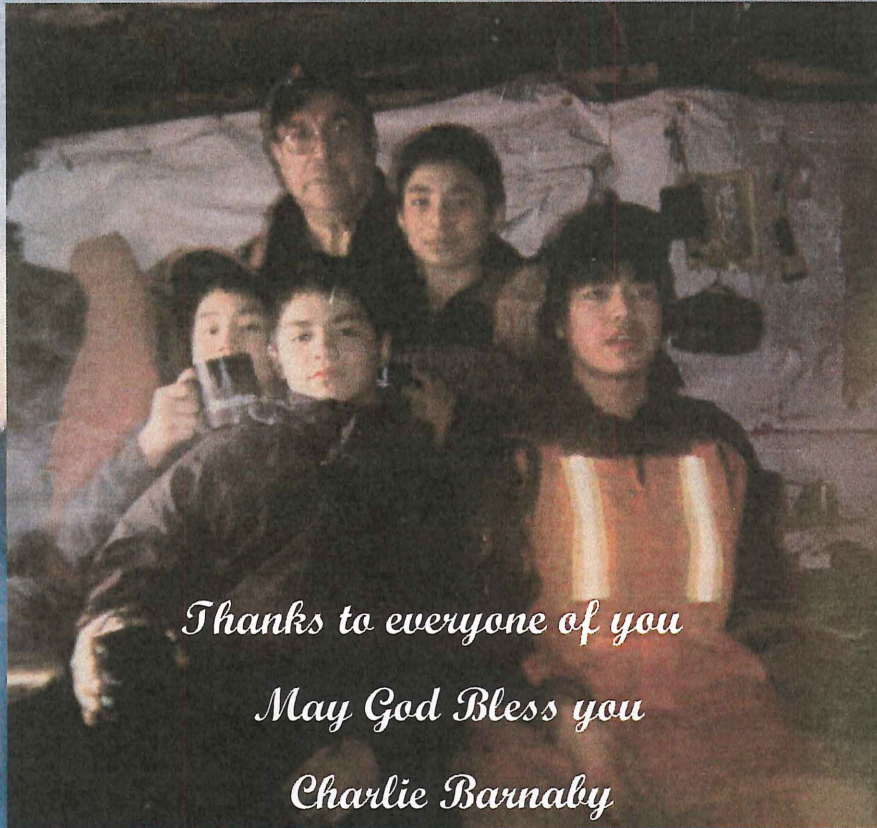
Day 11

February 27, 2006

Fort Good Hope

Weather: -38°

*We left Island Lake at 8:00 in the morning and got here at 5:30. We had to make two fires
– it's too cold for them and got a truck to meet us – took four students. We had to keep one
student to drive one skidoo. My partner drove one too.
Oh, we had a good time.*


